


THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Of premier importance and a feature that rightly takes pride of position ip this column for the present issue are the sincere congratulations of all Australian sportsmen to our kinsmen in England for the brilliant win gained by the Home Country's International Team for 1952. As mentioned in a stop-press section of the July edition, England won the current year's International, under

year's International, under single-barrel conditions, with the excellent score of 1645 points from Scotland, 1588, then Australia in third place, 1525, followed by Wales, 1490, and Ireland, 1487. Shot at Colwyn Bay, Wales, reports have it that the Great Britain teams enjoyed excellent shooting conditions. Al-though no definite details are to hand at moment of going to press, a private advice gave information that the Yorkshireman, J. Wheater, re-turned a full score of 100 straight truly a brilliant effort with one barrel. As has been explained previously, the Great Britain Associations choose the team by selection method and it is understood that a particular shooter's form over the whole year is taken into account when team selection is being arranged. Australia's method of each man shooting his way into the team is a popular means of team composition, but it is doubtful if Australia's best team is always secured under this system. Notwithstanding, general opinion seems to retain the idea that the Australian team selection method is unlikely to be changed.

Despite suggestions that singlebarrel shooting for future International matches would be permanent in Great Britain, information is to hand that this is by no means certain. Some sections of the overseas administration favour points scoring, others single-barrel, others again double-barrel. The chief popularity for single-barrel shooting appears to come from the North of England and Ireland. It is certainly

not favoured in Wales or amongst the older shooters. Scotland has long favoured points scoring. Opinion is, therefore, varied and strong for the different systems and it seems possible that a referendum or card vote will be taken throughout Great Britain on the question, rather than leaving a decision on the future competitions to the Executive Committees of the several Associations. If a vote is taken by the means mentioned, it is unlikely that a completely finalised opinion will be ascertained before the end of the year. This will mean that the Australian programme for next March will be indefinite until the International Committee considers the opinion given in the proposed vote and reviews the 1953 programme in London late in December or early in January next.

Whatever the future holds for the system of shooting the International Match, the event is now the premier contest of the British Empire and it creates world-wide interest. England deserves great credit for the great success of 1952 and Australia repeats its warmest congratulations.

The first Interstate Teams' Match to be shot in the various States of the Commonwealth within the next few weeks is creating much interest. In Western Australia affiliated clubs there are holding elimination events and the top ten men will represent the State at Perth on Sunday, Oct. 5, to shoot for the honours. In Tasmania, Hobart grounds will be the venue for the elimination contest and the actual Team shoot on Saturday, September 27. Tasmanians expect the event to be the highlight of the shooting season in that State. New South Wales has arranged to conduct a two-day shoot over September 12 and 13 at Griffith. The elimination contest will be held on the opening day and the top ten will shoot as the N.S.W. Team the following day. The Queensland arrangements are well in hand and the competition in that State will be held either at Roma or Townsville - possibly the latter centre. Final dates have not yet been arranged, but a two-day meeting is almost certain, including a Sunday, for the Team shoot. Victorians will meet at Coburg grounds on Saturday, September 13, with an elimination test, commencing at 10 a.m., followed by the Team effort later in the day. The top ten in the elimination contest will comprise the Victorian team. No advices are, at moment of writing, available from South Australia, but it is expected details will be to hand before next issue.

• Those in charge of the Team shoot in each State are reminded that two scorers (a scorer and check scorer) must sign the score sheets, and these must be air-mailed to the Secretary,



Gun Gossip . .



It is, I think, generally agreed that a narrow sighting plane is needed for best results at clay targets, especially those of the downthe-line variety. This is a form of shooting which calls for great accuracy of aim and accurate centring of the pattern. It is necessary to be dead on the target, each time, if you would raise your shooting to high competition level. To be able to break three out of five is not good enough. Hence the popularity of certain types of gun.

But when I have said — and I have said it more than once — that the side-by-side double will never be ousted from its popular place in field shooting, I have thought principally of the past. Not just my past experience, but that of the great shots of former days. Surely what has been done is a criterion.

