

The Editor's Notebook



NEW ZEALAND HANDICAP-PING. The report by the Captain of the Australian party (Mr. D. B. Mott) which visited New Zealand to take part in the National Championships in that Dominion, and which was published in the June edition of this journal, has created much interest and brought forth much comment on the handicapping systems used in New Zealand. It does not seem to be logical for a shooter who can put together 100 straight to be up on a front mark, and this is apparently what happens in New Zealand. The whole question will be discussed at the October meeting of the Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. This meeting will be held in Adelaide. Of considerable interest also, it has been learned that the New Zealand International Team is composed of shooters who register qualifying scores in three events instead of the single event as used in Australia. The qualifying events for International Team inclusion are the N.Z. National Single-rise Championship over 50 targets, and two qualifying events over 30 targets under points system of scoring. This allows for a possible total of 230 points, and in the 1961 New Zealand International those gaining places qualified down to 220. It would seem that Australia could learn from this scheme, and possibly profit by it, by making the Australian International Team qualification the top aggregate scores of the leaders in the National single-barrel title and the National double-barrel title. This, it would

seem, would be sure to bring about a top-class team. There is no denying that a shooter, sometimes with little experience, can enjoy a "day out" in the National double-barrel title and gain a place in the Australian Team. This has happened on occasions. Then when the pressure is on in the actual Teams' Match, the inexperienced shooter becomes a little uneasy and, missing a few, starts to fade out.

ASSOCIATION OFFICIAL REF-EREE EXAMINATION. The 1961 Official Referee Examination (written test) has been announced. Candidates intending to take the examination are required to make written application to the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, not later than July 29, 1961. Applicants for entry in the examination should lodge their full name and complete address. Only registered shooters who are members of an affiliated club will be eligible to take part. On July 31 Rules Brochures will be posted to all applicants, who will then be given two weeks to thoroughly study the Rules. On August 15 an examination paper will be posted direct to all applicants, who will be expected to return the completed examination paper, with answers appended, not later than August 22. The examination paper, with answers, must be completed within two hours before the President of the candidate's home club (or the Secretary where a President resides


outside a reasonable range from the applicant's home address). Completed papers received after August 28 will not be accepted. Candidates who successfully pass the written test—a pass is 80% correct answers—must then complete the oral test required under one of the A.C.T.A. Official Examiners before the end of the current calendar year. Those who neglect to obey this direction will be struck off the list of partly completed referee candidates.

The written examination has, on this occasion, been changed somewhat in that every question carries a number of points if successfully answered (in the opinion of the Official Examiner). The maximum points has been fixed at 100, therefore those who secure 80 points will be considered as having passed the theory test.

Those who were given extra time to complete the oral test at the end of last year are reminded that no further extension of time for completion will now be granted.

BREAK CLAIMS. Clubs are continuing to send in claims for break recognition to the A.C.T.A. office without the very necessary score sheets accompanying the claim. As as has been pointed out from time to time, break claims cannot be accepted unless substantiated by the actual score sheets. Clubs are also reminded that breaks made and accepted by the A.C.T.A., providing the above conditions are complied with, can be made from ANY mark, not necessarily off the shooter's own handicap. This question has frequently been asked in recent weeks, hence this official advice. A break may be made in a championship or handicap event, but only under double or single-barrel conditions. No break is recognised if shot in Deauville Doubles, walk-up, double-rise, mixed birds or any novelty competition. Break claims also will only be acknowledged if made in actual competition. By competition is meant two squads of at least ten shooters. shooting at ten targets.

REGISTRATION FEES. Those whose fees remain unpaid will be struck off the mailing list for "News" and will become ineligible for open handicap at the end of this month. Reminder notices were sent out to all showing on the records as not being financial, and the response to these notices has been excellent. However, there still remain some who have either ignored the obligation or do not intend to continue. Those in the latter category are requested to advise the Association indicating this fact so that additional mail matter will not be posted to them. In regard to payment of fees, the Association, during the past month, has received two amounts of £1, being obvious registration fees from shooters who have not appended their name with the payment. This position makes it impossible to acknowledge the remittance. One post-mark showed Menindee, N.S.W., and the other one appeared to come from Western Australia. The post-mark was unreadable, but started off with the letters "QU——". If the shooters concerned in the areas mentioned advise of their payment and the date posted, same will be acknowledged.

COMMONWEALTH DOUBLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 40 Clay Targets from 20 yards. Two barrels are permitted and either barrel shall be of equal value and score one point. Each competitor to shoot from the five tracks squad system at 5 or 10 clay targets at each visit. The management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 40/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of 5 clay targets until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 40 clay targets from 20 yards. One barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from the five tracks squad system at 5 or 10 targets at each visit. The management shall provide three trophies. 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 40/-, optional sweep-stakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay targets until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 20 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value and score as one point. Five clay targets from 20 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed

in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay targets, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 yards mark. The competitor advances at an ordinary walking pace — to shuffle or walk slowly is a "no bird". The clay target is released between 20 and 15 yards and the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator, or dice arrangement, and is determined each target the competitor is to shoot at. Five pairs of double-rise clay targets from 16 yards rise, squad system, only pairs to score and count as one. making possible total 20 points. In the event of ties to be shot at 2 double barrel, 2 single barrel, 2 walkup, and 2 pair double rise, total 8 points, until finality. Entrance fee 30/- for Championship, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The club management to provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH WALK-UP CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 25 clay targets, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. When ready in this position he commences and continues to walk at a normal walking pace. To walk slow or shuffle constitutes a "no bird". The puller will release the target between the 20 and 15 yards mark, the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator or dice arrangement. The competitor will shoot at five or ten targets at each visit. Each competitor shoots from centre track. Entrance fee to Championship 30/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent.

