The Editor's Notebook



HANDICAPPING. Of paramount importance since the last publication of this journal in 1958 is the development of a new handicapping system, agreed upon by the Handicapping Sub-Committee of the Executive Committee appointed for the express purpose of reviewing the handicapping system of the Association, and the appointment of a new official handicapper to the Association.

Official Handicapper. The new official handicapper to the Association is Mr. E. G. Biggs. Mr. Biggs will review handicaps of all shooters registered with the Association. However, it should be noted that handicaps can only be properly reviewed and forward and backward movements correctly assessed providing adequate returns are received from all clubs. Any club desiring to write the handicapper on any question appertaining to that section of the Association's activities should address same through the Association office (Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1) and not to Mr. Biggs' business or home address.

HANDICAPPING SYSTEM. The Handicapping system is as appended and clubs are instructed to ensure that requirements of the system are fully observed:

 programme and receives no more than 2 (two) divisions 1 yard forward

A shooter winning a Championship from a mark behind his Association handicap automatically goes back to the mark from which he won the Championship.

Once a shooter has attained the handicap of 16 yards he cannot again be handicapped in front of that mark.

No shooter can be moved forward more than 3 (three) yards from the maximum mark he has at any time attained.

All handicap marks, as they appear in Association "News", to be accepted as official. Club secretaries to ensure that handicap cards are adjusted accordingly.

All clubs are required to send to the Association office a "Handicap Return Form", duly completed, within 14 (fourteen) days of shoot being held. The Handicap Return Form must include details of all shooters, whether the shoot be an open shoot, club shoot or picnic shoot.

Clubs are required to notify the Association Handicapper of all shooting dates at least 14 days prior to the holding of any shoot.

PENALTIES. The following penalties have been adopted for non-observance of the foregoing directions:

(1) Club President will be informed by the Handicapper if his club fails to submit completed Handicap Return Form that club will be de-registered unless return is submitted to the Association Handicapper within 7 (seven) days.

- (2) Any shooter suffering deregistration by his club's failure to submit required Handicap Return Form may be re-registered by joining any other affiliated club.
- (3) Any shooter knowingly shooting with a de-registered club will be liable to de-registration.
- (4) Any de-registered club to be re-registered on supplying the completed Handicap Return Form required and paying a fine of £1/1/-. For a second offence under this clause a fine of £3/3/- will be imposed. Also an undertaking will be required from the offending club that Handicap Return Form will be furnished on all future occasions.

The new Handicapping System applies as from 1/1/1959.

The new handicapping system has been introduced after considerable thought, and the co-operation of all clubs and shooters is expected. It may be that in the light of events as they proceed that some amendments may be required to the system, but these can be developed in due time. The Executive Committee hopes for a 100 per cent. co-operation and also hopes that with full co-operation it will not be necessary to at any time invoke the penalty clauses of the system.

HANDICAP COMMENTS. In future a special section of "News" will be reserved for comments by the Association's official handicapper, Mr. E. G. Biggs. Handicapping queries will be answered through this column. Any question at all appertaining to handicapping should be forwarded for comment. By this means complete efficiency can be obtained.

Clubs are advised that a revised Handicap Return form has been prepared, and this will be available to all clubs after January 20. Club secretaries are requested to write in to the Association secretary stating their requirements for this new form. The new Return is larger and simplifies the work of secretaries and it should prove a most successful addition from the point of view of bringing about all-round satisfaction to all concerned.

Compilers of the New Handicap Form are reminded that the Return must contain the name of every shooter who takes part in any shoot covered by the Return. This is a very important point and it is required to be strictly observed.

CHAMPIONSHIP BADGES. Clubs are again reminded that it is now optional for a club conducting an open championship (that is Commonwealth, State or District Championship) to provide either a sash or a badge for the winner. If the club decides upon a badge, only an official badge struck by the Association is permitted.

