

The Editor's Notebook



A.C.T.A. SHOOTING RULES. Due to the fact that one or two anomalies appeared in the A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules as published a few months ago, it has been decided to re-publish the Shooting Rules and also the Championship Conditions in their entirety so that all registered will have a full and complete copy of the Rules and Conditions of Championships available to retain in his gun case.

In the A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules section the number of Rules has been reduced from 100 to 99. Rule No. 26 has been altered to bring it into line with the new system of double-rise shooting, and this Rule will now read,

"The score of a competitor in double target shooting shall be shown as one (1) point for each 'kill' as broken by the competitor's shot. Two barrels must not be fired at one target."

The foregoing is quite realistic and means that for each "kill" recorded by the competitor he now scores one point. Previously only pairs counted and a shooter could miss one and hit the other target of a pair and yet record no score. Now every target shot gains the shooter one point. It is very important, however, to remember that a competitor must fire at "a pair of targets", not merely concentrate on shooting one of a pair and then hoping that such a score would bring him into the prize list.

As previously announced, the word "English" has been deleted from Rule 46. An addendum to the Rule No. 65 is the following, "The shooter must shoot at a complete pair on every occasion. Each 'kill' shall score one (1) point."

Rule No. 72 has been deleted, as also has Rule No. 75. The lattermentioned Rules were, on investigation, found to be a replica of Rule No. 74, although couched in slightly different language. The previous Rule No. 74 now becomes Rule No. 73 and all remaining previous Rules are numbered two forward on the earlier brochure. Rule No. 90 has been altered to read as Rule No. 88, with the context, "All tie shoots in Com-monwealth, State and District Championships will be shot squad system, first miss-out, excepting walk-up and mixed championships." Conditions to the two last-mentioned events are outlined in the Championship Conditions Brochure.

Championship Conditions. The new Championship Conditions Brochure has been amended in accordance with recent new conditions as laid down by the Executive Committee. It will be noted that every Championship Condition differs from the previous Championship Conditions Brochure in some way. For instance, in all the double-barrel title events, tie shoots are now required to be shot "squad system, first miss-out". The same applies in single-barrel and double-rise events. Due to the variation of the contest, all mixed conditions for championships remain as previously.

In walk-up conditions it is impossible to shoot this under miss-out conditions, so the following has been emphasised (Walk-up), referring to the number of targets: "The competitor will shoot at five or ten targets at each visit, in whichever order the management may decide." In this connection some controversy has from time to time arisen regarding the method of assembling the competitors, in that some clubs have ordained that the competitors should fire five straight off, whilst others have directed that the competitors should fire at one target and then return to the rear of the squad of five and take his place on the firing point every fifth target. Now the position is that clubs are permitted to shoot these events in whichever order they consider is fair and appropriate. In double-rise conditions, where it previously instructed that pairs only would count and count as one point, the section of the Championship Conditions referring to double-rise now reads, "Each competitor to shoot at five pairs at each visit, five tracks squad system and score each 'kill' as one point." In the State Intermediate section it has been laid down by that "State Inter-mediate Deauville Doubles Championship shall be shot from 18 yards". The previous reference to skeet shooting has been deleted and new and simplified skeet rules included. The section referring to tie shoots in Deauville Doubles now reads, "In the event of ties to be shot off miss-out from tracks 2 and 4." This direction should clear up quite a number of queries on this point.

Altogether it is felt that shooters will welcome the publication of the revised Shooting Rules and Championship Conditions, thereby assisting both the clubs and competitors and possibly doing away with frequent controversy. All Rules and Conditions apply as from June 1, 1964.

OFFICIAL REFEREE EXAMINATION. The previously published direction that Official Referee Examinations would be held every 12 months has been rescinded, and the new Executive Committee direction is that an official referee examination will be held "provided the Secretary

receives sufficient nominations and it is considered worth while conducting a series. Obviously, if only a few nominations are received for candidature in the referee examination, little purpose would be served in conducting a series. Accordingly the procedure in future will be as outlined. In order to test the possibilities in this regard, registered shooters desirous of participating in an official referee examination series are instructed to lodge their name and full address with the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, not later than July 31—earlier if possible. If, on that date, sufficient nominations are considered to have been received, an official referee examination will be held and candidates advised of requirements.



