



The Editor's Notebook



REGISTRATION AND HANDI-CAP CARDS. It has come to the notice of the A.C.T.A. office that a few shooters — notably newly registered shooters — when their handicap has been amended or adjusted, have forwarded their cards to their local club secretary for completion and signature by that official. It is pointed out that this practice is entirely irregular and is required to he discontinued immediately. Any cards, for adjustment or correction in any way whatever, must be forwarded to the A.C.T.A. office (Box 2038 S. G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1) for necessary notation and signature by the appropriate authority. Signatures of club secretaries on registration cards are not valid and cannot be accepted. Club officials should ensure that only the signature of the A.C.T.A. handicapping official appears on the card when the shooter presents same at a shoot.

1963 INTERNATIONAL MATCH. As is already known and advertised, the Australian section of the 1963 International Match will be held on the grounds of the South Coast Gun Club at Southport, Queensland, on Queen's Birthday holiday, June 10, 1963. Advice has been received from London that the Great Britain International Tournament will be held in Dublin, Ireland, on June 21 and 22, 1963. A cordial welcome has been extended to any Australians visiting the British Isles during the period

of the Dublin Tournament. Any intending visitors are requested to contact the English Association, A. Peter Page, at Eley Estate, Angel Road, London, N.18, or telephone him at Edmonton 7528.

BREAK SEQUENCES. A shooter recently wrote the Association seeking information as to whether scores in a shoot-off were accepted a part of a break for badge recognition. There has never been any question in this regard. If a shooter in compiling a break goes on into a shootoff, all his scores are taken into account for the break sequence. However, all score sheets must be submitted to the Association in substantiation of the break. A few clubs have been overlooking this important point in recent months, which results in the issue of the shooter's badge being delayed.

SINGLE - BARREL SHOOTING. Under the Rules of single - barrel shooting conditions, only one cartridge is permitted in the gun. Some discussion has arisen as to what the penalty is if a shooter places two cartridges in his gun in a single-barrel event. A.C.T.A. Rule 44 is quite explicit on this point. Rule No. 44 reads, "'Lost Target' shall be declared if in single-barrel shooting the competitor loads two cartridges.

(A competitor is only allowed to load one cartridge and is not permitted to load an empty shell or a dummy cartridge)."

NOMINATIONS FOR A.C.T.A. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The following have been nominated for the several positions on the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee: President, John M. Tyquin (unopposed); Queensland section, Messrs. W. A. Gordon, R. H. Moyse, L. S. R. Stewart (unopposed); Victoria, Messrs. T. L. Almond, R. W. Fox, J. H. Headland, D. H. Moore (two to be elected; Messrs. E. G. Biggs and A. Pedersen do not come up for election in 1963); New South Wales, Messrs. G. Daly, F. Honeyman, D. B. Mott, K. Oldfield (three to be elected; Mr. R. R. Moore did not re-nominate and Mr. F. Hudson does not come up for election in 1963); Tasmania, Messrs. S. Marshall and W. E. H. Rainbird (unopposed); South Australia, Mr. R. C. Mules (unopposed): Western Australia, Mr. N. Wells (unopposed). The election will take place at the annual meeting of members and delegates at Southport (Queensland) on June 10, 1963.

OFFICIAL REFEREE EXAMINA-TIONS. Many enquiries have been received regarding the 1963 series of Official Referee Examinations to be held later in the year-these, possibly, from the mention of same in a late 1962 edition of this publication. All interested are informed that the examination series will not be held before August next. Candidates interested in taking part are advised that names will required to be lodged with the Association office not later than July 31. From that date the Association will advise candidates the requirements of the examinations. which must be concluded by August 31. Those interested are advised to watch this publication for complete details, which will appear in later editions.

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES. Frequently enquires come to hand seeking rulings on Deauville Doubles


decisions by referees. Recently a query came from a northern club which advised that shooter "A" had arranged to call "ready" and shooter "B" was to call "pull". The club making the enquiry did not specify as to whether the puller has been informed of the above arrangements. It appears that shooter "B" did not call, but shooter "A" took the birds when he said "ready", which apparently the puller understood to be the order for "pull". It should always be remembered that Deauville Doubles is fundamentally a "novelty" event and is what is termed as an "all-in" event, and the conditions of the event state that "the competitors can arrange between themselves which track they will take and who shall call for the release of the clay targets. In the event of a false call by either competitor, they must abide by the result". As already mentioned, it is not clear as to whether the puller was informed of the local arrangements between the two competitors.

