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

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The Editor's Notebook



Frequently one hears questions asked as to who were the previous winners of the Champion of Champions Cup and also who, in the past, has been the High-Gun in the International Match for Australia. Delving through the archives, it is interesting to note the names, several of whom recur in both contests.

Starting off with the Champion of Champions Cup, which was first mooted in 1936 following the donation of the handsome sterling silver Champion of Champions Cup by the late Donald Mackintosh, it is interesting to note that it was won in the year of inauguration by H. G. James, then manager for Donald Mackintosh and who now carries on the business of Donald Mackintosh. In 1937 it was won by Lew Bertram, a stalwart of the sport in its initial stages in Victoria. Bertram passed on some years ago. Recalling his win, it will be remembered by those privileged to witness the performance that Bertram won the contest on the 77th round (it was then shot at 50 targets). One of the main features was that he won shooting with an ancient Leo Mills gun which he stated at the time cost him £7/10/-. The following year (1938) W. J. Lancaster of Mildura was the winner. Lancaster was only declared winner after a protest had been lodged and dismissed. Then followed the remarkable chain of successes by Fred Burns. Burns won in 1939 and 1940. Nine years later he won again and followed this with another success in 1952—a record for the event and one which is unlikely to be broken. H. R. Donnelly

won in 1941, the last occasion the event was shot before the cessation for the war period. Donnelly won again in 1948. In 1947 the veteran, Dave Watson, who has long used the shooting non-de-plume of "Doch-an-Doris", possibly because of his Scotch upbringing, won in most unusual conditions. It was the last occasion that the event was shot in Victoria on King's Birthday week-end. The day can best be described as the vilest in the history of the event. Shot on Coburg Club's grounds, the day dawned with accompanying high winds and rain, altogether enough to put off the hardest of trapshots. All marquees and shelter tents were flat on the ground when officials arrived to start the shoot. After the 1947 experience the series was switched to the usual March period, which has proved so satisfactory ever since. Watson held a clean score after the 40th round. Coming up for his final ten releases, he was well behind his 41st and it looked like curtains because many good shots were close-up behind him. Watson, however, carried the strain very well and ran out winner with 49/50—one of the best shoots ever in the event. In 1950 J. A. McCraith, who shoots only occasionally these days, won, followed in 1951 by E. G. Biggs. In 1951 Biggs and Nev. Bassett (Queensland) tied over the scheduled course of the match. Both shot on, stopping them well. Biggs missed his 70th release and Bassett only had to "kill" to win, but unaccountably he also missed. Bassett failed again in his next five and Biggs coasted in.

J. Newton Thomas won in 1953, defeating B. G. S. Schooley, also of Queensland, in a lengthy tie shoot. Allan Quinton of Echuca (V.) withstood a strong challenge from Newton Thomas in 1954, and ran out winner. Sperry Marshall, the brilliant Hobart shot, won convincingly in 1955, whilst the 1956 winner was C. G. Mudford, who outstayed the Broken Hill shot, W. A. Commons, to win on the 95th round. The 1957 winner will be known when this issue reaches readers, and it can be safely said that the event always brings out the best our trapshots have got.

In 1939 saw the start of the now famous International Match, when the competing teams were England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Australia—Australia really appearing for the first time—the Home countries had established the International many years earlier.

The opening match in 1939 was shot on the old Bentleigh grounds of the Victorian Clay Target Club—the grounds are now a market garden. Several tied over the 100 targets and ultimate high-gun went to Athol Love, then a fireman at Eastern Hill (V.). Love mentioned coming up for the 120th round that his legs were getting "rubbery" and he did not think he could stand another round of five. Love, however, gained the honours on the 125th round, with a score of 123/125. The International series then finished for the duration of the war and were not resumed until 1948, when the Australian high-gun was Jack McCraith of Essendon (V.), 98/100. A Tasmanian, R. Redpath, of the Hobart Club, gained the honour in 1949 with a score of 97/100. Redpath's performance was very creditable because, it is recalled, he had to rush to the ground without having partaken of breakfast and did not have anything to eat until the event concluded. Doubtless his head was throbbing before he got through. Redpath and Love appear to have dropped out of the sport these days. Jim Smith, then of Home Hill (Qld.), gained the high-gun honours in 1950 with the low score 94/100. In 1951 J. Newton Thomas, then of Sydney, took top honours in 1951 with 100 straight—the first time the 100 straight had been gained by a member of any competing team. The

