





The Editor's Notebook



INTERNATIONAL MATCH, 1962. Advice is to hand from London outlining the full conditions under which the 1962 Mackintosh International Match is to be shot. The instructions read, "At a recent meeting of the Committee the question of the rules governing the International Match was discussed, and it was requested that your attention be drawn to the following conditions:—

Teams: To consist of 30 members, who must be nominated before they start to shoot their series. All scores to count, in each team.

Shooting Procedure: Each team to be divided into six squads of five members each, and each member to shoot at 100 birds, down-the-line, in four 25-bird stages (one stage from each of 4 auto angle traps) under rules as laid down. Two shots allowed at each target.

Scoring: 3 points for a first-barrel kill, 2 points for a second-barrel kill (highest possible score = 9,000 per team).

Guns and Cartridges: As laid down in the official Rules, guns must not be larger than 12 bore, and cartridges must not contain more than 1½ oz. of shot. No size of shot larger than No. 6 (English) to be used.

Results: Which must be sealed — must be received by the English Association not later than the morning of the home International (22nd June in 1962).

Date: To be advised to London. (The Australian section will be shot at the Royal Aero Club at Banks-

town, N.S.W., on Tuesday, March 13, 1962.)

South African Entry. Arising out of the recent withdrawal of the Union of South Africa from the British Commonwealth, a request was received by the English authorities from the C.P.S.A. of Southern Africa, as to whether a nomination of a team from South Africa would be acceptable. The English Association paid Australia the compliment of first seeking the opinion of Australia in this regard. Australia offered no objection. The English authorities then notified the Southern African Association that it was unanimously agreed by the International Council that South Africa should continue to enter a team in the International and added that despite political changes, it was hoped that the South African team would appear in the contest for many years to come.

International Team Complement. The Central African Clay Pigeon Shooting Association in Southern Rhodesia lodged a request with the International Committee that the teams in future consist of 30 guns each, but with only the top five to qualify for "scores to count" in the International Match. The International Committee considered this request at length. The Welsh Association indicated that Wales favoured "20 to count". However, after weighing all points for and against, it was resolved that the conditions in regard to scores be as indicated above, i.e. "teams of 30, all scores to count".

International Venue, Home Countries. The venue of the Home Coun-

tries International series in 1962 has been fixed to be held at Wellesbourne Aerodrome, near Stratford-on-Avon, Warwickshire (England), on June 22 and June 23, 1962. Visiting Australians will be warmly welcomed at the series.

MISFIRES. Recently several letters were received, all on the one subject. It appears that at a recent big shoot outside Victoria a shooter in a double-barrel competition had a misfire in his first barrel and then fired his second barrel and missed the target. The shooter called the referee (after firing both barrels), and that official declared a misfire on the first barrel and gave the competitor another target. The decision was wrong. The correct procedure should have been for the shooter, immediately he had a misfire, to raise his gun above the shoulder, indicating he required referee examination of his gun or cartridge. The competitor did not do this, but fired his second barrel, and the decision is accordingly "lost bird". Once the shooter fired his second barrel he renounced his claim to another target. Rule 42 is quite precise on the question. The Rule reads, "A competitor having a misfire or apparent misfire will, forthwith, call the referee for his decision, otherwise the referee shall declare it a 'lost target'. The competitor must not turn around, must not open his gun, and must keep his gun pointing in the direction of the traps."

HANDICAPPING. Of late it has been noticed that an increasing number of club officials are requesting that shooters be brought forward without submitting any or sufficient evidence for the Association to heed such recommendation. The Handicapping Formula clearly outlines what is required in this regard. The Formula reads, "Shooters who compete and shoot right through three full programmes and receive no trophy or cuts may be recommended, by club secretaries only, for inward movement, if proof can be provided that the shooter or shooters are overhandicapped. Recommendations from affiliated club secretaries must be accompanied by fullest details on the official Handicap Return Form." The foregoing clearly means that a shooter can only be recommended for forward "if it can be proved that he is over-handicapped", and the onus of such proof is in the hands of the affiliated club secretary. There have been instances of shooters attending three shoots, shooting in one or two events, and then requesting the club secretary to submit their names for handicap review with the object of coming forward — such names are not considered.

