





THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

The Interstate Teams' contest, the various sections of which will be completed prior to the next issue of this publication, is proving of great interest throughout the Commonwealth. The match, it is expected, will ultimately rival in importance the annual International Match, which has done so much to put the sport of so much to put the sport of clay pigeon shooting well on the sporting stage in Aus-tralia. Clubs conducting the

Interstate sections are advised to ensure that the rules are obeyed in every detail, as per the directions issued by the Executive Committee and promulgated by circular to all clubs concerned and Association Executive officials. If the slightest Executive officials. If the slightest doubt exists in regard to a proposed team member's eligibility on the day of the shooting of the match, it would be better in the interest of the competition to discard the proposed team membership of the shooter under review. In this regard it is important to remember that all team members must have resided in the State for which they will shoot for at least for which they will shoot for at least the preceding twelve months.

Interstate Teams' competition is undoubtedly an additional step forward in the development of clay pigeon shooting in Australia - may the best team win the inaugural contest.

Recently a northern State club official wrote to the Association seeking information as to whether his club could stage a District title, that is institute a new District championship, without reference to the governing body. For the information of all club officials who may think in the same direction, it is mentioned that "the Association controls all championships, whether Common-wealth, State or District." This is a direction which has existed since the inception of the Association. These titles are allocated annually by the Executive Committee. Rules for the



conduct of events are also laid down by the Association. Dates for the holding of open championships must be approved by the Association before the events are publicised. Club championships are not included in this direction. Club titles are entirely the domestic affair of the clubs concerned and the Association does not direct the conduct of these in any way, other than always expecting affiliated units to ensure that normal shooting rules are observed.

On occasions individual shooters write to the Association seeking review of their handicaps. Shooters are advised that the Association cannot accept advice from an individual shooter regarding his mark. Any request for a review of handicap should come through an affiliated unit of the Association, which is an affiliated club.


The A.C.P.T.S.A. is indebted to two well wishers of the Association

Hints for Referees

(By Douglas M. Pack, Roma, Old.) These hints are designed to assist referees in the practical application of the rules and to introduce some method into the art of refereeing.

Constant study and revision of the rules of shooting is absolutely essential to good refereeing.

THE TRAP.

Before shooting commences in any competition a referee should check the trap to ascertain that the pigeons are thrown-

(a) at the correct height,

(b) for the correct distance, and (c) within the prescribed angles.

Due allowance must be made for "wind" conditions in making these checks.

If undue variations in height, distance or angles occur during any event, shooting should be stopped and the trap corrected.

SQUADS.

The referee should be provided with a list of competitors in each squad and their handicaps in handicap events.

As soon as the squad is due at the traps, marshall the shooters to their correct tracks and call any laggards promptly.

Make sure both the puller and scorer are ready for action before shooting commences.

In championship events keep all competitors on their correct shooting marks and in handicap events only permit them to retire on their own tracks to the mark of the back marker in each squad.

Take particular note of the competitors on tracks Nos. 1 and 5 before shooting commences. You will then know that the squad must change tracks when No. 5 has had his shot and when No. 1 competitor shoots from No. 5 track, it is the last round of the squad.

Order the squad to "change" at the end of each round, or two rounds as the case may be.

No shooter should be allowed to leave his shooting track until the whole squad has finished shooting.

THE COMPETITOR.

It is particularly the referee's duty to see that the competitor is standing within the limits of his bounds. He should stand behind his shooting mark and within eighteen inches on either side of it.

Concrete tracks are usually 24 inches wide and this will not allow a competitor to shoot with both his feet off the concrete track.

As each competitor commences to shoot, check the position of his feet and if he is standing outside his bounds, call a "No bird" if his shot breaks the pigeon, otherwise call "Lost."

After checking the position of the competitor's feet, focus your attention upon the top of the trap house and listen intently for the call of "Pull."

After each shot make certain the competitor breaks his gun or opens the breach before turning round.

If any competitor is drunk, disorderly or handles his gun in a dan-gerous manner he should be sharply reprimanded and if his bad conduct continues, he should be disqualified on the spot by the referee (under the

Do not during any competition-

- (a) Offer any advice to a competitor to correct any mis-takes he may be making, or
- (b) Make any comment on the flight of the pigeons whatever the cause.

It is the competitor's task to cope with the conditions of wind, weather and the like and unfair to others to assist him.

A competitor has no right to "bar" a bird whatever the cause. He may claim a "balk", but the referee must make the decision.

