



An interesting enquiry has come from a Northern club. The club advises. "Is there anything in the rules relating to the use of a gun in competition fitted with a special sight? We have a chap in our club who has a special type of peep sight with a small spot lens." In the first place the enquiry is most unusual. How could a shooter really do himself justice in endeavouring to shoot clay targets with a peep sight? Reference to gunsmiths has brought the reply that the shooter concerned is only handicapping himself by installing a peep sight. This type of sight is used and is, in fact, essential in .303 shooting, but for use on a 12-gauge shotgun, it would appear to be quite unnecessary equipment. Years ago a few of the old-time shooters tried out a modified peep sight, but these did not last long and were soon discarded.

The English (or United Kingdom) section of the 1958 International competitions will be shot at Harrogate (England) on June 27 and June 28. It is of interest to note the conditions, laid down by the English governing body, which require to be complied with before any intending competitor's nomination to take part is accepted. The final selection of the English team will be made by the Team Selection Sub - Committee, and the decision of this Committee is final. The names of those selected will be made known at the conclusion of the English Open Down-the-Line Championship on June 7. The conditions are:—

(a) Only those competitors who shot at a minimum of 500 birds, down-the-line, in Association events and other major competitions held during 1957 shall be considered for a possible place, provided that, in addition:

(b) They shoot at a minimum of 300 birds down-the-line, in any competitions held during 1958 before June 6, the scores of which must be notified in writing to the Secretary of the C.P.S.A. by that date: and:

(c) They shoot over the 200 birds of the English Open Down-the-Line Championship Meeting on June 6 and 7, 1958.


The Captain of the 1958 English Team, who has already been chosen, is Mr. T. S. Bamber (Lancs.), with Mr. E. Horlock (Hants.) Vice-Captain.

The question as to whether women social members are permitted under Association rules has been raised by a New South Wales club. The Association has no ruling on the question of women members of a club, social or shooting members. It would seem that the feminine interest in a club is all to the good; in fact, quite a number of clubs throughout Australia already have women as club secretaries. And, in most instances, all are doing a very good job. The enquiring club was concerned chiefly on the question of registration. If a women shooter takes part in competition she is liable for registration the same as are all male competitors.

It was a pleasant occasion to see Association Patron, Frank Hockey, really breaking them in the first two events of the Camberwell Club's recent fixture. Frank has long been a Patron of the Association, and although bouts of ill-health have caused him concern in recent years, he is still able to get a cut occasionally. Frank is an old "Nobel" shooter and one who remembers the sport and the Association in infancy. It is worthy of mention that Frank just does not merely lend his name as Patron of the Association, but backs it up every year with a substantial donation to the Association funds. Long may he continue to enjoy the sport of his liking.

Clubs are reminded when applying for the new Association badge, carrying the new "A.C.T.A." insignia, that names of those whom it is intended badges will be issued to should be given. Recently one or two clubs have asked for a number of badges without indicating names of recipients. No badges will be issued unless April 1958 full details of names are given, otherwise unregistered shooters could easily obtain these registration badges.

A shooter recently wrote the Association enquiring "if any shooter can take part in any championship without any championship qualification". This is an unusual query. In the first place it could be that a championship could be advertised and there would be no starters because none would hold "championship qualification". Any shooter may take part in an open championship under the jurisdiction of the Association, providing he is registered and belongs to an affiliated club.

