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The Editor's Notebook



The annual contest for State team supremacy, for which "The Great Britain & Ireland Trophy" is the coveted award for the ensuing 12 months, has been won for 1956 by Victoria. It was Victoria's first success in the competition. This year's contest was of more than annual passing interest, because high-guns in all States gained entitlement to compete for Olympic selection. Full details of the scoring and team totals appear in another section of this issue.

Victoria, for the first time since the commencement of the series a few years ago, enjoyed reasonable weather and also was fortunate to produce a team with slightly better all-round gun ability than has been the case in previous years. The weather, although described as "reasonable", was by no means easy and did not assist the Victorian team to any extent. On the actual day of the team shoot conditions were anything but easy.

The winning team returned the good average figures of 981/100. This total included only one score of 100 straight, with four 99's, one 98, three 97's and one 96 — a good average performance. Western Australia and New South Wales finished equal in second placing, each with 978/1000. The New South Wales effort produced no less than six of 100 straight, but tapered away to a whipper-in score of 88. Western Australia, like Victoria, only produced one registration of 100 straight. Queensland was next with 967/1000, including two scores of 100 straight. Tasmania, with 965/1000, followed and included one score of 100 straight. South Australia was close up in last position with 964/1000, including also one score of 100 straight.


Congratulations are extended to members of the Victorian team on their success in the Olympic year Interstate Match.

When this issue goes to readers, the names of the two shooters to represent Australia in the actual Olympic Games shooting will be known. The interest in the Elimination Shoot to decide the pair has known no bounds. The interest is far and wide and scarcely a town in Australia is not in some way interested in the result. Those who have the pleasure of viewing the Elimination contest should not be unmindful of the extensive amount of organization which has gone into the preparation of the ground at Laverton R.A.A.F. Station. Much work has been involved and a great deal has fallen to the lot of Association officers, who have been untiring in efforts to obtain the best possible conditions for competitors. Olympic style shooting is totally different to the normal style as used in Australia. and spectators at the Games shooting will enjoy a spectacle unusual in Australia.

A query which has caused some confusion has been before the Association during the past month. It

appears that a shooter, in his normal place in the squad, called for a bird. The bird was released very quickly and the shooter accepted it and missed with both barrels. The referee called "lost bird" - the correct decision. It now appears that the shooter claims a "no bird" on the grounds that the bird was released before he called for it. The referee considered the protest and confirmed his decision of "lost bird". After the squad had left the mark the shooter complained to the President of the club, who set aside the referee's decision and sent the shooter back on the track to shoot at one bird; the result was taken in lieu of the bird disputed. In this query it should be pointed out that the referee's decision is final and, providing he is competent and has the full confidence of the club management, his decision should not have been altered. The referee is the final arbitrator on slow and fast pulls, and in the case under review he, after review, decided on a lost bird — his decision should not have been disturbed.

An occasional club when claiming a break badge for an individual shooter still persists in failing to send in score sheets to substantiate the break claim. Score must accompany all claims for break recognition. The score sheets must also carry the handicap (clearly indicated) or mark from which the break was compiled. This latter point is particularly important, as breaks are only acknowledged when compiled "on or behind the shooter's Association handicap."

BARRELS FOR OLD NEW

To every owner of an old shotgun the time will surely come when the soundness of the weapon becomes a matter of doubt, and in the majority of cases it is the barrels that are suspect. At the first sign of weakness the advice of a competent gunsmith should be sought, for the results of a burst barrel can be devastating. Naturally, the shot who takes the trouble to keep his gun in first-class condition will soon detect a bulge or ring where the metal is getting thin. A well-cleaned barrel is obviously inspected regularly; a dirty one conceals the action of corrosion while at the same time accelerating the process.

The final test in borderline cases should be re-proof, and it cannot be too often stated that the Proof Houses at London and Birmingham are there for the protection of the public at any time; all new firearms must undergo proof by law, but a gun can be tested again as often as desired. It is advisable for a gunsmith to undertake the work, as the gunstock and certain other parts are first removed to prevent their being damaged. The small cost of re-proof is well worth while, for any dangerous weakness will, without doubt, be revealed.