It is now advised to clubs and shooters interested that these new championship badges will become available for issue after January 12, 1959. The badges will comprise a basic replica of the present Association badge, with the addition of a plate affixed to the bottom. The plate mentioned will carry the shooter's name, the title of the event and the year in which it was won, impressed in enamel and bronze. The badges should prove of interest to shooters and provide the winner with a memento of a successful occasion. Weight has been reduced to a minimum, and this should enable most to. carry same on the shooting jacket at all times. The price of these badges to clubs has been fixed at 15/- each, including sales tax and postage. At least one month should be allowed for delivery from date of ordering.

CORRECTION. In the Official A.C.T.A. Championship Allocation for 1959, which appeared on page 15 of the December issue of "News", a minor correction is required. Due to a printer's error, the Commonwealth Double - barrel Clay Sparrow Championship was shown as having been allocated to Alexandra, S.A.; this should read "Alexandra, Victoria". Also the Commonwealth Night Deauville Doubles Championship was officially allocated to the "Australian Gun Club", not to Alexandra, Victoria, as shown on the official list. Copies should be corrected accordingly.

1959 Association affiliation and registration fees became due on January 1. The Association Constitutional Rules lav down that these fees are required to be paid before January 31 each year. Fees are: affiliation (clubs only), £5, and registration (individual

shooters only), £1.

All are notified that it is a fundamental rule of the Association that "every" shooter must be registered. In the past, instances have been noted where club officials have stated that some of their members had decided to register, whilst others did not intend to do so. No registered shooter may compete with or against an unregistered shooter. Club officials should ensure that all competitors are registered, otherwise unregistered shooters become liable to be dealt with under the rules of Association.

Bob-Bob Bobbin'

You have all heard of the "bob" or flinch, "bob" is easier to say and write. You have all heard of the "bob" and doubtless witnessed many; that is, if your shooting companions (a) use so-called self-loading guns, (b) use guns with safety catches, or

(c) use guns.

After reading sundry American gun writers, I had concluded that "bobbing" is a somewhat shameful affliction, and I, for one, shoot in considerable dread that a gremlin will enter the gun and produce a classic "bob" just when, with a fluid swing of the gun, I am about to shatter the second bird of a difficult double-rise, with 1s ounces of shot, of course.

However, recently I was fortunate enough to witness a marvellous exhibition of "bobbing" (I say fortunate because all the shame has now vanished from me for the "bob"), such as I am not likely to see again. The occasion was the "quail shoot", a highly entertaining event in which the shooter loads five rounds in a self-loader, commences his walk-up on the centre track with gun below elbow. The puller releases the first bird at his discretion, and the shooter commences shooting and continuing his walk if he wishes, while the trap thereafter functions at top speed, throwing single birds until five have been thrown. The shooter thereby

ROY HALSALL, President, Phone Shepp. 2287 F. CRAWFORD, Secretary Phone Shepp. 2774 expends his five rounds (a few did, too) for as many birds as he can kill.

This event proved two things, the inadequacy of the self-loader to live up to its name, and the almost universal tendency to "bob", even by experienced shooters who can put up a fine score, but the "bob", we are told, utterly ruins your chances of hitting anything with a gun or a rifle.

I have observed "bobbers" from every angle except directly in front; this position is to be avoided as much as possible. The "bob" could be described as an inward shrink, the elbows each dropping three inches closer to the hips, the cheek is brought into closer embrace with the stock, the head is brought forward and down and the gun muzzle describes a six-inch downward arc.

These movements are accompanied by an explosion, when they are invisible or incomplete, and a fine kill results, and sometimes by deadly silence, when they are visible. Of course, when the explosion results, the upward recoil of the barrel(s) cancels the downward arc, and helps keep the elbows up: yes, the explosions mask some finely executed "bobs".

"Bobbing", it seems, is as natural as breathing, inasmuch as we do it without being aware of it, and it is much more automatic than the guns that masquerade under that name. I managed to get my five rounds away, but "bobbed" beautifully on the sixth. Well, from now on I'll be "bobbing" in some good company.



Clay Busting Psychology

(Part III)

THEORY WEARY!

Just how far we can go on the subject of "mind over matter" in our sport depends again on the individual. For some, "theory" is a chore, to others interesting and to others again, a complication to be avoided.

a complication to be avoided.

The greatest "bug" in our efforts is, "Why isn't our form over the traps constant?" Why on some days is the breaking of targets seemingly simple and on others ten-straight

appears impossible?