English Association struck a special badge for presentation to Thomas to mark the occasion. He wears it regularly to shoots to the present day. John Bryant Junr., of Blackburn, the brilliant left-hander and one of Australia's Olympians at Laverton in 1956, provided a brilliant performance when he won the high-gun in 1952. In that year the event was shot single-barrel and Bryant returned the great score of 97/100. J. Newton Thomas won again in 1953, when the series was shot points system 3 and 2. Thomas carded 289/300 points. Frank C. Johnson, of Lower Ferntree Gully (V.), the Association's official photographer, was in sparkling form in 1954 and dropped only one bird in the 100. His score was 99/100. Double-barrel was reverted to in 1954 and 1955. A. F. Burns (Footscray), often referred to as the best all-round shot in the Commonwealth, won in 1955, also scoring 99/100. Points scoring was again in vogue in 1956 and 1957. In 1956 the systems used was 2 and 1. Successful high-gun was J. L. Nunn of Boonah (Q.), who shot the possible of 100 straight, using one second-barrel and scoring on points 199/200. A remarkable effort. The series was shot outside Victoria for the first time in 1956 when Bankstown (N.S.W.) was selected as the venue. In 1957 and in future years until further notice the International Committee in London has decreed that the International Match will be shot points system, 3 and 2.

The Association is pleased to announce that Mr. J. M. Bauman of Brisbane (Q.) has presented a solid gold (9 ct.) Cup as a Perpetual Trophy to be held by the winner of the Australian High-gun in the International series each year. The Cup, a very handsome trophy, is valued at 150 guineas. It will replace the former Cup which has done service for some years past. Appreciative thanks are offered to Mr. Bauman for his very worthy support and interest in the sport and the Association.

In the May issue of this publication it was mentioned that I.C.I.A.N.Z. Ltd. has agreed to present Silver Commemoration Badges to winners

Steve Stevens, the young 15-year-old rising champion clay target shot, was under notice with a good win in the Camberwell Club's Intermediate Championship at North Balwyn (V.) early in May. Young Stevens missed only one target over the scheduled course of the event. He defeated a good field. The runner-up in the event was the winner's father, Jock Stevens, a well-known shooter on metropolitan and some northern Victorian shooting tracks. Stevens Jr. appears to have a bright future as a trapshot — already he is a 19 yarder.

Colin Fletcher, the former Queenslander, has relinquished his position as secretary of the Dundonnell Club in western Victoria. Fletcher has taken over the Presidential Chair of the club. Secretary at Dundonnell is now Malcolm Small.

the coot. What was it? Wishart knows because he saw it plainly enough. It was NOT a snake, a cod, a spinner—perhaps it was the "Loch Ness Monster"? (Any ideas?)

An interesting first championship success was gained by prominent Melbourne shooter, Eddie Brenk, when he was successful at Croydon (V.). Brenk is a back-marker (well back, too) and in ten years shooting had never previously had the good fortune to win a title match, although he had been runner-up on at least 26 occasions that he can remember. Off his rear-mark, now 24 yards, Brenk has compiled at least 8 runs of 50 straight. His lack of success in championship events just proves how unlucky one can be when it comes to title success.

The occasion of the opening of the night lights on 4/5/57 for night clay pigeon shooting at Mount Gambier, South Australia, was a grand affair. One of the biggest attendances at a South Australian shoot resulted, including no less than 500 spectators. The first clay under lights was broken by Fred Bishop, a life member of the club. The attendance was so large that an "eye-opener" had to be abandoned and proceedings opened with the main £100 Handicap at 20 birds, in which three divided, H. Westlake, E. Messenger and C. Collins, each 20 straight. Colin Barr, the Mount Gambier President, extended a welcome to all present and gave an interesting outline of the club's activities, since its formation in 1872.

