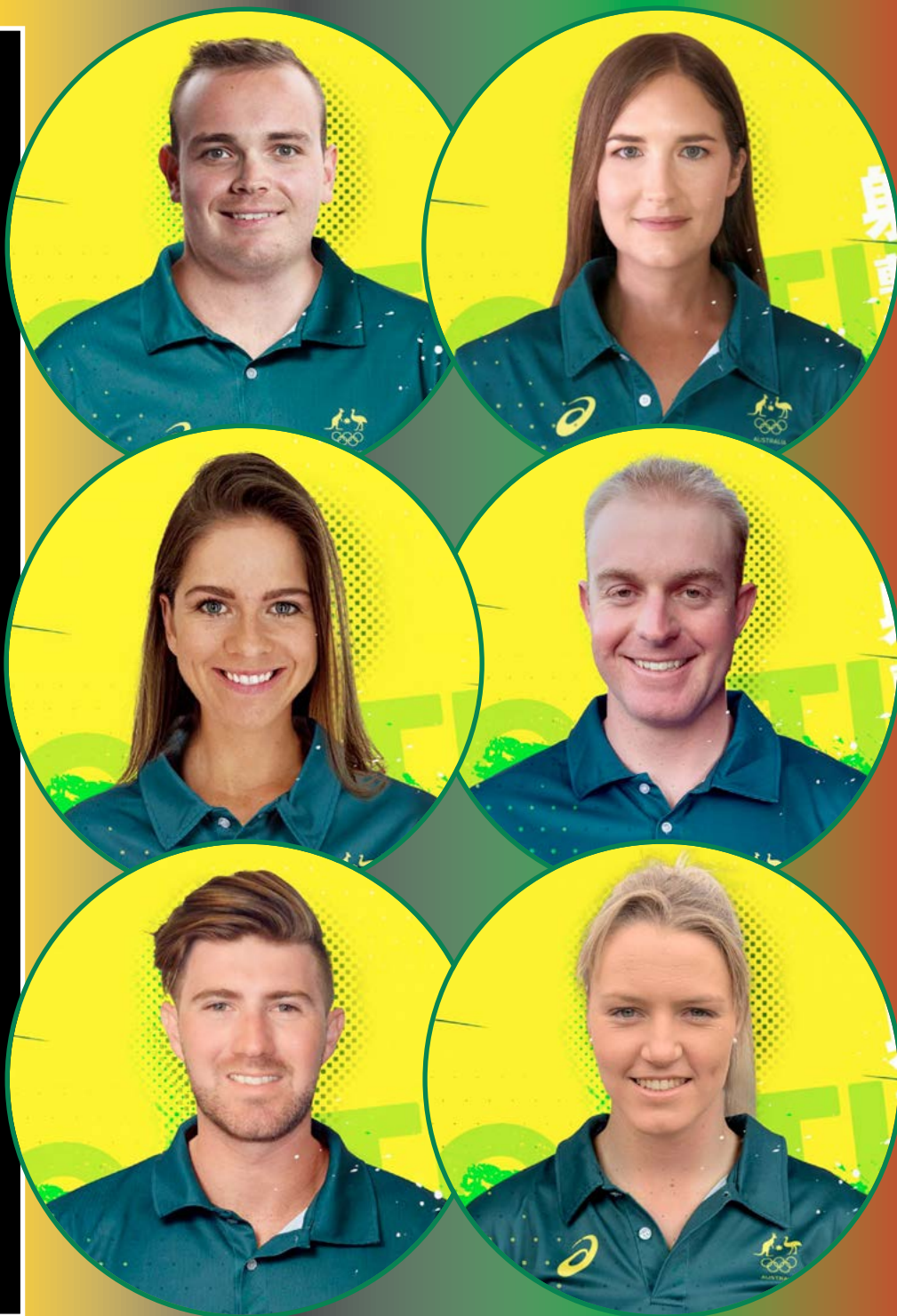

ACTA REPORT

Mal Dyson – President Paul Gilbert – CEO



Unfortunately, as we move towards the end of 2021, the Covid-19 situation continues to be at the forefront of everyone's minds. Obviously, NSW, the ACT and Victoria appear to be dealing with a virus that will "not magically go away", and at this juncture in time, lockdown appears to be the only answer other than mass vaccination. Sadly, this continues to impact on the capacity of clubs in these States to provide participation opportunities for their members, and while social interaction remains the main focus of attention in order to attempt to reduce transmission, everyone continues to be at the mercy of these compliance requirements. While it is understandable that many NSW, VIC and ACT members are frustrated that your sport is being impacted, please also be aware that less than a handful of sports nation-wide gained "continuation status" in the early days of Covid before the Governments stopped granting these concessions, and therefore nearly every sports participant in these affected jurisdictions is currently in the same situation as us. So, with the bigger picture in mind, please remain accepting of this situation that is out of everyone's hands.

With less regimented Covid restrictions currently in force, QLD, SA, NT, TAS and WA have, on the other hand, been able to continue various levels of competition and recreational shooting. On a personal note, I, (Mal), was lucky enough to travel prior to the lock downs and was able to visit Darwin, Top End and Alice Springs shooting clubs. Darwin Club held their State Titles, which was a four-day shoot, and even with the cancellation of interstate shooters due to the lock downs, this was still a successful carnival. Committee members from Darwin and Top End made all visitors feel welcome. Alice Springs also managed to attract a few visitors and again, everyone was made to feel welcomed.

My Clubs My Scores

Martin Smith has now completed the Handicap and Grading algorithm. This is now ready for testing over the next few months prior to going live on 1 January 2022. If all clubs that have not, as yet, come on board, could please contact Martin ASAP (0457 079 929), and he will assist you with getting your club online. Having spoken with a few AA Elite members and there only seem to be a small percentage who are concerned that they could be regraded down. Moving forward, where

a member has achieved the criteria to be awarded AA Elite this may still be able to be recognised. Please be mindful that, in order to obtain the award of AA Elite, the member achieving the award has to personally apply to the ACTA in order to receive this acknowledgement.

