



When this issue reaches its readers the 1953 International series will have been decided with the shooting of the Great Britain section of the contest — teams representing England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales — at Stirling (Scotland). The New Zealand and Australian Teams are published this month. It will be noted that the Australian Team finished some points ahead of our

sister Dominion combination, but it should be remembered that this year is New Zealand's first attempt at producing a team for the International contest.

Whilst it may appear somewhat unusual to Australians, it is a fact that New Zealand Association always conducts its main championship series in mid-winter, i.e. in July. It is understood that New Zealand finds it difficult to assemble all the leading shooters at any other period than during the month mentioned. Like Australia, New Zealand held its International section in March—a period, due to local conditions— when many prominent shooters are unable to attend. New Zealand is rich in first-class shots and once the International becomes a set part of the shooting calendar across the Tasman it is safe to assume that some formidable scores will be forthcoming.

Congratulations are extended to Newton Thomas of Sydney, who high-gunned for Australia in the International (Australian section) for the second time, and also to E. Green, top-gun for New Zealand.

It is probably that final scores will be known in Australia before this edition leaves the printer. If cabled results are available, same will appear in another section under "Stop Press" information.

Several shooters have written in to the Association headquarters since the publication of the June issue of




"News" advising that they have not received their regular copy and adding that their names do not appear in the official list of registrations. In every case it has been found that the writers of these advices were unfinancial and had, therefore, been removed from the official list of registrations and also from the mailing list of "News". As has been frequently pointed out, registration fees are due on January 1 each year and no fees should be outstanding after January 31. To expect to be retained on the list and receive "News" when unfinancial and the year half-gone, appears a little unrealistic.

The next series of Referee Examinations are announced in this issue. Entries close on August 24. Applicants should write direct to the Secretary, A.C.P.T.S.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1. Applications will be listed on arrival and preliminary directions forwarded immediately after August 24. A period of approximately 14 days' study will be allowed for the purpose of fully absorbing the rules as published in the Association Hand-book, a copy of which will be posted to each entrant after August 24. At the expiration of 14 days an examination paper will be posted to applicants. and this will be required to be completed within two hours by those concerned under the supervision of the home Club President. Completed paper must then be returned by airmail by first available post to the Association Secretary. A certificate must be signed by both the Club President and the person undergoing the examination that these conditions have been complied with. A preliminary certificate will be issued to each one successful in passing the written test. An oral examination, under actual competition conditions, will be conducted later.

It should be carefully noted that the foregoing conditions are required to be strictly observed and no late applications will be entertained. There will be no further examination series for referees in 1953.

This column has from time to time pointed out that breaks cannot be recognised unless recorded in competition. During the past month another club has raised the query as to whether a shooter would be en-titled to a break badge if "taking part in a registered shoot, shot 30 straight at the end of the shoot, the coming back to our club shot 30 odd straight". The answer, of course, is in the negative. The shooter concerned obviously was not engaged in competition when he shot the 30 straight at the end of the firstmentioned fixture and is, therefore, not entitled to receive recognition for the performance.

It has been noticed in returns received from a number of clubs using the official Association score book and result sheets that some officials are making notes under the "General Comments" section which are actually advices to the Association secretary on various matters. Club officials are informed that this procedure is inadvisable. Use of the section mentioned for anything other than comments on the shoot referred to in the top portion of the return are liable to be overlooked for the reason that, except for brief sub-editing, the "Results" section of the return goes direct to the printer. Club officials should note this information and write separate letters to the Association on any matters concerning general administration.



A shooter who fails to sign his name writes the following in praise of the Mildura club's effort at its recent opening. As the commentary is in praise of a new club, it is pub-lished as received. (Unsigned

matter will not be published in future .- Ed.) The commentary :--

"Visiting shooters and friends were given a royal time last month when the Mildura Clay Bird Club conducted the 'Sunraysia' Dist. D.B. Championship and other events at Mildura's new and up-to-date ground. Steps lead down from a natural grandstand to concrete tracks, and surely the concrete trap-house is one of the best in Australia. Nearly as big as a sleep-out, it has room for storage of thousands of clays as well as ample space for the trapper to work in. A lot of hard work and planning has been put in by the Club members, who must feel very proud of the result.

The Club President, Mr. Eric Bruce, entertained visitors aboard his motor launch after Saturday's shooting. Built in Scotland 80 years ago for the South Australian Governor, the vessel is a comfortable floating home, with everything from a re-frigerator (well stocked) to a bath.

On Sunday morning approx. 50 visitors boarded the launch for a cruise on the Murray. President Bruce navigated the vessel, whilst first mate Cullen and cabin boy Golder dispensed refreshments.

The boat pulled in to a picturesque log cabin on the Murray bank at Nairn, and Eric Bruce, Mildura's leading butcher, really went to town, cooking steaks and chops, barbecue fashion, for the hungry company. An informal concert was held during the afternoon and thoroughly enjoyed by all. Sailing back to the shooting ground at dusk, a high tea was wait-ing which included, among other things, 100 wild duck shot the day before.

