The Editor's Notebook



It is again desired to record appreciation of the interest in clay target shooting taken by I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited. A pleasing feature to record is the donation of £150 by the Company towards the cost of conducting the 1959 Interstate Teams' Match for "The Great Britain & Ireland" Trophy. The Company has long continued its support to this important event and the monetary donation enables shooters to take part in the actual teams match without any cost to themselves. Most shooters look forward to gaining a place in their respective State Team and thereby actually shooting for their own State. That they are able to do this at no cost to themselves is entirely due to the support given to the event by I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited. The £150 donated does not quite cover the cost. but the A.C.T.A. has been pleased to bear any costs over the £150 mentioned.

The Victorian section of the 1959 Interstate Teams' Match will have been shot by the time this issue of "News" reaches the hands of readers. The Australian Club, which was allotted the privilege of supervising the shooting of the match for Victoria by the A.C.T.A., decided that the autumn season was preferable to all other periods in the southern State, and held Victoria's section on March 7 and 9. The dates, when the A.C.T.A. National Championships programme is held in Victoria, are reserved for these events. Hence the holding of the Victorian section of the Interstate Match on these dates filled the gap for southern shooters.

A phase which has developed among some affiliated clubs during the past year has been the habit of conducting open shoots without first having the approval of the A.C.T.A. It should be remembered by all that all open shoots, that is shoots where over £50 is given in prize money or trophies for any one event, or where an open A.C.T.A. championship is being conducted, must first be approved by the Association - this applies both to the event or events and the dates on which the events are held. Another important point is also stressed. That is that the Association has control of all holiday shoots, whether they are intended as club shoots only or are open meetings. On Boxing Day last and also on A.N.A. Day in January, several clubs put on shoots without first applying to the Association for approval. It is most unlikely that the Association would disapprove of any proposed holiday shoot, except where a clash of programmes is possible. However, it should be noted for future occasions (this applies particularly to the Easter vacation period) that any club deciding to hold a shoot on a holiday is required to ensure that A.C.T.A. approval has been given, both to the programme and the date.

A number of clubs are continuing to lodge break claims without also lodging the score sheets substantiating the claim. Some clubs write "score sheets are available if required," others do not bother to advise about score sheets at all.

others again send in score sheets with insufficient data, such as sheets showing a miss in the middle of the score and also failing to send in the completed sheets covering the shooter's break. It is pointed out that no break claim can be recognised unless complete score sheets are forwarded, and these are required to contain fullest information. Another point is that some clubs have a habit of scoring twice in the same square on the score sheet. This procedure should be dropped without delay. It is almost impossible to follow the trend of scoring on sheets scored in this fashion. Clubs are again reminded that breaks are only recognised when compiled under double and single-barrel shooting conditions, and then only in competition.

Unfinancial clubs and similarly unfinancial shooters for 1959 are reminded that all those who have not remitted their current dues to the Association by May 1 will be struck off the list of registrations and will also be removed from the mailing list of "News". The Association cannot carry clubs and individuals who remain unfinancial. Costs of administration are considerable and those whose fees remain unpaid must necessarily be dropped from the records.

The Handicapper's Column

It is pleasing to report that cooperation of the Clubs to our new handicapping system has been good and is improving each week.

Unfortunately, an odd few interstate Clubs have not yet supplied the necessary information regarding recent Club shoots. These Clubs must understand that the system was introduced by the Association after a lot of thought and discussion for the benefit of the sport from a national point of view, so that it is imperative that all Clubs must co-operate in order to obtain maximum results.

A question asked in recent mail by a Victorian Club Secretary was as follows:

"One confusing point is that the rule states that once a shooter has attained the mark of 16 yards he cannot again be handicapped in front of that mark. In the amended handicaps of the March issue of 'News' one shooter has been brought forward from 17 yards to 14 yards and others from 16 to 14 and 16 to 12. Apparently there is a reason for such handicapping, and I would be pleased if you would

answer same in a later issue of that grand little journal, 'News'."

Yes, there is a reason for the above action, and that is explained in the following manner. During a period some two years back, the Association had a ruling that 16 yards was the front mark and that all new competitors commenced from that point. During that period some hundreds of new competitors commenced shooting, and in many cases never progressed. Later, when the rule was rescinded and 12 yards became the minimum mark, it became quite obvious that many of these people must be moved forward, as new members were already commencing to shoot from 12 yards. Eventually we will reach a position when our levelling-out process is completed, then the system should operate smoothly.

It is our intention to overcome the time lag involved in advising a shooter of his handicap alteration. This will be achieved by a system of card posting to the person whose handicap is amended.