When the barrels of a gun are condemned, the owner has to consider a number of factors before deciding his next move. Perhaps the first consideration should be the quality of the weapon, for if it is good, a new pair of barrels is certainly warranted, while if it is poor, the expense and trouble might not be justified.

Affection for a gun may be more important than cost, and many sportsmen prefer to fit new barrels to an old friend even when sober reason suggests a complete replacement. There is much to be said for this viewpoint, as the familiar "feel" is retained, and the exchange, if handled correctly, restores the gun as equal to new. The Board of Trade regard new barrel guns as new guns when assessing purchase tax, and, incidentally, this is the only repair to a sporting gun which is liable to the tax.

Correct Tubes.

In many cases, new barrels can be different from the old in certain details. The length, for example, can be slightly increased or reduced (standard sizes vary by 2 in., but odd sizes are supplied) and some variations of boring are possible, always providing the required bore is clearly indicated when ordering, so that the correct tubes can be obtained. Sometimes it is possible to change the bore by removing more metal from the barrel (but not by replacing metal already removed!).

It is not advisable to increase the length of the cartridge chamber, for the extra charge may be too much for the action; it was only made for one particular charge when new, and it is far from new now. The gunsmith will be able to judge the strength of the action, and this is most important when dealing with old guns that were proved with black powder. Because of that comparatively "mild" proof (by modern standards) many guns were made extremely light in weight, and there is always some doubt as to whether they will stand the present nitro proof. Sometimes the opportunity is taken to convert a gun from a nonejector to a self-ejector, but this is not practicable in every instance.

Once the choice has been made and the order placed, the procedure then followed can be divided into three main operations: brazing the selected tubes together, machining the resulting pair of barrels, and fitting the barrels to the action.

The "barrel filer", as he is called, must take great pains to copy the old barrels in every detail, for the machinist and the action filer will be unable to rectify any miscalculations on his part. In this class of work many of the usual methods are reversed because everything must be measured and fitted to the action. Normally, barrels are made to certain recognised standards, and the action is fitted to the barrels.

The main points when brazing the tubes together are the centres (where the striker will hit the cartridge cap) and the overall width of the completed barrels. If the new tubes match the old ones, it is quite simple for the skilled worker to space them so that when fitted to the action they do not seriously overlap, which means reducing the breech ends, nor cause the action to overlap, which, worse still, means reducing the action. This is bad practice, to say the least, and it is better to leave the breech ends slightly heavy and wide so that when smoothed down to the action, the barrels are at normal strength.

A steel "lump" is dovetailed between the tubes when brazing them, and on this the gun will be hinged; the "loop" under the barrels must be fixed accurately so that the original fore-end or fore-piece can be used again; the tubes are correctly spaced down to the muzzle ends, and with the addition of top and bottom ribs the barrels are ready for the machine shop.

Accurate Bearings.

Once again the operations are spotted from the centres, and to facilitate this, the barrels are roughly "chambered" out so that plugs can be fitted and accurate bearings taken. Briefly, the machinist has to remove all surplus metal, leaving a few thousandths of an inch for the bench worker to play with. The whole process now depends on the steel lump which was brazed between the tubes, as this forms the basis upon which the gun opens and shuts when complete.

Sometimes referred to as the "steels" when in a more advanced state (and split into two parts), they must be very carefully machined, for whereas in the "jointing" of a new gun metal is taken both from the steels and from the corresponding slots in the action, when fitting new barrels all the metal has to be taken from the steels.

The machinist cannot assume that the original construction of the gun was correct, or free from one of the many variations introduced by inventive gunmakers. Any deviation from normal found in the old barrels must be faithfully copied in the new, as the same deviation is present in

the action, which cannot be altered. Provision is made for the cartridge extractor, single or double, by sinking a well in the face of the barrel, and drilling a hole for the full length of the steels for the extractor leg.

