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The Editor's Notebook



Full details of the Association's programme for its National Championships and International Match series, to be held on the grounds of the Royal Aero Club at Bankstown, N.S.W., are published in this issue.

Several important changes in the programme have been included. One of the main items is the substituting of cash for trophies in the minor awards in the major championship events. The Executive Committee felt that it would be a more sensible arrangement to allocate cash to shooters gaining minor awards than the presentation of a trophy of equivalent value.

Proceedings will open at 9.30 a.m. on Friday, May 1, when the Aus-tralian National Single-barrel Championship at 40 targets from 16 yards is set down for decision. The winner will receive a handsome trophy valued at 35 guineas, championship sash, and will hold the W. Rainbird Perpetual Cup (presented by Mr. W. Rainbird of Launceston, Tas.) for 12 months. The Special I.C.I. Commemoration Sterling Silver Badge will also go to the winner. Runner-up will receive a trophy valued at £20, third trophy valued at £15. Cash awards will then follow; fourth will receive £10 and £5 each will be awarded down to and including 15th place. £5 will also be awarded to the best performer in the 12/16 yds., 17 yds., 18 yds., 19 yds. and 20 yds. and over category (not winning any other award). Also £5 will be awarded to the best Interstate performer in the States of Queensland, Victoria, Tasmania, South Aus-tralia and Western Australia (not

winning any other award), providing three or more entries are received from the States indicated. Of much importance in this event, it should be noted that the nomination fee has been reduced by 20/-, to 40/- for the complete event. Optional sweepstakes will also be held in conjunction of 20/- and 10/-, and these will be divided 60%, 30%, 10%, without any deduction whatever. Time permitting, a £100 Handicap at 20 targets will follow under double-barrel conditions.

At 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 2, the National Double - barrel Championship, at 60 clay targets from 16 yards, will be commenced. This year a departure from happenings of the previous few years has been made in that the event on this occasion will be decided under double-barrel, both barrels equal value, conditions. In the immediate previous years the event was shot under points system 3 and 2 in order to provide practice for members of the Australian Inter-national Team. The points system did not find great favour with com-petitors, and it has now been dropped. The winner will receive trophy valued at 35 guineas, will hold the J. M. Wilson Perpetual Cup for 12 months, will also receive the I.C.I. Special Sterling Silver Commemoration Badge. Runner-up will be awarded a £20 trophy and third a trophy valued at £15. Awards of £5 each will then go down to and including the 15th place-getter. Also special awards of £5 each will be allowed for the best 12/16, 17, 18, 19 and 20 yds. and over competitor not winning any other award. Similarly, awards

of £5 will go to the best interstate competitor from the States of Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania, South Australia and Western Australia, providing three or more competitors enter from each of those States and also again providing they have gained no other award. The event is one of the classics of the series for the reason that the first 30 place-getters will automatically go into the Aus-tralian International Team, which will shoot on Monday, May 4, at 100 targets per man from 16 yards, double-barrel. The Australian Team will compete against England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa, Central Africa, and possibly one or two other countries. On completion of the Australian section of the match the Australian scores will be sealed and details forwarded to London for comparison with scores of other teams during the International Home Countries tournament at Dublin (Ireland) late in June. Doubtless the honour of representing one's country will spur the interest and effort of many competitors.


Shot in conjunction with the Australian National Double-barrel Championship will be the Club Team's Championship. Conditions of this contest are that the team must comprise four men, all of whom must belong to any one affiliated club with the A.C.T.A. Team members must also reside within 50 miles of centre in which the club they represent is situated. Intending shooters in the metropolitan areas of Sydney and Melbourne must shoot with the club nearest to their permanent place of residence. The first 30 targets released in the Australian National Double-barrel Championship to each team member will be counted for the Club Team's Championship.

In addition to the important International Match on Monday, May 4, the 11th Grand Australian Handicap will be decided at 45 targets from Association handicap marks. Prize money has been pushed up from the previous amount of £200 for this event to £500. Double-barrel shooting will be the order of the day, both barrels equal value. The £500 prize money allocated for the event will be distributed as follows: for those competitors whose Association handicap

ranges between 12 and 16 yards the sum of £100 has been allocated, likewise a similar amount has been allotted for 17/18 yarders, 19/20 yarders and 21 yarders and over. This allocation will absorb £400. The remaining £100 will be cut up overall. Divisions, which will be compulsory, will be on the usual Association basis of 60%, 30% and 10%. The actual winner of the Grand Australian Handicap will receive the special Grand Australian Handicap Sash and also the special I.C.I. Commemoration Sterling Silver Badge. Shot con-currently with this event will be the Commonwealth Teams' Match, teams of four men, open to any four registered shooters who are members of any affiliated club in the Commonwealth. The first 20 targets released in the Grand Australian Handicap will count for the Commonwealth Teams' Match. Members of the win-ning team will receive £5 each. Nomination for the Grand Australian £500 Handicap is the nominal entry of £5, and for the Teams' Match, £1 per member.

