



The Editor's Notebook



"NEWS". This publication, com-monly known as "Shooters' News", but whose correct title is "Australian Clay Target Shooting News", with the present issue, passes into its 17th year of publication — no mean performance when those who recall the journal's initial issue will remember the considerable amount of trepidation with which the magazine was launched. It is of some interest to remember that "News" had its gene-sis way back in mid-1947 basically because of the paucity of news space given to the sport of clay target (then known as clay pigeon shooting) by metropolitan newspapers in most of the State capitals. Consideration was given to the production of a "bulletin", and the original intention was that this bulletin should be of 8 pages only and contain a summary s pages only and contain a summary of shoots in every part of the Com-monwealth as submitted by club sec-retaries. "News" has since developed into a monthly publication of considerable substance and standing and its page complement has, on occa-sions, reached a total of no less than 140 pages - frequently it is over 100 pages for a normal issue, depending on the amount of advertising carried. In the initial stages of production fears were expressed that the Association would not be able to maintain publication, chiefly on account of cost. Costs have risen steadily since 1947, but "News", thanks to the support given by advertisers, clubs and shooters generally, has so far been able to weather every crises and continue to enlarge in its service to the sporting shooter.

USE OF POST OFFICE BOX. Club officials and others having need to communicate with the A.C.T.A. are recommended to use the Association's G.P.O. Box number on all correspondence. By using the G.P.O. Box number, correspondents are assured of a much quicker pick-up and reply to their enquiries. This fact has been emphasised by the Director of Posts and Telegraphs in an official circular letter forwarded to all box holders. The circular mentions that the Department likes to ensure that, no matter how mail is addressed, it will be delivered to "your private box as quickly as possible". The circular continues, "Unfortunately, it sometimes happens that the Department cannot give as fast a service as we would like you to receive. This is because extra handlings are involved when the private box number is not shown in the address. As you will readily appreciate, these further handlings not only result in added costs, but also increase processing times. The Department is hoping for your co-operation in our campaign to encourage greater use of box numbers in addresses. There are two ways you can help:

firstly, by ensuing that your private post office box number is shown prominently in your letterhead and on accounts, invoices and other business papers; secondly, by showing private box numbers, where possible, on your outward mail."

Those interested are reminded that by addressing to the private box number much quicker delivery is obtained by this office, also a reminder is given that the post office box is cleared several times each day. If mail is addressed to the Collins Street office address, delay of at least one or two mails is certain.

NOMINATIONS FOR OFFICERS IN THE ASSOCIATION. Nominations for all offices in the Association (including membership of the Executive Committee) will close on Tuesday, December 31, 1962, at 5 p.m., for the 1964 year of operations. Article 27 of the A.C.T.A. Constitution reads, "Nominations for all offices in the Association and membership of the Executive Committee must be in writing signed by the Secretary of the member club or by the delegate member of an Unincorporated club making the nomination, and must reach the Secretary of the Association on or before the thirty-first day of December in each year prior to the Annual General Meeting."

It should be understood that only the Secretary of a member club (which means an incorporated club) or the delegate member of an unincorporated club may sign the nomination. No other signatures on nominations are acceptable or valid.

Nomination forms may be obtained from the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, or from the office of the Association at 495 Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1, prior to closing date of nominations. Nominations received after December 31, 1963, cannot be accepted.

The Annual General Meeting will be held in Adelaide in 1964 during the period of the National Championships and International series.

1964 CLUB AFFILIATION AND SHOOTERS' REGISTRATION FEES. Clubs and shooters are reminded that club affiliation (\pounds 5) and individual shooters' registration fees (30/- each) are due as from January 1. Payments may be made prior to that date if so desired. 1964 registration cards have already been printed and will be available promptly on receipt of payments. All fees should be paid by January 31 in accordance with the regulations. REFEREE EXAMINATION RE-SULTS. In this issue full results of the written section of the 1963 Official Referee Examination are published. The total points allocated are shown, as also are the Examiner's comments. There was a surprising lack of knowledge of Rules in several instances. Many lost points for non-observance of the conditions of the examination. The Examiner has allowed for little latitude for lack of knowledge or indifferent papers — by this means it is hoped to improve the standard of refereeing, which, by and large, has come in for considerable castigation in recent months.

INSTRUCTIONS TO REFEREE EXAMINERS. Official Referee Examiners are reminded that, following the publication of names of those who have passed the recent written Official Referee Examination Test, they are likely to have approaches made to finalise the candidates' Oral or Practical section of the Official Referee Examination. In the past it has been found that quite a number of Official Referee Examiners do not take this section of the examination very seriously, and after a candidate has supervised the shooting off of a couple of squads he is passed as a suitable referee. Such a test is incomplete and insufficient to bring about the production of good, efficient and satisfactory referees. Official Examiners are instructed that every candidate being examined for his practical test should referee in front of the Examiner for at least half a day - the candidate, as well as being completely conversant with the Rules and the theory of shooting, should, above all things, be up-to-date with Safety Rules; in addition he should display ability above the average in his control of a shoot. Only under very extreme circumstances should a candidate be accepted and passed as a proficient referee unless his knowledge is complete in every possible direction. In the past, Official Referee Examiners have been known to call upon a candidate to referee a souad (or possibly two) and then pass the candidate as a referee. Other Examiners have been known to leave the candidate in charge of a squad or squads and then walk away and

talk to other shooters coming back later and asking the candidate "how he got on" and then passing him as fit to referee and carry an Official Referee Badge. A shooter carrying an Official Referee Badge should be a first-class referee in every sense of the word, and it is up to the Official Referee Examiners to ensure that such a situation is brought about. Countless complaints have reached the A.C.T.A. office on indifferent refereeing, and this has, without doubt, been brought about by lack of interest on the part of some Official Referee Examiners, who, as already stated, are too lax in their approach to their position as final Examiners.

