The Editor's Notebook

Handicapping. Following a lengthy conference of the Handicapping Panel of the Association, the following formula for handicapping by clubs was decided upon. It should be clearly understood that the formula applies to club handicapping only from which recommendations should then follow to the Association.

- (1) A Handicap Return, or handicap recommendation must be forwarded to the Association once in every three months, at least. Immediate advice of any underhandicapped shooter should be forwarded to the Association before the 3 months' period.
- (2) Any shooter compiling a break of 50 straight is to be brought back one yard.(3) Any shooter compiling a break
- of 75 or over, brought back two yards.

 (Both above to apply if the shooter completes the break in front of or on his regulation Association handicap.)
- (4) An outright win, where the score is 20 or better, one yard back.
- (5) Three divisions, one yard back.
- (6) Where a shooter takes part in four to five complete shoots (shoots through the programme) and does not take out a cut or division of any kind, one yard forward.
- (7) When a shooter's handicap reaches 20 yards, careful revision of performances is advised, as well as due discretion, before further backward movement is recommended.
- (8) In the July 1955 issue of "News" any shooter who is shown as not having an Association handicap will be published on 16 yards, until such time as advice and recommendation from club or clubs where the shooter competes is received. (In other words, there will be no shooters shown,



from July issue onwards, as not having an Association handicap). For the reason stated, the full list of Association registered shooters and handicaps will be delayed until July issue.

The foregoing is quite a simple formula, which if heeded by all club officials, should quickly overcome any difficulties in regard to handicapping. With further reference to No. 1 clause above, this should be taken to mean that a list of handicap recommendations from every club, either forward or back, must be posted to the Association at least once in every three months. This direction applies to all shooters who have competed at the club, not merely shooters who are members of the local club. In regard to Clause 8, clubs are given until July 1 to submit a recommendation concerning all shooters who are listed as registered, but do not appear in "News" as holding an official handicap. Those concerning whom no information is available to the Association will be placed on 16 yards. This will also apply to shooters whose names are received as newly registered and against whom no handicap is shown.

In regard to the general position of handicapping, it is of interest to note that the following query was received during the month:—

- (1) If a shooter shoots a break of 50 or over to win an event, can his handicap be put back prior to the next event? The answer is Yes.
- (2) Can the President or Secretary of an affiliated club re-handicap

a shooter (even if from another club), if they think his score and form warrants it? Answer—Yes.

(3) Can President or Secretary of an affiliated club alter any registered A.C.P.T.S.A. shooter's card, and endorse same with their signature? Answer — Yes. One point on this last item which the writer missed is that, any such alterations made must be notified to the Association within three days of the adjustment, and also the reason given for such alteration of handicap.

Another handicapping query, also received within the past month, mentions that several shooters belonging to a well-known affiliated club had never had a handicap and had always shot from 16 vards, whilst other shooters with better performances (according to the writer) were yards in front. On checking up it was found that the shooters concerned had never had an Association handicap for the reason that no handicap recommendation had ever been received on them by the Association. The above directions should clear up this point without much trouble.

Another interesting query came to light during the month also. A club wrote in, stating, "There was a lot of difference of opinions over coming back in regard to shoot-off, and when brought back 1 yard, one shooter objected, as he said he could not be brought back. Anyway, he did no good. At a recent shoot shooters were brought back and finished about 26 yards, and there were no objections." The Association ruling on this is clear. When it is decided to bring shooters back to finish an event, an announcement must be made to those concerned. If there is a single objector, the direction is, shoot on under regulation handicaps.

All conditions, rules and other matter, concerning the forthcoming Olympic Games, are published in this issue. Same are published as received without any amendment whatever. The Association, at present, cannot provide any further information on the Games. All the information available is as published.


A shooter who recently made two or three breaks of 100 straight wrote to the Association, asking for a break badge for each 100 he registered. Break badges are available once only, which means that if a shooter registers a break of 50, he gains one break badge of 50, similarly for 75 and again for 100. The shooter does not gain a break badge more than once.

POKING SHOTS

Such is my opinion of a slow poking shot, that I would rather see a man miss in good, than kill in bad. style. For instance, if I saw one man spring a covey of birds close to his feet, and keep aiming at one till the covey had flown thirty to forty yards. and even bring down his bird dead. and another man miss both barrels, within the same distance, I should say perhaps the latter, if in good nerve, may be a good shot, but I was quite sure that the former never could be one, because he was an hundred years behindhand in the art of using a gun.

