The Editor's Notebook



THANKS TO I.C.I.A.N.Z. LTD. It is usual, following the holding of the A.C.T.A. National Championships, to publicly express, on behalf of all shooters and the A.C.T.A., thanks and appreciation to I.C.I.A.N.Z. Ltd. for the Company's renowned cooperation, assistance by staff per-sonnel and Company donations to the A.C.T.A. and clubs. 1963 has proved no exception to the interest and support given by the Company in previous years. The handsome donation of the clay targets and cartridges used in the International Match, plus the clay targets used in the Champion of Champions Cup, immediately comes to mind when analysing the National series. These particular donations greatly assist the Association and do much to enable the A.C.T.A. administration to retain the cost of entries for the entire programme at a minimum figure. In fact, the series can be regarded as the cheapest in the Southern Hemisphere, from the cost of entry viewpoint, and this can be largely attributed to the support given to the A.C.T.A. by I.C.I.A.N.Z. Ltd. When it is remembered that the Company also contributes £150 towards the cost of the annual Interstate Match, plus I.C.I. trophies to every club applying annually, it will be understood just what the magnitude of the support given really amounts to. Throughout the year and during the big fixture annually the Company permits certain staff members to assist in running the big shoot. This, in terms of hard cash, runs into no small amount.

The warmest thanks and appreciation are extended to the Company for its long-sustained support.

27th ANNUAL MEETING OF A.C.T.A. The 27th Annual Meeting of the A.C.T.A. was held in the R.S.L. Hall, Scarborough Street, Southport, on June 9. The meeting was largely attended.

Election of Office - bearers. The election of office-bearers for the ensuing year resulted: President, Mr. J. M. Tyquin, re-elected unopposed. No elections were required in the States of South Australia, Western Australia, Queensland and Tasmania for members of the Executive Committee, as the number of nominations did not exceed the required number. In Victoria the result of the election was that Messrs. T. L. Almond and H. D. Moore were elected. Messrs. E. G. Biggs and A. Pedersen were not required to stand, having been elected the previous year for a two-year period. In New South Wales Messrs, D. B. Mott and Keith Oldfield were elected. Messrs. F. R. Hudson and K. S. Soames were elected to a two-year period in 1962. The Executive Committee, therefore, now comprises those mentioned with the following: Queensland, Messrs. W. A. Gordon, R. H. Moyse and L. S. R. Stewart; Tasmania, Messrs. W. E. H. Rainbird and S. E. Marshall; South Australia, Mr. R. Mules, and Western Australia, Mr. N. Wells, together with President (Mr. J. M. Tyquin) and Secretary.

Appointment of Auditor. Mr. K. D. Courtney, Chartered Accountant, of Selbourne Chambers, Melbourne, was re-appointed Auditor to the A.C.T.A. Mr. Courtney has been Auditor for the A.C.T.A. for nearly 25 years.

Executive Committee Meeting. An Executive Committee of those members present was held following the 27th Annual Meeting. The question of shooting tie shoots "squad system and miss-out" was discussed. It will be remembered it was tried out at the Southport fixture. Meanwhile, clubs are informed that it is optional for them to conduct tie shoots in championships at either "best of five" or "squad system miss-out". The whole question will be reviewed in the light of experience at the October meeting of the Executive Committee.

Dinner at Shoots. The Executive Committee has decided that a buffet dinner will be available to shooters competing at the National Championships in future at the nominal figure of £1 per head. Full details will be announced later.

1964 National Championships. The 1964 National Championships and International Match will be held on the grounds of the South Australian Gun Club at Bolivar, near Adelaide, S.A. It is expected that the opening day will be either Wednesday or Thursday of Easter week, 1964, April 1 or 2.

CAR BADGES. Following the suggestion by several country and interstate sportsmen, the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee has agreed to arrange for the production of a metal car badge, providing sufficient orders are received. The design has already been approved, and badges will be available at 25/- each, providing 100 or more orders are received. If under 100 are ordered, initially the cost will be much greater. Therefore, those interested are requested to advise the Secretary A.C.T.A. as soon as possible their requirements in this regard.