THE TOM GLENN CUP. Secretary of the New Zealand Gun Clubs' Association at Dunedin, W. H. Stewart, has kindly advised of an error in describing the Tom Glenn Cup, which is now competed for in perpetual competition between New Zealand and Australia, and will be shot for again during the A.C.T.A. National Championships programme at Bankstown in March next. The trophy, although it bears the name of the "Tom Glenn Cup", was actually presented by Messrs. Peter Matheson of Wellington (who is well known on Australian shooting tracks) and Bill Nix of Masterton. The facts are that the donors prevailed on Mr. Glenn, the N.Z.G.C.A. President, to allow the Cup to be known as the "Tom Glenn Cup" in appreciation of the long and worthy service Mr. Glenn had given to New Zealand trapshooting over very many years. Mr. Glenn was at first averse to the proposal, but after a great deal of persuasion by the donors Mr. Glenn finally gave the necessary permission. "News" is indeed happy to publish the full details.



The Gun Engraver's Art

Looking at a gun recently, I was struck by a strange contrast. The gun was a cheap American double, quite a few years old, and at some time, probably thirty years ago, a new pair of barrels had been fitted.

The action was as plain as it could possibly be, with the maker's name on each side and an S on the strap forming the total adornment. But for some reason, the English gunmaker who fitted the new barrels decided to engrave the barrels as for an English gun, and they bear a neat pattern round the breech end of each barrel, another on the extension head, and a third running for an inch or so along the top rib.

Looking at this gun which has one half engraved and one not, it was easy to see why an engraved gun is so much more attractive than one which is entirely plain. Another way to judge the difference, for those fortunate enough to see an engraver at work, is to look at an action when only one side is engraved, and compare it with the other bare, polished side.

One thing always intrigues about gun engravers as a body, and that is the high average age they attain. In the Birmingham trade longworking lives are more or less normal, but of the total gunsmiths employed at any one time, it always seems as if the engravers have the oldest members.

George Gilbert

The classic example was George Gilbert, who was still engraving guns at the age of 94, a short time before his death, and there are many vivid recollections of that rather proud old man. Perhaps the most persistent is about his smoke-screen. The old engraver needed a fire in the workshop almost the whole year round, and burned coal in a small stove, which periodically choked the pipes.

Invariably he waited until a complete stoppage occurred, when he would summon me to a shop filled with choking smoke, where I had to wrestle with several hot stove pipes while I brushed them out.

On one of his last days at work, George struggled up the stairs to show me a pair of barrels on which, to his great distress, he had made the mistake of missing out one letter of a name. While he sat in the corner I found a barrel striker and carefully removed the lettering from the top rib—he had not gone very deep.

Half an hour later he returned in even greater trouble, for he had done the same thing again. It took me longer to console him than to put it right again. Third time we were lucky.

Mr. Gilbert did a fair amount of his work seated, and always rested for a spell when feeling the need for a break. Yet other engravers seem to do the bulk of their work standing, and only rarely use a stool. As these men also live to a good age, the method of working cannot have any great influence on the result.

Italian Style

Some engravers sit most of the time, others stand, but one of the most peculiar workers I ever watched was a young Italian who worked in the Birmingham trade for a short time.

This engraver had a special revolving vice for his work which could be turned and locked in any position—a most useful tool. Where he differed from the English workers was in the height of his vice above

the bench. It was built up so high that he could actually rest his cheek on the action he was engraving, and as he was a tall man, the vice was certainly well up.

Most of his cutting was done with a hammer tapping his gravers, and when his cheek rested against the work he appeared to be caressing it.