If the gun is a self ejector, the accuracy of this hole is doubly important, as a very slight error will completely upset the ejecting mechanism. After the action filer has fitted the new cartridge extractor or extractors, the barrels are returned to the machine shop to have the chambers finally machined to the finished size, an operation always carried out with the extractor in the barrels.

Fitting Action to Barrels.

The silky smoothness with which a gun opens and shuts is no accident, but rather the result of much care and patience, and from the start the action and barrels must be fitted together as tightly as humanly possible without ripping the metal. When the preliminary shaping and fitting are finished, plenty of oil is applied and the action is driven on to the barrels, first with a heavy mallet, and then by being forced home in a big leg-vice.

It may be necessary to do the operation in stages, particularly if the barrels have an extension of any kind, but the principle remains the same, a drive on fit is essential, and even in subsequent stages a mallet has to be used to assemble the gun. Only by these means can the perfect fit be maintained through all processes until the gun is finished.

A little more care is required when fitting new barrels, for unlike a new gun when both action and barrels are in the soft state, and each will "give" to the other, the action of the old gun is glass-hard and will not give only crack if forced too much. Bringing the centres into position has already been mentioned, and when it is seen that the hammer noses are coming exactly central on each barrel, the action can be allowed to come right over. The fore-end is next fitted on, usually the original one, and the gun can now be opened carefully.

To bring the faces of the action and barrels together, the surfaces are blacked by means of a smoke lamp (a wick and paraffin in a tin)

so that when the gun is sharply closed, then opened, the high spots are marked white, and where the black is untouched, a gap exists between the faces. The operation is known as blacking down, and the high spots are carefully removed with a smooth file until the faces are bearing all over and the top of the action is level with the barrels.

The cartridge extractors are connected up, the cocking and ejector work regulated, and when the new barrels are smoothed down to the action, the barrels are bored to size and the gun proved in the routine way. It would be impossible to give a complete list of the different types of gun that come into the gunsmith's hands for new barrels: sufficient to say that some need twice the time spent on them as others, and twice the skill. But whatever the type or value of the gun, the owner can be assured of one thing—it is now safe.

The Girl who Outshot Men

The life-long career of Annie Oakley, whose marksmanship feats remain almost unbelievable to this day, as they were to her own generation, is sketched by Walter Havighurst in the July Reader's Digest.

In Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, which thrilled thousands of Europeans and Americans in the late 19th century, Annie won the undying affection of the famous Indian warrior, Sitting Bull, when in one performance she broke six glass balls in mid-air with six shots of her rifle.

Though the show billed Annie as "The Girl of the Western Plains", she had never seen the western plains until she crossed the Mississippi with the show. But her childhood in the woods of Ohio had demanded the hardihood of a pioneerher father died while she was a child and at 11 she was bringing down wild game with a 40-inch cap-andball rifle.

When she was 15 she was introduced to Frank Butler, an Irishman who, with his partner, did a trickshooting vaudeville act. Annie outshot him in a clay-pigeon contest. A year later she married him; and when his partner was ill, slipped into the act herself. Next day the papers applauded her more than her husband.

In 1884 came stardom, with her husband, in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. Part of Annie's act was to shoot, while on horseback, targets thrown into the air by a galloping cowboy riding ahead of her. Next, her husband would hold up a card, the five of hearts, and Annie would shoot through each heart at 50 feet. She became world famous; in Europe she performed before Queen Victoria, Mark Twain, Crown Prince Wilhelm (the future Kaiser) of Germany. At the request of the Crown Prince she shot the lighted end off his cigarette from 50 feet away.

Although badly injured in a train accident, she toured American training camps in World War I to give rifle demonstrations to the troops. When she died in 1926, Will Rogers, himself originally a Wild West performer with his lariat tricks, wrote , in his column: "... her lovable traits, her thoughtful consideration of others will live as a mark for any woman to shoot at."

All the crew applied for shore leave except one man.

"What's the matter?" asked the officer. "Are you the only sailor who hasn't got a wife in this port?"

"No," replied the exception, "I'm the only one that has!"