Another source of inadequate organisation in the past has been the fact that some Official Referee Examiners fail to notify the A.C.T.A. as to whether a particular candidate has passed or otherwise. Examiners are informed that it is their duty to advise the A.C.T.A. office immediately they have examined a candidate, advising on the adaptability and potential capability of the person examined and indicating whether he is considered to be a suitable person to finally wear the Official Referee Badge.

OFFICIAL REFEREES. Informa-tion has reached the A.C.T.A. that numbers of shooters wearing the Official A.C.T.A. Referee Badge frequently decline to assist in the refereeing duties at clubs where they attend shoots. Only last month a shoot at which over 40 shooters attended, including five Official Ref-erees, the utmost difficulty was encountered in securing, first a referee to take over the shoot, and secondly a referee to even temporarily relieve the shooter acting as referee for the occasion. In the particular shoot under review, the management asked every one of the five Official Referees present if they would assist in the refereeing duties; all declined in turn. Finally the referee was ob-tained from "among the crowd" and he was not an official A.C.T.A. referee or had passed or even entered in a Referee Examination series at any time. The A.C.T.A. Executive Committee will look into this situation of

continued refusal by Official Referees to take over referee duties, and it is possible that some will be asked for an explanation, with a view to recall of their badge unless an improvement in co-operation is noted.

CONGRATULATIONS. The President and Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. have received many congratulations on the excellence of the recent A.C.T.A. National Championships and International Shoot at Southport. Reports advise that the organisation, generally congenial atmosphere and renowned A.C.T.A. hospitality was warmly accepted and the consensus of opinion was that the shoot was "tops" in every way.

NEW ZEALAND NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1964. The Secretary of the New Zealand Gun Clubs' Association, Mr. W. H. Stewart of Dunedin, has advised the A.C.T.A. that the New Zealand National Championships for 1964 will be held at Christchurch in the South Island from Monday, April 13, to Saturday, April 18, 1964. A special invitation has been extended to Australian shooters to take part.

NO PUBLICATION IN JANUARY.

In accordance with regular procedure, chiefly due to printer's vacation period, there will be no issue of this publication during the month of January, 1964. "Tips and Tails"

A new club formation is likely at Caragabeal, New South Wales. The formation organiser is Allan A. Taylor of Marsden, via West Wyalong, N.S.W.

A report of long ago, from overseas, gives an instance of the humour which


can pervade the magisterial bench in Ireland. It appears that a defendant was appearing following a report by the Irish Game Protection Association. A man was charged with poaching and the law ruled, "Not guilty, but don't do it again."

Some tall stories have come out of the Northern Territory, but the following report is true in every particular. Recently the Darwin Gun Club staged the Northern Territory Double-barrel Championship. In order to publicise the programme the Dar-win Club arranged to have the details advertised over the local radio. Considerable consternation eventuated when the announcer gave forth that the event was the premier title in the area, and was to be shot at "30 targets from one hundred and eighty yards". The ultimate winner, F. B. (Mick) Risk, in the circumstances, received a boisterous reception on his success, and members felt duty bound to "shoot-up" his hat (minus badges, of course). The famous hat now adorns the wall of the local clubhouse, along with that of Pat Sal-ter's, the club founder.

A new District Council has been formed at Cowra in New South Wales. The group will be known as the Central and Southern N.S.W. Gun Club Council. Its aims are bulk buying of cartridges and a Council Shield to be shot for in the area. The Council's selected area is 100 air miles radius of Young. Seven clubs are already included and four more are considering joining. Inaugural Secretary is Len Bird of Cowra (until the first shoot), when a set of bylaws and constitution will be adopted. The initial shoot is expected to take place in December next. Advice from London has been received that the result of the 1963

International Match, in which Australia was the successful team, was accepted with acclamation at the International banquet in Dublin (Ireland), which was attended by the Lord Mayor of Dublin. The English Association, on behalf of the Home Countries Associations, has also sent its heartiest congratulations to the Australian Team. It is of interest to again note that Canada's entry in the International Match for 1963 was not accepted, for the reason that Canada did not nominate its team prior to shooting their series. This is not the first occasion that the Canadian entry has been contrary to the regulations of the contest. It seems that the Canadian authorities permit every shooter on the ground to shoot, and then the best 30 scores are picked out. This, of course, means that the Canadian team is not shooting as a team in accordance with rules. The 1964 International in England will be shot at Sealand, near Chester, on June 26 and 27, 1964, and match conditions will remain unchanged. A cordial invitation has been extended to any Australian shooter who may be visiting England at the time to attend. For anyone interested it is advised that the address of the Irish Clay Pigeon Shooting Association is Brookfield House, Jobstown, Co. Dublin, Ireland.

Two interesting innovations at the 1963 Grand American series at Vandalia, Ohio, U.S.A. One was advertised as the "amazing new Hydro-Coil Gunstock". The hydro-coil stock is reputed to reduce recoil by 85%. The new stock is really a most ingenious device and actually reduces shoulder kick of shotguns and rifles to a mere "shove". The makers claim that it reduces fatigue and increases shooting enjoyment greatly. The new stock is on general sale now in America. It is a stock within a stock, the inner spring taking the effects

of recoil. The second ingenious contraption at this year's Grand American was the "Taylor-made" umbrella. This comprises a two-thirds size normal man's size umbrella fitted with a skull-cap in the centre section. The skull-cap fits over the shooter's head and thus automatically fixes a water diverter by means of the umbrella above the cap. The contraption provides the shooter with complete freedom from interference by rain whilst shooting. It is called "Taylor-made" for the reason that it was fashioned by 62-year-old shooter, Joe Taylor, of East McKeesport, Pa., and his nephew Walt. Taylor.

