



The Editor's Notebook



A.C.T.A. CHAMPIONSHIP BADGES.

It does not appear to be clearly appreciated by some clubs affiliated with the A.C.T.A. that championship badges, as distinct from championship sashes, must be ordered through the Association office and through no other source.

Recently a jewellery establishment in a large town (outside Victoria) wrote direct to the Association badge makers, apparently after first obtaining the information as to whereabouts, and then requested the Association badge-making firm to forward them five championship badges, plus one "plain" badge. Just by way of "rubbing it in", the firm writing requested that the requirements outlined be forwarded to them within 9 days of writing.

It should be clearly understood that the Executive Committee has directed that all A.C.T.A. Championship badges must be ordered through the Association office. Clubs ordering are advised that as the championship badge also carries the winner's name, plus the name of the event emblazoned upon it, that delivery date from date of order is approximately six weeks. As explained in an earlier paragraph, every championship badge has to be singly made, and this factor greatly adds to time elapsing between actual order date and delivery date.

In cases where clubs prefer to order sashes for championship winners, these clubs are advised that the official sash makers to the A.C.T.A. are Messrs. W. Flattely & Son Pty. Ltd., 301 Lonsdale Place, Melbourne,

C.1. This firm has been the official sash makers to the Association for many years and clubs requiring championship sashes are advised that no lengthy detail is necessary when ordering sashes from the firm. Experience over the years has provided the firm with adequate knowledge of most club requirements in regard to sashes.

As a matter of interest, it is mentioned that Messrs. Flattely & Son recently forwarded to the Association several letters received by them from clubs in Queensland and New South Wales ordering "badges". Messrs. Flattely & Son are not badge makers, hence their forwarding the letters referred to on to the Association. Posting of badge requests to Flattely's merely delays completion of the order. All badge requests, as already indicated, are required to be posted direct to the Association office, where they are handled with minimum of delay.

DEDUCTIONS FROM SWEEP-STAKES. The Association frequently receives requests from clubs regarding the allowable deduction from sweep-stake and also how the sweep-stake money going back to the shooters should be cut up. It is pointed out that the Association directs and lays down that in open champion-ships, that is Commonwealth, State and District championships, there shall be no deduction from the attached sweepstake in any way whatever. This principle has been adopted and not changed in any way since

the inception of the Association. In club championships and events in which sweepstakes are attached or just plain sweepstake events, the club management may decide deduction applicable providing the deduction from a sweepstake event does not exceed 50%, inclusive of birds.

In regard to the cut up of a sweepstake, clubs are advised to take the Association lead and divide 60%, 30% and 10%. It is known that some clubs allot the entire sweepstake proceeds to the winner, and this appears to be a matter of disappointment to some shooters. Clubs are strongly advised. when conducting club sweepstakes, to announce, or advertise, how any attached sweepstakes will be cut. The announcement or advertisement in this regard should, of course, be made prior to the start of the event. not half way through or at the end. No fault with the proceedings on these points could then be found by competitors.

BREAK BADGES. Some clubs continue to write the Association claiming break badges on behalf of shooters without also lodging the score sheets showing where and how the mark was compiled. Such application, of course, cannot be enter-tained. It is repeated again, that break claims can only be recognised when proper application is made and score sheets lodged for Association checking and perusal. Failure to do this merely prolongs proceedings and the shooter is delayed in receiving his badge because a further communication has to be made with the club concerned seeking the necessary information and score sheets.

1960 CHAMPIONSHIP ALLOCATION. The 1960 Official Championship Allocation as issued by the Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. appears in another section of this issue. Clubs and individual shooters are advised to accept the information shown as official. No further notification will be issued to clubs in this regard.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. It is advised that the full Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. met in Mel-

bourne in a two-day and one-night meeting late in October. Many matters of considerable interest to the sport and shooters generally were discussed.

INTERSTATE TEAMS' MATCH. The 1959 Interstate Teams' Match was this year won by the New South Wales combination, who recorded the splendid score of 493/500, defeating the holders, Tasmania, by one point. New South Wales now becomes the holder of "The Great Britain & Ireland Trophy" until the next competition. Congratulations are extended to the winning team.

