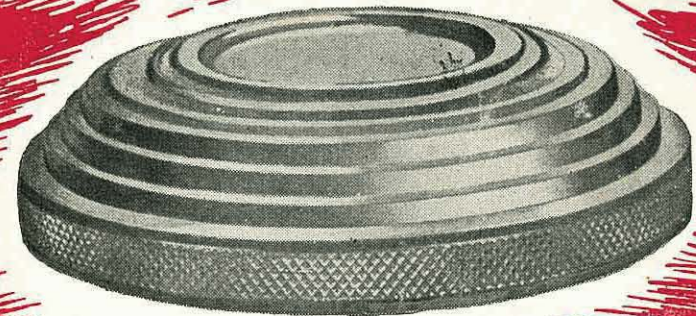

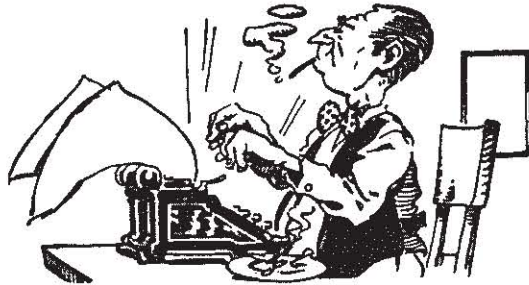

The Editor's Notebook



MEMBERSHIP OF AFFILIATED CLUBS. Every registered shooter is required to belong to an affiliated club before his registration with the A.C.T.A. can be accepted. On two occasions in recent weeks it has been discovered that shooters have registered, and in one case two shooters have been registered over a period of several years, without belonging to an affiliated club. The practice is most irregular and the A.C.T.A. cannot see its way clear to allow such a situation to continue. In future where there is any doubt, the shooter or shooters concerned will be requested to name the affiliated club to which they claim they belong. It is readily realised that some shooters may have overlooked joining a club. This factor would particularly apply in cases where a club has dropped out—some of the members of the defunct club occasionally would take part in open series without being attached to a club. Where this situation applies, shooters are requested to ensure that their registration is in order from the start by becoming a member of an affiliated unit of the A.C.T.A.

NEW SKEET RULES. The sub-committee of the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee has drawn up the new Rules which will be applicable to Skeet Shooting throughout Australia as from June 1, 1962. The Rules are substantially the same, fundamentally, as has been in operation in recent years. However, an important innovation is the establishment of

the No. 8 Shooting Station. The new Skeet Rules, which are printed in this issue, are accompanied by a line drawing of a Skeet Field Lay-out. The Skeet Rules will later be produced in Brochure form and will be available to clubs and registered shooters at a nominal fee. Meanwhile clubs shooting skeet open championships—that is, Commonwealth, State and District—are notified that, until further notice and the Executive Committee has again discussed the subject, will be shot at one round of 25 targets; nomination for each championship has been provisionally fixed at 30/-. (As from June 1, 1962.)

REGISTRATION CARDS. A club secretary recently wrote the Association asking, "Do I have to collect handicap cards and send them in for alteration?" This is an important point in the A.C.T.A. handicapping system. When a shooter is handicapped, either forward or back, his card should be immediately submitted to the Association office for amendment, and signature by the appropriate official. Whether the cards are handed in to the secretary of the club concerned or whether same are posted direct, is of no material difference, so long as the card is promptly forwarded to the Association for adjustment.

IMMEDIATE HANDICAPPING. A query reaching the Association recently asked whether a shooter,

whose handicap was 16 yards, on winning an open 18 yards championship should remain on 16 yards for the following events on the programme or wait until his name appears in "News" or his card is returned amended by the Association. The official Handicapping Formula is quite clear on the point. The Formula reads, "Club managements have the right to re-handicap any obviously under-handicapped shooter immediately, providing the Association is notified within two days and the reason given on a Handicap Return form." The Formula instructs that "A shooter winning a Championship from a mark behind his Association Handicap automatically moves back to the mark from which the Championship was won." In the case sighted in this query the correct direction would be for the shooter who won a championship off 18 yards, when his regular handicap was 16 yards, should immediately move back to 18 yards.