LOADING.

A competitor must load his gun only when at the firing point facing the trap.

When inexperienced shooters are at the traps and in handicap events when the competitors in a squad are on different marks, insist upon a competitor loading only when it is his turn to shoot.

Experienced referees who are really confident of their ability to control a squad may, in championship events and in handicap events where all competitors in the squad are shooting from the same mark, permit one competitor to be shooting, the next one to be loaded, and the next one to be loading provided they are all on their marks facing the trap. It will speed up the shooting, but safety should not be sacrificed for speed, and it is best to be cautious.

In single barrel shooting, permit only one cartridge to be loaded and do not permit any dummy cartridge or empty shell to be inserted in a second barrel under any circumstances.

It is the competitor's responsibility to fire the correct barrel.

THE REFEREE'S POSITION.

Where should a referee stand? The best position is about one yard behind the shooting mark of the competitor and not more than two tracks away from him, but in no circumstances should the referee stand in a position where his presence is likely to distract the attention of the competitor.

A referee must be constantly alert and listening for "fizzers" (faulty ammunition), the click of a misfire, simultaneous discharge from both barrels and the like, but if he is not in close proximity to the competitor, the chances are that he will miss these occurrences particularly on grounds where more than one trap is operating at the same time.

No one can referee effectively from an armchair or the scorer's table or while engaged in conversation with anyone.

THE BIRD.

A referee's vision should be riveted on the top of the trap house before

the competitor calls "pull". He should be ready to make any one of three calls—"No Bird", "Kill" or "Lost".

If the pigeon is too high, too low, too wide or broken on release, the call "No Bird" should be made promptly whether the competitor takes the pigeon or not, but if a competitor scores a "kill" on a difficult pigeon before it is declared a "No Bird", give him the benefit of his good shot. On the other hand, if the pigeon is too easy, it should be declared a "No bird", whatever the result of the competitor's shot.

Every pigeon except those "killed" should be watched right to the ground. It sometimes happens that a pigeon, particularly a "dusted" one, will break close to the ground and a referee should not therefore be too hasty with his call of "Lost". It is best to time the call "Lost" to coincide with the pigeon striking the ground and if the pigeon should break, the decision can be altered immediately without inconvenience to the scorer.

THE GUN AND AMMUNITION.

A thorough knowledge of loading, trigger and firing mechanisms and of safety catches on all types of guns is most desirable.

Carelessness in loading will sometimes result in a misfire which is not a mechanical fault and a referee must be very smart to pick it. Watch second barrel shots with automatic guns particularly. In double barrel guns (including under and over guns) with a single selective trigger and in automatic guns, the failure of a shooter to release the trigger after the first shot will cause a "misfire" in the second barrel and such is not due to any mechanical fault. The test is simple: Take the shooter's gun, which must remain pointed over the trap with mechanism untouched, pull the trigger. If it discharges, there could be no mechanical fault and the bird must be "lost".

A smart shooter may deceive an unwary referee in the matter of the safety catch, by flicking it off before the referee comes to investigate and claiming a misfire. Apply the same test.

The wads, particularly in some of the imported cartridges, can be very clearly seen and it is often difficult to tell the difference between a wad and a piece broken from the pigeon. In such cases give your decision as you see it—not as the spectators think. A referee's decision is final on such points and very few competitors will complain if a referee is conscientious and efficient.

Always remember that the referee who never made a mistake doesn't exist.

GENERAL CONTROL.

The greatest asset in controlling a squad is a loud and distinct voice and clear, crisp decisions. Every referee should learn to "throw" his voice properly—the sounds should come from the roof of the mouth rather than deep down in the throat.

Voices vary in their quality and carrying power and those with weak voices should try to improve them by practice. The competitor, the scorer and the spectators all want to hear your decisions.

Do not allow the spectators or any bookmakers to distract the competitors. If they do, stop the shooting and ask them for their co-operation.

A call of "No bird" if a competitor misses a pigeon when a bookmaker behaves in such a manner as to distract the competitor's attention will usually curb the bookmakers, and a referee has full authority to make such a decision.

Direct the competitors to change at the end of each round or two rounds, as the case may require, inform them when the squad is finished and instruct them to check their scores before leaving the tracks. Call the next squad to the tracks while the preceding squad is retiring and marshall them into their correct positions.

Concentrate on the job all the time—you cannot be a good referee unless you do so. So many things can happen and a referee must be constantly alert.

