Membership this year hit an all-time high. Over 14,100 members and climbing! The ACTA embarked on a campaign for 14,000 members in 2014, 15,000 in 2015 and so on, this being an idea from one of our sponsors. I thank him for the initiative of bringing it to the Executive Committee several years ago.

The new database is up and running with a tremendous amount of work performed by the ACTA office. Tony Turner, the Executive Officer puts in a mountain of work out of hours for no expectation of reward as does all of the office staff. These ladies have the Association at heart and perform above and beyond expectation. I would be remiss not to also mention Dave the groundsman for work he undertakes on the national ground, with support from Fred Rapley and others. This year I had the fortune to attend the Commonwealth Carnival in Kingaroy, Queensland and although my shooting skills were not to the greatest standard I had a great time enjoying the club's hospitality. To those who made it the success that it was, the members who attended thank you – as does the whole of the Association for progressing this carnival further.

Change – as I have previously written – some people love it, others hate it. Some change though is inevitable. The ACTA Executive Committee, through the Championships Committee, has examined the conduct of the National Double Barrel 'Blue Ribbon' event and have changed the program to see if there is another format of the carnival that will assist in the conduct of the program. However, after every carnival a debrief is held by the Championships Committee as to what did and didn't work. If it is found that this format is not correct, there will be a change to next year's program.

The Clay Target Shooting News (CTSN) has also had a 'makeover' and I thank Judy and Jim Shepherd for the work that they do in production of this magazine. If you

# EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

The 2014 year commenced with the very sad passing of National Vice-President Mr Ron Traill. Ron was a very respected and much loved member of the Association and the sport for most of his life. Ron's contribution to the Association cannot be detailed in such a short report, needless to say we all miss Ron's contribution to the Association as a whole and particularly his knowledge of the rules (and the spirit of those rules) and the National Championships. For all those who knew Ron personally, he was a gentleman in the true sense of the word and is never far from our thoughts.

Our National representation continues to be of the highest level with the National Trap team attending the World Championships in Hamilton, New Zealand with great results detailed in the World Championships report. The governing body of the International Clay Target Shooting Federation went through substantial change in 2014 with the resignation of President John McCormack of Ireland. Unfortunately John was unable to continue due to workplace legislation in Ireland. Vice President of the Association at the time Mr. Robert Nugent stepped into the breach and continues to provide leadership. We welcomed to the National Executive, Mr. Malcolm Dyson from Victoria and Mr. Don Power from NSW. Both Malcolm and Don settled in very quickly, immediately being active contributors to the Association through various sub-committees and as part of the Executive Committee.

My thanks to all of the volunteers who selflessly contributed their time to Clubs, Zones and State

Associations. Without these people, and those on the Executive Committee who give up their time and holidays to assist this Association, we would not be in the position we are today. To all of the sponsors of the 'Nationals' we appreciate your support of our National Events and the competitors.

Suzy Balogh commenced in the position of Coaching Director in April 2014. Suzy has already made a powerful impact in the area of Coach Development/Accreditation as well as attending Junior Coaching camps and implementing the ACTA Academy for nationally recognised Juniors. This is only the beginning of the rebuilding of coaching numbers and providing a structured pathway for both coaches and junior athletes.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the staff of the National office, it was a huge year for them as we firstly spent many hours discussing, revising and developing the template for the data-base. This process was a great deal more complicated than first thought. It was a true test of their perseverance along with performing their normal duties as required.

Our new alliance with the Media and Arts Unit of Charles Sturt University has already produced dividends, with coverage of the National Trap Championships. The media project will continue in 2015 with expanded coverage of events including the National ISSF Championships in January.

### COACHING

#### ACTA COACHING AND DEVELOPMENT PATHWAY

Junior scholarship initiative – prospective candidates were selected to attend the AISL ISSF Junior competition in Sydney from athletes who attended the junior coaching camp.

#### COACH DEVELOPMENT – CLUB/COMPETITION

Coaching modules are now posted on ACTA web-site with new coaching material developed for implementation in 2014.

Setting up a simultaneous coach development and the pathway structures within Australia. The NCD will ensure assistance to State Coaching programs.

We will work with State Institutes of Sport in gaining assistance for athletes.

2014 will introduce structured junior programs through assistance/co-operation with States including the implementation of the ACTA Academy program for all disciplines with links to State programs.

## INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING

The ISSF Nationals in 2014 were conducted in Perth and were run under the rule changes made in November and December of 2013. With the ISSF changing rules so close to the end of the year, it had caused some concern regarding the machine downloads, as these were not available from the manufacturers. With the co-operation of the shooters most changes were able to be done, but for the Trap Finals, it was shot under the former rules, so the shoot could be fair and equitable.

The ISSF dress code was introduced and this was generally accepted by the shooters. This was considered by us to be good training for those wishing to shoot overseas. The ISSF National event was used as a selection for the Commonwealth Games. Womens Double Trap had been added to the competition as it is now an event for the Commonwealth Games. 10 women shot the event.

At this event we had the required number of officials attending.