Another query on much the same lines is also recently to hand. The query reads, "If a shooter nominates for an event, states that his yardage is 18 yards, but if the secretary of the club knows that he has recently won trophy value of £100, but no backward movement has been observed in 'News' or his Handicap Card has not been amended, can the secretary request the shooter to shoot off 20 yards—also in the event of a shooter winning an event with trophy value of £100, is the secretary of the club in order requesting the shooter to come back two yards." From the information supplied, it would appear that the secretary of the club mentioned would be acting correctly in both instances by requesting backward movement. In fact, if all club officials acted in this way, there would be little complaint at "so and so not being handicapped". The Association has, very largely, to rely on the fullest co-operation from club secretaries/handicappers. It should always be borne in mind that fairness to all shooters is of paramount importance. If a shooter is missed in the handicapping or the shooter's club has failed to notify the Association of an important win, and this fact is known to any other secretary, then the shooter should

be handicapped immediately and the Association similarly informed.

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES SHOOT-OFF. There appears to be a certain amount of doubt in the minds of some club officials regarding the method of conducting a shoot-off under the present Deauville Doubles system of shooting. Rule 96 clearly states that "Tie shoots shall be conducted from tracks 2 and 4, one team at a time." It is hoped this intimation clears up doubtful points. It has been noticed that a few clubs have been shooting these tie shoots incorrectly.

SHOOTING ON CORRECT HAN-DICAP. Complaints have been reaching the Association of late that shooters, after winning or sharing in events where handicap penalty comes into force, have not moved to their new marks, nor have some club officials bothered to ensure that the shooters concerned have moved to the new mark. It is pointed out that the Handicapping Formula has been published and is now well known to practically every shooter who competes over the traps. If a shooter gains success where handicapping penalty is involved he should move to the new mark without question, not wait until the information is published in "News"—which in some cases could be as long as six weeks afterwards. All should be mindful of the fact that other shooters are entitled to protection from an under-handicapped competitor. The question of notification of amended handicap to shooters whose handicap has been adjusted is one that the Executive Committee will discuss in the near future.

NIGHT LIGHTING PLANS. Again, through the courtesy of Executive Committee member, Mr. D. B. Mott, the A.C.T.A. is pleased to announce that an additional supply of plan drawings for night lighting set-up are again available for clubs interested. These plans, in blueprint form, are drawn carefully to scale and are quite easy for the every-day shooter to follow. Copies are available through the A.C.T.A. office, at 21/- per set.

Official Skeet Shooting Rules and Regulations

SECTION I FIELD LAYOUT—TARGETS

1. A Skeet field shall consist of eight shooting stations arranged on a segment of a circle of twenty-one (21) yards radius, with a base chord (exactly one hundred twenty (120) feet, nine (9) inches long), drawn six (6) yards from the centre of the circle. The centre of the circle is known as the target-crossing point and is marked by a stake.

Station 1 is located at the left end of the base chord, and Station 7 at the right end when facing the centre while standing on the periphery of the segment. Stations 2 to 6, inclusive, are located on the periphery at points equidistant from each other (the exact distance between Stations 1 and 2, 2 and 3, etc., is twenty-six (26) feet, eight and three-eighths (8 $\frac{3}{8}$) inches. Station 8 is located at the centre of the base chord.

Shooting Stations 1 to 7, inclusive, are a square area, 3 feet on a side, with two sides parallel to a radius of the circle drawn through the station marker. Shooting Station 8 is a rectangular area 3 feet wide by 6 feet long, with the long sides parallel to the base chord. The location of each shooting station shall be accurately designated by a suitable marker, not easily removable, not more than 30 inches high and so constructed as not to interfere with the free swing of a shooter standing on the shooting station. The marker for Shooting Stations 1 to 7, inclusive, is on the centre of the side nearest the target crossing point. The marker for Shooting Station 8 is on the centre point of the base chord.