English engravers do most of the cuts free-hand, and only rarely use the hammer. Usually the steel "gravers" are mounted in small wood handles of a special shape, round and full to fit the palm of the hand. A lot of strength is required to cut patterns in steel, however keen the tool, yet qualified men seem to flick the metal out as if it was cheese.

Whatever the type of engraving, game, scroll, or just plain borders, the workman has to be something of an artist. Even in this craft, which is almost an art, men tend to specialise rather, and those used to scroll engraving will not be keen to do

game.
To the uninitiated, any kind of engraving looks difficult, and people who see numbers of engraved guns all the time also feel the same way. If asked which was the hardest type of engraving to learn, some would say one or the other, while some would say neither. Strangely enough, lettering is acknowledged to be the hardest part of gun engraving, and apprentices are allowed to tackle this part only after they can show good progress in the other parts.

Highly-Rated Trap Gun

Report by COLIN SHADBOLT

If you want a smart-looking gun that will last forever for use in traps, the Breda is the self-loader for you.

The Breda self-loader contains nothing startling in mechanical construction — it is just a very refined long blow-back action.

The principle on which it works is simple and reliable and many selfloaders have followed the same path, but few with such attention to the detail that makes the Breda such a silky performer.

The same principle is to be found in use by Winchester, Remington and Browning in their shotguns, Remington in rifles, and in machine guns the French "Chauchat" made for the 8 mm. Lebel rifle cartridge and used in the first World War Model 1915. CSRG. Another was the Madsen for the 30-06 U.S. Government.

In the Breda the action has a travel of 3½ ins., as it is necessary for the breech to move back far enough to allow the feeding up of the new round. This is the factor that controls the speed of fire as, but in

the Breda, this time lag is overcome to some degree by having the cartridge carrier lift as the action begins to recoil after firing. The Breda appears slower than it actually is, because the user does not get the slam-bang effect of some long-recoil self-loaders.

The Breda is like some cars that do not make a lot of noise as the speed runs up — they don't have to be noisy to prove they're going fast.

In the Breda the action runs on narrow rails which, like all parts of the gun that are exposed to friction, are hard-chromed. This use of hard chrome prolongs the life of the piece and makes it very silky in operation. Since friction is at such a low level. the power needed to operate the gun is correspondingly reduced, and so the balance of springs against recoil can be brought to a fine art.

Beside lowering friction, the use of narrow friction rails means increased freedom from jamming, fouling and sand. So the Breda has a very good reputation for avoiding fouling under

Australian conditions, which are rather more adverse than most other countries.

On firing, the barrel and action are held together, locked by a solid stud in the action engaging in a slot in the barrel, so that the full energy of the powder is given to moving the shot charge, and there is no loss of power at all.

As the charge moves up the barrel, the barrel and action move back inside the receiver against the weight of the barrel return spring and the softer breech block return springs. At a distance of 2½ ins. travel the back of the block smacks into the spring-loaded sear mechanism, setting the trigger to stop the gun "doubling" and also cocking the striking hammer.

A fraction further and the action slams into the loading platform lever, cocking the spring and further cushioning the backward movement of the action and barrel.

Finally the end of the barrel extension bumps on the frame recoil shoulder and starts forward again, the total travel being a matter of 3½ ins., and now the breech block and barrel part company, the barrel going forward, while the block hangs on to the fired case and then ejects it.

As soon as the barrel gets forward the latch holding the block back re-leases and the bolt mechanism races forward, picking up a fresh cartridge as it goes, and loading it into the chamber.

The value of this system is that all the resistances to be overcome can be placed and weighted in such a fashion to almost wipe out the sudden fierce blast of energy needed to start over an ounce of shot down the barrel to reach a velocity of almost 1400 fs. in a little over 2 ft.