St. George Club in Western Queensland will shoot over two days, Saturday, July 27, and Sunday, July 28. The Southern Queensland single-barrel championship will be main interest of a varied programme on opening day, whilst the similar double-barrel title and a £100 Handicap are principal attractions for the Sunday shoot. In a letter received from the Association's good friend in U.S.A., Rex Miles, he has forwarded a duplicate score sheet of the Seattle Gun Club's fixture at Redmond, Washington. Of particular interest is the fact that the competitors' list contains the names of Earl Caldwell and Frank Opsal, the two Canadians who represented their country at the Olympic Games shooting in Melbourne last year. It is of further interest to record that Caldwell gained the high-gun over-all with a score of 190/200 off 23 yards. Caldwell was also winner of the "A"

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class trophy. Opsal totalled 175/200, shooting off 22 yards. The "D" class winner was a woman shooter, Myrtle Winslow, of Seattle, who carded 178/200, off 20 yards. According to the score sheet it would seem as though the first hundred in the event were shot off 16 yards and the remainder off handicap. The "B" grade winner was Alden See Snr., of Renton, with 185/200, and the "C" class top man was W. Kalabin of Kirkland, Wn., with 178/200. Quite a few of the competitors shot in the handicap section only and the front-marker is shown on 18 yards. Again two competitors shot only in the scratch section. Caldwell and Paul Maylor, of Oak Harbour, were the back-markers, each on 23 yards. Mentioning Arnold Reigger, who carried all before him a year or two ago, Rex Miles states that the club has seen nothing of him this season and it is understood he is not shooting much these days. Miles says that he thinks Reigger's 27-yard handicap is not to his liking and it looks as though he has "cooled off". In cuttings forwarded by Miles it is mentioned that the 46th Annual Inland Empire Handicap shoot was held recently at Spokane (Washington). Dale Strodman of Jackson (Mont.) defeated Elmer White (Almira) in a tie shoot, 22/25 to 21/25, after they had tied, each with 95/100. High over-all in the 700-target series was R. E. Bell of Spokane, who stopped 659/700. The event had a total of 3,170 dollars in added money. Fine weather prevailed throughout. Woman high-gun was Vera Holdsworth of Calgary (with 89/100), who has been noted for good performances over the past couple of years.

New Zealand held its International Series at Hamilton in April. The series was blessed with perfect weather. In the first of the "big three" championships, the N.Z. Double-rise title, victory went to S. R. Marston of Christchurch. It was his first National title successes — his score 26/30. J. McKenzie of Seaward Downs won the N.Z. Skeet title with a score of 47/50. The "blue riband" contest of the National titles at Hamilton was the N.Z. Single-rise title, shot at 50 targets. After 30 rounds eight shooters held full scores. B. W. Williams (Hastings) was the

ultimate winner with 65 straight, with A. J. C. Donald of Otahuti, Southland, in second place. S. R. Marston won the A. N. Turner Memorial Trophy after a tie shoot with D. G. Wareham, who is well known in Australia. High-gun in the N.Z. section of the International Match was C. Hartley of Tauranga with the great score of 299/300 points. Hartley has now been New Zealand high-gun in the International for the past three years.

Footscray Club, which shoots on the No. 2 ground at Tottenham (V.), will shoot on July 6, when the club single-barrel title is main event. A 15-bird handicap and skeet events are principal attractions for the following shoot on July 20. Details are as advertised. Enquiries to Lindsay Pollard, secretary, 7 Murray Street, Thornbury, V. A Townsville (Q.) report indicates that Fred Blackman has resumed duties after an absence of some four months. Fred spent a lot of time on Magnetic Island and he reports wonderful improvement as a result. This will be pleasing news for his club members and also his many friends in the South. In a letter Fred mentioned that the duck season opened in the Townsville area on June 1 and will close on September 15—a month earlier than usual — doubtless influenced by the dry season. Ducks are reported to be plentiful, so good shooting is expected.

The Hargrave Park Club at "Bella Vista", Old Windsor Road, near Paramatta (N.S.W.), will shoot the County of Cumberland Mixed Birds title on July 20, followed by the similar double-rise clay sparrow title on August 10. The Charm of Old Guns

By J. WENTWORTH DAY

The Gun or Fowling Piece . . . is a general Engine and may serve for any Fowle Great or Little whatsoever for it hath no respect at what it striketh.
(Gervase Markham, 1621)

"One day, as we came in unexpectedly from a voyage in the punt, something was discovered burning among the logs on the kitchen hearth, and, though a desperate rescue was attempted, nothing was left but the barrel of our precious gun and some crooked iron representing the remains of the lock. . . . The sense of the cruel injustice of that act will never quite depart.

