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

# THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Club secretaries, and contributors to this publication generally, are advised to take particular note of the "dead-line" date for the receipt of copy for inclusion in any particular month. As stated in the front page in each issue, the final date for receiving copy is 30th of month preceding issue. Many are inclined to take this literally and leave everything, including handicap returns and recom-

dicap returns and recommendations, so that these will arrive on the 30th of the month or even up to the 1st and 2nd of the month of issue. This procedure, of course, simply means that many handicaps and other items have to be carried over to the following issue, making the copy, in some instances, almost out of date. If those forwarding copy can possibly get it prepared earlier, it is most advisable that it should be posted without delay. It will be understood that the Association's limited staff cannot possibly hope to cope with



all copy when it is left to the final "dead-line" date. A "dead-line" should be regarded only as an absolute final for urgent matter, not a date merely when "all" copy should be despatched. The earlier the copy comes to hand, the more time is available to deal with it and, if necessary, enlarge upon it. For instance, the receipt of club advertising copy about the middle of the month allows for a special paragraph in "Tips and Tails" or elsewhere. If left to the final "dead-line" date, such advertising copy

#### English Open Skeet Championship

For the first time since its inception (in 1934) the Clay Pigeon Shooting Association's Open Skeet Championship has been won by an overseas competitor, Captain W. B. Marriott, of Alabama, U.S.A., who is serving with the United States Air Force in England. The meeting, the ninth in the series, was held at Snitterfield Aerodrome, Stratford-upon-Avon, on Friday and Saturday, May 5 and 6, when weather conditions were far from ideal: cold and windy on both days, with heavy rain on the Saturday.

The Championship was shot over six rounds of skeet, one from each of the three lay-outs on each day (total, 120 birds), and the five highest scorers contested the final round, making an aggregate of 140. There were 59 entries on the first day and 68 on the second.

Two possibles (20 out of 20) were returned on the first day, one by Captain Marriott and the other by J. Wheater (Beverley), the holder. The leading scorers after the first 60 birds were: W. B. Marriott (58); J. Wheater and W. S. Lawson (56); S. T. Rimmer (54); C. Lucas and P. Stanbury (53); F. T. Moore and D. R. Nielsen (52).

Saturday's highest scorer was T. E. Sanders (Liverpool), who scored 54 out of 60, closely followed by F. T. Moore (53); S. T. Rimmer (52); W. B. Marriott and J. Wheater (51); W. S. Lawson and F. Garlick (49).

A large gathering of spectators watched the leaders shoot their final round, in which Captain Marriott secured a further possible, bringing his score to 129 out of 140, to win the Lord Chesham Cup. The scores of the other finalists, with their aggregate scores and final positions were: 2nd, J. Wheater (18), 125; 3rd, S. T. Rimmer (17), 123; 4th, F. T. Moore (17), 122; 5th, W. S. Lawson (16), 121.

The prizes were presented on the field at the end of the meeting by Mrs. W. B. Marriott, the wife of the new skeet champion,

## A few hints on the Shot Gun for beginners

By Capt. F. J. ALLEN

I expect a good many of the younger generation are interested in shooting with the shotgun. If so, perhaps a few hints from an old hand may be useful to them. Many of the young men of today have come back from military service and have had few chances of becoming good game shots.

First of all I would warn them about buying a gun. All guns are now very high-priced, so it is essennow very high-priced, so it is essential to get the best value they possibly can. They may buy a gun made by any of the well-known makers and give a lot of money for it, and then find that they shoot badly with it, for it is not the price given for the gun which makes a good shot. I strongly advise them to go to one of the gun makers who have a good school for trying and fitting guns. This can be done at a very reasonable price, and will make all the difference to their shooting, even if they are already fairly good shots. Some years ago a friend showed me a very nice high-priced gun which he had bought and asked me to try it out at clay pigeons. On picking up the gun I told him I did not think I could shoot with it, as it did not fit me at all well. He said: "If you are a good shot, you ought to shoot with this, as it is one of the best you can buy." I tried it out on some clay pigeons and only smashed two out of twenty. So he offered to shoot a match with me for £10. I said I would take him on if I shot I strongly advise them to go to one snoot a match with me for £10. I said I would take him on if I shot with my own gun, which I had been fitted for and which cost me about £12. A few days later I took my gun and smashed inneteen out of twenty and won his £10.

Gun shooting is very different to shooting with a rifle. You have not time to take careful aim along the barrel through sights as with the rifle; in fact, the gun should come up on the object shot at without aiming along the barrel at all, which it will do if it has been properly fitted. There have been a lot of letters to the sporting Press about letters to the sporting Press about aiming ahead of birds crossing at of Australian C.T. Club, at East Burwood, right-angles or thereabouts, so I do

not want to say anything very defi-nite about this, but in my opinion it all depends on swing. Personally I do not aim in front of any bird, and I think it all depends if, when and I think it all depends if, when you have swung on to the bird, you stop for a second or two and press the trigger, or (which I do) swing on to the head of the bird and press the trigger whilst you are still swinging. Just to pop up the gun and take an aim feet or even yards in front is, in my opinion, fatal to good shooting. A fast bird coming straight towards you low down is very often missed; here, again, I find that to swing on to the head and keep swinging until the bird just disappears under the barrels and pull when still swinging is the best way for this difficult shot.

