The 1955 Interstate Teams' Match, in all States, is close at hand. This event is second only in importance in the sphere of clay pigeon shooting to the International Match. The Interstate Match has grown in importance and popularity and success in it gives the winning State the unofficial status of the Champion Team State of Commonwealth. This the year, for the first time and due to the support given to

the contest by I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited, team members will be shooting without any cost to themselves. Which means that the club on whose grounds the contest for each particular State is held will provide both shells and clays to team members and will be reimbursed by the Association. An elimination contest will be held to obtain team members. Match conditions are 50 targets from 16 yards, using 2½ in., 1½ oz. load shells, double-barrel, both barrels equal value. Teams of 10 men. Information on the Teams' series to hand indicates that the Australian Club at East Burwood, where the Victorian section of the match will be shot, has decided upon and received Association approval, for Saturday, September 17. This will be an all-day shoot. Tasmanian Gun Club has also received approval for the Tasmanian section of the match to be conducted on the local grounds at St. Leonard's, just outside Launceston, on September 3. Shooting will commence at 12.30 p.m. Queensland, winners of the contest in the past two successive years, will shoot at Townsville, N.Q., on Sunday, October 2. New South Wales section will be shot at Bathurst, and the Bathurst Club has secured approval for a two-day shoot, extending over 16th to 17th September inclusive.

Members of each State team will receive a souvenir trophy in commemoration of their inclusion in their State team for the year. Reports from South and Western Australia as to the intended date for the hold-



ing of their sections of the match are expected shortly.

The winning State will hold "The Great Britain and Ireland Trophy" for the 12 months following the event, or until the next series is shot. This popular trophy, one of the most handsome ever to be presented for a shooting competition in Australia, was presented to the A.C.P.T.S.A. by the Associations of Great Britain and Ireland as a token of goodwill and appreciation for generous support during the difficult post-war years. All shooters taking part must be registered and have resided for 12 months in the State for which they will shoot in the competition.

Another official referee examination series - written - will be held in the immediate future. Intending candidates should register their names with the Secretary, A.C.P.T.S.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, not later than September 27, 1955, by written application only. No verbal applications will be accepted - each candidate is required to make a written application in order to ensure that formalities are completed. Candidates will be given three weeks in which to study the rules, as from October 1. Then a series of test questions will be forwarded which must be completed before the candidate's Club President, or an Official Referee Examiner, within the time prescribed on the notice. Candidates must use one side of the paper only when supply-

ing answers to questions, which are required to be returned to the Association by first available air-mail after the expiration of the time limit set out in the instructions. Those passing the written test will then be required to undergo a practical test before the appointed A.C.P.T.S.A. Official Referee Examiners, before official recognition is granted. In this connection those who have passed in earlier written tests and have failed to undertake a practical test will eventually be "written off" as referees unless, they make arrangements to complete the practical section before the end of the present calendar year.

Recently reports have come to hand, some complaining, that referees acting at various shoots are not "up with the field". In other words, they are too far hehind the shooters. One instance mentioned is a case where a referee was standing in a shed, at least 50 yards behind the rear mark, and calling his decisions from that point. Referees should at all times be close to the actual shooting. A referee should operate between tracks two and four and stand only a few yards, certainly not more than 10 yards, behind the rear-mark shooter. It is impossible to efficiently control a shoot or give decisions which cannot be questioned when standing in any other position. All who undertake referee duties should carefully observe this advice.

A number of queries on various questions have been received during the month. One query sought advice as to whether registered shooters were permitted to shoot at an un-affiliated club. Obviously such a procedure is out of the question. The whole basis of organisation and control is based on affiliation and registration. If such action was agreed to, no purpose could be maintained for proper administration. Another club secretary wrote in and complained that most of his club members had been placed on 16 yards in the July issue of this publication. Again there exists a very good reason for such action. No information as to the ability of these mem-

bers had been forthcoming and the official course was to place such men on 16 yards. (Vide June issue of "News"). Another club official mentioned that his club was shooting a championship (open), yet the Association permitted another shoot to take place some 300 miles away. Again little fault could be found with the Association action. Three hundred miles is no short distance under any circumstances, and it was reasonable to approve of the two series. Yet another club secretary mentioned the following, "Is it per-missible in a double-barrel event for a shooter, after obviously killing a bird, to shoot chips?" Shooters who do shoot regularly at "chips" are merely wasting ammunition. But the whole revolves around efficient refereeing. The referee must maintain equity of competition at all times and exercise a firm control. Shooters shooting at chips should be warned to desist. If, after one or perhaps two warnings, they fail to observe the referee's direction, then such men should be barred from the competition and if necessary barred from further competition for the rest of the day. Chip shooting tends to upset fellow competitors, and it should not be permitted by a referee at any time.