Many will prefer to believe "luck" is not with them, but is riding for the other shooter. Admittedly, our "down the line" system of trapshooting has never been accepted for Olympic Game inclusion just for the reason of unequal distribution of angles, and because of this, we apparently enjoy a much more popular sport; one never knows what day the angles will break in our favour or the other fellow's, but this is as far as our luck can be measured, and if one trains to lessen these odds, he can expect to be more constant in performances.

Every one of us is a theorist in our own light; we have become this way in bettering our skill. Sometimes, unknowingly, we have adopted another successful shooter's tactics and improved our scores, then again, when a recession period is in evidence, many change style only to become worse off. It is here that these people will do well to recall to mind the exact style they last employed when having a very successful day; positive results have proved that the ability was in the person, so intermixing deviations is pure folly just when good "reflex habits" were on the road to being concreted.

Concentrate hard on becoming

mechanical in your best style so that on addressing the traphouse the mind is free of all theory, then you can expect to perform as a lightning-fast reflex-shooter. For example, when a recognised champion goes "really bad" you will notice his timing is much slower; his troubled mind is interfering with his automatic subconscious ability; in effect, he will be

trying to shoot consciously when his natural skill is usually displayed with a mind totally occupied on the space beyond the traphouse.

The ultimate practice for concentration and use of reflexes is **Double** Rise shooting. Club Committees should be encouraged to put on as many of these events as possible.

If all "eye-openers" were doublerise events, the shooters would notice
a marked improvement over the remainder of programmes. "Speed"
with confidence is achieved through
a nervous tension brought on by a
more difficult type of contest. Shooting from back-marks is not good
training for international qualifications, as there is very little exercise
of the fluid body-swing, essential in
the endeavour to mechanically break
all targets at a uniform range.

The keen shooter who is having a run of successes finds concentration gives him little trouble. Between shoots he becomes so anxious that all his happy state of mind desires is to see a flying target to shoot at; he has clay-busting by the throat, and that's the way it's going to remain! He is so right!

A qualified instructor knows that there are three ways only to hit a target with a shotgun. The most common and possibly the most costly to perfect is the sustained lead method. The gun's muzzle moves well ahead of the target on release and is slowed down to a zone where contact will be made with the target. To execute a second-barrel shot the muzzle must seek out a new lethal zone by another heading off of the target and slowing for a "pot shot".

Under difficult handicap conditions, like back-marks or windy days, the sustained-lead "second" is just often enough too slow; however, this method is most essential when duck shooting at high passing birds.

The second method, as used by long experienced field-shots, is snap shooting; very spectacular and popular for spectator appeal, but the law of averages at the best is 24-25 with those

well practiced in the art. Because snap shooting forces the subconscious ability to the limit, distraction is practically impossible under any competitive conditions and is therefore recommended on occasions to assist in the training of shooting by reflexes

Snap or Zone Shooting is so subconsciously executed that other methods of shooting appear slow; the muzzle takes a short cut to the impact zone instead of its swing starting from the stationary position which allows a target to get further from the shooter. Sustained accuracy requires limitless practice.

Truly it is said of these shooters (until they miss one), that hitting a clay is as automatic as "hitting their mouth with a fork!"

The third method, Follow-through, is popular with international class shooters because it embodies the confidence of the sustained-lead and yet requires little conscious recalculation if the second barrel is needed. Aiming has to be confidently fast so that the target is automatically in the path of a quick, subconscious second-barrel.

The proved essence of success in trapshooting is automatic reflexes. Whether we be 40 m.p.h. types or even 70 m.p.h., the essential need is to become as machine-like in action as is humanly possible.

The follow-through procedure is a matter of placing your shooting frame to such an advantage as to allow the breaking of all your targets at a uniform range, regardless of angles. When you strike form using this method, all the first-barrel kills will fall at an equal distance from the traphouse; kills on the second will be, but 11 yards further away. The shooter shoots fast and apparently direct at the target, for it is only his momentum in the follow-through which computes the necessary allowance; the harder the angle, the faster the reaction, but as all timing is instantaneous, there must be no hampering on the hard-angle swing, nor must straight-away shots be any faster; the feet in conjunction with the body must favour the angle which will be the hardest shot. (Refer November "Clay News".)