"But they could not burn the barrel and we almost succeeded in fitting it to a stock of elder. . . . The matchlock, for as such it was intended, was nearly finished when our hopes were dashed to the ground by a piece of unnatural cunning. One morning the breech-piece, that screwed in, was missing. This was fatal. A barrel without a breech-piece is like a cup without a bottom. It was all over."

And that, you will remember, is from "The Amateur Poacher", that enchanted book of boyhood days. Could any words better picture the poignancy of the boyish desire to own a gun and its bitter dashing to the ground? Luckily, the young Jefferies, and his brother, who bore the delightfully classical name of Orion, were rewarded, not long after the destruction of the bell-mouthed barrel here recorded, a barrel belonging to a piece which "dated from the time between Stuart and Hanover" with a long, graceful and feather-like single-barrelled muzzle-loader, whose killing powers were enhanced, as the shepherd said, "if you chawed the shot."

Learning to Shoot

How many shooting men today can say that they learned to shoot with a muzzle-loader? Very, very few under the age of fifty years. Yet, I confess, with no little nostalgic pleasure, that I fired my first shot from a single-barrelled muzzle-loader. Like Richard Jefferies' boyhood weapon, it was long and light and slender. And, like his gun, it was at least seventy years old. It belonged

to old Bob King, our farm bailiff, whose boast it was that he had entered our family service when he was a fortnight old. At that tender age his function was to lie swaddled in a blanket on the wooden lid of the great copper in the whitewashed laundry where, gurgling and cooing, he kept the lid from bubbling off whilst his mother pounded at a "killer"* full of soapsuds and sheets. Country women in those days thought nothing of such heroic performances.

Bob had bought the gun for "half-a-crown and a tarrier dawg", more than fifty years before, from a man who was uncertain of its age. So, like Jefferies' gun, it must have been well over seventy years of age. The charge was one clay pipeful of powder, well rammed down, with a wad of newspaper, and one clay pipeful of shot. You rammed the powder until the ramrod jumped out of the barrel and you were recommended to chew the shot in order to make it "fly fudder". If one's teeth were not equal to chewing lead, then the next best thing was to mix the shot with melted tallow. This made it "fly in a ball". But by far the best and surest method of killing at long range was to load with one of Mr. Eley's "patent wire cartridges". Few people nowadays use a wire cartridge, and probably not one young shooter in a hundred would recognise the wire gauze container which was dropped down on top of the powder charge.

Effects Like Shrapnel

Certainly, some very long shots were occasionally pulled off, birds being killed at seventy yards, or more. It was fondly believed that the wire cartridge concentrated the shot charge for at least twenty or thirty yards after leaving the muzzle, at which range the gauze container disintegrated and the shot was released in a spray, rather like a burst of shrapnel. I have heard of three or four partridges thus being killed out of a convey on the wing at one shot.

But the most remarkable performance at home was that of old Mole, our shepherd, who, creeping up a ditch one rimy winter's day with his old brass-bound Tower musket loaded with swan shot, poked the barrel through the hedge, took careful aim at a dozen or more hooded crows, sitting like ghouls on a row of hurdles, and slew seven.

I must confess that I still shoot with three or four of the seventeen muzzle-loaders of all bores and lengths which adorn the gun-room. There is, for example, a single-barrelled four-bore by Wilkinson of Pall Mall made in the year of Waterloo, which, although some 14 lb. in weight, still handles sweetly, shoots strongly and will kill a goose stone dead at ninety yards. Today, with the price of ordinary cartridges at well-nigh prohibitive levels and 4-bore cartridges costing half-a-sovereign or so each, such a gun has very definite uses, particularly when taken in the punt or used from the deck of the fishing smack which is our "mother ship" on my salt-water fowling occasions.

Then there is a single 10-bore by G. E. Lewis, as good as the day it was built, and a superb double-twelve by Blissett, which is a joy to shoot with. The range and penetration of all three guns are exceptional, whilst their lightness and ease of handling is quite remarkable. The plain fact is that a best quality muzzle-loader was always a work of art, and, owing to the simplicity and lightness of its locks, it handles with featherweight ease.

