



THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

With the issue of the October edition, this publication passed into its fifth year of circulation among registered shooters with the A.C.P.T.S.A., clubs and business advertisers. The record, size, 80 pages, appeared in the final number of the fourth volume in August, 1951. Quite a substantial increase from the humble 8-page beginning with the initial edition. "News" will continue to be the property of the A.C.P.T.S.A. and the forum for the opinion of all who are interested and follow the pastime of clay pigeon shooting.



Among the chief interests of the past month has been a two-day and two-night meeting of the Executive Committee of the A.C.P.T.S.A. in Melbourne. So that all clubs and shooters may have a full knowledge of matters introduced at the meeting, details are appended. It is of paramount importance that all should read the information imparted and accept this column as the official direction for subsequent action.

Referee Examinations.—It is unlikely that referee examinations, that is to say, examinations for shooters to be accredited as official A.C.P.T.S.A. referees, will take place before the New Year. The Association hand-book of shooting rules and instructions is at present in course of being reprinted, after having been brought up-to-date following careful perusal by the Executive Committee. Copies of the hand-book will not be available before the end of the year. As the booklet is the basis of the referee examination, the question of the next test will necessarily be governed by the receipt of the new hand-book. Those intending to seek official recognition as A.C.P.T.S.A. referees should watch for announcement of the next examination series in this publication and lodge applications when details of closing date is indicated.

Interstate Challenge Match.—It was decided to institute, commencing in 1952, an Interstate Challenge Match between teams of 10 men a side, representative of the Eastern States of the Commonwealth. The Association will allot the shooting ground each year, commencing with a New South Wales ground in 1952. Team members will require to be resident in the State for which they will shoot for at least six months prior to selection. It is intended that standard ammunition be used (probably the same shell as used in the annual International Match), each man shooting at 50 birds from 16 yards. Nomination will be £2/10/- each per team member. Each State will pick its own team members, and each man selected will be required to meet his own expenses. The Association will donate £5/5/- to the individual high-gun for the match, whilst Messrs. Hartleys Ltd. have agreed to donate ten trophies to the winning team each year. The winning team will hold the "Great Britain and Ireland Trophy" (valued 120 guineas) for 12 months, or until the next competition. The first match of the series will be held over the holiday week-end, October 4 and 6, 1952. The Executive Committee has instructed that no State or Commonwealth Championships will be approved for the week-end mentioned.

New South Wales clubs are now invited to nominate for the holding of the first competition over October 4 and 6, 1952. Nominations to be in the hands of the Secretary,

A.C.P.T.S.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, not later than February 28, 1952.

A.C.P.T.S.A. 1952 Shooting Programme.—It was decided to conduct the Association competition programme extending over the dates March 8 to March 11, 1952, at the usual venue, East Burwood (V). Shooting will open at 8.30 a.m. on Saturday, March 8, with the annual Champion of Champions Cup, 60 birds from 16 yards, double-barrel. Conditions as to nomination fee and trophy list will remain the same as in 1951, except that after the first four major awards in the Champion of Champions Cup cash prizes will be substituted for the trophies of former years. An important departure from the regular "position by ballot" has been made. In future shooters will be squadded as their entries are received—no ballot for shooting position will take place. The Executive Committee feels that the ballot engages in considerable time which could be made better use of by arranging for shooters to start shooting immediately at 8.30 a.m. It should be particularly noted that no entries will be accepted for the Champion of Champions Cup after 9.30 a.m. on Saturday, March 8, 1952.

Australian Teams' Championship.—Conditions of the Australian Teams' Championship have now been fixed at "four men from any one affiliated club, who must be permanently resident within fifty (50) miles of the centre at which the club they are shooting for is situated." This direction completely does away with combination or similar type teams. On Monday, March 10, the Intermediate Championship, to start under same conditions as 1951, will commence proceedings at 9 a.m. This will be followed at 11 a.m. by a £100 A.C.P.T.S.A. Handicap. The International Team will shoot throughout the period required on this day—members will not be eligible to take part in other events until after the conclusion of the International Match.

Members of the Australian International Team, 1952, will comprise the 20 (twenty) highest scorers in the Champion of Champions Cup (National Championship) as formerly. On the final day, Tuesday,

March 11, the Fourth Grand Australian Handicap will be decided, commencing at 9.30 a.m., at 40 birds single-barrel from handicap marks. The series will conclude with a special handicap, to be agreed upon on the grounds, probably a £50 or £100 event. An important point should be noted. The 1952 International competition, which will include New Zealand representation for the first time, may be shot under single-barrel conditions. This will be decided at a meeting of the International Committee to be held in London late in December or early in January. Immediately advice is received, notification will appear in this publication.

