THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

"I am entering, of course, but just for practice." "What's the use of entering—I couldn't win in this company"—"I've got no chance"—"It is too much of a handicap for me to overcome." These and similar exclamations are frequently heard when entries are being taken for a championship contest at any big meeting. Obviously the three last mentioned are veritable "no-hopers" in their outlook to improving their shooting. The sportsman entering for "practice" is the one destined to be a first class shot and eventually be classified among the great in clay pigeon shooting.

Front-markers, generally speaking, fail to grasp the importance of open championship competition against the very best. Improvement by an individual in clay pigeon shooting can, to a marked extent, be likened to a moderate type player taking part in a first class tennis encounter, the very fact of competing with and against the best gradually brings him up to the class desired. The prac-

tice obtained in a first class championship has an unlimited effect on a shooter's outlook and does more to "bring him out" than a very great amount of coaching. A striking example of the value of championship competition was observed at a recent New South Wales championship meeting. Several Victorian front and middle-mark shooters faced up in the title event—none felt he could win it—but all considered "practice from 20 yards" was just what they wanted. As was expected none got into the placings in the championship, but in a big handicap which followed four out of the five mentioned finished with possibles and cut the big prize. The quartette was unanimous that the practice gained in the championship from the rear mark provided them with the necessary confidence to "smash them to dust" from their normal handicap—all four had a most profitable day. This instance is only one of many in past months. Clubs allotted championships are recommended to encourage front-markers to enter in big events as only by such means will these shooters become the champions of the future.

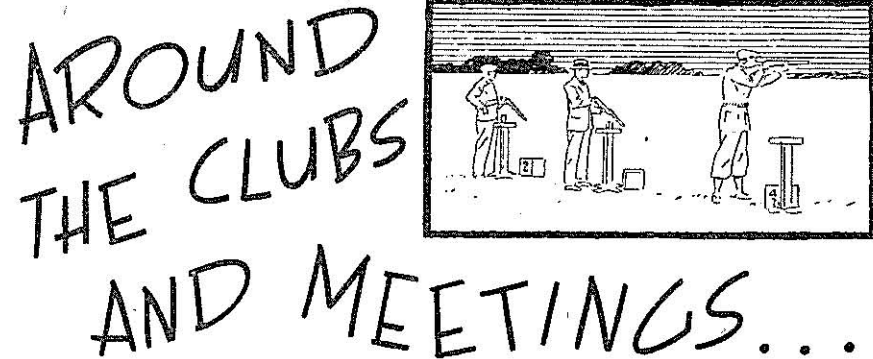

BATHURST G. C. (N.S.W.)—The Mount Panorama shooting ground of the Bathurst Gun Club drew an attendance of over 60 shooters last month when the main events were the New South Wales Mixed birds title of 1947 and a £25 handicap. In addition to shooters from the home State the visitors included a sprinkling of Queenslanders. The meeting was the most successful ever held by the club. Luke P. Hughes (Sydney) who the previous month had won the Commonwealth Mixed birds championship at Leeton, was the ultimate winner of the title event. Over the first stage at double-barrel eight possibles were recorded. Frank Bean (Lithgow) emerged leader with a possible 10 points after the second stage. Bean dropped astern when he missed four out of his five releases at walk-up, Luke Hughes going into the lead with a possible five straight, and an aggregate of 14/15. He had missed his second bird at double-barrel. Hughes held a one point lead entering the final stage at double-rise. Those nearest to him being L. Norris (Coogee), G. G. Beaumont (Young) and E. Brazenall (Punchbowl), all 13/15. Hughes maintained his lead and ran out winner 17/20. Beaumont and Brazenall tied for second 16/20. In the shoot-off Beaumont finished one up on Brazenall. Hughes was warmly congratulated on his success. He made a special trip from Sydney to assist the club and referee the shoot—his onerous duties of the day apparently did not affect his form. Gordon Beaumont (2nd) has not been a lucky competitor in big events. His placing in this title series recalls his eventful second to H. R. Donnelly

(now of Bruthen, Vic.) in the Commonwealth double-barrel championship at Holbrook (N.S.W.) in 1941. On that occasion Donnelly missed his first two birds in the big event. Beaumont (although lacking practice) stuck on to tie with Donnelly 23/25—he could have won but failed to stop his second last bird. In the tie shoot Donnelly was much too experienced and won comfortably. (It is worth recalling that Donnelly showed remarkable championship temperament on the occasion referred to. Although shooting right under his first two birds and missing completely he re-set himself on the mark and went on throughout the day and did not miss another bird). The £25 Handicap first money went to S. Lamb of Goulburn with Len Humphries (former secretary of Bathurst Club) runner-up. Others close up were H. Parker (Bigga) and F. Bean (Lithgow).