Over the past 6 weeks ACTA Management Sub-Committee have met on 2 occasions, the Constitution Sub-Committee and the full ACTA Executive Committee on 1 occasion and the National and State Rules Supervisors twice. It has therefore been a busy 6 weeks. The Constitution Sub-Committee, as mentioned earlier, has enlisted the services of CPRGroup, a Queensland Company, to assist in the preparation of the new Constitution. The Management Sub-Committee are about to meet again and discuss the survey responses provided by members and clubs which will assist us in the preparation of the strategic plan for the ACTA.

2021 Member Survey

Firstly, thanks to the 700 shooting Members and 20 Clubs that took the time and effort to respond to the surveys. As you might expect, the range of responses across this cross-section of members provided a vast range of responses, from great to unimpressed, depending on each person's expectations and experiences. We also received responses that completely contradicted one another, some feeling that changes being made are great and long overdue while others being of the opinion that those same changes are ruining the sport!

There were a number of topics that repeated many times. One of them was a suggestion that members are charged too much for membership while others suggested that they should receive membership discounts due to Covid-19. As we advised in an earlier edition of the Clay Target e-News, the member's club is the primary source of your participation. The stark reality is that clubs are not in any position to reduce or refund membership . . . to the contrary, they (and we) rely heavily on membership subscription in order to just remain buoyant and provide the basic amenities and services that we deliver. In the case of the ACTA, our base operating costs are also totally independent of the events we deliver. Our nomination fees for competitions fully offset participation costs, so "no event"

doesn't equate in any way with "lower expenditure" or financial windfalls. This is because, even in a Covid lockdown, costs of facility maintenance and upkeep and membership support remain. If funding were not available to keep facilities and club infrastructure preserved and financially in balance, the cost would ultimately lead to permanent closure with no future access to the products and services that the respective delivery agents provide. So, while the present situation isn't currently looking like a great return on your investment, please rest assured that the future of keeping your club and sport alive totally depends on it!

Debunking the Myths

One of the most interesting things about reading the survey responses was the range of perceptions, (some accurate while others skewed), that our members have regarding their (your) expectations around what we should be delivering to clubs and members as an Association. Some of the views relate to historical interactions while others are reactions to personal experiences and expectations. While there were MANY constructive comments which we will take on board, there were also a number that were errantly conceived, so I feel that it is important to set the record straight in some of these areas. Over the next few months, therefore, we'll concentrate on some of the things that were suggested as common expectations of what the Association should provide and try to explain where the impossibility of the assumptions lie. Today's is "PROVIDE MORE FUNDING / FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CLUBS".

I'm sorry to be the bearer of bad news, but the ACTA is not a recipient of any Federal Funding from Sport Australia, and that being the case, we don't receive any money in order to redistribute seed / grass roots funding back to clubs. Many years ago, the ASC determined that they would only fund one Australian PEAK Sports Shooting Body . . . Shooting Australia. Prior to that, the ACTA, Pistol Australia and Target Rifle Australia performed all functions around sports delivery right up to and including ISSF and Olympic Team participation level. With that decision of the ASC, Shooting Australia became the elite sport delivery agent, and with it took all of the collective NSO's Federal Funding. That said, the ACTA is no longer recognised by Sport Australia as a peak Sports Body and, as a consequence, is not even entitled any more to apply for Federal sports grants.

Please also let me clarify here . . . Sport Australia funds Olympic and World Championships pathways. This means the discipline of ISSF only from Shooting Australia's perspective, so DTL, Skeet and Sporting Clays elite pathway opportunities are not funded by

the Australian Government in any way whatsoever. Additionally, grass roots development funding is provided only to SA whereas, in any other normal National Sports Organisation scenario, this funding would otherwise be made available to member clubs through the Peak Sporting Body. In order to tick this funding box, SA have invented "Come and Try May" which many clubs choose not to participate in, therefore, also denying themselves of this funded opportunity.

So to be accusing the ACTA of stashing millions and stealing money from clubs is quite absurd. We, like the clubs, survive solely on subscriptions and charging a fee for service. The perception that we spend too much money on the elite participant is also flawed as the small financial contribution we make towards our National DTL, Skeet and Sporting Clays Representative Teams is achieved from an annual levy of \$2 / member and \$5 per Nationals Nomination. Furthermore, these levy contributions don't come anywhere near covering the real participation costs for these athletes and also severely restrict team sizes.

The expectation therefore that we should buy new traps for clubs, purchase them large parcels of land to shoot on and replace aging assets or employ full-time trap mechanics to travel the country and service / set trap machines to a national standard with our surplus funds is, sadly, so far from reality it's fantasy. Furthermore, clubs can and do have access to grant funding through their own state governments, so expecting the ACTA to find the financial means to employ more staff, (at no increased cost to members), in order to source and deliver this service is also truly illogical and impossible.

Constitution Update

The Constitution Sub-Committee met again on Monday 6 September to review all of the club feedback that was received. This was provided by a total of 9 clubs. CPRGroup has also been enlisted to extract any constitutional feedback from the surveys so we can add these responses into the mix. Again, we would like to thank those of you who provided feedback with the ambition that we can use your comments to make the proposed constitution work for everyone. Our next step will be to meet again with CPRGroup in a few weeks' time to commence reediting or rewriting of the document and develop a timeline for reengagement with our members on this issue.

Fed-Ex TNT Firearms Freight Withdrawal

We have been advised by Bridget McKenzie's office that the Nationals are attempting to find solutions to the Fed-Ex decision to stop freighting legal firearms

around Australia through its company. Her office has advised that "Australia Post has undertaken to work with industry on a solution to continue firearms freight. Australia Post is currently examining possible solutions with the firearms industry over the transportation of firearms over 1130mm, bulk shipments of firearms and accessories, as well as the transport of ammunition". Further meeting will be conducted between both parties over the coming weeks.

ICTSF World DTL & English Sporting Events

ICTSF General Assembly members met via Go To Meeting in early August. Discussion out of the meeting was the ICTSF World DTL and the ICTSF World

English Sporting Event. From this meeting the following decisions were agreed:

- the next ICTSF World DTL Event will be further postponed to 2023 and on confirmation from the CTSASA it will be held in South Africa. To get the Championships back on rotation England (CPSA) will hold the event in 2024 at the Bywell Shooting Grounds.
- the ICTSF World English Sporting is still to be decided. France has shown some interest in staging this event however they have not responded to requests for more information from the Admin Council.

