



### THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Within the next few weeks members of the Executive Committee in the States of Committee in the States of Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania, will decide the State venue for the holding of the 1953 Interstate Teams' Match. This event, the inaugural contest of which was held in 1952, now ranges in comparable importance with the annual International series. In 1952 New South Wales returned top South Wales returned top



All shooters taking part must necessarily be registered with the A.C.P.T.S.A. for 1953 - 1953 registration cards will be required to be produced prior to the start of the elimination event. Inclusion of unregistered shooters will bring about instant disqualification of the whole team. Whilst Executive Committee members in the States mentioned will decide the location of each State Team competition in their own States, it has been decided to arrange



for the Secretary of the South Australian Gun Club to handle operations in South Australia, and similarly the Secretary of the Perth Gun Club to take charge of affairs so far as Western Australia is concerned. All competition in connection with the Interstate Teams' Match is required to be completed prior to the first week-end in October and results must reach the Secretary A.C.P.T.S.A. not later than October 12, 1953.

Venues decided upon will be advertised in Association "News" at least one month prior to the holding of the event, thus allowing for all registered shooters interested to have ample notice.

Notwithstanding publicised instructions on the method of applying for break badges, quite a number of club officials continue to lodge applications for break recognition whilst omitting to substantiate application with original (or certified copies) of the score sheets. It should be clearly understood that break recognition cannot be entertained unless the score sheets are forwarded to the Association secretary. Clubs are also reminded that only one break badge will be issued in the categories of 50, 75 and 100 or over. Should a shooter return a second or later sequence in the above classifications, no further badges will be issued.

The question of colours for championship sashes has again been raised

during the past month. The official direction from the Association is that colours to be used are, for all Commonwealth championships-dark blue, for all State Championships - red or maroon, for District titles - white. It is an Association direction that these colours are not to be departed from at any time. It is optional for a club holding a District title to supply a sash to the winner. Any colours, other than those mentioned. may be used for club championships or any other purpose required by the club. Orders for sashes should be posted direct to the official Association sash makers, Messrs. W. Flattely & Son, Pty. Ltd., 301 Lonsdale Place, Melbourne, C.1.

Readers will observe that the full list of registrations is published again in this issue. The list contains all those financial as at end of May, 1953. The names of a number of shooters who delayed payment into June had been removed from the list just prior to going to press. Those concerned are advised that their names will be reinstated in the July publication. ### GUN GOSSIP

By NORTH COUNTRY

One or two questions as to the killing power of the popular little .410 bore gun. About this gun is that there appear to be two schools of ideas—the ideas of those who tend to exaggerate what it will do, and of those who try to debunk it as some kind of trivial toy. Neither of these schools of opinion is fair to it

The .410 firing the full-length cartridge is most certainly no toy. Indeed at close range it is as deadly as any gun, for there is nothing it would not kill. It is altogether wrong and misleading to refer to it as a toy—as some layman who purchased one for his son might find out to his cost. But it is equally foolish to shower upon it virtues which it does not possess. The fact is it is an excellent gun for garden use, for potting rats about the policies of the home or among the farm buildings, for shooting some of the vermin in the game preserves during the breeding season when as little disturbance as possible should be caused, and for certain rabbiting and even for bird shot at close range over decoys.

That is the kind of shooting for which the .410 is best suited — shots up to 25 yards. If the gun is well choked and used with the Almac cartridge — an all-metal case — it will be found to be hard-hitting and effective; or with the full-length paper case. But my advice is that it should not be expected to do more than I have mentioned. It is not a game gun, though, of course, it will kill game at close range as well as a 12-bore.

The ammunition for this gun has a generally wide distribution and can be purchased at most retail shops. The manufacturers have concentrated on this bore, as it is a most convenient size for the purposes stated. It is a very nice little gun to have about the place. But it should be confined to these limits and not used for serious game shooting, where it is sure to be expected to do too much. That is how it gets a bad name,


which it does not deserve. For its rightful job, it is a good gun.