HOBART G. C. (Tas.)—As will be noticed in the advertising section of this issue of "News" the Hobart Club has introduced for its main event on February 14th, a ten bird, "Jack Rabbit Double-barrel Handicap." This is somewhat in the nature of a trial and is certainly a novel innovation. The conditions of the event are, nomination 5/- with 20/- added, which is refunded 2/- each bird "killed" of the 10 to all shooters. The amount remaining "jackpot" is then divided by the high guns on 12 yard mark, 13 to 15 yard handicaps and 16 yards and over. The result of this unique event will be watched with interest by mainland clubs. If successful it is almost certain to be tried elsewhere.

This experience of Smith's recalls a similar happening some years ago in a Victorian mixed title on the old Bentleigh grounds of

the Nobel Club. Turoa Webster, the former New Zealand jockey held a clear lead to the final stage and required to break only one pair at double-rise to be outright winner. Webster broke all his right swingers and completely missed all the left birds and thus failed to score in the stage. He finished out of a place. Newton Thomas shot particularly well throughout the Townsville Club's two day meeting. On the second day he gained first money in the £50 Handicap with a score of 20/20 and later divided a five birder off 20 yards. W. Carrington (Charters Towers) and J. Smith (Home Hill) divided the placings in the £50 handicap, each 17/20. A 14 round skeet event went to S. Ball (Powlathanga) 13/14, with W. W. James (Townsville), Thomas and Melville dividing the places, 12/14. Three five birder's resulted—No. 1 div. R. H. Winn (Townsville), W. J. Hanran (Townsville) divided first and second with Joe. Hanran third. No. 2 div. W. Carrington, Joe Hanran, Newton Thomas, R. Knuth, J. Pratt, A. Clay and D. Peberdy. No. 3 div. Joe Hanran, D. Peberdy and W. Jones. The winners in each event scored possibles. W. J. (Willo) Hanran, the club's Vice-President and Honorary Association Vice-President, and Club Patron, D. Peberdy, made the presentations of the winning trophies. The club was favoured throughout with ideal weather and all competitors voted the series one of the most enjoyable since resumption of competitive shooting.