Clay Target Shooting Rules

Applicable from 1st June, 1964

COMPETITION.

Rule No. 1.—Wheresoever the word "competition" may be used in the following rules, it is to be understood to refer to each particular event, and must at all times be so construed by the management, in whose charge the carrying out of such "competition" has been entrusted.

THE MANAGEMENT.

Rule No. 2. — The management of any club holding a tournament, or other competition, under these rules has the authority to reject any entry in the said tournament, or other competition, without giving any reason therefore, and to disqualify in whole or in part, any competitor who acts in an ungentlemanly or disorderly manner, or who handles his gun dangerously.

COMPETITOR.

Rule No. 3.—A competitor is one who has nominated for the particular competition and whose name appears on the official score sheet or score board.

Rule No. 4.—A competitor must be at the firing point within two minutes after having been called by the official referee, scorer or a member of the club management. Failing therein, he may be disqualified or be penalised with loss of targets.

Rule No. 5. — A competitor shall hold his gun in a position of safety, with breech open at all times.

Rule No. 6. — When at the firing point ready for competition, the competitor shall distinctly give the command, "Pull", to the puller, and thereafter the competitor is in the competition.

Rule No. 7.—When firing, the competitor's feet must be behind the firing mark assigned to him, and he must stand with both feet within eighteen (18) inches on either side of the centre of this mark. Should

the competitor fail to observe the above rule, a "lost target" will be declared.

Rule No. 8. — Shooting on the grounds at any place other than the firing point at legitimate targets only is prohibited except where a pattern plate is installed.

Rule No. 9.— No competitor shall make, negotiate or discuss any bet (either on his own shooting or that of any other competitor) while he is at the firing point or shooting tracks, nor shall he leave the firing point or shooting tracks for the purpose of making, negotiating or discussing any bet. If any competitor infringes this rule, he may be disqualified by the referee.

Rule No. 10.—A competitor shall close his gun only when at the firing point and facing the traps. He must remove the cartridge or cartridges from his gun before turning from the firing point on No. 5 track and proceeding to No. 1 track. The cartridge or cartridges must be removed from any magazine gun between each track.

Rule No. 11. — It shall be the responsibility of the competitor to check his score with the score sheet before leaving the shooting track. Any protest on his score must be lodged with the referee immediately, i.e. before leaving the shooting track. Such protest can only be made against incorrect score.

Rule No. 12.—All such protests must be confirmed in writing within 15 minutes, accompanied by £1 forfeit.

Rule No. 13. — A competitor is duly notified to compete when his name is called out by a referee, scorer or other person authorised to do so by the management, or when his name appears on the score board. If a "squad hustler" is furnished, it

is a matter of courtesy only, and does not in the least relieve the competitor from responsibility. It is the duty of each and every competitor to be promptly on hand to compete when called upon to do so.

THE REFEREE.

Rule No. 14.—The Referee's decision in all cases coming under his jurisdiction as set forth in these rules, shall be final.

Rule No. 15.—Besides attending to the special duties as set forth in these rules, the Referee shall adjudicate the competition. He shall DISTINCTLY and LOUDLY announce the result of each shot by calling out "Kill" when the target is broken and "Lost" when the target is unbroken. He shall decide all other issues which arise in relation to the direct competition.

Rule No. 16.—If the Referee is negligent or inefficient, impairing thereby the equity of the competition, the management may forthwith remove him. This rule applies also to scorers, pullers, trappers and any other of the staff.

Rule No. 17. — The Referee is empowered to challenge the ammunition used by any competitor.

Rule No. 18. — The Referee shall insist that no competitor is permitted to shoot from other than his allotted handicap.

Rule No. 19. — The Referee has power to alter his decision.

Rule No. 20. — All members of a squad shall automatically change lanes as soon as the next shooter has shot and not wait until all shooters have shot. The members of any squad shall remain at the firing point until the last shot of the squad is fired.

THE SCORER.

Rule No. 21.—The Scorer shall keep an accurate record of each shot. Accordingly, the Referee call "Kill", or "Lost". He shall mark the figure 1 for "Kill" and 0 for "Lost".