CLAY NERVES

When, at a clay pigeon meeting, an important tie is being shot off, the spectators often wonder amongst themselves on the state of nerves of the contestants, and discuss the attacks of jitters that have been known to overcome shooters in these circumstances. An experienced shooter is not so likely to suffer these attacks as the novice, but they can hit most shooters at unexpected moments. Obviously the time of most strain is as mentioned, during a major championship when two or three guns have tied and are on the line in front of a crowd who will mentally dissect every shot and weigh each shooter's chance one against the other. Even the most against the other. Even the most experienced shot must feel one or two butterflies; these may go after the first shot, but I find it hard to believe that anyone is quite unaffected.

Jitters can arise in quite a different way from the strain induced by tie shooting. For example, many shooters will remember times when they have been going straight and then missed that last bird which would have given them their first twenty-five or fifty or even one hundred straight. I can remember the feeling and I think many more shooters to come will experience it. Some shoot with a system to try and stop thinking about things like this and have a set routine to go through between shots, so as to keep their minds occupied and prevent thoughts wandering or wondering about that next bird. Such a routine may include extracting the spent case, clearing the barrel of smoke, changing the unfired round from the left to the right barrel, opening the cartridge loading and then that the cartridge, loading and then that cast fully all the cartridge. just as carefully closing the cartridge box. Such antics have a purpose, but no doubt they look fussy to anyone watching.

Superstitious Loading

The purpose is that by the time all these actions have been made it will again be the shooter's turn to call his bird and he has occupied all the

time between shots in doing something that prevents his thoughts from wandering and so spoiling his concentration. Other shooters steadfastly refuse to look at the trap between birds for fear that they may be influenced by what they see, their opposite numbers will watch every bird like a hawk and do not appear to be affected. Shooters can even become mildly superstitious and have been known always to place their cartridges in the gun with the lettering on the base the right way up, and feel that they ask for trouble in not so doing. The reason they found trouble was because some part of their mind was thinking about the case not being the right way up instead of their whole mind concentrating on the bird that they were calling.

I once read that the only sure way to combat jitters was to take every bird and to treat it as a separate competition. To concentrate afresh for it and to forget all that has gone before, just to think of that one bird and, when it came, to blast it to pieces as if every little bit of it was hated intensely. Shout at it, bark at it, or decoy it out of the trap house with a soft and deceptive call, but whichever way it is done it should be gone after with murderous intent, and when it has been dealt with forget it. If, by any chance, it was missed, then try not to think about the fact of missing it. It is possible to get so worked up over this and then thinking of making certain of the next one that concentration goes and that way lies more trouble. Treat the next bird as a separate thing, not as something connected with a miss.

Complete Concentration

Brooding on a missed bird can lead to a very bad attack of jitters and then timing and concentration can go, and not one, but a string of misses may follow. To be able to concentrate solidly on the job takes a lot of practice, but it is necessary to learn to do it as soon as possible, for without it a certain type of

shooter can be so upset by a miss This is usually followed by a gradual creep upwards until he reaches his old form again.

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS

There can be many reasons for this; ill-health or worries unconnected with clay pigeon shooting are not the least of them; an unrealised change in shooting style can also be the cause, but on the whole I think that these most noticeable changes in form occur in the case of a shooter doing well in his first or second season - when his shooting is instinctive and everything has gone well. But this shooter has not enough experience behind him to be able to analyse his shooting and to decide why he missed a particular bird, so that when he hits a bad patch he does not know what to do to put it right. It may take such a shooter two seasons or more to collect enough knowledge to enable him to get back on the right track, and this period can be very disheartening and he will require lots of encouragement. otherwise he may gradually be seen less and less on the clay pigeon grounds.

To sum up, I feel that although the experienced shot may have an occasional uneasy feeling, a miss or two will not upset him enough to spoil his day's sport, but the shooter with less experience would do well to try and instil in his own mind the need to concentrate on each and every bird to the exclusion of any thoughts of misses he may have had.

that he unconsciously throws in the towel and again a series of misses is the result. A shooter affected in this way might be one who is normally shooting well, until an unexpected and unaccountable miss comes along: it may be an easy-looking bird. This so upsets him that he is still thinking about it when he calls his next bird, and the net result is that this bird goes the same way is that this bird goes the same way as the first. The rot has now set in and instead of gritting his teeth and forgetting those birds and trying to finish straight, the shooter will say, "Oh—I've had it," and will forget all he has learned of concentration and single-mindedness of purpose and relax and moon along and his shooting suffers accordingly.

A good but inexperienced shot can go to pieces when put in a team. The feeling of responsibility is too much for him. Such a person should remember that other shooters in the team have probably had the same fears and have got over them, and again concentration on the task in hand will help him forget this fear, but the only real cure for this malady is more shooting and experience of team shoots until the fear of letting the side down goes from his mind and is replaced by a feeling of determination to be High Gun.

Then there is the often puzzling case of a shooter having a really good season and being right on the top and the next year fading right away and sliding down the scale.