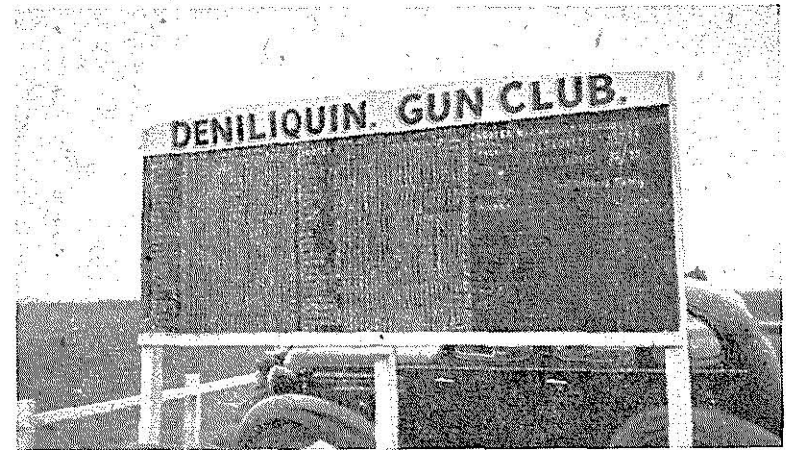

TOWNSVILLE G. C. (Qld.)—The Gun Club held its Christmas clay bird shoot in pleasant conditions. Members turned out in force to make the shoot a huge success. The opening event at five birds, single barrel, produced seven possibles. F. Blackman stopped another 5/5 to fill first place with 10/10. W. Hanran was second with 9/10 and R. Winn was third with 6/7. Another five birder, produced four possibles. The shoot off resulted in a win for J. Hanran with 10/10, E. McKimmin was second with 13/15 and W. Jones 12/15 was third. Another five birder followed, and this time W. Hanran and J. Hanran topped the list, with possibles, and with 5/5 each, divided first and second places. W. S. Higgins, T. Clay, F. Blackman, R. McLennan, E. McKimmin, B. Pattel and R. Winn with 4/5 shot off for the minor placings. A teams' shoot, comprising five men per team, attracted seven teams, and in this, F. Blackman's team, comprising F. Blackman, K. Misken, W. J. James, W. Stockham and J. James scored an outright win. The final event, a Deauville Double, first miss out was very keenly contested, and shooting on, practically in the dark, J. Hanran and E. McKimmin put on a neat effort to win with 12/12 from T. Clay and C. Mathiesen filled second place with 11/12.

GRIFFITH G. C. (N.S.W.)—New Year's Day meeting at Griffith was the high-light of the opening 1948 fixtures. Shooters attended from Melbourne, Bathurst, Sydney, Young, Albury, Holbrook and all the surrounding districts. At the outset the club and its officials are to be complimented on a magnificent ground and general set-up. Only a few months ago the area was virgin country. Thanks to the unabating efforts of secretary Ted Fromholtz, Claude Carnell, Jim Theodore, Wm. Gibbs (President), Stan Briggs, J. Little, Glen McWilliams, Ron Gow, L. Bowditch, Dr. Jim Sertori, Harold Anstee and a number of others the club now possesses an up-to-date club house roomy enough for secretary's office, buffet and bar counters, spacious verandah and meeting accommodation. The club's new concrete tracks and paths are first class. The gate leading to the club-house was cast by A. Davis in his forge at Lee-

Ted Fromholtz remarked on the day preceding the shoot that only wet weather could ruin their hopes for success on New Year's Day. Sure enough it started to rain about 2.30 a.m. on New Year's morning and continued until 6.30 p.m. As a result a number of entries were lost to the club for the reason that some roads were impassable to district shooters. Ollie Cox, Geoff Bragg and Bill O'Brien made a spirited arrival by plane from Holbrook and Albury. Circling the ground prior to landing this group was on the shooting mark some 60 minutes after its final take-off from one of Ollie Cox's home paddocks at Mangoplah Station. Shooting opened with the New South Wales Double-rise Championships at 12 pairs from 16 yards. The Melbourne shooters Roy Johns and "Drongo" were the early leaders. The Barellan shooter, Jack Semmler, one of the last entries received delayed on account of wet roads) missing only his 3rd pair ran out winner 11/12 pairs. The two first mentioned each stopped 10/12—"Drongo" won the tie shoot 12/14 to 11/16. Semmler was not in the sweepstakes—Johns and "Drongo" taking the main cut in these. "Drongo" presented the club

with £5/5/ of his winnings and Roy Johns £2/2/-. They were heartily thanked for their generosity. At this stage of the proceedings an adjournment of one hour was made for lunch. Here again good organisation was apparent. Jim Theodore and his staff at his Garden of Roses Cafe in Banna Avenue arranged to cater for 60 shooters within 30 minutes—Jim achieved his aim with 8 minutes to spare. Incidentally Jim's specially prepared Murray Cod cutlets were par excellence. The Rice-Grower's Trophy attracted a field of 46 and four shooters returned scores of 19/20. They were J. O. Cox (Mangoplah), W. R. Johns (Melbourne), A. C. McDonald (Grenfell) and H. Anstee (Griffith). The tie shoot was decided at miss-out. The ultimate winner was Ollie Cox. Cox was called upon to shoot first in the shoot-off. He had an experience in this section likely to try the nerves of the most hardened tieist. Cox drew two no birds, then a mis-fire followed by another no-bird before he pulled a shot. However he stood the test like a world-beater and broke the 3 birds necessary to win with first barrels. His score was 22/23. Roy Johns (Commonwealth title holder) was second 21/23, then McDonald 20/22 and Anstee 19/21. Five others tied for fifth placing and popular Jim Theodore, returned from his arduous duties of