#### NATIONAL RESULTS 1958 ASSOCIATION SHOOT

The Australian Clay Target Association's annual National and International series, held at East Burwood (Victoria) for the first time since 1955, produced an excellent entry. with a gross total of 235 entries in the main event, which decided the Australian Team for the International Match. A great interest was the entry of two New Zealander sportsmen, in Allan Brown of Otago (N.Z.) and Jim McKenzie of Seward Downs (N.Z.). All States of the Commonwealth were well represented, with the biggest entry ever in the series of ten shooters from Western Australia. State totals were: Victoria 146. N.S.W. 46, Queensland 13, Tasmania 9, W.A. 10, S.A. 8, Northern Ter-ritory 1, and New Zealand 2. Generally fine weather prevailed throughout the fixture. Proceedings opened with the Australian National Single-barrel Championship, at 40 targets from 16 yards, both barrels equal value. Three carded the full complement of 40 straight. the full complement of 40 straight. They were Claude Dean of Wan-garatta (V.), Jack Blake of Cressy (Tas.), and Cyril Ferguson of Bris-bane (Q.). The tie shoot went to the 95th round, with Dean taking the honours 95/95 from Blake 94/95, and

(Keilor, V.), 48/50. The sectional awards were won by: 12/16 yarder, P. Williams (Naracoorte, S.A.) 37/ 40; 17 yarder, L. Higgins (Willaura, V.) 36/40; 18 yarder, Allan Brown (New Zealand) 47/50; 19 yarder, R. Rawlings (Bruthen, V.) 43/45; 20 yards and over, Tup Pedersen (Drouin, V.) 49/51. The State awards were won: New South Wales, Fred Hudson, 53/55; Queensland, J. L. Nunn (Boonah, Q.); Tasmania, Fred Blake (Cressy, Tas.); South Aus-tralia, W. A. Commons (Adelaide, S.A.), 48/44; Western Australia, F. Bailey, 37/40. The Ladies' Trophy was won by Miss Pam Coxon of Isis-P. Williams (Naracoorte, S.A.) 37/ was won by Miss Pam Coxon of Isisford (Q.), 33/40.

Saturday, March 8, opened cloudy and calm when the National Doublebarrel title was decided. 235 nominated. Match conditions were 60 targets from 16 yards, double barrel, points scoring 3 and 2. J. Newton Thomas and A. C. Tie tied with 179/ 180 points. The tie shoot went another 20 rounds before Tie failed to cover a left-quartering bird and Thomas won 239/240 points, Tie 238/

166/180; 18 yarder, S. McFarland (Hay, N.S.W.) 174/180; 19 yarder, A. Bradley (Captain's Flat, N.S.W.) 175/180; 20 yards and over, C. G. Mudford (Preston, V.) 220/225. Miss Pam Coxon again won the Ladies' award. The State trophies (not winning any other award): New South Wales, Don Scowcroft (Newcastle, N.S.W.), 190/195; Queensland, Cyril Ferguson (Brisbane, Q.), 162/180; Tasmania, Jack Blake, 172/180; South Australia, W. A. Commons (Adelaide, S.A.), 174/180; Western Australia, Frank Bailey, 172/180.

Another good crowd attended on Monday, March 10, when conditions were pleasant, but inclined to be windy. The Australian Team of 30 men faced up to their marathon event of 100 targets from 16 yards, shooting from the No. 3 trap. The 10th Grand Australian Handicap of £200, at 45 targets from Association Handicap marks, attracted another good entry. This event was shot while the Internationals were engaged on the No. 3 ground. As is occasionally noticed in big events of this type, only one possible, by Les Turner, a director of Evans & Balfour, was diffector of Evans & Balfour, was carded, 45/45, and Turner gained the first money. Second to ninth places were cut by L. Engel (Newcastle, N.S.W.), N. Simson (Tally-Ho), L. Eastoe (Mentone, V.), L. Mitchell (Moe, V.), R. Layton (Melbourne), A. Hamilton (Dandenong), C. Mud-ford (Prestor) W Enging (Card A. Hamilton (Dandenong), C. Mud-ford (Preston), W. Finnigan (Gar-denvale, V.), each 43/45. Tenth to thirteenth money was cut by F. Brook (Gilgandra, N.S.W.), Leo Haseler (Clara Creek, Q.), W. Lonie (Croy-don, V.), Dr. A. C. Gibbons (Pens-hurst, N.S.W.), A. Hedger (Alexan-dra, V.), R. Thom (Burwood, V.), G. T. Wakefield (Mildura, V.), R. Manuel (Kerang, V.), G. Gilfillan (Shoalhaven, N.S.W.), G. Marshall (Hobart, T.), A. Bradley (Captain's Flat, N.S.W.) and C. L. Barnes (Mil-dura, V.), 42/45. #### COMMONWEALTH TITLE TO BREDA AUTOMATIC