Rule No. 22. — The Puller shall pull the trap, or traps, instantly in response to the competitor's call of "Pull".

Rule No. 23.. — The Puller shall have an unobstructed view of the competitors at the firing points.

BROKEN TARGET.

Rule No. 24.—A "broken target" (kill) is one which has at least a visible piece or pieces, or the centre section, broken from it, or which is completely reduced to dust, or which has a visible section broken from it, even though such section is broken into dust by the competitor's shot while in the air.

Rule No. 25.—A "dusted target" is one from which more or less dust is detached by the competitor's shot, but which shows no visible diminution in size therefrom. A dusted target is not a broken target, and is a "Lost" target.

Rule No. 26. — The score of a competitor in double target shooting shall be shown as one (1) point for each "kill" as broken by the competitor's shot. Two barrels must not be fired at one target.

BAULK.

Rule No. 27. — Any extraneous occurrence which, in the opinion of the Referee, materially interferes with the equity of the competitor after he calls, "Pull", constitutes a baulk. Only the competitor directly interested can claim a baulk, which, if allowed by the referee, restores him another target.

Rule No. 28. — In double-barrel shooting, jarring back denotes that from the concussion of the first shot the safety has been slipped back to "safe". Whatever may be the cause of slipping the safety back to "safe", the competitor must abide by the result.

Rule No. 29.—Simultaneous discharge is one wherein, from any cause, both barrels are discharged together or nearly together, and shall be declared "No target".

NO TARGET.

Rule No. 30. — After a referee declares a "no target" it is thereafter no part of the competition, and is irrelevant to it.

Rule No. 31.—"No target" shall be declared when a trap is sprung at a material interval of time before or after the call of "Pull".

Rule No. 32.—"No target" shall be declared when the trap is sprung without the call of "Pull".

Rule No. 33.—"No target" shall be declared when, in single-target shooting, two targets are thrown at the same time.

Rule No. 34.—"No target" shall be declared when the target is thrown at a widely different angle (see diagram).

Rule No. 35.—"No target" shall be declared when a competitor shoots out of turn, or from the wrong track.

Rule No. 36.—"No target" shall be declared when two competitors, or when a competitor and a noncompetitor, shoot at the same target.

Rule No. 37.—"No target" shall be declared when there is a misfire, in either barrel, caused by the competitor's gun, or a misfire of the cartridge, due to no neglect on the shooter's part.

Rule No. 38.—In the event of a misfire with the second barrel, the competitor must fire a live cartridge in the general direction of the target, and is permitted to score with the second barrel only.

Rule No. 39.—"No target" shall be declared (whether shot at or not) when a broken target is thrown.

LOST TARGET.

Rule No. 40.—"Lost target" shall be declared when the competitor fails to break the target.

Rule No. 41.—"Lost target" shall be declared when the competitor fails to shoot because his gun was unloaded or uncocked, or because the safety was faultily adjusted or jarred back, whether from his own oversight or not, or because of any other cause chargeable to his own oversight or neglect.

Rule No. 42.—A competitor having a misfire or apparent misfire, will, forthwith call the referee for his decision, otherwise the referee shall declare it a "lost" target. The competitor must not turn around, must not open his gun, and must keep his gun pointing in the direction of the traps.

Rule No. 43.—"Lost target" shall be declared if a cartridge after it has once misfired in the competition, or a gun after it has twice misfired in the competition, is used by the competitor. Rule No. 44.—"Lost target" shall be declared if in single-barrel shooting the competitor loads two cartridges. (A competitor is only allowed to load one cartridge and is not permitted to load an empty shell or dummy cartridge.)

Rule No. 45.—"Lost target" shall be declared if a competitor shoots from his wrong handicap mark.

CHALLENGE AND PROTEST.

Rule No. 46. - A competitor may challenge the load of any other competitor, such load shall not be greater than one and one-quarter ounce weight of shot struck measures nor larger in size than No. 6. On receipt of a written challenge, with £1 for-feit, the management shall obtain a cartridge from the challengee, and if, after public examination of it, the management finds the challengee has violated the above requirements, he may be disqualified or not, accordingly as the offence was wilfully committed or otherwise. In case the challengee is wholly innocent, the forfeit shall be paid to him, otherwise it shall be returned to the challenger. The management of any club, or of any tournament, has the power to examine any competitor's cartridges at their discretion, without involving themselves in any penalty.