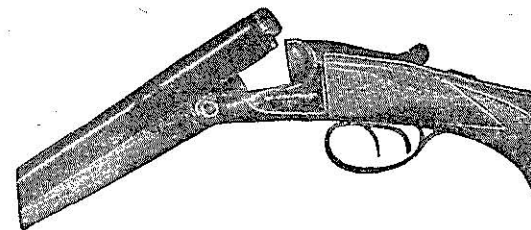

HANDICAPPING

The vexed question of satisfactory handicapping is ventilated in the following extracts from a letter received by the Secretary A.C.P.T.S.A. from a shooter in New South Wales. "It is just 12 months since I was handicapped and since then clay pigeon shooting has cost me a lot of money. At least I would be satisfied if I was on equal terms with some of the other shooters. You see there are shooters here in these parts who are on 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 yards and who are wonderful shots and they travel around all the shoots and clean up trophy after trophy and yet they do not come back any further." The shooter continues in similar strain right through his letter. In reply it was pointed out to the shooter concerned that he belongs to an unaffiliated club, that he also competes at one or two other unaffiliated clubs and over the past 12 months no information that he had even been shooting had reached the Association. In other words no Handicap Return has been received. It will therefore be realised that the full reason for this particular shooter's handicap not being reviewed is due to his own and his club's lack of co-operation with the Association. Proper assessment of handicaps is impossible without adequate material to work on.

Association Recommendations

Shooters and clubs are reminded that affiliation and registration fees for 1948 are now due. Same require to be renewed as from 1st January each year. All are asked to cooperate by forwarding necessary fees (clubs 21/-, shooters 10/-) as soon as possible and thereby facilitate the administrative work of the Association.



The question of a decision given by the referee during the shooting of the 1947 Victorian Mixed Birds Championship at North Coburg is frequently under discussion. For the information of all shooters the following is the ruling given by the Association Executive when the matter was brought under its notice recently. "That the Association is aware that certain cartridges are faulty and that unforeseen circumstances in connection therewith are not covered by Association rules. When normal shells and supplies return a final discussion will take place on this matter and this will enable a decision to be made on the point. Meanwhile such decisions are left to the discretion of the referee." The above is a copy of the actual reply given to the letter forwarded to the Association seeking direction.

OVERSEAS ITEMS

(From Mr. W. P. Grosvenor—Famous English Shooting Authority and Coach)

"I am president of our local village gun club here in Norfolk. This said local of ours used to field a pretty hot team. On one occasion shooting at a championship meeting in London the team broke 121/125, a score that has never been beaten in England before or since. Also we put up a team of four which broke 190 out of 200 birds to win the I.C.I. "Christmas Box" competition, against a field of over forty clubs competing. I give you the scores as we are rather proud of our success, Messrs. N. Beck 50 (all right barrels), G. R. Neal 48, W. P. Grosvenor 47, Mrs. Ida Grosvenor (my wife) 45, 190/200. As a possible point of interest, my favourite trap gun has 32" barrels, side by side, weighs 8 lbs. and is full choked both barrels. My wife's usual gun has 30" barrels, side by side, weight 7 lbs. 2 ozs. and fully choked. Both guns take 2¾ cases, but we shoot the usual 2½ cartridges out of them. Automatics I do not care for, they can jamb. In the good old days we had our own private shooting ground, with an automatic trap lay-out, a 22 miniature rifle range up to 100 yards and also a 20 yards revolver range. I have mentioned previously some notes regarding the big meeting the Germans ran at Berlin in 1936. This meeting was a great success. However, it was definitely not an Olympic contest by rule, but it required quite as much winning, as the pick of the Continental shooters are very hot stuff over traps set to Olympic conditions. This is due very largely to their idea to hold all clay bird shooting events at really difficult birds, thrown to beat the gun and not to enable shooters to make high scores. To anyone accustomed to the automatic trap, the 15 trap trench as used on the Continent comes as a shock and it will pull a 96 per cent. man down to about 90 per cent. as a rule. It is certainly 5 per cent. at least more difficult and to some shooters a good deal more.

