

# The Editor's Notebook



"CHARITY" and UNREGISTERED SHOOTS. Information has been received by the A.C.T.A. that certain individuals are repeatedly staging "charity" shoots and other unregistered fixtures. It has been further reported, quite boastfully, by the sponsors of these particular shoots and also by some of the participants, "If I win, I can't be handicapped by the Association, as it's a picnic shoot and no report is sent in, as it's not registered, etc., etc." It has been found that the nominations at the shoots referred to are, in many instances, cheaper than ordinary club shoots, for the reason that overhead is practically nil and the organisers are quite happy to cover costs, with a bit for themselves or, in some instances, a fictitious "charity". It has been pointed out that the shooters taking part in these fixtures shoot off their Association handicap mark and in many cases compete against nonregistered shooters who shoot off any handicap named and are usually "ringing in", anyway.

It is not intended by the Association that this state of affairs should continue without participants risking a "please explain" and possible risk of disqualification.

Rule 87 of the A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules reads, "All shooters must be registered by the A.C.T.A. before taking part in competition. Unregistered shooters are not permitted to compete at any time. Registered shooters who shoot at an unregistered or unaffiliated club render themselves liable to disqualification."

The A.C.T.A. is loath to invoke Rule 87, but in view of the reports being received, it would appear that there is little doubt that the Rule mentioned will be used in its severest form if continued ignoring of the Rules is maintained.

It should be remembered by all that a By-Law exists within the A.C.T.A. framework that gives the Association "control" of all and every "charity" shoot, no matter by whom it is organised. By this it is meant that before a charity shoot is advertised and conducted, permission from the A.C.T.A. must first be obtained.

The whole question of unregistered shoots will be discussed by the Executive Committee in the near future, and it can be safely assumed that that body will issue instructions invoking all necessary Rules to ensure satisfactory running and control of the sport.

HANDICAP RETURNS. A shooter outside Victoria recently wrote the Association requesting that his handicap be adjusted back several yards. The shooter explained that he was still shown as a 12 yarder and could not see how he could possibly retain that mark, as he had won several 12/16 varder trophies. The shooter was thanked by the Association for his advice and his handicap was adjusted accordingly. However, this is a position which should not be. The trouble is due to lack of cooperation by his club secretary in failing to submit handicap return forms. In the case of the club in

question, the Secretary rarely sends in either results or handicap recommendations. The club is penalising its own members and all other shooters by failing to submit returns and is decidedly unfair to the clubs and shooters who carry out Association requirements in full.

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES. A club recently sought an official ruling on a Deauville Doubles query. It appears that two quick shooters were shooting together as a pair. One would call "right" and the other "pull". On one occasion the targets were re-leased by the puller on the call of "right" and before his partner had time to call "pull". Both shooters accepted the targets, one "killing" with his second barrel and the other missing with both barrels. A discussion followed and the pair were given "lost" decision. The decision was correct. The shooters should not have accepted the targets. Apparently the puller misunderstood the correct call and released the targets before both shooters were ready to shoot - in such case the competitors were quite entitled not to accept the targets and call for another pair when both were in correct shooting position.

COMPLETION OF RETURNS. An important point in the compiling and completion of handicap return forms is being overlooked by a few clubs. The main point at issue is the filling in of the handicap returns. It has

been noticed that some clubs refrain from including the name and subsequent performance of a shooter who happens to be a visitor at their particular club. This action is completely erroneous. When a handicap return is compiled for forwarding to the Association the name of every competitor who took part in the shoot covered by the Return should be included, whether he happens to be a club member or not. It is impossible to assess satisfactory handicaps unless this is done. One case illustrates the point. A shooter, a visitor to an affiliated club, was permitted to take part. Shooting off his handicap, he won the main prize, which exceeded £50 in value. The club failed to include this shooter's name and performance in the Return, and but for vigilance at the Association, this shooter's top-class performance would have passed unobserved, and consequently his performance would have remained un-handicapped. Clubs are requested to give particular attention to this point and ensure that every shooter's name is included on the handicap return form.