HANDICAPPING — FORWARD MOVEMENT. It was decided that as from 1/1/1964 all shooters would be brought one (1) yard on their handicap as shown on December 31, 1963, immediately their 1964 registration is received. This will apply only to those shooters who register. Unregistered shooters will not be able to partake of this privilege. The yard forward will apply to all yardages from 13 to 27. This direction will apply in future years following 1964, which means that if a shooter does not become liable for handicapping penalty during 1964, he will come forward another yard in 1965, and successive years.

LIFE REGISTERED SHOOTERS. The Executive Committee has expressed considerable disappointment that a number of Life Registered Shooters have failed to pay the 20/for "News" as directed by that body some time ago. Those in this category are now informed that "Life Registered Shooters will not be the recipients of 'News' unless they pay the annual fee of £1" (Hon. Life Vice-Presidents excluded).

OCTOBER MEETING OF EXE-CUTIVE COMMITTEE. The next meeting of the Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. will be held at the R.A.C.V. Club, Queen Street, Melbourne, C.1, on Thursday and Friday, October 31, and November 1, 1963, commencing at 9.15 a.m. each day. Clubs or individual shooters requiring items included on the Agenda paper for the meeting are advised that any requests in this regard must reach the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, not later than October 3. Similarly applications for 1964 Open Championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are required to be received by the A.C.T.A. Secretary not later than October 3.

NOTICES OF MOTION. Notices of Motion are required to be placed before the Executive Committee before same can be approved for presentation to the following annual meeting. Such Notices are required to be submitted to the A.C.T.A. Secretary by September 30, in accordance with Article 43 (d).

HANDICAP RETURN FORMS. In recent weeks it has been noticed that some clubs are ignoring, in the handicap return form, the column which is headed, "Amount won — Cash or Trophy Value". This column is the second column from the right of the

return form. Clubs are informed that it is of utmost importance that handicap return forms should be filled in completely - that is to say - supplying all the information possible. There are some clubs who still have some of the older type handicap return form which does not have this column included in its set-up. To these clubs it is advised that new forms are available on application to the Association office. It is imperative that handicap return forms should be completed following every shoot. Failure to do this affects all shooters, those entitled to come forward as well as those on backward movement. Another important point also is that certain shooters are writing direct to the Association, claiming that they have shot in three programmes and should be moved forward. Such claims cannot be en-tertained in future unless accompanied by a fully completed handicap return form.

> The American system of classification for handicapping is not practised in Australia, chiefly because the sport is not yet developed to such a high standard in this country as in U.S.A. It is of interest to note the advice contained in the Washington State Shoot programme, which was held on May 31, June 1 and June 2 at Yakima Sportsmen Gun Club, Washington. The intimation referred to states, "Any shooter without a record will be placed in a class and words determined for him by the handicap committee. To prevent the entry of "dark horses" the classification committee reserves the right to change the classification and yardage of any shooter at any time during the pro-gramme. The classification order is, gramme. The classification order is, 96.5 per cent. and over, "AA"; 95 and under 96.5, "A"; 91 and under 94, "B"; 88 and under 91, "C"; under 88, "D". The Washington Associa-tion has what is termed a "grievance committee" and any misunderstand-ing of rules and regulations must be taken up with them and no one else. Errors in scores must be contested and settled before the shooter shoots five additional targets, otherwise the score will stand. The scorer will call lost targets only. When a squad is called to shoot, the squad will be held for 3 minutes for a tardy shooter; after that time he will be scratched from the event. Tie shoots are completed the day the event is finished, time permitting. If a contestant is

A report from the English Association states that the English Open Championship was held at Wellesbourne, Stratford - upon - Avon (near Shakespeare's birthplace) during early June. A record entry of 127 was received. The report states that the English shooting season is "now more active than ever". The English Association has arranged to forward six of the "robot pigeons" as used early this year at Monte Carlo. The equipment, it appears, is made in France and the targets are of plastic manufacture.

