THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Seeking concessions in the issue of ammunition, the partial or total abolition of sales tax, excise duties and customs charges, in order to attract young men to take up clay pigeon shooting with the ultimate object of securing trained gunners for national defence, a deputation representative of executive officials of the Leeton Gun Club (N.S.W.) waited on the Minister for Air (Mr. Drakeford, M.H.R.) on the occasion of a recent visit of the Minister to Leeton. The deputation quoted figures as to costs and the difficulty of attracting young men to the sport while shooting equipment remained expensive and as its star example of the proficiency obtained through training at clay pigeon shooting illustrated the performances during the recent war of a former member, Norman Williams. This sportsman reached senior rank in the R.A.A.F. and when the war ended was the most decorated rear-gunner in the British Empire Air Forces.

Both the Club and Williams himself claim that his noteworthy achieve-

ments were largely due to his earlier experience as a clay pigeon shooter with the Leeton Club.

The Minister was most sympathetic in his replies to the deputation. The Leeton Club has now passed the matter over to the A.C.P.T.S.A. for further action.

The A.C.P.T.S.A. Executive discussed the idea launched by Leeton Club and is now desirous of having the views of its affiliated Clubs, particularly in regard to the control and management of such a scheme should the Government agree to grant any or all the concessions asked.

Therefore, affiliated Club officials and individual shooters interested are requested to place their views before the Association with the minimum of delay so that every angle of the important subject may be discussed with the Government should the way be opened.

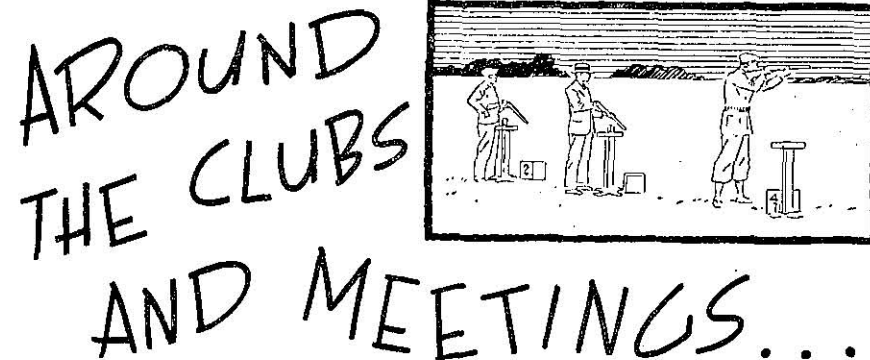

The Association

The Association Executive met on June 11. There was a full attendance of members with the exception of the two Tasmanian representatives, Messrs. Rainbird and Tyquin. Both were granted leave.

Mr. E. G. Biggs was appointed joint honorary assistant handicapper and he will be in co-operation with the Association Secretary. Mr. Biggs will concentrate largely on the handicaps of metropolitan shooters.

The Executive members were greatly concerned with the number of reported cases of clubs permitting unregistered shooters to compete both at Club and Open meetings. It was decided to instruct that the following rules should be published as a reminder of the importance of observing the Association's Constitutional Rules—

Rule 16 (d) (portion):

"The Executive Committee may suspend or disqualify for such period as it shall seem proper any individual member of an affiliated club or any person not a member of an affiliated club who is in arrears for three months with his registration."

Rule 33 (a) reads:

"The Association shall keep a register of shooters and no person may enter or compete at any Association competition or event or at any competition or event conducted by a club unless such person is re-

gistered with the Association and is not in arrears with his subscription."

The Rules are far reaching in their effect and are plainly understandable—affiliated clubs are expected to observe the Rules as laid down.

The Association shoot on June 14, held on the Blackburn Club's East Burwood grounds, attracted nearly 80 guns. The Association Intermediate Championship (20 birds from 16 yards, restricted to shooters whose Association handicap did not exceed 16 yards) was won outright 20/20 by "Eskdale" (Bill Robinson) of Bentleigh. It was his first title success and deservedly popular. Major-General W. Bridgeford, Association patron, was runner-up, after tie shoot, 29/30 with Cliff Bound 28/30, third.