A shield should be installed at the target opening of each traphouse so that the trap operator is not visible to the shooter when he is firing at Station 8. This precaution is desirable as a safety factor for the pro-

tection of the trap boy from possible injury from direct or ricocheting shot.

As a safety precaution there should be a barrier (wire or rope) located 7 to 10 yards behind the shooting stations 1 to 7, and roughly following the course of the semi-circle on which these stations are located. No spectators should be allowed within this barrier and the referee should be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

One target should emerge from a traphouse (called High House) at a point three (3) feet beyond Station Marker 1 (measured along the base chord extended), and ten (10) feet above the ground level. The other should emerge from a traphouse (called Low House) at a point three (3) feet beyond the Station Marker 7 (measured along the base chord extended), and two and one-half (2 $\frac{1}{2}$) feet from the base chord extended (measured on side of target-crossing point), and three and one-half (3 $\frac{1}{2}$) feet above the ground.

Suitable markers shall be placed at points forty-four (44) yards and fifty-five (55) yards from both the High House and the Low House, to indicate the shooting boundary limit (44 yards). These distances shall be measured along a line and the flight of a regular target (55 yards) from the opening (where target emerges) in traphouse through the target-crossing point.

SECTION II SHOOTING PROCEDURE

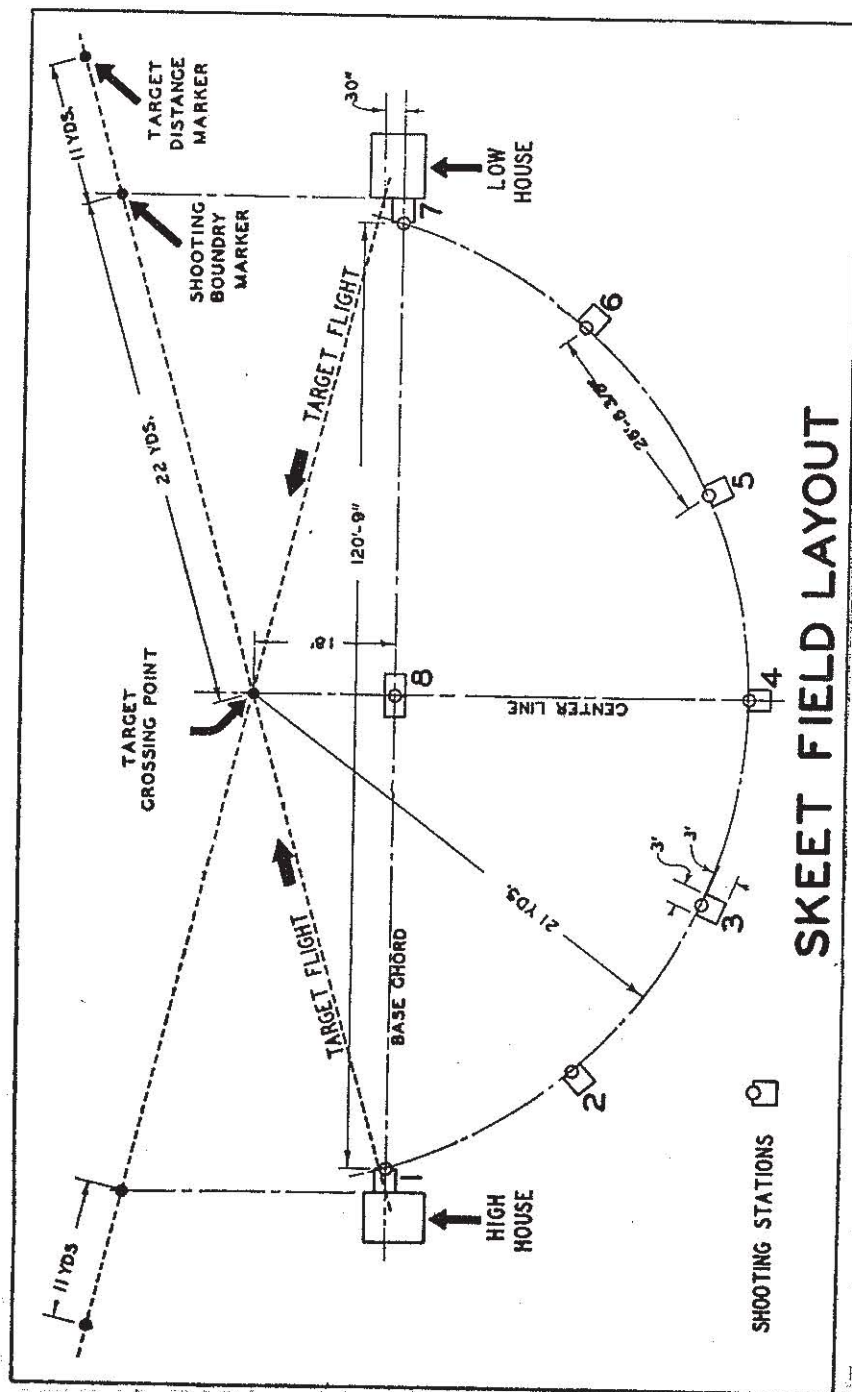
1. Definition of Terms.