That's about all we have to report on this month.

As always, please stay safe and healthy. Hopefully the promises of freedoms associated with 80% vaccination will help things open up again soon!

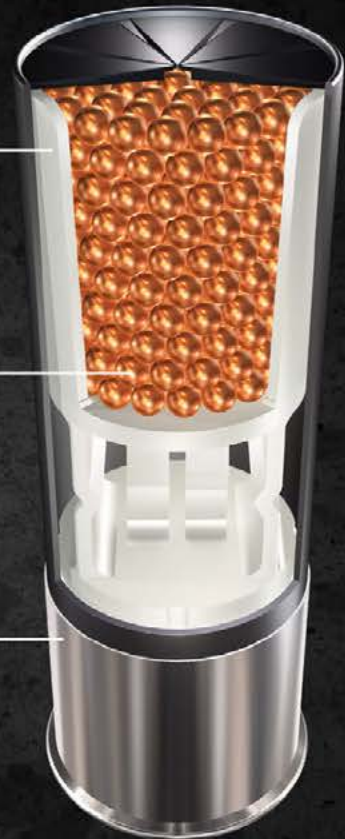

SACTA STATE ISSF CARNIVAL

International Clay Target Club

August 27, 28, 29 2021



In a year that most of us would prefer to put behind us, restrictions due to the pandemic have been eased enough here in South Australia for us to be fortunate enough to hold our State Carnival for ISSF. Without dwelling too much on the events that have caused us all sorts of grief around the country for the past 18 months, we are all here again to compete for the 2021 titles – albeit without many of our interstate friends and counterparts. Being a Shooting Australia sanctioned event this year, we were hoping to see a few competitors come through after the Tokyo Olympics to start their points qualifications, but not to be, due to ongoing border closures, thanks to our recently acquired evil friend – COVID.

On the official practice day (Thursday), we saw a decent contingent of competitors come through to shoot at our host Club, International CTC, to prep their skills for the three days of competition.

Leading up to our competition dates of August 27, 28 and 29, we saw unseasonal weather conditions. Some rather cold and wet days mixed in with some heavy rain days. And, the next 3 days were going to be no exception with light showers and heavy rain expected over the Saturday and Sunday singles event.

The first day started at around eight degrees for the morning and with very still air. Only a limited number of participants came to the ticket window to contest the first event, the State Mixed Pairs title, due to the inability of interstate travellers to make it here this

year. Held only for the third time here in South Australia, the small mix of competitors filed through to try their skills. Targets were set the night before and being checked again in the early morning for distances, heights, speeds and angles. Although a challenging first set of 75 with lots of low, fast and wide targets, no one could wish for better targets in such still conditions, with great visibility in front of the traps. The weather gods were going to be kind to us this morning with only a light breeze and clear blue skies.

As everyone wandered around the grounds seeing who they were up against, there was the usual atmosphere of anticipation. Office staff was well catered for with lollies in the bowls for keeping the energy levels up. At 9am everyone was called out to the layout to view the targets. Everything looked fine, and the games got under way.

Both layouts were being used this year and at 10.10am the targets were shown on the second ground for the next set. Steadily but determined they all got through their rounds. Competitors were coming in between the rounds to check the progressive scores and see how they had fared and there were smiles as well as sad faces to be had, but the targets were still flying nicely with no high winds to contend with.

After the qualifying event, cartridge checks were next on the agenda with competitors bringing 2 packs of their chosen ammunition for scrutinising.

When all the numbers had been calculated at the end, the shoot-offs got underway – 25 targets of Single Barrel for each competitor to determine the winners of the sought after State Red Sashes. The top 4 pairs went out to face it off – George K and Deserie Baynes against Skye P and Deb McPherson for the Bronze medal

match. The Bronze medal winners were Skye P and Deb McPherson 109 + 33. By this time the predicted showers had not eventuated, making for a nice clear day. The Gold medal match then got underway with Tom Grice and Molly Bretag against Martin Collumb and Anna Evgeniou. When all had gone quiet the Silver medal went to Martin and Anna 118 + 36, and, with only 1 point in it at the end, the Gold was won by Tom and Molly, 122 + 37 taking out the State Red Sashes and the State title. Congratulations and well done. Presentations got underway nice and early at 1.30pm which gave everyone a chance to have a relaxing afternoon and some well earned R&R before the games began again tomorrow. Congratulations to the winning participants. While the competitors had gone, all the officials were hustling over the trap layouts with their protractors, height sticks, angle and distance markers etc. to get everything right for the morning. A few people stayed behind to get some much needed practice in.

A special word of thanks must be given to the guys who give so generously of their time every day over the Carnival, year after year, to be at the grounds at the crack of dawn to get it all right so that the competitors can have a trouble free competition – our Patron, Kelvyn Prescott, Tania Evans, Craig Bentley, Martin Collumb, and Guy Yoannidis – it's a pretty thankless task, but we would like to acknowledge your efforts. Thanks also to the Shooting Australia girls Bianca and Sarah in the office, as well as Jane Vella who operated the shoot program remotely from interstate due to the inability to travel caused by the lockdowns. Finally, the ICTC Club committee and members Bobby Dower and Rick Zupanic who kept everything running smoothly – thank you all so very much.

So today, Saturday, the commencement of the qualifying 125 target singles rounds of which the first 75 targets would be shot today and would determine our SA Postal team. Seven squads came in this year for Trap. At the Skeet end, everything was also checked and double checked as the rules tell us. Considering the circumstances with the COVID situation, two squads still came out for the Skeet. The participants were called to the traps to check all the targets before they all headed out to undertake the task. Once again the forecast was for blustery conditions with late showers, and only 17 degrees, which made

for an awesome day with targets bouncing and being wind effected. Scores on the board certainly reflected the conditions with some being absolute train wrecks, and hopes of being in the winner's circle being dashed.