Connoisseur's Pleasure

But although some few older men may find a connoisseur's pleasure in shooting with a good muzzle-loader, the fact remains that no muzzle-loader is an ideal gun for a beginner. The risks are too great. First, there is the risk that the gun may be so old that the metal has become "sugary" and liable to blow up. Secondly, there is the risk of over-charging, which again means blowing the weapon to pieces. Thirdly, there is the even greater risk of reloading the gun when a grain or two of smouldering powder may still cling to the inside of the barrel. If that happens, the new charge, as it is

poured down the barrel, will ignite, a tongue of flame will shoot out of the muzzle, and the powder flask will blow up in the shooter's hand, taking his hand with it. For that reason, I always swab out my muzzle-loading puntgun and the 4-bore with a twist of oakum on the loading-rod before recharging either of them.

I have shot with a good many muzzle-loading 8-bores of varying weights, lengths and performances. It was the "long-gun" most commonly in use among the fen fowlers and coastal gunners of one's youth. Old Norfolk gunners called them "marsh rails". I possess a number of highly interesting old 8-bores of varying degrees of unsafeness. Practically every one is credited with having performed prodigies of slaughter at unbelievable ranges. There is the single flint-lock 8-bore with the six-foot barrel, which once stood in the Armoury at Wentworth Castle in the West Riding amid a fantastic collection of muskets, rifles, short swords, horse pistols, battle-axes and armour. It now hangs in my gun-room just above the five-foot, four-inch barrel of the long "bank-gun" which, a hundred years ago, boomed over the flooded wastes of the Old Bedford River "washes" at Welches Dam. It is supposed to have killed no less than forty-six peewits at one shot.

The workaday gun, and indeed the gem of the collection, is a mighty double-hammer breech-loader 8-bore by the one and only Joe Lang, with 36-in. Damascus barrels, bored to shoot 4½-in. cartridges, which today are unobtainable. This gun has a hole through the stock, through which a breeching rope can be roved, thus turning it into a puntgun. It fires 2½ oz. of shot from each barrel and is deadly up to a hundred yards.

In spite of its weight of 16½ lb., it swings easily and well from the shoulder at an angle of 45 degrees for overhead shots. It must be admitted that, when fired on a horizontal level, there is a tendency to "barrel drop", although, to be sure, one wintry day at Wells-next-the-Sea I actually shot a jack snipe with it in the goods yard at the edge of the saltings, using No. 2 shot! I posted

the bird, with an account of its incredible demise, to John de Grey, the late Lord Walsingham, who was lying ill at Merton. He adored snipe on toast and was the author of those two enchanting little books "Hit and Miss" and "Fish", which should be on every gunroom bookshelf.

He wrote back: "Thank you so much for *Scolopax minimus* Miraculous! This reminds me of the man who shot a crocodile in a tree! He caught it on a shark hook, and, being unable to land it himself, threw the end of the cable over the branch of a tree. Then, with three or four natives hauling on the rope, they pulled the crocodile out of the water and up to the branch, where he shot it. Your jack snipe belongs to the same category!"

The real uses of the 8-bore are by no means confined to the shooting of jack snipe in goods yards. It is the ideal gun for use in a boat or punt when one does not want to use a punt-gun. It is equally admirable for fighting when standing under a sea-wall, waiting for geese, that may come in seventy or eighty yards up. Birds which are normally beyond the range of a long-case 12 can be brought down with an 8-bore, although one is well aware that many excellent bags of geese have been made with long 12s. The most popular and most usual length of 8-bore cartridge is 3¼ inches, which can generally be relied on to kill with reasonable certainty up to 80 yards, or to mop up half a dozen duck at a single shot if they are well bunched. I have killed five wigeon on the wing at one shot with my big 8, a shot which can undoubtedly be surpassed by many other gunners.

Concerning 4-Bores

Four-bores are seldom used nowadays except by a few muscular fowlers. A 4-bore can weigh anything from 17 lb. to 22 lb. for a single barrel. It makes an admirable light punt-gun. I have owned several, including one which once knocked out five greylag on the wing at one shot. The man behind the gun for that shot was that first-rate sportsman and naturalist, the late Edward Valpy, who was never happier than when fowling on his wonderful island called Bo (pronounced Boo) in the Lofoten Islands under the unearthly light of

the midnight sun.