Of much interest in connection with this event is the fact that Executive Committee decided to alter slightly the conditions of the Interstate Match series. Commencing in 1960, the competition will be shot for by teams of 15 instead of the usual ten which has been the case in past years—in fact, since the competition was originated. Although the teams will comprise a complement of 15 in future, only the best ten scores will count in the competition. This brings the event more in line with the International Match, where teams comprise 30 men, with the best 10 to count.

As usual, I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited will sponsor the major cost of the competition. The Company has donated the sum of £150 to assist the Association in staging the series. £150 does not cover costs, but the A.C.T.A. has been pleased to find the balance of the money required to pay the clubs holding the competition. From 1960 on, the A.C.T.A. will increase its allowance to 750 shells and 900 clay targets.

The allocation of the Interstate Teams' Match, State sections, for 1960 has been made by the Executive Committee. The Official Allocation is: Queensland, at Cunnamulla Gun Club; New South Wales, at Royal Aero Club (Bankstown); South Australia, at Alexandra (S.A.); Western Australia, at Perth; Tasmania, at Cressy (Tas.), and Victoria, at Melbourne Gun Club.

1960 NOMINATIONS FOR OF-FICES IN THE ASSOCIATION. Nominations for all offices in the Association close on 31st December. 1959. Rule 11 of the Association Constitution reads, "Nominations for all offices in the Association and membership of the Executive Committee must reach the Secretary of the Association on or before the thirty-first of December in each year prior to the Annual General Meeting".

From the foregoing it will be understood that the Association year closes on 31st December each year and nominations for all offices in the Association for 1960 are required to be in the hands of the Association Secretary not later than 31st Decemher next. All nominations must be signed by an affiliated club secretary, in accordance with the Rules.

Nominations received after 31st December next will not be accepted.

NOTICES OF MOTION. Notices of Motion having reference to amendment of Rules are also required to be lodged with the Secretary, A.C.T.A,. on or before thirty-first of December, 1959.

1960 ANNUAL MEETING. The 1960 Annual Meeting of affiliated club delegates will be held at Southport, Queensland, on Sunday, June 12th, 1960, commencing at 10.30 a.m. Every affiliated club with shooters registered is entitled to one delegate to represent its interests at this meeting. Name and full address of delegate must be supplied to the Association Secretary at least seven days prior to the meeting. Only fully accredited delegates will be admitted to the meeting.

1960 ASSOCIATION SHOOTING FIXTURES. The 1960 Association National and International series will be held on the grounds of the South Coast Gun Club at Southport (Qld.). extending over the dates June 10th to 14th, 1960 (both dates inclusive). Preliminary details of programme appears in the December issue of "News". Complete details of full programme will appear in the early 1960 editions of the Association iournal.

NEW HANDICAPPING FORMU-LA. As from January 1st, 1960, the following new Handicapping Formula has been approved by the Association Executive.

50 BREAK

If compiled in front of regular handicap no alteration.

If compiled three yards or more behind regular handicap

2 yards back. If compiled on or one or two yards behind regular handicap, 1 yd. back.

75 or OVER BREAK

If compiled in front of regular handicap no alteration. If compiled three yards or more behind regular handicap, 2 yds. back. If compiled on or one or two yards behind regular handicap, 1 yd. back.

CASH DIVISIONS

A cut of £25 to £50 or equivalent trophy value 1 yard back. A cut of between £51 and £150 or equivalent trophy value

2 yards back. A cut in a Handicap of £151 or more or equivalent trophy value 3 vards back.

DIVISIONS (Sweepstakes)

A shooter who obtains three cuts (divisions) in sweepstakes of ten birds or more on any one programme with a minimum of 15 shooters in

Club Secretaries or Club Handicapper cannot recommend inward movement of more than 1 yard on each recommendation, unless shooter has suffered some physical disability. Once a shooter has attained the handicap of 14 yards he cannot be moved in front of that mark.

