THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

1953 A.C.P.T.S.A. Championship allocation, which received the attention of the A.C.P.T.S.A. Executive Committee early in October, will be published in full in the November edition of this publication. Affiliated clubs and shooters interested are requested to accept the intimation as official and prepare club programmes for 1953 accordingly. Club secretaries are again reminded that all dates for open championships and events where £50 or over in prize money is provided for any one event, must first be approved by the Association. Officials who have already applied for 1953 dates are advised to confirm these through the Secretary A.C.P.T.S.A. early in the new season.



The inaugural Interstate Teams' Match series will have been completed prior to the next issue (at time of writing, N.S.W., Tasmania, Victoria and Queensland had already finalised their respective sections of the match). Detailed scores of all teams will be printed in time for November inclusion. A few queries which arose during the deciding of the series in various States will have the scrutiny and consideration of the Executive Committee and any anomalies reported will be regulated in plenty of time before the 1953 series is entered upon.

Scores of the Great Britain Teams in the 1952 International series are published this month. Congratulations are again extended to the English team for its brilliant success. Australians would also like to extend further congratulation to the Yorkshire shooter, J. Wheeler, who gained the Empire High-gun for 1953 with 100 straight—a really brilliant effort under single-barrel conditions. Australia's high-gun, 21-year-old J. Bryant Junr., was second to Wheeler

with 97/100—also a sterling performance and one in which all Australian sportsmen will approvingly share. Due to local difficulties, New Zealand did not field a team this year, but information is to hand from the headquarters of the N.Z.G.C.A. that our sister Dominion is a certain starter in 1953. Arrangements are already in hand to stage a special all New Zealand series, with the International Match as the highlight, probably at Wellington. The date arranged will be very close to the usual period in March when Australia's best strive for International honours. By this arrangement New Zealand will now be able to ensure that scores recorded there will be in London in plenty of time for the dead-line date about mid-June. New Zealand's inclusion in the International will do much to bring this interesting contest into greater limelight in the sphere of world clay pigeon shooting, particularly as it applies to the sport in the British Empire.

Several queries were received during September. Answers were requested through this column. A Queenslander asked the following, "If a shooter has a mis-fire with his first barrel, but pulls his second barrel and misses, I would call it lost, would that be correct?" The decision in accordance with the rules is, of course, "lost bird". The shooter who experienced the mis-fire on the first barrel should immediately call for the referee and hand him the gun

with mechanism untouched. The referee then decides, after trying the gun, what the correct decision is. However, if the shooter fires his second barrel and misses, he must abide by the result, which is "lost bird". (Details of procedure, etc., are clearly outlined in the September issue of "News", in the article on Refereeing by D. M. Pack).

A second query refers to a bird that "goes straight up or out of bounds". This is obviously a "no-bird" and the referee should call this decision quickly, if possible before the shooter makes any attempt to shoot at it. It is not a matter for the shooter to decide, it is clearly a referee matter, even if the shooter accepts it and hits it.

A further query concerned automatic guns. The questioner asked, "Can a simultaneous discharge be declared against a shooter using an auto-loading gun?" The answer is Yes. The discharge report will be slightly different from the regular double-barrel gun, but is easily picked by a careful referee. This is a gun fault due to a worn firing pin. The shooter should be warned by the referee that the gun is defective and further use may result in "lost bird" decision being given against him.

U.S.A. Shooting . .

From Rex Miles, Secretary, Washington State Association

I have nothing official about the Olympic Games trapshoot. Don't think that any of our good shooters would qualify, as all of them have won plenty of money purses. Amateurs in this country compete for money and the purses out West are always big. My son, Keith, for example, has won about a thousand dollars this year, didn't win top place in any event, but was, with one exception, up in the big money. Professionals are shooters working for Arms and Powder Companies, suppliers to the sport, and cannot shoot for the money (only in special events

provided for them). Think this answers your questions.

Well, Bill, I have been on another trip to Canada, this time to Harrison Hot Springs B.C., to take in the Pacific Indian shoot. Harrison Spa is one of the outstanding resorts of Canada. It really is a wonderful place. Our Mayor, Art Meehan, two others from Spokane, made the trip with me. The roads are excellent. It is exactly 432 miles from my house to the Hotel, this is the same distance as Lake Louise. Now about the Grand American. Arnold Reigger is making his presence felt (as usual). The first preliminary day he broke the 100 (16 yards) and 99/100 from 25 yards to win the Handicap. He broke 97/100 from 25 yards in another Preliminary. There were four 98's, the wind and rain affected the scores, as it usually takes a 100 straight to win. The following extract from a newspaper explains details of the Grand American winner (Aug. 22) and also the North American title and Champion of Champions race.