Competition will close on Tuesday, May 5, when the A.C.T.A. Intermediate Championship, at 20 targets from 16 yards, will open the day's shooting at 9.30 a.m. This event, previously restricted to those whose Association handicap did not exceed 16 yards on day of the shoot, is now open to all shooters up to 18 yards (inclusive). This innovation should revive interest in this very popular event. It is recalled that in the postwar years as many as 180 entries were received for the Intermediate title. In the past couple of years the entry has been very limited.

The blue riband event of the series. The Champion of Champions Cup, at 60 targets from 20 yards, doublebarrel, is listed for the final day, following the Intermediate event. The Champion of Champions Cup was the original basis of the National Championships series and some great names appear as winners of the event. No championship qualification is necessary. Nomination is 60/-, targets free. A 20/- and 10/- optional sweepstake are attached and these will be divided, without deduction, 60%, 30%, 10%. The winner will hold the Champion of Champions Cup Perpetual Sterling Silver Trophy, presented as

far back as 1934 by the late Mr. Donald Mackintosh. The winner will also receive a replica, A.C.T.A. Champion of Champions Sash, I.C.I. Sterling Silver Commemoration Badge, and the winner's trophy valued at 30 guineas. Second will receive trophy valued at £15, third trophy valued at £10, fourth £10 (cash) and fifth £5 (cash). Time permitting, another £100 Handicap will conclude the programme. Intending competitors are advised to arrange early accommodation. Limited accommodation is available at the Club House, Bankstown, and those seeking this should apply at once to the Secretary, Royal Aero Club, Box 5, Bankstown, N.S.W., indicating their requirements.

A club outside Victoria recently wrote the Association making the following enquiry: "If a new mem-

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ber wishes to join a gun club on the day of a shoot and provided he pays his membership and registration fee with his nomination, is he eligible to shoot for a prize on the same day?" This is entirely a matter for club management and administration. The main point at issue would seem to be the new shooter's handicap. Providing the shooter in question is known to the club officials, and they are able to properly assess his correct shooting mark, there does not appear to be any reason why a joining shooter should not be permitted to compete on the day of joining up.

The Handicapper's Column

NEW SYSTEM OF HANDICAPPING

All Clay Target shooters will agree that a sound system of handicapping is very necessary in order to further the interests of our sport. We also know that however good the handicapping formula is, and how carefully we supervise a system, it will break down wherever and whenever a particular club fails to co-operate by not forwarding shooting performances of its members to the Handicapper.

It must be remembered that it is just as important to move a competitor forward when he fails to win after a period of "off-form" shooting as it is to move him back when he wins. In effect, if we are all handicapped correctly, we will eventually find a mark beyond which it becomes impossible for us to win. This mark will vary with the individual.

Many clubs have within the last month been issued with new handicap return forms which require to be filled in after each shoot and returned to the handicapper within fourteen days.

On the left-hand side of the form is a space wherein the name of every shooter competing in the day's programme must be recorded. In the adjoining column must be listed the number and type of events in which he competes. The next column will detail his outright wins in any of the events listed. In the column under "Divisions" should be noted his placings in any of the events. In the column marked "Present Handicap" is noted his present shooting handicap mark, and finally the Club Handicapper's recommendation is placed in the column provided. Any general remarks can be given in the space allocated under that heading. It will be realised that in small

It will be realised that in small club shoots it would not be fair to handicap severely because of the small attendance, and although a competitor may win perhaps a 15-bird event outright, his reward, considering 10 or 12 competitors taking part, would be small and would not justify a penalty of one yard, particularly if he were a back-mark shooter.

Likewise, a low average competitor who attends shoots regularly without sharing in the prize allocation should be kept in mind by the Club Handicapper for forward movement after a period of poor shooting.

