



The Editor's Notebook



It is announced with deep regret that another of the Association's Patrons, Sir W. Lennon Raws, passed away in Melbourne on Saturday, April 19, at the age of 79. Sir Lennon Raws, together with the late Mr. Donald Mackintosh, were the foundation Patrons of the Association when tion Patrons of the Association when the body was first formed in the early thirties. When accepting the appoint-ment, Sir Lennon Raws expressed great pleasure and readily agreed that his Company, I. C. I. A. N. Z. Limited, would support the Associa-tion in all its activities. Much of the long-sustained support given by the Company to the Association has its origin in steps taken by Sir Lennon Raws. He was the Company's first managing director and was Chairman of Directors when he retired from active participation in the Company's affairs some eleven years ago. His wife, Lady Raws, predeceased him by 12 years. He leaves three married daughters and one son, to whom the sympathy of all is extended.

The First International Gun Show and Hunting and Fishing Exhibition has been arranged to take place at the London Olympia for ten davs, commencing on August 14 next. The Exhibition, as already stated, is the first of its kind and should create world-wide interest.

The Exhibition will cover all types of guns and shooting, including biggame hunting. It will also deal with fishing and hunting in most countries.

Antique and historic guns will be on display and other special features will include demonstrations of falconry and fly-casting.

One of the purposes of the Exhibition is to encourage the general public to take an objective view of field sports and to recognise the value of shooting and hunting in protecting the farmer and maintaining the balance of nature.

The Exhibition is being promoted by the Foreign Fairs Exhibits Limited of 58 Jermyn Street, London, S.W.1. It should have more than a general interest to Australia and any Australians whom may happen to be in England about the period mentioned.

The A.C.T.A. is again indebted to the interest taken in the sport of clay pigeon shooting and the Association by I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited. The Association desire to acknowledge with deep appreciation the Company's handsome donation of £150 towards the cost of financing the annual Interstate Teams' Shoot, for which is awarded "The Great Britain & Ireland" Trophy, at present held by Tasmania. Several years ago the Company interested itself in assisting this event and has continued to do so ever since. In fact, in the Olympic year of 1956 the Company increased the donation to £300. Sincere thanks are extended for this worthy support.

It is also mentioned that the Company annually provides the targets and cartridges for the annual International Match as well as most targets for the Champion of Champions Cup, and the funds for the Air-Fare event.

The aggregation of these donations makes up to a substantial sum each year and one which greatly assists the Association in carrying out its many functions.

Some queries which have come to hand recently are outlined. One club wrote: "If a shooter wins more than one event during an afternoon or wins one event and divides another two, is that shooter handicapped on each event? For example, a shooter on 16 yards wins the first event, ties in the second, wins the third and then divides the fourth, should that shooter remain on the 16-yard mark all day or at the end of the day be shooting off the 19-vard mark? Also what would be his handicap if on the same day he made a fifty break?" In the first place, it would appear that the shooter, to gain the successes outlined, was obviously on the wrong mark. Apparently he had not been handicapped on his previous form to be allowed to shoot off 16 yards. It is wise to exercise discretion when such an occasion as mentioned arises. The shooter may: (1) be under-handicapped in the first place, (2) he may be having a "day out", (3) the class of opposition may be so weak that he cannot help but be successful. On the gains mentioned, the shooter should at least be brought back two yards, taking into account the 50 break as well. The club goes on: "Has the official club handicapper power to bring a shooter forward if he considers so, or must he recommend it to the Association?" The official club handicapper (it should be noted "official", not just any official who happens along) has the power to move any shooter forward or back at any time, provided the Association is informed within three (3) days of the action and adequate reason given for such movement. If approved by the Association, the movement will then be shown in the first available issue of "News" which follows.

During the past month several clubs have submitted long lists of members, at the same time advising that those on the list submitted were to be issued with new A.C.T.A. official Association badges. Apparently the officials submitting these lists are not conversant with the regulation governing the issue of new badges. When a newly registered shooter is enrolled on the registration list he is automatically issued with the new badge. However, for previously registered shooters where a new badge is required, the fee of 4/6 is required to be paid, and this payment must accompany all applications for the new badge issue.

It would appear that those referred to above who have lodged applications for badges have mis-read the paragraph in the April issue. Those interested are advised to refer to their December 1957 issue of "News" (pages 5 and 6), which clearly outline the procedure required.

