The Editor's Notebook

With the issue of this month's publication this journal enters upon its ninth year of service to the sport of clay pigeon shooting in Australia and to the shooters allied to the pastime. During the year just past, the "News" issued its record size for any issue since inception — 120 pages. This is something of a marked increase to its humble beginning, when four double-sheets comprised its makeup: in other words, eight pages!

With the co-operation shown.over the years since inauguration, it is hoped that the publication will continue to expand and provide regularly matter which is of interest to "the man with the gun".

In recent months it has been noticed that there is a prevalence among certain competitors to actu-ally discuss the referee's decisions during the competition. In fact, some competitors have been noted to be trying to "referee the competition" whils⁺ actual competitors, similar to the older type of footballer who tries to referee a game as it progresses. Referees are reminded that they are not bound to discuss any decision with competitors unless under very unusual circumstances. Recently at a shoot in the Melbourne area a shooter was noticed objecting to the referee's decisions, with the referce replying and altogether a discussion taking place. The whole situation culminated in the competitor making an extremely uncomplimentary re-mark to the referee. This state of affairs must not be allowed to continue. A competitor has his remedy if the referee is unreasonable and not maintaining equity of competition. To continue a discussion with the official is inappropriate behaviour and clubs should see to it that officials acting as referees should play their part correctly. If a competitor becomes objectionable, the referee, in turn, has wide powers and these should be exercised if anything ob-





jectionable is noted or continued by competitors.

Many club officials are continuing to send in requests for break badges without accompanying the application with actual score sheets showing where the shooter compiled the break. Also a number are forwarding the score sheets, but it would take more than a legal mind to follow just where the break has been recorded on the sheets. When a break-badge application is made, the club forwarding the application should clearly state that shooter's name and address, the sheets should be numbered in proper order and sequence, with date appearing on right top corner of each sheet. Where the actual break occurred should be marked so as to be easily discernible and quickly checked by Association officials. Handling the score sheets in this way makes for quick perusal and equally quick finalization.

It is advised that there is a delay of some 12 to 14 weeks in delivery of break badges for the reason that makers are unable to cope with the demand. Those interested should note this, as many letters have been received by the Association enquiring on delivery.

The Great Britain and Ireland Trophy shoot, for State supremacy throughout the Commonwealth, has brought forth increased interest following this year's competition. In one or two instances States have advised that the holding of the

elimination shoot followed immediately by the actual State Team shoot has produced a feeling of staleness among team members during the team competition. Many have felt that it would be better to hold the elimination one day, followed a day later by the Team Shoot. Whilst this is doubtless a good idea, it has many difficulties. Many shooters are unable to attend for more than one unable to attend for more than one day and they would therefore eliminate themselves. The team with best score for 1955, up to the moment of writing, is New South Wales, and as though to emphasize the value of the elimination and the value of the elimination and

team shoot on the same day, the N.S.W. team shot at Bathurst, after completing the elimination shoot and returned the excellent score of 496/500 Six 50's and four 49/50's. In Victoria the opposite took place. Shooting at East Burwood, the Victorians, except those who scored the possible in elimination, had to shoot, in several cases, well into the 70's before a decision on team complement was reached. This meant that when the team faced up, quite a number were already "blown" in their efforts to first secure a team placing.

Dear Sir,

Under the heading: "Letters to the Editor", in the August "News", Mr. E. A. Holmes states he would like to see double-barrel shooting eliminated. May I disagree with this opinion?

For the past 22 years I have been trap shooting regularly in this district, am a member of three clubs here, and have been treasurer of one for the past eight years. During this time I have had an excellent opportunity of studying the likes and dislikes of the various shooters, and it is my opinion that the double-barrel events are always by far the most popular. Moreover, they are regarded here as the major events, whereas the single-barrel fixtures are regarded as minor events.

Also, in my opinion, the man who can shoot, say, 75% of his birds with his first barrel and 25% with his second barrel is a better shot than the man who shoots, say, 85% with his first barrel and 10% with his second, and from my observations,

there are quite a number who would approximate these percentages.

It is usually the man with a good second barrel who collects his share of game in the field and most of us have witnessed the unpleasant spectacle of the shooter who has so little confidence in his second barrel that he hesitates to fire it and lets an easy shot go by.

Ever since its inception in this country, trap shooting has been re-garded as two-barrel shooting, and I would say, let us remain accus-tomed to using both barrels. If the standard of shooting is becoming too high, then let us increase the handicaps, but let us not become one-barrel shots.