The £100 Handicap first prize went

to A. J. Russell of Warrandyte (V.) 25/25 (only possible) from "Tambo" (B. J. O'Day) 36/37, Frank Brown 36/38, D. D. Mackay (Gooronbong, NSW) 35/38, Rex Powell (Tas.) 32/34 and Bob Meehan 28/30. 12/15

Ten Years Ago

W. J. (Wally) Lancaster of Mildura won the much discussed and partly disputed Champion of Champions title on the old Nobel grounds at West Footscray (V.) on June 13, 1938. He defeated the then record field of nearly 70 shooters. Lancaster missed his 19th, 21st and 33rd birds. A protest was later lodged with the A.C.P.T.S.A. claiming that Lancaster also missed an additional bird. The protest was not upheld. The places were filled, after tie shoot by J. Bryant 55/60 and "Drongo" (L. Tibb) 54/60. A. Love 50/55 was fourth.

and well over 100 attended. The Club has plans for turning this into an annual ball and next year may see this development.

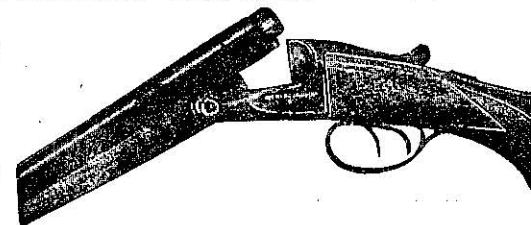

News from King Island indicates that the pheasant season has not proved to be as big as expected. The restriction on the shooting of "hens" has limited bags markedly. Many Victorian and Tasmanian shooters visited the Island for the opening, but few reported anything but "birds scarce." One prominent Victorian shooter's pedometer showed 22 miles—four cock birds!

Albury Field Shooters Club (NSW) has renewed its Association affiliation and will stage a £50 handicap on July 31. Ted Brenk, a comparative new comer to the sport of clay pigeon shooting has taken to it "like a duck to water." Last month in the Camberwell Club's charity shoot he stopped 40/41 for the day. Brenk recently presented the Blackburn Club with the major portion of a complete public address system of extensive size, in all representing a donation of about £40.

The coastal swamps around North Queensland have plentiful water and ducks are reported to be there in millions. Inland the season is dry. Townsville Club has everything set fair for its big meeting next month, August 14 and 15, when the Commonwealth title will be shot for the first time in North Queensland. The Club's full page advertisement in this month's "News" outlines fully just what to expect for all competitors. For those able to attend it promises to be "a trip and a half" and remem-

ber its only one day's airliner travel from the Southern Capital. Fred Blackman, the Townsville Secretary, (Box 415) will provide any additional information required.

Dates approved by the Association for fixtures at Hornsby Club (Sydney) are, July 3—Sydney Single barrel, August 7—Sydney Deauville Doubles Championship, and September 4—the N.S.W. Premier title (double barrel). Dave Wright, a recent competitor in the big Association meetings, is assistant secretary and treasurer at Hornsby.

Seymour Club (V.) which has been in recess for several years, owing to the war intervention, almost had everything sealed and signed for a new and spacious ground on a new location about half mile east of the Railway Station. Just when things appeared "home and hosed" a hitch in negotiation occurred and the deal fell through.

Bill Reid and son Pat, Seymour stalwarts, re-appeared on Melbourne shooting grounds again last month for the first time since pre-war. Bill only recently returned after 12 months in England and Ireland. He reckons "not a bit keen on horse meat."

Blackburn Club, at its shoot on June 19, observed one minute's silence as a tribute to the memory of Mr. Vernon (Mac) Evans, a director of the sports firm of Evans & Balfour, of Melbourne, whose sudden passing on June 16 shocked the shooting world. Mr. Evans was a keen supporter of shooting in all its forms and held executive office in many of the organisations with which he was connected. The A.C.P.T.S.A. and shooters generally extend the deepest sympathy to his relatives.

be extended some concessions in relation to the supply and price of cartridges and clays.

History

"Prior to the 1939-45 World War the Leeton Gun Club approached the then Minister with a similar request. This request was refused, the Minister stating that he could not connect clay pigeon shooting with Defence Training.

"This contention was disproved during World War II. Clay pigeon shooting was recognised, as an essential part of Air Force training and was adopted as a training method by the British Empire Air Training Scheme in Great Britain, Canada and Australia and was also adopted by the United States Army Air Force and Navy Air Arm training schools.