GENERAL

A shooter winning a Championship from a mark behind his Association Handicap automatically goes back to the mark from which the Championship was won. Only the Association Handicapper has authority to amend shooters' Handicap Cards. Card to be posted (all mail is now air mail) direct to the Association for adjustment immediately such adjustment is sought, together with Handicap Return outlining the reason for the amendment of Handicap. Club management has the right to re-handicap any obviously under-handicapped shooter immediately, providing the Association is notified by air mail within two days and reasons given with a Handicap Return, otherwise any such handicap movement will not be ratified. Clubs when registering a shooter for the first time must clearly indicate whether shooter has had field or other experience before a 12-yard handicap is issued. Failure to provide this information - the shooter will be placed on 16 yards.

RE-INTRODUCTION OF HANDI-CAP AND REGISTRATION CARDS. Handicap and registration cards will be re-introduced as from January 1st, 1960. Registered shooters are requested to carry the card at all times when attending shoots. No amendment or adjustment to the handicap shown on the shooter's card will in future be valid unless same carries the signature of the Association handicapper (signatures of club officials are no longer acceptable). Only club officials (President, Secretary or Handicapper) may recommend movement of a shooter's handicap. This is required to be done by the submission to the Association office of a handicap return or explanatory letter

advising the movement suggested and the forwarding of the shooter's card to the Association office. If the movement is considered justifiable, card will be endorsed accordingly and returned immediately to the sender. In this connection it is advised that all mail within Australia is carried "air-mail" as from November 1st, 1959. Hence little delay will be occasioned by the posting of the cards. Any registered shooter may be moved by any affiliated club management—forward or back—at any time considered appropriate, but such movement must be advised to the Association office within two days for ratification. If the shooter's card is not forwarded with any such advice the movement will not carry ratification or approval.

ADDITIONAL REFEREE EXAM-INER. Mr. T. L. Almond of Ashburton, E.II (Victoria) has been appointed an additional Official Referee Examiner.

SHOOTING-UP. Clubs are reminded that "shooting-up" is not permitted after the close of the first round in any event, except in the cases of members of the Australian International Team wishing to take part in the Grand Australian Handicap at the National shooting series.

ELECTRIC TRAPS. The Executive Committee has issued the following direction in connection with the use of electric traps by affiliated clubs: "That clubs shooting over electric traps be informed that these traps must be adjusted to throw birds in complete conformity with Association rules with regard to height, distance and angles."

COMMONWEALTH AND STATE SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS. Commonwealth and State Skeet Championships, as from January 1st, 1960, will be shot over two rounds (50 targets) as under I.S.U. Rules.

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES CHAM-PIONSHIPS. The Executive Committee has decreed the following change in the rules governing Deauville Doubles competitions and championships. The change to operate as from January 1st, 1960, for 12 months as a trial period. If at the end of the trial period the change is considered satisfactory the Rule in this class of event may be permanently altered by the Executive Committee. The change in Deauville Doubles rule for the present to read, "All Deauville Doubles to be shot from the same yardage and be shot with four shooters on the ground at one time — first pair using 1 and 5 tracks, and on second round to change to tracks 2 and 4. The second pair to operate in the opposite way."

1960 AFFILIATION AND REGISTRATION FEES. Club affiliation (£5) and shooters' registration fees (20/- each), are due and payable as from January 1st next. Secretaries submitting lists are asked to please arrange lists in alphabetical order and state whether shooters listed are newly registered or are renewals. Full initials and full addresses are also required to be shown. Observance of the foregoing requests ensures more efficient recording. All fees should be paid not later than January 30th, 1960, in accordance with the Rules.

CHAMPIONSHIP BADGES. As is now well known, the Association recently introduced championship badges. As from 16th November, 1959, these badges will be made up in the following coloured enamel: for Commonwealth titles, blue enamel; for State titles, red enamel; for District titles, white enamel. Clubs ordering badges for any other type of event will have

their badges made up in green. The cost of championship badges, as from 16th November, 1959, will be 25/-.

ERRATA. Clubs are notified of a slight correction in the circular recently posted by the A.C.T.A. The section in the circular which refers to "Interstate Teams' Match"—the yardage from which this event is to be shot from 1/1/1960 onwards is shown as 16 yards—this should read, "18 yards". Which, in effect, means that the Interstate Teams' Match in all States from 1960 onwards is to be shot from 18 yards, 15 men aside, with the best 10 scores to count (double - barrel, both barrels equal value).