At the end of the day, there were lots of smiles and lots of sad faces again as the scores came in and got tallied. At 1.30 pm everything was over and everyone started making their way to the bars and hotels for some well earned rest and to get refreshed for the last 50 targets of the qualifier before the real work starts tomorrow in the finals. Squad sheets were redrawn and rotated ready for a start on time.

We were very lucky with the predicted rains holding off during the competitions. It started raining about 4:00pm and went overnight – by Sunday morning, we were back to clear skies and about 16 degrees for the day. As the first wave headed out at 9am, everyone started contemplating where they were going to end up. Competitors went out and did whatever they had to do to stay in the running for the State titles that were on offer for the select few that could manage their way through the changing conditions.

The last 50 targets were shot and calculations were being done in the office. A lot of head shaking was happening around the grounds and competitors were thinking – what could have gone so tragically wrong. The changing light conditions of the day before had already taken their toll and created some pretty average scores, however, it was a level playing field for everyone. A few however, managed to push through the day and come in with a decent score. Top score of the competition was a 112/125 by Craig Bentley – an indication of how tough the conditions were this year, but still a great effort to shoot that well.

The numbers were tallied, the bib positions allocated, and the top scores went out to face it off. The Womens final was Molly Bretag, Deserie Baynes, and Anna Evgeniou. The Mens final was Craig Bentley, Eric Parletta, Skye A – Z (Pienudomkijlert), Martin Collumb, Alex Sologub, and Thomas Grice.

Ladies final was conducted, and all shot single barrel under the shoot-off conditions and after the first 40 targets, the first to leave the group was Anna. The next 10 targets determined the Gold and Silver winners between Molly and Deserie. Coming out victor after those 10 targets (and picking up the Gold) was an elated Molly

Bretag. Congratulations and well done Molly, and commiserations to Deserie but still a valiant effort finishing with Silver.

Men's final got started and after the first 25 targets, the first to leave was Eric. Now the competitors do a series of sets of five with one person leaving after every set. Next to leave were Martin, and Craig. Alex Sologub picked up the Bronze. The Gold and Silver match got under way

between Skye and Tom. Eventually Skye came out victor to the huge cheers of his friends. Well done to both these guys and congratulations to Skye on the Gold medal and Tom with Silver.

Meanwhile, down at the Skeet end, it was Doyle Yoannidis, Fred Guyatt, Nick and Vince Dimasi, John Taarnby and Damien Yon on the battlefield

Here in South Australia we also have this event graded and like to reward the participants for their efforts in Grade.

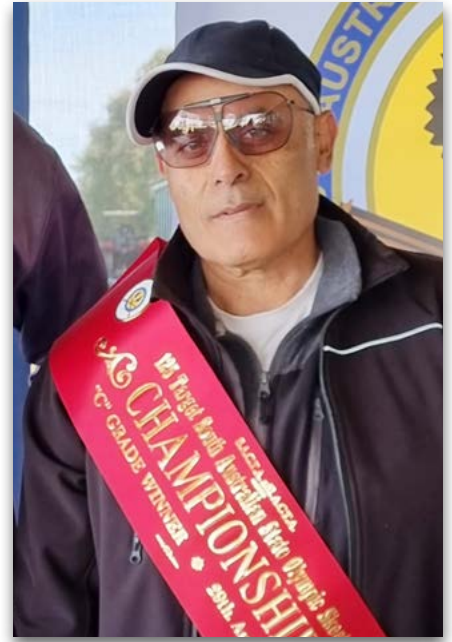

Olympic Games TOKYO 2021



The lack of international shooting competition during the Covid pandemic period undermined the ability of the Australian shotgun team to climb onto the medal dais during the recent Tokyo Olympic Games.

In a high quality shooting competition, the Games proved to be a frustrating event for the Australians with Laetisha Scanlan's fourth placing in the women's Trap the team's best performance.

With the Australian Government implementing a ban on overseas travel from Australia, unless there was an exemption from the Department of Home Affairs, the six member Australian Olympic Trap and Skeet team were limited to domestic events while rival athletes from European countries and the USA gained valuable international competition experience during the countdown to the Tokyo Olympics.

"I think we lacked international pressure. Australia wasn't allowed to travel to any of the World Cups in the lead-up to the Olympics," said Scanlan.

"This was our first international event in 18 months. You can't be disappointed with the results. We had the best preparation that was available," she added.

Laura Coles, the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games Skeet gold medallist, also bemoaned the lack of overseas competition since winning Olympic team selection in April last year.

Her last international event was the World Cup competition in Mexico in 2018.

"I think the fact that we haven't had a high-quality international event let me down a little bit," said Coles.

"There is a lot I can learn from this. Being on the world's biggest stage in such a pressurised event is a great opportunity to learn," she added.

While most of his teammates were unable to practice because of Covid restrictions, men's Trap athlete James Willett was able to train on his family farm in Mulwala. But he was hoping to gain international event sharpness in the months and weeks prior to the Games.

"We spent a lot of time preparing. We just tried to make the most of a not-ideal situation. We

gave it our all . . . we've done the best we could have," said Willett.

"I will take away some learnings and look forward to Paris," he added.

Scanlan came within an agonising one target of earning a bronze medal in the women's Trap

to finish level on 26 targets with San Marino's Alessandra Perilli. However, Perilli progressed on the higher bib number at Scanlan's expense to be one of the last three athletes.

It was Scanlan's second Olympics, and her fourth place was higher than her fifth placing behind gold medallist, Australian team-mate Catherine Skinner, at the 2016 Rio Olympics.

"I'm super disappointed," said Scanlan at the end of the final. "One more target would have got me a bronze medal," she said.

"It was a tough final and the medallists shot better.

"Hopefully when I reflect on this, the disappointing feeling won't last for that long and I can look back and enjoy the memories that Japan has created.

"It's been an amazing journey, a five-year long process and I'm really proud of myself to get to another Olympic Games especially within a pandemic," she added.

In her first Olympics, Smith showed her class to qualify fifth in the six athlete final, but she was unable to reproduce her best form in the medal deciding round.

"Qualifying was good, but the final was disappointing. But that's how it rolls sometimes," said Smith.

In the men's Trap, Willett and Tom Grice both missed qualifying for the final.

