



The Editor's Notebook



GENERAL MEETINGS OF A.C.T.A. As some appear to be unfamiliar with Article 43 of the A.C.T.A. Memorandum and Articles of Association, particularly as applicable to Notices of Motion, it has been decided to republish Article 43 (d). Article 43 (d), therefore, reads (referring to pro-cedure at Annual Meetings), "Con-sidering recommendations by the Executive Committee in respect of any other business affecting the Association or any member thereof or affecting any club of which a Delegate is a member of the Association or in anywise relating to Clay Target Trap Shooting of which notice shall have been given to the Secretary for consideration of the Executive Committee on or before the 30th September in year preceding the Annual General Meeting."

From the aforementioned Article it should be understood that a Notice of Motion of any description is required to be submitted to the Secretary A.C.T.A. on or before the 30th September in each year (previously it was December 31st). All Notices of Motion must now first be reviewed by the Executive Committee before same can be listed for discussion at an Annual Meeting.

Clubs and member delegates interested are reminded to keep this important point in mind. A Notice of Motion lodged with the Secretary after September 30th cannot, in future, be accepted.

FRONT-MARKER AWARDS. Over a period of years it has been noticed that many clubs do not give sufficient thought to the awarding of frontmarker trophies. As a point of interest it is mentioned in the "A.C.T.A. Conditions of Championships" that only three trophies are required to be given, first, second and third. There is no mention of front-marker awards in championships. However, many clubs do allow for the inclusion of front-marker prizes in championships, and this action is commendable. But, when giving these awards, it should be remembered that the award is intended to encourage the front-marker to compete in championships (and other big events also) instead of looking on at the middle and back-markers crashing their targets. The whole point of this paragraph is, therefore, to draw attention to the allocation of front-marker awards in the most satisfactory manner. The principal cause for disappointment is the question of the 12/16 yarder award. Many clubs simply put on a 12/16 yard trophy and consider they are achieving good relations by so doing. In many cases they are. But again, if sufficient thought is given to this award, probably many clubs would alter their method of distribution. Analysis of a front-marker award means just what its title indicates, i.e. a frontmarker. Therefore, a shooter who has got back to 16 yards could, by no stretch of imagination, be described as a front-marker. Hence the awarding of a "12/16 yarder" appears a little out of perspective. It is recommended that clubs give consideration to including (if necessary) two forward-marker awards, one for 12/14 yarders, who are the real front-markers, and one for the medium-markers, i.e. the 15/16 yarders. Clubs undertaking this procedure would find a happier response to their endeavours. Many shooters on 15/16 yards are bordering on being top-notch class shots, and a 12/14 yarder is just not in the same category.

AUSTRALIAN TEAM'S GREAT SCORE. It is indeed pleasing to be able to record the great score registered by the all-Australian Team in the 1962 International series - the Australian section of which was shot at Bankstown, N.S.W., on Tuesday, March 13th, 1962. The team, which this year was selected over three events, instead of the customary single match of previous years, undoubtedly was a good one, well blended with age and youth. The Australian Team recorded the splendid total of 8764 points out of a possible 9000 points, which means that the team of thirty Australians only dropped 236 points in 9000! Another very interesting feature of the score is the fact that only 37 targets were dropped or lost in 3,000 - another notable achievement. The score must surely be one of the best, if not the actual best. ever recorded by an Australian Team. No fewer than nine members of the team grassed the full complement of 100 targets straight, eleven shot 99/100, six shot 98/100 and the lowest target total of any member of the Australian Team was a really good score of 96/100. Congratulations are extended to the Australian Team on a very fine effort. It will certainly take a good score to beat the Australian combination.

THE GRAND AUSTRALIAN HANDICAP. Much comment has been raised since the holding of the A.C.T.A. National Championships and International shoot at Bankstown, N.S.W., as to the reason why so many who attended the shoot failed to take part in the Grand Australian

Handicap. It was noticed that many shooters, particularly back-markers, whilst in attendance during the shooting of the Grand Australian Handicap, did not put in an entry. It can hardly be used against the event that the entrance fee was excessive for the reward offered in the prize list. It has been suggested that the event be dropped from the programme and replaced with another championship. This is a point which will be discussed by the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

HANDICAP RECOMMENDATION OF NEW SHOOTERS. Many club officials when registering new shooters for the first time frequently fail to notify the A.C.T.A. as to the capability of the particular shooter in relation to his ability to handle a gun. In cases where no recommendation is received from club officials concerned, the shooter is immediately placed on 16 yards in accordance with the Rules governing such a situation. On occasions this leads to clubs writing in requesting immediate change of handicap, whereas if the original letter of registration contained adequate recommendation. no additional correspondence would be necessary. Clubs are particularly requested to note this situation.