A. Shooting Position.

Standing with both feet entirely within the boundary of the shooting station.

B. Gun Position.

Any position which is comfortable or satisfactory to the shooter and is consistent with safety.

C. No Bird.

Any target thrown for which no score is recorded, or failure of a target to be thrown within the prescribed time limit of one second. This permits the throwing of "instant" targets, but gives a short time period in order to prevent a contestant from refusing a target which does not appear immediately after his call. If a shooter fires upon a target which appears after one second has elapsed between his call and the emergence of the target, and also before the referee calls, "No bird," the result of his shot shall be scored. If he withholds his shot after such an alleged "slow pull," the referee may declare the target, "No bird," provided he, in his sole judgment, decides that the delay exceeded the one second time allowance. The pull is not required to be "instantaneous."

D. Interference.

Any circumstance beyond the shooter's control which unduly affects his opportunity to break any particular target. The appearance of a target, or a piece of a target, from an adjoining field shall not be ruled as interference, unless such target, or piece of target, strikes or threatens to strike, the shooter or his gun, and provided that such interference occurs after the shooter has called for his target and before he fires upon it.

E. Regular Target.

A regular target is one that appears after the shooter's call and within a period not to exceed one (1) second, and which passes within three (3) feet, horizontally or vertically, of a point fifteen (15) feet above the target-crossing point. This target, in still air, must carry to a distance equivalent, on level ground, to fifty-five (55) yards from the traphouse, but under no conditions exceed sixty-five (65) yards.

F. Irregular Target.

(1) An unbroken target that has not conformed to the definition of a regular target.

(2) Two targets thrown simultaneously in singles.

(3) Target thrown broken. Under no circumstances shall the result of firing upon a broken target be scored.

G. Regular Double.

A regular target thrown from each traphouse simultaneously.

H. Irregular Double.

Either or both targets of a double thrown as irregular targets. Only one target is thrown.

I. Proof Double.

A repeat of a double.

J. Shooting Bounds.

For Stations 1 to 7, inclusive, an area forty-four (44) yards in front of the traphouse from which the target is thrown. For Station 8, the distance from the traphouse to a point directly over a line with Stations 4, 8, and the target-crossing point.

K. Balk.

Failure to shoot at a regular target or double.

L. Malfunction of Gun.

Failure of gun to operate or function through no fault of the shooter.

A gun doubling shall be considered a malfunction for the second shot.

The "fan-firing" of the second shell in doubles, caused by a shooter holding back the trigger after the firing of the first shot, shall be considered as the fault of the shooter and is not an allowable malfunction.

M. Defective Ammunition.

Failure of ammunition to fire or function due to structural deficiency.

N. Dead Target.

A target from which a visible piece is broken as a result of having been fired upon and seen by the referee.

O. Lost Target.

A target from which no visible piece is broken as a result of having been fired upon.