For a left-handed shot it is most essential to be fitted for the gun, as nearly all guns are made for right-handed men.

Snipe, for instance, should be shot at as soon as they get up, or wait until they get a good distance away and have finished their twisty flight. Rabbits, especially when bolted from their burrows in south places require grap shoat.

their twisty flight. Rabbits, especially when bolted from their burrows in rough places, require snap shooting. You often have to shoot where you think they are going, as you can hardly see them.

Before finishing this little lecture for the young, I should like to give a few warnings about carrying a gun. Please do not carry it in the crook of the arm, with the muzzle raking all your neighbours' right and left, and when carrying it on the shoulder, keep the trigger-guard upwards so that the slope of the barrel points upwards, not downwards, where it is likely to blow somebody's head off. You cannot beat carrying it with the barrels pointing to the ground, a few feet in front of you; in this position it is quite safe and can be very quickly got to the shoulder. When getting through a hedge or over a fence, it is best to unload and not trust to the safety-catch being at safe. Although I once saw a young fellow, who has since become champion clay-pigeon shot for Suffolk, getting over a post and rail fence, and just as he was on the top, with one leg on each side, a covey of partridges came over. He cocked his gun while on top of the fence and killed a brace. Some shot!

I feel sure that your boys will develop into top-notch trapshots if they will only stick to the one shot at a bird. Besides, when they attend a shoot they know just how many shells (cartridges) they will need for a programme. As to these two shots, well, a mediocre shooter would use almost two shells for a bird, the economic feature is a strong argument in favour of it, too.

June and hope to pick another date in September. The Roma boys set out for the St. George shoot over the last week-end in June. Some of them reached St. George — others didn't have such a clear run. In fact, information is to hand that a number found themselves hopelessly bogged about midnight with no option but to "curl up in the cars until daylight." These sportsmen have the sympathy of all Southerners — we know just how it can rain in the Northern State and how unfortunate it should be that it always seems to happen when a shoot is listed.

B. G. S. (Bill) Schooley, of Clara Creek Club (Q.), who shot his way into the 1950 Australian International team, has sent along his cheque for ten guineas as his life registration fee with the A.C.P.T.S.A. Bill sends his "kindest regards to March acquaintances and yourself." (Many thanks, Bill, your regards are heartily reciprocated.—Ed.)

Vic. Howard (Bathurst secretary), who frequently graces these columns with his wittily penned lines, is again in form for the current issue. However, it might be mentioned that these comments were intended by Vic for the June issue, but they arrived on July 3, nearly four days late for that month's inclusion. Vic says: "At last it has happened, Yessir, this club actually acquired some clay birds. Only 500, but it proves that some DO come to N.S.W. Of course, those good birds have already received treatment and now repose

on the slopes of Mt. Panorama. The boys had been on the chain for several months, scores suffered from both weather and lack of shooting. The club is still as strong as ever, but no club can stage shoots without supplies. The club anticipates big events in the spring if clay birds become available by then." Vic then adds: "The two-day drought broke again here yesterday (late June) and the West is flooded again (or still). Haven't seen the sun since early May, and Bathurst, which is famous for frosts, has only had two this winter and they were lollipops."

Roy Johns continued to show his prowess under double-rise conditions when he gained a clear-cut win in the Footscray Club's double-rise championship on July 1. He is expected to try himself out at Townsville this month seeking Commonwealth Double - rise honours, which that club will shoot on 12 and 13. Roy is probably one of Australia's best all-round shots, although he will never admit to this title.

The Australian Club anticipated about 50 shooters on the windy day, July 1, but drew no less than 80 shooters. The day produced most interesting shooting, and in the two down-the-line events, no less than 34 possibles. Frank Brown staged a splendid return to form by winning the main event, 39/40 (a ten birder); "Dick" was runner-up, 38/40. "Dick" is developing into one of our most interesting marathon shoots-off expert. Almost every week-end in recent months he has been engaged in long, drawn out struggles.

The battles between Bill Wager and "Dick" are now a highlight of any shoot; at the moment of writing they are all square—two all. Les Turner and son Don were unexpectedly drawn together in a Deauville Doubles contest at the same ground in a drawn for partners and gun-off-shoulder contest, and they duly completed the sequence by winning



Entrance fee for Championship 20/-, with optional sweep, 10/-, to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent, of the sweep money received without deduction. The club management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd, The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered the optional sweep.