Bathurst Gun Club, west of the Blue Mountains area of New South Wales, will shoot day and evening of Saturday, November 16. Shooting will start at 10 a.m. Main day event is the Central Western District of N.S.W. Single-barrel Championship this event will be preceded by a series of 10 and 15-target events. At night the Central Western Districts of N.S.W. Night Double-barrel title will be disposed of. Trophies have been presented by I.C.I.A.N.Z. Ltd., and Messrs. F. W. Green & Co. There are possibilities of a new club being formed at Millicent in South Australia, on the Adelaide side of Mount Gambier. A report from that area indicates that some part of the organisation is at present under way.

A shooter in Western Australia recently wrote to the A.C.T.A. requesting the October 1961, October 1962 and November 1962, back issues of "News". Fortunately one or two of these back issues were available, and the parcel has gone forward to the interested shooter, who claims he will then have a complete library of all issues.

The statement of receipts and expenditure of the Camberwell Clay Target Club was presented to members at the annual meeting of the club, held in the Supper Room of the Camberwell Town Hall (V.) on Thursday, October 3. The club revealed that its income from all sources was $\pounds 2,363/6/11$ and expenditure was $\pounds 2,161/18/1$, leaving a surplus of $\pounds 201/8/10$. With the accumulated funds brought forward, amounting to $\pounds 995/12/6$, gave a final figure of $\pounds 1,197/1/4$, a very satisfactory state of affairs and one that the club management can indeed be proud of.

This column is again indebted to the interest of veteran sportsman. Charles Loughland, who not infrequently dives deep into the archives of his treasure chest of sporting information and comes up with an ancient book or two which carries much old-time information. The most much old-time information. The most recent "donation" includes a couple of copies of the American "Outdoors Magazine" under the dates of Decem-ber 1915 and January 1917. In the latter edition considerable information on clay trapshooting is men-tioned. Of interest to present-day trapshooters is the reference to the performance of a Mrs. Ad Topperwein, who late in 1916 broke 1,952 clays out of a possible 2,000, from what is termed "a regulation auto-matic trap" on the grounds of the Montgomery (Alabama) Country Club. In performing this feat Mrs. Topperwein is claimed to have broken all previous records for trapshooting. The previous best, up to this period, appears to have been 965 out of 1,000 in a shooting match between John

W. Garrett of Colorado Springs, Colo., and John Rohrer, when Garrett gained the honours. Mrs. Topperwein is reported to have used a gun weighing 7½ lbs., and its weight caused her to tire considerably during the effort. From first to last shot her time was 5 hours 20 minutes, but her actual shooting time was assessed at less than 34 hours. Mrs. Topperwein finished strongly, breaking 98 out of her final 100. However, she suffered severely with a blistered hand from the barrel which at times grew so hot that it was necessary to apply cold water to the gun. In her mara-thon effort Mrs. Topperwein had break_sequences of 106, 111, 139 and 280. From an accompanying picture it would appear that Mrs. Topperwein used the regular pump gun so popular in American transhooting circles.

Shooters of a by-gone era, particularly those associated with livebird shooting, will regret to learn of the passing late in September of Frank A. Tubb, a one-time secretary of the Melbourne Gun Club and also one-time secretary of the Victorian Gun Clubs' Association. The writer was talking to the deceased the day before he passed on and he gave no indication of feeling in any way unwell except that he mentioned that his eyes were failing. It is understood he collapsed in a Melbourne city street. Sympathy is extended to his widow and family.

The International Shooting Union (Union Internationale de Tir) has advised that the 1963 World Championships, arranged at a meeting in Cairo (Egypt) to be held under the supervision of the Shooting Federation of Venezuela, will not take place. It is understood the Venezuela Federation started preparatory work, but recently came to the conclusion that the Championships could not take place before the beginning of 1964. The reason for the postponement being the close proximity of the Presidential elections in that country. As 1964 will be the year of the Olympic Games, the International Shooting Union feels that a World Championship series would not be appropriate. It seems likely that the next World series will take place in Chile in 1965 — this date will allow

all nations interested more time for preparation. Lebanon offered to take over for 1963 in place of Venezuela, but again time was against the proposal and, as already stated, the International Union is refraining from approving a 1963 World contest.

"Keep both eyes open" is a rule that must be adhered to if one is to become an expert trapshot. This rule should be strongly impressed upon beginners because the natural impulse is to close one eye. Take an experiment. Secure a cane or stick of wood and pretend it is a gun, select some object to aim at, fix both eyes on the subject and then bring the "gun" (or stick) to the shoulder. Don't then close one eye and look instinctively along the stick to see if you have pointed correctly. Be sure you do and check whether the stick was pointing just right. You wouldn't shut one eye when playing billiards, golf, tennis or any other game that requires co-ordination of eye and hand. Two eyes are always better than one, and if you have two, don't close one when shooting at swiftflying clay targets. Occasionally a person naturally right-handed is the possessor of a left eye that is stronger than, and master of, his right eye. Few persons are aware of this condition in themselves. If it exists, it will cause poor shooting. You can readily ascertain the relative strength of your eyes for yourself, that is providing you do not want to go to an oculist. Fasten the gaze, with both eyes open, on small but prominent object in your room, then throw up your right arm, pointing at the object with the first (or index) finger as if it was the barrel of a pistol. Hold it there for an instant or two, then close the left eye, and if you are right-eyed — that is, your right eye is the master of your leftthe finger will be found to be point-ing right at the object. Then, as a matter of curiosity, open the left eye and close the right - the finger will then apparently be pointing away off to the right of the object. If, however, the reverse is the case - that is, if when you close the left eye the finger seems to be pointing to the left of the object - then your left eye is the master. In that case you should either learn to shoot from the left shoulder, or, if you still stick to

the right shoulder, have your gun stock bent so that when it comes up into position, the rib is aligned immediately under the left eye. But in any case, use both eyes when shooting, for each does its necessary part. The few shooters who do good work at the traps with one eye closed should probably be considered as the exceptions which prove the rule.