In any case, why not, continue to have both double and single-barrel events and so cater for the requirements of all shooters?



to take an interest in the fascinating study of gunology. A large American Wild West show was visiting our town and we sat at the ringside popeyed and with mouths agape as we watched "the champion rifle shot of the world" sit on a horse with all the cowboy outfit and break round balls tossed a few feet in the air by a lady also on a horse and also in the same rig-out. The rifle he used was ob-viously a '92 model Winchester .44 and the revolvers he brought into play later were of the same cal. 



GUN GOSSIP

About the care of guns, I notice how careless some men are (or thoughtless) as regards the places in which they put their weapons down during, say, a shooting lunch. It seems to me that some people take a great risk in not troubling to find a safe nook for their valuable guns. A safe place can always be found it is just a matter of a little trouble.


One of the worst places in this respect is a wall, particularly where the ground level is paved or metalled roadway. In the first place the mere fact of a pair of barrels being placed against the rough finish of a wall is sufficient to cause scratching of a fine surface, which while it will not make any difference to the shooting, does impair (if only slightly) the appearance and value of a gun. In the second place, should the gun fall or be knocked down (and this can easily happen under such insecure conditions), it is quite likely that the barrels will become dented or the muzzles burred. Dents do, of course, affect shooting and they need to be removed by expert craftsman. They may even be so deep as to render a gun a danger on firing. While under the hazards of active service, it is excusable for a gun to become seriously dented, there is no excuse for this to happen during the relaxation of lunch. A gun can always be made safe then.

A friend of mine even goes to the trouble of cartying an old glove in one of his pockets and this he pulls over the muzzles should it become necessary to place the weapon against any hard surface. This not only prevents scratching, but acts as some insurance against the gun slipping or being jerked down. When you use a very best gun it really is worth looking after. In a stone-wall country guns are more likely to become damaged than in wooded and hedged country, where stones, rocks and hard surfaces generally are the ex-

ception rather than the rule. If a halt is called among trees, bushes and plantations, it is so simple to find a safe place for your gun that you are entirely to blame should any damage befall it.

As I have pointed out before, much petty damage is done to guns in and about cars. And I have seen good guns treated without any regard for their appearance in this way. In one case I saw a gun by one of our leading makers lying on the floor of a car among other and far less valu-able paraphernalia. That, I gathered, was how it travelled — whether the back seats of the car were full or empty. I would never subject one of my old hammer guns to such gross lack of consideration. Of course, I know there are those who regard their guns as tools—just implements for doing a certain job of work. In the case of old worn or very cheap weapons it is their owners' affair and it does not matter economically, though, as I say, I would never treat any gun as a tool. But in the case of expensive high-grade guns, any rough treatment is, in my opinion, little short of a crime.

If I am using a car as a passenger between beats I hold my gun between my knees. But I will say that the modern streamlined car is surely not

the most convenient vehicle for the man with a gun. It does call for care, if not agility, in both entry and exit - if a gun is to be safeguarded against scratches, bruises, even dents. Metal fittings predominate and space is so restricted.

I always prefer to clean my own gun. As the late Payne-Gallwey said, a rough-fisted attendant can work irretrievable harm on a best gun in a matter of minutes. Attendants (rough-fisted or otherwise) are not so numerous today and most men have, in any case, to do their own cleaning. It is probably just as well. Besides, anyone who likes his gun as he should do, should wish to clean it after a day's shooting and take a practical interest in it. Cleaning, indeed, is all part of the day's work, and many a pleasant session have I spent in the gunroom of an evening. going over the events of the day.

Where there are children in a house, the gun-owner should take extra precaution when placing his gun—if the latter is not consigned to a cabinet or gun-case. Children are inclined to meddle, and it will do a gun no good to be moved or handled by ignorant fingers. In the old days the leather loops in the beam across the ceiling provided a safe place.

Duck Shooting in Thessaly

The Voevis marsh in Greece is set is dignified by the Greeks with the name of Lake. Wearing a good pair in wild, grand country. To the north lies Mount Olympus and the Vale of Tempe. To reach the marsh from war-and-earthquake-scarred Larissa, on the plain of Thessaly, there is a narrow country road which skirts the northern edge of the marsh before winding away into the low, barren hills running down from the Vale of Tempe till they reach the sea below Volos. The marsh itself is some ten miles long by five miles across, and OCTOBER-1955

of waders, however, one can traverse it from end to end. The reed-clumps with which it abounds provide no more than indifferent cover for the gun, and this fact may tend to en-hance its popularity with the wildfowl.

