

The Editor's Notebook



"NEWS" 15th BIRTHDAY. With the issue of the present edition of this publication, it is worthy of comment that "News" begins on its 16th Volume; in other words, the publication has enjoyed 15 years of unbroken service to the clay target shooters of the Commonwealth and overseas. Safe it is to state that "News" has found a place in the interests of all those who follow the pastime of clay target shooting. Of particular interest also is to record details of the Patrons and office-bearers of the day at that time. They were: Patrons, the late Lieut.-General Sir John Lavarack, a former Governor of Queens-land; the late Sir W. Lennon Raws, a former Chairman of I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited; the late Mr. Essington Lewis, the late Mr. Donald Mackin-tosh. Only Lieut.-General W. Bridgetosh. Only Lieut-General W. Bridge-ford and Mr. Frank Hockey remain of the Patrons of 1947. President was J. M. (Jock) Wilson, who retired some years ago. Vice-Presidents were in 1947 accepted in the A.C.T.A. (There are no Vice-Presidents today.) In 1947 they were: Messrs. G. L. Bragg, V. L. Fankhauser, J. T. Mc-Arthur, W. E. H. Rainbird, and the late G. H. Watts. Only Mr. Rainbird today remains actively engaged as a member of the Executive Committee. Honorary Vice-Presidents in 1947 were the late F. C. Abell and W. J. Hanran. The 1947 Executive Committee was: Messrs. J. O. Cox (Man-goplah, N.S.W.), J. Bryant Senr., the late J. J. Dawson (Beaumaris), Aubrey F. Johnson and T. R. Wightman. Mr. J. O. Cox was the mover of the motion at the Executive

Committee meeting which decided to institute the publication of "News". Many shooters have advised that they retain every copy issued.

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS IN 1963. For those arranging forward programmes the following information on 1963 Public Holidays should be helpful. The information which follows has been obtained through the Victorian Government Gazette Office, so same can be accepted as completely official. The days are: A.N.A. Day, Monday, January 28, 1963; Anzac Day, April 25, 1963 (Thursday); Easter Saturday, April 13, 1963; Easter Monday, April 15, 1963; Queen's Eirthday, Monday, June 10, 1963. The Victorian Labour Day holiday is Monday, March 11, 1963 (Victoria only). From the above, it will be observed that the A.C.T.A. National Championships and International series will be held from June 6 to June 11, 1963, at Southport, Qld., the headquarters of the South Coast Gun Club.

REFEREE AND SCORER. A letter reached the Association from a northern club recently wherein the writer complained that at the writer's club a referee was also scoring. The writer added that he did not appreciate how one individual could possibly give his full attention to both refereeing and scoring at the same time. The A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules state that the Referee shall "announce the result of each shot", whilst the scorer "shall keep an accurate record of each shot", the official score to "be available for inspection by the competitor". It has been noticed at many clubs — in fact, it has become almost general practice at clubs — that the referee will also act as scorer. In an emergency this procedure is probably allowable, but clubs should ensure that the referee is referee only and another official appointed to act as scorer.

1963 CHAMPIONSHIP ALLOCA-TION. The 1963 Championship Allocation, for Commonwealth, State and District Championships, as allotted by the Executive Committee at its recent Sydney meeting, appears elsewhere in this issue. The Official Allocation as printed is official notification of open championship allotment for 1963. Any unallotted title may be applied for to the Secretary A.C.T.A. during the year. Clubs and shooters are informed that no additional notification of the championship allocation for 1963 will be forwarded.

"LOST" TARGET. A southern club has written the Association as follows, "A shooter called for his bird and the gun failed to fire, although cocked. On checking the gun, it was not closed tightly on account of the rim of the cartridge being slightly over-size." The club continues and asks, "Is it negligence on the part of the shooter, or should another bird be allowed?" The club finally advised that one particular gun will not close on 50% of shells in general use, although other types of shells fit perfectly. On the facts supplied, the only decision would be "Lost Target". Rule 41 is explicit on this point. It reads, "Lost Target' shall be declared when the competitor fails to shoot because his gun was unloaded or uncocked, or because the safety was faultily adjusted or jarred back. whether from his own oversight or not, or because of any other cause chargeable to his own oversight or neglect." Obviously the shooter concerned must have been aware that the gun he was using would probably

not fire if it was only partly closed, hence it was the competitor's own neglect in using a shell which he knew would cause the gun not to close. It would appear that the gun in question is faulty and needs the attention of a gunsmith.

NOMINATIONS FOR OFFICERS IN THE ASSOCIATION. Nominations for all offices in the Association tions for all offices in the Association and membership of the Executive Committee will close on Monday, December 31, 1962, at 5 p.m., for the 1963 operating year. For general in-formation, Article 27 of the A.C.T.A. Constitution reads, "Nominations for all offices in the Association and membership of the Executive Com membership of the Executive Com-mittee must be in writing signed by the Secretary of the member Club or by the delegate member of an Unincorporated Club making the nomination, and must reach the Secretary of the Association on or before the thirty-first day of December in each year prior to the Annual General Meeting." By way of explanation, it should be understood that only the Secretary of a member club (which means an incorporated club) or the delegate member of an unincorporated club may sign the nomination. No other signatures are valid or acceptable.

Nomination forms may be obtained from the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, or from the Association office at 495 Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1, prior to closing date. It should be noted that nominations received after December 31, 1962, cannot be accepted. The Annual General Meeting and election of officers will take place at Southport, Qld., on Sunday, June 9, 1963.