SHOOTER'S POSITION. Several queries have come to hand regarding the position of competitors' feet when taking part in competition. Rule 7 states that, "When firing, the competitor's feet must be behind the firing mark assigned to him, and he must stand with both feet within eighteen (18) inches on either side of the centre of his mark. Should the competitor fail to observe the above rules, a 'lost target' will be declared." Further in the official Rules, Rule No. 45 states, "Lost target' shall be declared if a competitor shoots from his wrong handicap mark."

From the foregoing, it should be understood by all competitors that a shooter will have a lost target called against him if he shoots from the wrong mark. Also the competitor is expected to stand behind his firing mark; by this it is meant that if he is a 16 yarder, he should not exaggerate by standing on 17 vards. Reasonable judgment is expected of every shooter, and referees should insist that the Rules mentioned are

properly carried out.

My Mate Charlie on "Opening Day"

How I shudder when anyone mentions that word "Opening Day!" It was on February 14th, when my mate Charlie sauntered in to disturb the peace and harmony of our humble home, and casually invited me to go with him on "Opening Day".

Now to me, opening day was only a day when most of our better halves gathered at some pre-arranged place for a good old "yak yak", then promptly forget about everything until it was time to open the purse buy a few tins of food - dash home and open them for the evening meal. Just how wrong can a simple soul be! for Charlie let me into the secret that opening day was the day of days, when countless kindred souls gathered at some unearthly hour, beside mosquito-infested swamps and lagoons, to declare war on the hordes of wild ducks, which, he assured me, could be readily found at these places. My wife has always told me that I would fall for the "three-card trick", and perhaps, when we are again speaking, I'll admit she was right.

Charlie painted a glowing picture of the pleasure it gave a man to camp out at night so close to nature (too close for me, as it turned out) and to see the dawn break clear and calm. Added to this was the satisfaction of downing a full bag of duck and how much money could be saved on the weekly meat bill, just by placing a few well-directed shots towards the heavens.

Being a fairly close friend of my pocket, this latter appealed greatly to me. After convincing my wife of all the advantages of this proposed trip, I sought out Charlie for advice as to what gear would be required. Perhaps it would be as well to mention at this stage that Charlie is a particularly hardy type and the conventional things of life do not appeal

to him. In fact, there are times when I think he was not born, but quarried!

In my innocence, he assured me it did not matter about taking any blankets, as we could both sleep, without any trouble, on the seats of the car—also that we only needed the bare essentials of food and tools to eat it with. One point in his favour was that he did advise me to bring some mosquito lotion—not that he would need it—but he considered that the "mossies" may like to sample some of my not so blue blood. Mum duly purchased the said lotion and muttered something about wasting money when there were so many things around the home it could be put to better use on.

Charlie said he could get me the loan of a good single-barrelled gun that would rake them from the sky, and told me to buy three packets of 24" cartridges. At twenty-six and threepence a packet, this was starting to pinch my friend my pocket, but having committed myself, it was too late to withdraw now.

However, Charlie came good, and said he would supply all the tucker, as I seemed to be such a useless coot, that I would probably finish up trying to buy a few loaves of toast or something equally as stupid.

Came the 16th and I was beginning to become quite excited about the opening. Charlie had arranged to pick me up at four-thirty p.m., so we would have ample time to do the fifty-odd miles and still have time to settle in nicely before dark. Five o'clock came and still no Charlie! then ten minutes later the tortuous squeal of tyres announced his belated arrival. From then on things moved fast. After hurriedly stowing my meagre gear in the car, and giving mum a farewell, which she did not seem to appreciate, we headed off.

Now Charlie is a big bloke and built in proportion, and that includes his feet, too, for no sooner were we on the highway than the big foot hit the floor and stayed there. Maybe Sterling Moss or Jack Brabham would have kept us in sight while we were on the highway, but when we turned off on to the dirt track Charlie came into his own. He explained that he learnt to drive on log trucks and that you had to keep 'em rolling on all sorts of roads to get anywhere.

I've had some rough rides in my day, but nothing to compare with this. When I would visit my uncle's farm he would let me cart the water in a "Furphy" and riding that was pretty rough. Then once some older workmates kidded me to have a ride on a diesel-engine camshaft; this also was considered rough, but compared to this trip they were pleasure cruises. To add interest to the trip. there were gates in various stages of decay about every mile, and there's no need to tell you who was promoted to gate opener and closer. The absence of many tyre marks seemed to please Charlie greatly and he figured there would not be many shooters at his pet swamp. Dusk was falling as we arrived at the swamp, along with about a hundred and fifty other cars whose drivers apparently knew a much better track in. It was about this time that I noticed that Charlie had a red retriever dog in the back seat, and the dog also noticed me. His welcome to me was far from cordial and I decided to treat him with a fair amount of respect in the future.