'Tips and Tails''

Shooters throughout South Australia and Victoria will regret to learn of the serious illness of Colin Barr of Mount Gambier and S.A. representative on the Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. Barr is in the Ru-Rua Hospital in Ade-

laide, and although reported to be improving, it would seem that it will be a fairly long time before complete

recovery comes about.

Frequently mention is made in sporting circles of the value of the white ibis. C.S.I.R.O. have investigated these birds and described them as "reliable farm hands". The destruction of plague locusts and of fresh-water crayfish in irrigation channels by the White Ibis is con-sidered to be a potentially useful contribution to agriculture. Occasionally these splendid birds are shot at and frequently killed by irresponsibles with guns. The usefulness of the birds should not be overlooked.

Dulverton Gun Club in the Tasmanian Midlands has affiliated with the A.C.T.A. Secretary of the club is R. J. Ward, whose address is Oatlands, Tas. Club President is Dr. G. Courtney, also of Oatlands. The club is fortunate that it is permitted to shoot on Sunday afternoons - this factor greatly assists interest and attendance of competitors.

The Victorian Duck season will open on February 20, 1960, at 5 a.m. and will close on April 30. Several changes in the regulations will be introduced for the coming season. Four species of duck, hitherto protected, have been added to the list of game ducks. These are the pinkeared, the blue-winged shoveller, the chestnut teal and the monkey (or freckled) duck. The bag limit on opening day is 20 birds and 10 on subsequent days. Within the stated limits there must not be more than

10 black duck, or 10 grey teal, nor more than 5 ducks of any other species. The prohibition of the use of unplugged automatic shotguns has been lifted. The Director of the Vic-torian Fisheries & Game Department, amouncing the changes recently, stated that he had no doubt the changes outlined would prove popular with shooters. There are still four species of ducks which may not be shot, the two tree-ducks (which are very rare), and the musk ducks and the blue-billed ducks. Shooters failing to obey the new regulations, which have been introduced as experimental and from the viewpoint of protection, could find the regulations indicated re-imposed if shooters do not fully co-operate. Victoria appears to be in for a good season.

It has often been mentioned in these columns that the A.C.T.A. is always ready to co-operate when a genuine charity shoot is arranged at which novice shooters and possibly a few registered attend to aid a worthy cause. Recently the secretary of the Glen Innes, N.S.W., Ambulance Queen Committee wrote the Association seeking permission for a Charity Shoot on November 28. In view of the co-operation evidenced by the Glen Innes Committee the Association had no hesitation in formally approving of the proposed fixture, providing details of score sheets were forwarded to the Association for perusal. There are occasions when groups go ahead, without first applying to the Association, and announce their intention to hold a "Charity Shoot". This is most irregular and shooters attending such a function render themselves liable to be dealt with under the rules of the Association for taking part in "an unregistered shoot".

I will be obliged if you will bring before the notice of the Executive Committee the concern felt by many clubs and registered shooters at the Association's recent decision to terminate the issue of handicap cards.

The case was amply stated by Mr. Harrold in his letter to the Editor of Shooting News, which appeared in October issue of that journal, and this club supports the views there expressed.

I do not know what reason was given by the Annual Meeting for its decision to discontinue the handicap card system, but I do know there are good reasons in favour of the retention of that system. Shooters had got used to having their handicap alterations recorded on their cards and now they are thrown into confusion by not knowing what handicap alterations have taken place until such advices are published in Shooting News. Shooters moving in are affected as much as those moving back.

I think that under the old scheme of the Association Handicapper advising the shooter of his handicap adjustments the clubs would have been brought more into the picture if a similar advice had been issued to the shooter's home club secretary. Then both the shooter and his home club would have been advised simultaneously of the handicap adjustment, and the confusion mentioned at the Annual Meeting of the Association may have been avoided.

To the Editor, A.C.T.A. News.

Dear Sir.