**Congratulations Sperry Marshall** on winning the Commonwealth Skeet Championship,

by the Sydney Gun Club's President, W. J. (Bill) Rutty of Wollongong, N.S.W., who returned high-gun figures of 296/300 points. In the windy conditions which prevailed for the match, Rutty's effort was particularly meritorious.

The Club Teams' Championship, shot in conjunction with the Australian National Single-barrel Championship on March 8th, was again won by the Coburg (V.) No. 2 Team, with a score of 358/360 points. This team was the holder of the title, which was gained at Southport (Q.) in 1957.

The weather for the final day, Tuesday, March 11th, was as near perfect for shooting as could possibly be desired - no wind and pleasantly warm sunshine. Shooting opened on the last day with the A.C.T.A. Intermediate Championship at 20 targets from 16 yards, double-barrel (both barrels equal value). Another good field of front and middle-mark shooters faced up to the traps, which was shot once across the ground, that is to say, five targets from each trap. Five competitors returned possible scores of 20 straight. The tie shoot went to 45 rounds before a winner was obtained in P. Williams of Naracoorte (S.A.), who took the main honours from Air Commodore W. Garing, 45/45 to 44/ 45. Williams is a prominent duck shot in the Naracoorte district. Air Commodore Garing has only been shooting for a few months. He is Commanding Officer of the Air Force Station at Point Cook (Victoria) and had a most distinguished war record. gaining many decorations under combat conditions. Third place went to


the veteran V. L. Fankhauser, who owns the property on which the Burwood shooting grounds are situated, 29/30. S. Thom, a shooter taking part in his first competition shoot, and a brother of the wellknown Victorian back-marker, Russell Thom, gained fourth placing, 27/30; S. A. Staughton of Tally-Ho (N.S.W.) was the fifth place-getter, 22/25.

One hundred and fifty-one nominated for the blue riband of the series, the Champion of Champions Cup, including the title holder, Russell Faunt, of Sydney. Perfect conditions prevailed throughout.

The traditional Champion of Champions Cup was, of course, main interest on the final day of the series. A very good field took part, repre-sentative of all States and New Zealand. Shot at 60 targets from 20 yards, double - barrel, both barrels equal value, many shooters were well in the running at half-way. One of the most remarkable incidents over the final stages occurred when Fred Burns (V.), holding to a clean score, shot behind his 55th target and clean missed with both barrels. A still more remarkable incident took place when the favourite for the event, Newton Thomas, clean missed his final target. Those who returned full scores were Sperry Marshall (Hobart, Tas.), the 1955 winner, when the event was last held in Melbourne, A. (Mick) Hamilton (Dandenong), and the secretary of the Australian Gun Club and Marshall of the shoot, A. H. (Eddie) Brenk. Shooting on, over the best of five, Brenk was the first to fall and took third placing when he missed his 66th target and returned figures of 69/70. Hamilton and Marshall kept together for a further 20 rounds. Marshall appeared to be a little lucky, as on two occasions he just scraped small pieces off with his second barrel. Hamilton was shooting very well, but appeared to be getting faster each shot, a factor which proved his undoing. Stabbing at a right-quartering target, he seemed to shoot over it quickly with both barrels and failed on 86th round: Marshall broke the remaining targets of the round and ran out winner, 90/90, to Hamilton, 89/90. The winner was loudly applauded for his success. Bill Rainbird of Launceston,

who deputised for the President at the final presentation of trophies, was indeed pleased.