A.C.T.A. NATIONAL CHAMPION-SHIPS. The A.C.T.A. National Championships were conducted at Bankstown, N.S.W., on the grounds of the Royal Aero Club. This edition had gone to press before the conclusion of the series. However, the main winners' names are shown in the special "Stop Press" section. A full and detailed resume of the entire shoot will be published in the next issue.

#### CLEANING GUNS.

One of the first concerns of a shooter on returning from a day's shooting, either in the field or over the traps, should be to clean his gun. This should be a traditional sequence. Always take the gun apart before attempting to clean it. If it should have happened to become wet, make

sure that it is wiped absolutely dry. Work on the inside of the barrels with the steel wire brush until it comes out clean, then use a clean mop with oil. The action and fore-end should be carefully wiped over with an oily rag. Never leave the job for someone else to do—if you take a proper pride in your gun, you never will.

their victims and inflict severe and dangerous wounds with their sharppointed horns. Hare drives are a feature of some winter shooting in certain districts of Australia. The tremendous speed of hares is rarely appreciated. When driven they are inclined to canter along, stopping now and then and sometimes sitting up to have a look around. When walked up, a hare may steal along a furrow ahead of the shooter, or if put up, they certainly run, but not initially at anything like top speed—so quick aim and shooting just above the tips of the ears should hit the head of a hare going straight away. The stride of the hare is enormous; it has been measured to be about eleven feet at a fast canter and has been estimated to be double that figure when fully extended. Hares usually produce

three to five leverets in a litter.

An American report reveals veteran 74-year-old Adolph Nelson as the second man in the history of trapshooting in U.S.A. to shoot at 200,000 registered single targets. Last year, despite his age, he shot at 40,000 targets with an average of .9582. He broke 25 hundreds straight during 1961, shooting in all kinds of weather. In the veteran's event at the 1960 Grand American meeting he won the title with 99/100. Nelson is a retired inventor and is still engineering consultant for some of the major automobile companies.

Mr. W. McCullough, Dear Mr. Editor,

I for one am very pleased to see the shooting "News" is up another 10/-, and my opinion is that £2 would not be a penny too much, considering the information we get from this valuable journal. Why, in England during my two years' visit I only received one issue - they started off well by issuing about five "News" journals a year to shooters and finished up with one issue for the following years only, and if one wished to know where and when the various shoots were taking place in England one had to refer to a weekly paper, the "Shooting Times". Of course, this should not be, but there it is.

I would at the time of writing like to draw your attention to the fallacy of shooting two barrels at one target; perhaps the various committees are not aware that we here in Australia are the only people who do that, and the nearest to double-barrel shooting is in England, where it is points shooting, 3 for the first barrel, 2 for second barrels. I am quite convinced that our shooters don't measure up to either English or American shooters, for the simple reason that we here in Australia rely too much on our second shot to make a "kill".

I have a paper cutting of a 15-yearold Los Angeles schoolgirl who shot from the distance of 16 yards and broke 200 clays straight (single barrel, of course). I know during my two years in Hollywood I visited three or four clubs each Sunday alternately, places such as Pasadena, Rutland and Oakland; from clubs where, if there was no competition, we always shot 75 or 100 birds, 25 at each stand, and 5 from each mark, and it was a common thing to see 18 or 20 shooters out of a possible 35 shooters break their 100 straight. and I doubt very much if we have many shooters who can from time to time go out casually on the 16-yard

14 Harcourt Road, mark and break their 100 straight, simply because, as I have previously mentioned, we rely too much on our second barrel.

> I would also like to see Sunday shooting; people play golf, tennis, cricket, and other sports on Sunday, so why not allow the shooting? And lastly I would like to see cartridges allotted to shooters at a great reduction re price - it is us, the trap shooters, that keep the big combines wealthy, not the game shooters; I would suggest 14/- to 15/- a box quite enough to pay, and I think it high time the firms went out of their way to see that trap shooters do get their ammo at a much reduced rate.

Regarding increase in price of "News" to 30/-, something like this was necessary. Still, I think if registration had been left at 20/- and a ten-shilling charge for "News", everyone would be happy. We can't afford to lose one shooter, even if he shoots but once a year. Personally, I would still have my copy even if it cost £1 per issue.