As most shooters are aware, there has been quite a lot of discussion on the Referee Examiner's comments on Rule No. 16, Where in single-bird shooting, two birds are thrown and

the shooter breaks one, the Referee Examiner rules that it is a kill. Well, he is perfectly correct according to the Rules laid down by the A.C.T.A. Most shooters' comment and contention is that when regulation birds are thrown singly and inadvertently two birds are thrown, neither bird would travel the regulation distance and would therefore be ruled as a NO BIRD under Rule No. 10 (f) as stated. When there is any other reason not provided for in these rules if, in the opinion of the Referee, it materially affects the equity of the competition, and could then be ruled as a NO BIRD.

This is a matter that the Executive Committee could very well look into and make any necessary provision for any such an emergency.

I myself, if refereeing a singlebird event and such a thing happened, I would declare it a NO BIRD under Rule 10 (f) as explained above, whether the shooter missed it or not, and I feel sure that every shooter would agree that it was the only possible thing to do under the circumstances.

Once again I must say that the Examiner was perfectly CORRECT under the present rules of the A.C.T.A. and shooters must therefore accept his ruling as such.

Trusting that this Rule will be carefully considered at the Executive's next meeting.

OUT OF THE PAST

Twenty Years Ago


Two glaring errors in the headings of newspaper reports of the period stated that Geoffrey L. Bragg, a "N.S.W. rifleman", and Harry G. Burrows, also described as a "rifleman", had enjoyed successes at the Blackburn and Nobel Clubs grounds respectively. At Blackburn, Bragg ran up a break of 38 straight. He seldom shoots these days. Billy Scott, described at the time as "a 17-year-old" and an amateur racing cyclist, grassed 32 straight. At the Nobel shoot mentioned, Harry Burrows, still prominent as an official referee at major shoots, with Desmond B. O'Callaghan (still a regular shooter), each ran up breaks of 49 straight. O'Callaghan's sequence included success in the club's premier title (double-barrel) of 1939.

Bill Copeland, who still shoots occasionally, was also under notice at a Nobel shoot with a break of 32 straight. Also at Blackburn, Les Schilling was observed as a winner from "Texas" (C. Lancaster).

At this period it was announced

At this period it was announced that the annual Association Champion of Champions fixture had been changed from the then King's Birthday holiday in June each year to the Victorian Eight Hours Day Holiday, then in April.

The late Harry Ball gained his most important success up to that time when he won the Nobel Club's Single-barrel Championship, outstaying the then National Champion, Jack Bryant Junr. At a Coburg shoot Athol Love (high-gun of the first International match) and President

of the Coburg Club, was the outstanding performer on his club grounds. Love won the main event and cut three others. At Camberwell, Aubrey Johnson, still a very active committee-man and Vice-President of the Australian Club, together with W. R. Johns, now Secretary of the Camberwell Club, were under notice in winning brackets.

Apparently the question of liquor at shoots was a hot subject in December, 1939. The following is an extract of the editorial section of the December 1939 issue, "Since the publication of the previous issue of this journal

several matters—or, to use a more positive term, we use the word incidents—have arisen, and perhaps passed, which call for subjective review and singular ventilation in this the clay pigeon shooting sportsmen's forum of free expression and discussion. The opening stanza has reference to the question of the supply of alcoholic liquor at shooting grounds. This is a matter which periodically raises its ungenerous head and has, therefore, been before the shooting public on previous occasions—but it should not be regarded as a hardy annual." (Them's words, indeed.)

Ten Years Ago

At a club shoot in December, 1949, trophies for which were donated by Evans & Balfour, no less than 92 shooters competed. The club then had three tracks (it has four now). The three tracks were hard pressed to cope with the mass of competitors. At the same club, about the same period, 82 shooters competed, when the 1949 Commonwealth Double barrel title, the blue riband contest of the year, was decided. The contest at that 'period was staged at 25 targets (today it is 40). Four singled out from the field, each with 24/25. They were "Duxbac" (H. G. James), E. G. Biggs, A. F. Burns and W. R. Johns, Strangely, both Burns and Johns missed their first release in the match. The shoot-off was a tense affair. In the first round of five all missed, Biggs and Burns missing one and Johns and "Duxbac" missing two. Continuing, Burns and Biggs went to the 40th round before Burns was declared winner 38/40, Biggs 35/40. "Duxbac" later defeated Johns for third placing, 42/45 to 37/41.

