President's Report

Mal Dyson – ACTA President

It gives me great pleasure to deliver this, my first Annual Report as President of the Australian Clay

Target Association (ACTA), on behalf of the National Executive. Since taking on this role there has been a smooth transition into the position. I have found the Association to be most welcoming and inclusive and while the initial stages have had their challenges, it has been through the support of members at all levels, administrative and general, that have ensured that the ACTA has stayed strong and cohesive and well prepared for any challenges.

MEMBERSHIPS

During the last twelve months memberships have increased from 13,646 to 13,692 – a small, but positive, increase of 46 members. 2,089 new members joined the Association, this is a reduced number of new members, down 285 from the previous year.

Our Association membership shows no 'real' growth from year to year as we lose approximately the same number of members as we gain.

The intent of the Recreational membership category was to provide clubs with the opportunity to retain and grow membership, providing a 'target only' classification. This category gives Recreational members the opportunity to be exposed to competition shooting with a desired outcome, leading them to full membership. In an effort to build Association membership a club membership incentive scheme is being introduced for the 2020 membership year to assist clubs to increase new members and retain lapsed members. Clubs that are able to increase their 2020 membership by more than 20% from their membership level as at the 30th October 2019 (baseline) will receive \$30 reimbursement from the ACTA for each member registered above the 20% increase from the 2019 figure.

This incentive endeavours to encourage clubs to seek new members through financial bonus but will also assist ACTA through an increase in membership numbers.

FINANCIAL

The Association has reported a net deficit of \$119,747 for the current financial year. This compares to previous financial results as follows:

2019 (\$119,747)

2018 \$1,493,290

2017 \$4,359,192

The 2018 and 2017 financial results had been significantly inflated by the one-off capital funding received from Infrastructure NSW to assist with the construction of the ACTA Function Centre.

2019 also represents the first full year of the Function Centre operations including the associated annual depreciation charge. The Association has recognised a total depreciation expense of \$349,863 for the 2019 financial year.

The ACTA held total cash reserves of \$1,047,243 at the year-end which is an increase of \$295,714 since 31st December 2018.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

All National Championship events conducted during the year were very well attended. The support of members at National events is most encouraging and provides not only an opportunity for intense competition and rivalry but also a chance for National Executive in attendance to meet with ACTA members.

The National DTL Championships were held at the Roma Clay Target Club, with a very creditable 440 competitors attending. Congratulations to Roma President Andrew Whyte and his committee in delivering an excellent and entertaining Carnival. Congratulations to Phil Grainger on winning 2019 High Gun.

The National Skeet Championships held at the National Ground (Wagga Wagga) was also very well attended attracting 160 competitors from all over Australia. Congratulations to High Gun winner Glenn Clarke.

The National ISSF event held at Brisbane Gun Club was also well attended. Aislin Jones made history when she became the first female shooter to win the High Gun title in Skeet. James Willett won the Men's Trap High Gun and Penny Smith won the Women's Trap High Gun.

National Sporting Clays this year was held at Whiteman Park, Perth WA. With a small field of

57 competitors this was a little disappointing. Chris Brown, from the Maryborough Club in Victoria, was the Overall Champion.

COACHING

The ACTA, by confirmed right, have resumed the control of ACTA Coaching Accreditation.

The ACTA Executive have again introduced a Coaching Sub-Committee. A National Coaching Committee will comprise of the members of the Sub-Committee and each State Coach. This National Coaching Committee will appoint a National Chairperson from within the group and this group will be charged with the decision making process in relation to the National coaching program.

On behalf of the ACTA Executive and members I would like to acknowledge and thank Suzy Balogh for the time and effort she has contributed to ACTA coaching.

ADMINISTRATION

The National Office has seen several changes during the year with the resignation of Chief Executive Officer Paul McLoughlin, and the appointment of Paul Gilbert to the position.

After 15 years with the Association, Maureen Ryan decided to retire. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Maureen for her dedication and application to the position and wish her well for her future endeavours.

Incoming CEO, Paul Gilbert, has reassessed the administrative positions and as a result Sue Vesperman has been assigned to memberships, Judy Ferry remains in finance; in the administration area we welcome Aileen Storey to general office responsibilities including the specific role of administration of the Function Centre and Jenny Robinson has been appointed to the position of reception/administration in a part-time capacity.

The outside staff have also had changes with Ewan McLachlan resigning, to change occupations. The Association has employed two maintenance and ground staff members working a 30-hour week. This allows ample allocation of time to maintain the National Ground and service the Function Centre.

SPONSORS

The ACTA are most grateful for the exceptional support provided by the Association's sponsors. Sponsorship was received from Casella Wines, Bronze Wing, Beretta Australia, Perazzi Australia, Winchester Australia, Clay and Hunt, On Target, Outdoor Trading Company, Hunt Sporting Supplies,

Mialls Gun Shop, Power Ammo, BEST and PCM Enviro. The Association takes this opportunity to thank these major sponsors for all their efforts and looks forward to their ongoing support.

FUNCTION CENTRE

During 2019, the Function Centre averaged around three events per month. This included school presentations, trade fairs, seminars, career expos and other community events. Income generated from catering was \$65,527 and hire of the centre was \$65,542.

With the appointment of Aileen to concentrate on the Function Centre, her knowledge and experience of media and marketing has already seen excellent bookings for 2020. The Function Centre continues to be a very positive investment.

ACTA FUTURE

ACTA Executive has appointed Brisbane Company CPR Group to conduct a Strategic Planning Process with the outcome to be a National Strategic Plan. Previously there has been no definitive forward planning documentation and this process aims to prepare a clear plan to provide direction for the current, and future, National Executive members and administrators to ensure the long-term viability of the organisation.