In general, it does not necessarily follow that the Association Handicapper will always accept the Club

A Trained Dog is a Good Dog

Every farm has a dog or two, and most farmers can reminisce all evening about the uncanny feats of intelligence performed by their fourfooted companions. Few farmers, however, look on training their dogs as a serious matter.

Go to Jarvis, Ontario, though, and you'll find a farmer who got interested in pure-bred collies a dozen years ago, took the lead in establishing an "Obedience Club" to train unmannerly dogs, and found that by taking a little more interest in man's best friend, it could become an exciting hobby.

Malen Wilkins is the man. He's the squire of Shadyholme Kennels, a 230-acre farm growing cash crops like grain corn, winter wheat, and red clover seed.

But this big six-footer, with a ready smile and a gentle way about him, likes to slip away and amble about the kennels when things get too rushed around the farm. Scratching the ears of his faithful collies is the best way he knows of to relax.

You can't call the kennels a business, because he says he does well to meet his expenses with them. The satisfaction and enjoyment he secures from his dogs is his best reward.

When Malen got interested in pedigreed dogs, he found that the show ring called for ideal conformation, but gave no credit to animals with intelligence and training.

"Most people value a dog as an obedient companion," he reasoned, and four years ago he played a part in founding the Hamilton Obedience Club. Now every summer ten or a dozen district folk from both farm and city meet weekly for about three months to train their dogs.

Asked how those big snarling dogs can be trained, this dog lover said, "I never beat a dog," but he added, more fully should any Club Secretary care to drop me a line, care of the Association office address, i.e. Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1.

"You've got to conquer a dog before it will be any good to you."

His hand is remarkably free of scars, but he can recall some rough dogs that he did battle with before bringing them to heel. "One German shepherd we had would bite everything in sight. He tore through my shirt and sweater the first time I saw him, and his horrified mistress exclaimed, 'I'll never bring that dog back here again'."

Nevertheless a firm hand brought the dog to heel. Malen has the build himself to handle those dogs firmly when strength is called for.

Another dog made for his throat the minute he was handed the leash. He threw the dog off its feet, and whirled it around a few times. But when it regained its feet, it lunged at him again. He whirled the dog more vigorously than ever, and when he finally dropped the panting animal and ordered him to "heel", the dog obeyed. He realised he had been bested.

This dog enthusiast won't hit a dog with a leash, either. "That would scare them of leashes and make training almost impossible," he says.

Training can bring about remarkable changes in spirited dogs. He recalls one summer training class which included a dalmatian and an airedale. The sight of each other set these dogs almost hysterical with wrath. They growled and snarled. Yet at the end of the course, when each had learned to heel, and had learned almost complete obedience, they could be seated side by side without a sideways glance. In fact, Malen says, he hasn't yet seen a really mean dog. "Unfortunately, some people ruin good dogs.

"One dog, for example, was fine for me here in the kennel, but when he was returned to his owner he was

soon chained in a barn, with everyone afraid to approach him. His food was shoved to him with a stick.

"No wonder the dog didn't develop for them."

His advice to dog-owners: "Never tie a dog. That's the surest way to make a good dog cross. Train him to be obedient." He had some advice about how this can be done.

"Get the dog used to the choke leash first. Then, when you say 'heel', bring him firmly to your left leg. When you are standing, make him sit just under your left hand as it hangs by your side. When walking, bring him along beside your left leg. Indoctrinate him with the whereabouts of it. That's where he must be when under control.

"But remember, praise him often, when he has done the correct thing, even if you had to force him to do it. Dogs want praise and affection.

"In training," he advises, "don't pull hard and steady on the choker. I once had a dog brought to me that had been taught to pull. When walking on a leash, he pulled like a draft horse. When you bring pressure on the leash, do it vigorously, so he can do nothing but obey.

"Once the dog has learned obedience, then he can be further trained."

Mr. Wilkins' determination to make obedience count in pure-bred dog circles was so great that he played a part in setting up an obedience score card for shows, and now he is often asked to judge at obedience

shows. One of his own collies was the first to pass the obedience trial before three different judges and thus go into the official records.

Of course, conformation counts, too, and Malen has imported dogs from England of the finest Scotch collie bloodlines to improve his own dogs.

He keeps about four females and an imported male, and figures on raising about three litters of up to eight pups each, from each female every two years. He charges 50 dollars each for pups, with no price cutting, and as far as he can judge, tries to assure every dog of a good home.