P. Doubles, First and Second Shot.

The first shot shall be the first shot fired. The second shot shall be the second shot fired.

Q. Optional Shot.

The shot fired after the first twenty-four targets have been scored dead in any one round.

2. General.

A normal skeet squad is composed of five shooters. The squad shall start shooting singles at Station 1 in the order in which the names appear on the score sheet, and shall proceed through the singles at stations as numbered, shooting the high-house target first and the low-house target second. Each shooter shall shoot at both targets before leaving the shooting station, except at Station 8, where each shooter shall shoot at a target from high traphouse before any member of the squad shoots at a target from low traphouse.

Doubles shall be fired upon at Stations 1, 2, 6, and 7 in that order, shooting the first shot at the target emerging from the nearest traphouse and the second shot at the target from the farthest traphouse. However, the shooter shall have the option of reversing the order of the first and second shot, in which case the referee must be notified before shooting. If a double is not completed before any reason beyond the control of the shooter, another double shall be fired upon, and is known as a proof double; except, however, if a shooter fires upon the first target of a regular double and fails to fire upon the second target because of the fault of the shooter, the result of the firing upon the first target shall be scored and the second target shall be scored "lost."

A round of Skeet for one person consists of twenty-five (25) shots, the object being to score the greatest number of dead targets. Twenty-four shots are fired as stated above. The first shot scored lost in any round shall be repeated immediately and the result scored as the twenty-fifth shot. Should the first shot lost occur in a double, the lost target shall be repeated as a single with the result of this shot scored as the twenty-fifth shot. If the first shot scored "lost" should be the first target of an irregular double, then a proof regular double shall first be fired upon to determine the result of the second shot, and then the first target scored "lost" shall be repeated as a single and scored as the twenty-fifth shot.

Should the first twenty-four targets of a round be scored "dead," the shooter shall have the choice ("optional") of trap and station for this twenty-fifth shot.

In the interest of conserving time, the shoot management may elect to have shooters fire upon their doubles at Station 1 immediately following the shooting of singles at that post and follow the same procedure at Stations 2, 6 and 7. When this policy is adopted, shooters who have not missed a target after having fired upon doubles at Station 7 shall then take their optional shots at that station (7). The squad will finish out the round by shooting singles in the usual manner at Station 8. Taking the "optional" shot by all "straight" shooters while they are at Station 7 is intended to prevent confusion and cross traffic that would result in taking the twenty-fifth shot after finishing at Station 8. Clubs adopting this speed-up policy, in the interests of uniformity, require all squads to follow the same procedure.

At the beginning of each round, when the squad is assembled at Station 1, the squad shall be entitled to observe one (1) regular target from each traphouse and shall have the option of observing one regular target after each irregular target, except where said irregular target was fired upon.

No member of a squad shall advance to the shooting station until it is his turn to shoot, and until the previous shooter has left the shooting station. No shooter shall order any target or shoot at any target except when it is his turn. The penalty for shooting out of turn without permission of the referee shall be to score all targets so fired upon as "lost."

No member of a squad, having shot from one station, shall proceed toward the next station in such a way as to interfere with another shooter. The penalty for wilful interference in this manner shall be disqualification from the event.

No shooter shall unduly delay a squad without good and sufficient reason in the judgment of the referee in charge of his squad. A shooter who persists in deliberately causing inexcusable delays after receiving a

first warning from the referee shall be subject to disqualification from the event.

Broken Gun. When a gun breaks in such a manner so as to render it unusable, the shooter has the option of using another gun if such gun can be secured without delay, or dropping out of the squad until the gun is repaired and finishing the event at a later time when a vacancy occurs or after all other contestants have finished the event. Nothing shall prohibit the shooter from missing one round because of a broken gun, having the gun repaired and then rejoining the squad for all later rounds that the squad have not started. In that case the shooter will finish any or all rounds, starting with the shot where the breakdown occurred, that were not shot because of a broken gun, on the proper fields and in the first vacancy that may occur, or after the event has been finished by all other contestants.