"The records of these Air Forces show that the marksmanship ability of servicemen who had been members of gun clubs was far above that of men who had had no previous training.

"The record of Mr. Norman Williams of Leeton, proves this contention. Prior to enlisting in the RAAF he was a member of the Leeton Gun Club and had experience at clay shooting. In the Air Force (RAAF) he reached the rank of Squadron Leader and was the most decorated rear gunner in the British Empire Air Force. He was so highly honoured because of his outstanding record as a gunner. During his service Mr. Williams took part in air training clay bird shooting in England, Canada, Australia, the United States of America and Japan. In Japan Mr. Williams was one of the officers who was closely connected with the clay bird training of the RAAF members in that theatre. Mr. Williams is definite in his claim that his exceptional record as a rear gunner is mainly due to his gun club experience.

The Club's Case

"Gun clubs in Australia point out that rifle clubs do receive concessions from the Commonwealth Government

in the interests of defence. Gun clubs believe that their branch of shooting is better defence training than rifle shooting. This particularly applies to training for the Royal Australian Air Force.

Present Conditions

"Apart from the shortages of shells, the cost of shells and clays to the gun club man and to those whom it is desired to interest in clay bird shooting—the young man—is almost prohibitive. Gun clubs believe that if these costs could be eased by concessions from the Government more and more young men would be attracted to clay bird shooting.

Suggested Concessions

"While gun clubs do not ask for the same concessions, or to be put on the same footing as rifle clubs, as regards the issue of ammunition, they maintain sales tax excise and customs duties should be lifted on the allotment of shells to gun clubs on a membership basis for practice shooting. They believe that if this was done costs would be so reduced that clay bird shooting could be brought within the reach of the young shooter who, under present conditions, cannot afford to indulge in clay shooting.

"The above, Mr. Minister, is the Leeton Gun Club's case, and we point out that it is the case of all other gun clubs in Australia.

"We ask you to give it your earnest consideration."

end. Beginning as a shooter at the early age of ten he graduated through miniature rifle shooting to International and Olympic honours as a top-line trapshot, chiefly at clay pigeons. His knowledge of the sport and its adherents developed him into probably the greatest coach in Great Britain—although his sporting modesty always caused him to ask that restraint be used in describing him as such. On the launching of this publication Mr. Grosvenor was approached for a series of instructive articles on the sport of clay pigeon shooting and how it "should be done."

His willingness to promulgate his knowledge brought immediate response and none will doubt that the matter he provided over several months as published in this journal was instructive and informative beyond the normal expectation. Australians are indeed fortunate that Mr. Grosvenor, forwarded shortly before his death, a further series of articles, all of which will be published in "News" from time to time.

In a letter from the Secretary, English Clay Pigeon Shooting Associa-

tion, it was mentioned that one of Mr. Grosvenor's greatest pleasures in his last year was the fact of his communications to Australia and the additional friends he had made thereby.

We extend to his widow, Mrs. Ida Grosvenor, (herself for many years Women's Champion clay pigeon shot of Great Britain), his daughter, Mrs. Betty Spooner, of Hove (Sussex), and son Miles, very sincere and deep sympathy.

REFLECTIONS

Have you ever stood with your foot on the brass rail, in gloomy contemplation of the rows of bottles on the shelves behind the bar and regretted that you lacked possession of just two things—a heap of bricks, and enough courage to heave them?

I often think that it is inhibition of this nature that makes us take up trap shooting. The suppressed desire to skittle those bottles finds expression in a skyliff of pulverised pitch each time the shooter hisses, through gritted teeth, the word "Pull!"

There certainly was a team of these bar wreckers on the tracks at Blackburn Gun Club on April 24 and 26, when, just who was, and who was not the champ. of the champs, was decided. The distinction was claimed by Horrie Donnelly of Bruthen, who weighed in with 49 x 50. Jack McCraith was right on his tail though throughout the day, but failing to disintegrate one brace of his birds he ran into second place. Jack has apparently done this so often it appears as if he possesses the same variety of luck as the fellow that played the piccolo in the band that displeased the Sultan. Having allowed three birds to sail on to a happy landing in Vic Fankhauser's orchard Roy Johns romped home third.