"Children do make a difference to the home, don't they?"

"Yes, but it can usually be repaired."



most favoured when shooting mallard, grouse, hares and snipe. "North Country" concluded by advis-ing that he considered it needed a good full choke, held very accurately, built chose whit at 45 words to kill clean a rabbit at 45 yards, with standard gun and loading.



The temptation to regard the .22 rifle as a toy can readily be resisted by reflecting that when firing high-velocity long rifle ammunition, it can deliver a blow of 174 foot-pounds!

The kick of a firearm has two main phases. In the first the exploding charge tends to thrust forward and the gun backward, the greatest velocity is imparted to the lighter of the two objects, but the heavier one is set in motion to some slight extent. This is the phase known as the jump. It affects the flight of the charge because it develops into an upward as well as a backward movement and occurs while the charge is still passing up the barrel. The movement is upward as well as backward because the main point of resistance - the shooter's shoulder is somewhat below the line of thrust, and because the main mass of the gun and its stocking is likewise centred below the thrust axis. The

"'Skeet Royale'-for the skeet shooter who kills his own meat, scours his teeth with river sand, and to whom hog bristles are softest eiderdown."

Shall we ever catch up? Just as we make our native type of skeet a little harder and a little more like the American brand, the skeet editor of an American contemporary comes out with the challenging statement that "What skeet needs today is hair on its chest." He then proceeds to show how the hair is to be planted! "Skeet Royale," the inventor calls it, and he issues a warning in advance that it is only "for tough guys who like their meat mighty rare and their soup unstrained."

Briefly, the scheme is to retain the angled outward birds of the new angled outward birds of the new system, but to alter the trajectory of the low trap bird so that it is only 10 ft. above the ground at 21 yards from the traphouse. The trajectory of the high trap bird remains the same. The object of this is obvious; it is to get variation of plane of flight, and it would make doubles shooting particularly tricky shooting particularly tricky.

Then, to make it harder, the semicircle is put back to the old place a 20-yard radius centred on the point midway between the two traps, so that the actual distance from each shooting station to the point where the bird flights cross is 26 yards instead of 21 yards, as in the present skeet.

Skeet. Shooting procedure is changed to eliminate the easy "incomers" at Stations 1, 2, 6 and 7. Going-away birds only are given from these stations, and pairs of singles from the others. Doubles are then shot from Stations 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8 (this last station is the one not used over here).

The American round of twentyfive birds is made up with one "booby bird"—a simple single from No. 4 station, but with the shooter ignor-ant of which trap will throw it.

There it is, in all its simplicity. Most of us find our own skeet has enough "hair upon its chest" to make it tough for us — and "Skeet Royale" is still only an idea, even in American minds. It is a fairly safe bet





How does a Piaeon find its way?

(By D. H. DAY)

The age-old problem of how pigeons find their way home was discussed scientifically in a recent issue of "The Journal of Experimental Biology". It is of interest to all. Dr. G. V. T. Matthews, Cambridge

University, a leading authority in this field, claimed that some of his experiments had established that pigeons could not home effectively in overcast conditions. He said that indicated that the sun must play a

indicated that the sun must play a part in the way they navigate. In his experiment, Dr. Matthews first kept pigeons for four to five days in irregular periods of light and dark, then transferred them for a further five to 11 days to artificial days and nights of the right length, but advanced or natorided a number but advanced or retarded a number of hours.

When released, all birds flew off consistently in the wrong direction, but Dr. Matthews claimed the direction they took was consistent with their internal "chronometers" having been correspondingly advanced or retarded by the artificial days and nights, causing them to "miscalculate" longitude.

This experiment tended to establish both the existence of time-sense and its function in homing.

Dr. R. Thouless and Mr. J. G. Pratt, Duke University, U.S.A., claimed

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that a pigeon needed a minimum time to observe the arc in which the sun was moving. They found that pigeons which observed it for 10 seconds, before setting off, did just as well as those which observed it for 40 seconds. This weighed against Dr. Matthews' hypothesis.