OFFICIAL SCORE.

Rule No. 47. — The official score must be kept on a score sheet and be available for inspection by the competitor.

Rule No. 48. — Every competitor in a squad shall be permitted to examine his score sheet before the score sheet is sent to the Secretary's Office. The individual scores shall be totalled before being placed on the score boards.

WIDELY DIFFERENT ANGLE.

Rule No. 49.—When a target is thrown either way outside the prescribed limit of the angles, height and distance in single target shooting, it shall be deemed to be thrown at a widely different angle and "No target" shall be declared.

MAGAZINE GUN.

Rule No. 50.—The term "magazine gun" applies alike to automatic guns, pump guns (so called) and

other guns not directly dependent on hand loading and are permissible for clay target shooting.

SHOOTING FOR TARGETS ONLY.

Rule No. 51.—Shooting for targets only, is a term which shall be held to define the status of a competitor in any given event, or events, or in an entire tournament programme. and shall signify that a competitor who is "shooting for targets only" has no interest in any trophy, or trophies (unless he is entitled to do so by a specific announcement in the programme), nor any interest in any money, or moneys, the division of which depends on the scores made in said event, or events, or in the entire programme. "Shooting for targets only" shall not be allowed at open shoots or by any shooter who has attained the mark of 14 vards.

GUNS AND LOADS.

Rule No. 52.—A competitor shall not use a gun whose bore is LARGER than a twelve gauge.

Rule No. 53.—A competitor shall not use a load of shot greater than one and one-quarter ounce weight, struck measure, nor may a larger size of shot than No. 6 be used.

TARGETS, TRAPS, FLIGHTS, AND ANGLES, PITS AND SCREENS, FIRING POINTS.

Rule No. 54. — No target shall measure more than four and five-sixteenths $(4\frac{1}{10})$ inches in diameter, nor more than one and one-eighth $(1\frac{1}{5})$ inches in height.

Rule No. 55. — An automatic trap must be used at all open shoots.

SERGEANT SYSTEM.

Rule No. 56.—Five single traps, four feet apart, constitute the Sergeant System. The targets are thrown from unknown traps, at unknown angles. Maximum throw of traps to be 55 yards, minimum 30 yards. Limit mark to be 16 yards. Shoot from centre track.

FLIGHTS AND ANGLES.

Rule No. 57. — Targets, whether singles or doubles, shall be thrown not less than 45 yards nor more than 55 yards, with a flight of 9 feet high at a point 10 yards from the trap, with a margin of tolerance of not more than 18 inches, above or below.

Except in double target shooting, the flight of targets shall be at unknown angles, thrown within an area of 45 degrees right and left of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of number three firing point and prolonged through the centre of the central trap, or through the centre of the single trap when only one trap is used.

Rule No. 58.—To arrive at the proper height at which targets should be thrown as set forth in Rule 58, due allowance should be made according as the ground in front of the trap rises or falls away, and the flight of the targets 9 feet high at a point 10 yards from the trap is judged to be from an imaginary horizontal straight line drawn through No. 3 firing point through the single trap, or through the centre trap if the Sergeant System be used, and prolonged indefinitely.

Rule No. 59. — In single target shooting, to aid in distinguishing between target within and without bounds, two stakes (see Diagram II) not less than 3 feet in height shall be placed in the arc of a circle whose radii are 50 yards and whose centre is the centre of the single trap, or the centre of the central trap when three are used. Respectively, right and left at 45 degrees of the aforementioned imaginary straight line, two stakes shall be placed upright (see Diagram II).

PITS AND SCREENS.

Rule No. 60. - Trap houses shall be used to give full protection to the trappers. These houses shall be 3'3" high in front, tapering or sloping to 2'9" at the back, and shall be 6'0" from front to back, 8'0" wide. A tolerance of 3" either way is permissible on these dimensions. All height measurements shall be taken from the level of the centre lane. The trap shall be mounted in a manner which will bring the top centre oscillation of the throwing arm 14" above the level of the centre lane. A tolerance of 1" either side of this dimension is permissible.

FIRING POINTS.