However, my attention was drawn by Charlie telling me to stop day-dreaming and have a gander at the mob of duck pitching in on the far side of the swamp. If they were ducks, it seemed there would be at least one each for every shooter who had gathered at this "secluded" spot. My personal opinion was that in the dim light he had mistaken mosquitoes for ducks, for at that moment a vicious stab on my ear foretold of the things to come during the night.

Charlie decided that it was high time we fed the inner man, so he

produced a well-worn tucker box and proceeded to get a good square feed. as he called it. This would have been easy if we could have found the tin opener and if the ants had not found their way into the box. After much labour, and two cut fingers, I did manage to get a can of camp pie open. This, together with some tomatoes and chunks of bread, which felt as if they had been left over from last year's opening, supplied the needs of the inner man. As the day was one of high fire danger, and the lighting of a fire to boil a billy being out of the question, our liquid refreshment came from cans.

Have you ever tried to sleep on the seat of a car? Well. I have been practising sleeping for over forty years, and consider that I'm really well up in the art of slumber - even mum grants that it is one of the few things I do really well -- but try as I may, sleep eluded me. Meanwhile a terrific rumble from the rear announced, to the world at large, that Charlie was in the happy land where the ducks are in teeming thousands, and the word inspector has never been heard of.

There I was, folded up like a "fourpenny roast", and every movement exposed some new place for a concentrated mosquito attack. After

curve in my back like an archer's bow. I endeavoured to turn over. Here's where the real trouble started, for, by some mischance, my leg got tangled with the steering wheel and an earsplitting blast from the horn announced to all and sundry that I was in difficulties. From nearby camps came further muttered threats and other unprintable suggestions. Slowly the night dragged on, while Charlie lay there, closed up like a three-bladed pocket knife—dead to

Came the time to push off and wade across the swamp to where Charlie reckoned the shooting would be best. Now mosquitoes don't like the rain any more than I do, and every one of them tried to find a shelter on me.

around in a slow circle to see how badly I had been hit. This, indeed, was adding insult to injury. With a last pitiful look, he winged off, unmolested by any more novice gunners. "Oh, mother, why had I let myself be talked into this situation?"

Dejectedly I got some dry cartridges from the bag on the post, and calculated that the lot ruined were worth at least twenty-eight shillings. The further I went, the further behind I was getting. I was certain now that for me the day was going to be duckless, when a voice called out, "Over your head, swan shooter." This was a warning that a duck was coming from behind me, so I started to put the gun up and cock it at the same time. In my excitement of seeing a duck within range, my thumb slipped off the hammer and the gun discharged, still in an elevated position. Imagine my surprise to see a huge "blackie" closed up like a book and heading for the water. At last my luck had turned for the better and already my mouth was watering in anticipation of the delicious meal mum and I would have. As the duck hit the water the day suddenly seemed much brighter and the earlier insults did not sting so much. Now to recover the bird and put him safely in the bag. By this time the duck had somewhat recovered and was swimming slowly and erratically away towards the far side of the swamp.

Charlie decided to save me any further trouble and sent his dog to do the retrieving. That dog soon gathered the duck, but instead of responding to whistles and calls, he headed on toward the far side where another bird was splashing about. As yet, I was not worried, as Charlie had told me what a great retriever his dog was, and no doubt he was just showing us how clever he was by getting both birds at once. As he (the dog) picked up the other duck and continued on to the chap who had downed it, an awful uncertainty crept over me. In moments such as this, when fate is to deal a cruel blow, it is best to happen quickly, and this it did. As soon as that miserable "corn beef setter" that was masquerading as a retriever gave up the birds, this so-called sportsman

quickly disappeared into tall reeds and tea-tree. With him went my last hopes of getting a bird, and my mind's eye began to see a home-coming that would be far from pleasant. When that "tripe-hound" returned he was met by a barrage of language that should have scorched the feathers from every duck within miles.

Charlie decided to go and look for a couple of wounded ones he claimed to have put down in the reeds, although I had not seen any of these go down. After half an hour or so he returned with four blackies and one teal, and claimed he had found just about all his wounded ones. I think he certainly had! Now it was slowly beginning to dawn on me why shooters, with good dogs, usually get good bags, and those without, were less fortunate. But let's be fair about this — not all owners of efficient dogs stoop to such things, and many of them are most helpful.