Shooting Up. Where a shooter has entered but does not show up to start an event with his squad, he will not be permitted to shoot up after the first man in the squad has fired the first shot at Station 2. He may join the squad for all later rounds, but the round missed because of lateness must be shot on the proper field in the first vacancy, or after all other contestants have finished.

3. Scoring.

A. The score in any one round shall be the total number of "dead" targets.

B. Targets declared "no bird" shall not be scored.

C. One "lost" target shall be scored on:

(1) A balk or failure of gun to fire due to fault of shooter. Should this include both targets of a regular double, it shall be scored as first target lost, and a proof double shall be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

If a balk should occur, or his gun fail to fire because of the shooter's fault, when a proof double is thrown and the result of the first shot has already been scored, the second target shall be scored as "lost."

(2) Each excessive malfunction or malfunctions of the gun.

(3) Doubles fired upon in inverse order without notifying referee of intention.

(4) Target broken after it is outside the shooting bounds.

(5) Each target fired at when shooter fires out of turn without permission of referee.

(6) Each target fired upon and allegedly missed because the shooter's gun had a bent barrel, or a bent compensator, or any other bent tube or accessory.

D. No claim of irregularity shall be allowed, either on singles or doubles, where the target or targets were actually fired upon and the alleged irregularity consists of deviation from the prescribed line of flight, or because of an alleged "quick pull" or "slow pull," unless the referee has distinctly called "no bird" prior to the firing of the shot in the event of the "quick pull," or prior to the emergence of the target from the trap house in the event of a "slow pull." Otherwise, if the shooter fires, the result shall be scored.

4. Repeat of Target for Malfunction of Gun or Defective Ammunition.

Only two malfunctions of any one gun in the same round shall be allowable. The third and all subsequent malfunctions of the same gun shall be excessive. Provided, however, that when more than one person is using the same gun in the same round, this rule shall apply to each of said persons separately.

A shot shall be repeated for each instance of defective ammunition. If a shell having once misfired is used again, and fails to fire, the result shall be considered a fault on the part of the shooter and scored "lost."

5. Double or Proof Double.

A. (1) If the first target of a double is thrown irregular as to deviation from the prescribed line of flight and is NOT shot at, a proof double shall determine the score for both shots, whether the second target is fired upon or not. The referee shall be the sole judge of irregularity.

(2) If the first target emerges broken, the double shall, in all cases, be declared "no bird" and a proof double shall be thrown

to determine the result of both shots.

(3) If the shooter fires at the irregular target described in (1) above, then the result shall be scored for the first shot and the following rules pertaining to the second shot shall apply:

B. In shooting doubles, if the shooter is deprived of a normal second shot because (1) the second target is thrown broken, or (2) the second target is thrown irregular as to deviation from the prescribed line of flight and is not shot at, or (3) the second target is not thrown at all, or (4) the second target is not thrown simultaneously, the result of the first shot shall be scored, and the second target only shall be declared "no bird" and a proof double shall be fired to determine the result of the second shot. If the shooter fires at the irregular target described in (2) above the result shall be scored.

C. If a double is thrown but the targets collide, before the result of the first bird is determined, it shall be declared "no bird," and the result of a proof double shall determine the score of both shots.

D. If a double be thrown but the shooter is deprived of a normal second shot for any of the following reasons, the result of the first shot shall be scored, and the second target only shall be declared "no bird," and a proof double shall be fired to determine the result of the second shot only.

(1) Both targets are broken with the first shot.

(2) The wrong target is broken with first shot. (For proof double ruling, see par. F. below.)

(3) The first shot is lost and a collision occurs before the result of the second shot is determined.

(4) The second target collides with fragments of the first target, properly broken, before the result of the second target is determined.

(5) The result of the first shot is determined, and interference occurs before the second shot is fired.

(6) An allowable malfunction occurs on the second shot. If such malfunction is excessive, not allowable, the second target shall be scored "lost."