There were 7 people who attended the ISSF International Referees Course held in Perth. We have now a good amount of officials to call on when needed, which is important when Australian Cups and State events are held in their own States. We are always looking for people to become officials.

It is good to see many States are now getting PQS status for their ISSF Championships. The shooter's scores go to Shooting Australia and count for their ranking, etc. We hope in time all States will be able to do the same as it then gives these events the same status as Australian Cups.

A new set of Questions/Answers are completed and have been sent to the ISSF Referee Examiners in all States to use when testing for the ACTA ISSF Referees Badge. An update was required now the rules have been radically changed.

A big congratulations to our Commonwealth Games Gold Medallists, Laura Coles, Laetisha Scanlan and Adam Vella.

Also Bronze Medallist at the 2014 World Championships, Catherine Skinner, who also obtained a Quota Spot for Australia.

At the World Championships/Grand Prix in Double Trap Womens Emma Cox won a Silver Medal and Jack Wallace, the Junior Trap Silver Medal.

### PROMOTIONS

The last twelve months have been extremely busy and challenging with the introduction of the new online registration and members 'My Page'. It is fair to say we have had a few teething problems and these are being addressed as they occur, but I believe that this new system and data base will be a great asset to the Association in the future.

We have been working on increasing the membership to achieve 15,000 members in 2015 and are well on the way to achieving this with 14,154 members at the end of September 2014.

A program is being prepared to hold Media Education Days in each State to try and encourage more positive media involvement and coverage of our sport. This has proven difficult in the past but we must keep trying. We also have media students from the Charles Sturt University in Wagga Wagga who are attending our national events producing videos and interviews to be used as promotional material on our website and hopefully as TV content. If this is successful I would like to extend it to include State and major events in the future.

I would like to remind Clubs, Zones, and States that if they are conducting promotional events, promotional materials and banners are available. I thank everyone who have been involved in promoting our sport and hope that you have gained members and friends from the experience.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our Executive Officer and the ladies in the office, without their dedication and hard work the Association could not prosper.

### NATIONAL GROUND

Complex and Facilities Report 2014

New works undertaken or completed in 2014.

1. Referees/scorer stands – shade covers.

A prototype shade cover was designed, manufactured and displayed on the grounds during the NSW Trap Championships in October 2014. Manufacture of the covers for the remainder of the stands will be installed in early in 2015.

2. Aluminium 3 tier grandstands – shade covers.

Various designs and pricing has been sourced and evaluated for the nine (9) existing grandstands, scheduled for installation in 2015.

3. Camping grounds – drainage improvement program.

MJM Consulting Engineers were engaged to provide a proposal for improving the existing drains and adding additional drains and pits on the camp site areas on the eastern end of the grounds. This proposal is currently being reviewed. Construction will be undertaken in 2015.

4. New Ball Trap – layouts 2, 4, and 6 Three (3) Mattarelli Multi-Directional Ball Traps have been purchased for delivery in early 2015. A number of trap house designs have been completed and are currently being evaluated, with site work scheduled to commence on installation at the end of March, 2015.

5. Toilet and shower blocks – refurbishment.

## RULES

In 2014 the Rules Committee implemented a number of changes, taking effect from 1 August, 2014. Those Rules included:-

Skeet -

Rule 6.01 (a) to change to:-

*'All appropriate 12 gauge and 20 gauge scores shall be recorded for percentage performance classification irrespective of how the event is run.'*

Trap, Skeet and Sporting Clays –

New Rule 4.08(d), 8.08(d) and 11.02(h)

*'The use and carriage of military style shotguns are prohibited on ACTA grounds at all times.'*

Taipan Shield changes:

*Teams to consist of three women registered with the ACTA. Two from the same club, whilst the third member may be from a neighbouring club.*

*The event is to be shot from October to December.*

*Team members can only nominate for one team.*

All other rules remain the same.

## COMPLIANCE AND GOVERNANCE

The Legal and Governance Committee's name was changed to Compliance and Governance to better reflect the role of the Committee.

National Executive Committee members Cheryl Arnol (Chair), Kim Hibble, Rob Fox and co-opted ACTA member Neil Haydon are members of the Committee. Ms Kay Hull takes a judicial role on the Committee as necessary.

The Committee has delegated authority from the National Executive and its terms of reference include –

1. Review matters that are referred to the Committee from the National Executive in relation to governance issues at either State or National level.
2. Monitor the operation of the National Executive to ensure compliance with the constitution.
3. Make recommendations to the National Executive in relation to referrals to a judicial committee or appeals panel as appropriate.
4. Make recommendations to the National Executive for decisions that will achieve good governance outcomes.

The Committee's prime role is to review the governance procedures in relation to the operation of the ACTA.

The Compliance and Governance Committee's role is not to provide legal opinion to any of the stakeholders of the ACTA. The Committee reviews matters referred to it and provides the National Executive with its considered opinion on the best course of action that could be taken in the confines of the governance structure of the ACTA.

The principal activities of the Association during the financial year was to operate as a sport's governing body.


There was no significant change in the nature of these activities during the year.