A Constitution Sub-Committee has been formed to revise and update the ACTA Constitution. This committee is working towards presenting a new Constitution to our membership in 2021. Updates will be provided throughout the year to give members the opportunity to provide input into this documentation and will form an essential element of the Constitutional review process.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our staff and fellow Executives for their support, time and effort during the year. A special thanks to Vice Presidents Gary Read and Terry Marsden, also a special thank you to retiring President Robert Nugent. In closing, thank you to all members within our Association who have volunteered their time and work at all levels – Club, Zone and State. Your contribution to our Association is gratefully received. With your effort our Association remains strong.

CEO Report

It's been another hectic month with many items being consolidated leading up the Trap Nationals commencing on 21 March. We have taken many nominations over the last 4 weeks, and by the time this publication reaches you, pre-nominations will have closed. For those of you who forgot but still wish to compete, it is not too late ... in 2020 late nominations will be accepted up to and during the event at the Events Office. (Please be aware that these will, however, attract a \$20 late fee per event). We look to welcoming you to the National Grounds for Pre-Nationals on 21–22 March and the big event on 23–29 March.

DOUBLE RISE GRADING

Following the revision and implementation of a new process for Double Rise Grading which commenced on 1 January 2020, it soon became apparent that the initially determined 25 pair qualification process and percentage was not sufficient to accurately assess a shooter's skill level. Unfortunately, during January and February, Tasmania and South Australia held their State Championships using the 1/1/20 rules, with a result that some AA grade shooters were initially placed in a lower grade for the Double Rise event and then proceeded to shoot the rest of the competition in their current trap grading. This caused a great deal of embarrassment, to both the event organisers as well as some of the competitors, as a result the ACTA Executive Committee needed to urgently re-think and revise the entire situation. As a consequence, on 24/2/20, revision was made and notified to clubs. The new qualifications require a shooter to shoot 100 pair (200 targets) to then be given their Double Rise Grade. (Please see the National Rules Supervisor's page to obtain a clear understanding of these revisions). Again, the National Executive Committee wishes to apologise for the angst this first attempt may have caused to members, Clubs Zones and States. It was never intended or expected that the Association would wish to compromise its members or its competitions through inadequate planning, and it is in hindsight that we wish to correct the situation by admitting our shortcomings, and, more, to revise the criteria immediately so we can remedy the problem moving forward.

DOUG SMITH MEDAL

There has been further revision to the Doug Smith Medal Points event attendance multiplier. On the

recently-approved sliding scale, it was determined that the formula needed to be changed from "10 points for 100–199 event participants" to "10 points for 0–199 event participants". The reason for the revision is because there are smaller states that may not attract 100 shooters, which, (using the first incarnation), would effectively have eliminated the Team High Gun Winner from being awarded points for this prestigious award. This revision addresses this anomaly.

CLUB MEMBERSHIP INCENTIVES

In January, an enticement was advertised to clubs for 2020. This incentive is based on clubs increasing their 2020 ACTA registered members by at least 20%. The incentive period is between 1 November 2019 and 30 April 2020. Clubs achieving a minimum 20% increase on their 2019 member numbers by 30 April will receive a \$30.00 rebate per person for the 20% or better increase in member numbers achieved. Please note that the \$30.00 incentive payment is only paid on achieving at least a 20% growth in club members and is payable only for those new members above their 2019 figure. The ACTA Office has tabulated all club membership numbers as of 30 October 2019 which will be used as the baseline for calculating each club's 20%+ increase for 2020.

There has also been a definition placed on the term "new membership". In order to assist clubs, for any lapsed membership to be re-counted as "new", the person must have been a non-member for a minimum of 12+ months. (In other words, not have been/rejoined as an ACTA member for the 2019 year). As such, the combination of re-joining lapsed and new members needs to exceed 20% in order for the club to qualify for its incentive. We wish to take this opportunity, (as the end of the qualification period nears), to remind all of our clubs to keep up their sterling efforts to reach their target numbers so we can financially reward you accordingly!

SPONSORS

As we advised in last month's Clay Target e-News, the 2020 Trap Arms Fair will include all of our 2020 Trap and Skeet sponsors, including; Winchester, Bronze Wing, Beretta, Perazzi, Power Ammo, On Target Sporting Arms, Clay and Hunt, TopShot, Outdoor Trading Company, Hunts Shooting Supplies, Outdoor Sporting Agencies and BEST. Due to the volume of stock and merchandise that will be available, the trade display sites will be bigger and better than ever, so the area will, by necessity, need to be located on the large, traditional trading space

to the south-east side of the Events Office. Thanks to all of our sponsors for their kind and generous support of our sport and, in advance for the time, effort and devotion they will provide to our members' purchasing requirements at the upcoming Nationals!

ISSF OLYMPIC TRIALS

Our Olympic Hopefuls are still competing in qualification events leading up to the team announcement in the next few weeks. The final Sydney event will be held at the Sydney International Shooting Centre on March 22, following which our Shooter's final scores from the four qualification events will be tabulated and determined. After 3 competitions, (the Commonwealth and National Titles in Newcastle last January and the Melbourne event at the end of February), a number of athletes are still fighting for team places. It is a three-way battle for 2 spots in the Ladies Olympic Trap event with Penny Smith on 364 points, who is now possibly safely clear, being 15 points ahead of Laetisha Scanlan (348) with Catherine Skinner (345) just another three points behind Laetisha. With the final nomination trial to be held in Sydney this week, Australia's second women's trap position looms as a winner-take-all battle between Scanlan and Skinner. In the third Men's Trap elimination event, NSW's James Willett (376) continued his dominance when out-scoring Victoria's Mitch Iles (362) and NSW's Thomas Grice (366). Willett is certain to win selection for Tokyo with Iles and Grice battling for Australia's second quota position.