Valpy was one of the few men who, before the 1914-18 war, crossed the Himalayas on foot and penetrated, disguised as a Holy Man, into the secret temples of Lhasa, "The Forbidden City" of Tibet. He also had the distinction of buying 50,000 acres of the Hebrides for £500! It worked out at 2½d. an acre, the cheapest British land sale ever recorded. The property was the Galsen part of the island of Lewis. I remember that he offered me 10,000 acres for £100 — which, after careful calculation of the feu-duties and other drawbacks, I refused!

Dear Sir,

May I touch on what is perhaps the most vexed question among members of the Association (in these parts at least) at the present moment.

It is the matter of handicapping. News of the "new method" came as quite a surprise to most shooters and the first reaction was "it cannot last".

Attendance at club shoots of our own club have fallen off to such an extent that it is causing our executive and committee no small concern, and

I understand this is the case with most clubs in this area.

Now it would appear that the method of putting beginners on 12 yards and letting them shoot their way back to a more stringent handicap proved very successful for the ten years following the commencement of post-war shooting. But the back markers (generally those good shots who earned a handicap of 18 yards or more during this period) could not accept the "right" of a front marker winning an important handicap event. They considered the front marker had it all his own way.

Let us analyse where most big prize money has gone over the years and which shooters have the big breaks to their credit. I would say that so far as our club is concerned that 90% of big handicap prize money and 100 break badges are held by the back markers. All done off their association handicap, too.

The meeting of the Executive of the Association at Bankstown last year to make this radical change has done much to injure the stability of clubs. This is a considered opinion by most shooters I have spoken with over the period.

Attendance figures at our club have fallen from fifteen to twenty-five novice shooters to about three or four per shoot. This leaves us with an attendance of perhaps fifteen to twenty, which number is insufficient to meet the overhead attached to a shoot and still return at least fifty per cent. of nomination money to the shooters.

I ask you, sir, why was the beginner penalised by bringing him back 4 yards in one sweep and compelling him to meet the good shooter 3 yards worse off. Whoever thought this was an equitable means of handicapping?

The rule has done nothing else but discourage the beginner and novice shooter and to make the winning of championships and the big handicap more certain for the back marker.

To offset the disadvantage this new handicapping has caused, our own executive are endeavouring to restore interest in club shoots by giving front markers a bird or two, and in

some instances up to four birds start in a 10-bird handicap event. This is a just means of encouraging the front marker, but he rarely does better than to share a sweepstake with the back markers despite this apparent advantage.

A dual method of handicapping is not desirable, to say the least, but is being tried by our club to try and restore interest in this wonderful sport.

With so many others, I feel a reversion to the old method must soon take place.

Why not a vote on the question by the President of every club within the Association, who, before recording his vote, can be guided by the feelings of his active club members.

The Riddle of the Crow

One of the most unwelcome sounds is the raucous "Caw! Caw!" of the crow.

The economic status of the crow is questionable. The crow is condemned as an egg eater and young bird destroyer, feeding on them before grasshoppers are plentiful. From an agricultural standpoint, the case is not so black for the crow. He does not seriously affect grain, but does help to control some of the worst insect pests the farmer has to contend with. Cases have been reported where land frequented by numerous crows escaped serious damage from grasshoppers while adjoining localities where crows had been systematically shot were devastated by the pests. Some sporting organisations attempt to control the crow since it raids the nests of ducks and other game birds. However, the crow is wary, intelligent and adaptable, and even though attempts are made to eradicate him, he survives.

One of the most interesting experiments attempting to explain the migration of birds was undertaken with crows by Dr. Wm. Rowan of Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. In August of 1929, and again in 1931, he and his students trapped hundreds

of crows and housed them in large flying cages. Each crow was banded with a number tag and placed in one of two groups, the "control birds" which were kept under normal conditions and the "experimental birds" which were subjected to daily increasing doses of artificial daylight. Instead of being under the influence of the shortening days of winter as were the control birds, the experimental birds were subjected to ever-lengthening hours of light; in other words, to an artificial spring.

When the crows were released in summer the experimental crows flew off in a northward direction—not one crow turned toward the south.

The control birds appeared more hesitant, they hung about in the trees near the cages, the urge to migrate south had apparently been lost. In spite of sub-zero temperatures, they remained throughout the winter.

Dr. Rowan was attempting to prove that the twice-yearly migration journeys of birds was brought on by the shortening of days. He emphasised, however, that such experiments would have to be repeated many times under many different conditions to prove his point.






