

THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Of commanding interest among the happenings of the past few weeks has been the intimation that New Zealand will be represented in the International Teams' contest as from the 1952 series. This will be New Zealand's first essay into International competition and the advent of our sister Dominion's representation will do much to bring this very interesting series under greater world notice. The

competing teams for 1952 will therefore be: England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, New Zealand and Australia. The New Zealanders will be a welcome addition to the competition and, on behalf of all Australian shooters, a most cordial welcome is extended to them. It is expected the New Zealand team will shoot its section of the International during the progress of the N.Z. 1952 Championship tournament early in July next. Australia will retain the usual March date, expected to be March 10th in 1952, for the International on this side. The question as to whether the next International will be shot under single-barrel conditions has not vet been decided. A meeting of the International Committee in London will decide this point shortly.

In a note from the Secretary, New Zealand G.C.A., information was forwarded indicating that automatic and repeating guns may be used in future trap-shooting events in N.Z. A request was made that this information be promulgated in this journal. The new by-law is quoted as received:—

"In all matches, sweepstakes and championships, the standard or basis size of the bore of the gun shall be 12, and no handicap allowances shall be made for smaller bores. In all our competitions shooters may use any type of gun they prefer. In skeet shooting, automatic and repeating guns may be used in accordance with the official skeet rules. In all our other



competitions automatic and repeating guns may be used subject to the following conditions:

- (a) The guns must be pinned or plugged (or) so that not more than two cartridges can be inserted in the gun, that is one cartridge in the chamber and one in the magazine.
- (b) A competitor must not insert any cartridges in his gun until he is on his mark and until his turn to shoot.
- (c) If after firing there remains a loaded cartridge in his gun, the competitor must extract it before turning round and leaving his mark.
- (d) Before moving from one position to another the competitor must open his gun at the breech and leave it open, and he must carry it so that the referee can conveniently see the breech, and he must not leave any cartridges in the chamber or magazine of the gun.

For an infringement of any of these conditions the referee or the management shall disqualify the shooter from the competition."

A number of cases have been noted in recent months of shooters adopting shooting "nom-de-plume" without the permission of the Association and also without registering such shooting name. It is pointed out that under Association rules shooting names can only be used with the ap-

proval of the Association, and to use any such approved name a fee must be paid and the name retained at all times, unless cancelled by written request. A recent case comes to mind of a shooter in a State outside Victoria using three different shooting names — quite an absurd position. A suggestion has been made that the shooter concerned used the various names to bluff the handicapper. This seems unlikely, but it could be possible. The handicapper would doubtless take a "dim view" of such proceedings. At all events, shooting names are permitted, on application to the Association, for which a fee of 20/- is charged. The name, when approved, must be retained at all times thereafter. The registration of obviously foolish or ill-considered shooting names will not be approved by the Association.

A few shooters have written advising that their copies of "News" arrive irregularly. In such cases shooters should advise the secretary A.C.P.T.S.A. without delay, when replacement copies will be forwarded, providing same are available. Many shooters fail to notify change of address, and this factor has proved to be a persistent cause of nondelivery of "News". Any change of address or non-receipt of the publication should be notified immediately — the matter can then be cleared up with little delay. Waiting several months merely aggravates an unsatisfactory position.

Ten Years Ago . . .


Trapshooting news was dwindling rapidly during October, 1941, due to the onset of the war. Several clubs had already "folded up" for the duration. Following the publication of the next two months of "Ten Years Ago" this feature will necessarily cease. Competitive trapshooting dropped right out after December, 1941.

L. Tewksbury, now President of the Melbourne Gun Club, was frequently under notice at this period. He won a Blackburn Club event 11/ 11 and was runner-up in another event to the late F. Gray.

"Hawkeye" (Norman Hill) won a five birder at Nobel grounds, 25/25, from Billy Scott, 24/25. The latter won another event later in the programme, 10/10. J. R. Schutt and Peter Garrone, veterans who seldom shoot these days, divided a five birder. E. G. Biggs, the present National Champion, was under notice with success in the club single - barrel championship at Coburg with 20 straight. The final Blackburn fixture in October, 1941, was in aid of Red Cross funds and some £70 was made available to that body after the shoot. The series was five-bird events all day. Winners noted were John Martin, the late F. Gray, "Nimrod" (Harry Roberts), Dave Watson, J. Bryant and "Dick" (Dick Wightman, who is at present overseas).

OBITUARY

It is with profound regret that the death of veteran Association patron, Mr. Donald Mackintosh, is recorded.

Mr. Mackintosh passed on early in September at his home at Essendon (Victoria), after an illness extending over several months.

One of the greatest trapshots of all time, Mr. Mackintosh won fame over the traps both in Australia and abroad. At one stage of his shooting career he was absent in England and on the Continent for nearly 10 years. During this period he won world acclaim for his great prowess.

Mr. Mackintosh had been a patron of the Association since its inception. During the early stages of formation of the A.C.P.T.S.A. his support and advice was invaluable. Mr. Mackintosh was the donor of the famed International Trophy which is shot for annually between teams in the Home Country and Australia and is at present held by Australia.