Members of the Hagen Gun Club at Mount Hagen in the Western Highlands area of New Guinea were pleased to welcome His Excellency, the Governor-General, Lord De'Lisle, who recently made an official tour of the territory. Lord De'Lisle took great interest in the club and participated in competition shooting. The Governor - General proved himself a keen sportsman and his visit to the club was a highlight of his tour. The Hagen Club had a lot of trouble in recent months in securing supplies of clay targets. Consignments from the Australian mainland revealed a breakage percentage of over 70% in some instances. The club recently secured dies from a Melbourne source and are producing their own targets. This has done much to increase interest in the sport and the club.

Burdekin Club Secretary, Len Ashworth, at Ayr in North Queensland, has been presented by his club with a handsome gold watch in recognition of 25 years' service as Secretary of the Burdekin Club. Some of the Nth. Queensland clubs appear to be able to retain their secretarial officers for long periods. Another instance comes to mind, that of the Townsville Club, where Secretary Fred Blackman has been in the Secretary's chair for nearly 30 years!

There is a strong possibility of the Mount Isa Club in North Queensland re-forming after a period of recess of two or three years. A few years ago Mount Isa had a first-class club, and there is no reason why a good club should not again eventuate from the present effort. F. T. Maddicks, of 2 Fir Street, Mount Isa, is the organizer.

Mildura Club in far north-western Victoria has suffered a severe loss in the sudden passing of its very capable Treasurer, Laurie Bruce. Sincere sympathy of all shooters is extended to his relatives.

A report from South Australia advises that a female mallard duck, which had been ringed at Lake Tuakitoto in the south Island of New Zealand, has been shot at Narrung Narrows, between Lakes Alexandrina and Albert. A Torrensville shooter brought the duck down. This is believed to be the first record of a mallard from New Zealand crossing the Tasman. The distance from Lake Tuakitoto to Narrung Meadows is approximately 1,850 miles.

Huntly Club at Bendigo will shoot from 1.30 p.m. on September 7. The club has arranged an interesting programme, chief items of which are the two main events-the club singlebarrel championship (20 targets from 16 yards, nomination 25/-) and the Harcourt Cup. The Harcourt Cup is a teams contest, teams of 5 shooters, nomination 25/- per shooter. Previous winners of the event were: 1960 Harcourt, 1961 Huntly, 1962 Huntly. Dear Sir,

During the shooting of the Doublerise event at the recent International a decision given by a Referee caused quite a lot of comments and, in my opinion, the loss of two "kills" for a shooter. The shooter, using an automatic gun after calling "Pull", shot one target, but did not fire at the second target. Without opening his gun, he held it up and called for the Referee, who, upon examining the gun, found the fired cartridge had not been fully ejected, thus preventing the second cartridge being fired. The Referee removed the spent cartridge, also the unused one, and gave the decision "Lost Bird".

Following this unreasonable decision, the shooter shot his next pair, then calling for his next pair, had the same experience as before. He again held up his gun, and the Referee, without inspecting it, called "Lost Bird". In my opinion these were incorrect decisions. In conclusion, would suggest that referees for shoots such as mentioned — in fact, all shoots — should be more conversant with the Rules. The A.C.T.A. should employ only referees who know the correct decisions.

How interesting to read correspondence relating to my father, the late Lew Bertram.

I have in my possession the cartridge which was used in the final and winning shot in the 77 break. Mounted on a section of gun stock and suitably inscribed, it makes a good memento. The cartridge was an Eley nitro. I do not know who bothered to mount it—possibly Mr. Donald Mackintosh. I have also his Champion of Champions Cup, 1937. I remember my father's home-coming that evening; Mr. Horrie James helped carry the trophies. I think my father won every first-prize trophy for the shoot. Our dining table was not large enough to contain them.

He could hold his own at live birds. I have before me at this moment a gold medal, "Mixed Bird Championship. Oakleigh Gun Club, 1931".

Although at that time barely a teenager, I well remember the "characters" associated with live bird shooting.

One very placid shooter was Mr. Bill Downie, a one-armed and, if

I remember correctly, a one-eyed shooter, who was an excellent shot.