A.C.T.A. OFFICIAL REFEREE EXAMINATION

COMMENTS BY EXAMINER

Some 148 candidates lodged applications to take part in the examination, and of this number, no fewer than 129 papers were returned. This is particularly pleasing. A few candidates found it inconvenient to take the examination.

The number who succeeded in securing sufficient marks to secure a pass in this, the theoretical section, of the examination was an excellent average. However, many lost marks for indifferent presentation and careless preparation of their answers. Others also failed to gain marks because they submitted an answer and then an alternative answer. In answering an examination paper the candidate must be definite. To those who took the trouble to thoroughly study the A.C.T.A. Rules, fullest appreciation is paid.

Successful candidates in the written section of the examination should now arrange with one of the official examiners (as listed in "News") to undergo the practical section of the examination. Once having been considered satisfactory by a referee examiner (following the written test), candidates then become eligible to receive the Official A.C.T.A. Referee Badge. Once the Official Badge is received, do not merely add it to the collection on your shooting jacket and forget about the Official Referees' obligation — that is, to indicate at all times that the wearer is willing and able to assist at his own club as well as at any club which he may visit from time to time.

RESULTS

PASS

ANDERSON, K.: 84. — This candidate should check on rules dealing with single - barrel shooting. Also distance and height targets should be thrown.

ALLEN, B. B.: 93. — This candidate has completed a good paper, but does not appear to be clear on rules governing single-barrel shooting.

BURTON, R.: 87. — While the answers given by this candidate are good, he should check rules dealing with shooting from handicap mark. Also decision when more than one competitor shoots at the target.

BROWN, E.: 89. — Most of the questions have been well answered except for No. 4, in which the candidate did not appear to know what decision to give. Also there is nothing in the rules which states that slow pulls are not allowed for in Deauville doubles.

BIRCH, J.: 82. — The answers submitted by this candidate were satisfactory, but he should study rules governing loading of guns and onus of shooter in this respect, also shooting for "birds only".

BURGESS, A. M.: 84. — While most of the questions were well answered, this candidate should study the rules dealing with slow pulls. Also correct procedure Referee should take when dealing with gun malfunctions, his answer to question No. 8 was quite incorrect.

CLAY, D.: 96. — The paper submitted by this candidate was very good and indicated a good general knowledge of the rules.

CAIRNS, C.: 87. — Most of the answers on this paper were lacking in detail and several were not fully answered.

CHAMPNEY, M.: 87. — This candidate does not appear to be clear on rules covering correct loading of gun and the responsibility of the shooter in this case. Also Rule 36 should be studied more fully.

CHALLIS, J.: 83. — This candidate should give further study to the rules dealing with double - rise shooting, also correct procedure in the event of a misfire.



CLARKE, I. T.: 94. — The answers on this paper were good and gave evidence that the candidate knows most of the Rules well.

He should check on Rules dealing with slow pulls in Deauville - double shooting.

COLLIS, W.: 100. — This candidate has shown that he has a very good knowledge of the Rules; all questions were well and fully answered.

CHRISTENSEN, N.: 90. — While the conditions covering championships are not in the rules given, it is necessary for Referees to know the conditions and he should know that there are Commonwealth Walk - up Championships. Most of the other questions were well answered.

COMERFORD, T. W.: 82. — This candidate should give further study to rules governing shooting for birds only. Also shooters shooting out of turn. Answers to other questions well answered.

CHISHOLM, P. K.: 93. — Most of the questions were well answered, but answers on distances and yardages lacked detail.

CRIPPS, E.: 90. — The answers given by this candidate were both full and correct, but he should study rules governing Deauville-double shooting.

DAY, M.: 90. — This candidate has answered all questions well except for No. 6, which was quite incorrect. Also No. 14 was not fully answered.

ETHELL, Dr. C. S.: 83. — Most of the answers on this paper were reasonably good, but the candidate should check on procedure when dealing with malfunctions. Also it is necessary for a Referee to have a general knowledge of championship conditions.

EVANS, C. D.: 80. — This candidate appears to have a fair idea of the Rules, but some of his answers lacked detail and some questions were not fully answered. He would be advised to study correct procedure in dealing with malfunctions.

GALL, C. J.: 90. — This candidate has given good answers to most questions, but should check on size of clay targets. Also how to determine the correct height clay targets shall be thrown. He should also check on rules for conducting walk - up championships.

GRUMMETT, D. J.: 93. — The answers given on this paper were quite good, but points were lost by lack of detail on questions 7 and 13.

GILLESPIE, J.: 98. — This candidate shows a good knowledge of the Rules and has submitted a very good paper.

GRAY, J. A.: 95.—All the questions were well answered except No. 17. Quite a good paper.

GROVER, J. M.: 81.—The majority of the answers given are quite good, but the answers to Nos. 2-3-8 indicate that the rules relating to them should receive further study.

GLASSON, A.: 86. — The answer given to question No. 11 was quite incorrect and rules on double-rise shooting should be checked. The remaining questions were well answered, but lacked detail.

