



THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

With the approach of autumn, the mind of the clay pigeon shooter begins to visualise the bigger events of the shooting season, that is the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) and the Fourth International Teams' Match against England, Scotland Ireland and Wales. These events are listed for March 11 and 13. The first-named contest will be staged at 60

clay pigeons from the International mark of 16 yards, using 2½-in. shells containing the regulation International load. The International Match, which is now one of the highlights of the clay pigeon shooting season in Australia, is shot at 100 birds per man from 16 yards with the same type shells. As will be remembered, Australia was successful in winning the International in 1949 for the first time—all team members will again strive to retain the honour for the Commonwealth.



At the International Committee conference in London recently it was decided to change the "score to count" condition from best 15 scores to count to "18 scores to count," thereby only two lowest scores will be counted out, instead of five as in the previous contests.

Another important feature which should be carefully noted by intending competitors is the hour of starting the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship). As will be noted from the printed detailed programme, the starting time is listed for 8.30 a.m. The Executive Committee will decide at its February meeting the "dead-line" for the receipt of entries. The time decided upon will be announced in the next issue of this publication, and intending competitors are reminded that it will necessarily be strictly adhered to.

An important development is expected to be announced in the immediate future regarding the furthering of the Association's activities. Many Executive officials and responsible shooters, both in Victoria and other States, feel that in view of the growth of the sport and the Association's extension that the present is the opportune time to introduce State or Zone Councils for the purpose of conducting local administration and supervision. The idea has been well received in all parts of the Commonwealth, and already the scheme is being handled in the preliminary stages. The U.S.A. system is likely to be adopted as a basis. More of this will be published later.

ASSOCIATION DIRECTION.

Last year affiliated clubs were informed by circular that one-hand or pistol fashion holding the gun was prohibited. A further direction in this regard is now issued, and clubs are instructed that "one-hand or pistol style" handling of the gun, either in competition or otherwise, is barred absolutely and completely. Clubs are required to observe this instruction carefully.

Deauville Doubles .- As you know, in recent months we have witnessed some very excellent shooting in the above type of event, and if my memory is correct, winning scores have been in the vicinity of 50, 60 and 70 pairs. Undoubtedly this is very interesting for the combinations concerned, and up to a point holds most shooters' interest, but I am sure these very prolonged shoots-off do become boring to the average shooter after, say, 30 or 40 pairs have been disposed of. One of the reasons for the post-war increase in attendances at the very popular sport of clay bird shooting is the number of shots each shooter can have during an afternoon, and some very excellent shooting in the is the number of shots each shooter can have during an afternoon, and obviously long Deauville Doubles events do reduce the amount of shooting per individual. With this thought in mind, the Australian Clay Target Club recently ran a Deauville Doubles event in the following manner: 10 pairs Deauville Doubles off 16 yards, with partners drawn for, a 12/15 yarder with a 16 yarder back. The method of shooting was as per Mr. J. M. Scott's system, which was advanced in Association Shooting "News", i.e., at the first five pairs shooter "A" used double-barrel and shooter "B" single-barrel only. For the second round of five birds shooter "B" used double-barrel and shooter "B" used double-barrel and shooter "B" used double-barrel and shooter "A" single-barrel. single-barrel.

The event was very well received by shooters present, and although it may have been coincidence, no shoot off was necessary. Of approximately 20 pairs who entered, only one 10/10 score was recorded. It is fully realised that shooting in the normal way with each shooter having both barrels, that a first-class combination may shoot 50 pairs straight using first barrel only. However, I consider the psychological effect of single-barrel for portion of the shoot would make a difference and reduce shoots-off to a minimum.

The above is purely a personal opinion and in no way intended as a criticism of club methods, but

perhaps other shooters would like to comment on the subject.

Dear Mr. McCullough.

I have now returned from my trip to Scotland and will endeavour to write vou a short article on grouse shooting. Although I was born and reared in the middle of the grouse country, the grouse I shot were all poached, and I shot plenty of them. In fact, had I lived 80 years easlier, I feel sure I would have had a free trip to Australia! Even to this day grouse poaching is not looked on as a light offence.

It costs a lot to rent a grouse moor for the shooting season. Twenty-five years ago it would run at about £1 per bird. This is if you expected to get 2,000 birds off the moor, the rental would be about £2,000. Of course, the use of the Lodge would go with it - this is usually a castle or a huge building built on the lines of a castle, with numerous turrets and battlements. There are also outbuildings to house cars, servants and dogs. These Lodges are usually taken by Englishmen for the season, who employ local "Ghillies" to do all the fetching and carrying necessary when shooting over trackless moors where there are no roads of any kind.