I know many old pokers who would feel sore at this assertion, but this I cannot help: it is my humble opinion, and therefore I have a right to give it.



It is beyond question that the quickest and most humane method of despatching poultry is by biting off the head. The practice of wringing the unfortunate bird's neck is a barbarous survival from the dark ages. Human beings, having thicker necks, should be left alone.

OLYMPIC GAMES

Clay Pigeon Shooting

OLYMPIC GAMES — CLAY PIGEON SHOOTING. Entries. Maximum number of entries and competitors in each event: 2 per nation. Events. 1. Clay Pigeon. 200 pigeons. Prizes. First Prize: Silver-gilt Olym-Prizes. First Frize: Silver-gilt Olympic Medal and diploma. Second Prize: Silver Olympic Medal and diploma. Third Prize: Bronze Olympic Medal and diploma. Clay Pigeon Shooting begins on Tuesday, 27th November, and continues on Wednesday, 28th November, 1956. Arms and Ammunition. Shotgun, with maximum calibre 12, may be loaded with two cartridges. Maximum charge of shot, 36 grammes: maximum calibre of gungrammes; maximum calibre of gunshot, 2.5 millimetres (equivalent of British No. 6). Number of Pigeons. 200 clay pigeons, in 2 courses of 100 pigeons each. The competition is carried out by groups of 6 men shooting 4 series of 25 pigeons on each day.

RULES AND SHOOTING REGULATIONS

for

INTERNATIONAL CLAY PIGEON SHOOTING.

The Shooting Range.

1. An international clay pigeon shooting range shall have 15 traps placed in a straight line, one after the other, and divided in 5 groups of 3 traps. The distance between the central trap in each group shall normally be about 5 metres (5½ yds.). The traps shall be placed in a sheltered trench with roof, the upper edge of which shall not be more than 0.5 metres (18-20 inches) above the trap's carrier.

A shooting station furnished with a table or bench, where cartridges, etc., can be laid, is to be placed 15 metres (162 yds.) behind the central trap in each group and level with the trap trench roof.

In order to facilitate judging of conditions mentioned in Section 31 b, a low barrier or some similar arrangement may be erected 20 metres (22 yds.) in front of the traps, and parallel to the trap trench, if the nature of the terrain permits this.

- 2. The traps shall be adjusted in such a manner that they meet the following requirements in calm weather:-
- (a) At best angle of elevation the target must carry a distance equal on level ground to about 70 metres (77 yds.).
- (b) The height of the target's path above trap level and 10 metres (11 yds.) from the traps, shall be at least 1.5 metres (4ft. 9ins.) and not exceed 4 metres (13 ft.) and should normally be 2 (63 ft.) to 3.5 metres (11½ ft.).
- The target shall be thrown within an area bounded by angles of about 45° right and left of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of the shooting station and the central trap in the corresponding group.
- 3. The traps are to be re-adjusted each day before shooting commences, and thereafter a trial pigeon shall be thrown from each trap.
- 4. The traps shall be released by an electrical or mechanical device which shall be operated from a position where the puller can see and hear the shooters.
- 5. The pigeons shall have a diameter of about 11 cm. (4.4 in.), a height of about 3 cm. (1.2 in.) and a weight of about 100 grammes (35 ozs.). In international competitions the targets shall be of an internationally recognised make.
- 6. The shooting range shall be laid out in such a way and the targets shall be of such a colour that the targets are clearly visible against the background under all normal light conditions.

Arrangements of Matches.

- 7. As a rule shooting should be carried out in squads consisting of 6 shooters. The Management may fill vacancies with proficient shooters not taking part in the competition.
- 8. In international competitions the shooters of each country shall be spread over the various squads. The Management shall draw up a plan for distribution, whereafter lots are drawn (separately for each day at a time announced in advance, thereby permitting the delegates of the participating nations to be present.

Firing order within each shooting squad is decided by new ballot each day.