Don Scowcroft (Newcastle), Barry Guy (Portland, V.), S. Stevens (Northcote, a 16-year-old shooter who is still at school), Newton Thomas, J. McKenzie (New Zealand), Peter Poole (Melbourne) and Fred Burns (Footscray), all with final scores of 59/60, shot on to decide the remain-ing two places. Young Stevens, who found the "weight" a bit too heavy, missed his third release in the tie shoot, whilst the New Zealander, McKenzie, strangely missed his first tie shoot target. Scowcroft missed his 15th tie shot and Poole his 26th. Thomas and Burns then staged a treat for the spectators. These two, possibly two of the best all round shooters in Australia today, shot until their guns got too hot to hold. They appeared to be inseparable. After a conference both agreed to shoot from the Association back-mark handicap of 27 yards. Thomas won after the scores had reached the 130th round, 129/130 to Burns 128/ 130. So concluded one of the best post-war shoots held by the Association. Thanks are extended to all those who co-operated and assisted in the conduct of the shoot.

Being one of the few active members of the "fair sex" but greatly interested in the sport of clay pigeon shooting, I read with much interest the letter of Mr. E. E. Albert and felt I had to answer.

Yes, Mr. Albert is right when he says Gun Clubs are folding up in lots of instances, and I think he's right about the sport being too expensive; this, I think — and I've been around many Gun Clubs — is the main factor in the falling off of the shooters.

The introduction of 16 yds., I think, was another factor which somewhat helped to turn away a few members. most of them have not rejoined — at least, not in this vicinity, but we've been lucky enough in our own particular club to get 10 - 12 new members.

But where Mr. Albert gets the information from that clay pigeon shooting is too easy is beyond my comprehension, and I know most shooters will agree with me. He says, on a reasonable day, conditions are too easy. How often do we have such a day for our shoots?

He points out a list of Championship winners; well, good luck to them, any of the other shooters who attended could have shot the possible, too. Believe me, you have to be on top form to win a Championship, or anything else at a Gun Club these days.

However hard the shooting conditions are, the experienced shot or the good average man will win, so by making things harder you will certainly lose the new shooter and a lot of average men, too; they wouldn't have a chance. The best shooter in the world can only shoot the possible.

I've only been shooting a short time, I love the sport, never miss a shoot any time I can get to one; I've just got to the stage where I can perhaps divide an event now and again, and believe me, Mr. Albert, that is what makes the sport so much more exciting. Do you think I would like to go to meeting after meeting, or any other shooter either, to see conditions so hard I was "not in the race"? No, sir, if that was so, I'm afraid the Association would be minus a lot more of its members.

### GUN GOSSIP •

By NORTH COUNTRY (By courtesy Editor "Shooting Times", England)

I do not know if it is due to the greater amount of publicity which seems to be given to everything today, but I keep on hearing of, or reading about shooting accidents. It is not possible to say how numbers compare with those of former years, but I have only to read the popular Press to see how often accidents occur, and how many of them are fatal. In the old days the most common ground for accidents was in rabbit shooting; now it appears to be in bird shooting. All sorts of people seem to go in for shooting today — people, I should say, who have had but scant training (if any training at all) in the safe use of firearms.

An ominous factor in this is the cavalier attitude so often shown by some of those who have been concerned in these accidents. Even in my own experience, I have known members of a party to adopt a lighthearted attitude towards this whole question of accidents — as if to say that an occasional accident here and there was almost part and parcel of the game! I was brought up in a very different school to this; you only had to make one little slip and home you went! And to miss a whole day's shooting because you omitted to remove your cartridges when climbing a gate was the sort of punishment you did not forget. I should like to see a bit more discipline along these lines today.

There are kinds of shooting which are far more dangerous than rabbit shooting. This is where shots at low birds are taken. This, I feel sure, is how many a serious accident is caused. In rabbit shooting the charge was directed towards the ground, and the less vital parts of the human anatomy would be the most likely to be hit — should an accident occur. But a low shot may well be at head level. And should someone happen to be the other side of the hedge and in the line of fire, the worst might happen.