—1st, 2nd and 3rd. In the event of second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall provide three trophies ties to be shot off in lots of five clay pigeons until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH DOUBLE-RISE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 pairs of clay targets from 16 yards. Each competitor to shoot at five pairs at each visit, five tracks squad system. Pairs only to score and count as one point. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five pairs until finality. The management of club conducting Championship shall provide three trophies -1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 40/-, optional sweep-stakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH DEAUVILLE DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot from 24 yards at 20 pairs of doubles. The competitors will stand with four shooters on the ground at one time, the first pair of shooters using tracks one and five for the first round, changing over to tracks two and four for the second round. The second pair of shooters to alternate with first pair. The competitors can arrange between them-selves which track they will take and who shall call for the release of the clay targets. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs shall count, and as one point. Either shooter can help his partner after he has broken his clay target. In the event of a misfire by either gun, another clay target or targets will not be given that competitor, and he is required to abide by the result. Each two competitors will shoot at

five pairs at each visit. In the event of ties, to be shot off in lots of 4 pairs until finality. Entrance fee for Championship 35/- for each competitor, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, 60 per cent. first pair, 30 per cent. second pair, 10 per cent. third pair from money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets each pair that have entered the optional sweep. The management shall provide four trophies—two for 1st and two for 2nd.

COMMONWEALTH SKEET CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at two full rounds of Skeet (each of 25, total 50) using seven stations. Targets to be thrown, singles from Stations 1 to 7, in that order. Doubles to be thrown simultaneously from Stations 7, 6, 4, 2 and 1, in that order. Targets to be released instantaneously upon the competitor's call of "Pull" (for the high house) or "mark" for the low house. Gun position for the competitor, when ready to shoot, to be optional. Should the first twenty-four targets of a round be scored "dead" the shooter shall have the choice (optional) of trap and station for his twenty-fifth shot. In the event of ties a round of seven singles and two doubles (from Stations 2 and 6) will be shot. The shooter will call for his bird when ready to shoot. Entrance fee for Championship 60/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The club management shall provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered the optional sweep.

State Championships

STATE DOUBLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 30 clay targets from 18 yards. Two barrels are permitted and either barrel shall be of equal value and score one point. Each competitor to shoot five or ten clay targets at each visit from five tracks squad system. The management shall provide three trophies—1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 30/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay targets until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

STATE SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 30 clay targets from 18 yards One barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from five tracks squad system at five or ten clay targets at each visit. The management shall provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 30/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay targets until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

STATE MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 18 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score as one point. Five clay targets from 18 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay targets, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 yards mark. The competitor advances at an ordinary walking pace — to shuffle or walk slowly is a "no bird". The clay target is released between 20 and 15 yards, and the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator, or dice arrangement, and is determined each target the competitor is to shoot at. Five pairs of double-rise clay targets from 16 yds. rise, only pairs to score, and count as one point, making possible total 20 points. In the event of ties to be shot at two double barrel, two single barrel, two walk-up and two pair double rise, total eight points, until finality. Entrance fee 30/- for Championship, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent. second 30 per cent, third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The club management to provide three trophies—1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

STATE WALK-UP CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. When ready in this position he commences and continues to walk at a normal walking pace. To walk slow or shuffle constitutes a "no bird". The puller will release the target between the 20 and 15 vards mark, the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being pre-determined by an indicator or dice arrangement.
The competitor will shoot at five to ten targets at each visit. Each competitor shoots from centre track. Entrance fee to Championship 30/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay targets until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

STATE DOUBLE-RISE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 15 pairs of clay targets from 16 yds. Each competitor to shoot at five pairs at each visit five tracks squad system, pairs only to score, and count as one

point. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five pairs until finality. The management of club conducting Championship shall provide three trophies—1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 30/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

STATE DEAUVILLE DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot from 22 yards at 20 pairs of doubles. The competitors will stand with four shooters on the ground at one time, the first pair of shooters using tracks one and five for the first round, changing over to tracks two and four for the second round. The second pair of shooters to alternate with first pair. The competitors can arrange between them-selves which track they will take and who shall call for the release of the clay targets. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs shall count, and as one point. Either shooter can help his partner after he has broken his clay target. In the event of a misfire by either gun, another clay target or targets will not be given that competitor, and he is required to abide by the result. Each two competitors will shoot at five pairs at each visit. In the event of ties, to be shot off in lots of 4 pairs until finality. simultaneously from Stations 7. 6. 4. 2 and 1, in that order. Targets to be released instantaneously upon the competitor's call of "Pull" (for the high house) or "mark" for the low house. Gun position for the competitor, when ready to shoot, to be optional. Should the first 24 targets of a round be scored "dead" the shooter shall have the choice (optional) of trap and station for his twenty-fifth shot. In the event of ties a round of seven singles and two doubles (from Stations 2 and 6) will be shot. The shooter will call for his bird when ready to shoot. Entrance fee for Championship 50/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received. without deduction, are permissible. Entrance fee for Championship 25/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off in lots of five clay targets until finality. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those competitors who have entered for the optional sweep.