The 1949 New South Wales Singlebarrel title was shot at Bowral by the Wongabri Club. A local shooter, Allan Shepherd, won 23/25 from Newton Thomas, 22/25, with Sid Lamb (Goulburn) defeating Luke Hughes, after a tie shoot, for third place.

At Townsville (Qld.) the North Queensland Deauville Doubles Championship excited main interest. The winners were Townsville club shooters in D. Peberdy and the late T. Clay. Fred Blackman (still club secretary) with J. Melville were runnersup.

Don Corstorphan, Secretary at Colac (and still on the job) won the Club Single - barrel Championship. Corstorphan won outright 14/15 with Bill Arnold in second placing 13/15. An amusing incident took place at this shoot. The then President, Theo Norman, fired the first shot for the President's Trophy. Much to his surprise and to the great enjoyment of onlookers, a large white cockerell appeared from the trap when he called "pull". Norman was so taken back that he almost forgot to fire the special blank cartridges which had been placed in his gun. At St. George in south - west Queensland H. T. (Boyce) Siddins, still a regular shooter, both at St. George and adjacent clubs and also at Coffs Harbour in N.S.W., took the day honours with 62/70.

NEW SOUTH WALES WINS 1959 INTERSTATE MATCH

The New South Wales team registered a brilliant performance to win the 1959 Interstate Teams' Match. 1959 Caribbean Games

The shooting events of the Central American and Caribbean Games once more gave proof of the high standard of the skeet shooters of Venezuela. Juan Garcia, placing 3rd in the World Championships, started under the pressure of being the favourite and was slightly thrown out of balance by a correct but rather hard decision, which deprived him of one bird in the first series. His morning score, 24, 23, did not look very promising, but he pulled himself together in a magnificent way and finished with 149 birds out of the remaining 150.

Dr. Carlos Plaza fought hard to follow his team mate, but had to bow to the strongly built Puertorican Jaime Loyola, who fired with an easy swing. The Colombian shooters also made a very good show.

Shooting conditions were not ideal. as the competitors had to fire against the sun in the morning. The timing device also put some extra pressure upon the nerves of the shooters by refusing to function now and then.

Clay Tips for Tyros

by BROCK

in "Shooting Times" (Eng.)

An experienced clay shooter who comes into contact with a beginner or group of beginners to the sport is often assailed with queries, such as, "How much lead should you give an angle bird?" or "How high on the trap house should I point the gun?" To the beginner there are many puzzling questions which the experienced shot does not think about, and when they are asked, it is not always easy to find the answer quickly. So much shooting with sporting guns is purely automatic, it is a question of instinct and practice, and to turn round and say, "I always do this," or "I always do that," is not easy. Even the simple question of whether to shoot with both eyes open or with one shut is not so easy to answer as it sounds.

Just for a moment think about yourself. Do you shut one eye when shooting game? The probability is that without really stopping to think, you are not sure and you might even have to go and pick up a gun and swing it about a bit in an attempt to get the right answer. Many trap shooters will say that they always shut an eye, but I have my doubts as to whether they really do. They may close an eye when aligning up on the trap house, but the odds are that they open it at the moment of calling the bird, and that eye most probably stays open whilst the bird is being taken.

The job of the volunteer coach is not always easy, and this article tries to pin-point some of the questions which are asked most often, and in attempting to answer them I do not wish it thought that I am trying to set myself up as a writer of a handbook on shooting, so remembering this, these words are addressed to the beginner at the game, not the experienced shot.

General Principles

First of all, let us take clay pigeon shooting in a general sense and then later cover the three sections of the

sport. Trapshooting, Skeet and Sporting Shooting. Generally speaking. the first thing a would-be clay shooter must do is check on his gun. Does it fit him? Is the stock the right length and cast, and is it the gun for the job? From the way the gun comes up, it is often easy to say that it does not fit well, but minor, and not easy to notice alterations in drop and cast may make a tremendous difference in a person's shooting capabilities. The only real answer to this is to consult a good gunsmith, or to buy your gun from one. It is not in his interest to let a customer go away with a gun that does not fit, and small alterations should not take very long. An experienced shooter can often spot a man and a gun that fit each other badly, but some of the finer points are not so easily noticed hence professional advice is usually the best.