OUT OF THE PAST Twenty Years Ago

In the early autumn of 1939 the first Commonwealth Double - barrel Championship ever held in Tasmania was conducted at the old King's Meadows shooting grounds of the Tasmanian Gun Club at Launceston. The event was allocated to the Tasmanian Gun Club by the then A.C.P.T.S.A. (now the A.C.T.A.). Reports have it that the event drew the most representative field, including shooters from three States, that,

up to that period, had contested the event - the blue riband title of the Commonwealth. Generally the standard of shooting was below expectations. Over 500 spectators attended. including several members of the Tasmanian Parliament. "Calrossie", who was then the winner of 80 championships at all classes of targets, was a competitor, as was the late Lew Bertram, the then holder of the Australian record break of 77

straight, which he compiled at the old Nobel Grounds at West Footscray. The winner was the Victorian, Jack Bryant Senr., who returned a score of 23/25. Pat Reid of Seymour (V.), H. Munnings of Kempton (Tas.), and Lew Bertram tied for second place, each 22/25. The tie shoot for the places resulted in Bertram gaining second 27/30, Reid (third) 26/30 and Munnings 25/30 in fourth position. It will be seen that the scoring was mediocre right through the event. E. H. Holmes, then of Moree (N.S.W.) and now of Collarenebri (N.S.W.), where he is President of the local club, had a great chance to tie with the winner, but missed two targets in his last five shots. Others close to the place-getters were Bill Rainbird (President of the Tasmanian Club), R. Holmes (Moree), the late H. A. McIntosh (Seymour, V.) and "Calrossie", each 21/25. Local shooters Ron Green and Alf Poxon were next best with scores of 20/25.

Bryant, the following week after his Launceston success, was high-gun at a Camberwell Club shoot with a sequence of 28 straight. Shooting from the old "double-towers" at the Nobel grounds, Kim Sans ran out the winner 11/15 from "Duxbac" (H. G. James) 9/18, and R. Collis 7/15. A minor event was cut by "Blackie" (Roy Blackwood), the late Jack Schutt, "Drongo" (Les Tibb) and the late E. J. Parow. Shooting at Blackburn, George Copeland, with a run of 58 straight, was the outstanding performer; he followed with 60/61 at a Nobel shoot the next week.

In the Commonwealth Single-barrel Championship of 1939 the winner was J. L. Lowe, who used the shooting nom-de-plume of "Browning". He returned a score of 21/25. Des O'Callaghan, who still shoots fairly frequently, was runner-up with 20/25. Third place-getter was A. W. Hall, now of Berriwillock. An enthusiastic re-opening of the Hobart Gun Club is reported at this time. In his address at the opening, Dr. J. F. Gaha, the then Tasmanian Minister for Health, stated that "clay target shooting was a high-class sport that gave much pleasure and should be encouraged as much as possible".

Ten Years Ago

A Tasmanian shooter, R. (Dick) Redpath, was under notice with a brilliant performance when he gained high - gun honours in the International Match. Redpath had to undergo a tie shoot before his place in the team was assured—this on the morning of the International shoot. A tie shoot was necessary to decide the place from 17 to 20 (these decide the places from 17 to 20 (there were 20-men teams at that period). Redpath had to rush out to Burwood without first obtaining breakfast, secure his place in the team with a good effort in the tie shoot, and then followed with high-gun score of 98/ 100 in the Australian Team - a very creditable performance. Runner-up to Redpath was J. A. McCraith of Essendon 96/100, with A. E. Poxon (Launceston) and J. Bryant Senr.

At the same fixture Fred Burns won the Champion of Champions against what was up to that time an all-Australian record field of 153. Burns dropped one target, his 57th, which he heavily dusted, to score

59/60. J. A. McCraith was again in second position with 58/60. H. R. Donelly (winner the previous year), E. G. Biggs (present A.C.T.A. handicapper) and W. Arnold of Colac (V.) tied in third place. Arnold missed his second release in the resultant tie shoot for the minor place and took fifth placing 58/62. Donelly and took fifth placing 58/62. Donelly and Biggs then shot on to the 69th round when the pair decided to toss. Donelly called correctly. Both had scored 66/69. Keith Cameron of Roma (Q.), Vic Fraser of Lakes Entrance (V.), John Bryant Junr. (Blackburn, V.) and E. Brice (Canowindra, N.S.W.) were next. Fraser missed his 61st and Brice his 67th and on the 70th round Bryant and Cameron also tossed and Bryant was and on the 70th round Bryant and Cameron also tossed, and Bryant was the correct caller, 67/70. Others fairly close up were Fred Brook (Gilgandra, N.S.W.), L. L. Schilling (Ormond, V.), H. Ceresa, H. Eldridge (Alvie, V.), A. E. Poxon (Tas.), F. Skate (Blackburn), Bert Haynes (V.) and Newton Thomas, then of Townsville (Q.), each 55/60.





Our next shoot will be an open day on 11th April, 1959, and we look forward to it being one of those good days when we can share the company of our neighbours.