Figures soon become monotonous, so I am not going to bore you with records. But if you care to consult Gladstone's Shooting Records, or indeed any of the classics, you will read of feats which leave no doubt as to the effectiveness of side-by-side double guns and the loads and cartridges of former days. It is all very well to say that De Grey and Walsingham were superlative shots. There is no question about that. But those tremendous game totals and the amazing averages of kills to cartridges could never have been attained had there been much wrong with standard guns and loads — which latter were little different from those of to-day.

De Grey favoured full chokes in both barrels and Walsingham improved cylinders. De Grey did most of his shooting, I believe, with one ounce of No. 5 shot. This size and load will give a nice pattern from a full choke. And, I daresay, De Grey had his guns specially regulated for No. 5.



Your good publications came this week; they are up to par. Thanks a lot. Have just returned from our State shoot at Walla Walla. It was nice shooting weather, although a stiff cross wind blew most of the time. Arnold Reigger completed his latest run at 1230. This is how he compiled it: 450 straight at Reading, California, then 400 straight the next week at Portland, Oregon. At Walla Walla he missed his 381st target. They tell me he took a slow pull and the target was a "terrible" outlaw, but Arnold shoots at anything under any conditions. His figures top Joe Hiestand's official long run of 1179. Hiestand's 1404 was on his practice and shoot-off included in the official run. Joe's run was made with the Standard load (at that time) of 11 oz. of shot. Reigger's run is with the new Standard load of one and an eighth of shot, 24 drs. of powder No. 8. This is the load that Reigger shoots at everything, even from 25 vards at Walla Walla.

Reigger won Class A with a perfect 200, the doubles with 95, the All Round with 380 x 400 (a low score for him). His handicap score of 91 was also low for him. The Singles Championship with 199; in this event he finished his 1230 straight.

Reigger was not at the Hayden Lake shoot. Rudy Etchen was there and won the Singles with 199, and the doubles with a phenomenal score of 99 x 50 pairs. Rudy was a pro. up to the first of this year. He quit his firm and is now back with the amateurs, and I may say he will give them a rough time. As he is one of the world's greatest, not as good as Reigger, though. I doubt very much if there is anyone in the world who could shoot the scores Reigger does. His handicap shooting has all the long-distance men completely outclassed.

That article by the Englishmen in your recent issue is very interesting. He says all American shooting is one shot at a target except doubles. His is very wrong there. Doubles also is one shot at a target. Should a shooter shoot at the same target with both barrels, his pair would be lost - lost regardless of whether he broke it or not. I have never seen a shooter here use both barrels on the same target.

Will be looking forward to the result of the International. It should be common property by now. Hope "our" boys came out on top again.



The Cult of the Single Barrel

The following is another interesting article by Mr. E. M. Ginn and is published by permission of The Editor, "Shooting Times", London. The previous contribution by Mr. Ginn was of much interest to Australian readers—the following appendage doubtless will have a similar reception.

When the executive committee of the Clay Pigeon Shooting Association decided to fall in line with the accepted practice of single shot down-the-line clay target shooting, a practice adopted by the U.S.A. long ago — and it must be borne in mind that more shots are fired at clay targets in the U.S.A. in one week than are fired in one year over here -there was a certain amount of adverse criticism. This criticism came mostly from the older members, men who could well afford to use two cartridges on one clay target. The younger members, most of whom could not afford this expenditure on cartridges, welcomed the new rule with open arms, for two reasons, both connected with the expense of clay target shooting today.

The first is expenditure on cartridges. It is obvious that to be good

enough to stand any chance at all at any C.P.S.A. open meeting a certain amount of practice is necessary, and if you are to use both barrels at an open meeting, i.e. "kills to count" or "points system", then you must practise with both barrels, and the expenditure in cartridges used in practice will by far exceed those used at any open meetings. This, of course, also refers to practice for any of the international events.

Secondly, in the past the man owning a gun with one barrel only of full or three-quarter choke has always felt himself to be at a disadvantage shooting against a man who can afford to purchase a special trapshooting gun with both barrels choked (usually three-quarters right and full left), and indeed he is in all events in which the full use of both barrels at one clay target is allowed. This feeling of disadvantage has led to many young shots dropping out of the game altogether, a very regrettable state of affairs, especially when we need young blood to carry on the best traditions of the sport.

Splendid Value for Money.