#### District Championships:

No. 15: The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay pigeons from 16 yards rise. Clay pigeons to be thrown as per Rule 13, A.C.P.T.S.A. Handbook,

Sections 5-(a), (b) and (c). Two harrels are permitted and either barrel shall be of equal scoring value and shall score one point. Each competitor to shoot from the centre track at three to five clay pigeons at each visit. The number may be decided by the club's management conducting the championship (in hot weather it is advisable to shoot at three clay pigeons). The management shall provide three trophies - 1st. 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 20/-, with optional sweep as may be decided by the club management, and shall be divided as follows: First 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent, of sweep money received without any deduction. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay pigeons until finality. management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

No. 16: The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay pigeons from 16 yards rise. Clay pigeons to be thrown as rer Rule 13, A.C.P.T.S.A. Handbook, Sections 5-(a), (b) and (c); one barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from the centre track at three to five clay pigeons at each visit. This may be decided by the club's management conducting the Championship. (In hot weather it is advisable to shoot three clay pigeons). The management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 20/-, with an optional sweep as may be decided by the club management, and shall be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received without any deduction. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay pigeons until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those competitors who have entered for the optional sween.

No. 17: The Championship shall be shot at five clay pigeons from 16 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score as one point. Five clay pigeons from 16 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay

pigeons, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 vards mark. The competitor advances at an ordinary walking pace — to shuffle or walk slowly is a "no bird." The clay pigeon is released between 20 and 15 yards, and the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator, or dice arrangement, and is determined each bird the competitor is to shoot at. Five pairs of double rise clay pigeons from 16 yards rise, only pairs to score and count as one, making possible total 20 points. In the event of ties to be shot at two double barrel, two single barrel, two walk-up, and two pair double rise, total eight roints, until finality. Entrance fee 20/- for Championship, with optional sweep of 10/-, optional sweep to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received without deduction. The club management to provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

No. 18: The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay pigeons, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. When ready in this position he commences and continues to walk at a normal walking pace. To walk slowly or shuffle constitutes a "no bird." The puller will release the pigeon between the 20 and 15 yards mark, the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being pre-determined by an indicator or dice The competitor will arrangement. shoot at three to five birds at each visit. The club's management conducting the championship will decide the number of birds at each visit (in hot weather it is advisable to shoot at three clay pigeons). Each competitor shoots from centre track. Entrance fee to Championship 20/-, with an optional sweep of 10/- which will be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received without deduction. The management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay pigeons until

finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

No. 19: The Championship shall be shot at 12 pairs of clay pigeons from 16 yards rise, and shall be thrown as per A.C.P.T.S.A. Rule 16, Section (2). Each competitor to shoot at three pairs at each visit, pairs only to score, and count as one point. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of three pairs until finality. The management of club conducting Championship shall provide three trophies-1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 20/-, with optional sweep of 10/-, to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received without deduction. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sween.

No. 20 (Deauville Doubles): The Championship shall be shot from 16 yards rise at 20 pairs of doubles. The competitors shall stand on two and four tracks, 20 feet apart. The competitors can arrange between themselves which track they will take and who shall call for the release of the clay pigeons. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs shall count, and as one point. Either shooter can help his partner after he has broken his clay pigeons. In the event of a misfire by either gun another clay pigeon or pigeons will not be given that competitor and he is required to abide by the result. Each two competitors will shoot at five pairs at each visit. Entrance fee for Championship 20/- for each competitor, with 10/- for each competitor as optional sweep, to be divided 60 per cent. first pair, 30 per cent. second pair, 10 per cent. third pair from money received without deduction. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets each pair that have entered the optional sweep. The management shall provide four trophies - two for 1st and two for 2nd.

No. 21 (Skeet): The Championship shall be shot at a full round of Skeet using seven stations, latest English conditions of ground layout and angles at which clay pigeons are thrown, 14 single rise clay pigeons,

one cartridge only to be placed in gun; three pairs of doubles from stations two, four and six, silent rise. In the event of ties a round of seven single barrels and two pair double rise from stations two and six. The shooter will call for his bird when ready to shoot. Entrance fee for Championship, 20/-, with optional sweep, 10/-, to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of the sweep money received without deduction. The club management shall provide three trophies—1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered the optional sweep.

In all competitions under walk-up conditions, the competitor may carry the gun in any position consistent with safety.

#### TOWER CHAMPIONSHIPS

No. 22-Commonwealth: To be shot at 25 clay pigeons from a centre track, five yards directly in front of centre of Tower—five clay pigeons to be shot on each visit to the track. Normal setting of trap, clay pigeons to be thrown at usual angles. Two barrels permitted, and each barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score one point. Ties to be shot off at five clay pigeons until finality. Competitors must not turn towards the Tower and must face directly to the front throughout the competition. Entrance fee for Championship, 25/-, with an optional sweepstake of 10/-, to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweepstake money received, without deduction. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

No. 23—State: To be shot at 20 clay pigeons from three shooting marks, each five yards apart and five yards from the Tower. Entrance fee for Championship, 20/-, thence same conditions as Championship Condition No. 22.

No. 24—District: Same conditions and entrance fee in Championship Condition No. 23.