The Executive Committee has also decided that no person, other than an Australian citizen (of at least 12 months standing) will be permitted to represent Australia in future International competitions.

1952 Annual Meeting.—The next Annual Meeting of Affiliated Club delegates will be held at Scotts Hotel, Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1, on the evening of Monday, March 10, 1952, commencing at 8 p.m. All clubs entitled to delegate representation are requested to ensure they are represented at this meeting by a delegate who is a resident member of his club. Names and addresses of delegates should reach the Association secretary, seven clear days prior to the meeting.

Shooters Registration Card.—Commencing forthwith, every shooter, both renewals and newly registered, will be issued with a "1952 Association Registration Card." This card will be issued immediately registration fee is paid and will be renewed with a new card when payment is made in each succeeding year. The card will bear the name and address of the shooter and will also show his Association handicap. This card will be signed by the Association secretary when issued (providing a handicap is known). Columns for handicap alteration appear on the card and handicap variation throughout the year will be noted on the card. Notation of the changed handicap must be signed by the "home club secretary" of the shooter concerned, immediately after the information has appeared in Association "News". The registration card is to be carried at all times,

either in the gun case or shooting jacket, and is to be presented to club officials before entry is accepted or cash or trophies paid over. The introduction of the card will be a valuable guide to all club officials as well as being a certificate of registration for the shooter.

Championship Sashes. The Executive Committee has directed that clubs allocated State and Commonwealth championships are required to present sashes to the winners of these events. The colours to be used are, Commonwealth — Dark Blue; State — Red or Maroon; District — White. It is an optional matter whether sashes are supplied for District titles. The colours are to be strictly adhered to. Clubs are again reminded that the official sash makers to the A.C.P.T.S.A. are Messrs. W. Flattely & Son Pty. Ltd., 301 Lonsdale Place, Melbourne, C.1, and all enquiries or orders for sashes should be directed to this house. The firm has complete knowledge of requirements, hence a long detail of explanation is not necessary.

Championship Entry Fees.—Due to increased cost, the Executive Committee has directed that an all-round additional charge of 5/- is to be made in Championship nomination fees. This will mean that hence forward Commonwealth Championships will carry a 30/- entry fee, State and District Championships a 25/- entry fee.

Trophy Allocation in Handicaps.—Again due to recent heavy increase in cost of trophies, the Executive Committee has instructed that the earlier by-law, whereby "20 per cent. of all money prizes where £25 or more is given for any one event was to be allocated for trophies," has been rescinded. Clubs should therefore take note that the circular of recent weeks directing attention to this by-law should not be taken into account. All cash awards may now be presented straight out without trophy allocation, if so preferred.

Publication of Registration List.—Due to increasingly high costs of printing, the Executive Committee advises that the full list of registered shooters with attached handicap will in future be published only once in each 12 months, probably in June each year. However, it should be

carefully noted that amended handicaps, together with new and renewed registrations, will be published each month, as is customary.

Handicap Returns.—Commencing as from January 1, 1952, clubs are instructed that a handicap return must be lodged by each affiliated club once in every three (3) months. Clubs failing to observe this direction will, after the expiration of six months, have name of club published in Association "News" as defaulting on this instruction. Handicap return forms are available from the Association Secretary, and clubs out of supply of the forms should make immediate application. The handicap forms are set out in a simple make-up which should be followed easily and understood completely. The forms when compiled should refer only to those shooters whom "it is recommended should be re-handicapped." By this it is meant that a complete and full list of every member and/or visiting shooter is not necessary. It is emphasised that the handicap returns are required to indicate those who, in the opinion of the local handicappers, require either moving forward or backward. To support any recommendation made for re-handicap, columns are available on the return form which should be filled in showing details of the performances on which the re-handicap recommendation is based. Association handicaps can never be brought fully up-to-date unless returns are forwarded to the Association secretary. Delay in submitting returns longer than three months tends to make any re-handicap movement somewhat stale, hence the Executive's direction of at least a return once in every three months. In most cases very little work is involved in preparing the return—generally not more than six to ten shooters are concerned. The preparation work on the return is therefore anything but exacting.

Where a shooter is registered without an accompanying handicap recommendation, or in cases where shooters' names appear in "News" without a handicap, the home club of such shooters should immediately advise the Association (brief letter is sufficient) of the initial handicap recommended. Any later changes can appear in the regular way through the handicap return. By this means

the unsatisfactory position of a shooter visiting another club and finding himself placed on a mark quite beyond his capabilities will be avoided. Introduction of the previously mentioned "Registration Card" will prove of considerable assistance in this regard. Association handicaps are assessed on down-the-line events only. Walk-up, Deauville Doubles, Double-rise and novelty events are not taken into account. Handicap returns should not include performances under the headings mentioned.