In the Men's Skeet, Queensland's Paul Adams won the Melbourne event from Victoria's Keith Ferguson in a double shoot-off. It was Adams' third consecutive Olympic nomination trial victory, and he (on 368 points) now holds an 11-point lead over NSW's Joshua Bell (357) and a 16 point buffer over Luke Argiro (352) in the race for Australia's single Men's Skeet Olympic team quota position. In the Melbourne Women's Skeet final, Victoria's Aislin Jones edged West Australia's Laura Coles by two targets. The race for Olympic team selection for the single Women's Skeet quota place will go down to the final nomination trial in Sydney. Aislin Jones (348 points) holds a one point lead over Laura Coles (347) with Brittany Melbourne (335) in third position.

Best of luck to all competitors this week in your final Olympic Trial event, and we look forward to announcing our worthy Olympic Representatives next issue.

RULE CLARIFICATION

DOUBLE RISE

The introduction of this event as a separate discipline has been the subject of more controversy and questions than any other discipline introduced in the past.

To clarify the Rule and how it will be applied is as follows:

Irrespective of personal belief in Double Rise being graded, the following Rule, as written will be applied and enforced without exception.

1.14 DOUBLE RISE

- (a) Double Rise shall be shot squad system and called by the referee, 1-1 or lost – 1 or 1 – lost or lost lost, whichever the case may be, each target to count one point.
- (b) A competitor must shoot at a complete pair of targets on every occasion, each target broken by the competitor's shot shall score one point. Two shots must not be fired at either target.
- (c) For initial grading – all ACTA members with an established Trap grade as of January 1 2020, will shoot the first 100 pair (200 targets) in that Trap grade. These targets will then be used to determine a shooters Double Rise grade. Grades shall be: AA 88% and over; A 80% and under 88%; B 72% and under 80%; C under 72%.
- (d) A shooter may have his grade increased after shooting 100 pair (200 targets), but must shoot three (3) consecutive groups of 100 pair (600 targets) at a lower grade percentage to be down graded.
- (e) No re-grading will apply until the end of the club's programme of that day. Should a shooter shoot at another Club later on that day the new grade will take effect.

EXPLANATION

As of the 1st of January, no ACTA shooter had a grade in Double Rise, including AA Elite Trap.

As Rule 1.14(c) now dictates, all ACTA shooters with an established Trap grade as of the 1st January 2020, will shoot their first 100 pair (200 targets) in that grade. Once shot these targets will be percentaged to determine a shooters Double Rise Grade.

After shooting 100 pair (200 targets) the first action a Handicapper should do is to delete any score

that is not consistent with the shooter's ability, Rule 2.04(h). For example, if three of the 25 pair of event targets averaged 88 percent or better and the 4th score, has a percentage applicable to a C grade score, say only 74 percent, should then be deleted.

The determination of the shooter's Grade would then be calculated from the remaining 150 targets. Obviously, if all scores are similar then the percentage will be calculated on the total 200 targets.

Any Shooters who have been allocated a PROVISIONAL Double Rise grade, but who have not as yet recorded a full 100 pair (200 target), should disregard that provisional grade.

Many AA grade shooters have questioned why they cannot simply accept AA as their grade in Double Rise. The answer is very simple, you can only decide and accept to remain in a grade once you have established a grade in that discipline Rule 2.01(m). You cannot shoot in any grade higher than that attained in competition.

DOUBLE RISE SHOOT-OFF TARGETS

After a consensus from State Rules Supervisors and Handicappers, it has been determined that all Double Rise shoot-off targets, shot in competition from 15 metres will be recorded in the Shooters Record Card.

GRADED HIGH GUNS INCLUDING NATIONAL HIGH GUNS

Many shooters have now realised that they will have a different Double Rise grade to their Trap grade and have asked "What will happen in terms of High Gun Grading?".

The answer is simple, you will be entered into the Grade High Gun in your highest DTL grade discipline, at the Trap Nationals for example, it will be the higher of either your Trap grade or Double Rise grade.

AA Elite Trap shooters please note that you must present your card for Double Rise grading at the Trap Nationals – Rule 2.01(f). Failure to produce a Record Card may result in the penalty being applied with an additional fee for the issuing of a replacement card.

The Committee present their report together with the accounts of Australian Clay Target Association Inc ('the Association') for the year ended 31 December 2019 and the auditors' report thereon.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Association during the 2019 financial year was to administer, promote and develop the sport of clay target shooting.

RESULT

The net operating deficit of the Association for the year ended 31 December 2019 was \$119,747. This compares to a net operating surplus in 2019 of \$1,493,290 (with one-off capital funding of \$1,413,205).

STATE OF AFFAIRS AND SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

The Committee note that the ICTSF World DTL Championship ISSF Nationals were both held at the National Ground in 2018, resulting in a significant increase to operating revenue for that year.

In the opinion of the Committee there were no other significant changes in the state of affairs of the Association that occurred during the financial year under review not otherwise disclosed in this report or the accounts.

EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

There has not arisen in the interval between the end of the financial year and the date of this report, any item, transaction or event of a material and unusual nature likely, in the opinion of the Committee of the Association, to affect significantly the operations of the Association, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Association in subsequent financial years.

SHORT AND LONG TERM OBJECTIVES

The short term objective of the Association is to service its members through:

- Organisation of local, state, national and internal competitions,
- Ongoing coaching and development,
- Collaboration with State Associations and affiliated Clubs.

The long term objectives of the Association are to promote the sport, service its members and to work collaboratively with all state organisations to manage the future development of the sport.

KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

The Association monitors key performance indicators against industry standards and internal expectations. The indicators are both financial and non-financial with the results presented for the Committee's discussion.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS


The Committee is planning to reassess the ongoing valuation methodology of the property, plant and equipment held by the Association in the coming financial year.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS

For the Year Ended 31 December 2019

NOTE 1 - STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report includes the financial statements and notes of the Australian Clay Target Association Inc as an individual entity. The Australian Clay Target Association is a not for profit entity incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

These financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the entity in the preparation of the financial statements:

(a) *Income Tax*

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) *Cash and cash equivalents*

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and demand deposits, together with other short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(c) *Receivables*

Accounts receivable include amounts due from members. Accounts receivables are recognised at the amounts as they are due for settlement. Accounts receivables do not carry any interest and are stated at their nominal value.

(d) *Inventories*

Inventories comprises goods for resale and goods for distribution and use at no or nominal consideration as part of the Association's ongoing activities.

Inventory held for sale is measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(e) *Trade creditors and other payables*

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days on recognition of the liability.

(f) *Property, plant and equipment*

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Where the cost model is used, the asset is carried at its cost less any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. Costs include the initial purchase price and other directly attributable costs.

Land

Land held for use is stated at re-valued amounts. Revalued amounts are fair market values based on appraisals prepared by external professional valuers once every three to five years or more frequently if market factors indicate a material change in fair value.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the revaluation surplus in equity. Revaluation decreases that offset previous increases of the same class of assets shall be recognised in other comprehensive income under the heading of revaluation surplus. All other decreases are recognised in profit or loss.

Buildings, plant & equipment

Buildings, plant and other equipment (comprising fittings and furniture) are initially recognised at acquisition cost, including any costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Buildings, plant and other equipment are subsequently measured using the cost model, cost less subsequent depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised on a straight-line basis to write down the cost less estimated residual value of buildings, plant and other equipment. The following useful lives are applied:

(g) *Revenue*

The Association applies AASB 15 for recognising revenue. Revenue is recorded as the amount of the transaction price that is allocated to the performance obligation, excluding any amounts of variable consideration, when the performance obligation has been satisfied. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST). The Association has the following specific policies for when the performance obligations have been met:

Provision of Membership Services

Revenue for membership subscriptions is recognised in the period to which the benefits of the membership is provided.

Sale of Goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Capital grants

Capital grants received to enable the Association to acquire or construct an item of property, plant and equipment to identified specifications which will be under the Association's control and which is enforceable are recognised as revenue as and when the obligation to construct or purchase is completed.

For construction projects, this is generally as the construction progresses in accordance with costs incurred since this is deemed to be the most appropriate measure of the completeness of the construction project as there is no profit margin.

For acquisitions of assets, the revenue is recognised when the asset is acquired and controlled by the Association.

Donations

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control of the asset.

Interest revenue

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method.

(h) *Goods and services tax (GST)*

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

(i) *Employee benefits*

A provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

The Association's liabilities for other employee obligations are included in other long-term benefits as they are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service.

(j) *Reserves*

Asset revaluation reserve comprises gains and losses from the revaluation of land.

All other reserves comprise surplus funds that have been designated to be spent for a specific purpose in the future to which the individual reserve relates.

(k) *Financial Instruments*

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the entity commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted). Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss' in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Finance instruments are subsequently measured at either fair value or amortised cost using the effective interest rate method or cost. Fair value represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as:

The amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments; plus or minus the cumulative amortisation of the difference, if any, between the amount initially recognised and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method; and less any reduction for impairment.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the

contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying value with a consequential recognition of an income or expense in profit or loss.

(i) Financial assets are classified at fair value through profit or loss

When they are held for trading for the purpose of short-term profit taking, or where they are derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying value being included in profit or loss.

(ii) Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

(iii) Financial Liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities (excluding financial guarantees) are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Fair value

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments. Valuation techniques are applied to determine the fair value for all unlisted securities, including recent arm's length transactions, reference to similar instruments and option pricing models.

Impairment

At each reporting date, the entity assess whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether an impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

De-recognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual right to receipt of cash flows expires or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are either discharged, cancelled or expired. The difference between the carrying value of the financial liability, which is extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(l) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of assets, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the class of assets belong. Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

(m) New Accounting standards adopted during the year

AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

AASB 15 took effect for the Association on 1 January 2019, replacing AASB 118 which details the recognition of revenue. Under the new standard revenue is recognised when specific performance obligations are met. The adoption of this standard has resulted in a change in when the Association recognises revenue from membership subscriptions. This income is now recognised in the period to which the membership is provided, previously the income was recognised on a cash basis.

AASB 16 Leases

AASB 16 took effect for the Association on 1 January 2019, replacing AASB 117. The new standard removes the distinction between operating and finance leases, consequently the majority of leases will be recognised on the balance sheet. Under the new standard, an asset (the right to use the leased item) and a financial liability to for future rental payments are recognised. This standard did not have a material impact on the operations of the Association.



Well, another year has come and gone. Yes, almost 12 months to the day, we were all here at the South Australian Clay Target Association State DTL Carnival. This year from Thursday February 6th through to Sunday February 9th sees our 4th year that the Carnival is extended to be 4 days of competition, based on the success of the reintroduction of the State Champion of Champions. A good decision on behalf of the State Board.

By Wednesday afternoon, the grounds of the State Shooting Park were already buzzing with activity as the usual caravanners and campers arrived, getting themselves a favourable vantage spot for the 4 days of shooting competitions. All the Trade stands were being erected with lots of great goodies on show for everyone to feast their eyes on and buy. Competitors from nearly every State this year, over the 4 days of events, were all vying to try their skill at claiming one of the many Red State sashes that were on offer.

Temperatures for the 4 days were going to be reasonably comfortable in the low – mid 30's. The days leading up to the Carnival were quite scary earlier in the week with temperatures reaching 43–46 degrees only a few days ago, and we all thought of how awful it was a few years ago when the Carnival had to be run in similar temperatures. In the background, everyone was out there practicing to make sure they had a psychological edge and to be sure they were used to the background of the various layouts that were being used before the competitions starts tomorrow at 11am.