Guns and Cartridges

From the fit of the gun we come to the type of gun to be used. Here the branch of clay pigeon shooting in which you are interested must be considered, but again very generally the gun can be of any type providing it is sound and its trigger pulls are regular and not heavy. On a sideby-side a flat rib is an advantage and an over-and-under should preferably have a ventilated rib. Automatics have come to the fore to a great extent these days, but if you have one with a barrel attachment which blows the blast out sideways, then you will not be popular with your next-door shooters and will, for this reason, not be able to use it when Trapshooting, but this attachment will not prevent you using this gun for Skeet. Pump guns are amusing to watch in operation, and the experienced user can be very quick in getting off his second barrel, but they are not advised for novice use, as until the knack is perfected, the shooter thinks more about the use of the gun and not enough about the target.

So much, for the moment, about the gun. The next logical point is, naturally, what goes in the gun, i.e. the type of cartridges for the sport. These days the shooter has the choice of many loads for different purposes. The choice of manufacture is limited, but there is a choice. The ideal cartridge is one that will do the particular job required of it with the least fuss and bother. Pattern is essential; that means density of pattern and regularity of obtaining that pattern, and this must be obtained with as little wear and tear on the shooter as possible. If you eventually shoot in hundred-bird competitions and then have fifty birds to shoot off in ties you will appreciate these remarks about wear and tear on the shooter. The load should, therefore, be as light as possible within the bounds of efficiency. Loads for the various types of clay shooting can vary.

Personal Items

So far we have discussed the gun and the cartridge; now for a very important piece of shooting equipment—the "straight piece behind the

gun." Without the shooter the gun will not go off: if the shooter cannot see the bird, then there is no point in letting off the gun, and the gun must also be pointed in the right direction. So we have the personal fitness of the shooter to consider. There is no need for intensive training sessions with weight reductions or muscle-building exercises, but a certain amount of fitness is required in order that eyes, nerves and muscles work together in perfect harmony. Eyes can be looked after with shooting glasses, nerves and reflexes can be nursed by not shooting when you are tired or immediately after a long car drive, and muscles should be kept fit by indulging in a little gun handling in your own home. Heavy manual labour just before shooting is also not advisable. Muscles that are tired and quivering will not quickly answer the instructions given them by the mind through the nerve system, and if both mind and nerve system are also tired, then can readily be imagined the errors that can be made between mind and

muscles, between the call of pull and the squeezing of the trigger and in the controlling of the direction of the gun.

Finally, when handling the gun, it is no good to stand there as if holding a broom handle or a lump of wood. A good gun has balance, but to be able to take advantage of the feel of a gun the shooter's stance must be right. For a normal person shooting off the right shoulder, most of the weight must be on the left foot, which should be the leading foot. The body should roughly point at a 45° angle to the expected flight of the bird, or rather to the direction that the gun will point, and the body should feel free and not all tensed up. Tightening up of the essential muscles will not speed up shooting. It is much more likely to cause a shooter to poke.

Stance varies a little according to the type of shooting that you are doing. Obviously when shooting Trap "gun up" you have to consider other things than you would when shooting Skeet "gun down." "Sporting," with its different types of birds, is different again, but basically, if the weight is on the left foot and the body is free to pivot, that is the best position for shooting.

Beginners will see experienced shots who crouch and shoot with the left leg bent or who bend their bodies in various contortions. Although these shooters may do well, and some of them be international shots, the beginner is not wise to copy them. The easiest and most free style is the best, until you gradually develop a style of your own. The beginner will ask the experienced shot how much lead he gives for a swinging bird and

how much for a crossing bird, but again there can be no definite answer. Lead is tied up with swing and if you swing quickly then your lead can be reduced, but if you try and intercept with, say, a five-feet lead, then the only result is a poke and a string of misses.