DISTRICT MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 16 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score as one point. Five clay targets from 16 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay targets, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 yards mark. The competitor advances at an ordinary walking pace - to shuffle or walk slowly is a "no bird". The clay target is released between 20 and 15 yards, and the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator, or dice arrangement, and is determined each bird the competitor is to shoot at. Five pairs of double-rise clay targets from 16 yards, only pairs to score and count as one, making possible total 20 points. In the event of ties to be shot at two double barrel, two single barrel, two walk-up, and two pair double rise, total eight points, until finality. Entrance fee for Championship 25/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received. without deduction, are permissible. The club management to provide three trophies—1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

DISTRICT WALK-UP CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double barrel,

either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. Often is heard that a gun is a "hard-hitter". This is a misnomer, as applied to guns. Old ideas have long existed that a heavier striker blow can give extra impulse to the shot charge. Every gun is a hard-hitter if it pointed correctly — the odds are that the so-named hard-hitter carries no heavier punch than the next shooter's; it merely happens to fit and is possibly in the hands of a better shot. Occasionally tight-choked single-barrel firearms have been known to reach out further than less constricted tubes.

There are occasional critics of the now well-established medium of television in Australia; but it would seem that the makers of blank cartridges would not be in agreement with any criticism the fascinating pastime provided by television watching.

Eastern Goldfields Club at Kalgoorlie, W.A., has issued some interesting advertising to cover its big two-day programme extending over July 22 and July 23. Two District Championships (double and singlebarrel) will be decided, as well as the £75 D.B. Golden Mile Handicap, the £50 D.B. Boulder Handicap, as well as night shooting. High-gun over the series will receive the Golden Badge High-gun Trophy, a special 18 crt. Gold Gun Badge. Intending competitors should contact the Secretary, Eastern Goldfields Gun Club, Box 107, Kalgoorlie. The club intends improving its amenities for shooters and visitors with the building of a

new club house and kitchen, new secretary's office, entertainment hall and all other modern conveniences. The club's nearest sister club is over 200 miles away, so visitors would be warmly welcomed.

Shooters of a decade or so ago will well remember Melbourne architect Verner Fick, a one-time President of the Blackburn Club, prior to its amalgamation with the Nobel Club, and gamation with the Nobel Club, and later becoming the present Aust. Gun Club at East Burwood. Fick passed on a month or so ago at Rye, where he was living. His funeral took place at the Sorrento Cemetery, on the eastern end of Port Phillip Bay. Fick was quite a good shot in his prime and, above all, was a good sportsman. Getting back a little further, old Nobel shooters will recall the presence of (then) Colonel E. K. Smart, shooting over the traps at the old Nobel ground at West Footscray. Lieut.-General Smart later served in Lieut.-General Smart later served in diplomatic posts overseas. He also passed on a few weeks ago and was accorded a military funeral. The late officer was well liked at the traps, but his official duties precluded him from taking sustained interest.

An unusual experiment was tried out recently in Britain. A large circulation newspaper came out with a heading in black type, "Duel Challenge to Gun Toting Teen-agers" and went on, "Britain's top marksmen are planning a four-hour duel with gun toting teen-agers from two industrial towns, but the duel would not be a 'Pistols for two and coffee for one' affair. It has been planned to help solve the problem of gun-happy youngsters with nothing to shoot at." A correspondent continued, "We are facing a new social problem. All youngsters instinctively want guns. The trouble is that these youngsters do not know what to shoot or where to shoot and can be seen wandering around the fringes of industrial areas with guns under their arms. They love the feel of a gun and the idea of being shooting men, but they probably end up shooting at a tin on a fence, or damaging windows, chimney pots or perhaps an occasional human being. That is why we have worked out an idea of an open invitation shoot for all kinds of novices."

In the advertising for this shoot it was mentioned that a "50 Bird Open Sporting Clay Pigeon Shoot" would be held. Whether the advertising published in the wide circulation daily had the magic effect or not is un-known, but by 12 noon over 40 had turned up for the Open Sporting 50 birder. Most of them had never shot at a clay pigeon before. One unusual feature was the fear of the organizers with so many youngsters wan-dering about "armed to the teeth". However, the only incident was provided by a gentleman of the cloth who had a game leg—taking a high target, he slipped somewhat, corrected his balance, and turned round to find the audience flat on their faces as though Allah's faithful had received their call from the minaret. The experiment proved well worth while and perhaps could be copied in Australia.