GITTOES, R. J.: 82. — This candidate has passed his theory paper, but before attempting any actual refereeing he should study rules relating to questions 3 and 11 dealing with baulks and double-rise shooting.

HAYMAN, G.: 100. — All of the answers submitted were very good in interpretation and detail. An excellent paper.


HENN, C. A.: 93. — This candidate appears to have a very good knowledge of the Rules except for those dealing with handicap shooting. The answer to question No. 1 was incorrect.

HASTIE, J.: 83. — The answers to Nos. 10 and 15 were inncorrect. The rules governing slow pulls and onus on the shooter to load his gun correctly should receive further study. All other questions well answered.

HASLAM, N. E.: 86. — This candidate submitted an incorrect answer to No. 8 and has failed to give the correct procedure in his answer to No. 18. All other questions well answered.

HAY, I. 85. — This candidate lost points for failing to answer question No. 4 and incorrectly answering No. 11. He would be well advised to study the rules dealing with doublerise shooting.

JONES, J. J.: 94. — The answer to question No. 10 was incorrect. Otherwise the paper returned by this

candidate was a good one, indicating a good knowledge of the Rules.

JONES, G. J.: 98. — All questions except for No. 8 were well answered. The answer to No. 8 was lacking in detail only, otherwise a good paper.

JONES, S. J.: 94. — This candidate has submitted a good paper and shows good knowledge of the Rules. He would be well advised to study the rules governing the answer to No. 8 question.

JESSEN, A. C.: 92.—All questions excepting Nos. 6 and 16 were well answered. The candidate appears to know the Rules well, but should check up on double-rise shooting rules.

KILGALLON, A. J.: 92. — The answers given on this paper were both full and clear, but the rule on Deauville-double shooting should be studied.

KINSEY, R. H.: 86. — Most of these answers are quite good, but the answers to Nos. 8 and 10 were incorrect. Further study should be given to procedure dealing with malfunctions and also rules dealing with slow pulls.

KENT, A.: 89. — The answer given to No. 17 by this candidate was most vague. Also not sufficient detail given to Nos. 7, 16 and 18. Otherwise a good paper.

KEOGH, W.: 91. — This candidate shows that he has a good knowledge of the rules, as all questions excepting Nos. 7 and 15 were well answered.

KING, R.: 84.—The answers given in this paper were lacking in detail. Nos. 8 and 11 were incorrect. In reference to the answer to No. 1, such drastic action as disqualifying a shooter is not warranted.

MUDFORD, C. G.: 83. — Questions 8 and 10 were incorrectly answered, but all other questions were well answered. Rules dealing with slow pulls and jammed shells and procedure for dealing with same should be studied.

MATHIESON, I. W.: 91. — This candidate has given the wrong answer to question No. 15, as the gun was not correctly loaded for the event. Otherwise all the questions were well answered.

MARKS, K. A.: 84. — Questions Nos. 8 and 10 were answered wrongly and rules dealing with these questions should be studied. Also rule governing shooting for birds only in State championships. Other questions well answered.

McKEAN, W. A.: 81. — This candidate has answered most questions well, but two, namely 8 and 10, were quite wrong. Also answer to No. 5 was lacking in detail. The Rules should be learned more thoroughly.

MOLONEY, L.: 81. — The paper submitted by this candidate indicates that he does not have a thorough knowledge of the Rules, as his answers to Nos. 7-13-16 and 17 were not complete. He should give further study to the rules relating to these questions. Also to single-barrel shooting.

MACLEAN, R. J.: 81. — Questions Nos. 3-8-17 were answered wrongly, and as several other answers were lacking in detail, the candidate should give more time to study the Rules fully.

MAUGHAN, C.: 88. — This candidate did not answer question No. 8 correctly and did not give any detail to Nos. 16 and 17. All other questions well answered.

MILTON, W.: 89. — This candidate should check rules on single-barrel shooting. Also on baulks, as the answers were incorrect to questions 2 and 3. Otherwise this was a good paper.

MERCURIO, A. E.: 88. — Answers to questions 8 and 10 were incorrect and rules relating to these questions should be given further study. All other questions were well answered.

NEILSON, H. E.: 100. — This candidate has furnished a particularly good paper which indicates that he has given quite a lot of time to study the Rules and thought to the answers.

NORTON, J.: 96. — In answer to questions 1 and 3, this candidate tended to express personal ideas rather than the rules. Other than these two answers, all other questions were well answered.

NEILSON, J. P.: 99. — Except for lack of detail to answer No. 16, this candidate has completed a particularly good paper.

OLIVER, M. D.: 100.—The answers by this candidate were very good and indicate this candidate has a thorough knowledge of the Rules. OLIVER, L. F.: 94. — This candidate has furnished a very good paper, but would be advised to read the rules dealing with slow pulls and Deauville-double shooting.

O'KEEFE, J. B.: 89. — The answer given to question No. 11 was incorrect. No. 7 incomplete, otherwise a good paper.

PINNER, G. J.: 83. — This candidate has given incorrect answers to questions 1 and 11. Also No. 16 was lacking in detail. The rules relating to these questions should be given further study.

POWELL, T.: 94. — All questions except for No. 10 were well answered and there is every indication that this candidate has a good knowledge of the Rules.

PULFORD, K. H.: 95. — The answers submitted by this candidate were quite good, indicating a good understanding of the Rules.

QUIRE, P. M.: 87. — The answer to No. 8 in this paper was incorrect, and the answers to Nos. 14 and 16 were not complete.

RUSHFORD, M. T.: 92. — All questions except No. 10 were well answered with full detail. The rule relating to slow pulls and Deauvilledouble shooting should be checked on.

