

THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK


Australia's success in regaining the Mackintosh International Trophy for 1949 and with it premier Empire honours in the international clay pigeon shooting field, is the paramount interest of the moment. The news of our Australian team's success has been warmly received throughout the Commonwealth, and from all accounts equally well received in Great Britain. An extract from a recent letter

from the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association would appear to amply bear out this claim, which reads, "The very fine score put up by the Australian team was received by all the countries present with the greatest acclamation, and although you will probably hear from individual Associations, I was asked to send you and all the Australian shooters who took part the warmest congratulations of the clay pigeon shooting fraternity in Great Britain and Ireland. Although the English



team were naturally sorry to lose the Mackintosh Trophy, they were also delighted to acknowledge Australia's success. The Mackintosh Trophy was presented by Lady Garnet Wilson at the dinner given by the Scottish Clay Pigeon Association at Dundee, after the International match, and was accepted on your behalf by Mr. J. Donald Miller, a well-known member of the S.C.P.A."

As is now known, Australia won with a net score of 1,374 points from England 1,336, then Scotland 1,321,





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U.S.A. SHOOTING

By Rex Miles (Washington, U.S.A.).

"Hearty congratulations to the Australian Transhooting Team on its victory in the International Match. Your boys are on the way up. As you say, they even may be stiff competition for our shooters-but they are going to have to break a lot of targets. If they would only get going on the 'One shot at a bird.' it would improve their ability to bust 'em. Your Deauville Doubles is still a two shot, and in case a target is broken with the first shot, they can even shoot three times at the second target: this is according to the rules you sent me. (Mr. Miles asked for information on our Deauville Doubles conditions .- Ed.) It is, no doubt, a lot of fun, and with shortness of supplies in your country, should stretch out the fun. We have what we call a 'protection race.' Ten shooters enter each event. The numbers (five red and five black) are placed in a hat, the shooters then draw for partners. Number 1 red, number 1 black are partners, 2 red and 2 black, and so on. They line up 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, red, and 1. 2. 3. 4. 5 black. They start from 18 yards. Red 1 loads his gun, so does his partner, black 1, shoots, and if he breaks his birds it is scored dead; if they both miss they are out. Or if red 1 should not break his bird. then his partner (black 1) shoots. they are out and the target is scored 'lost.' They take their turns shooting: when number 1 black calls 'pull.' number 1 red protects him should he miss, and so on. After all ten have shot from 18 vards, all those left in step back two vards (to 20 vards); they do this until one set of partners are left, and, of course, are the winners. It is strictly a 'miss and out event.' These events are just 'play' events, and, of course, never shot for trophies or championships. As you will note, a top-notch shooter may draw a 'dub shooter' for a partner, or a topnotcher a top-notcher, or a 'dub' shooter a 'dub.'"



Dear Mr. Editor,

As my name suggests, I am only a beginner at clay bird shooting; however, I beg a little of your space to express an opinion on the behaviour of certain shooters who appear to have little or no regard for their fellow shooters and a complete disregard of their own dignity. Going the rounds of the various clubs, I have found myself associated with a very fine body of men and sportsmen, and

this only serves to highlight those whose behaviour I find objectionable.

To those who feel some pangs of resentment, I would say there must be some tinge of guilt; in defence I can only suggest that the number of shooters who feel as I do have prompted me to write this letter.

Clay bird shooting is a gentleman's sport, and has no room for people who do not subscribe to these sentiments, and it is very disappointing to find that when you take your family to a shooters' gathering they may be subject to profamity or may have to witness the larrikin-like behaviour of men who should know better. (Both of these incidents occurred quite recently at one shoot.) We younger shooters feel that the men who are the fathers of clay bird who are the fathers of clay bird shooting can teach us quite a lot about both shooting and conduct on the traps; fortunately, the majority of them do; however, a small minority, lacking in the social graces and good manners, seem to feel that when visiting a country shoot one must be objectionable to impress.

The A.C.P.T.S.A. has made rules and regulations to govern this, our sport, and common decency compels us to guard them as such, and I say to those who may feel somewhat guilty that we look to you to keep this sport above reproach and free of any vestige of larrikinism. I hope this appeal will not go unheeded.


Goulburn Club (N.S.W.) will hold a £55 handicap on August 13. Sid Lamb, Secretary, will reply to all enquiries.

liminary to the Commonwealth walkup championship listed for September 3.



Gun Gossip



Why is it that some men feel happier when shooting with a singlebarrel or the narrower plane of an over-and-under, or one of the repeating or automatic weapons? A local shooter writes that he started his shooting with a 12-bore single, and. while he often wished that he could get in the second shot, he shot very well with it. Then he bought his present gun, a double hammerless. and he found he could shoot fairly well, but not up to the required standard. Recently a friend lent him his 16 bore automatic, and with this gun he has made some wonderful bags and has also done well at clavs. All the same, he admits that the gun lacks a bit of range and is very heavy. He wishes to know how it is that, in spite of these two drawbacks, he has managed to be more successful than with his double.


Now, this is a difficult question. If it were just a matter of clay shooting, I should say that the narrow sighting plane is an advantage in this sport. Many of the best shots use over-andunders here, finding that they can centre their charge more accurately on the thin saucer-like edge of the inanimate target — a small mark in comparison with the average game. Still. in ga: e shooting, some men prefer the narrow sighting plane. It is as well to remember that not everyone shoots with both eyes open. I believe the majority do keep both eyes open, and I am not trying to suggest that the single sighting plane type is merely a weapon which appeals to the shooter who closes the left eye.

If a man begins to shoot with a single barrel, closes the left eye and does not graduate to a double for some years, it is not inconceivable that he should find that use of a double (side-by-side) a little less easy to shoot with for a time. This difficulty should right itself, however, in due course, unless the user is really one of those who seem to require the narrow plane to be at his best. My advice to all such is to procure an under-and-over rather than any kind of repeating or automatic firearm.

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The Grosvenor Corner

(BY THE LATE MR. W. P. GROSVENOR)

This month's extract from the correspondence of the late Mr. W. P. Grosvenor commences a short series of stories which he headed, "We do meet 'em." Mr. Grosvenor goes on.

"All shooting men are sure to have. "All shooting men are sure to have, at some time or another, run across strange experiences. It is the custom here, when strangers wander in, to ask them if they would care to try a few shots, in the hope that we may get hold of some fresh blood to swell our membership.

"It does not always come off, and "It does not always come off, and I remember an incident or two that were rather amusing. When the old North London Gun Club held its opening meeting in 1910, the lay-out consisted of a small trench, with three Eley Traps. The earthen bank protecting the trapper was not very

high, but sufficiently so to protect him and hide the barrels of clay pigeons which, in those days, contained 500. Well, the inevitable on-lookers turned up in force and during the lull between events the club capthe full between events the club cap-tain asked if any of the visitors would like to try their hands and fire a shot or two. One man accepted and so as to make it as easy as possible, he was placed right up behind the trench and told to call "Pull" and then fire. This he did. "Pull" and then hre. This he did. However, in his excitement, he pulled the trigger immediately he called "Pull" and the gun, not yet raised, went off and put the charge into an unopened barrel of 500 clay pigeons and smashed the lot, thus making an unbeatable score — to the horror of the club members. It was not so expensive then as it would be now. as clays at that time were 22/6 a barrel of 500."