Early on Thursday morning the officials were running around in a scurry of activity while final checks were being done to the layouts – angles, heights, distances and speeds. To this part, a word of thanks has to go out to the Shoot Marshall (Andrew Hoare) and his committed team for overseeing trap set-ups over the 4 days. Friends that hadn't seen each other for ages were seen all over the park having a good laugh, telling stories and catching up on the last 12 months. Most interstate visitors came in with their families for the events, and this certainly made for a large crowd of onlookers and a great ambience at the grounds.

Even the office was a flurry of activity as we made sure everything was in readiness, especially the important stuff like all the lollies being in their respective bowls for the staff (very important)!! The grounds had been manicured nicely for our competitors, so that everyone could have a great 4 days of competing without a worry in the world. The office was prepared for the

rush of shooters at the ticket window and with nominations and squadding on cue, right on 11am sharp, 93 competitors – 17 squads), (just a little down on last year), started to get called and filed out to the walks to contest the 1st event which was the 75tgt State Champion of Champions title off 18m. Lurking around every corner and walking amongst us you could see some of the best shooters in Australia waiting to pounce and claim one of the available Red State title sashes. Breezy conditions greeted the shooters with temperatures in the high 20's. Squads shot their whole 75 targets in 1 visit to the trap with just a reload in between 25's. After shoot-offs, when all had gone quiet, the results were counted and came out as follows: C Grade 1st went to Charlie Noto 99/125, and 2nd was Darren Nicholas. B Grade 1st went to Ray Mack 104/125, and 2nd was Anna Evgeniou. A Grade winner was Ben Grossi 116/125, followed by Stephen Reyne in 2nd place. AA 1st was taken by Tim Williams with a well shot 143/150, with Jarred Nicholls 2nd place. The Junior category went to Harry Clark, Veteran winner was Robert Andrews

and the highest scoring Lady was Deserie Baynes. The highest accolade of Overall Open for this event was taken by a very happy Glen Castellaro 146/150.

Presentations were all over by 3pm and a great day was had by all. Most competitors headed out to the practice trap for some Double Rise practice before everyone started to head to their accommodation for a relaxing break before tackling tomorrow's events.

Friday morning came around and everyone was excited about the next event which was the 25 pair State Double Rise Championship. 100 shooters came out to contest the event in near perfect conditions, which were calm with only a light breeze and temperatures around the mid 20's. This is the first year with the new grading for Double Rise, so there are some unfamiliar (and rather strange names) taking out the Titles. By the time the shoot-off's started, it was a bit blowie which made the targets a little tricky for the shooters. It was over fairly quickly and when the final results came in, they looked like this: C Grade winner was Craig Bentley 44/50, and 2nd went to Robbie Clark. B Grade was won by a Gavin Height 47/50, while John Hawker took 2nd A Grade 1st was taken by Stephen Reyne on 43/50, with 2nd place going to Shannen Gallagher. AA was won by Steve Trembath 66/70, and 2nd went to Glen Castellaro. Veteran winner was Gary Hayden, Ladies was Kelly Coogan and the Junior winner was Harry Clark. The Overall State title went to Steve Haberman with a near perfect 67/70. Congratulations Haby! (for the second year).

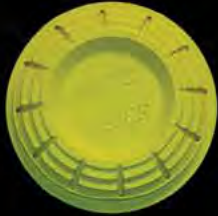

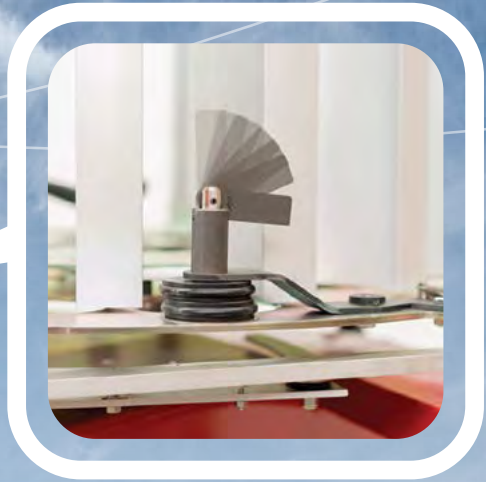

Pairs Trap Championship plus the first 75 targets of the Commonwealth ISSF Skeet Championships.

For those not familiar with mixed pairs, there are two shooters (a male and female) to a team who both shoot 75 targets each for a total out of 150. The top two pairs then shoot off over 25 targets single barrel for each person in a gold and silver match. The third

and fourth placed pairs in the event also shoot a final under the same format for the bronze medal.

Tokyo 2020 will be the first time this event has been conducted at an Olympic Games and currently Australia has some of the best exponents of this in the World. An interesting fact is that Australian teams have won two World Championships in mixed pairs with different individuals pairing up in the past three years. Penny Smith and Thomas Grice won the inaugural World Championship in 2017 and backed it up with a bronze medal in 2019 when Laetisha Scanlan and James Willet became the current World Champions.

This year however it was Penny Smith and Thomas Grice who prevailed over up and coming junior female Geogia Pistone and her partner Todd Malone. The winners of the Bronze medal match were Stephanie Pile and Daniel Di Pietro over Kiara Dean and Craig Henwood.

Tuesday saw the completion of the Commonwealth ISSF Skeet Championships and the first 75 targets of the Commonwealth ISSF Trap. In the women's final Laura Coles from WA came

What a trio of World Class Athletes right there. James Willett NSW became the 2020 Men's Commonwealth ISSF Trap Champion defeating Vince Molica Vic in second place and Mitchell Iles who came in third.