Speaking for myself, I found a day out on the marsh with one or two other guns much more enjoyable

From time to time the V.I.P.'s in Athens found it necessary to shake down their livers after too much of the night life of the Capital. On such occasions we were called upon to provide them with sport and hospitality. Cartridges were always our own main worry, though they were abundant in Athens, so the wise visitor brought a hundred for his host if he wanted to ensure himself of a warm welcome.

Out of these visits arose a memorable series of shoots, known by such names as "Christmas Bang", "Farewell Bang", and so forth. Farewell Bang, indeed, proved to be the finale, and was also the biggest! It was found possible to assemble thirtythree guns.

The night before Farewell Bang our own small party, consisting of six guns and attendants, set out for the village of Populi, which is at the base of a small valley running up

between the foothills to the north of the Marsh. Here the headman, whose title is dignified in the English translation as The Mayor, was waiting to meet us. He had placed his simple house at our disposal and provided a supper of roast mutton and goats' milk cheese with bread, washed down with the local wine, retsina. These village feasts always had for me the savour of the Homeric legends. Thus may Ulysses have supped with his companions before setting out on some adventure. That night we lay down to sleep on the floor in our warm sleeping bags, for the air was cold.

Promise of a Fine Day

The next morning broke with a promise of being fine and clear, though cold again. We set out from the village as the first streaks appeared in the east, our host of the night before acting as guide, until we reached the road, across which the marsh began. Strung out in line, we at once entered the reeds, when there was a whirr of wings. We all got in a shot or two, and quickly claimed six birds, mallard and teal.

We drove slowly forward, and before long heard the southern party open up from the other end of the marsh. From then on the fowl began to rise in all directions, but out of gun shot for us. This was disappointing, but they made for the hides prepared for the V.I.P.s in the centre.

After a while we halted on a line of rough hides that we had ourselves prepared at an earlier date, and there we waited. The day was indeed going to be a cold one. Suddenly a teal shot by high and fast. As I fired, a bullet sped past my ear. I thought that this was a bit "off", as I had not noticed anyone carrying a rifle as we set off. But I managed to locate the culprit and remonstrated with him.

The southern party were now driving up towards the V.I.P.s and both parties were getting a good number of shots, while we got colder and colder. We decided then to organise our own little drive, principally to get warm. So we set off across an open area, the home of an unusuallysavage sheep dog, known to us as the Hound of the Baskervilles - a great shaggy fellow with the courage of a hungry wolf. Nobody cared to venture alone into his territory. Sure enough, he was not long in making his presence known, and was accompanied by several other dogs, only less savage than himself. For some reason he selected me for his personal animosity. I kept him covered as he edged round me, and be hanged to any duck that might have risen at that moment!

The volunteer beaters were thrown into the battle, and they soon appeared from away on our right flank, strung out in a long line. It took them quite a long time to approach any of the duck (which kept well out of range, but with the minimum amount of effort to themselves). At last the beaters themselves were out of sight to us.

We began to wonder whether there would be any evening flight after all the disturbance. The "Operation Order" on which the shoot had been conducted, clearly stated, "There will be no withdrawal from the marsh until last light." At 5 o'clock we de-cided to ignore this in the northern

party and came out of the marsh to find our jeeps. We did not think that the V.I.P.s would miss us, somehow. These "Operation Orders", on which all the Bang series were conducted, were amusing little pieces in themselves, and helped to whet the appetite for what was to come. They were very much to the point, and necessarily, too, with the shoot covering such a wide area that ground control was out of the question. One phrase in the order was, "All birds will be treated as hostile."

Certainly, the V.I.P.s, as well as the southern party, had a very much better day than did we. We quickly shoved our own little contribution to the day's bag into the serried rows of mallard, teal and wigeon that were being laid out at the rendezvous at Larissa. There was a grand total of 396 duck and a dozen geese, pinkfooted and grey-lag. Seven of the geese had fallen to one gun, includ-ing a right and left. The Grand Master of the shoot consoled our party by saying: "Well, anyway, we couldn't have managed had you not kept them off the top end of the marsh."

I must conclude by recording that, not so long afterwards, a lone shot, out from Larissa on the marsh, found himself surrounded by Communist guerillas instead of wildfowl. He had to count himself fortunate in losing no more than his gun and cartridges, and being allowed to return to Larissa in his jeep.