Do not wear dark glasses when refereeing — you may miss those fine pieces broken from the pigeon if you do.

Make your decision and stick to it. Carry the "Rules of Shooting" in your pocket to settle any arguments if your decision is queried, but do not allow any competitor to argue with you while a squad is shooting. The right time is when the squad finishes.

Good referees rarely have any arguments.

QUESTIONS.

If you have any questions to ask on the interpretation of the rules of shooting or their practical application, let the Association Secretary have them so that rulings may be obtained and others may benefit from your experiences.



Clay Pigeon Shooting at Helsinki

Mr. Enoch Jenkins, Welsh International Champion trapshot and captain of the Welsh Team, was a member of the British Team which took part in the XV Olympia, clay pigeon shooting section, at Helsinki recently.

Mr. Jenkins wrote to the A.C.P.T.S.A. Secretary under date of August 1, and his impressions, which are of great interest to shooters on this side of the world, follow. He

"Having just returned from the Olympic Games Trapshooting contest at Helsinki, and as that section of the Games will no doubt come under your leadership in Melbourne in 1956, I thought perhaps you would be pleased to receive a report and full scores of the shoot.

The shooting contest was held at Huoplahli, on the shooting grounds of Mr. Conrad Huber, the well-known Finnish shot, on July 25 and 26, over one set of traps. I am pleased to say that the shoot was carried out in a very efficient manner and to the satisfaction of shooters and all concerned, although the weather was not too kind.

One set or range of traps consists One set or range of traps consists of 15 single traps, set in a straight line, one after the other and divided into 5 groups of 3 traps, the distance between the centre trap in each group is 5 metres (about 5½ yards). The traps are placed in a sheltered trench with roof, the upper edge of which must not be more than 20 inches.

The shooting stations, 1 to 5, are placed behind the centre trap of each group and level with the trap trench roof.

At the commencement of the shooting 5 shooters must be ready to shoot, one at each station. The sixth shooter must be ready to take his place on No. 1 station counting from the left.

When the shooter on No. 1 station has fired at the first target he must move to No. 2 stand as soon as No. 2 has fired, and so forth, until 25 birds each are shot.

The shooting conditions, as at all Olympic Games, were difficult. Fast Olympic Games, were difficult. Fast targets travelling approximately 80 yards at all elevations and angles, and the background consisting of fir trees and granite rock (as most of the Finnish landscape does) with changing light and occasional showers, made smashing the black yellow capped targets far from easy.

Arriving from England on July 20, instead of July 17, as previously arranged, I missed one of my allotted days for practice, that with changing loads and one barrel to heavy loads and two barrels was not to my advantage. Being drawn No. 1, I had the honour of opening the shoot, which commenced at 9.0 a.m., 8.0 a.m. British summer time. At that time the light was bad and I could not really get going, although a finishing score of 89 could not be considered bad in the circumstances. After the first day's shooting I felt very confident and turned in a better score and wished I could have had the first over over again. There were 40 shooters at Helsinki, two per team, compared with 150 in Berlin in 1936 with six men per team and two sets of traps.

Originally in other Games in which I have competed - in 1920 at Antwerp, and 1924 in Paris - 5 men completed a team, with three reserves. The three high-gun men in each team to compete for the Individual Prize.

As usual, I found all the shooters a grand lot of fellows. A number of them had been to the World's Championship meeting in Oslo and were in very good form. Several of them I had met previously in Berlin and Paris. The Olympic Village, where approximately 4,000 competitors were housed, was very comfortable, with all conveniences. Feeding arrangements were excellent, with a plentiful supply of delicious food, and it was really amusing to see some of the heavy men consume a meal equal to two or three weeks of our English ration.

The Stadium when full, with the colours of the competing nations splashed all around, was a wonderful splashed all around, was a wonderful sight. I would like to say here, 'Bravo Australia', you sent some wonderful athletes, especially Marjorie Jackson, who brought back memories of Jack Donaldson the "Blue Streak". I met Jack many times and shot over traps with him on Cardiff Racecourse many years ago.

As soon as I receive photographs from Helsinki I will forward same to you.

While shooting my second 25 birds on Saturday, July 26, at Helsinki, No. 6 trap broke down. Instead of the trapper hoisting a flag, I was horrified to see a lady's face appear at the end of the trench, when I had my gun covering No. 1 trap: it just shook me up.