Some clubs, despite instruction otherwise, continue to send score sheets to the Association. Score sheets are not required, except in cases of break confirmation.

The Association main requirements are, briefly, that all shooters are registered, that a brief summary of a shoot or shoots should be prepared and forwarded for publication in Association "News", that a handicap return be completed and forwarded at three-monthly intervals (at least).

Finally, when submitting handicap returns, it is important to remember

that these contain recommendations concerning all shooters whom it is recommended should be re-handicapped — meaning that the return should refer to not only local club members, but recommendations on visiting shooters whom the local club handicapper considers should have marks reviewed.

The 1952 Championship Allocation has been completed by the Executive Committee. Full details appear in this edition. Clubs are requested to accept the list published as official, no direct intimation will be issued.

Clubs and shooters are reminded that there will be no publication of the "News" during January. The January and February issues will be combined as one and will be issued on or about February 5. Clubs intending to advertise shoots between end of December and early February are advised to include information regarding these fixtures in the December edition.

SPECIAL NOTICE

In conformity with usual procedure, shooters, clubs and advertisers are notified that there will be no publication of "News" during January, due to printer's vacation period. The January and February issues will be combined and it is expected the February edition will be available on or about February 5.

To all using the advertising columns this reminder is included so that all dated matter, such as shoots, etc., to be held during January and early February should be advertised in the December issue, for which closing of copy date is November 30.

The letter reads, "The President and Committee of this club extend their congratulations to you for your very fine effort in winning the two major events at the meeting held on Saturday last. Your performance was made the more meritorious by the difficult conditions and the fact that an entirely new trap was used on a strange ground." The letter bears the names of officials — none of whom are now connected with the sport — President, R. W. Hawke; Hon. Secretary, E. A. Holmes, and Asst. Secretary, G. A. Townsend.



The Habits of Snipe

It is worthy of mention that Harry Gullifer, who does not shoot a great deal these days, is a garage proprietor at Caulfield (just alongside the spot where a good many gallopers do their stuff and punters try to "pick 'em") and his testimonial letter is saturated in oil. It is none the less valuable to Harry; it is steeped in the right atmosphere of his business interest. Similar letters and others of interest would be welcome for this section.

Some people have a rather vague idea that any ground that is wet will hold a snipe, and that the wetter it is, the more birds it is likely to harbour. There never was a greater fallacy. Snipe detest water-logged ground; it is the soil of a spongy consistency, which harbours just under the surface that variable insect and minute shell life on which they wax fat, that attracts them in large numbers. So the wise man avoids that kind of lake in miniature from which a few barren reed beds emerge above the waterline, and seeks hollows in the sedges, young grass fields beside a stream and mossy patches round the springs. How the snipe and more particularly the migrants which return year after year to the self-same spots detect these succulent feeding grounds so unerringly is a mystery, but it is none the less a fact. It is for the embryo shooter to display a like intelligence if he would fill his bag. . . .

Moonlight or pitch dark nights will cause the snipe to change his quarters; so will frost and heavy, continuous rain, and although on calm, soft days, when the birds are well fed and lazy, a bog may yield abundance, the converse is equally true. When good living is easily come by, the snipe, gorging at night to repletion, may not come home with the milk, in other words, the dawn. Similarly, when storm or darkness impedes his search for food, he may remain until late in the morning in his feeding grounds. The soil must be soft enough for his bill to probe for worms and insect life without difficulty and so when frost seals up the land you must look for him elsewhere than in his usual haunts. Then you may find him, in fact, almost anywhere and in the most unexpected spots—the margins of streams, the bottoms of damp ditches, or drains which the frost has failed to reach. I have even shot snipe out of roots, when the sun has thawed the rime on the leaves to soften the earth below.

after all, any shooter that may be wrongly handicapped is due only to lack of information from club secretaries." This official undoubtedly has given the difficult matter of handicapping a lot of careful thought — his appreciation of the whole position is entirely correct. His summing up is to be commended.

The Queensland shooter, H. B. Wade, of "Cheriton", Gradule (S.W. Qld.) writes an interesting comment which is published as an additional viewpoint on the question of single-barrel shooting. The letter reads, "I am one of those who really appreciate the 'News' and read every word in it. I read with interest the comment on what Mr. Bell had to say about the merits or otherwise of single-barrel shooting at clays, and I am in entire agreement with him in the matter. We do not take part in trap shooting to save cartridges, but rather with the hope of ever improving our form with a gun. What better way can one learn to become proficient with a second barrel, at game or anything else, than by following through and smashing a flying clay, if necessary with the second shot? It takes ability! Who would like to see a son grow up capable of bringing down, say, a quail with one shot, but totally unable to swing and fire accurately his second barrel? One should not confuse this issue of the use of one or two barrels with other sports — golf, football, tennis, etc., and their rules have nothing whatever to do with shooting. Print my views if you have space — or think they are worth it. For heaven's sake, make sure of my copy of 'News'."