Some old-timers would still remember "Luke", a character far removed from his biblical name-sake. He turned up at every live bird shoot, generally with one or two under the belt, watery eyes peering at the score-board, and a shaky hand jotting down in an old notebook. The score always seemed to make the press. I think he used to phone his paper from Porter's pub at old Bentleigh.

And then the time clay birds came to Heatherton (the site of the old Gun Club). I remember a shallow pit in the sand, an old type hand trap, etc. Of course, clay's were only shot after the "interesting" events were finished.

In the semi-dusk a small group would gather to crack clays. My father sensed the possibilities and very soon a club was formed at Centre Road, Bentleigh.

Our garage at Bentleigh was shooting headquarters. Sunday morning was a shooters' fraternal, accompanied by internal lubrication and post-mortems. The garage was 30 yards, front door to back. Many a sheet of paper was patterned as guns and sometimes hand load shells were tried out.

Incidentally the "Leonard Mills" gun was never owned by my father. He actually found it among the tools in the back of a Brighton garage proprietor's "A" model Ford. I believe it was returned to its owner (Mr. Geo. Pockett) when clubs went into recess during the war.

May I correct your first article: Lew Bertram was born at Stratford, Gippsland, Vic. He was a bush boy. He died Sept. 1945, aged 59 years.

The annual A.C.T.A. National Championships and International fixtures opened at Southport, Queensland on Thursday, June 6, and concluded on Tuesday, June 11. The series was an unqualified success, well attended (in fact, a record in went attended (in fact, a record in aggregate shooters over the full period of the shoot), excellent shoot-ing, good organization, and winners certainly had to shoot right up to their form to be successful. Con-gratulations are extended to all successful shooters.

cessful shooters. The series opened in somewhat dull weather for Southport, with a fairly strong, following wind. The initial contest was the National Double-barrel Championship, 80 targets from 16 yards, double-barrel, with which (shot in conjunction) was the A.C.T.A. Intermediate Championship (shot at the first 40 targets). A total of 237 faced up for the big event, plus an additional three squads (15 shooters) who took in the Inter-mediate event only. Fifteen possibles shooters) who took in the inter-mediate event only. Fifteen possibles were recorded in the big event, and these shooters faced up to the new system for Australia of "squad sys-tem and miss-out". NIKKO U/O

By COLIN SHADBOLT.

There are now an odd dozen makes of under and over shotguns on our market. Their growing popularity in field shooting and trap work merits serious consideration

before buying one. The basic design of the "over and unders" is not new, but only in recent years have price-cutting technical advances been made in production machinery. These machines can produce close tolerances that enable the hand work that made these guns so expensive to be largely done away with.

The Nikko is a typical example of its kind, and although its outside finish does not make it a serious competitor of a de-luxe gun like the Breda, there is no gun within £60 of its price that has the same competition record as the Nikko. To equal the competition record of the Nikko we must look past £150 instead of £88/15/-.

The gun itself has a rather odd history. It was made originally by Kodensha, of Japan, and attracted favourable attention when marketed by that firm in the U.S.A. The huge combine of Olin Mathieson, rivals to Dupont, saw in the gun the only way to get over the problem of a reasonably priced gun of the under and over type. Their solution to the problem was to invest in the Kodensha company, and with the low labour charges of the Japanese economy, coupled with extensive mechanisation on the production line, they were able to market a lowpriced gun of high quality.

In the change-over they standardised on one model with a choice of chokes and barrel lengths. The standard model, with 28 or 30-inch tubes, has a choice of chokes. In the 30 inch, the gun won the coveted 1961 National Championship in Australia, and the 1962 State Sparrow title,

To get back to the gun itelf, it goes without saying it is a very handsome creature, since it has a brushed chrome body with a nicely engraved floral pattern. To emphasise the body the lever and strap are bronze-black, with the trigger guard, which is engraved also in black.