Adverting to sequence of throw, I saw Donald Lamont, the Scotch captain, shooting his last 25 birds for the Coronation Cup at Stratford-on-

Avon in 1937, nearly caught. He had to go out and "kill" all his 25 birds to beat Percy Stanbury's score (Stanbury had finished) and he had a crowd of several hundred watching him. He sailed merrily along for the first 17 or 18 birds, then when expecting a full left angle throw the trap threw a bird to the right. He was already starting to swing up as soon as he called and lost considerable time in switching over. But, being a really good shot, he swung over and broke it. Cuffing his ear for being so unwise he went on and finished with a 25 straight to win. Both my wife and I make a point of not trying to read the trap; we never vary our hold and always point on to the top of the trap house centre.

It may be of interest to your Australian shooters to know that Olympic shooting conditions have all been held over a 15 trap trench, modelled on the one installed at the Middlesex Gun Club at Hendon, near London. It has been common practice to make competitions as difficult as possible by winding up the springs to throw birds far beyond the usual distances and set at full wide angles and variations in height. The usual programme has been 100 birds per man, the team consisting of six shooters with five on the line at one time and the sixth man waiting. The shooters moving up one position after every shot. The contests consist of two 10 bird events, two 15 bird events, two 20 bird events and then the last ten birds are shot at by each competitor in turn, standing on No. 3 position (centre track) and firing at the 10 birds as they are thrown from any of the 15 traps. A trap, once sprung is not used again, so during the "ordeal" the shooter will, at the finish have fired at ten of the fifteen birds available, but in any order, subject to the whim of the puller. Of course the three birds thrown by the centre group of three traps are normal, but those from the two and four groups are more difficult, and those from one and five are extremely so.

In these last ten birds the shooter is playing a lone hand. It is certainly

a bit of an ordeal, especially for those unfortunate enough not to be able to forget those looking on and so be able to concentrate entirely on the job.

In the Olympic contest of 1908, at which I was an onlooker only, England won, with Canada a bird behind second. In 1912, at Stockholm, the Americans sent a very hot team and they won easily, with the English team second, beating the German team by one bird in the 600.

At Antwerp the conditions were the same and the splendid American team, which included their three highest average men, Troch, Arie and Wright, all just under 98 per cent. over several thousand targets, simply romped away with both the team and the individual honors. At Paris in 1924, we really had high hopes. All six of us had been shooting well in practice and I who considered myself nowhere near the best of us, had averaged better than 96 per cent. on well over 1,000 birds, and others held about the same average. Yes, we thought we might give U.S.A. a run for their money. But we were the sport of circumstances. The clay birds were made in England and the makers, to enable them to stand the journey and handling had completely altered the mixture and instead of being amenable to the impact of small shot and owing to there being a lot more pitch put into them, were found to "laugh" at No. 7, and in some cases No. 8 shot, with which our cartridges were loaded. One could hear the light pellets distinctly tinkle on them, see them literally jump, but not break. We found eventually that No. 6 only was any good on them.

Our highest scorer missed 17 out of 100. We checked up on the throw of some of the birds and found that the left hand bird at No. 1 position was going about 100 yards. This should not be read as an "alibi," but as fact.

The individual contest was won by Halasey, a fine Hungarian shot with 98/100, after shooting off a tie with Huber, a Finn. The Americans, Canadians and Continentals were all using No. 6 shot. Enoch Jenkins, our best man, quickly dropped using his shells, bought some American ones with big shot and made some sort of a show at the finish."

The A.C.P.T.S.A. recently communicated with the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association, seeking permission to hold its section of the 1948 International (providing it was intended to proceed with the series in 1948) on April 26. This date is the Monday holiday of the Victorian Eight Hours Day weekend. A further request was made regarding the official definition of amateur status, as applicable to the Olympic Games and shooters generally. The following interesting reply is published for the information of all affiliated units of the A.C.P.T.S.A.

"It has been decided to endeavour to stage the International Tournament in Wales on 25th and 26th June, 1948, and a Delegate Conference to discuss details has been called for 9th January 1948. The point you have raised concerning the date when you will shoot in Australia for the "Mackintosh" trophy will be brought up at this meeting. A formal application was made last year by this Association to the Olympic Games Committee for the inclusion of clay pigeon shooting in the official programme of the 1948 Olympic Games, but a reply was received to the effect that the programme was already full and the application

could not be entertained. We are, therefore, formulating plans for a 3 day meeting to be staged near London in July 1948 'in conjunction with the Games' and hope to be able to give you further information in the near future. As regards 'Amateur' status, we have written to the Olympic Games Committee asking them to give the official definition of this, as applicable to the Games generally, and we will advise you of the reply in due course."