As the night was still in short pants, an open-air picture show was put on and was equal to any seen and heard in our best picture theatres. Refreshments were on hand during the whole day and night, as was the hospitality. Visitors are at a loss to understand how they can hope to entertain Mildura's shooters in anything like the same style."

While gun cleaning after a day's shooting, it is of primary importance not to forget that the weapon will require superficial attention before next use. Too much oil on the ex-terior makes for dirty coat-sleeves and possible insecure grip. Therefore, always dry-clean the outside of the gun before starting to shoot. The inside of the barrels should also be pushed through to remove surplus oils, which can sometimes affect the pattern of the first two shots, rendering it open and scattered. This is of particular importance in clay pigeon shooting.

Ted Wedgwood, Coffs Harbour publicity officer and one-time President of the club, says, "The 'News' is still the first prize monthly magazine." (Brevity and wisdom .- Ed.)

A new club has been formed at Yerong Creek in Southern New South Wales. 
Stop Press-· ENGLAND WINS INTERNATIONAL MATCH

England won the 1953 International Match, defeating Australia by 5 points only. Cabled information advises scores as: England, 5013 points (1); Australia, 5008 (2); Scotland, 4956 (3); Ireland, 4840 (4); New Zealand, 4817 (5), and Wales, 4769 (6).

A new club is contemplated at Isisford in Queensland. E. J. Cottrell is one of the chief sponsors.

A duck record is reported by the Victorian Fisheries & Game Department. The report advises that a black duck set a new Victorian record for long-distance flying. In April, 1952, the duck concerned was marked with an aluminium band at Queen's Park Lake, Coburg (V.). Recently a shooter brought the duck down at Rockhampton, Queensland. This meant that the duck had flown 1,200 miles —the longest-known flight by a duck since the Department commenced banding.

Eric McKimmin, the Townsville sportsman who competed in the National championship series a few years back, reports the loss of his gun in leather case during a trip from Townsville to Ingham. He has advertised extensively in the north and offered a good reward for its return, but at time of writing, there had been no response. 

# GUN GOSSIP

#### By NORTH COUNTRY

A friend has been telling me how he let off a hammer gun by allowing the right hammer to slip when he was in the act of lowering it. Being a well-trained and experienced shot, he naturally had his barrels pointing at a safe angle and he did no harm. Which is just as it should be. But— think what might have happened?

It had been a wet morning. His fingers were wet and slippery and that is how it happened. He was that is how it happened. He was unloading preparatory to putting down the gun for lunch. Now this situation need never have arisen, had the gun been made so that the breech could be opened without first having to lower the right hammer. Why were not all hammer guns made on this obviously necessary principle? this obviously necessary principle? this obviously necessary principle? I only possess one hammer gun now —a weapon manufactured about 50 years ago. In this gun there is no need to lower the right hammer before opening. The top lever can be pushed over to the right far enough to allow breech opening when the hammers are raised the hammers are raised.

We hear a lot about the dangers of hammer guns. Certainly hammer guns which necessitate the lowering of hammers over a loaded chamber are dangerous — wickedly dangerous in irresponsible hands. But so long as the lever can be pushed far enough to the right to allow opening without interference with the hammer, the gun is very much safer. In fact, the hammers need never be raised or lowered on loaded chambers. Before loading, the harmers can be raised, and they can be lowered after unloading. In this simple way a harmer need never be raised or lowered on a loaded chamber. This renders an old hammer gun much safer. But there is this weakness — there is no safety-catch to block the triggers when the gun is cocked. In the event of a fall, the gun might be discharged by way of the triggers.

If a hammer gun should be fitted with a safety catch, I do not see room for any complaints (on the score of danger). Many of these guns have got their kind a bad name, because they have been kept in use long after the safety margin in the mechanism has been reduced below the minimum through continual wear and tear. There is no compulsory retirement age — and something at last gives out.

It may be asked why space should be given to the now obsolete hammer gun. Well, the answer is that though such guns are not now made, many of them remain in service, and active service at that. It will be a long time before the last hammer gun is off the "active list." So we must accept the situation as it is. I have (as I have said) and at times use a hammer gun which is at least 50 years old. So well made is it that it is likely to last another fifty.

What is necessary is that these weapons are seen to, kept in good order and generally maintained. If only they were, and of course nitro proved, everything would be beyond criticism. A good hammer gun, made at the time such weapons had first-class work put into them, is better than a cheap hammerless. At least, other things being equal, had I to make a choice, I would have the hammer (provided it had low hammers and could be opened when fully cocked).

Perhaps I am fortunate as being one of those who can shoot equally well with hammer or hammerless. It makes no difference to me - I just hit and miss all the same. But I like hammerless guns best as weapons. And I do think much enjoyment is had through using weapons which you like. I have never been keen on using other people's guns — though on occasions it has been necessary.

Hammer guns may have earned a bad reputation for accidents. I have no figures, but rather feel that this is so. But surely this is chiefly due to the fact that hammer guns have been the universal weapons. Very many such guns are used now, and -Cont. on P.50