E. If a double is thrown and an allowable malfunction occurs on the first shot, it shall be declared "no bird," and the result of a proof double shall determine the score of both shots. If such malfunction is excessive, not allowable, the proof double shall be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

F. There shall be no penalty for withholding the first shot when either target of a double is irregular. A proof double shall determine the score of both shots thereafter.

G. In shooting a proof double after the first target (of a double) is "lost," if the shooter fires at, or breaks the wrong target first, said proof double shall be declared "no bird"; but, if this same procedure is repeated at the same station by the same shooter, it shall be scored as both targets "lost." If, in such a proof double and the first target (of a double) is "dead," the shooter fires at, or breaks, the wrong target first, said proof double shall also be declared "no bird"; but if this same procedure is repeated at the same station by the same shooter, it shall be scored as first target "dead," and second target "lost."

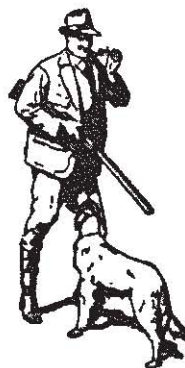

"Tips and Tails"



An American report published in the "Shooting Times" of England outlines some interesting statistics on the score of frontier shootings in U.S.A. between 1870 and 1890. The figures as published rather discount the might of the television "marshal" who seldom seems to miss when flashed on the T.V. screen. Among the comments listed

and the interesting facts mentioned are that in the worst years of frontier troubles no records were kept of shootings, and in later years the marshals got paid for gaolings—piece work—rather than for shootings, so they were more likely to bang some character over the head than to ventilate him. It is reported that for cowboys it was a lot smarter to tangle with another drunken cowboy, who probably never had the money to shoot his revolver more than now and again at a rattler or coyote, rather than with the town marshal who usually was a real professional. 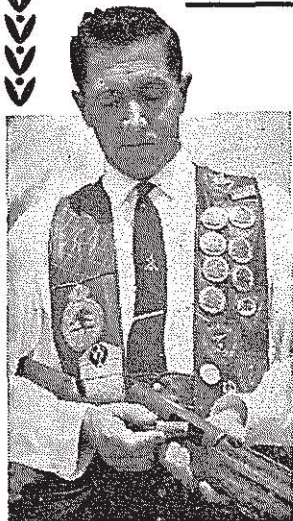

Many do not realise the unnatural hazards which many birds have now to contend with. One of the most hazardous of all are the over-head wires everywhere throughout the country. Many night-flying birds suffer from injuries received by contacting these wires, and many, in fact, are killed through rushing head-long into the wires. Another serious hazard, a development of recent years, is that faced by sea birds, and this is the floating oil discharged by ships. It is not unusual for oiling to bring about a lingering death for any bird. In endeavouring to preen oil from the feathers, the birds swallow a certain quantity, and that, coupled with inability to feed normally, soon brings about their finish. A disaster in this regard is reported from the Swedish area, where some 1,500 long-tailed duck had to be shot because they were badly oiled. This particular species of duck has declined in numbers in recent years and the shooting of the additional 1,500 has been described as a very great loss indeed.

A. W. Dyer has taken over the secretarial duties of the Bairnsdale Club in the Victorian Eastern Gippsland region. He succeeds C. H. Heath, who has been Secretary for a number of years. Dyer's address is 122 Francis Street, Bairnsdale, V.

Most Accurate .222

A gun designed for accuracy and handling qualities which is an interesting break-away from traditional long, thin barrels—that's the Gevarm .222.

(Test Report by C. Shadbolt)

There is nothing new about the .222 Remington cartridge. Indeed, Winchester must be the only arms company in the world which has failed to put out a rifle to handle this spectacularly successful Remington development.

Latest rifle chambered for this cartridge is the Gevarm .222 Bolt action magazine rifle, which in styling is as interesting as the cartridge for which it is chambered.

In appearance, the Gevarm .222 is short and stubby, with what appears to be an over-long fore-end and it represents a break-away from the concept of long, thin barrels and racy stock lines. It has placed the emphasis on shooting and handling qualities.