Rule No. 61. — Firing points shall be three yards apart in the circumference of a circle whose radii are 16 yards (see Diagram I).

DISTANCE HANDICAPS.

Rule No. 62. — The distance handicaps, when used, shall be on prolongations of the lines given in Diagram I, commonly known as "fanshaped". The distance between the firing points, 16 yards, shall then be three yards (see Diagram III).

SQUADS.

Rule No. 63. — Competitors shall shoot in squads of five, except when there are less than five competitors available for the last squad of any programme event, or when there are

withdrawals from a squad or squads after the competition has begun.

DOUBLE TARGETS.

Rule No. 64. — In double target shooting there shall be squads of five at 16 yards. Double-rise shooting may be off handicap marks or such marks as the club management may decide, except in the case of Championships.

Rule No. 65.—Each double shall be thrown as a right and left quarterer, whose flights shall be limited to DDB (Diagram IV) right and left




DIAGRAM I. STANDARD FIRING POINT LAYOU'T.




DIAGRAM II. SINGLE TARGET SHOOTING.

of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of No. 3 firing point and prolonged through the centre of the central trap, or through the centre of the single trap when only one trap is used. To aid in distinguishing between targets within and without bounds, four stakes not less than 3 feet in height shall be placed in the arc of a circle whose radii are 50 yards, and whose centre is the centre of the central trap, or the centre of the single trap, when only one trap is used. Respectively, right and left of the aforementioned imaginary straight line, two of the stakes shall be placed upright, one at 20 degrees and one at 45 degrees in said arc.

The shooter must shoot at a complete pair on every occasion. Each "kill" shall score as one (1) point.

Rule No. 66. - "No target" shall be declared when only one target is thrown.

Rule No. 67.—"No target" shall be declared when both targets are broken by one shot.

Rule No. 68. - "No target" shall be declared when one target is a broken target or both targets are broken targets when thrown from the trap or traps.

Rule No. 69. — "No target" shall be declared when both barrels of the competitor's gun are discharged simultaneously, or near simultaneously.

Rule No. 70. - "No target" shall be declared when one target follows




DIAGRAM III. DISTANCE HANDICAPS.

marks are 3 yards apart as in Diagram I, whilst the other marks are handicap shooting. The 16-yard at one yard intervals along the tracks.




DIAGRAM IV. DOUBLE TARGETS.

the other after a material interval of time, instead of the two targets taking flight simultaneously.

Rule No. 71.—"No targets" shall be declared when one target or both targets are thrown at a wider or narrower angle or angles or higher or lower than is set forth in Rule No. 65.

Rule No. 72. — Wherever squad system shooting shall apply, squads of 5 or 6 shooters, No. 1 shooter in each squad shall always start the shooting. The club, at its discretion, may require shooters to change starting lanes on each trap as follows: No. 1 shooter shall commence shooting from Lane No. 1 on Trap No. 1, Lane No. 2 on Trap No. 2, Lane No. 3 on Trap No. 3, and so forth over all the traps. Preserving the continuity of lane changing on each visit to the traps. This Rule shall also apply to double-rise.

TIES.

Rule No. 73. — All ties shall be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The club at its discretion may require the shoot-off to be run over the same number of traps and in the same manner in which the event was shot. Shooters shall be squadded in the same order of priority in which they qualified. Shooters are to be resquadded at the start of each run over the traps. This Rule shall apply to double-rise also.

UNFINISHED COMPETITION.

Rule No. 74. — Should darkness, bad weather, or other cause, interfere with the competition, the management shall have the right to decide how and when the competition shall be continued, provided that it is not postponed longer than 14 days. Any competitor who defaults in respect of such postponed competition forfeits all his rights and standing therein.

OFFICIAL DECISIONS.

Rule No. 75. — Every person entering competitions agrees to accept all official decisions, and to abide by the rules controlling the competition.

ALTERATION TO TRAP.

Rule No. 76. — Any member of the Executive Committee of the Association or official referee attending any shoot under A.C.T.A. Rules shall have authority to adjust any trap immediately should it not be throwing regulation targets. Immediately any such alteration has been made, a target to be thrown and the competition to continue.

STANDARD EQUIPMENT.