Willett needed to shoot two perfect rounds of 25 targets to qualify for a finals shoot-off but could only manage a last round score of 23 after shooting a faultless first round of 25.

Willett ultimately tallied 120/125 to be placed 21st while Grice managed 119/125 to be placed 25th.

In the inaugural Mixed Trap Teams event, Australia's teams of Willett and Scanlan, plus Grice and Smith were an agonising single trap away from a shoot-off for the bronze medal match after the three qualification rounds.

Both Australian teams tallied 146/150 to be pipped for the fourth place bronze medal position by the United States which went on to defeat Slovakia for the bronze medal.

Willett and Scanlan began the qualifying rounds perfectly each scoring 25/25 in the first round but then proceeded to drop four targets in the remaining two rounds.

Grice fired two opening rounds of 25 targets, but he and Smith were unable to climb into medal contention.

After they completed their three rounds, the

Australian teams watched the USA team hold their nerve over the final shots to seal a place in the bronze medal match.

Scanlan said they were disappointed with the result but proud of their effort.

"We're both disappointed with our qualification score. We've shot better before but that's the Olympics and that's the pressure it brings," said Scanlan.

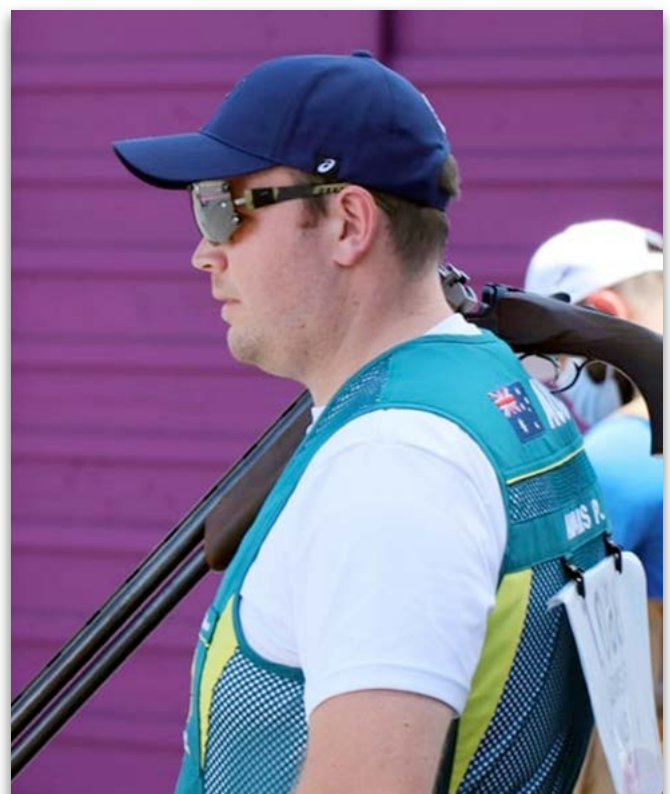
"Pressure is a privilege, and I am proud of James and myself that we gave it our all.

"Just getting to the Olympics with the whole pandemic and the postponement has been an absolute journey. I'm so proud of James and

myself and the whole Australian team," she added.

In the men's and women's Skeet, Paul Adams and Laura Coles knew they needed two near perfect rounds of 25 targets on the second day to reach the men's and women's Skeet final.

Adams, backing up after the 2016 Rio Olympics, fell three clays short of qualifying for

a finals shoot-off and ultimately finished in 21st position with a score of 119/125.

He was left to rue a second day opening round of 22/25 but put his disappointment aside to finish with a strong final round of 24/25.

"The first day was good. It went to plan with a score of 73. But the first round (on day two) was pretty rough with a 22," said Adams. "I was just in front of a couple of targets, and that was miniscule."

Coles opened the second day of qualification with a score of 24/25 but was unable to reproduce another near perfect final round to finish with a 20/25. Ultimately, she tallied a score of 112/125 to finish in 25th position.

Perth-based Coles' Olympic preparation was made even more difficult with WA border restrictions limiting her ability to travel east for training camps.

With less than three years until the 2024 Paris Games, the athletes are now hoping to resume international competition next year and fine tune their quest for Olympic podium results.

A huge congratulations to all the athletes who went out there and put their all into each shot. We are extremely proud of how they turned up and represented themselves and their country.

Vision and Shooting

Victor Scrooby is an optometry partner with Specsavers in Queensland.

He has been involved in the target shooting industry for over 20 years and was the optometrist consulting to the Great Britain World Class shooting program in the UK from 2000 to 2008. Now living in Brisbane he continues to help competitive target shooters of all disciplines and is a clay target shooter himself.

20/20 vision is just the average and is probably not good enough to excel at our chosen sport.

There can be no doubt, that vision is a critical part of any target shooting sport and that this is a huge topic prone to much debate and opinion. Let us try to cover a few basics in this article and delve into more detail in future articles.

You need only attend any of the coaching clinics, or 1-to-1 coaching sessions, to realise how often vision is referenced when instructing clay target shooters. Given this, it is amazing how little we know about shooting and vision. If you consider some other sports for example golf, and the Tiger Woods tee shot, or tennis and the Federer backhand, we have analysed every single component of the shot, from stance, to grip, to swing, to head position.

The perfect shot can be videoed and played back endlessly with the exact mechanisms analysed and understood so that they can be replicated over and over again. Motion detection software can identify exactly where a competitor is going wrong, and the coach can instruct them on exactly what to change. My children both play tennis and new technology can even tell them how many revolutions they are putting onto their topspin or backspin shots !!

This kind of analysis is just not possible with shooting, and we still don't really understand how the brain knows exactly when to pull the trigger. This is especially true when it comes to clay target disciplines, where you are faced with a moving target. Sure, we understand the basics and importance of gun mount, body position and technique, but the process of visually acquiring the target, positioning the gun, being aware of where the barrels are and pulling the trigger, all takes place in just a few seconds. Significant

improvements in technology are allowing us to delve deeper into the process of shooting and phenomena such as the "quiet eye" will, I am sure it will be further researched over time. For now, though, the difference in technique between a hit or missed target is still often a mystery but there is no doubt that vision is critical.

Broadly speaking, there are three main areas of vision that a clay target shooter should consider. They are visual acuity, lens tints, and the phenomenon of cross-dominance.