SUNDAY SHOOTING IN SYD-NEY. Sunday trap shooting in the city of Sydney has at last become an established fact. The Royal Aero Club of New South Wales Gun Society, which shoots on the Bankstown Aerodrome (Commonwealth Property), announces that it officially commenced Sunday shoots over its extensive lay-out on Sunday, June 24. Regular shoots will in future be held fortnightly, and the July fixtures are set down for Sunday, July 8, and Sunday, July 22, commencing at 1.30 p.m. each day. Intending shooters are reminded that the club has arranged for lunch to be available at the Club House, so that shooting parties, if desirous, can make an all-day trip to Bankstown. Trophies for the shoots of the immediate future have been donated by Doug. Kennedy, Fred Hudson, Mick Smith, and the A.C.T.A. President.

John Tyquin. The August dates arranged are August 5 and August 19.

The development of Sunday shooting in Sydney will do much to popularise the international pastime of clay target shooting. It is of interest to note that the grounds were first used for Sunday shooting during the recent A.C.T.A. National Championships series in March, the actual date being March 11.

Other clubs in New South Wales should remember that Sunday shooting is still not legal in that State, although many clubs are permitted by their local civic authorities to conduct shoots. However, the Bankstown "break-through" establishes a precedent and all hope that the successful efforts of the Royal Aero Club in New South Wales will be followed by similar success in all States of the Commonwealth.

Telegraphic address is "Shooting — Cairo". The programmes point out that the Egyptian climate in October is considered to be one of the best of the year. Normally a blue sky, good visibility and light winds. The maximum mean temperature is about 86° F. and the minimum around 66° F. Rain is reported to be very rare. The clay pigeon section of the championship shooting series will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, October 16, 17, 18 and 19. The remainder of the time will be occupied with the rifle and pistol shooting competition. Team entries. accompanied by an entry fee of 5 U.S. dollars for each event, should be forwarded to the International Shooting Union, Webergasse 7, Wiesbaden, Germany, before August 1.



Individual entry, indicating the number (not necessarily the names) of individual competitors in each event, accompanied by 2 U.S. dollars for each competitor for each event, should be sent to the U.A.R., P.O.B. 290, Cairo, before September 1. Late entries will be accepted if the available number of targets and ranges so permit. The skeet shooting competition will be at 200 birds in series of 25. The individual clay pigeon championships will be at 200 birds in series of 25. Team Championship, 300 birds in series of 25. Copies of the programmes may be viewed at A.C.T.A. office in Melbourne by any intending competitor. The A.C.T.A. is affiliated with the International Shooting Union.

This is the delusion that causes men to say, surely from the very depths of their armchairs, that since the individual pellets from a .410 hit ensure a clean kill, whereas in the

as hard as those from a 12-bore, the former will kill game as well as the latter if only the aim be accurate enough. But the truth of the matter is that, for a given degree of choke, the small-bore throws a pattern just as extensive as that of its full-sized counterpart: it is the pattern density that is less, not the size of the circle covered. Thus, a fully-choked twelve has a total spread of about 4 ft. at 40 yards. So, roughly, has a .410; but in the one case there is a wellfilled 30-in, centre, making it fairly certain that any bird within it would be struck by sufficient pellets to

latter the pattern is so thin as to make the same result highly improbable, to say the least.

If, of course, in order to equalise matters, the small-bore is given more choke than its larger rival, then it does indeed throw a smaller circle. Thus, a fully choked 20, firing 2 oz. of shot, would put about the same number of pellets in the standard 30-in, circle as would an improved cylinder 12 firing 116 oz. (Obviously so. since 70 per cent. of 4 equals about 50 per cent. of 1 in.) And it would certainly require to be held straighter for comparable performance, for its patterns would completely lack the very considerable fringe outside the 30-in. circle that the 12-bore patterns display. Incidentally, some of us would miss that fringe!

* *

Another persistent delusion is that the cartridge is always right. I recognise at least three kinds of bad cartridge, which I would classify thus: There is (1) the intrinsically bad cartridge, which has one or more bad or variable components, and is incapable of good or consistent results in any gun. Then there is (2) the good cartridge gone wrong, which has good - quality components, but with some incompatibility or malproportioning between them. Some apparently very superior game cartridges, which had been hand-loaded for me by a well-known maker, provided a conspicuous example. I did so badly with them that I had them independently tested. The verdict was: "ineffective for use against game".