It now became evident that Charlie was keen to leave the swamp and head for home, as he considered his "bag" of nine birds would be as good as he could do. Myself, I dreaded the thought of arriving home emptyhanded; still, maybe Charlie would give me one of his birds and so lessen the wrath that must surely fall upon me.

It took only a few minutes to clean the guns and pack up ready for home, and just as I thought we were all set, Charlie asked me to bring my pocket knife down to the water's edge. Here he introduced me to the gentle art of removing some feathers from around the "rear end" of the birds and then extracting the "insides". This, I felt, must surely earn me a duck. As Charlie seemed to be having some trouble sharpening his knife and rolling a smoke, I finished up cleaning all the birds, whilst Charlie counted them again and put them in a white flour bag. This was a good safety precaution, as some of the blow-flies were almost as large as a teal duck, and seemed bent on wresting our hard-won ducks from us.

And so we set off for home, me with certain misgivings, and Charlie apparently untroubled. Had I been able to see into the future, I certainly would not have agreed to him stopping for a feed of blackberries, but stop he did, and what else could I do but join him?

Fully contented, we again became mobile and headed the Holden for home. Apart from Charlie going to sleep a couple of times, and having sleep a couple of times, and having a few near misses, we arrived at my place. Mum and the boys had obviously been expecting us and were gathered in high expectation. After all my gear had been unloaded I felt the time was right for Charlie to open up the duck bag and give me at least a pair, but how wrong I was, for this "galah" made no move to do so, and strong hints left him unmoved unmoved.

When it became obvious to mum hostile gleam appeared in her eye and, unfortunately, at the same moment, she noticed suspicious stains on my lips. The blasts that had greeted the duck at five a.m. were very mild compared to what happened in the next five minutes. My ears

burned and my breath was taken away completely. When at last mum paused for breath, I turned to Charlie for some moral support, only to find that he had quietly started up his car and driven away.

I won't bore you with details of the next few days, but feel I should mention that the following week-end a cheeky little brat from next door said, "When are you going duck shooting again, mister?" "We want to hear your wife in action again!" "We ain't heard anything so good since our mum burnt dad's old coat that had a tenner in it!"

These nights I sit and dream of what might have been and think of how my ex-mate Charlie deserted me in my hour of greatest need.



OUT OF THE PAST

Twenty Five Years Ago

A paragraph in one of the leading sporting papers of the day, 25 years ago, stated that the Launceston Police, mainly through the efforts of the Tasmanian Gun Club, had been supplied with a speed boat to allow the police to intercept poachers of game and fish in the waters of the Tamar and tributary streams. It was reported that poachers had been very active, but with the advent of the new boat, officers of the law expected to obtain good results.

The annual meeting of the now extinct Victorian Clay Target Club, its third, was held in the C.T.A. Rooms, Melbourne. G. A. Townsend retired as Secretary and L. L. Schilling, who is still shooting within the

metropolitan area of Melbourne, also retired from the office of President, which was taken over by Reg Hawke.

A shoot of the Nobel Club twenty-five years ago was held on the old original West Footscray grounds. Sixty shooters attended. The late Donald Mackintosh presented the club, on this day, with a magnificent old silver wine decanter. The story is that the decanter, which is still one of the perpetual trophies of the Australian Club (which amalgamated with the Nobel Club), was a gift to Mr. Mackintosh by one of the Indian princes whom he met on one of his trips abroad. The trophy is certainly unique in type.

Fifteen Years Ago

Norman Guy won his first championship when he was successful in the Coburg Club's tower championship. The tie shoot was unusual for this event; when the tieists faced up (E. G. Biggs and N. Guy) they were apparently using the same gun—each had to alternate in their shooting with Guy, the winner.

One of the most interesting results of the decade was a ten-birder at a Camberwell fixture. This was won outright with the remarkably low score of 9/10 by L. L. Schilling —

the result was a complete surprise against a big field.

At Launceston Jack McCraith of Essendon won the Commonwealth Single-barrel Championship from the late Ted Casey. J. M. Tyquin, now A.C.T.A. President, was the outright winner of a £50 Handicap on the same programme.

The late Lionel Byrne and George Daniels of Narre-Warren paired and cut a Deauville Doubles contest at Blackburn, with Jack Bryant and the late Fred Fitzallen.

Ten Years Ago

The "News" of March, 1952, reported the passing of King George VI. The report states that the late King "had much in common in the kindred spirit of shooters, as he was one who favoured gun sport.

A discussion was raging at this period over "handicap champion-ships". The "News" was asked for an opinion on the question, and, of

course, the answer given that there could be no such happening as a "handicap championship". A championship is either a championship or it is not; the question of handicap does not enter into the discussion where a championship is concerned.