With regard to break badges and D.B. shooting, there is a state of affairs existing here which I consider should be rectified.

Under the present system of making these awards there is con-sidered to be no difference at all in ability between the man who breaks 100 targets with 100 shots and the man who would possibly take 200 shots to get his "100 straight". They each get their badge and it is the same badge in both cases.

We hear that some shooter has shot 100 straight, yet it well might be that 20 of this number were collected by the use of two shots, yet he is as good as the man who gets his 100 with 100 shots — or is he?

Could not some distinction be made here? It would be an easy enough matter to have two separate awards, 1st class badge for those who get them all with their first, and 2nd class for others.

Incidentally, I never could see any sort of fair reasoning in D.B. (kills to count) method of scoring at all and it is my own personal view (along with others that I know) that this form of shooting could well be eliminated and the sport not suffer thereby.

While not wishing to belittle the shooting of "Buffalo Bill", I would like to tell you a few things about so-called sharpshooting acts. Some portion of all such acts that I have seen are faked.

During the last thirty-five years I have been associated with a Rodeo-Circus show that at some time or other has billed most professional sharpshooters known in Australia, so I am qualified to make the above statement re fake. While I never had the pleasure of seeing Colonel Cody's act, I can tell you of a similar one that was based on what the Colonel used to do. My brother toured the U.S.A. with the 101 Ranch Wild West Show in 1912-13 and this huge show — they employed 1500 people — had three brass bands, a tribe of Sioux Indians, etc., etc., and included several sharpshooters.

The act with the so-called glass balls was done as follows: The balls looked like glass, but were made of resin and the slightest touch would break them.

The rifle used was loaded with dust shot and was 32 or 44 calibre, and so threw a nice wide pattern and any single piece of dust would break the ball.

Balls were propelled with compressed air and rose up nice and slowly.

A 44 calibre pistol was also used and one in each hand of the "sharpshooter" looked very effective. While some slight skill would perhaps still be necessary, the impression created was that the balls were glass, and that the rifle was loaded with ball, and so looked much harder than it was, hence I say a fake.

I could tell you of lots of such fakes, but don't wish to impose myself on you to that extent.

This is the first time I have ever sent you an item, so hope you think it of enough interest to use.



I may be wrong, but I have a feeling Jim Stoddard (Pentland) was there that day.


I wonder if Buffalo Bill's performances ended prior to, or after, that date.



SALANCE. By G. W. Spearing (England)

Most people who shoot and take an interest in the gun or guns they use realise that a game shooting shotgun should balance — that is to say, see-saw, when supported on a narrow edge.— at a point approximately under where the action pin is situated in the forward end of the action bar. In the case of an Englishmade double, this point comes at about 3²/₃ in. to 4 in. in front of the front trigger.

The "action pin," "cross pin" or "body pin," by the way—call it what you will—is the round pin about which the barrels pivot when the gun is opened.

One has seen a gun roughly checked for balance by resting it on a stiffly extended forefinger and moving it back or forward until the point of balance is hit on. If this is found to be farther forward than the action pin, the gun is pronounced to be "muzzle heavy" or vice versa.

It is a very good rough test, but the whole thing is not so simple as that.

A stick weighing only a few ounces itself having a 3 lb. weight attached to one end and, say, a $3\frac{1}{2}$ lb. one attached to the other, has a point of balance that can be found in exactly the same way. But if you can imagine a gun having most if its weight divided between the muzzles, on the one hand, and the heel plate of the stock on the other (if this were possible), you will also, no doubt, realise that it would be an unhandy sort of thing to shoot with.

To feel "handy" to the user, a game gun must have by far the major part of its weight concentrated between the two hands. That is to say, when the gun is held naturally with the right hand grasping the grip of the stock and the left holding the barrels at a point about where the nose of the fore-end comes.

It will be noticed that I have, so far, used the term "game gun" as distinct from any kind of special

purpose gun or a rifle. By a game gun I mean a perfectly ordinary kind of gun weighing about 6½ lb. that you would take out, hoping to deal equally well with high pheasants, driven or walked-up partridges, or any other kind of flying game, and also — and this is important — with bolting or dodging ground game as well.