I think something might be done by means of a film showing just how accidents happen and the situations that lead up to them. It would need a lot of working out by experts in order to be of value, and to achieve its purpose. But shown on T.V., it should have some effect in combating the evil and helping to improve matters. Many of those who use guns are not sufficiently danger-conscious. They fail to realise how tragic can be the result of the least negligence, carelessness or thoughtlessness. Accidents happen so quickly (and so easily in the case of irresponsibility). 1 always feel the extra danger when shooting in enclosed country. High hedges often mean much to the rough shooter or the solitary shooter. But what lurks behind them must be his constant concern. It need not necessarily be human beings - it may be cattle.

The first snipe I ever shot was on a bit of marsh where cattle grazed. The difficulty lay not so much in the shooting of the bird (which gave me as easy a chance as snipe ever do give), but in keeping my line of fire off the cattle, which were all around, I dislike situations of this kind.

It is often in circumstances of that kind that the worst accidents happen, a man may be careful enough in his handling at home or at the shooting school, but under the excitement generated in the field, when game is flushed, he may behave differently.

# OUT OF THE PAST

#### **Twenty Years Ago**

Fred Burns. who was described in Coburg Club for the first time, when 1938 as a "Werribee" shooter, won the Victorian Mixed Birds Championship at the Blackburn grounds, Burns missed only one target, in this rather difficult type of event, in the doublerise section.

Miss K. Bloomfield, now a wellknown Melbourne medico, was under notice in late March 1938 when she won a ten birder outright from the then reigning Champion of Champions Cup holder, the late Lew Bertram.

Also about the same period Bill Twyerould, who is now President of the Frankston Club, won a ten birder outright.


With the duck season in Victoria in full swing, it is of interest to make reference to the question of adequate-ly drying-out waders or gumboots. In many cases water comes in over the top of waders, similarly with rubber boots. Modern electrical ap-pliances are first class for dealing with condensation, but it is too much to expect them to cope rapidly with really soaked equipment. The well-tried stuffing with newspaper has proved efficient in many cases, given sufficient time, but when it is a

question of ensuring warm, dry feet at the next outing, possibly within an hour or so, alternative drying methods must be looked to. It is definitely not reasonable treatment to subject rubber boots to intensive heat. A worthwhile hint on dryingout equipment mentioned is to place a few handfuls of bran in each boot. The bran will absorb the moisture in almost record time. A light covering of bran inside a rubber boot, whether wet or dry, makes for a most comfortable foot-warming "sock". Damp boots can also be efficiently aired with the aid of a piece of cardboard. Inserted in the leg section, clear of the foot, the cardboard creates a passage of circulating air which quickly dries the inside lining. For those who brave the many duck swamps, the foregoing hints are of value.

### **Preparing Wild Duck**

With the duck season at hand again, most shooters (those who do not do their own cooking) expect their bag of wild duck to be properly cooked. The flavoured gravy and sage and onion 'stuffing are important factors. If the birds are young, most can be assured of successful cooking if the following old English directions are carried out:

Clean, wash and wipe the ducks, stuff and sew up, reserving the giblets for gravy. Roast for about one hour, basting well. Skim the gravy before putting in the giblets and thickening.

The giblets should first be stewed in a very little water, then chopped fine and added to the gravy in the roasting pan, with a chopped shallot and a spoonful of browned flour. Serve with currant or grape jelly.

If you are doubtful of the age of the bird, it is a good idea to wrap it up completely in a large piece of greaseproof paper, putting the dripping inside the paper.

#### TENDER RESULT

This not only keeps the bird moist, but also the enclosed steam will make even a tough bird tender.

For the stuffing, take 6 onions, 1 heaped tablespoon sage leaves (finely chopped), salt and pepper,  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. breadcrumbs, 1 oz. butter.

Boil onions until nearly tender, drain, dry and chop them up. Add other ingredients and mix well.