GUN GOSSIP **

By NORTH COUNTRY

(in "Shooting Times")

Some men are just natural shots and, given the chance, very quickly attain a high standard. All they need is experience and polish. But they must be discouraged from the temptation (nothing succeeds like success) to take shots at unsporting ranges. It is not at all easy to say how this should be done unless you personally know the "culprit". What would offend one man might be accepted by another (and acted upon). But the correction must be made or else, good shot though he may be, the culprit will never become "persona grata" in respectable shooting society.

But how do these natural shots happen? That is indeed a question. It might as well be asked how certain great writers, actors, etc., came into being! At the same time most of us need to develop a bit, no matter what natural advantages we may have. The good eye has to be sharpened. Yet shooting is an exacting sport, making many calls upon our capacities. The natural shot who scarcely misses a walked-up bird does not necessarily live up to his name when faced with the best of driven birds.

Now my correspondent has something to tell us about his own case. He writes: "Natural shooting is quite contrary to my own case; to perform respectably I need a gun made to fit. practice at clays, care with gun mounting and footwork and a selfanalysis of where the shot went when I miss. There are some days when I shoot well, when I seem to be able to make a mental note at the moment of gun mounting: "that bird is rising, shoot well over it," or at a crossing shot: "that bird is well out, swing shot: "that bird is well out, swing through a bit more"; or at a bird coming apparently straight at my butt: "that bird's head is pointing a bit to the right, give it a bit of swing! There seems to be plenty of time to note the direction of flight before shooting, yet I am conscious of taking my shots quickly without in any way poking. At other times I just can't make myself shoot in the manner described; to some extent this is due to lack of practice, especially the lack of rabbits, which not only provided practice, but kept one on the alert and ready for action when shots at birds were few and far between."

This is a graphic description of the kind of shooting experience which is common to most of us. We are, as it were, able to hurry slowly on our good days. The fact is the eye is in, our footwork and stance are just right, our swing is effective — all fits in to its appointed place. On our off days, it is the reverse of all this. Everything is just wrong. And we end up by poking our guns.

So the question of the psychology of shooting arises. It may be asked why, if we enjoy a normal standard of health, we should ever have these off days. Actually it is my experience that when we have these off days we are, as often as not, one hundred per cent fit. I have been out shooting, running a temperature, and have shot well in spite of it. On the other hand, I have shot very badly when feeling on top of the world. Do we always concentrate enough? I don't know, but I doubt it. This calls for an effort that we are inclined to relax without perhaps fully realising the fact at the time. When we wake up, it is generally too late. There follow those post-mortems in the gunroom on all the birds (or beasts) which we ought to have bagged.

Does a man in his sixties need a light gun? This was put to me by a reader nearing the sixty mark who is about to purchase a new gun. I would say the answer depends on the individual, always bearing in mind that at this age he is not getting any younger. Most gun-makers make quite a speciality of manufacturing light guns of one kind or another. So clearly the demand is good enough. I think that as this man is having a new gun in any event, he might as well make it a light one. If he wants to cut down on his charge and insure himself against recoil effects, he can have rather more choke in both barrels. Thus his ranging power will be as good as his neighbours'.

Continuing, Harry says, "Thoroughly enjoy reading A.C.T.A. 'News', which I find to be most interesting and a credit to yourself and all associated with its production. Hoping 1958 will be the best year A.C.T.A. has so far had."

A new affiliation with the Association is that of the Mary Kathleen Club at Mary Kathleen, Nth. Queensland. The club is centred, as many probably know, at the famed uranium mine, and its President is F. T. McDonald, whose address is given as Drilling Contractor, Mary Kathleen. Secretary-Treasurer of the club is P. King. Mary Kathleen Club will shoot on every second Sunday in each month. The Cloncurry Club is cooperating with Mary Kathleen, and a good club should eventually develop at the mining centre.

Noel Edlington, of Tuggeranong, via Queanbeyan, N.S.W., has taken over the secretaryship of the Queanbeyan Gun Club. He succeeds J. R. Watt of Canberra in the office.

The following is not another tall story, but has been passed on as quite authentic. Three game biologists of the Tennessee State Game and Fish Commission (U.S.A.) were in the vicinity of an area known as Old Hickory Lake. A "duck caller", with renowned talent in this direction, was operating from his blind. Two separate flights of duck responded, coming in to the decoys. As the flights converged, two duck collided in mid-air. One recovered and flew on, but the other, a mallard, fell dead. Retrieved and cleaned, the bird carried no shot marks—only a bruise on the chest.