A further refinement of this system is the use of a relatively heavy barrel, and Breda have taken this tried and true principle for the selfloader and refined it until the gun operates surely and without the slamming and bashing that characterises other guns that use this same prin-

By the use of a suitable collar on the barrel recoil spring the reversing of the collar takes care of light and heavy loadings, so that the 22 in. shell can be used for short-range work in the 2% in. gun. In the Magnum 3 in. model the same thing applies, so that the gun can be adjusted for 2% in. shells as well as its heavy 3 in. loadings.

Since the gun takes down, the idea of interchangeable barrels comes to mind immediately, but this is not the course that Breda have followed. Barrels made of high-grade nickel-chrome steel and hard-chromed inside cost real cash, and furthermore you can't go racing around the game field with a covey of bearers carrying your spare barrels. Accordingly, Breda has standardised on a 24½ in. barrel, and then offer a number of very light choke tubes which screw on to a threaded muzzle and give you any type of choke you may need.

Barrels are offered in two styles, with or without the ventilated rib, and then with the addition of any of five choke tubes, the shooter is in a position to take on any form of shooting he wishes. These choke tubes are easily changed in the field and weigh but a few ounces, so that

the shooter need ever carry but a single tube with him, saving under the most exceptional circumstances.

The choke tube gives a good aiming point as well as giving the degree of choke required. I am asked constantly if a Poly choke would be more desirable, and I am personally

satisfied that the Poly choke has not the pattern possibilities of the interchangeable tube idea.

If the Poly choke were the unqualified success that it is claimed to be, then other ideas like the widely used Cutts Compensator would have disappeared, but not so. Surely it is no accident that the makers of the Winchester and Remington guns do not fit Poly chokes as a matter of course, but the makers of the cheaper grades of gun like Savage, Stevens, Noble and Higgins, do. The answer is that the fine patterns of the tube choke cannot be duplicated by the variable choke, or at least that's what my patterning shows.

So I consider at the moment that the Breda interchangeable tube is the most effective answer for the shooter who demands fine patterns with a minimum of weight and spare bits. With the 24½ in. barrel, which has been standardised for the Australian market, the over-all length when fitted with the interchangeable tube becomes as shown in table.

It will be noted that as the degree of choke increases, so does the length of the choke tube, which is an inherent factor in the construction of a choke, and the reason why guns with open-bored barrels can be obtained in shorter lengths than the closer borings of the modified and full-choke types. Pattern figures are standards for a 30 in. circle at 40 yds.

Nor do the Breda company stop with the use of alternate styles in barrels, in the degree of choke, or in modification of the mechanism to take different styles of cartridge, but they offer a seven-shot extension for the magazine. This is a most diverting piece of additional equipment, for the man who requires that additional magazine capacity, then in this magazine extension he has the whole works. The click adjustable cap on the fore-end is removed and the extension screwed into place without the use of any special tools are you're in business.

Why anyone would need more than the normal five shots is not my concern, but I could see some use for this extension as regards roo and pig drives, but under ordinary sporting conditions this Breda will be found a trifle too efficient for real sport. Patterns are very even, and it would be quite easy for any reasonable field shot to fill his bag very quickly.

be quite easy for any reasonable field shot to fill his bag very quickly.

The stock is of the trap style with a sharply curved pistol hand and a Monte-Carlo comb, the gun points very smoothly and swings well, and there is very little disturbance when firing, the usual slam-bang of the self-loader is missing, and all the shooter notices is a slight check to his swing, and then she's on target again, ready for a second. It feels like a very nice duck and fox gun.

Another thing I noticed was the very quick swing of the fairly short barrel, but when shooting this for penetration I could find no noticeable difference. This has been a point which has been made much of, and I was always firmly convinced there must be something in this very long barrel business, beside being a mere hang-over from the long guns of black-powder days.

I started off with ordinary bright jam tins and started firing at 55 long paces. The first shot out of the Breda put four pellets of number six plated shot into the tin hard enough to let daylight through the metal, the 32 in. conventional gun put three through the tin the same amount.