Aptitude to break a string of 50 clays under the follow-through system requires less than half the knowledge and experience demanded of other methods. Increases in handicap or bad weather conditions is less likely to affect performance, as timing is speeded up with all distraction kept at a minimum.

To thoroughly understand the above three methods of shooting and to apply them individually either for practice or necessity is to realise that you have reached the peak of achievement with the shotgun!

A word on Tranquilizers. Some shooters claim better accomplishments with the aid of alcohol or minor drugs; such aids are best described as mind-changers. Just what the individual's secret self-transcendence amounts to within his subconscious is the amount of confidence he will gain by imbibing; therefore those who never day-dream of success whilst under moderate intoxication cannot expect any gain in concentration or subconscious ability by using Dutch Courage.

The best advice is to leave well enough alone, as drawn-out shoots sooner or later find a weakness; sobriety of one's nature spasmodically returns until an interjection of conscious realisation causes a slow reaction and a "lost" bird.

In concluding these articles, the writer finds it necessary to mention one point for consideration on Equipment.

Because we have delved into the science side of our sport, it is fitting to note that shooters break their targets at ranges from 27 yards to 55 yards from muzzle, and to watch champions in long shoot-offs is to realise that many break their targets under 27 yards. For this reason and the necessity for every shooter to eliminate all handicaps possible, should one find his shooting time approaching the 27-yard breaking line, he would do well to measure his pattern at that distance for the 30-inch even-spread.

The single-choked autoloader is a marvellous beginners' gun, but one must weigh the fact that a single target lost in a 30-bird match could just pay for the difference between a gun of two choke ratings and the favourite "field piece".

German manufacturers have only recently analysed and designed 12.G O. & U. guns for the Australian socalled soft target, and it is surprising to note that an £800 gun fitted with two sets of barrels has the international 16-yard chokes rated at our half-choke and three-quarter, yet still pulverises targets at 40 yards range on the "first".

It is of utmost importance that the confidence of a back-marker's timing should never be hindered when he has to perform on the international 16-yard line; therefore he can quite often accept a half or even a quarter choked first barrel as being a lethal pattern for his trained ability.

To the purchaser of a new gun, personal stock - fitting is of utmost importance, as manufacturers cater only for general fit, similar to a "suit off the hook" in clothing stores, but it is the tailor-made article which gives comfort in manoeuvreability: always consult a gunsmith who has successfully fitted some other trapshooter of your acquaintance.

The writer thanks all readers for interest shown, and whilst he professes to be neither a practised psychologist nor a past-master at clay bird shooting, he hopes humbly to help certain categories of shooters who have had problems pertaining to his articles.

The information is original and has been taken from six years of notetaking as an instructor and he welcomes any criticism in a friendly discussion. His status in war-time, after a Tour of Operations over Europe, was to train pilots and gunners in deflection shooting, where the "motto of the day" was "draw a fast bead and shoot straight if you wish

to live!"

OUT OF THE PAST Twenty Years Ago

Late in 1938 Fred Burns, who now is well on the way to his second 100 in championships at all types of targets, is reported as having won his "8th title at clays". (A lot of water has gone by since those days.)

At Moree (N.S.W.) Bob Holmes, one of the two famous shooting brothers, won two events outright. His possibly more brilliant brother, Ted Holmes, who is still shooting regularly with the Collarenebri Club, of which he is President, is reported

as being "below form".

W. R. (Bill) Bloomfield of Sandringham gained his most important success when he won the Southern Hemisphere Double-barrel Champion-Hemisphere Double-barrel Champion-ship at the old Nobel's Ground at West Footscray. Bloomfield won after a double tie with the then Seymour shooter Pat Reid, and aggregated 31/33. Veteran Frank Hockey de-feating "Snowy X", Vic Fankhauser, and Athol Love after a long-drawn decider to contablish third-place decider to establish third place. Hockey scored 29/33.

The Cunnamulla Club in Queensland held its first "championship". meeting late in 1938.