He was a grand sportsman in every sense of the word. His unsurpassed knowledge of national affairs and outstanding world figures, as apart from his expert knowledge of gun-lore, made him attractive company always. His fine sense of humour, fair-play and goodwill contributed much towards the development of the interesting and better things of life.

Born at Rockbank (Victoria), Mr. Mackintosh was 84 at the final curtain—the world will be the poorer by his passing.



It was a great shoot; you will never have attended a real trapshooting tournament until you have taken in the Grand American, so, Bill, plan on it next year, get your affairs in order and pack your bags. The State of Washington did really well. Arnold Reigger won High on the 1000 targets, also the All-Round Championship on the 400 mixed targets, 200 singles championship 50 pairs and the 100 Grand American Handicap. Reigger broke 97 from 25 yards in the Grand American Handicap. He has a run of 129 straight from 25 yards (A record. He broke the last 50 in the Preliminary Handicap and the first 50 plus in the Grand; did not shoot a target in between the two handicaps). As I told you before, Reigger did not qualify for the Champion of Champions Race, as he did not compete at the State shoot here last June. Corinne Farrell, of Ellensburg (Wash.) won the Women's Championship; she also broke 99 from 19 yards in the Vandalia Handicap the last day — a shooter came in with 100, so she got the runner-up trophy."

A cutting was forwarded which referred to 62-year-old Bishop M. Crawford. The latter was known among many Melbourne shooters in the 1920's when he shot in trapshooting competitions. Crawford was known in his best trapshooting days as winner of the 1927 International Trapshooting championship at Havanna (Cuba), the 1928 handicap match at Springfield (III.) and the 1929 Missouri Championship winner.

But to-day, other considerations apart, few can derive any benefit from the high-hammered gun beyond the fact that its continual use saves the purchase of a new gun. This, surely, is penny-wise and pound-foolish."

After all, in field shoot-ing, the second barrel is often used, and with clays, it is a pleasure to be able to bust them and hear the Ref. call dead, whether by the first or second barrel."


A new club is forming at Eulo in Western Queensland. The secretary of the organization is F. L. Lietchford. Eulo.

The outside front cover carries the national emblem of the competing countries. The Scottish Thistle is at top left corner, the English Rose in the centre, the Australian Kangaroo at top right corner, the Welsh Leak at bottom left, with the Irish Shamrock at bottom right. Quite an impressive set-up.

Latrobe Gun Club in North-Western Tasmania-the place where the "big trout" abound - advertises its two-day championship meeting which extends over November 3 and 5. The opening day shooting will start at 1.30 p.m. Main events are the North-Western Districts of Tasmania S.B. championship, with a £20 han-



J. C. ("Pee-Wee") Thompson, for-merly of St. George (Q.), now a member of the Moree Club (N.S.W.), recently took out "Lifer" registration with the Association. This well-known identity in the shooting world is known to many Southern State shooters. It has often intrigued postwar shooters as to how the shooting name of "Pee-Wee" came to be attached to the redoubtable Jack Thom₁-son. The facts follow. Early



in 1938 a big effort was made to firmly establish clay pigeon shooting in Sydney; actually the opportunity was taken of staging a big shoot, extending over several days, at the Pagewood Movie Studio grounds. The series was well publicised and shooters from most of the Eastern States (including a number from Tasmania) attended and competed. Jack Thompson was quite the personality at this particular shoot that he remains today. He went to some length to explain how his property at St. George was being eaten out (it was a dry season) by pee-wee's. Jack made much of a fetish of his constant reference to this factor that a visiting shooter (it may have been Bill Rainbird from Launceston) dubbed him "Pee-Wee" Thompson. Jack accepted this in good sporting spirit and immediately registered his shooting name as "Pee-Wee". This has stuck through the years, and shooters in every State continue to think of Jack Thompson in no other category but "Pee-Wee". Jack went through the war years, serving in the Middle East for a long period. Notwithstanding the ravages of time, it would seem that "Pee-Wee" will be with J.C.T. for all his shooting years.

At Gladstone in Queensland two shooting groups have operated for a number of years. One body was known as the Gladstone Game and Trap Shooting organization, and the most recently formed was known as the Gladstone Diggers' Gun Club. With the idea of fostering clay pigeon shooting and automatically strengthening the sport in the area, both groups have now amalgamated

Mosquito Repellent

The sports of shooting and fishing entice us into places where the mosquito abound, and until recently my life was made miserable by the unwelcome attentions of these pests. A doctor friend prescribed 40 per cent. Dimethyl Phthalate (D.M.P., for short) in cold cream, applied to the wrists, ankles, and neck as a repellent. The effect is miraculous, and all insects are kept at a distance. The preparation gives a slight tingting sensation for a few seconds, and effectively lasts about two hours. Any chemist will make up the cream, and I believe there are proprietary compounds also available. D.M.P. was evolved as a mosquito repellent in jungle warfare, and all sportsmen.