Lastly there is (3) the wrong cartridge for the gun. This may be a perfectly honest cartridge, for example, a high-pressure, high-velocity cartridge, capable of giving good results in a tightly bored, well-choked gun. But when used in a loosely bored, cylinder gun, it may be a very bad cartridge, giving really scattered patterns, accompanied possibly by balling, and certain to cause disappointment in the field. Even with a modern gun, tightly bored and well-choked, I have seen as much as 22 per cent. difference between the average patterns thrown by a selection of well-known brands of cart-

ridges. So there can be no greater delusion in shooting than the belief that any cartridge that makes a bang and delivers a good punch to the shoulder is a good one, and suitable for the gun from which it is being fired.

The Left-Hand Gun

(By CHARLES FAIRLEY, "Shooting Times", Eng.)

A shotgun not called for as often as it might be is the left-hand opener. Left-hand models are available for the rifle shooter, with special arrangements of the ejection, but the left-handed shotgun man is obliged either to adapt himself to a right-handed gun, or have one specially built for him.

As so few are made, I can only conclude that most do, in fact, use a normal gun, having trained themselves to shoot from the right shoulder. An alternative is a single-barrel gun, with Martini action, or an auto, if one can be found that ejects to the left.

Those who insist on a double might consider the Darne sliding breech gun, which, as far as I could see when it was tested last year in Birmingham, should handle equally well left or right-handed.

I can well appreciate the difficulties of left-handed people when trying to use the right hand, for on the rare occasions when I am working on a left-hand opener I am just as much at sea. My right thumb, conditioned by many years of forcing extremely stiff levers open, can cope with most types of opening, but the left makes very heavy going of it.

The amount of extra work involved when making a left-hand gun depends largely on the type of top lever chosen. If a Greener type lever with double bites is used, a special tumbler and bolt are required, while a Greener treble bite requires a special top lever as well. In the normal way, a lug to the left of the tumbler is lifted when the lever is moved to the right; this lifts the connecting pin which in turn raises the bolt. The connecting pin is screwed into a lug on the head of the bolt, also on the left.

When a lever is made to move to the left, the lugs on tumbler and bolt have to be on the right. At a pinch a tumbler could be turned from large diameter round steel, but a special forging has to be made for the bolt.

If a cross-bait is to be fitted, the tang extension of the lever has to

be over to the right, instead of the usual left, and this again means a special forging. The tang slot in the action body is cut out by the action-filer, and in this instance it has to be to the right of the barrel extension, as the cross-bolt is thrown out on that side.

The hole in the action for the cross-bolt is sometimes drilled by the action-filer, and sometimes done in the machine shop when the action is part built. There is no actual difference in the machining of an action for a left-hand Greener — one can be taken from stock, as all changes are either to the parts fitted, or are made by the action-filer.

Guns to be fitted with left-hand Scott levers are a different proposition altogether. Here a specially machined action is required, as well as another forged bolt. With care the ordinary spindle can be brought in.

The tumbler of a Greener and the spindle of a Scott perform the same functions—as pivots for the complete assembly, and as "keys" in the bolt movements, but where the Greener tumbler is fitted into the strap of the action, and at right angles to it, the Scott spindle is fitted through the body of the action, and at a distinct angle.

It follows that as the Greener tumbler is upright in the strap, the lever can be easily made to swing left or right. But the Scott spindle, crossing the action from centre at the top to the right at the bottom, lifts the lever clear of the strap when opened to the right. If an attempt was made to open the lever of an ordinary action to the left, the lever would simply jam against the strap long before it could get clear.

The special Scott action for lefthand opening has the spindle hole drilled from centre at the top to left at the bottom, where it is keyed into the bolt, so that immediately the lever is moved to the left it clears the strap.

A lug at the end of the spindle forms the key, when it is let into a slot in the bolt. It is just possible to reverse the spindle for left-hand working, but as the slot in the bolt reinforced area, a forging is needed with the reinforcement on the other side — or one with a thick area right across the bolt. The unwanted metal can then be removed from either side.

For Greener or Scott the top lever spring has to be specially made the other way round, and fitted at the opposite side of the action.

If the Scott has a drawbolt for a third bite, this bolt is slotted through the top of the action, but well to the right instead of the left. The edge of the lever boss is taken as the outside edge of the slot, and from there the bolt is made wide enough to cover the barrel extension and be about in. into the action the other side.

Keying is done in the flange of the lever boss, but this work is done by the action-filer and entails no change in machining.

A normal top safety requires little alteration when the lever is changed over; in fact, a push rod safety, working from the bolt centre, is unchanged. Rocker safes are moved from a point well off centre, so here again positions must be reversed. Side safeties, being fitted in the wood, can be switched over without much difficulty.

Apart from a fair amount of caston to the stock, about the only other alteration needed to a left-hand gun is to the triggers. Normal ones are shaped and set to it snugly against the finger of a right-handed man, and would be altogether wrong for the left hand. A small point that makes all the difference to the shooter.