Rule No. 77. — Concrete blocks and measuring sticks for measuring height of targets are required to be standard equipment for all clubs. A peg at least 2 feet high is required to be placed, dead centre in front of trap at 50 yards, as an aid to determining distance targets are being thrown.

HANDICAPS.

Rule No. 78.—Club handicaps must be not less than Association Handicaps.

SWEEPSTAKE DEDUCTIONS.

Rule No. 79.—Permissible deduction from sweepstakes by clubs, in club contests, shall be not more than 50 per cent. (inclusive of targets).

Rule No. 80. — No deduction is permitted by clubs in optional sweep-stakes.

OWNERSHIP OF UNBROKEN CLAY TARGETS.

Rule No. 81.—All clay targets—broken or otherwise—at all times remain the property of the club and not the shooter. The shooter only pays for the privilege of shooting.

SHOOTING AT PIECES.

Rule No. 82. — Unless, in the opinion of the referee, it is contrary to the equity of the competition, a competitor taking part in a competition may shoot at the pieces of HIS OWN TARGET, if he so wishes.

SHOOTER'S ENTITLEMENT.

Rule No. 83.—If a shooter withdraws or is disqualified from a competition, he forfeits all rights to resume. When a competitor has withdrawn, during any part of a competition, the tracks to be at once closed up.

SHOOTING UP.

Rule No. 84.— "Shooting up" after the first round of a competition is not permitted in any circumstances, except in the instance of shooters taking part in the annual International Match.

REGISTRATION OF SHOOTERS.

Rule No. 85.—All shooters must be registered by the A.C.T.A. before taking part in competition. Unregistered shooters are not permitted to compete at any time. Registered shooters who shoot at an unregistered or unaffiliated club render themselves liable to disqualification.

SHOOTING IN FRONT OF HANDICAP.

Rule No. 86. — No shooting is permitted in front of Association handicap in any handicap events.

HEIGHT OF TARGETS.

Rule No. 87. — Targets in all competitions to be thrown at a height of 9 feet 10 yards from the trap, with a margin tolerance of not more than 18 inches, either way.

TIE SHOOTS IN OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Rule No. 88.—All tie shoots in Commonwealth, State and District Championships shall be shot squad system—first miss-out except walkup and mixed birds.

SHOOTING NAMES.

Rule No. 89. — Competitors must at all times use their correct names when entering a competition. Shooting non-de-plumes are not permitted.

"PISTOL GRIP" STYLE SHOOTING.

Rule No. 90. — Holding the gun "pistol" fashion, using one hand only, is barred. Any shooter acting in this way is to be warned against continuance—if continued, the shooter to be disqualified from competition forthwith and the matter reported to the Executive Committee. (Penalty, fine £5).

BREAK RECOGNITION.

Rule No. 91.—The A.C.T.A. will recognise breaks in sequences of 50, 75, 100, 150, 200 and 250, providing same are shot over an automatic trap under double or single-barrel conditions and in regular competition on one day only, excepting the case where a club is conducting a programme extending over two or more successive days. No practice between events is permitted and breaks must be continuous. To shoot in other than double or single-barrel events immediately concludes the break. Actual score sheets, clearly marked, showing where break occurred, must be produced to the A.C.T.A. before recognition can be granted. Break badges, once they have been obtained, will not be repeated.

ASSOCIATE REFEREE.

Rule No. 92.—An assistant referee, for Deauville Doubles and doublerise competition, is permitted. The Chief Referee to give his decision following the call of the assistant referee.

CASH DISTRIBUTION.

Rule No. 93.—In all cash distribution, handicaps or sweepstakes, the distribution shall be on the basis of 60% (1st), 30% (2nd) and 10% (3rd). A competitor scoring the only possible in an event wins only 60%, first place.

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES.

Rule No. 94.—Deauville Doubles shall be shot with four shooters on the ground at one time, first pair using tracks 1 and 5 and the second pair using tracks 2 and 4, after shooting first round of 5 pairs, shooters then change tracks, first pair taking tracks 2 and 4, and second pair taking tracks 1 and 5. Tie shoots shall be conducted from tracks 2 and 4, one team at a time.

Rule No. 95. — Any misfire or mechanical failure in Deauville Doubles does not entitle the shooters to another pair of targets and they must abide by the result.