Referring to Skeet and Walk-up events, these are supposed to give us practice for field shooting. To see a

shooter walking down the track with a gun "glued" to his shoulder is not funny, it's pathetic. Fancy shooting rabbits or quail like this while scrambling over logs or through long

I notice a photo on page 78 Dec. '61 issue "News" of Carlos Plaza. He has the toe of his gun below his elbow in Skeet shooting, but then, of course, he is only World Champion at Skeet at present.

Congrats, to Q'land and N.S.W. on allowing their Interstate shoots to go so often and so far from the capital cities. I have always found that the farther out you go, the harder it is to win an event. If any shooter doubts this, let him start at, say, Warren, and go on through Cobar, Bourke, Cunnamulla in Q'land and on to Charleville.

It was very disappointing that Bourke and Broken Hill clashed last year. Menindee, Mildura, Broken Hill, Bourke and Cobar had to attend one or other of these two shoots.

Sincere hopes that organised Sunday shooting will be made legal,

When will referees and referee examiners cease to ask shooters to go back a yard after each shot? They must realise that shooting in Handicap events, it is a lost target if shot from any but the shooter's own handicap.

Dear Sir.

This letter is written not as a Club Secretary, but as a registered and financial shooter of the A.C.T.A., and the views expressed are my own, and if aired publicly, will not be favourably received in some quarters. However, as one who is in the Association for the sport and not business, I could not care less in that respect. as I feel sure that the majority of

the shooters agree, in part if not in full, with what I am writing.

Rule No. 87 reads as follows, "All shooters must be registered with the A.C.T.A. before taking part in competition. Unregistered shooters are not permitted to compete at any time. Registered shooters who shoot at an unregistered or unaffiliated club render themselves liable to disqualification."

At the present time many registered shooters are taking part in Picnie Shoots, Charity Shoots and Unregistered Shoots. And I dare say that in the past nearly everyone has taken part in a shoot of this nature.

These shoots have been more or less accepted, or a blind eye has been turned in their direction, as some charity or other has been benefiting and most shooters have attended to help the charity and also to bust a few clays. The trophies at these shoots have nearly always been of money value.

However, today these Picnic Shoots are becoming popular and very numerous, also the trophy value in some instances are as much as £50 and higher, and shooters attend with thought in mind that "if I win, I can't be handicapped by the Association, as it's a Picnic Shoot and no report is sent in, as it's not registered, etc., etc."

The nominations at these shoots are in most instances cheaper than Club Shoots, as there is no overhead and the organisers are happy.

One amusing aspect of these shoots is that the registered shooter still shoots off his Association handican and, in a large number of cases, competes against non-registered shooters who shoot off any handicap he wishes and is usually a "ring-in", anyway.

From heresay, the reason some of the shooters supporting these shoots is said to be "the Association handicapping is too severe on front markers, or I got a yard for such and such, but the other bloke did the same at somewhere else and didn't get a yard." These grievances may be real or imagined, and I am not prepared to vote either way.

However, to try and overcome some of these handicap problems that do arise when, either through late re-

Sec., Box 234, Townsville. ports or handicaps not appearing in the "News" till a fair while after the shooter has earnt a yard or two, whatever the case may be, would it be possible to place the onus on the shooter? By this I mean that it be obligatory for a shooter who wins or receives a cut or trophy value which earns him a yard to come back that yard before he can nominate in the next event.

At the present time some shooters do this sportingly and voluntarily, but unhappily these are far too few. The general interpretation by a large number of shooters is that, "until they get their handicap card back, or until the new handicap appears in the 'News', I stay on my old handicap, or that piece about management or handicapper have the right to re-handicap any obviously underhandicapped shooter, does not apply to me."

I know that these problems have been aired before and no doubt will be argued over again in time to come. We are a nation or sportsmen, and proud of it no doubt, but when it comes to winning, which we all like to do, it appears that some of us are reluctant to accept the penalty imposed, which after all is imposed to keep the game fair and give the other bloke an equal chance of winning.

Sir, I trust that by this you have not been confused to what I have been trying to get across, and to sum up and put in a nut shell what I wish to express is this: by paying registration I feel that we are entitled to protection from these unregistered shoots that are being conducted, and that the A.C.T.A. should let it be known in strong and no uncertain

terms that the Association will not tolerate and will take whatever action is necessary to enforce Rule 87. And I suggest that the Executive Committee gives thought to placing the obligation on the shooter as regards accepting the necessary penalty before nominating in any other events. I do feel that this would lead to better sport and would leave no doubt in anyone's mind as to when the new handicap should take effect.

