



AUSTRALIA WINS INTERNATIONAL

Just prior to going to press, the following cable was received from Dublin (Ireland): "England 1398, Scotland 1360, Ireland, 1339, Wales 1329. Heartiest congratulations from all over here. I.C.P.S.A. Dublin."

Obviously the cable indicates that Australia has won the 1951 International series for the second time. The Australian Team total of 1443 allows for Australia to have a winning margin of

45 points. Altogether a very pleasing and heart-warming achievement.

When the Australian combination was announced at East Burwood and faced up to its marathon task of 100 targets per man on March 12 last, there were many who agreed that the 1951 complement to represent Australia was "the best yet". Results have rather confirmed this survey. Approving congratulations are extended to every member of the team for a splendid effort and richly deserved success. Whilst complimenting the team—and it should be remembered that the group represented Australia and were not shooting as individuals — the remarkable performance of Newton Thomas with his high-gun 100 straight is again a matter for congratulation to that team member. Thomas is the first Australian to record 100 straight in the International. Those who have shot in this "wearing down" contest realise just how much concentration is needed to secure this result. E. G. Biggs, the 1951 National Champion and holder of the Champion of Champions Cup, with his 99/100, is also entitled to commendation. Biggs was somewhat unfortunate in meeting Thomas in such devastating form -it being recalled that Biggs's 99 was the first occasion on which 99/ 100 has been recorded for Australia. Up to 1951 the best high-gun for Australia was 98/100. The 1951 Australian average for the first 15 scores to count was 96.2, which, as



far as is known, is a record average since the inauguration of the International series in Great Britain.

Undoubtedly Australian form at clay pigeons has advanced greatly since 1939, when this country first essayed to "cross swords" with our sporting kinsmen in Great Britain with displays such as provided by the winning 1951 Australian Team, it may be, that in the not far distant future, a challenge or two may be suggested to our grand and helpful friends in the U.S.A.

(Detailed scores of Australian Team appeared in the June issue of this publication. Information on individual scores recorded by Great Britain teams will be published immediately on receipt, probably in the August issue).

Apropos of a recent commentary in this column on the possibility of single-barrel shooting becoming a regular feature of Association shoots and possibly club shoots of the future, the proposal has brought forth numerous reactions from various parts of the Commonwealth, all of which appear to incline favourably to single-barrel shooting throughout both Association and club competitions. A New South Wales senior club official vigorously warmed up to the point, and his comment provides a pen picture of an opinion seemingly held in a good many

quarters. The official writes, "Paragraph in the 'News', Vol. 4. No. 9. June, 1951, or perhaps I should say half column relating to single-barrel conditions, gave me a real kick. Have advocated this type of shooting for a long time, as I think it really tends to keep one on their toes, especially knowing there is no second chance. Have also noticed poor scores in single events, as compared with double shooting, but this may be due to carelessness in some measure forced by the knowledge of having another barrel, but I think the boys will settle down after a little time on forced single events and no doubt finish with scores better than ever before. The high cost of ammunition and clays makes this type of shooting even more desirable, not to mention the added advantage of being able to use a single-barrel single-shot gun. This being the case, it is possible more young people will be drawn to the sport, as a single gun can be bought at a reasonable figure. so owning a gun will not be half so expensive as previously. It is to be hoped some enterprising English firm will now turn out a singlebarrel gun, hammerless and everything else modern, especially made for trap shooting, plain finish and not too expensive. In conclusion I hope A.C.P.T.S.A. and all member clubs give single-barrel shooting deep consideration."

The foregoing is a much appreciated comment and will be of great assistance to the A.C.P.T.S.A. Executive in formulating future policy.

Shooters are reminded that this publication is their forum and its columns are always open to fair and reasonable comment, and if so desired, constructive criticism. Shooters with any point they wish ventilated should not hesitate to write to this journal — any such efforts need not be attempts of literary masterpiece, but at the same time the question of brevity should not be overlooked. Items to the point briefly are certain to receive priority over rambling contributions when it comes to selection for inclusion.