A tale is told about this: a travelling menagerie was going through the district and the baboon escaped from his cage one night and wandered out on to the moors and perished from the cold. Two local "Ghillies", McWilson and McCullough, were coming over the moor in the morning and came on the dead beast. They had never seen anything just like it on the moors and they just stood spellbound for a few minutes gazing at the corpse. Then McWilson found his tongue,

"Weel, he's no a McWilson he hasna got the red hair." "No," replied his mate, "and he's no a McCullough he basna got the lang chin. Gang up to the Lodge, Jock, and see if there are any Englishmen missing."

The 12th of August in Scotland is like the 11th and 13th of March at East Burwood. All you can hear is guns all day. For the first month you tramp the moors shooting over dogs. The birds usually hide in the heather until you are right on them, then get up with a great flurry and fly very fast. After a few weeks the birds get very wary and then they are shot at the butts. The butt is a hole in the ground with some tarf around the top to hide the shooter standing inside. They are usually about 100 yards apart. The beaters go out in a wide arc and drive the birds towards the butts. This shooting takes more skill, as the birds fly fast and low. After about two months the shooters find their way back to the northern cities and the grouse are left to the mercy of the poachers for the rest of the year. There is a very strict etiquette to be observed by all shooters. They must avoid shooting at birds nearer other shooters, or at one that is too near or too far from them. Any luck must be shared by all. Boasting is forbidden; excuses for bad shooting should never be made. Coming from poor marksmen, they sound absurd, and from a good shoot unnecessary. Grouse is a delicacy much in demand in Mayfair and Paris.

Wishing you and all shooters all the best for 1950; will see you in March.

Ten Years Ago...

Early in January, 1940, Harry Ball (Kew) outstaved J. Bryant to win the Nobel Club's single-barrel title for that year. This was shot on the Bentleigh grounds. The pair had two tie shoots before Ball was equal to defeating his rival by one target. Bryant was later in good form to win the Metropolitan Deauville Doubles title when partnered by "Dubbs". Over the original course of the event they had tied with H. Ogg-D. McKimmie, and G. Daniels-W. Bloomfield. This contest was staged on the old Blackburn grounds. Bryant and "Dubbs" had. a few days previously, motored to Sydney to compete in the N.S.W. double-barrel title at Hornsby. "Dubbs" was runner-up in that event to W. Lawler, of Bowral. The latter now resides in Queensland.

Melbourne's Hotel Australia was the venue on December 21 last of a dinner in honour of staff retiring after long service with Imperial Chemical Industries Australia & New Zealand Ltd. Loch Finlay (Sales Manager) and Fred Byers (Australian Club's asst. secretary and former Nobel club secretary) have been good enough to forward a menu card, the first cover leaf of which displays the names of those honoured by the world-renowned company. Scanning through the list of some 15 names, we notice the following: Messrs. L. P. Hughes (Sydney), Harold F. Poole (Melbourne), C. M. Snape (Sydney), and last but by no stretch of figuring of least importance, none other than that great Australian—in every sense of the word—"Calrossie", or Jack W. Sutherland. The dinner was a great affair, but at the same time it was tinged to some extent with a sadness that so many of those who have done so much to establish the Company's high standing in the Southern Hemisphere were "signing"

Mr. Harold Poole, for many years Australian Sales Manager of the Company, was another with the typical thoroughness which the Company has always aimed for and has so distinctively secured. The assistance and advice given by Mr. Poole, "Calrossie" and Luke Hughes to the A.C.P.T.S.A. in the early days of its formation and building up will be long remembered by those privileged to have had the experience of their co-operation. So much has the Company valued, and still does value, the advice of these great sportsmen that, although officially retired, each has his desk retained in its respective appointed place so they may "just drop in when feeling like it." It appears that two shooters, newcomers to the sport, surprised by returning possible scores of ten straight at single-barrel in the particular event under review. Apparently they were so surprised by their prowess at finishing in front of a field of shooters which included Internationals, that when it came to the tie shoot, both were so overcome by the occasion that the shoot-off went six rounds before either of the finalists hit a bird! The winner returning the score of 11/16, ten of which he broke straight in the original ten rounds of the event. The club also tried out the J. M. Scott method of shooting Deauville Doubles. The idea is worth cultivating. The try-out was spoiled by many contestants failing to properly observe the conditions. When all understand the scheme better, another attempt will be made at establishment.

A new club is in process of formation at Mittagong (N.S.W.). This area is in the Bowral-Mittagong portion of New South Wales and should assist to provide competitors to both Bowral and the new club. W. J. McDonald is sponsor.

Gladstone Diggers' Club (Qld.) has secured an automatic trap, and is now ready to stage major cham-

It is not often that a shooter, at his first attempt, wins a champion-ship event and runs up a first class break string at the same time.