- 9. At the commencement of shooting, 5 shooters shall be ready to shoot, one at each shooting station. The 6th shooter shall be ready to take a place on No. 1 station counted from the left. When the shooter at No. 1 station has fired at the first target he is to prepare himself for taking up position at station No. 2 as soon as the shooter at Station No. 2 has fired, and so forth.
- 10. Each stage consists of 25 birds. In smaller events, however, it may be decided that the stages shall comprise fewer birds.
- 11. It shall be so arranged that the shooters are unable to predetermine from which of the 3 traps in the group the targets will be thrown. Releasing, however, to be performed according to a system whereby each shooter receives an even distribution of the various throwing angles for every 100 targets thrown. This may be achieved by automatic distribution or by the use of an indicator.
- 12. The shooting shall be carried out with no other intervals than those decided in the programme or caused by technical difficulties or calling of a new squad. In exceptional cases, however, the referee may—with the jury's agreement—interrupt the shooting if there arises bad weather of obviously short duration.
- 13. If a shooter is not present when his squad is called, the shooting shall commence without him. If a breakdown of gun occurs, and this cannot be repaired immediately, or if the shooter does not continue with another gun, he must leave the shoot-

- ing station and the shooting shall continue without delay. The referee shall decide when the shooter may shoot the remaining targets.
- 14. If a breakdown occurs to one or more traps during the shooting this shall be reported to the referee, who shall decide whether the stage is to be interrupted or is to continue with the remaining traps. The question is to be laid before the jury after the 25 birds' stage is completed. If a trap is repaired or re-adjusted, a trial pigeon is to be thrown from all 3 traps in the group.
- 15. In international competitions the scores shall be recorded by 3 scorers. At the same time the scores are to be written up on a large board so that the competitors may follow the results. Immediately after the shooting, the score sheets shall be compared and any disputes are to be decided for each pigeon. The results shall be read aloud so that they may be heard by the shooters, and at the same time the scoring board checked for correct entry.

Referees and Jury.

- 16. The shooting shall be conducted by a referee with wide experience in clay pigeon shooting. His main function is to make immediate decisions regarding killed or lost targets, and he is to give a distinct signal for lost target.
- 17. The referee shall be aided by 2 assistant judges. Usually these are to be appointed in rotation by the referee from among the competitors, and preferably amongst those who have fired in the previous squad. All competitors are obliged upon request to function as assistant judges, but the referee has the right to accept substitutes.
- 18. The referee is to make an immediate decision whether a repeat target is to be thrown due to irregular target or some other condition (see sections 31 and 32). If possible he shall call "No Bird" or give some other signal denoting this before the shooter has fired his first shot.
- 19. The referee shall always make decisions himself. If any of the assistant judges is in disagreement it is his duty to raise his hand and advise the referee of this. The referee is then to make his final decision.

- 20. Providing no other decision has been made, there shall be appointed a jury for international competitions, consisting of a representative from each country, with the arranging country's representative as chairman. If more than 5 countries participate, the representatives shall appoint a jury consisting of 5 members. The jury makes decisions by majority. The chairman's vote decides equal votes. The jury can make valid decisions when the chairman and two members are present. In urgent cases 2 unanimous members of the jury may make decisions, after consultation with the referee.
 - 21. It is the duty of the jury:-
- (a) to see before shooting begins that the ranges conform with regulations (see sections 1 to 6) and that the arrangements in general are suitable and correct;
- (b) to see during the shooting that the rules are adhered to and in connection herewith among other things check guns, ammunition and targets by random tests or other suitable procedure;
- (c) apart from the referee to make decisions in connection with technical defects or other disturbances in the shooting;
- (d) to deal with protests (see, however, section 49, last item);
- (e) to make decisions regarding penalty if a shooter does not adhere to the rules or deports himself in an unsportsmanlike manner;
- (f) to agree upon a working arrangement whereby at least 2 members of the jury are always present on the range, one of them to be in the immediate vicinity of the referee.
- 22. The jury's decision cannot be appealed against unless a special jury of appeal has been appointed for the competition.

Guns and Ammunition.

23. All kinds of shotguns, including automatic models, 12 gauge or smaller, may be used for shooting. Compensators or similar devices which may disturb the neighbouring shooter are not allowed. No handicap will be given to competitors using guns with a calibre smaller than 12.