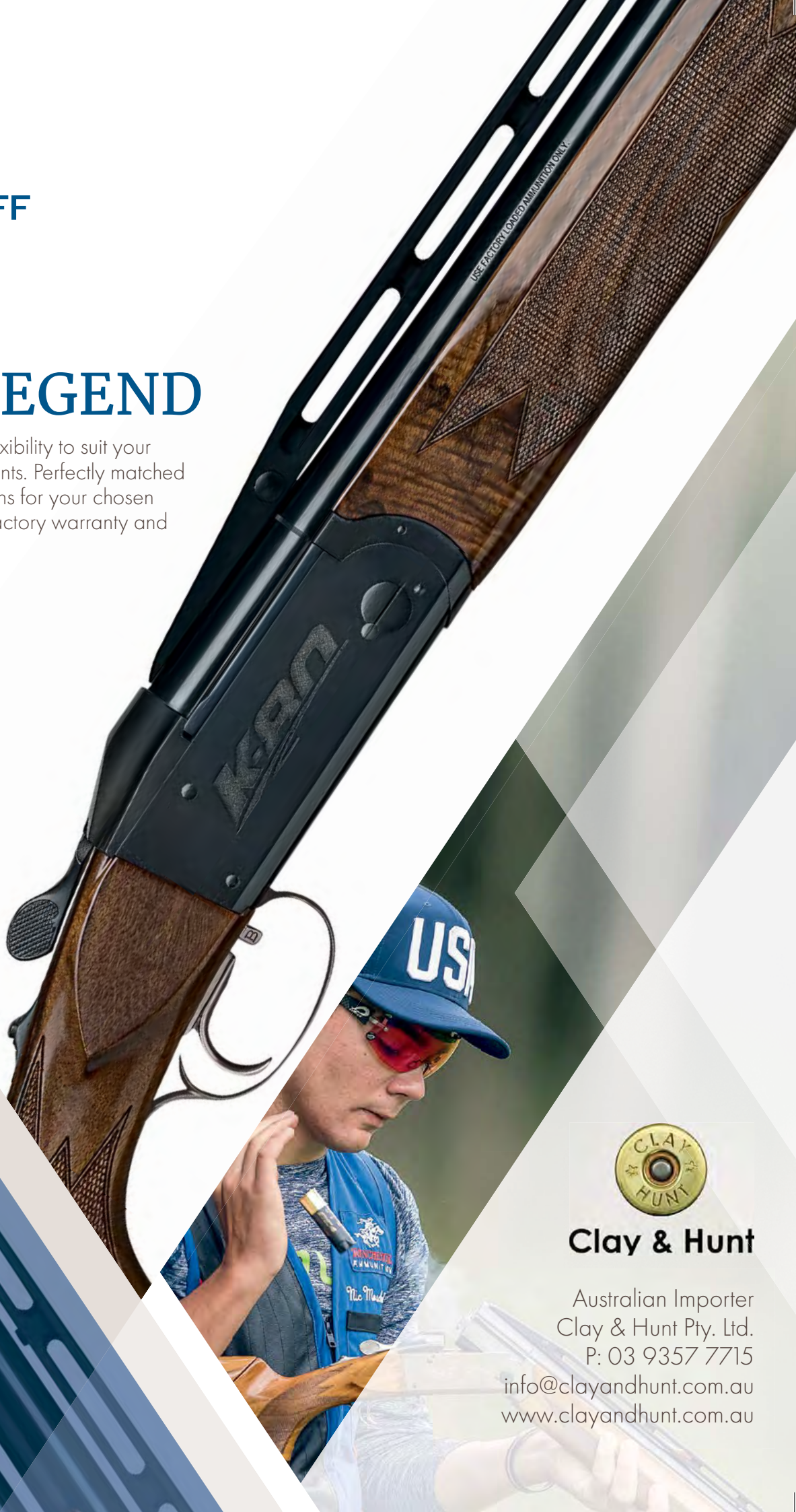

The Finals of the 2020 National ISSF Skeet Championships resulted in the overall winner of the women's National Championship event being Aislin Jones over Laura Coles from WA silver medallist and Chloe Tipple from New Zealand capturing the bronze medal. The National Men's ISSF Skeet Championship for 2020 was won by Paul Adams Qld, this was his second Championship win for the Carnival. The runner up in this event was Luke Argiro from Mildura Vic, and the bronze medallist was Josh Bell of NSW.

As this was the conclusion of the Skeet section of the 2020 ISSF National Carnival the High Gun winners for Skeet were also awarded.

The 2020 Men's High Gun Winner was Paul Adams with a score of 234/250. The Women's High Gun Winner this year, was Laura Coles with 223/250. Junior High Gun Winner was Aislin Jones with a 221/250, and the Veterans High Gun was won by Barry

As we can see from the results there are now sufficient shooters to hold competitions in all sections and grades, something that had previously disadvantaged women and juniors particularly when the women only shot 75 targets events.

The final event for the 2020 ISSF Carnival was the Australian National ISSF Trap Championships conducted over the Friday and Saturday. The men's final was a fantastic spectacle that included two extremely

Psychological Skills for Shooting

Positive Self-Talk

Last month I presented a summary of self talk: that steady stream of thoughts and dialogues that go on in our minds. I mentioned that self-talk can be either positive or negative and it can, if repeated enough go on to form beliefs by which we think, act and live. This month I want to explore positive thought patterns.

I recently attended the New Zealand Sporting Clays Nationals in Rotorua. The targets were difficult and challenging. They were set at very long distances but it was the topography of the club grounds proved the greatest challenge. Notwithstanding the walking down step and dangerous paths, the targets could be set high on ridges and driven down at heights and angles unknown to shooters who predominately shoot on the Hay Plains. There was also the opportunity to set targets that were driven hard 40 to 50 metres below your feet. It would be impossible to set targets like these on flat ground. Because we were shooting targets on steep ground that were not familiar with the scores were somewhat lower than we were used to. This was a blow to a lot of shooters and the talk over meals reflected a lot of negative thought patterns.