AFFILIATION AND REGISTRA-TION FEES, 1963. Clubs and shooters are reminded that club affiliation fee (clubs only) of £5 and individual shooters' registration fees (30/- each) are due as from January 1. Payments may be made prior to that date. 1963 registration cards, which are now available, will be promptly issued on receipt of payment. All fees should be paid by January 31, in accordance with regulations. Early payment greatly assists the Association staff.

ADVERTISING. Advertisers are notified that there will be no publication of this journal for the month of January, in accordance with usual

practice, due to printer's vacation period. Therefore, those wishing to include advertising matter for events taking place during January are recommended to include same in the December issue, copy for which closes on November 1, although late copy (advertising only) will be accepted up to November 4 for the December issue only.

Gun Gossip

By GOUGH THOMAS ("Shooting Times", Eng.)

It may surprise many readers to learn that the practice of loading cartridges with a charge of steel balls — that is, common ball bearings — is by no means unknown.

The motive is not far to seek. A few cartridges with large shot are required, say, for deer. Such cartridges are not always available locally, nor is large shot. But steel balls are: the local garage or agricultural engineer has plenty. And so some misguided improviser removes the charge of small shot from a few ordinary cartridges and substitutes steel balls. If he fires such a cartridge without injury to himself, he is lucky. He would need to be luckier still to fire it without injury to his gun.

An actual case has just come to my notice. The gun involved was a single-barrelled one, and was so badly damaged that it was submitted for a Proof House report, from which I quote these extracts:

"The damage now found is the deep scoring of the bore from the base of the chamber right through to the muzzle, as if some many-sided tool had been forced through the barrel.

"There is a ring bulge at 12½ inches from the breech face, and pimple bulges on top and beneath the barrel at about this point. From this point, there is less severe scoring of the barrel until the object . . . reached the choke. From this point to the muzzle, the scoring is again more severe.

"I have . . . no hesitation in suggesting that it is caused by the firing of very hard pellets, such as steel

ball bearings in lieu of lead shot. Steel ball bearings being relatively incompressible tend to jam . . . and in being forced through the bore, retain that pattern and leave this tell-tale evidence.

"The practice (is) . . . murderous to the gun and somewhat more than dangerous to the user."

From this report we can trace the sequence of events from the moment of firing. At the first impact of the explosion, the steel balls arranged themselves into a rigid and practically incompressible assembly, which the gas pressure was sufficient to force into the barrel, scoring, in the process, the grooves referred to in the Proof House report. By the time the shot had travelled about 12 inches, the gas pressure would have fallen to less than a third of its original value, and was becoming incapable of driving the charge any further. Besides, there was probably a slight constriction of about twothousandths of an inch over this part of the bore. The shot charge, therefore, momentarily jammed or checked, whereupon the onrushing gases instantly piled up a wave pressure behind it, dealing it a hammer blow and breaking up the jam, and causing the pimple bulges in the progress. The force of this blow from the elastic hammer-head of high-velocity gas was also transmitted to the walls of the barrel, which yielded to it, thus causing the ring bulge.

From this point onwards, the broken-up jam of pellets travelled more easily until they reached the choke, in which they jammed again, causing the final indentations observed. By this time their velocity was evidently sufficient to carry them out of the muzzle without appreciable check — otherwise there would have been another pressure wave and another ring bulge, or possibly a burst.

The lessons of this case are (1) that the barrel was irretrievably ruined by the firing of a single cartridge of steel balls; and (2) that it was bulged and might well have burst at the very point where the user was probably holding it.

A further warning is conveyed by the possibility that the man who fired the cartridge was not aware of what

it contained. It is not uncommon, for example, for a few local gunners to be got together for a deer drive, and for the man in charge to hand out a few rounds of buckshot cartridges to each of the guns. It has happened to me; and it never occurred to me to note if the cartridges showed signs of having been re-loaded - still less would it have occurred to me to ask with what. But never again would I accept large-shotted cartridges in such circumstances without question. I know full well that if, under dire compulsion, I had to fire a round loaded with steel balls, I would first say good-bye to my gun. And then, just in case, I would say good-bye to my left hand.







Do Birds have Sense of Smell?

(By D. H. DAY)

Do birds have a sense of smell? Pigeons have, according to Dr. Wolfgang Michelsen, of Harvard University, U.S.A.

The doctor has proved it with the a few times on the wrong one, they help of an ingenious contraption which may help other scientists to determine whether other species have the same sense

The problem has baffled scientists for centuries.

Farmers claim that crows can smell newly-seeded fields, and some pigeon fanciers believe that pigeons recognise them by smell.

Scientists over the centuries have turned up evidence both for and against the theory, but Dr. Michelsen found that none of their arguments was decisive.

He built a large box, in which he placed an aluminium cylinder resembling a hot-water tank. In the cylinder was a hole large enough for birds to enter.

Inside the cylinder were two illuminated discs, one red and one blue. Air was put into and withdrawn from the cylinder mechanically. The interior atmosphere could be completely controlled.

If a bird pecked on one disc seven times, a trapdoor opened, and out dropped grain. If it pecked on the other disc four times, the light went out and there was no grain.

Dr. Michelsen put two hungry pigeons in the box for short periods, stretched over weeks. They were "conditioned" to the idea that if they pecked enough times on one disc. they would be fed, but if they pecked


would stay hungry.

The right disc was changed every so often, so the bird had no way of knowing which was the right one.

Then Dr. Michelsen began introducing odours into the completely controlled atmosphere. The birds learned that when an odour was present, pecking on the blue disc produced food, but when there was no odour the red disc produced food.

Dr. Michelsen's report has gone to the American Association for the Advancement of Science.