RHEDEY, A. A.: 87.—The answers given by this candidate indicate that he has a good knowledge of the Rules, but the answers to Nos. 7 and 16 were not complete.

RIDGE, L. S.: 98. — This candidate has completed a very good paper and appears to have put in a lot of study on the Rules.

SINGLETON, N. E.: 84. — As this candidate has given incorrect answers to questions 10 and 15, it may be suggested that he give further study to the rules relating to slow pulls and correct loading of gun by competitor. Other than these, all other questions were well answered.

SHEPHERD, R.: 90. — All answers except the one for No. 10 were well presented and show a good knowledge of the Rules by the candidate.

SMITH, D. A.: 92. — Except for the fact that this candidate does not appear to know how to deal with an instance when a shell is jammed, he appears to have a very good idea of the Rules.

STEEN, M.: 90. — Except for an incorrect answer to No. 8, and an incomplete answer to No. 16, this candidate has forwarded a paper with plenty of detail and accurate interpretation of the Rules.

TILLEY, M.: 85. — All questions except Nos. 8 and 10 were accurate. Rules on procedure for dealing with jammed shells and slow pulls should be studied.

THIELE, M. B.: 89. — Question No. 8 was wrongly answered. Also the answer to No. 17 was only partly answered. Otherwise a good paper.

TREASURE, R.: 100. — Every answer on this paper was complete and accurate, indicating a good knowledge of the Rules.

TREASURE, J.: 94. — All answers except for No. 10 were quite good, indicating that the candidate has a good knowledge of the Rules.

VON SENDEN, N.: 89. — This candidate has wrongly answered No. 2 question and did not appear to be clear as to a decision for No. 10, otherwise a good paper.

WHITLA, C. F.: 83. — This candidate should study the rules applying to Nos. 3 and 8 questions, as the answers were incorrect. Also No. 7 answer was not complete.

WOOLLEN, R.: 89. — Most of the answers in this paper were very good, but points were lost by lack of detail in Nos. 7-13-16. Also should check on Referee's procedure when dealing with jammed shells.

WALKER, E. V.: 89. — This candidate should read the rule relating to shooting from allotted mark. Also Rule No. 36. Answer to No. 1 was incorrect.

WEAVER, E. D.: 90.—The answer to No. 10 question was incorrect. Also No. 7 was lacking in detail. Otherwise a good, clear set of answers.

WILSON, R.: 84. — Two questions, Nos. 3 and 10, were incorrectly answered. Candidate should also check rules on claims for baulks, also slow pulls. The answers to Nos. 13 and 16 lacked detail. All other answers quite good.

WATTS, J.: 92. — All the answers given by this candidate were very good except for No. 8. The correct procedure to be used by Referee when checking faults should be studied.

WENBAN, R. E.: 80. — The answers to Nos. 3 and 9 were incorrect. Also several others were not complete. This candidate should give more study to the Rules.

WENBAN, B.: 86. — By the incorrect answers to question No. 10, it would appear that this candidate should give more time to studying the Rules, particularly slow pulls and rules governing double-rise shooting.

WALKER, R. A.: 94. — The answere given by this candidate were quite clear and complete, indicating a good knowledge of the Rules. The rule dealing with claims for baulks should be studied more thoroughly.

WORRALL, A. G.: 91. — Except for incorrect answers to Nos. 10 and 17, this candidate has submitted a good paper. Rules concerning these two questions should be studied further.

WAIT, K. R.: 91. — This candidate has furnished quite a good paper, but the answers to 5 and 7 were not complete. The rule governing "birds only" shooting should be studied.

WILLIAMS, B. F.: 85. — Questions 8 and 10 were not correctly answered. Also the answers to Nos. 13 and 14 were not complete. All other answers quite good.

WILLIAMS, W. F.: 86. — The answers to questions 8 and 10 were not correct. Also the answers to Nos. 13-16 were lacking in detail.

FAIL

ANDERSON, L.: 50. — It would appear from the answers submitted this candidate has not studied the Rules very thoroughly.

ANDERSON, A. R.: 73. — The rules dealing with height and distance targets should be thrown, should be studied. Also rules on slow pulls and procedure when checking for malfunctions.

ADAMS, R.: 70. — The answers to questions 3-8 and 11 were incorrect. The Rules should be studied more fully.

ANDERSON, P. A.: 75. — This candidate, by his answers, tends to be making his own rules. He should study the rule dealing with slow pulls.

BOYLAND, T.: 64. — This candidate appears not to have a very clear knowledge of the Rules. He should remember that the Rules must be adhered to and "Personal Decisions" are not allowed.

BEASY, K.: 70. — This candidate should give further study to the Rules, particularly those dealing with malfunctions and correct procedure in handling them.

BLACKWELL, R.: 71. — By the answers submitted, it would appear that this candidate does not know the rules covering slow pulls, shooting of double rise and correct procedure for dealing with malfunctions.

CHIZZOTI, E.: 75. — This candidate has answered several questions incorrectly and shows a general lack of knowledge of the Rules.

CONSTABLE, K. H.: 71. — Candidate has the interest of the shooter at heart, but should remember that the Rules must be carried out and personal ideas must not be exercised.

CASEY, P.: 75. — The answers submitted indicate that this candidate should give further study to the Rules, particularly those dealing with malfunctions and correct procedure.

DENSLEY, L.: 71. — The answers given to questions 11-16-17-18 were quite vague and indicate that this candidate should give further study to the Rules.

DURDIN, T.: 46. — This candidate should study the Rules more fully, as his answers indicate he has very little knowledge of any of them.


DENSLEY, K.: 71. — In this paper questions 3-7-16-17-18 were poorly answered and several other answers were lacking in detail.