What is needed to change the negative thought patterns into positive thought patterns?

According to Burton & Raedeke, positive thought patterns help create a “flow” mindset by boosting confidence, maintaining an optimistic attitude, promoting concentration at crucial moments, enhancing motivation to push you to your limits, creating an optimal level of arousal and ensuring poise and mental toughness when confronting failure or adversity. Wow, what a sentence: and it’s not just the words and wondrous phrases. This is it. If we could consistently develop this flow mindset, we would rarely miss, fail or lose, and if we did we could handle it.

Burton & Raedeke outline eight strategies that we can use to help us use self-talk productively and effectively. They refer to these strategies as “smart talk commandments.”

1. *Be an optimist not a pessimist.* Self-talk is always a choice; it can either be positive or negative or it can be a combination of either. As an athlete we should focus on our strengths, and push for personal bests that can help us reach our middle and long term goals. Coaches can play a vital role here: be a positive role model and concentrate on what you’re your athlete can do rather than what they cannot do.
2. *Remain realistic and objective.* Positive self-talk must be just more than thinking positively, in a way that can confuse reality with day-dreams. Dreams and visions are important but they must be translated into specific goals and action plans. Smart talk will keep our thoughts well grounded and realistic: this is important because it will help us bounce back from a defeat if the goals we have set ourselves are realistic and achievable.
3. *Focus on the present, not the past or the future.* Regular readers will have heard this before, and it needs to have the status of a mantra. If we focus on the past we are likely to relive old failures and misses and make judgements about our performance based on these skewed thoughts from the past. The same is true for focusing on the future: because we cannot be guaranteed of victories, we become anxious about the outcome and this anxiety leads to self-doubt. Self-doubt leads to our muscles tensing up and we miss. The present is the only time any of us can act. If we stay focused on the present we can concentrate on the process (shooting), and the product (score) will look after itself. Burton & Raedeke, state that smart- talk forgets the “if only’s (past) and the “what if’s” (future) and concentrates on staying in the moment and enjoying the here and now.
4. *Appraise problems as challenges rather than threats.* Athletes who view problems as challenges bring out the best in themselves by remaining motivated and performing up to their capabilities. If you perceive problems as threats you will become consumed with avoiding failure, become stressed and perform poorly.

5. *View successes at replicable and failures as surmountable.* You will success as something you can do again and again if you believe that the success is due to effort and ability rather than just good luck. Coaches and the athletes themselves need to attribute failure to something they can control: for example, the failure may be due to fitness (physical skills), poor shot (technical skills) or poor concentration (mental skills). Skill development in any of areas may assist in solving the problem. Smart talk helps the athletes see that the causes of their failures can be fixed and that success is achievable.
6. *Focus on the process so that the product can look after itself.* Burton & Raedeke believe that self-talk focus should be on the process goals (eg, hard work, mental preparation, skill and strategy development) that help us achieve the desired product goals. For shooters the process is the actual act of shooting: pre-shot routine, mounting the gun, acquiring the target, swing, pulling the trigger and following through. The product is the score.
7. *Concentrate on the things you can control.* This according to Burton & Raedeke is the most important aspect of self-talk. If we try and change people and events beyond our control, then all we do is create stress for ourselves. If however, we focus self-talk on the things we can control, our emotions and behaviours remain positive and constructive. We cannot control our opponents behaviour but we can control our own: smart talk would tell us to "Act not React".
8. *Separate your performance from your self worth.* Your worth as a human being has nothing to do with how you shoot. Sporting ability, is only one aspect of who you are: your work, your ability to develop and maintain relationships, your ability to provide something for the sport or other who compete are more important than your ability to perform well. Everytime you compete you must remember that "you" are not your score (your score was how you performed on the day).

By following the eight strategies listed above you should be able to construct positive thought patterns, which will support your ability and should lead to further success. It must be remembered that it is impossible to stay positively focused all the time. Because we are human, it is very easy to slip into a negative mindset that will work against the good work that the positive thought patterns are trying to achieve. The plan is to have a positive thought

patterns that significantly outweigh the negative thought patterns.

Self-talk is something none of us can avoid. What we need to do, especially when we are competing, is to limit negative self-talk as this generates self doubt and causes us to tense up, our movements become less fluid, and we miss the target. Positive mindsets on the other hand can help us maintain the 'flow'.

Criteria: Any 100 target score from any State or Territory 12g State title of any State carnival. Submit as many State 12g scores as you like and use the best one. Plus the combined scores of the National – Handicap, 20g, 12g and Commonwealth events. Eg: 100+350=450 targets total. Best two scores win.

Commencement: 1st June 2018 until the completion of the 2019 Skeet Nationals (for a 5 year trial)

Additional awards include: FITASC Five Person Club Team Event, Two Person Team Event;

Two Women Team Event; Mixed Pairs Team Event; All Australian Skeet Team

CASELLA / BRONZE WING HIGH GUNS on Events 3 to 7:

OVERALL; GRADED AA, A, B, C; WOMENS; JUNIOR; SUB JUNIOR & VETERANS.

Glenn Trophy team selected every year. World Skeet team selected even years.