"VANDALIA," OHIO

Another unknown, 44-year-old Orval E. Voorhees, of Grand Island, Neb., won trapshooting's biggest prize—the grand American handicap.

The Nebraska garage owner scored 98 of 100 from 18 yards to outshoot a field of 1754, fourth largest in the "roaring grand's" history, in a heavy wind which at times reached almost gale proportions. It was one of the few times in the 53 years of firing at the big event that the classic has not wound up in a tie, necessitating a shoot-off.

Only one shooter, Ned Lilly of Stanton, Mich., who has been a hot-shot around the grand for some 20 years, menaced the new champion, Lilly, who won the North American junior championship in 1932 and 1933, the national doubles championship in 1937, the North American Clay target championship and the high overall championship in 1933, broke 97 from the extreme handicap yardage of 25 in this event.

Voorhees explained his victory by saying, "We shoot in the wind all the time in Nebraska and that breeze didn't bother me much." He broke 89 in the preliminary handicap, but turned the score around in final round.

Rudy Etchen, red-haired, 29-year-old Sun Valley, Idaho, crackshot who

won the North American clay target championship as a professional a year ago, did it again today as an amateur at the 53rd Grand American trapshoot.

Etchen won last year with 198 of 200 in the 16-yard classic, but he had to break 300 straight today to beat out an amateur field of 710 of the western hemisphere's finest gun pointers.

Reinders Wins Big One

Vic Reinders, 45-year-old Waukegan, Wis., college professor, won the Champion of Champions race for the third time. He broke 200 straight to take the coveted title, breaking the second century in a shoot-off after being tied with a perfect score in the regular event by Arnold Reigger of Seattle, M. D. Clark of Woodbury, Conn., and Dr. H. L. Roberts of Salem, Va., who finished in that order.

Reinders won the Champ of Champs, in which only state title holders compete, for Texas in 1945 while in the army, and in 1946 for Wisconsin. Mrs. Frances King of Atlanta, Ga., and Miss Iva Pembroke of Phillipsburg, Kan., who finished one-two today in the Women's North American clay targets race, scored 99 of 100 in the Champ of Champs competition. They were the only women in the field and each dropped a target in her last 25."

"Tips" and "Tails"



Writing from Katanning (W.A.) club president, B. J. Bennecke, who was recently on a world tour carrying an introductory letter from the Association, states, "I wish to thank you for your letter received early this year introducing me to

clubs in England and U.S.A., which I found most useful. Unfortunately I was not able to spend as much time with the gun clubs and their members as I would have liked, as my time was limited. I did not have the pleasure of meeting Mr. Harry Rogers, Secretary of the English C.P.A., but spoke to him several times on the phone. When he heard I would be in Leeds he wrote the President of the Northern Districts area where I met Mr. Walter Sable, one of the leading shots in England, who showed me various grounds, and I participated in a shoot at Wetherby. A young club of which Mr. Sable is President. The club grounds I saw were beautiful and I cannot speak too highly of the members. They couldn't do enough for me. In America I had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Rex Miles, also Mr. A. Rhyle, at the Pacific International shoot at Sacramento, California. The President and other members of this club were very good to me, showing me everything. The club house and grounds were beautiful; eight traps were in operation at the same time, all electrically loaded. This was a four-day shoot with many events, including the Pacific Coast Championship. I was asked to take part in some of the events, but when I saw the high standard of their shooting and being only a moderate myself, I declined. As an Australian representative I would have made a poor showing with a borrowed gun and strange conditions. There were shooters there from the whole of the

Pacific Coast area; their top team would later shoot off the American Championship with the East Coast. The automatic gun seemed very popular, next being the under and over. I saw a new Remington automatic there, 330 dollars worth (£148 Australian) which I admired very much, but dollars are unprocurable for a purchase of this. The electric loading and release is a big improvement on our manual operated trap at our club. Unfortunately I did not see the end of this shoot, as I was back in Australia a few days after its completion. I hope one day to again see America and its hospitable people. Thanking you for letter of introduction."

A new club is forming at Blackall in Queensland. President is Norman Banks.

Milton on the N.S.W. south coast has a clay pigeon shooting club. The club recently affiliated with the Association. W. R. Pinder is club hon. secretary.

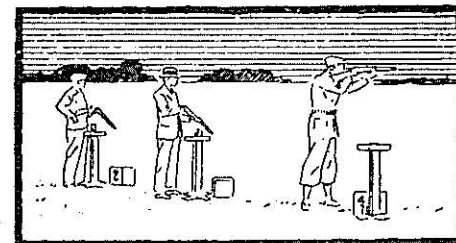
replacing Ron Williamson, who retired for business reasons. Ron will co-operate as assistant. The club looks forward to big development in the future.