There are on sale to-day at least four British-made single barrel guns; all are well-made, highly efficient weapons, and any of them can be slightly modified to include those refinements required for trapshooting at a moderate cost. None of these guns costs more than £20 - including Purchase Tax — some of them even less, and all are wonderful value for money at to-day's prices.

You will often see a gun adver-tised as a "good killer" or "hard hitting". These loose terms mean just nothing at all. No gun can be a harder hitter or a better killer than its degree of choke (if pro-perly "regulated") and the efficiency of the ammunition used in it, i.e., any two guns having exactly the same degree of choke, shooting exactly the same make and load of cartridge, will have exactly the same hard hitting or killing efficiency, the only possible difference being that the gun having the heavier, stiffer barrel will give slightly closer patterns. Of course, a skilled barrel regulator can regulate a barrel with a certain load of powder, a certain weight and a certain size of shot, to give its best pattern with that load.

An Experimental Rule.

We can fully understand why those of the older school did not at first like the C.P.S.A. rule (which, by the way, is an experimental rule of single barrel down the line shooting. These men can afford the extra outlay on cartridges and for years past they have schooled themselves both in practice and in actual competition to rely upon second barrel kills, or "full use of gun" as it is known, and they already have a gun with both barrels well choked. Up to now my remarks have been confined to clay target shooting, but can equally be applied to game and vermin shooting. All shooting is psychological; it is a state of mind, and if our subconscious mind knows that we have two shots at hand, then we are apt to regard the second barrel as essential. I feel sure that not only those who have adversely criticised the C.P.S.A. single barrel rule, but shooting men

in general, would find practice in the use of a single barrel a great asset. Knowing they have only one shot at their command, they would learn to concentrate far more on the first shot --- make the shot count more than they do at the moment, and in these days of limited supply and high cost of cartridges, this would be all to the good.

I do not suggest for one moment that we should scrap our double barrel guns; the second barrel is at times invaluable, but we must try all we can to make our kill with the first shot and regard the second barrel as an extra shot for an extra kill, not as a shot in reserve to retrieve a miss with the first shot, as so many of us are apt to do. And we do this because over the years we have trained ourselves to rely on the second shot, perhaps to the detriment of our performance with the first. I suggest we approach our shooting in a new frame of mind, load one barrel only and train the mind to the fact that if we miss with the first shot, we have "had it".

If we can do this, it may even lead to an improvement in the standard of our shooting as a whole, and I would even suggest that for our less serious shooting. I mean that for pottering and rough shooting, not shooting at driven game, we should try one of these cheap (at to-day's prices) single-barrel guns; we may have a surprise in store, we may shoot even better with the narrow sighting plane of a single barrel than we have ever shot with a side-by-side double.

Narrow Sighting Plane.

Now, is there anything at all in this idea of an advantage of the narrow sighting plane of a single barrel? This is my answer: go to any championship meeting of the C.P.S.A., inspect the guns carefully, and you will find that under-andover guns, which are, of course, the equivalent of single barrels as regards sighting plane, outnumber the side-by-side doubles by over two to one. You will also find quite a few single barrel pumps and semiautomatics in use; in fact, the use of

these guns is gaining ground over here in spite of the difficulty of obtaining them. On the Continent a side-by-side is

almost unknown for clay target shooting, and the use of the underand-over is almost universal. Moreover, it is not only in the realm of clay target shooting that the underand-over is supreme, for it is also the most popular type for general field shooting. The British-made under-and-over is an example of gunmaking craftsmanship at its finest, but it is expensive, although I hear that a medium price British underand-over is in preparation. In the U.S.A., where, as I have said before, shooting of all kinds is "big busi-ness", the side-by-side is almost dead both at the traps and for general field shooting; there is hardly a single American firm building sideby-side doubles to-day, the pump action repeater easily taking the lead, followed by the semi-automatic and the under-and-over in that order, and for down-the-line singles shooting the single shot, single barrel has pride of place.

I have only given these facts to illustrate my point that there must be something in this theory of an advantage inherent in a narrow sighting plane; and it may be that in time we will use the single barrel, single shot far more than we do now. We may even drift back to the underand-over. After all, the first double barrel guns made in England were under-and-over, not side-by-side.