His own dogs have the benefit of sizeable runs. An acre field is divided into four sections, by five-foot woven wire fencing. Dogs boarding in his kennels (for he often has dogs brought to him by owners who want to go on a vacation) are exercised regularly in the grassy runs, too.

What breed of dog is the most intelligent?

He says that dog families are like human families. You get variety in each. He recalls one tiny chihuahua that took the obedience training and passed the test on his first try. Some big dogs breeze through the training and others seem complete clods.

But whatever the breed, Malen Wilkins figures, every dog is a good one. It is the master who is responsible if a dog goes bad.

main event at the Nobel grounds, 18/19. The report of the day states that "Landells, when apparently set for a good break, drew a damaged disc, which was barred. He missed the next release, spoiling an otherwise good sequence". The late C. Corbett was runner-up, 17/19, and J. F. McCarthy of Geelong third.

Fred Tricks, who shot under the name of "Shoubra" and held a high office in the Municipality of Sandringham (V.), and who was National Clay Pigeon Champion in 1934, won the now extinct Victorian Clay Target Club's Double-barrel Championship on the old Bentleigh grounds. "Shoubra" stopped the full complement of 20 straight, defeating W. R. Bloomfield, 19/20. Fred Burns gained third placing after a long tie shoot, 43/45.

Veteran "Calrossie" (Jack Sutherland) at this period gained his 79th championship. He was the recipient of many congratulations on his race to gain his century of championships.

Reg Christensen, a former Birchip (V.) trapshot, won a double at a Nobel fixture at West Footscray. While Gordon Tilly, a very promising young pre-war shot who has not competed since returning from active service, won no less than four events at a Camberwell Club shoot. The late Harry McIntosh of Seymour gained headlines for a break of 25 straight.

Ten Years Ago

The Latrobe Club in Tasmania, which is not often heard of these days, staged a holiday shoot at this period. M. M. (Mac.) Johnstone was reported to be in his best form after a fortnight's fishing at Great Lake.

At Peak Hill (N.S.W.) the Western Districts of N.S.W. Double-rise Championship was won by W. (Bill) J. McPhee, then of Dubbo, but now a senior police official at Taree (N.S.W.). McPhee won outright with the moderate score of 7/12 pair.

At the Australian Club at East Burwood (V.) 99 shooters faced up to the trap when a 20 birder was the only attraction. Frank Brown of Dandenong returned the only possible and won outright. George Biggs, now handicapper for the Association, carded a break of 45 straight.

The Townsville Club (Q.) reported that it was experiencing great difficulty in obtaining supplies of clay targets. J. E. Melville figured prominently during a shoot there in February, 1949.

The Fifth Annual Report of the Hobart Club was submitted at the club's annual meeting held at 148 Collins Street, Hobart. The club report indicated that 11 shoots had been conducted up to end of December, 1948, and the average attendance was "50 shooters".

Frank Hockey, Association Patron and well-known shooter of many years standing, wrote to the Association early in 1949, stating, "Forwarding my usual donation to the Association funds." He then continued. "A correspondent once wrote to the Editor of 'Punch': 'Dear Editor - The jokes in "Punch" are not as good as they used to be.' The Editor replied. 'Dear Correspondent, You're quite right - they never were'." Frank then continued his letter, "I don't think clay pigeon experts shoot as well as the old-timers, but probably the answer is that 'they never did'." (Who are the old-timers?)

It might be mentioned here that the book, al-though titled "The Dead Shot", carries a couple of supplementary titles, for in addition to "The Dead Shot" the cover leaf adds "Or Sports-man's Complete Guide", being "A treatise on the use of the Gun", with medianetary out faithing leaf rudimentary and finishing lessons in the art of shooting game of all kinds, dog-breaking, etc." The author is "Marksman", who does not divulge his identity beyond that non-deplume. The book goes to considerable length to explain what is termed "The Bad Shot". An extract, "A bad shot is an unfortunate being, generally an excitable, nervous, craving sort of fellow, who vexes himself every time he fires his gun; and though his companions ridicule his attempts, they are annoyed to see him banging heavy charges at coveys, wounding several, but killing none. His dog becomes suspicious of him, and grows careless in its work; because it so seldom has the chance of mouthing, and sticking its nose into the plumage of a bird; which is always as great a delight and satisfaction to a dog in the field, as are the choicest and most fragrant exotics to a lady in her boudoir. If a bad shot, by any chance, happens to bring down a bird, a race immediately ensues between him and his dog, as to which will be first to recover it.