At the annual meeting 1962, shooters will be asked to agree to an increased registration fee. Shooters are entitled to know what is to be done with the increased revenue.

# Shotgun Oddities

By RICHARD ARNOLD

("Shooting Times" Eng.)

Inevitably, the firearms historian must come across examples of the gunsmith's or gun inventor's labours. which are very unorthodox. Several specimens may be described as the products of "cranks", others show the germ of an idea which, unworkable at the time, yet may none the less form the basis of a practical arm at a later age.

Now and again, however, one encounters or hears of firearms which have been, apparently, put into production, yet have failed for some reason or other to make the proper impression on the sportsman.

During my researches into the history of repeating shotguns I came across many sound designs which, with a little streamlining, would be workable today. But I also encountered two or three others which, seemingly practical, none the less were failures. For the benefit of some sportsman, not necessarily a collector, into whose possession an unorthodox looking repeating shotgun may fall, I append the following notes to assist in identification.

#### Push and Pull

Colt's repeating, revolving chambered, shotgun is a familiar sight to collectors, as also the early 1887 model Winchester under-lever actions. The model 1892 Winchester, however, was rather unique. The model was operated through pushing the barrel and magazine forward and then pulling it back. The model was not successful, however, and fell into disfavour very quickly. A fair number of models are in collections.

About the same period the Burgess Gun Company of Buffalo, New York, U.S.A., experimented with a repeating shotgun. They finally produced a manually operated repeater in which the pistol grip and trigger assembly was pulled backwards by the sportsman, and then pushed forward. Production on the model started in 1893 and only continued

R. JORGENSON, Secretary. Box 15, Portarlington. for two years. The same firm did produce at a later period a semiautomatic repeating shotgun.

Today there is on the market the remarkable Cosmi, which looks like the conventional single-barrelled shotgun, but which is none the less a repeating arm which carries the magazine in the butt stock, whilst the weapon is loaded by a conventional top-lever breaking system. But there had been early attempts to build a repeating shotgun, at the end of the last century, which contrived to look like the conventional doublebarrelled arm.

#### A Rare Repeater

Such an attempt was that model known as the "Ostrander". To all intents and purposes it was a doublebarrelled arm, yet it was capable of firing four successive shots. The magazine consisted of two com-partments immediately beneath the breech, and the cartridges were loaded into each compartment by means of loading gates on both sides of the weapon. After the first two shots had been fired, the replacement or magazine cartridges were raised by elevators and fed into the breech. The gun was equipped with conventional hammerless action, but a third trigger operated the repeater mechanism. The shooter was aware when the magazine cartridges were in the breech because a couple of rods, attached to the loading elevators, stood out above the rear of the action face, about one inch high.

The Ostrander is, however, an extremely rare arm and it is unlikely that many were made, consequently anyone in possession of one is holding a fairly valuable specimen, provided it is in good condition.

#### Decr-hunter Influence

About six years ago a new repeating shotgun appeared on the American scene. This reverted to the old lever action and was produced by Kessler under the title of "Lever-Matic". It was claimed that the prime purpose of the design was to fill a need for deer hunters who, for decades accustomed to rifles using the lever action, would be able to shoot with the Kessler without having to re-learn any technique. For some

reason or other, however, the Kessler does not seem to have "caught on", and does not appear to be in production. It was rather unique because, in addition to the usual safeties, the manufacturers incorporated a gas-escape port to cope with any defective cartridge.

But, in spite of all the different forms of repeating shotgun which I have come across, the strangest oddity I have encountered is a singleloader, and a muzzle-loader at that! In Messrs. Stephen Grant and Joseph Lang's collection there is an ovalbored shotgun, not to be confused with Lancaster elliptical rifling, the purpose for which has not yet been elucidated. Many theories have been put forward to account for that remarkable boring, yet try as hard as I have done, I cannot trace any clue which points to its purpose, nor, apparently, can its present owners.

Oddities are sometimes the most fascinating items in any collection.