A number of shooters have been removed from the official mailing list

as from the current issue of this publication. The reason for this is that those referred to have omitted to remit 1951 registration fees. Unfinancial and unregistered shooters cannot be permitted to attain the same rights and privileges as those who ensure that their dues have been paid. Quite apart from being irregular and contrary to Association rules to include unregistered shooters, the present-day costs of production are so much in advance of initial production figures that it is imperative to retain only those shooters who are sufficiently interested to maintain payments within reasonable limits of time. It is pointed out that in 1952 unregistered shooters will be removed from the official lists not later than March.



Ten Years Ago . . .

Jim Smith, of Home Hill (Qld.) on one of his first visits to a Melbourne shooting ground in July, 1941, was under notice with an outright win 20 straight on the old Blackburn grounds.

At Coburg during the same month a couple of shooters who have now passed on are recorded among the winners. The Coburg club's doublerise title was won outright by the late Bert Anquetil, 6/8 pairs, from W. James, 5/8, and the late Ray Chandler, 4/8. E. Parkinson (now living in Sydney) and former secretary, Frank Unmack, won a Deauville Doubles contest at the same fixture. Fred Burns won the Victorian Walk-up championship at Camberwell, 21/25, from Eric Ball (Colac), 18/25. It is worthy of note that at the Camberwell fixture a fox was shot by one of the competitors. out for "seemingly wounded game" and ventured too close to the guns. The shooter who grassed the wily visitor was using light load cart-ridges, but quickly got a double-barrel in, and Reynard toppled over. Harry McIntosh, of Seymour, who seldom shoots these days, was a successful competitor, winning a 10 birder, 19/20, also at Coburg.

GUN GOSSIP

(By "North Country" in "British Shooting Times)

Do you want your gun to last; or do you want to be buying a new gun every few years, like a motor car? That is the question. At least it is the question a shooter put to me the other day when he was discussing the prices of guns. I do not know, but I feel that most shooting men, myself included, prefer to buy a gun which will last. Of course, I know what is behind this question - the present high prices of guns. Not everyone has the ready money these days to invest in a good gun, and hire-purchase terms are not to everyone's liking. So a desire develops for more of the mass-produced article. A sign of the times, naturally. And in view of the present and impending circumstances, there seems little to be done about it.

If you can possess yourself of a good gun, it is, in my opinion, a great advantage. I do really believe you will shoot better. I know as well as anyone that a cheap gun will kill just as far and all that. I have used lots of cheap guns and have brought off some very long shots with them—probably because such guns are heavily choked in many cases. But for steady reliable shooting where you need to kill bird after bird in succession, give me a good quality gun.

I do not know how it is with others, but to me much of the pleasure and charm of shooting would fade had I to use some piece of "ironmongery". A good gun is to me a companion—just as a dog. Whether waiting for duck on some lonely estuary, for pigeon in the quiet of the woodlands at dusk or away on the rough shoot, I like to have with me a gun on which craftsmen have given some of their time, a gun well-designed, tastefully engraved and of good balance. This adds to my enjoyment and, as I say,

it helps me in my shooting. I like, too, to shoot with my own gun. If I am shooting with a borrowed weapon—I don't care how well finished and highly engraved it may be—I never enjoy myself to the same extent.

As for shooting results, because somebody can kill 99 out of a 100 with a cheap ill-balanced gun, it does not follow he would not shoot better over a season with a best weapon. The shooting of wild game throughout a whole season is a stern and revealing test. There is such a variety of shots and so many different sets of circumstances that whatever weak spots there may be, they are sure to be found out. Nothing like the real thing to bring about a "showdown". You may be hot on some game, but poor at duck and snipe. You may soon be one hundred per cent. on rabbits.

So, as a gun needs to be of good quality to last (if it is put to much use), I say you should want a gun to last. That will be the best investment and the soundest proposition. Your results will show better results over a period of years. If you keep a strict tally of kills to cartridges, you will be able to draw up a balance sheet and see for yourself.

Many a small shooter who has a cheap or very worn gun and only shoots rabbits (and those only at suitable angles and ranges) is under the impression that he knows all there is to his job. He is under a sad misapprehension. His exceedingly limited experience is no true criterion. While a good shot can make a reasonable score with any gun, he cannot be his best unless he is well armed. Good guns are not just made and required for their looks. They are in demand for their functioning.

