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
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



THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

A number of shooters have advised that their names have not appeared this year in "News", although they are financial. In order to clear up an apparent mis-understanding, it should be noted that, by direction of the Executive Committee some months ago, it was decided to publish the full list of registrations once each year, probably in future June issues. The last full list was published following



During the last month two cases of clashing dates in major events have occurred. In each instance the fault has been with the clubs concerned. It is an Association direction and also in the best interests of the sport and the shooters that clubs holding open shoots should apply to the Association for approval of all open dates. When a clash of major events occurs, no club or shooter really benefits. It is therefore most important for club officials to observe this direction from the governing body. Club officials should also remember that Association handicaps



should be used for all open shoots. An open shoot is a championshiip meeting (other than club) and any occasion on which £50 or more is given in prize money for any one

Amendment to handicaps on registration cards has brought forth a further query during the past month. One northern club has asked if the registration card has to be returned to the Association secretary for amendment and signature. As previously explained, returning the card to the Association is not required. The actual procedure is (this has already been explained in three previous issues of "News"): for a club desirous of recommending a variation - either forward or back -of any shooter, visiting or local club member, to report the incidence of the recommendation to the Association immediately (within three days), outlining reasons for varia-tion proposed. If the Association accepts the recommendation, the amendment to the handicap of the shooter concerned will appear in the following issue of "News". Once the official intimation of change of handicap has appeared in "News", the shooter concerned should submit his registration card to his home club secretary for notation and signature. This is quite a simple procedure and one which protects the interests of all concerned. If the shooter under review does not produce his handicap card, it is important that his home club secretary should note the

variation in handicap and take steps to see that the shooter's card is amended without delay.

The organization of the Interstate Teams' Match, which will now be shot under similar conditions to the International Match—i.e., posted results—and will be under the supervision of Executive Committee members in each State. In the case of Western Australia and South Australia, it is recommended that should these States desire to sponsor teams that organization should be carried out by the Perth Club in W.A., coopting Presidents of Katanning and
Geraldton, and the South Australian
G.C. in Adelaide. Match conditions
will be 10 men a side, each to shoot at 50 birds from 16 yards, double-barrel. Through the courtesy of Imperial Chemical Industries A. & N.Z. Ltd., International load shells will be available by end of July at nominal rates for this event. Members of the Second S bers of the Executive Committee will have full information on shells available prior to the issue of this edition. The local State Executive authority, as approved by the Association, will decide the ground on which the event is to be shot and results will then be posted to the Association for checking and decision. Messrs. Hartleys Ltd. will present ten trophies to the winning team and the Association will also present a special award to the high-gun of the contest. It is advised that all contests are to be decided not later than the first week-end in October.

THE SHOTGUN BORE

The bore of a shot gun was determined by an old method of muzzle-loading days and came originally from the weight of the spherical lead bullet that would exactly fit the bore of the gun concerned, e.g., a 1-oz. bullet exactly fits the bore of a certain gun, and as sixteen of these go to a pound, the gun is termed a 16-bore; similarly a spherical bullet of which twelve go to the pound fits the bore of a 12-bore, and so on.

In the box lock action the locks are fitted actually into the body of the action, as opposed to side locks, which are let into the side of the gun behind the body of the action.

During the progress of shooting, Michael and son were playing and the younger dog accidentally bit a portion out of the older dog's left eyebrow. Dr. H. H. Martin of Yarram, who was a competitor, immediately assisted by stitching the injured animal. On the way home the trip was along portion of the South Gippsland Highway, through Woodside and Yarram. Near Woodside a signpost indicated that the Ninety Mile Beach was close by, so Jack felt that the dogs were due for a run and let them down into some swamp water a mile or two off the main road. The dogs frolicked for some time and it was noticed that Michael was

Followers of the sport of clay pigeon shooting throughout the Empire will regret to learn of the recent passing of Major H. R. Northover, O.B.E., M.C., which took place at his home, Bisley End, Brockham Warren, Boxhill Road, Tadworth, Surrey, England. The late sportsman was in his 70th year. Major Northover was well known for his inventive genius particularly in regard to traps and clays. He represented England on many occasions in the International series and was several times High-gun for the Mother Country. He was the founder and President of the Bisley Gun Club, one of the most prominent clubs in England.