Foxes are very plentiful along the Murray River in the Corowa (N.S.W.) area. Farmers have recently been organising hunts. One farmer has collected over 100. In another section of the district over 70 were obtained in one night by spotlight shooting, with several guns operating. With few rabbits about, the foxes are desperate for food and are attacking young lambs and poultry.

A scalp bonus of 10/- per head has been recommended in the Boolooroo area of New South Wales be paid for wild pigs. The pigs are reported to be causing extensive damage to crops and pastures. In South Queensland the Balonne Shire Council at St. George has been given permission to conduct its own wild pig destruction campaign. Under the campaign, all landholders in the Shire, covering 12,070 square miles, will be required to destroy all pigs on their properties.

A new affiliation with the Association is the Calivil Gun Club (Victoria). Secretary of the Calivil Club is H. R. Humbert, whose address is Prairie (V.), in the Bendigo district.

Top score for ugliness among wild animals goes to the warthog of Africa. This animal has many repulsive features. Its face is covered with warts, gristle, bumps and growths. Its eyes are deeply imbedded in sacs of creased skin. Short, stumpy legs support its over-heavy body and its large head tapers down to a long, flat snout. Its home is usually a hole abandoned by some other creature of the wild.

The Clermont Club (Qld.) will hold its annual shoot at Clermont on Sunday, June 8. The club is hopeful of a big attendance. Secretary is D. L. Moody, Box 21, Clermont, Q.

The Hobart Club (Tas.) has published its 14th Annual Report, covering the year ended 31st December, 1957. The club conducted 12 shoots during the year and made a profit on all but two of these fixtures, and these losses were minute, i.e. £1/15/2 and 1/-. On one occasion during the year the club gained a profit of £43/1/- from one shoot. The club makes reference to the economic problems which beset those keen to keep club finances in good order. It is of interest to note that of the seven major championships conducted during the year, six were won by the Marshall brothers, Paul and Sperry. The other winner was R. Wighton. President of the Hobart Club is E. G. McRae; Secretary, E. P. Lawrence. Vice-Presidents are Messrs. S. Marshall, P. Marshall and W. R. Morgan. Committee, Messrs. E. Powell, R. Wighton, T. Headlam, W. Reynolds, D. Bridges and G. Gourlay; Assistant Secretary, D. Love. Messrs. J. A. Brent and J. M. Tyquin are Lifemembers of the club.

OUT OF THE PAST

Twenty Years Ago

A report published in the Sydney "Referee in mid-1938 advised that the contemplated "International", which officials of the Association were endeavouring to arrange, was unlikely in that year. An advice from the English Association secretary that it would be impossible to arrange details of a five-country International. The intimation from the English Association suggested that "Australia should shoot a teams' match under International conditions and despatch details to England. It was felt that the English International supervisors would have more data to work on."

Another report of the period stated that "The Jewish Hunters' Society of Palestine, Mt. Carmel, Haifa", were seeking information regarding an Empire competition at clay pigeons.

Closer to home a report from the Sale Club stated that Len Robinson (still secretary of the club), E. Elston, W. Fischer, W. McInnes, A. O. Rayner, J. Ferguson, Lou Bourbaud (President), H. Hare and J. Jones were among the winners at a local shoot.

The late Jack Reid of Seymour is recorded as having captured his second major title when he won the 1938 Commonwealth Skeet Championship at the Field Shooters' Club at East Oakleigh. He had previously won the Commonwealth Mixed Birds title. Reid was followed home in the first-mentioned event by what was described as "two Scottish sportsmen", in J. M. (Jock) Wilson and "Pentland" (Jim Stoddart). "Pentland" broke the striker of his gun and finished the final few rounds with a borrowed weapon.

At the Victorian Club fixture at East Bentleigh, Harry Burrows is noted as a winner, together with Les Schilling, Frank Hockey, Verner Fick, the late J. R. Schutt, the late Lew Bertram, "Dubbs" and "Duxbac".

Ten Years Ago

At Blackburn grounds the club single-barrel championship was won by E. G. Biggs, after a tie shoot with "Ingi" (Cliff Ingbritsen), with W. R. (Bill) Bloomfield in third placing.