- 24. The length of the shell is not to exceed 70 mm. (2\frac{3}{4} in.). The shot is not to be larger than 2\frac{1}{4} mm. (No. 6) in diameter and the load of shot is not to exceed 36 grammes (1\frac{3}{4} ozs.). It is not allowed to use black powder or tracer cartridges.
- 25. If malfunctions of guns or ammunition occur, resulting in the shot not being fired, "No bird" is to be declared, provided the rules in section 45 are observed. "No bird" is allowed twice only, for malfunctions in the same gun in a 25 birds' stage.

Shooting Rules.

- 26. Two shots may be fired at each target.
- 27. Shooting stance is optional.
- 28. When the shooter is ready to shoot he calls "pull", "lost", "go" or some other word of command, after which the target shall be thrown immediately.
- 29. The target is "dead" when:-
- (a) the pigeon, or part of it, is pulverised;
- (b) at least one visible piece is broken from the pigeon.
- 30. The target is "lost" when:-
- (a) the pigeon is not hit (during its flight);
- (b) the pigeon is only dusted;
- (c) a pigeon has been called, but is not fired at by the shooter;
- (d) the shooter is unable to fire because he has not released the safety catch, forgotten to load or cock his gun;
- (e) the first shot is a miss and the shooter fails to fire his second shot because he forgot to place a second cartridge or to release the stop on the magazine of an automatic shotgun, or because the safety catch has slipped back to "Safe" by the concussion of the first shot; whatever the cause of this, the competitor must abide by the result;
- (f) there is a case of misfire or breakdown of the gun, and the shooter opens the gun or touches the safety catch before the referee has examined the gun (see section 45);

- (g) the third or subsequent misfire or breakdown of the same gun occurs in a 25 birds' stage;
- (h) the shot is not fired due to some other reason which does not entitle the shooter to a repeat target. It is not allowed to pick up a pigeon in order to find out if it has been hit or not.
- 31. "No bird" to be declared and another pigeon shall be allowed whether or not the competitor has fired:—
- (a) if the target breaks on throwing;
- (b) if the target flutters, has insufficient initial velocity or takes an irregular course on leaving the trap (see section 2);
- (c) if the target is thrown from a trap in a wrong group;
- (d) if 2 or more targets are thrown simultaneously from traps in the same or nearby groups;
- (e) if the target is of a noticeably different colour from the other targets.
- 32. "No bird" to be declared and another pigeon shall be allowed if the competitor has not fired:—
- (a) if the target is thrown before the shooter has given the command;
- (b) if the target is not thrown immediately after the command, and the shooter lowers the gun (see section 43).
- 33. In case of misfire or malfunction (see section 25) another pigeon shall be allowed:—
- (a) if the competitor's first shot misfires and he does not fire the second shot. (If the second shot is fired, the result of this is to count);
- (b) if the first shot is a miss and the competitor's second shot misfires (see, however, section 30 e). In this case the first shot on the new bird must be fired in the air. If the bird is hit with the first shot, the target is lost. Misfire is counted when a cartridge does not ignite on impact, or when the powder does not burn in a normal manner (see, however, sections 30 f and 45).
- 34. The referee may also declare "No Bird" and allow another pigeon if:—

(a) the shooter has been materially disturbed;

SHOOTING

- (b) another competitor shoots at the same target;
- (c) the referee, due to some special reason, cannot decide whether the target was killed or lost.
- 35. The repeat target may be thrown from any trap in the group independent of the indicator.
- 36. If both shots are fired simultaneously, the result is to count.
- 37. Shot is counted as not fired if:—
- (a) a competitor shoots out of turn (see section 39);
- (b) a shot goes off unintentionally before the competitor has given the command. But if the target is thrown—and the competitor fires his second shot—the result of this is to count.

Rules of Conduct.

- 38. All guns, even when empty, shall be handled with the greatest care. Conventional double-barrel guns are to be carried with the breech open. Magazine guns are to be carried with the breech open and muzzle pointing up. Straps on guns are not allowed. When a shooter puts his gun aside it must be placed vertically in a gunstand or another place intended for this purpose. It is forbidden to touch another competitor's gun without the owner's consent.
- 39. Shooting and sighting may only be practised at the shooting stations. Shots may only be fired when it is the shooter's turn and the target has been thrown. It is forbidden to sight at other competitor's targets. It is also forbidden to sight at or shoot wilfully live birds or beasts.
- 40. At roll-call the shooter must be ready to shoot immediately and take with him sufficient ammunition and other necessary equipment (see section 13).
- 41. The shooter is to stand in shooting position with both feet behind the foremost edge of the firing stand. He shall remain at the shooting station until the competitor on his right-hand side has fired. After the shooters have fired their last shot in the stage, they are to remain