Visual acuity

Visual acuity is critical in any target sport, but what is visual acuity, and how good is good?

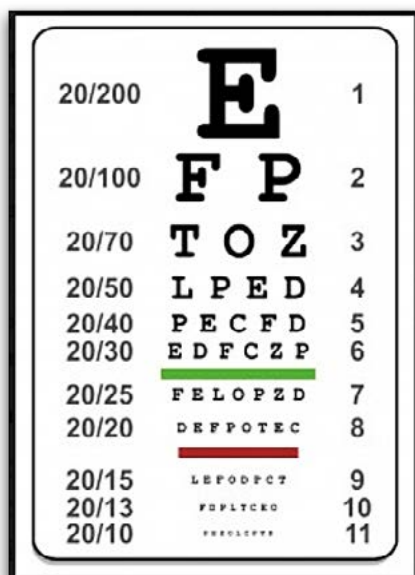
We all understand the concept of 20/20 vision as being able to read the bottom line on a test chart during an eye exam. What very few of us do realise however, is that 20-20 vision – which means essentially normal vision or average vision – is nowhere near a true indication of what the human eye is capable of and is probably not good enough for clay target shooting.

If we look at how visual acuity relates to trap shooting, for example, the target being a disc 108mm in diameter, tilted almost flat and moving away from you at 60km an hour, represents an object much smaller than a 20-20 vision target. Without exception, every truly elite shooter that I have worked with has had visual acuity significantly better than 20-20.

So how do we achieve acuity better than 20-20 vision? Well, the good news is that the answer is actually quite simple, most of us are capable of better than 20/20 vision with a little help in the form of your distance prescription. Now I can hear you all saying, "but my distance vision is fine!!!" Even if you do not need a distance prescription for normal day-to-day activities such as driving, an accurate distance prescription in your shooting

glasses will get your distance visual acuity to its maximum potential and that will probably be better than 20/20.

This image shows a typical Snellen vision chart showing that we can measure vision to well below 20/20.



So many of my shooting patients tell me that their distance vision is fine but “fine” is not always good enough for clay target shooting and most people are astounded at how much better they see the clay with even a mild prescription helping them.

Some world-class shooters will tell you that they look for the ridges on the clay and in good light that is quite possible.

In summary:

I think we can all agree that the better you are able to see the target, the easier it is for the brain to calculate where it is and to guide you to intercept it. The best way to maximise that target clarity is to shoot with prescription glasses even if you do not use glasses for anything else. 20/20 vision is just the average and is probably not good enough to excel at our chosen sport.

Lens tints

There has always been a lot of myth and mystery about which lens tint works best for an individual, and largely it is just a case of personal preference. Shooters should feel free to use whatever tint they like, there is no best tint.

Having said this though, there are a few physiological and scientific factors that are worth considering and there are definitely good and bad options.

Tinted lenses serve two functions, one is to reduce glare, and the other is to improve contrast. As we age, the media within the eye becomes less clear and so it is quite normal to find that in younger shooters with relatively clear eyes, contrast enhancement is not a priority, they are more concerned with glare reduction, and will therefore often prefer darker lenses.

In older shooters (50+) the media within the eye is not as clear and they are therefore most often less concerned with glare reduction and more worried about contrast enhancement.

Which lenses do what?

Darker lenses found in normal sunglasses with neutral colours like grey or brown, have little or no contrast-enhancing function but are very good at reducing glare. The human eye is most sensitive to the longer wavelength yellow light spectrum and is not as good a focusing shorter wavelength blue light.

Lens tints in the yellow and orange spectrum have the property of blocking the short-wavelength blue light, significantly increasing contrast and in so doing improving focus. It is worth considering though, that a plain yellow lens, will sometimes increase glare and therefore is not that popular for shooting.

The orange spectrum lenses offer a combination of glare reduction and contrast enhancement, and therefore it is no surprise that they are still the lenses most often chosen at all levels of shooting.

The new RxS range with the three tint density options, seems to have a particularly good balance of contrast enhancement and glare reduction.

We have all seen, those shooters who have huge cases carrying many different tinted lenses of every imaginable colour and intensity, and really that is fine because the overriding factor when it comes to tint choice is still personal preference. Having said that, I believe in a sport like clay target shooting, you want to eliminate as much indecision as possible, and having to choose between 10 different tint colours every time you shoot, probably adds a degree of uncertainty that we could all do without.

The following image (see next page) is the very popular RE Ranger Edge frame with an example of the contrast enhancing lenses. The lenses are interchangeable, so it is easy to have multiple lens options and one frame.

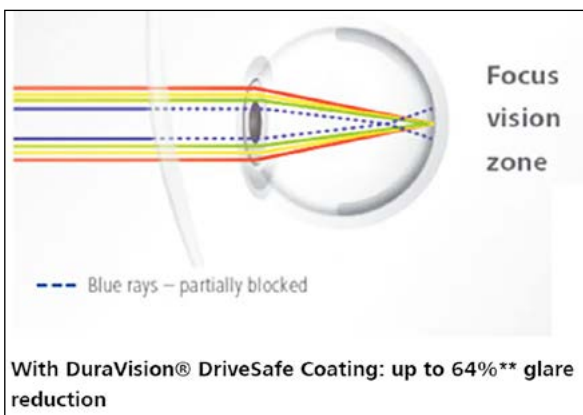
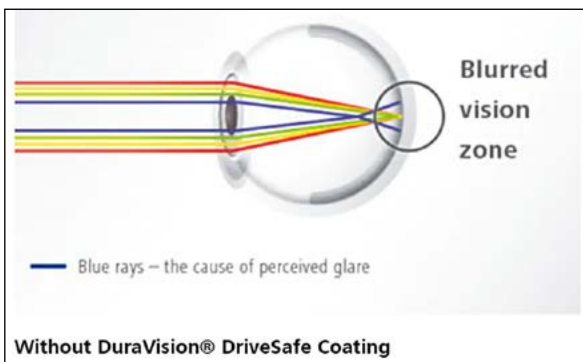


Clear lenses have a light transmission of around 92% while a dark grey lens will only transmit around 12% of the available light. An orange lens like this will transmit around 50% giving a good compromise.