I flew down to Melbourne on the 23rd to see the show and I would not have missed it for a truckload of Icil Specials. I am only sorry that I did not shoot in it. Not that I'd have stood a dog's chance against the top flight of that bunch of pellet-pushers; but there were a half a hundred other shooters on the tracks who did not stand a dog's chance either, but they were there, and they were shooting too, which is what

makes the game what it is.

The two days' noise ran with the smoothness of a sealed-in-oil bearing. The first cracker went off shortly after 10 a.m. and long before the sparrows had decided to lay off the Fankhauser fruit trees for the day the sash was hung round Donelly's neck. Jock Wilson and officials of the Association buzzed around like those flies whose predominating colour when viewed as straight-aways, is blue. Geoff Rutledge and Locke Findlay and others of the I.C.I. boys did a good job in a quiet, unobtrusive way throughout the two days of the shoot. Like the contests of their Star Crimp shells the liaison staff of I.C.I., is a well-balanced load. Incidentally, if you are a visitor to Melbourne at any time, do not let Geoff and Locke take you out to lunch. If you do, I warn you you will stagger back to your pub with "new look" curves where you don't want 'em.

It was rather hard to see some of the old champs. take a lacing, but that is inevitable of course. When Anno Domini and your sins start catching up with you, you just cannot see things as well as you used to. (Well, perhaps you still see 'em, but you cannot do so much about it—which goes for other birds besides clays).

I never thought I'd live to see the day when Horrie James would miss four in a row. But old "Duxbac" was a sick man, with a badly injured leg that day, and he re-entered hospital immediately after the shoot, which just goes to prove that Horrie can "take it" just as smoothly as he used to dish it out a few years ago.

The interstate round-up was a tribute to the efficiency of the A.C.P. T.S.A., and its popular organiser Bill McCullough. Tasmania may be only a little burt of an island, but Billy Rainbird and a dozen or so more from the A.B.C.* land were there. They did not go back empty-handed either, since they collected the trophy for the "teams match" from Blackburn's best four.

Jock Berry and a gang of Sydney boys, including Tim Wright, and

Bruce Hill came down from Sydney, the ever-pleasant Don Muir and others came in from Griffith, and so on, while a couple of shooting stars—Jim Smith and Newton Thomas—whizzed their way two thousand miles from Townsville, North Queensland. What for? . . . To try and break fifty clay saucers, Or to sit in good company at one of the over-loaded tables at the dinner held in Vic Fankhauser's apple packing shed at the conclusion of the first day's shoot? Your guess is as good as mine, but I'll bet we both guess the same way.

What a feed that was! If you'd taken the whole gang outside after we'd staggered to our feet when the last spoonful of trifle slithered down the hatch, not a man of 'em—Donnelly and McCraith included—could have hit the packing shed if you threw it out of a straightaway trap from 12 yards. They were too damn full!

Speeches at the dinner were few and brief. Don Corstophon sang, and Luke Hughes of I.C.I., warbled a couple of encores on his mouth wur-litzer which is as much a part of Luke as is his old Webley & Scott. A trapshooters' dinner without Luke would be a dinner maybe, but not a "trapshooters'" dinner. There were other musical items in the form of a general sort of get-together round the piano—a kind of free-for-all which anyone with a beer in his hand could enter and contribute a short verse.

The chorus ran:—

"That's a cute little rhyme . . .
Sing us another one do-oo"

I was so impressed by the cuteness of most of the verses that I have arranged with Jock Vincent to get me copies of them. Jock promised to do this provided he could purchase some asbestos paper to type them on. I want them to give to a little Sunday school teacher who lives near me. She'll just love them I know, particularly the verse that told the pathetic story of a young man in the building trade and a young lady whose address I understand is somewhere in St. Kilda. It was very touching, and not without an atmosphere of tragedy, for the last line tells us that the

husky young builder—quite inadvertently—"killed 'er" . . . Very sad.

As an example to the younger members present I left the party early—in the morning—Locke Findlay delivered me safely to my hotel at something after 2.30 a.m. when he gently roused me out of a sound sleep in the back of the car with the soothing whisper: "Wake up old rooster—you're home!"