The North Eastern double-barrel Championship of 1948 was shot at and won by A. W. Hall from G. Walker (Wangaratta).

The Commonwealth Mixed Birds Championship of 1938 was shot at Deniliquin and won by Frank Brown of Dandenong with a score of 15/20, from Gary Daly (Deniliquin), 13/20, and his brother, E. Daly, in third place, 12/20. A £20 Handicap at the same fixture was cut by John Houston (Hay, now President of the Association), John Bryant Junr., and Frank Brown.

At a Camberwell Club shoot Roy Longmore and W. R. Johns tied in the club double-barrel title. Johns won on the 32nd round.

Duck Research in Victoria

- * How many ducks are shot each year?
- ★ How many lose feathers, yet fly on apparently unharmed?
- * How many have the hunters taken home after a season's sport?

These questions are of vital importance to the Fisheries and Game Department, whose responsibility it is to advise on the regulations governing the duck seasons. The regulations should be designed to allow the greatest number of duck to be taken, consistent with safeguarding the breeding stock for future seasons. They should also be designed so that the available opportunities to shoot duck are shared equally amongst the greatest number of shooters.

Shooting pressure on ducks is also important because it probably influences where ducks go in Victoria. If the shooting is too heavy in certain districts the birds may move to

quieter areas. Similarly, the migration of duck into Victoria from the main breeding centres in outback Australia, just prior to the open season, may be affected by the timing and the extent of the shooting. These factors are taken into account when the open season is being recommended so that the influx will be used to the greatest advantage.

At present nobody knows how many ducks are shot each year, and it will be a long while before the exact figure is known. Meanwhile the question becomes increasingly important as Victoria is developed and the growing population of hunters goes further in its search for ducks.

Investigating hunting pressure by modern methods.

The Game Bird Research section of the Department is at present working on a new method of measuring hunting pressure in conjunction with its duck trapping and banding programme. Within recent months an apparatus has been set up at Lara for the X-ray examination of each wild duck which is banded. Its purpose is to discover how many of the duck flying around in the bush carry shot pellets, the result of "nearmisses" by shooters.

Both the number of ducks carrying the evidence of "near-misses" and the number of ducks killed by the shooting will be proportional to the number of ducks fired at. As it happens, the only factor of these three which can be easily measured at the present time is the percentage of "near-misses", the ducks carrying a few spent pellets in their bodies. This

gives an indication of the shooting pressure.

The X-ray apparatus and its use.

The fact that duck often carried lead shot was first observed in America several years ago. Since that time two types of unit have been developed. The unit, designed and made up by this Department, is the first in Australia and incorporates some of the better features of overseas models.

The X-rays are completely enclosed within a lead-lined box, affording maximum protection to the operator and assistants. The apparatus is portable so that it can be operated at the swamp where the ducks are trapped and released.

After receiving its band each duck is lowered head first into an aluminium cone which holds its wings close to its body and so quietens it. The lead-lined lid is put on the cone and

passed through the light proof box to the operator in the portable dark room. The cone is lowered into a hole in the lead-lined box in front of the fluorescent screen. The X-rays are switched on and the image observed behind the protective lead glass. The duck can be rotated by turning the handle on the cone, and lead shot stands out in contrast to the softer tissues of the duck. Only a few seconds are required to locate and count the shot, then the duck is released unharmed to continue its journey round Australia.

Of the first one hundred Grey Teal examined, 15 had lead pellets embedded in their flesh. Most had one or two pellets only, though one duck had eight size-8 pellets in various parts. The ducks carrying shot appeared no different in behaviour to those free from lead and showed no obvious effects of their narrow escape. More than 28,000 wild duck have been trapped and banded in the past four

years, and if the programme continues, ducks in similar numbers will be examined for shot.

Results of this work.

As this investigation is developed, the results should greatly assist in the scientific formulation of game laws. Unnecessary restrictions can be avoided, while the need for any new duck regulations might be convincingly demonstrated. Hunting pressure is only one of many ways in which a duck can die and an investigation of this kind could do much to assist in formulating a constructive game management programme. This will mean more ducks and more frequent good shooting seasons.

Immediately prior to the 1958 duck season in Victoria, Richmond shooter Don Latham had the pleasure of visiting and assisting the Fisheries & Game Department Staff (V.) at the field research camp at Lara (V.). He has kindly forwarded some details and illustrations.