Is there really such a thing as a Night Shooting Lens?

Yes, there is, they work by filtering out blue light and are becoming very popular for night driving. The idea is that artificial light sources like floodlights used at shooting grounds emit a lot of blue light which the eye is not very good at focusing. If we can remove these short wavelength emissions, contrast is improved. Zeiss make a very good night driving lens which I use shooting and find very good. It is probably important to stress here that a night shooting lens with your prescription no matter how small would be much more beneficial.

Below is an extract from the Zeiss website giving some more explanation of how these lenses work.



In Summary:

- Tints serve two functions, reducing glare and improving contrast.

- Younger eyes have no issue with contrast so prefer darker lenses, older eyes have reduced contrast and will prefer contrast-enhancing lighter lenses.
- Lenses that are too dark reduce contrast too much, lenses that are too light increase glare too much. Look for a lens with a combination of the two and go with whatever is most comfortable for you.
- Try to avoid the confusion of too many lens tint options. My advice is to find a colour that you like and perhaps have it in three different densities, light, medium, and dark for different light conditions and always consider having them in your distance prescription.
- There are specific lenses designed for night conditions and they do make a big difference.

Eye Dominance

Eye dominance is a huge topic for shooters and will definitely be covered in much more detail in a separate article but let's understand the basic principles.

Just like we are all right or left-handed, we have a very similar ocular dominance where the brain will prefer to use one eye or the other for detailed concentrated tasks.

For most of us the ocular dominance and handed dominance are symmetrical (i.e. On the same side) but for some the dominance is asymmetrical. This has genuine implications for shooting and especially clay target shooting, where the need for peripheral vision and acquiring a moving target means that ideally, we would shoot with both eyes open. The consequence of cross dominance is that your dominant eye is not your aiming eye, and you end up with a very confusing sight picture and very inconsistent shooting, and in severe cases a complete inability to hit a target with both eyes open.

I think that it is important to introduce the idea that an eye dominance issue may arise from a lack of dominance or a shallow dominance not necessarily cross dominance, but this will be covered in much more detail in a separate article.

There are many different options for shooting with a dominance issue and they include shutting one eye, fully or partially occluding one eye, or using something like an Easy Hit bead to try to reinforce dominance in the aiming eye.

Again see the article on eye dominance for more detail on this.

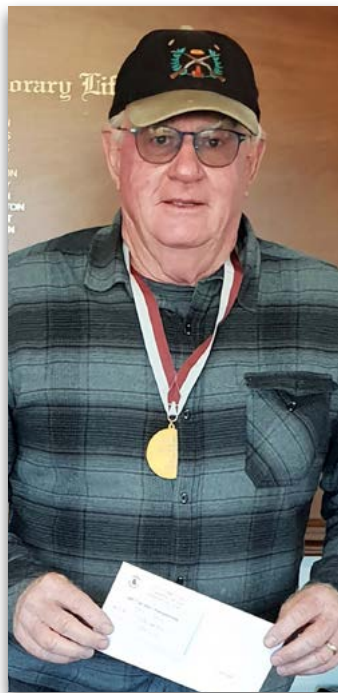

What's happening in the VCTA

You will never guess where Victorian clay target shooters have been for the last three weeks? Well, it hasn't been on the trap layout shooting clay targets!! As the magazine gets ready for production, Victorian Regional members are, at last, looking to slowly emerge from another Covid-19 lockdown.

As many have experienced, for what seems time immemorial, competitions have been cancelled or postponed and the only activity at clubs has been emergency maintenance.

Hopefully, with the increase in vaccine rates, close adherence to the Chief Health Officer's advice and guidelines and a little bit of luck, we will now see a gradual reduction of the restrictions that seem to have had such a huge hold on our social freedoms for such a long time.

History of Skeet and NSSA

Skeet differs from all other shooting sports, because it was originally developed to improve hunting in the field, and only later, because of its growing popularity, developed into a competitive sport.

Its development was actually brought about, because of the industrial revolution sweeping the country during the early 1900s. Rural areas began growing at incredible speed, into large, sprawling, industrial cities.

Hunters were now finding it necessary to travel longer distances in order to find areas in which to hunt. When they finally arrived, they discovered the game was no longer as plentiful as it once was. Not only were hunters having a harder time finding game, but certain species had already been hunted into extinction. One example is the carrier pigeon.

The American sportsman soon began to realize, some form of game conservation would have to be enacted. Eventually, it was, with game seasons, and bag limits, imposed on all hunters. Because of the shortened hunting season, hunters were now finding it harder and harder to get enough practice to become a decent shot. Some hunters turned to trap shooting to fine tune their hunting abilities. However, this was no help because of the lack of incoming and crossing shots.

In 1920, this problem was finally addressed by Charles Davis of Andover, Massachusetts. He was the owner of a dog kennel and an avid hunter. He spent many hours trying to devise a way to improve his field shooting. After trying and discarding many different types of plans he finally settled on an idea based on a field, laid out in a 50 yard circle. He called it "Shooting Around the Clock."

Around the circle, he placed 12 shooting stations, with a single trap, located at station 12. Shooters would fire two shots from each station, and one from the center, equaling a box of shells, or 25 shots. This layout provided almost every type of shot a hunter would encounter in the field.

All went well, until the owner of the adjoining property complained of falling shot on his land. To avoid any future problems, Davis cut his shooting circle in half, and put a second trap at the opposite end of his shooting field. This became the birth of the modern day skeet field.

This hunting practice field became so popular; it soon developed into a popular shooting game. Eventually, it was renamed Skeet, which is the Scandinavian word for Shoot. In 1926, the first National Skeet Championships were held, and shortly after, the National Skeet Shooting Association was formed.