Gladstone Diggers' Gun Club in North Queensland recently had the unenviable experience of not being able to hold its advertised Queensdand double-rise championship on Sunday, June 10, owing to non-arrival of clays. Fortunately club officials had a fairly detailed list of those likely to attend, and they were able to inform most intending competitors. The club has had a considerable quantity of clays on order for months through merchants and local traders. Two consignments forwarded to Gladstone by rail were completely lost between Brisbane and Gladstone-either of these consignments would have seen the club through its State title series. Another consignment being road-freighted from Melbourne to Sydney and thence by rail (also for the State shoot) had not (at time of writing) reached Sydney. The club holds waybills for the two "lost" legions, but the Railway Department is unable to locate the consignments. Gladstone endeavoured to obtain assistance from Rockhampton Club, but the latter club had only 3,000 clays on hand for two carnival shoots already advertised, and was unable to assist. As Gladstone secretary, N. E. Byrne, puts it, "you would not read about it." Before selecting and advertising a fresh

date for the State double-rise title Gladstone club intends to make sure it actually holds the clays under its own "lock and key". Details of the new date will be published through these columns.

Townsville Club secretary (Qld.), Fred Blackman, reports that the duck opening was a real "bumper" on June 9. Fred adds, "Ducks of all species—black duck, widgeon, wood duck, teal, water whistlers and grass whistlers-are thick this year and the opening day was one of the best I have had. We have no club activities as regards clay bird shooting, and won't have, either, while the ducks are flying, so I won't have any reports for a while."

was that the said George kept an eye on "Skipper" for a few days, but finally gave up the chase.

A flourishing duck industry has arisen in the Philippines because of a duck egg delicacy unknown to the rest of the world. The name of the delicacy is "balut", which, in brief, is unhatched duckling. It is said to te as popular in Manila as hot dogs in the United States and Canada. Millions of these eggs are sold by pedlars every year along the streets of the city.

When almost ready to hatch, the duck egg is removed from the incubator and hard-boiled in the shell. The custom of eating these eggs must be centuries old. One of the villages, named Pateros, was so named by the Spaniards because of the large number of ducks found there at the time of the Spanish conquest. It is still the principal business of the village, the name of which means duck-roises. which means duck-raisers. The duck industry is made possible and economical by a fresh-water lake, containing almost unlimited amounts of snails and other aquatic duck food. A non-broody duck, similar to the American mallard, has been developed which is found in flocks. They sometimes average 150 to 180 eggs per bird. The ducks conveniently lay eggs the year around, seldom stray from their pens, and are put into bamboo enclosures during the night.

The picture herewith shows Arnold Reigger, of Seattle, Washington, tipped as the Captain of the 1951 Sports Afield All-America Trapshooting Team. Reigger attended nearly every major trapshoot in the West last year, compiled the great average of .9870 on more than . 10.000 registered targets A.T.A., and Pacific Coast targets, an all-time record for this number of clay pigeons. He turned in .9908 on 1,200 P.I.T.A. (Pacific Coast) clays, .9865 on 8,500 Amateur Trapshooting Association Targets, and blistered the doubles for a healthy .9304 rating on 2,400. He won several major championships, tied for the National Championship at the Grand American with 200 straight, broke 199 out of 200 to win the AA honors in the Dayton Homecoming event. and copped the Zone Champion of Champions contest. His long run of 917 straight is a new record for 1s ounces of shot. 23 drams of powder.

Am expecting to hear that your boys walked off with the International Race. Always enjoy your "News", Bill; thanks a lot; I read it from "Kiver to Kiver". Bill, with all the enthusiasm that the Australians have for trapshooting, don't you think you could finance and send a group of, say, ten of your best shooters to attend the Grand American? I think I suggested this before; anyway, it is something to work on, then some day it will come about. The Australians seem to hold their own in other lines of sport, and this boy Marshall, who attends Yale University, is putting your swimmers out in front. As you know, he has made World Records in this country. This is just one Champion. Your tennis and golf stars are always in there, too. (Thanks for the invitation on behalf of all Australian shooters, Rex. But your dollar complications make a "mass" invasion from Australia rather difficult at present. 