Although the barrel is 22.5 inches long, it appears to be shorter because it is still 0.7 inches at the muzzle and thus it is reasonably heavy.

There is no question that a short, heavy barrel tends to retain its zero better than a long, light one.

On this Gevarm we find no rear sight at all. Provision is made for mounting a 'scope or aperture sight on the dove-tail, and when this is done, any possible objection to the relatively short barrel is overcome. The manufacturers have taken the view—and in my opinion, rightly—that the .222 is not a cartridge that will be used on dangerous game, but will be used with a full appreciation of its accuracy. This can only be realised from the use of the aperture or 'scope sight.

The accuracy of the model I shot was first class, and to date is the most accurate commercial rifle of this calibre I have tested. And that covers a lot of territory. Should it be desired to use this rifle against pigs, then the fitting of a telescope of four power with a big exit pupil would be the first answer, or, alter-

natively, a good aperture sight with a disc of 0.08 inch or preferably up to 0.1 inch would serve well.

Personally, I think it is high time manufacturers gave up the fitting of the crude open back sight, and left it to the shooter to pick his own, reducing the price accordingly.

Another item that has received loving care is the trigger, which can be set down to a fine, crisp job by the use of two screws positioned in holes at the back of the receiver and hidden under the bolt when it is open.

The bolt is long and unusually thick and massive, with twin locking lugs at the bolt handle.

The receiver housing is 1.3 inches in diameter and 6.5 inches in length. This makes operation of the bolt a much smoother operation than in those rifles using a shorter receiver than with a scaled-down Mauser-type bolt.

There need be no difficulty over mounts, as there is a solid well-made Hillver mount out for this rifle. But I feel that under the shock of continual recoil that the 'scope may slide forward along the dove-tail unless the owner gets a file and haggles the dove-tail at the point where the mount fits on to it to give the 'scope mount something, as the metal in the receiver is plenty hard.

This rifle should be well suited to 'scopes with a limited amount of lateral movement, as the dove-tail is cut very true and needs only the slightest amount of lateral movement in the 'scope to come to the true centre.

To sum up: This is a most accurate piece, with woodwork designed to give the shooter the best accuracy.

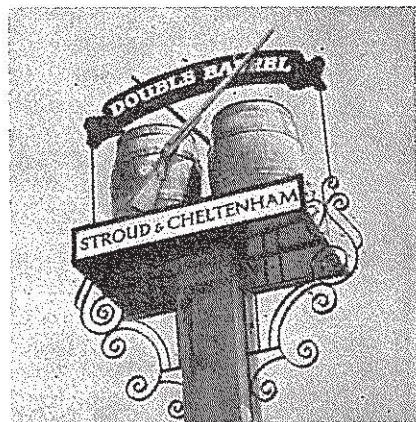

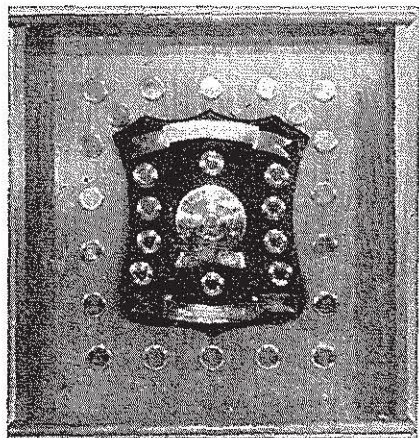

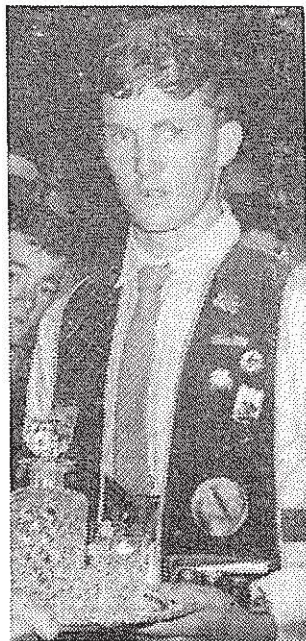
