

THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

The evergreen subject of shooters' handicaps is always a point of interest for the commencement of discussion and perhaps unfinished argument among shooting sportsmen. On the question of Association marks, it should always be understood that handicap allocations are assessed on the recommendations of clubs. If clubs fail in their duty to forward recommendations on this important subject, nothing but

unsatisfactory handicaps can result. In a recent letter from a shooter outside Victoria the writer mentioned that "some of the best shots are up on 12, 13 and 14 vards in this State and continue to remain there despite their constant winning." If the facts are as stated, some club officials in the State under reference are sadly lacking in efficient administration. The Association system of assessing handicaps is simple and easy to apply. On receipt of recommendations from clubs, outlining reasons for recommendations, shooters are allotted Association marks. It does not always follow that a recommendation is accepted by the Association. However, if appropriate reasons for recommendation is attached, it is the usual practice to accept the advice providing the recommended mark is not an absurd and unreasonable variation. It should always be remembered that recommendations should take into account the shooter who has lost form — in other words, recommendations should refer to those to be brought forward as well as those entitled to be handicapped beyond prevailing yardage.

An advice has come in from a shooter who visited an interstate club (outside Victoria) mentioning that he was refused permission to shoot with an automatic gun. The shooter asks for Association regulation on the point. The club concerned is certainly taking up an unusual line of reasoning. Providing the usual safety rules are observed, there can



surely be little difference whether a shooter uses an automatic, side-byside, or under-and-over. The Association has issued no ruling on the matter. The advice to the shooter is to shoot where he can use the weapon of his preference.

A Queensland club has sought information as to whether the Association still requires handicap returns to be furnished regularly? Also the same club asks for the usual procedure when a home secretary or handicapper wishes to adjust his own handicap. The only occasion when the Association requires a recommendation on the handicap of any shooter is when the mark is due for revision, either forward or back. The usual procedure for a home secretary or handicapper is to arrange for the club President to adjust the handicap, make a notation on the registration card of the shooter concerned and advise the Association of the facts within three days. This procedure is accepted by the Association.

Recently a shooter compiled a break of 43 straight. Anxious to secure a 50 break badge, he then arranged with the club management to allow him to shoot on a further seven rounds, not in competition. The application for the break recognition could not be accepted by the Association for the reason that the final seven rounds were not registered in competition. It is pointed out that break recognition can only be accepted providing the score has been registered in competition, under double or single-barrel conditions and providing no other form of competition or practice intervened.

A club during the past month sought information as to whether it was eligible to hold a championship on its grounds without first obtaining Association permission. On this point clubs are advised that club championships are a domestic affair of the club concerned, which means that these events are under the club's own management. All other "open" championships, whether Commonwealth, State or District titles, are under Association jurisdiction and must be approved by the A.C.P.T.S.A. both in regard to allocation, conditions and date of holding.

Extract from A.T.A. Rule Book :--


Sixth --- PROFESSIONAL Any person who receives compensation from any of the ammunition, arms. or target companies or individuals directly affiliated with these industries, for shooting, or for the dis-play and sale of their merchandise or has his or her expenses paid in or has his of her expenses paid in full or in part, or who receives shells, gun, powder or other shoot-ing paraphernalia free of charge or who is enabled to purchase any of the commodities manufactured by any of these aforesaid companies or individuals used for transhooting at less than regular wholesale prices, shall be considered A PROFESSIONAL TRAPSHOT, and as such shall not be permitted to compete for money or trophies in registered shooting matches or tournaments. except in those events specially provided for professionals. Exceptions! (Indian and Fraternal Organizations.)

Seventh — Any person who has been in the employ of any of the aforementioned companies or individuals as a professional trapshoot, salesman, demonstrator, or displayer of the merchandise of any of these aforementioned companies, may regain his or her amateur standing 6 months after termination of said employment by making application to the officials of the A.T.A. and receiving their approval.

Eighth — Nothing in the above section shall affect the amateur rights of those persons who are employed by any of the aforementioned companies in a manual capacity and who in every sense of the word are amateurs, nor shall any person connected with any of these aforesaid companies in an official capacity be considered a professional trapshot providing each pay his or her expenses and conducts himself or herself according to the A.T.A. rules.

Ninth—All other persons are to be considered as amateurs and shall be entitled to all of the rights as set forth in these rules. Best wishes to all in Australia.

Bangall Club (Qld.) has affiliated with the Association. Club secretary is J. Crombie of Marita, Longreach.