A new club at Collarenebri (N.S.W.) has affiliated with the A.C.P.T.S.A. Club secretary is F. K. Badgery, of Alpha, Collarenebri. The formation and affiliation of a new club is accepted as one of the usual passing events of the year. With Collarenebri affiliation is revived memories of a first-class pre-war shot in Ted Holmes, formerly of Moree. Ted was well known (with his brother Bob) as one of the up and coming shots of the Commonwealth prior to the outbreak of hostilities. Ted and Bob Holmes were then considered to be among the best tutored clay pigeon shooters in the Commonwealth. In 1939 at Launceston (Tas.) Ted had the Commonwealth double-barrel title "in the bag" and held a clean score at 20 rounds. He failed over the final five releases solely due to lack of practice. The brothers served throughout the war period, and Ted did not enjoy the best of health for a long

time afterwards. However, the old spirit has been re-kindled and having taken up property at Collarenebri, it was a foregone conclusion that the local shooters should request Ted to accept the Presidential office. This he has done and he intends to make Collarenebri second to none among clay pigeon shooting clubs. In a recent letter Ted wrote, "Dear Bill, If you think back to about February or March, 1939, to a Commonwealth Championship shoot in Launceston and a deer hunt in the hills of Tassy. where the only deer hunted was a 30 gal. keg of Cascade and a lot of 'full' alecs with guns, when three members of the party decided that things were getting dangerous and left for safer parts, well then, I guess you will know who is writing to you. One hell of a lot of water has passed under the bridge since then, and until a few months ago it was almost the last time I fired at a clay bird. We did a bit of shooting at the old Moree club after that for a time, and then closed down for the duration. Some time after the war another club was formed there, but with hardly a one of the old mem-bers. I am now 150 miles from Moree and seldom get over there. Some of the fellows round here have shot a few clay birds and were keen to get a club going. They reckoned that I was the only one who knew anything about the game, so they made me President." Ted continues asking for all latest literature and requesting that efforts be made to ensure full supplies of International load shells to country clubs. He concludes, "Have just unearthed an old snap which might interest you, so I am enclosing."

I have been asked which I consider to be the more dangerous weapon — a rifle or a gun. It is, in my opinion, one of those questions to which no proper answer can be given without some qualification. So much depends on the circumstances.

At really close quarters - 15 yds. or so - I consider a gun to be far more dangerous than any rifle. For one thing, in the event of an accidental discharge or of wild, irresponsible shooting, a charge of loose pellets which spreads increasingly as it gets away from the gun, is far more likely to hit somebody than a single bullet which can easily pass between a couple of persons standing well within an inch of one another, without causing any harm whatsoever. For another a charge of loose shot at close range will cause far more bodily harm, in a fair and square hit, than any kind of bullet, large or small, irrespective of velocity or any other ballistic factors. The resultant haemorrhage from a charge of small pellets, even in a non-vital spot, is nearly sure to prove fatal. The laceration caused by pellets at close quarters has to be seen to be believed. A shotgun at short range is the deadliest weapon imaginable.

But the fatal range of a gun is extremely small. At a few hundred yards the only harm that a gun is likely to do is to put out an eye. This is serious enough, but a gun cannot cause death at this range (shot balling or any thousand to one chance excepted). Whereas a rifle may cause death at a mile or more away. Yet the chances are well against an accidental hit.

In these over-populated countries a rifle becomes a far more dangerous weapon than it is in, say, a vast and sparsely populated country like Canada. Gun accidents are, unfortunately, far too common. Every season brings its toll of fatalities and many more non-fatal accidents.

A high-velocity bullet may disintegrate on contact with a hard surface, it is true. The trouble is. it may hit some person or some valuable animal first. There is this, too. The firer of an irresponsible shot does not know what happens eventually to his bullet — or at least he may not know for some time. The firer of a gun at least does know what happens at the time of firing.

I would say that a gun within its very narrow limits is the more dangerous of the two weapons. But those limits are so very narrow that I would rather know there was a dangerous man in the next field armed with a gun than a similar man with a rifle. The feeling that bullets, travelling at a high velocity, may get you or even pass within a few yards of you, is not a pleasant one. Where a gun is concerned you at least know where you are - near enough. But a rifle! Its bullet may get you from the next parish.

Of course, a miniature rifle is safe enough in the proper hands in almost any part. So long as a man studies his background and exercises due care, he can fire away with his .22. But something more powerful is another question.

A great and ever-present danger in low-country rifle shooting is stock. You take a shot at a rabbit sitting on top of the river bank and forget that cattle or sheep may be grazing in the next field. I do not know the effect of a .22 bullet into the middle of a fat bullock at 75 yards, but I should be very sorry to see it happen. Such things must just not be allowed to happen.

If a full sense of the danger of which firearms are capable could be cultivated in every shooter, we should hear of few accidents. I think that many a man has no idea of what a gun or rifle may do. He neither knows nor thinks much about the subject. He is too keen on his individual results. Danger is comfortably forgotten.

The Thistle . .