The ACTA reserves the right to alter the program.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY – National Skeet Championships

1. Any shooter wanting to compete at the Skeet Nationals must be a registered member of the ACTA for the current financial year that the championships are being held.
2. **The close date for nominations is 5pm on the 1st May 2020. Preferential squadding will only be accepted on nominations received prior to this date.**
3. Every shooter is to provide their current and previous Record Card when requested by the State or National Handicapper at State and National Championships.
4. In the event of any shooter not being able to produce his/her Handicap Card, a duplicate shall be issued for the duration of the National Championships. This card will then be forwarded to the Club Secretary to enable scores shot to be recorded.
Note: A \$20 fee will be charged for the issue of any duplicate Handicap Card.
5. Shooters will be Pre Squadded and any interpretation of this will be the responsibility of the Tournament Director.
6. Each shooter is to take enough cartridges to shoot at 50 targets/100 targets. A time limit of one minute will be imposed for the changeover for each 25 targets. Should the one-minute time limit be exceeded then a penalty of the **LOSS OF ONE TARGET** may be incurred.
7. For the National 28gauge Championship load size is limited to 21gr (3/4oz) maximum struck measure shot size not larger than no. 7. For the National .410bore Championship load size is limited to 14gr (1/2oz) maximum struck measure shot size not larger than no. 7"
8. Any shooter missing their squad and requiring re-squadding will be penalised one (1) target (at the discretion of the Tournament Director).
9. Should a shooter being late for his squad then elect to withdraw from the event he will not be eligible for any refund of nominations paid.
10. All shooters should sign the score sheet after each 25 targets. Once a shooter has signed his score sheet he has accepted his score and grade. Any score sheet not carrying the shooters signature will be credited with the lowest score recorded.
11. All competitors will be called upon to referee and/or score throughout the period of competition. The persons' designated to referee and score must fulfil their obligation to do so. While replacement referee and scorers are permissible, the penalty of a loss of one target for their failing to officiate shall be made against the officially designated person. Failure to either referee or score will incur a penalty of the **LOSS OF ONE TARGET** in the next event. Should a following event not be programmed then the penalty of the **LOSS OF ONE TARGET** will be incurred in the event concerned.
12. Any unauthorised shooter interfering with or attempting to interfere with the trap will be penalised **FIVE (5) TARGETS**.
13. All disputes must be in writing together with \$20 deposit, which is refundable subject to the appeal being upheld.
14. All disputes and deposits must be lodged with the Tournament Director, who shall arrange a hearing with the appointed jury.
15. When team selection is involved, shooters who are eligible for the open team selection as well as section teams shall choose in which team they will be selected. They cannot compete in both Open and Section teams.
16. Any eligible competitor paying nominations is entitled to receive awards in the Open section, Women's, Junior's or Veterans section, however the overall winner cannot take any grade prize.
17. A minimum of three persons must compete in any Grade or Section, including High Gun before sashes, medals trophies and/or cash are awarded, irrespective of nomination paid.
18. Any interpretation of the program and conditions of entry will be the responsibility of attending members of the Executive Committee, whose decision shall be final. The ACTA reserves the right to alter the program.
19. An acceptable standard of dress is required for all competitors, Tournament Director to adjudicate.
20. **All Competitors must comply with Firearms Licensing Laws in their State of residence and in the State hosting the National Championships.**
21. Squads of 5/6 to shoot 50 targets in one visit only to the traps. Squads of 5/6 to shoot 100 targets in one or two visits to the traps or as designated by the Tournament Director.
22. Payment of the nomination fee only entitles the shooter to enter the event. Changes to the program including the number of targets shot will not be eligible for any refund.
23. Free junior nominations, open to any junior who has not competed in a national event of any discipline & only by pre-nomination. Claim for this concession must be made at time of nominating & will not be refunded retrospectively. Late nominations will not be eligible for this concession.
24. Shooters will be Pre-squadded as per ACTA rules and regulations and any interpretation of this will be the responsibility of the Tournament Director. Withdrawing from an event needs to be done in writing or by ringing the National Office (02 6938 2121) & leaving a message **PRIOR** to the event. All refund requests will be dealt with on an individual basis.
25. The setting of targets will be conducted by the Tournament Director and the trap mechanic prior to the start of the event daily. No further adjustments will be made to traps without the authorization from the Tournament director or the Shoot Marshal.
26. Shooters must have at least 200 targets recorded on their Record Card to establishing a grade prior to entering State and National Championships.

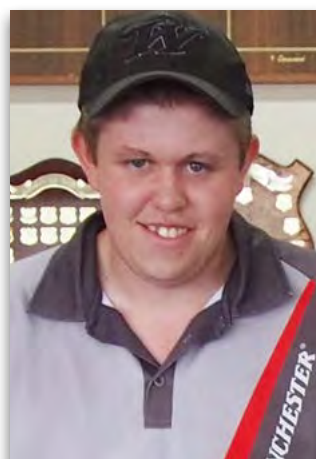

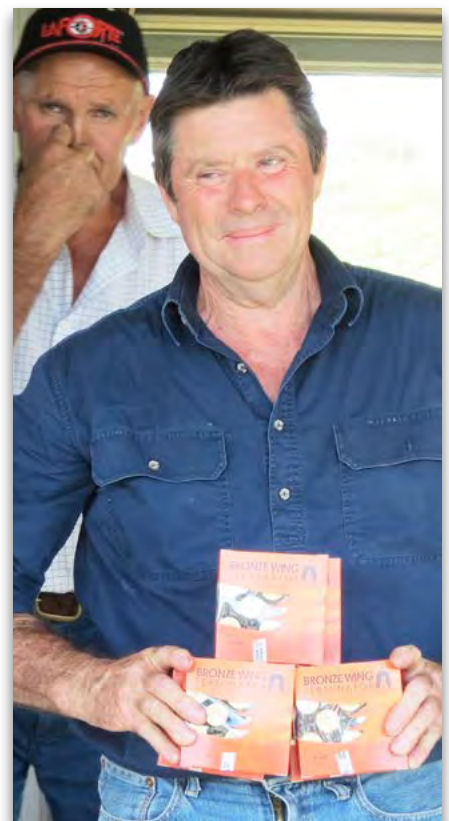