FLETCHER, D.: 69. — The rules dealing with malfunctions and correct procedure by Referee should be studied.

HUSSEY, K.: 74. — The answers to questions 1-3-11 were incorrect and the majority of the other answers lack detail.

HAMMER, A. C.: 69. — The answers to questions 3-8-18 were not correct and several other questions were vaguely answered. This candidate should give further study to the Rules.

JESSUP, L.: 57. — The answers to Nos. 1-3-6-6-7-8-10 were quite incorrect and the remainder were poorly answered. By these answers it can be gathered that the candidate has a very limited knowledge of the Rules.

MARSH, C. J.: 68. — In this paper Nos. 2 - 10 - 15 were incorrectly answered, and all the other answers indicate a poor knowledge of the Rules.

LEWIS, T. S.: 72. — The answers given to Nos. 3-10-12 were incorrect. The rules relating to baulks, slow pulls and two shooters shooting at one bird should be studied.

MacDONALD, H.A.: 64. — By the answers submitted by this candidate it would appear that he has not a clear knowledge of the Rules. He would be well advised to study the Rules further, particularly those dealing with double-rise and double-barrel shooting. Also procedure for dealing with malfunctions or jammed shells.

MILES, E. R.: 70. — This candidate has not answered questions 8-10-13 correctly and was quite vague with several others. He should study rules No. 24 and 25, as these are most important.

MARKS, I. A.: 76. — In this paper questions 5-8-10 were incorrectly answered. Several other answers were lacking in detail.

McINTOSH, E. J.: 69. — Most of the answers in this paper were poor. Questions 3-8-10 were wrongly answered. All this indicates that the candidate has not studied the Rules very well.

MITCHELL, H. M.: 65. — Questions 1-3-6-10 were answered incorrectly. The majority of the other answers were very vague. This candidate should give a lot more study to the Rules.

OUT OF THE PAST Twenty Five Years Ago

One-time Seymour shooter, the late Jack Reid, won the 1938 Commonwealth Skeet Championship, which was shot on the grounds of now extinct Field Shooters' Club. The report of the day stated that "Commonwealth Skeet Championship was a title seldom spoken of with the same enthusiasm as down-the-line contests at clays". The report further goes on to say that "the field brought together most of the stylists among southern States shooters". Reid's winning aggregate was 17/20, strangely missing three of the singles.

Commonwealth Single-barrel Championship of 1938 was won by H. Munnings of Kempton (Tasmania). He was the first Tasmanian to win the title since the late Charlie Keane gained the honour several years

previously. The event was shot on the then grounds of the Tasmanian Gun Club at King's Meadows, Launceston. Munnings was not sighted until about the 15th round, but he put in an excellent finish to win well, shooting his last 20 straight (singlebarrel). In those days all championships were shot off the centre track and each competitor shot singly. It is mentioned that this contest, under single-barrel conditions, took no less than three hours to complete. The late Charlie Corbett, a veteran of the early Nobel Club days, won a £5 Handicap at a Coburg fixture, while Percy Dennis won the main event at the Victorian Clay Target Club at Bentleigh and gained a free entry into the Champion of Champions Cup.

VANDALIA.—Albert Kees, sporting probably the oldest gun in a record field of 2,530 shooters, became the eighth shooter in the 64 years of the Grand American to post a 100 in winning the coveted Grand American Handicap of 1963.

The 61-year-old Richmond, Ind., machinist, took the day off work and drove the 39 miles to the Grand to shoot. He lost a day's pay, but toted home nearly \$9,000 for his work at the traps.

"I usually attend the week's programme at the Grand, but the people I work for have been so good to me that I decided to come up this year just for the big one," Kees said. Kees, who operates the Richmond'

Kees, who operates the Richmond' Trap Club, owns some 30 guns, but his favourite is a gun he "ashamedly" admitted he paid only \$75 for four years ago.

"It's at least 26 years old. They quit making them in 1937," Kees said. "It has a nickel steel barrel and they don't make them any more, either," he continued. "When I bought the gun all I wanted was the metal workings. The wood was so rotten it was falling apart."

Kees not only put a new stock on the gun, but he performed the difficult task of installing a release trigger himself. Instead of squeezing the trigger, he holds on to it until he wants to fire and then lets go of it. The 21-yard shooter's gun weighs two pounds heavier than the average trap-gun, and Kees has a piece of lead in the stock to absorb kick.

He has attended every Grand since 1949, but never had won a title. Kees began shooting trap in 1948, when he could shoot for free while running the Old Trail Rifle Club. He is proud of the fact he was Richmond's first registered trap shooter, and there are now some 50.

His previous high score in handicap shooting was a 97 shot 13 years ago. "I never gave it a thought about

"I never gave it a thought about winning," Kees explained, "but I feel like I can shoot real well. After all, I've lived with guns all my life. When I get my set pattern I'll go all the way if I'm not interrupted. I got that pattern and nothing interrupted me."

Ball State Coed Wins

It was for sure there would be a reporter of a Grand American Handicap title for the first time when Sharon Kingen and Elizabeth Dickey toed the line for a shoot-off after each broke 97 during the programme.

Sharon Kingen and Elizabeth Dickey toed the line for a shoot-off after each broke 97 during the programme. The 18-year-old Miss Kingen of McCordsville, Ind., had won the women's title in 1961, and Mrs. Dickey of Anderson, Ind., was the defending champion. Miss Kingen, who shoots every day at her father's gun club while not away in school at Ball State Teachers' College, defeated the 1962 champion, 24/21, to become the first G.A.H. repeating champion.