To most people a thistle is just a thistle, but, as a matter of fact, there are more than a dozen species in this country of which only three or four are really common. Very familiar is the marsh thistle which is a spindly, top-heavy, weak-kneed looking plant with dark green, narrow leaves; but it is not confined, as its name would imply, to marshy places. The creeping thistle has a bushier habit, as botanists put it, with frilly, grey-green leaves. It is the farmer's particular curse, for it spreads by means of creeping underground stems and is most difficult to eradicate. Stouter still is the spear thistle whose stiff leaves end in long needles which easily penetrate the rough shooter's nether garments as he pushes his way through scrub and waste. Lastly among the common species is the dwarf thistle which hugs the ground. Upon this prickly rosette the heedless sportsman, weary with walking on hot days, is apt to seat himself, heavily, and straightway rise up again. The Scotch thistle, so called, is a magnificent weed six foot high and finely flowered. It is a native of Mediterranean lands and will not grow wild in Scotland, though it has established itself farther south in the stronghold of the Sassenach. For some reason the Scots chose it as their heraldic emblem, though the choice is as illogical as that of the British lion. ("Shooting Times")

Tension and Confidence

Hitting them is often difficult because of self-imposed mental hazards.

There will be a few of us, very few indeed, who when we are waiting for our dog to flush the first bird of the season, do not feel excited and tense with the pressure of the big moment when the crackling of the undergrowth and the whirring of wings herald the signal for us to bring into play those many natural forces which brings our gun to the shoulder, line it up on the towering bird, and finally, just at the right moment to intercept the bird's flight (we hope) prompts us to pull the trigger. However, it's not quite as simple as all that, for sometimes even the best of us fail to make the grade, and as we watch the leaves idly flutter to the ground from a shot that was wide of the mark, and hear the mocking, raucous cackling of the cock pheasant as he glides unscathed into the safety of some near distant cover, we mentally curse ourself for allowing that thing called "tension" to temporarily unbalance our judg-

Perhaps you've shot on the clay bird track when competition has been tough and you've just wanted the one bird to go to win the match. Up to that one bird the going has been simple, for as you've called "pull!" your gun has swung effortlessly in the direction of the bird and upon pulling the trigger you've seen it smash in a cloud of dust. Yes, it all seemed so simple at the time you were hitting them, but as you went out on the track to smash the last bird which would make you the winner in the match, you begun to wonder whether it was all as simple as it seemed. As you call "pull!" you wondered all the more, and as the bird arced in the air you realised that it was not so easy as it all seemed, and as you pulled the trigger you knew in your mind that you wouldn't connect. You didn't; neither could you on the second barrel, for by the time you had collected your senses the bird was swiftly dropping

to the ground and your second shot was at least 10 feet above it.

This is tension, for that last bird was difficult simply because the mental hazards we have conjured up within us have made it appear so. It certainly is difficult when we have worked ourself in that condition, for our reactions have been slowed down to a point where eye, brain and physical co-ordination fail to do the split-second operation which times the shot perfectly so that it will reach the target just at the right

In shotgun shooting in particular it has always appeared to me that tension and confidence are closely allied, and that the right combination of the two will bring results. Over-confidence often breeds carelessness or lack of proper tension. Under-confidence breeds fear and indecision — excess tension, one of the greatest bugbears in the art of wing-shooting.

Causes of excess tension vary widely, and often in this respect one man's meat will be another's poison. I once shot with a man who was never too good a shot until he had had several misses in succession. He then used to grit his teeth, yank down his old shooting hat on his head, and with a "do-or-die" look in his eyes connect with shot after shot with almost uncanny precision. Another chap I used to shoot with was just the opposite, for he would shoot remarkably well until he had a miss, and for the rest of the day he would go groping all over the place trying to regain his timing.

Yes, shooting is a mighty curious business, and anyone's timing can go haywire for both physical and emo-tional reasons. For example, a miss-fire or a "no-bird" in a clay match is often sufficient reason to throw some shooters off their next bird or two. A change of ammunition, the mere fact that they have recently had their barrels re-blued, a new gun,

or simply watching other shooters on the track missing. These are all mental hazards which are calculated to breed indecision and loss of timing with many otherwise good shots.

There may be a cure for this, but as long as human nature is what it is, the cure will rest entirely with the individual concerned. However, if I had to make some specific recommendation, I would select a change (temporary, of course) in timing. For example, a naturally fast shot can start looking his target over, for it may be that the tension has speeded him up too much. By this I don't mean that he should place the gun to his shoulder and "ride" the shot, but that he should study the flight more carefully and deliberately, and go into action less hurriedly.