Another Queenslander, K. A. Coulton, who recently registered through the Goondiwindi club, also refers to "News"; he says: "I received my first copy of 'News' and would like to congratulate you — or who ever is responsible."

sit in comfort and watch the shooting, which during winter often continues through semi-gale conditions.

This club had everything imaginable for the comfort and convenience of members. An attendant, who by the way is a qualified armourer, takes members' guns as they arrive; cleans, assembles and places them in the rack. After shooting, all guns are cleaned and returned to their cases by this attendant.

The day I visited Travers Island a normal Club Shoot was being conducted. The first event was over seventy-five birds, and I assumed, in view of the numbers present, that this would take ages to conclude. However, I was soon called on to the mark and found that within a period of twenty minutes I had completed three rounds of birds. This was possible because five birds are shot by each shooter on each position and twenty-five birds on each trap. It was so organised that shooters move immediately from one trap to the next. All shooters shot from 16 yards on the first two traps and moved to the 21-yard mark on the third trap. This proved a real test in view of the very windy conditions.

The next event was a twenty-five pairs double rise, which was also despatched in a very swift manner. Again the wind made shooting difficult, but I witnessed some brilliant shooting by several shooters who enjoy a good reputation in the United States.

Since returning I have been asked whether conditions in America are easier than in Australia. In my opinion it would be far more difficult to maintain averages in U.S. than in Australia in view of the extreme weather conditions of that country. Clay Pigeon Traps are certainly no slower, nor lay-outs much different to what we have here. Clay pigeons, however, appear to smash more easily, but whether this is due to the composition of the clay or the quality of the American ammunition, I would not like to suggest.

I was very interested to ascertain if American trap shots are as

good as their scores indicate, and have come to the conclusion that they are putting up performances which they could repeat in Australia on any of our grounds. The brilliance of the top American trap shot cannot be disputed, but it can be explained.

I had heard that when the American expert practices for a competition he would shoot perhaps one hundred birds a day for some weeks before the match. I am told on good authority that the top shooting men of America kept their eye in by shooting some four or five hundred clay pigeons a day when practising for an important event. I venture to say that a number of Australians, given similar practice, would hold their own with U.S. champions, but I believe that the American expert is proficient to a degree far above Australia's present best.

To describe trap shooting in the other countries I visited would make this letter too long; I will set out my impressions in a later letter if you consider it would be of interest to Association members."


The Frankston Club, on the fore-shore of Melbourne Port Phillip





These two gave a fine exhibition of how it should be done until John slowed up at the 45th round and missed, giving Russell 3rd place, 44/45. The opening event at 5-bird D.B. produced 15 possibles. In the tie shoot the gag was applied, "Single-barrel," and, as usual, proved effective, eleven dropping out in the first two rounds. "Nimrod", Cyril Fankhauser, J. Bryant and Sampson divided the stake at 7/7. The third event, 10-bird D.B. Sweepstake, was div. Frank Brown and John Bryant. Night shooting is now in full swing. These shoots are held on alternate Wednesdays. For those interested in this type of shooting, an enjoyable evening is assured. With the improved lighting, vision is now almost 100 per cent.

ABOUT BIRDS

Birds live at a faster rate than most other creatures. Their body temperature is higher, their pulse beats faster, and their blood has more red corpuscles per ounce than that of any other animal.

It takes a good set of muscles to keep a bird's wings beating for hours on end and with some species the pectoral muscles which raise and lower the wings may weigh half as much as the entire bird, bones and all.

To keep their weight down many birds have hollow, air-filled bones. The number of these bones varies with the species, and with some birds it is carried to such an extent that a five-foot pelican weighing twenty-five pounds is said to have a skeleton of only twenty-three ounces.

There are several groups of birds who are "grounded" for a period each year. At the molting season all their primary wing feathers fall out about the same time and they can't fly

until the new ones develop. These include the ducks and geese and such sea birds as the auks, guillemots and puffins. They are all good swimmers, though, and the sea birds are expert divers as well, so they stay out on the water for safety.

A bird doesn't fall out of bed, because it can't. When it bends its knees and ankles to sit down on a perch, this automatically tightens a tendon that curls the toes into a firm grip. The bird can't even let go until it stands up again.

One of the biggest mysteries of bird life is how the flocks of young birds can fly to a winter home they have never seen before over a route they have never travelled before and do it with no older birds to guide them. Indeed, how do they know enough to fly south in the first place when they have never seen such a thing as a winter and have had no experience that tells them to avoid it? (John H. Spicer, U.S.A.)