- standing at their stations until the last man in the squad has fired and the referee has announced—"Finished".
- 42. It is not allowed to put cartridges in the gun before the shooter is standing at the shooting station facing the traps with the gun pointed at the flight area and the referee has given the "all clear" for the squad. Magazine guns are not to be loaded with more than 2 cartridges. The shooter is not allowed to close his gun before it is the turn of the competitor at his left to shoot.
- 43. If the target is not thrown immediately after the command has been given, the shooter is to denote that he refrains from shooting by lowering his gun from the shoulder (see section 32 b).
- 44. The shooter must not turn from the shooting station before the gun is opened. When an irregular target is thrown or the shooting is interrupted, the gun shall be opened. It is not to be closed again until shooting can continue.
- 45. In case of misfire or gun failure, the shooter shall remain standing with the gun pointed to the flight area without opening the gun or touching the safety catch until the referee has inspected the gun (see sections 30 f and 33 c).
- 46. The shooting shall be carried out without interruptions, and the shooter is only to give the necessary words of command, report "ready", or "protest", and answer the referee's questions.
- 47. The referee or his assistants are to see that the safety precautions are adhered to, that unauthorised persons are expelled from the range, and that the puller has an unobstructed view of all shooting stations.

Protests.

- 48. If the shooter or team captain disagrees with the referee's decision regarding a shot, protest may be initiated by raising the arm and saying "protest" or "appeal". The referee shall then interrupt the shooting and—after having heard the opinion of the assistant judges—make his decision.
- 49. The referee's decision can be appealed against verbally or in

- writing to the jury. At least one jury-member shall always stay near the referee and receive such protest. If the jury finds the protest justified, it can give the referee directions for future decisions, or appoint a new referee, or change his decision inasmuch as this does not concern hits, misses or irregular targets when the referee's decision is final (see sections 29, 30 a and b, 31 a).
- 50. If the shooter or team captain is of the opinion that the score which is read aloud when the stage is finished is incorrect, he should make his protest verbally to the referee immediately. The referee shall then as soon as possible—in the presence of the scorers—examine the score sheets, and may examine witnesses, after which he is to make his decision. If the person protesting is not satisfied with the decision, a short written protest shall be handed to the jury.
- 51. If a competitor, captain or official observes anything which does not conform with these rules, he shall report this to the referee or a member of the jury. The referee shall, if he is of the opinion that he cannot take immediate necessary measures, refer the reporter to a member of the jury. The referee's decision can be appealed against to the jury in the form of a short written protest.

Penalties, Etc.

- 52. The shooters are obliged to acquaint themselves with these rules and regulations and bind themselves by their entry in the match to penalties and disciplinary measures enforced upon competitors omitting to adhere to these rules. The same applies to shooters neglecting to comply with the referee's decisions.
- 53. If the shooter uses guns or ammunition which are not in accordance with sections 23 and 24, all shots fired with such gun or ammunition are to be counted as misses. If the jury finds that the fault has been committed with intent, it can in consequence hereof exclude the shooter from the competition. If the jury finds that the shooter could not reasonably be aware of the fault and that he through the fault has attained no essential advantage, it can

decide to approve of the shooting results, providing the fault is corrected as soon as the shooter has become aware of it.

- 54. Violations of section 38, 39, 41, 42, 44 and 46 normally incur a warning in the first instance. The jury may fine the shooter one bird on repeated violations or major transgressions, and in aggravating circumstances may exclude the shooter from the stage concerned or from the whole match.
- 55. If the shooter is not present at roll-call and this is not a case of force majeure, or the shooter is not ready to shoot (see sections 13 and 40), the jury may under specially extenuating circumstances give the shooter a warning. Otherwise the shooter is to be fined one bird and will be given the opportunity to shoot the remaining targets at a time decided by the referee.
- 56. Should the jury find that a shooter delays the shooting or deports himself in an unsportsmanlike manner, it may give him a warning or fine him one bird or exclude him from the match.
- 57. When the jury fines a shooter one bird and this decision is not occasioned by any special target, the first dead target after the decision has been made known is to be counted as lost. If the shooter has completed the day's shooting, one bird shall be deducted from the store of the last stage.