Such a gun is bound to be a compromise, as it will have to come to the shoulder quickly and easily and point like lightning for a shot at a rabbit bolting across a ride, but it must also have enough forward inertia to be steady during a careful swing on to that high pheasant that you can see coming some distance away, and can prepare for — the one whose speed and height alone so often get him safely past the guns!

That little bit of inertia — the property of a body at rest to resist motion and of a moving body to resist any retarding effect or change of direction — can have a wonderful steadying influence when taking fairly long and premeditated shots. On the other hand, too much of it can slow you up dreadfully on a quick snap shot at a dodging rabbit or a woodcock darting through the trees.

One major difference between a game gun and a sporting or military rifle is the difference of the position of the point of balance. Also, of the way in which the force of inertia is made use of in the case of a rifle to help the user to hold it steady while firing. This more especially when taking an "off-hand" shot; that is to say, shooting without any kind of rest.

With a rifle, a quick throw up on to the target is not quite so necessary as with a gun. What is more important is that the shooter shall be able to keep the sights aligned as steadily as possible on the target and to squeeze off the trigger without upsetting that alignment.

The point of balance of a rifle is accordingly much farther forward

A. STEWART, President. T. GORE, Hon. Sec., 3 Yardley St., Maidstone. than that of a gun. The inertia of the relatively much thicker and heavier barrel or barrels is made use of to resist as much as possible any tendency to waver away from the correct sighting alignment during trigger let-off.

It will be noticed that I do not make use of the term "pull" in connection with the letting off of a rifle. A shotgun must, of necessity, be fired by a quick, decisive contraction of the trigger-finger. A rifle, on the other hand, must be fired in such a way as to minimise the likelihood of upsetting the sighting at the moment when the sear of the lock disengages. One is therefore taught to let off by means of a gentle progressive squeeze of the trigger hand.

It is not always that sheer quickness of getting the gun to the shoulder when confronted by the "surprise" type of shot is of paramount importance. Sometimes it is much more necessary to be able to carry out a steady and accurately controlled swing.

Down-the-line clay shooting calls for just this steady and careful kind of shooting. I am not suggesting that there is anything slow about it — quite the contrary. However, in the first place, one doesn't have to worry about getting the gun to the shoulder quickly; one can take one's time about that. In the second, one is — or should be — standing in as near a perfect shooting position as one knows how. There is no uneven ground, no brambles tangled round one's legs, no foliage in the near foreground to obstruct one's view, etc.

When the clay is sprung, the amount of actual gun and hody movement necessary to get aligned on it is not great compared with what one sometimes has to do to get on to a bolting rabbit. Even an extreme side bird when shooting from No. 1 or No. 5 stands calls for no kind of hasty movement whatever. It is accuracy and swing control that is going to count every time.

In view of these facts, a gun having a little more forward inertia than the standard game gun will have a steadying effect on most people.

As we have already seen, the ideal game gun has the bulk of its weight concentrated between the two hands of the used — between the grip of the stock and a point at the tip of the fore-end. This is done by making the forward half of the barrels as light as is consistent with safety, and usually by hollowing out the inside of the stock to counterbalance, so that the gun shall not become too "muzzle light" altogether, and have a wobbly uncertain feel about it when it is brought to the user's shoulder.

What is done, in effect, is to contract as much of the total weight of the gun as possible inwards towards the point of balance.

In the case of what I should term the ideal Down-the-Line gun — be it side-by-side or under-and-over neither of these things are done. The stock is left rather thicker and heavier and in its solid state, and the forward half of the barrels are left heavy enough to make the whole gun balance anything up to two inches farther forward than a game gun.

Therefore, we have that effect of spreading the total weight of the gun outwards more from the point of balance towards the muzzle, on the one hand, and the butt plate on the other.

There is, of course, the fact that this results in a rather heavier gun. However, this does not matter very much, as the user will not be carrying it about all day, and the little extra weight will make it much more comfortable to shoot with when firing a large number of cartridges in a comparatively short time.

There is nothing new in the foregoing information. It is a principle that was fully understood and made use of by gun-makers more than a generation ago in the hey-day of live-pigeon shooting; before the clay target was thought of.

Future programmes are published herein, and you can see there will be plenty of shooting and trophies at all meetings.