At 50 yards the Breda had five through the tin, while the conventional gun had six. I came back five yards at a time, and first one gun and then the other would be on top, until at 40 yards each gun left a new tin looking like a culinder, and I for my part ended up firmly convinced that if anyone centres the full 1½ oz. load squarely on a duck at 40 yards, then that duck would assuredly take a hell of a bashing.

I can only assume that the length of the shot charge is such that the duck flying through it only gets a small portion of what is being sent his way. On birds just lifting off the water it is quite another story, as they don't get a chance to gather speed and so collect most of the shot exactly where it is aimed.

By and large the Breda can be recommended to the man who wants an efficient killer. Personally I think that this class of weapon, with such a smooth action and a stock which fits the standard shooter very well,

is a bit solid for sporting work. There wouldn't be a great deal left for anyone else if a merchant with one of these lead throwers got to the pond first.

I appreciate the attitude of the American Game Commissions, which insist these guns carry a magazine plug to restrict their capacity to two rounds. Due to the extensive use of chrome on all parts exposed to wear, including the barrel, this outfit should last a lifetime and must be rated very highly among the self-loaders. It's among the best available on the world market, for their trap record here and overseas is a most impressive one, and considering the number of doubles used, the Breda has done very well indeed.

Advice to Young Shooters

(By Orion)

To a shooting man, his dog is as important as his gun. Some would say it is even more so. A few who would prefer a day's picking-up with their own dogs to a day's shooting without them.

It is very easy to become sentimental about dogs, which we rightly regard as natural and essential partners in our shooting endeavours. though this rather presupposes that a dog has been well trained, is thoroughly efficient, and perfectly obedient in all circumstances. If it can be so described, well and good; you will be proud to take it anywhere and it will be welcomed even as you are. If, on the other hand, it falls short of this ideal by much, do not risk taking it to a shooting party where it may embarrass you, put you off your shooting, and become a nuisance to others.

Choice of a Dog

If you have not got a dog, but are thinking of buying one, what sort should you choose? It depends to some extent on the kind of shooting you are likely to be chiefly concerned with, but there is a fashion in gundogs, just as there is in the so-called non-sporting dogs.

For the game shot, the most popular dog today is undoubtedly the labrador retriever, and a grand dog it most certainly is. If one of this breed is your ambition, you will have no qualms about taking it anywhere, once it is trained, and you will never be asked "what is it?" but whether you buy a puppy or an older dog, make sure it comes from a good working strain. Even that does not guarantee that your puppy will turn out to be a treasure, for character in dogs can vary as much as that in humans, and, like humans, their nature is revealed to some extent in their expressions: an open, friendly, and intelligent look generally augurs well for the future.

The Spaniel

For rough shooting, the all-round qualities of a spaniel make a strong appeal to many, and a good springer is a sound and popular choice. They are fast, tireless, and sagacious, but inclined to be excitable, and for the average dog-owner are more difficult to train than retrievers. Clumbers, which one rarely sees these days, are heavier, steadier, slower working dogs, but the density of their coats enables them to plough through cover which would daunt almost any other breed. Easier to train and handle than the average springer, no less an authority than King George V considered them the most reliable of all gun-dogs, and why they have gone out of fashion is a mystery. The cross between clumber and springer may quite conceivably become a popular choice in the future. In quite recent years such dogs have been used with marked success when worked in teams in lieu of human beaters. They should prove equally successful for one-dog owners and have much impressed.

Cockers are delightful Gogs, with much the same characteristics as springers, except that they are built on a smaller scale. Some, indeed, are so small that they can be regarded more as toy-dogs, the result of their popularity as pets, so if you settle for a cocker, make sure it comes from a working strain.

Of pointing dogs, I have no personal experience of pointers, but setters are lovely creatures, and to shoot over, or merely watch, a well-trained brace at work is a fascinating and beautiful sight. They are specialists, but the needs of the average shooting man are probably best met by a retriever or a spaniel, and if you are lucky enough to pick a good one, he or she will assuredly serve you well on every shooting occasion, as well as becoming your devoted friend.