Tie-Shooting.

- 58. If 2 or more shooters obtain equal scores, precedence for the first 3 places in championships are decided individually by tie-shooting in 25 birds' stages until a difference in the scores occurs. The stage or stages shall be shot according to the usual rules, in such a way, however, that the squads may consist of fewer than 6 men. If tie-shooting is likely to be held, the shooters involved shall keep in touch with the Management, so that the tie-shooting can becarried out at the latest 30 minutes after the shooting proper is finished.
- 59. For the remaining scores the last 25 birds' stage is to decide precedence, thereafter the second to last and so forth. If all stages are equal, precedence is decided by ballot.

60. If 2 or more teams obtain the same score, tie-shooting for the best team is to be carried out in accordance with the rules in section 58. Precedence of the other contestants is decided according to the rules in section 59.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

International Clay Pigeon Shooting.

- 61. In world championships each country is entitled to participate with a max. of 5 shooters. The arranging country may invite a further 3 shooters from each country to compete in the individual world championships.
- 62. The championship consists of 300 birds, divided into 100 targets. per day for 3 days. For individual competition total score for 300 birds to count. In team competitions each country may compete with 5 shooters the names of which shall be given in writing before 5 p.m. at least 2 days prior to the first day of the competition. Total score for the 4 best shooters from each country over the first 200 birds to count.
- 63. If two or more teams obtain the same score, precedence shall be decided for the first three places by tie-shooting between the 4 shooters whose results are included in the team score. The first stage of 25 birds during the third day's shooting is to count as tie-shooting. If the results are still equal, the next stage of 25 birds is to count, etc. Precedence for the remaining places in the world championship shall be decided according to the rules in sections 58. 59 and 60. This also applies for team shooting.
- 64. Prizes of honour (not championship medals) may be awarded for each day's shooting separately.
- 65. In world championships, Olympic Games and other international championships to which the Union has delegated a technical representative, the representative shall confer in advance with the Shoot Management regarding the arrangement of the matches, plans for ballots, etc., and take over the jury's duties until the jury is able to take up activities. according to the rules in section 20.

JUNE-1955

The jury in world championships shall be elected according to the rules in force in the other competitions embraced by the world cham-pionship. The jury's decision may be appealed against before the Jury of Appeal.

66. Before the first day of competition, the shooting ranges are to he open for training and/or shooting for badges for at least 3 days, 1 the day. The same type and make of pigeons shall be used for training as those used for the competition.

AMATEUR RULES.

The principles of amateurism, laid down in the declaration of the I.O.C. at its congress 1947, should be valid for the members of the International Shooting Union.

- 2. Money Prizes. Money Prizes up to £2 or \$8 or its equivalent are considered as a compensation for costs. If there is a meeting covering several days, money prizes totalling £10 or \$40 or its equivalent, within the same week are also considered a compensation for costs without detailed specifications from the competitors. Money prizes exceeding the above-mentioned sums should be given over to the club to which the competitor belongs. The competitor may receive from his club only a sum corresponding to his actual costs, which may include:-
- (a) entrance fee
- (b) ammunition
- (c) travelling expenses and cost of living according to the rules of the I.A.A.

These apply only to categories of shooting supervised by the U.I. de Tir.

- 3. As an amateur should not be considered:-
- (a) Anyone who gives an exhibition in marksmanship and is paid for
- (b) Anyone who professionally makes test shooting of guns, or ammunition from the shoulder (an operator of a test shooting machine is not included).
- (c) Anyone who is a professional instructor in shooting.

To (b) and (c) categories do not belong a member of the armed forces, who acts as an instructor to recruits.

In judging the status as an amateur according to this article, the activities of the competitor during the last two years should be considered.

4. The competitor should fulfil the qualifications of amateurism laid down by the National Olympic Committee of his country.

N.B. The above definition to date from the publication of the Rules for the Olympic Games, 1948.

OLYMPIC AMATEUR DEFINITION

An amateur is one who participates and always has participated in sport solely for pleasure and for the physical, mental or social benefits he derives therefrom, and to whom participation in sport is nothing more than recreation without material gain of any kind direct or indirect and in accordance with the rules of the International Federation concerned.