In America it is bored for a longer cartridge and to fire a much heavier charge. Then, of course, it will kill farther. But it will also weigh more and cease to be the extremely light little weapon we know here.

The .410 is a better-shooting weapon than it was 40 or 50 years ago. Like the .22 rifle, it has had a great deal of work and thought put into it. It has advanced and I think it will surely hold its own, so long as extravagant claims are not made for it.

But I am not in favour of such a small bore as a first field weapon for the young shot. Let him have one by all means, for knocking about in garden, orchard and paddock. We can all of us make use of one in this way. When, however, the "Hope of the family" takes his place in the line with adult sportsmen, he should be armed with something better. If he should fire a risky shot, he is as likely to do harm with one gun as the other. And by the time he is ready to go in the field he is certainly strong enough to carry, say, a 20-bore. Thus equipped, he is more on a footing with his seniors and in a better position to show what he can do.

In my references to these various small bores, I am thinking of the standard guns, longer-chambered guns firing heavier charges and killing farther. But these guns weigh more and cease to be what we here call small bores. One of our chief reasons for small bores is a saving of weight. Of course, if you prefer to do your shooting over a very narrow sighting plane and you do not care for overand-unders, and you wish to use a full charge, some kind of long-chambered small bore may very well be the answer. That is the case in America, where powerful 20-bores are used for duck shooting. The repeater and automatic are the guns in that country. But doubles are in use. (Shooting Times) too.

### WHAT MAKES A CHAMPION

Canada's only Gold Medallist at the 1952 Olympics started shooting at 12 years of age. Two years later he won his first Major Championship.

In Canada's famine of honours at the Olympic Games of 1952, a singularly brilliant achievement by one of her sons captured the heart of the nation. It was the performance of 17-year-old George Genereux of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. This high-school boy from the Prairies won 10 of Canada's total of 30 points, and its only Gold Medal, symbol of Olympic supremacy.

George's outstanding performance at Helsinki attracted the attention of sports writers who wanted to know many things. What of the boy himself? Was he, as the record might suggest, a shooting machine, an automaton, a nerveless individual with ice-water in his veins? He is none of these things, they discovered. He is, in fact, a likeable, competent, well-integrated individual, and a good competitive shooter. When the tension mounts with each successive shot at these gruelling contests, George admits that he feels nervous all right—just like his competitors.

Twelve years old when he first started to shoot at the Saskatoon Gun Club, George's ability was quickly spotted by Jimmy Girgulis, veteran trap-shooting star. Girgulis was introducing his sons to the clay-target busting one afternoon, by letting them shoot at birds with a .410 shotgun, when George joined in. This proved to be an important meeting, for, from that time on, tournamentwise Girgulis kept George under his wing and has been his coach and mentor ever since.

The first major victory in competition shooting for George was in 1949, when at the age of 14, he shot his way to the Manitoba-Saskatchewan Handicap Championship. Then two years later at the American Trapshooting Association competitions at Vandalia, Ohio, he won three North

American championships—the Junior, the Junior All-Around and the Junior High Over All.

This year at the contests sponsored by the A.T.A. he was runner-up in the Junior Preliminary Handicap Championship, and he won the Junior Champion of Champions of North America title. To this he added the Saskatchewan gles) to his laurels. Then before going to the Olympics he stopped at Oslo, Norway, where he was placed second in the World Championships.

George doesn't confine his shooting to clay pigeons and targets. He likes to hunt, and he frequently tries his hand at bringing down duck, prairie chickens and crows. He is also a good all-round athlete. A top-flight hockey player and baseball pitcher, he is a real asset to his high school where he started his last year this autumn.

But with all this outdoor activity, George hasn't neglected his studies. He is a good student. When asked about his plans for the future he replied that he hadn't made up his mind definitely. After further consideration, he added, "Probably medicine."