DUCK DECEIVED

By L. P. MONEY

(An English commentary)

All game shooters and others whose work bring them in close contact with the workings of nature will have noticed that in many cases birds and animals appear to have some forewarning of impending weather conditions.

I would like to describe a case where the reverse occurred, and several hundred ducks were fooled by a temporary local weather condition to the great advantage of my companion and myself.

In the area where this happened the ducks enjoy daytime sanctuary on a large private lake barely a mile from shore. All local shooting depends upon a knowledge of the flight lines between this lake and the various feeding grounds used. Quite

reasonable sport can be had over areas which the duck pass, but only when there is sufficiently strong head wind to keep the duck down to a reasonable level. When there is no wind the true shooter comes into his own, and by making the long and difficult trips to the feeding grounds, and accepting the discomfort of travel over mud flats, can often enjoy sport of a type which many never know.

Normally this is done "on the moon" so that many hours of sport can be gained, but there are other moonless nights when the keen shooter will make the trip in the hope that a few duck will arrive whilst sufficient daylight remains for a fleeting chance. It is of such a night that I would like to tell you.

The season was well on, a fair bit of shooting had been carried out and the duck were already well educated. Each night they seem to flight later and chances of success seemed slight. In fact, we had made the trip only after convincing ourselves with such well-worn phrases as "We know we'll get nothing if we stay at home"; "It's nice to be out with the gun even if we get nothing" and "The only thing that's certain about game shooting is the uncertainty." In this frame of mind we rowed over to the marshes, and started the walk to the nearest of the feeding grounds.

The weather had a most threatening appearance and there was no doubt that we would be lucky indeed to escape a violent downpour from the mass of dark clouds which were moving our way. With the substitution of "duck" for "fish" it seemed a pretty safe bet that the famous expression describing fishermen's luck would soon apply to us, and I remember that I gave some consideration to the idea that there might, perhaps, be some truth in the remarks which women-folk are apt to make when referring to the duck shooters of the family.

There was still a reasonable amount of daylight left when the clouds reached us, thick, black and low, but there was nothing reasonable about the rain which poured down upon us.

I huddled down in an unsuccessful attempt to make myself a smaller target for the sheets of rain beating against me, and again renewed a firm promise to buy myself a new shooting coat. The one I was wearing had long ago seen its best days, and this fact was brought home to me by a dampness around the seams, which soon became a trickle and then a stream running to the parts of the body least appreciative of such treatment.

Change of Fortune.

At its worst the squall was of a frightening intensity, and the sky so heavy that for a short time it was literally as dark as night.

It must have been this that accounted for our change of luck, for

as the worst of the storm passed us and daylight crept in under the edges. I was jerked back to life by the sight of five ducks almost over me. Behind them, clearly showing against the rapidly widening patch of light sky, were many big bunches heading our way. Gone were my thoughts of misery and discomfort as every nerve tingled its alertness whilst I attempted to come to terms with the first arrivals, but the rain had one more trick to play. So heavy did it lay on my hands and gun that my thumb slipped over the safety catch and the chance was gone. It turned out for the best, because the main body of duck came straight in, and for the first time in my life I was shooting at duck on the feeding grounds in practically broad daylight.

For a few moments there appeared to be duck everywhere around us, and it seemed to take them a short while to realise what had happened. Their movements were uncertain and aimless and it gave us the chance to fire, reload, and fire again. May I admit that this sudden change from the miserable crouching in the pouring rain to this all-action excitement was too much for me. I shot wildly and badly and picked up only one. Luckily my companion retained his com-posure and had three successes, and then, as suddenly as it had begun, it was all over. The duck were climbing away out of range, and at the risk of being called all sorts of things I am prepared to swear that some of those duck which suddenly found themselves milling around our heads and guns in near daylight had clearcut expressions of amazement and astonishment on their faces.

There is no doubt in my mind that the duck were completely fooled by the extreme darkness when the worst of the storm blotted out the light over their lake, and they set out for the feeding ground secure in the thought that the danger period was over. That being so, their surprise at suddenly finding themselves looking down the business ends of two double twelves in daylight, can well be imagined. If duck have a language I feel certain that the leader who authorised take-off that night heard all the uncomplimentary remarks in their vocabulary.