Psychological Skills for Shooting

Paying attention

In a recent article in the Field and Game Magazine, two previous National Champions Chris Brown and Robert Hall are asked, 'What are the most challenging targets?' They both replied that all targets are challenging if you are not paying attention. Michael Yardley, British shooter and psychologist, argues that to achieve great scores you have to focus on the target and nothing else. The July article on Target Acquisition also placed emphasis on attending to the target. One of my earliest articles was on attention, and given its importance as a psychological construct essential for peak performance, together with some research from the net, I am updating what has come before. Our mind has developed a system by which we pick some stimuli or information for further processing while ignoring almost everything else. The system is called *attention*. The website <http://psychology.iresearchnet.com/sports-psychology/perception-in-sport/attention-theory-in-sport/>, is uncredited but defines what attention is, types of attention, how it is measured and the three theories behind attention.

Attention is a term that denotes the process of exerting mental effort on specific features of the world around us or on our thoughts and feelings. Research by cognitive psychologists, have identified three types of attention employed by humans.

Firstly, *concentration* which refers to a person's decision to invest mental effort in what is most important in any situation. For the shooter, this is the target.

Secondly, *selective attention*, is the perceptual ability to zoom in on task-relevant information (the speed and path of the target) while ignoring distractions.

Finally, *divided attention*, refers to a form of mental time-sharing ability whereby people can learn, as a result of extensive practise, to execute two or more concurrent skills equally well.

With respect to measuring attention, I will outline briefly the three main ways. Firstly, the **psychometric approach**. Working memory is used in intelligence tests to measure a person's ability to attend to information as part of solving a problem. Each sport is unique in the sensory information that needs to be attended to for an Ideal Performance State (IPS). Robert Nideffer (a renowned US Sports Psychologist) has developed an applied theory of concentration. To understand this theory it is necessary to realise that for each of us an optimal level of arousal will coincide with efficient use of attentional capacities; this is referred to as our ideal performing state (IPS). At this IPS, we efficiently match the attentional demands of the situation with use of appropriate type of concentration. When we are not at our ideal performing state it is because the types of attentional focus becomes inefficient and mismatched with the situational demands. Nideffer argues that we all have an individual *concentration style*, which means that we have characteristic ways of using our attentional capabilities. Nideffer describes concentration as being either broad or narrow. Nideffer also sees influences on concentration as either external or internal. We can now measure our concentration style in each of these types of concentration:

1. **Broad-External**: awareness of everything that is going on around – seeing, hearing, feeling. This is where good peripheral vision and shooting with both eyes open is important.
2. **Narrow-External**: Ability to concentrate in a focused way, to focus on the one thing, to narrow onto the relevant aspects of a task.

Very useful in target skills and as a way of blocking distractions.

3. **Broad-Internal:** Need to analyse, organise and plan. The ability to mix it with what is going on and draw some logical conclusions. Being able to deal with a large number of ideas at the one time.
4. **Narrow-Internal:** Ability to focus on a single thought or idea and stay with it. Needed to enhance awareness of aspects of body reactions to stress (tight muscles, too high heart rate, etc). Usually indicates extreme dedication and capacity to follow instructions, to stick to a performance plan.

Some of the limitations of Nideffer's theory is that it doesn't distinguish between task-relevant and task-irrelevant information in sporting settings and it examines a person's perceived, rather than their actual, attentional skills. Still this theory and approach has stood the test of time and can still be considered relevant.

Second, is the **neuroscientific approach**, based on cognitive neuroscience, which involves a range of neuroscientific techniques in an effort to reveal which parts of the brain are activated when an athlete is paying attention to a sport-related task. Some of these techniques are electroencephalography (EEG), a method that records electrical activity in the brain using special electrodes placed on the scalp; functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI), a method that detects changes in the activity of the brain by measuring the amount of oxygen brought to a particular location within it; and transcranial magnetic stimulation (TMS), a method in which the functioning of a specific area of the brain is temporarily disrupted through the application of pulsating magnetic fields to the skull using a stimulating coil. The limitations of this model are that it is extremely expensive and rather impractical in every day sports settings. It is useful in those sports where the brain can be measured when the athlete is visualising a performance.

The **experimental approach** looks at dual task paradigm and investigates how well people can divide their attention between two concurrent

tasks like reading and listening to music. This approach is limited because it is difficult locating pairs of attentional tasks that can engage an athlete's interest in a laboratory setting; very difficult for clay target shooters.

Cognitive psychologists have developed three main theories of attention: *filter theory, capacity theory, and spotlight theory*.

Filter theory was the first theory of attention in the 1950s and argued that people were limited in their ability to process information and there must be a mechanism that facilitates selection of some information while inhibiting the selection of competing information. This theory can be discredited by the *cocktail-party syndrome* where even within a noisy room people still managed to pick up on their name if it was mentioned by another person.

Capacity theory or resource theory argues that we have a limited amount of attentional ability. This may explain the difference in performance between being alert and tired or when there is a break in proceedings that leads to a break in concentration.

Spotlight theory argues that our selective attention allows us to zoom in on some aspects of a stimulus while ignoring others. This fits in with Nideffer's theory. The limitations are that it ignores that sometimes we focus on the wrong target, it is concerned mainly with external stimuli and also ignores emotional aspects such as anxiety that can lead to choking.

With the theoretical aspects of attention out of the way, next month I will explore what strategies we can use to improve attention and concentration.

PRESS RELEASE

**Re: 2022 Roman Bounty Shoot
(Formerly the Roman Chariot Shoot)**

Since 2018 and the inception of the series of Car Shoots the program has remained unchanged. The Rules thus ensured that at least 5 shooters from each grade made the final 40 Shoot-Off. This was done deliberately with the Grade winners from each of the 5 Graded events being included.

However, in 2021 the management had to use the Double Rise Grading rules to fill the spots from that event. This resulted in these grade spots being filled by what were 4 - AA Grade DTL shooters, reducing the minor grades representation in the final. This happened due to no fault of these shooters, and some were even uncomfortable with taking their spot.

The unintended effects of the introduction of the Double Rise Grading Rule is very unpopular, with many minor grade shooters now saying they will not enter Double Rise events in the future. This will see Double Rise being removed from programs across Australia as club managements do what is best for their club.

Management believes this was really a case of fixing something that was not broken.

The management see this as unacceptable and has decided as follows:

Whilst the current Double Rise Grading Rule remains in place, the Double Rise event will be removed from the program and replaced with a 30 target Continental Points event, restoring balance to the makeup of the top 40 Shoot Off.