An American report outlined some of the performances of the great trapshot, Arnold Reigger. The report

The Alexandra Club in Victoria held its first Birthday Shoot, and this proved most successful. The club double-barrel title decided at this fixture went to Geoff. Cookson from Tom Cherry.

Trap Firing Lines Safe Place

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS

The following extract from an American newspaper, published in Columbus, Ohio, has been forwarded to the A.C.T.A. by Hon. Association Vice-President, Rex Miles. The article makes interesting reading and is published as received.

The safest place in the world is where the shooting is heaviest.

And that would be on the firing lines of America's trap and skeet clubs.

The clay target brigade fires between 190 and 200 million shotgun shells every year on the trap lines and skeet fields—and not one shell has caused a fatality.

The safety subject popped up at the recent 63rd Grand American Trapshoot at Vandalia, Ohio, where some 2,500 of the nation's top scattergunners staged a 10-day 1,500-target programme.

"Roaring Grand"

Representatives of one of the big arms and ammunition firms decided to do some research on just how much shooting had been done at the "Roaring Grand" over the years. They came up with:

Since the "Grand" started back at the turn of the century, the entry list for the big classic's events has exceeded 60,000 men, women and children. They have fired more than 35 million shells, all of the 12-gauge variety.

That breaks down to 105,000 pounds of potent powder, 2.8 million pounds (or 1,400 tons) of leaden pellets, 175,000 pounds of paper, and 3,500 pounds of priming mix. The priming mix, if fired in one batch, would result in an explosion almost like a blockbuster bomb.

Only One Injury

Yet, with all that explosive going off, and pellets flying along a milelong trap line, only one person in the history of the "Grand" has ever been struck by any of the shot.

Several years ago a youngster in the traphouse, from which the clay targets emerge, stuck his head over the edge without waving a red warning flag.

He was under the impression a squad had completed its 25-target chore and that all was clear. But the last shooter had been given a broken

Single Pellet

As the boy peeked over the edge of the concrete traphouse he saw the gunner and ducked back. The startled shooter released the trigger. The charge of shot struck the slanted top of the house, and a single pellet ripped through the hair of the youngster, barely breaking the skin on his scalp. Ten minutes later, after fast first aid, he was back on the job.

That's the only gunshot injury in the "Grand's" history — one in 35 million

That record has been made despite the fact there is no formal, militarytype safety programme observed. Few of the guns handled by the marksmen have a "safety" — since none is needed. Only one shell is

allowed in a gun at one time, except when doubles, or twin-target events are under way.


255-mile High Pile

The gunners are imbued with the thought of safety at all times. Shotguns are loaded and closed only after the preceding shooter has fired. Guns are never loaded off the firing line, and weapons are pointed only in the direction of the field where the targets fan out. Drinking of alcoholic beverages is strictly taboo.

Incidentally, one figure filbert estimates the targets thrown at the "Grand" since its inception would soar 255 miles into the air if stacked saucer-like, and that a train of 260 freight cars would be required to transport them.

But all the figures pale when compared to the astounding safety factor. As one expert put it:


"It just proves that guns, in the hands of careful persons, are not dangerous."

Dear Mr. McCullough.

Just recently I had a trip to U.S.A. I visited the Pininchula Sportsman's Club, situated about 16 miles south of San Francisco, a place called Belmont. I went there on three occasions.

I refereed two events of 25 birds single barrel. I inspected the trapssingle barrel. I inspected the traps—automatic and self-loading. There were six down-the-line and six sets of skeet traps. The shooting hours were Wednesday to Saturday each day, 1 p.m. starting time. Sunday, 10 a.m. starting time.

All events, while I was there, were 25 birds S.B. Down-the-line and skeet were shot at the same as we shoot them in Australia.

Ninety per cent, of shooters there use the single - barrel pump - action

I took particular notice of the birds (clays), as I know one shooter who went from Australia and was shooting 20 straight at his best, and on his American trip he got a score of 199 kills.

The clays at this club I visited-(1) did not spread on the angle we have here in Australia: it would only be half our angle;

(2) the clay travelled slower; (3) the clay did not rise 9 feet like our clays do.

So as I had found it that way, I was speaking to your President, John Tyquin, and I said I was going to send this letter in to be printed in the "Shooting News" for the Australian shooters to read about.

I saw a lady shooter over there shooting the event I refereed; she shot 25 S.B. kills. A couple of events later she shot another 25 S.B. kills. She has a wonderful style and is a left-hand shooter.

Your A.C.T.A. President, John Tyquin, recommends that you send her the "Shooting News" each month.