The question of shooters being required to hold "gun below elbow and against the side" in walk-up events in Australia and which has now been dispensed with recalls the following fact from none other authority than Mr. H. Rogers, the veteran secretary of the English C. P. Association. Mr. Rogers writes: "At one time British shooters had nearly all competitions gun down. To ensure rigid adherence a post-card (or polished card) was placed between elbow and hip and held there. The slightest movement and the card fell." Presumably if the card fell the referee's decision would be "no bird."



"Sunday Shooting"

The question of permitting clay pigeon shooting clubs to indulge in their chosen pastime on Sunday is developing into a handy perennial.

This is particularly applicable to Queensland northern clubs. Queenslanders are allowed a certain amount of latitude in this respect, but they would like to see the antiquated act which debars Sunday shooting by organised clubs amended. The question was raised at the 1946 annual meeting of the Association, but no official action was taken. It would appear that the only way to establish precedent is for clubs to place themselves at the mercy of local authorities. This has been known, if deftly handled, to produce remarkably co-operative results.

Extracts are quoted from Jack P. Payne's cuttings — "Three North Queensland young men convicted under 106 year-old Act, for carrying rifles on Sunday were each carrying sugar bags which were found to have stock and barrel of .22 calibre rifle inside. Each had the bolt in his pocket. Defendants were fined 5/- each and rifles returned to them."

Mr. Justice F. T. Brennan, a member of the Queensland judiciary, is reported in the second of contributor Payne's cuttings, referring to Sunday shooting and having in mind the carrying of firearms on Sunday, which prohibited sportsmen from taking part in the North Queensland duck opening in August. "A great number could not be there for the opening on Saturday because of their work—the ducks would be gone by the time they arrive. For 2 years there has been practically no ammunition. I have been besieged by sportsmen with a desire to indulge in clay pigeon and duck shooting on a Sunday. As a judge, I cannot advise on the legal aspect, but I do know that cricket, football, bowls, rifle shooting, tennis, golf, swimming, fishing and other kindred sports are availed of on a Sunday. If an Act passed in the Victorian age prohibiting the carrying of a firearm is now being used to kill the free exercise of healthy amusement which does not interfere with the observance of the Sabbath, then I respectfully suggest that the Government pass legislation to remove that anomaly."

(Have any of our registered shooter readers opinions on this contentious subject?—Ed.)

Ten Years Ago

Records of ten years ago reveal a most interesting item for reproduction here. The published introduction reads, "Popular Scottish sportsman J. M. ("Jock") Wilson, now a resident of Canterbury (Vict.) gained his most important success when at Barellan (N.S.W.) he outstayed an interstate field to win the premier clay pigeon championship of New South Wales."

This reference concerns none other than the A.C.P.T.S.A. President of today, "Jock" Wilson.

The field was top class and included the best from N.S.W., Victoria and Tasmania. "Jock" missed his 2nd and 20th releases and was outright winner 23/25. "Drongo" (Les. Tibb) and E.

Alberts (Moombooldool) each with three misses shot on to decide the places. Alberts finished runner-up 32/35 to "Drongo's" 31/35. "Drongo" at that time held the remarkable double of premier double-barrel champion of Queensland and Tasmania.

R. (Bob) Ferris, then of Langley, near Kyneton and now of Jerilderie (N.S.W.) won the Midland District championship at Trentham Falls (V.). With divisions in a couple of sweepstakes Bob returned a string of 37 before missing. Bob hopes to establish a first class club at Jerilderie as soon as supplies become easier.

A. McNay was the main winner at the Blackburn Club's opening meeting in January 1938. McNay was making his first appearance on a shooting ground. (Does any present day shooter recall this sportsman?—Ed.)

Handicaps have been declared with the limit mark shooters commencing at 12 yards in accordance with the rules of the Association. Clubs are requested to conform to this rule and begin handicaps at 12 yards. Unknown shooters should commence no nearer than 16 yards.

In order to ensure satisfactory Association handicapping, Club officials are requested to show each shooter's full surname and initials (shooting name if any in addition) when forwarding handicap returns to the Association office.