By the same token the habitually slow shot may often improve by speeding up and throwing his usual caution to the winds. Once such a shot starts hitting them he will, I believe, eventually get the feeling that there is plenty of time, for not only will he hit his birds in closer and have more time to get in his second barrel if he misses, but he will develop a feeling that the birds were not moving as fast as they were when his shooting was slower. I believe most good shots when they are "on the beam" experience this sensation, that is why they are able to gear up their mental impulses just at the right moment to make every shot count.

I myself have noticed that on those days when I am not keyed up enough to shoot well, that it is quite plain to me where I have erred. I know I have missed directly that "something" tells me to pull the trigger, but it is then that I inwardly pray that at least part of the spread of my shot pattern will connect with the target.

Other days I may suffer from overtension; it is then I try so hard to make sure of my shots that I get "on" the target, only to get "off" again before my mental impulses have ordered my muscular powers into play to swing and pull. At times like this, one is apt to get really rattled, an unhappy state which only adds insult to injury, and finally

breeds many of the faults which go to overthrow the whole shootingworks of co-ordination out of gear.

This morning, as usual, I went out to take My pup down the yard for a walk.

But he sat on his haunches, looked up in my face,

And straight away started to talk. "Who is this spalpeen who signs himself "Doyle"

Who talks with the brogue and makes out a case

Against me, who is true Irish bred to the bone,
And he says I'm an utter disgrace

to our race?"

He says I am Irish, and begorra he's right,

And me Irish is up and I'm looking for foight:

He can bring out his gun, his shillalah and all,

It's no blarney I'm talking, me back's to the wall.

Bejabbers, I'll pull off his green Irish britches

And scatter them wide o'er the bogs and the ditches,

And the foight will be over before it's begun.

But no! I remember, I'll eat every word,

For Luke has a daughter, a bonny wee bird:

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CHOOSING A SHOTGHN

Buying a gun to-day calls for a lot of consideration and forethought. First and foremost there arises the questions: "How much can I afford to pay for a gun?" or "Can I manage to buy two guns?"

Nowadays the price of shotguns is nearly 200 per cent. higher than the 1939 cost.

There are quite a lot of second-hand guns on the market to-day. Some are quite good, and have, no doubt, seen better days in the gunroom of some of our country houses, and are well worth purchasing. On the other hand, there are some which are quite useless; they may be badly choked, badly balanced, or they may throw a consistently bad scattered pattern. These may be the cause of the guns being on the second-hand market, and such guns are to be avoided. If the purchaser is going to buy a second-hand gun and has not the necessary knowledge himself, then he should get some experienced person to "vet" the weapon for him. But if the sportsman is at the beginning of his shooting career, then it is worth his while to buy a brand new gun to suit himself.

Having decided on the amount of money that can be spent, there then arises the question of the kind of shooting for which the gun is needed.

If more than one gun is being purchased, it dispenses with this problem because each gun can be for different types of shooting; for instance, open or improved cylinder for driven game, full choke in a gun for bird shooting or a 3-in. cased magnum for wildfowl. Lucky is the man who is able to own more than one gun.

But the one-gun rough shooter has to combine all these features into one gun. He shoots at all types of game, and as an open cylinder is unsuitable for shooting pigeon and wildfowl, likewise a full choke is not so suitable for driven game. What he needs is a good all-round gun which is handy in itself and not too heavy.

A magnum, for instance, weighs from 7% to 8 pounds, which is a bit too heavy for the average rough shooter who has to walk to find his game. A 5%-6 pound gun is just right for use, but it may not stand up to a lot of rough usage and most certainly not to the heavier shot charges.

The same applies to cartridges. A 2½-inch case loaded with 1 or 1 1/16 ounces of shot is entirely suitable for game shooting, but not so suitable when used at longer ranges when wildfowling. A 3-inch magnum case loaded with 1½ ounces of shot is excellent for wildfowl, but far too heavy for ordinary game shooting.

The sportsman has now to decide on a compromise between all the aforementioned needs. The actual choice is left to the person who is to use the gun, and the rough shooter would do well to choose a gun something like this—a hammerless 12-bore with 25- or 28-inch barrels which are bored right barrel improved cylinder and the left full choke. They should also be bored to take both 2½-and 2¾-inch cartridges and be nitroproofed for 1¼ ounces of shot. The gun itself should not weigh more than 6¾ pounds.

From this it will be seen that the gun combines the needs already mentioned. Note that the barrels are bored one improved cylinder and one full choke; they also take two lengths of cartridges, the 2½-inch case for every-day use and the 2¾-inch case for longer range work at birds and wildfowl, and a 6¾-pound gun is a handy weapon to use and carry on a day's good, hard shooting.

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