The sub-junior title went to 13year-old Frank R. Fincel of Dubuque, Iowa. His 98 also tied 12 other shooters, including Dayton's Bruce Shoup, for sixth place overall. The 75-pound Fincel and Dana Stewart, Lancaster, were left after 11 fell by the side in shoots-off.

Stewart dropped his 73rd target, but little Fincel missed his final (75th).

Kees' win from the 21-yard line snapped a three-year string of winners from the 20-yard line and his 100 was the first since Roy Foxworthy did it in 1960.

The early bird didn't get the worm in the Grand American preliminary handicap.

Instead, 30-year-old Bill Lawless of Cambridge, O., shooting 1,933rd in a field of 2,035 trap shooters, carted home \$8,000 by breaking 99 x 100 from 23 yards with a gun that he had bought only a week ago and "sold" before the shoot. Twelve other shooters posted 98's before Lawless' 99 came, and it looked like A.T.A. officials were going to have the biggest shoot-off in history before Lawless "saved" them.

It was near 3 o'clock when Lawless' squad, the 386th of 405, toed the line.

"I knew top score was 98 when I started, but I didn't know I had won it until I looked at the scoreboard," he said.

Among the dozen 98's were 14year-old Tim Phillips of Hamler, O., and 39-year-old Mary M. Sullivan of Indianapolis.

Mrs. Sullivan's 98 barely nosed out young up-and-coming shooter Laura Louise Mote of New Madison for the women's title. Miss Mote had a 97. In the shoot-off with the dozen 98's Phillips broke 50 straight for runnerup and the juniors title. Another junior, 15-year-old Craig Hall of West Concord, Minn., had 98, but couldn't match Phillips' pace in the shoot-off.

Trotwood's Kent T. Stauffer was just one off for junior laurels with a 97.

Mrs. Sullivan was second in the shoot-off and third overall to give her the highest finish for a woman ever in the preliminary handicap. The mother of two daughters and president of the Sullivan Arms Reloading Corporation succeeds Mrs. Annette Schimenz, who last year finished fourth in this event.

Professional winner was James J. Bourgeois of Jackson, Miss., with a 96.

EXTRACTS FROM THE WRITINGS OF THE LATE W. P. GROSVENOR

(One-time coach of English International Teams, as written to A.C.T.A. Secretary in mid-1940's.)

At times I, like other old men, find my recollections of my very early days appear to have a certain interest to young listeners, who profess to enjoy hearing of the days when sails had not been ousted by steam, pirates were still not unknown, and the romance and glamour lurked around one's affairs.

I do not mean that I can draw a picture such as Clark Russell could, but, in a way, I can remember many interesting things, both as happening to myself, those which are "hearsay" of others, now long dead, and of long ago diaries of voyages left by some relatives of mine. One in particular of a voyage to Australia about 1830, which took all of four and a half months.

In my own early days every ship I had anything to do with used to carry a stand of arms (old Snider rifles) in a rack round the mizzen mast, which passed through the cabin saloon under the poop deck. Also the early days of the Australian gold discoveries when a Colt Cap and Ball revolver would fetch as much as forty pounds, yes, and more, too. As a great-uncle of mine recorded in a

letter, he having taken two Colts out with him, quickly sold one as soon as the ship docked in Australia, and I expect the other one went, too, as he never mentioned it again. However, the bulk of my own associations was with sailing ships and early steamers plying to Chinese waters. Here was romance and adventure indeed. I was privileged to know and remember one of my great-uncles who lived to make a small fortune in the East as a small ship owner and sailing one of his own vessels. We would like to remember him as to his reprehensible opium-smuggling activities and that his ship carried guns, and always with a "long stern gun" to enable him to out-sail and get away from the Chinese men-ofwar who were trying to curtail his activities — this, said "Long Tom" on more than one occasion, enabled him to do some damage to rigging and escape pursuit.


How I would love to see a fullrigged ship again, with her cloud of canvas, or even one of the early steamers, with a schooner bow and schooner rigged, such as some of the later Duncan Dunbar steamers were, largely relying on sails with the engine as a sort of fall back to when the wind failed.

The world is very small. Recently at Hove (Sussex) I contact a tradesman and was astounded to find that he was an old-timer in boxing circles. We compared early recollections, especially the fight between Frank Slavin and the "Coffee Cooler" Frank Slade. I saw this fight, which lasted exactly 29 seconds, Slavin winning it through adopting tactics inspired by Charlie Mitchell, the old English heavyweight scrapper.

Getting back to shooting. I was once at a gathering of the leading lights in the old live pigeon days. One of them was Elijah Moore, who once won the Grand Prix at Monte Carlo, and we were discussing an incident in which an English shooter lost this valuable Grand Prix prize by being TOO GOOD A SHOT. He was in the position of stopping his bird to win outright and had actually killed his bird with his first barrel and it was falling close inside the boundary fence, most certainly stone dead. However, he punched in his second barrel to make sure of it (almost automatically) and, to his horror and also to that of his supporters, hit it so hard it was blown over the top of the fence and so a lost bird. When picked up, it was found that the charge had combined or balled to the extent that it had struck the dead bird so hard that it had literally blown it over. A most ironical way of losing a big event. Charges seldom ball to this extent, but I once smashed a driven partridge at all of 30 yards so completely that there was little left of it.


What sort of duck shooting do you get on your side of the Globe, I do not know. Just around here (the Broads district) used to be a paradise for duck shooting, both for mallard, pochard and tufted duck, but in recent years it has fallen off very badly. All the Broads swarm with coot, and these have to be kept down by organised shoots, as they eat the same weed as the duck do, and also, being pugnacious, they kill the young ducklings and do their best to harry the duck.