The Champion of Champions shoot and the International Teams' Match that followed was the biggest shindoo of its kind ever staged in Australia, and I was mighty pleased to see Jack McCraith lead the field on the second day with 98 x 100 which—I've got to be generous—is fair shooting! I've a feeling that next year's show-down will be much bigger. Bill McCullough tells me that there are some 1,250 subscribers to "Clay Pigeon News." This means that there must be at least 1,250 clay-clouters out of gaol. So, what about next year letting the business to to H—and grabbing your gun and pyjamas and flying A.N.A. or T.A.A., or "any damn way" down to Melbourne and let us smoke twelve hundred and fifty guns in the 1949 Champ. of Champs. Say the word and I'll tell you right now that Vic Fankhauser will fit his apple-packing humpy with elastic sides so that the whole gang can get in to dinner. That is the kind of guy Vic is.

Looking forward to seeing you there. Good hunting!

WHY I USE THE AUTOMATIC

(By E. G. BIGGS)

Many times I have been asked why I use and how I like the automatic shot-gun? A discussion on this subject resulted in the Editor of our Association "News" seeking a story on what may be termed a subject not without interest to many shooters.

The history of my association with shooting goes back to my earliest youth when a small boy on my father's cattle property in Queensland. In that particular part of Queensland game and wild life abounded in plenty. Every boy is veritably born with "a rifle in his hands" and as his age advances, whether on foot or horse-back, his rifle is always close at hand. Naturally under these circumstances I learnt to use the rifle with a fair amount of success. At fast moving game with an automatic rifle we seldom missed. This brings to my mind, an oft repeated statement, that to be outstandingly successful in shooting, either in the field or over traps, one must take up the gun early in life. The younger one is the easier it becomes to judge distance and speed. As instancing this point I recall many occasions of riding after kangaroos and shooting from the saddle at this fast moving target. It will be noted that a keen sense of distance and speed is essential when shooting in this fashion, otherwise you shoot well behind the target.

Coming to live in Melbourne I acquired my first contact with the shot-gun about 1938—a very light double-barrel job. How well I remember the "kicks" this one gave me. I found that I was never happy looking along "two barrels"—I much preferred the single line straight to the target. Late in 1939 I decided to try my hand at clay pigeons—using a double-barrel gun. After a season or two I felt it was the Browning Automatic single barrel gun for me. My shooting improved immediately. If you take the time to read over what I have already

said you will observe that I am leading up to my main points and these are, (1) my early days of shooting were done with a rifle—which meant looking along one barrel only, (2) I consider that the single barrel weapon is much easier to handle and a much quicker gun to aim accurately, (3) the automatic gun is a single trigger job, therefore the grip does not have to be relaxed for the second shot, (4) with a single barrel one does not have the tendency to "cross-fire" (which often happens when shooting with a double-barrel gun), (5) the killing range and the patterns are usually exceedingly good, (6) the recoil which is taken up by the snubbing device lessens the sore shoulder and headache, (particularly in long events over traps).

I have heard the automatic gun coming in for a lot of criticism from time to time—some say the mechanism becomes faulty and other complaints. Against this I mention that 95 per cent. of the American shooters use the automatic and pump gun (and these boys generally can shoot) also it is important to remember that automatic weapons must be kept clean, lightly oiled and re-loaded shells should not be used. I consider that most of the faults lie with the man behind it and not the gun. I have been told that my own shooting would be better if I dropped the idea of the automatic, but the foregoing is my experience and my own opinions.

In concluding let me say that no matter how good your gun is, if the stock does not fit the shooter concerned he will never put together a good scoring string. He will lack co-ordination with body, head and eyes and fast timing is impossible. The shooter should always remember to keep his cheek down on the comb, not as we often see a shooter lift his head to watch the bird and forget to take the gun along with him.

The following are the Association Handicaps for all registered shooters competing in OPEN events. Where no handicap has been declared, insufficient record of performances are known.

Handicaps have been declared with the limit mark shooters commencing at 12 yards in accordance with the rules of the Association. Clubs are requested to conform to this rule and begin handicaps at 12 yards. Unknown shooters should commence no nearer than 16 yards.

In order to ensure satisfactory Association handicapping, Club officials are requested to show each shooter's full surname and initials (shooting name if any in addition) when forwarding handicap returns to the Association office.