Without going into the pros and cons of trap and field guns, it can be stated as dogmatically as you like that there is no commaintainy as you have that the task here is no com-petition gun that can offer the features of the under and over. If this were so, the American team to Cairo would not have been found shooting all guns of this type, including a couple of Remington model 32's, a fine gun but discontinued because of high costs. This is the reason why Winchester Western, the firearms section of Olin Mathieson, have

taken over a large part of the Kodensha Co. Ltd.

As a gun, and apart from its appearance, and the under and over feature, the Nikko offers a single trigger mechanism which is not recoil operated. If a misfire occurs on the first cartridge, the second barrel can be fired. The choice of barrels is fixed by the position of the safety which moves in a U curve to select the barrel chosen.

On the right, the trigger selects the modified barrel, which in this case is the lower This selection has been made on the one. supposition that most game will be taken with the modified barrel, and so the lower barrel has been chosen, as this throws least strain on the locking-up mechanism. This trigger selector is a tricky piece of stuff, and in the early days of the Winchester merger, occasional guns appeared when the trigger selector either fired one barrel only or else fired both on the same pull.

This was a "teething" trouble which a new design has eliminated.

Kodensha used to hand these tricky jobs to the old grey-beards who really knew what they were doing, not just thought they did. The gun action is a curious compound of selected features of English top-flight guns.

The locking-up mechanism uses only a single bite, but the locking bar has a tapered end and so, with wear, continues to keep the gun tight, holding the barrels down against the faces of two heavy lugs protruding from each side of the lumps. The barrels and the action are made of nickel chrome steel (SNCI) with the barrel locking stops made of high-speed tool steel (SK3), which is very resistant to sudden shock.

To assist in the speed of loading, the gun has no top extension for locking up, which I would have expected in the absence of the Purdey double bite, and to assist further in speed of reloading the gun, carries selective automatic ejectors. These are really handy and belt out the fired case with gusto, but raise the unfired shell only sufficiently to be grasped with the fingers if it is desired to remove it. Coil springs are a feature of this gun and Swedish spring steel is used throughout.

Although it is not the thing to fire a gun on empty chambers, the Nikko did not seem very disturbed over this; the strikers are of the rebounding type, and leave a good imprint on the primer, and to ensure their reliability, are made of Chrome Molybdenum steel (SNC2).

The barrels mentioned are of nickel chrome steel, and to ensure good patterns, the surfaces have been polished, and then hard chromed. Hard chroming gives a very high surface to steel and gives the chokes much the same effect as polishing by the firing of hundreds of rounds of cartridges.

Coming to the woodwork, the pistol grip and fore-end are checkered, running about 20 lines to the inch. The wood has the appearance of walnut, and is coloured and flame scorched to add to the illusion. The fore-end is held to the barrels using a modified Deeley loop, close to mid-way along the fore-end.

The fitting of the Butt to the action body is very good, but there is a fair amount of space between the fore-end and the barrels. Whether this is to ensure ease of fitting or ventilation in the case of a hard-worked trap gun. I am unable to say.

When the gun was patterned, the two barrels showed up well. The gun feels good and balances well, as might be expected, as this is one of the features of the under and over, and one of the reasons why it has become the first choice as a competition arm. The relatively broad, ventilated rib along the top of the full choked barrel has a file cut surface, and this makes sighting easy with its single plane.

The single trigger needs no re-positioning of the right hand to take the second barrel, but is slightly heavier in the second pull than the first. Apart from this difference in weight, both pulls have little take-up and only a moderate amount of backlash.

With a drop of only one and a half inches at the comb and a fairly close pistol grip, the stock dimensions are good. The weight of the gun at a triffe under 8 lb. is enough to avoid gun headache due to recoil, yet the gun does not have that heavy, "loggy" feeling due to too great a concentration of weight in the action, as is found on some quite expensive Continental over and unders.

Shot with the last of a batch of Icil Special which has always given extremely good results, patterns from the barrels were very evenly spaced and I could not see the lower barrel letting much get through the pattern at the 30-yard mark with a percentage of 65 at 40 yards. The second barrel gives almost as even a pattern at 40 yards, although a little more bunched at 73 per cent.