WALK-UP.

Rule No. 96.—Walk-up events shall be shot double-barrel from No. 3 track. The competitor shall load his gun at the 22 yard mark. When ready in this position he commences and continues to walk at a normal walking pace, holding his gun in any position of safety. The puller will release the target between the 20 yard and 15 yard marks, the mark being unknown to the competitor, having been previously determined by an indicator or dice.

OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS AND OPEN COMPETITIONS.

Rule No. 97. — Open Championships, that is Commonwealth, State and District Championships, and open competitions (cases where more than £50 is allotted for distribution in any one event), must have the approval of the A.C.T.A. before being advertised or conducted. (This Rule applies both to the actual event and the proposed date of holding.)

CARTRIDGES.

Rule No. 98.—Standard She'll for Championships. Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are required to be restricted to 1½ oz. of shot, struck measure, or its equivalent. Shells marked by the manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved.

Rule No. 99. — Clubs running any event have the right to divide the number of targets by the number of traps available, shooting 6, 7 or 8 targets per visit per trap. The club, at its discretion, may require lane changing as per Rule No. 73. Illustration: 15 targets, two traps, one visit. No. 1 shooter shoots 8 targets on Trap No. 1, finishing on Lane No. 3. No. 1 shooter now starts on Lane No. 4 on Trap No. 2, and shoots 7 targets, finishing on Lane No. 5. Illustration No. 2: 30 targets, 5 traps, 6 targets per trap, one visit. Clubs must preserve equality by lane changing between traps as per Rule No. 74.

CHAMPIONSHIP CONDITIONS

Applicable from 1st June, 1964

The Championship shall be shot at 40 Clay Targets from 20 yards. Two barrels are permitted and either barrel shall be of equal value and score one point. Entrance fee for Championship 40/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without de-duction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 40 clay targets from 20 yards. One barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from the five tracks squad system at 5 or 10 targets at each visit. The management shall provide three trophies, 1st. 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 40/-, optional sweep-stakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

COMMONWEALTH MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 20 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring

value and score as one point. Five clay targets from 20 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay targets, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 yards mark. The puller will release the target between the 20 and 15 yards mark, the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator or dice

The competitors will stand with four shooters on the ground at one time, the first pair of shooters using tracks one and five for the first round, changing over to tracks two and four for the second round. The second pair of shooters to alternate with first pair. The competitors can arrange between themselves which track they will take and who shall call for the release of the clay targets. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs shall count, and as one point. Either

STATE SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 30 clay targets from 18 yards One barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from five tracks squad system at five or ten clay targets at each visit. The management shall provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 30/-, optional sweepstakes, to

Tower Championships

COMMONWEALTH TOWER CHAMPIONSHIPS

To be shot at 40 clay targets, squad system, five feet directly in front of centre of Tower-five clay targets to be shot on each visit to the track. Normal setting of trap, clay targets to be thrown at usual angles. Two barrels permitted, and each barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score one point. Ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. Competitors must not turn towards the Tower and must face directly to the front throughout the competition. Entrance fee for Championship 40/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

STATE TOWER CHAMPIONSHIP

To be shot at 20 clay targets squad system, five feet directly in front of centre of tower, five clay targets to be shot on each visit to track. Entrance fee for Championship 25/-. thence same conditions as Championship Condition No. 22.

DISTRICT TOWER CHAMPIONSHIP

Same conditions and entrance fee in State Tower Championship.

STATE INTERMEDIATE DOUBLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double-barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. Shooting will take place from 16 yards. Each competitor to shoot from five tracks, squad system. Each competitor to shoot at five to ten clay targets at each visit. The event is restricted to shooters whose Association handicap does not exceed 16 yards on day of competition. The management shall provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Entrance fee for Championship 25/-, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

(State Intermediate D'ville Doubles will be shot from 18 yards.)

DISTRICT INTERMEDIATE SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

Same conditions as State, except where double-barrel is stated, singlebarrel should be understood, with the addition that competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun.

CLAY SPARROW TITLES

Same conditions as applicable to clay targets.

NIGHT SHOOTING CONDITIONS

Same as foregoing, entrance fee 5/- extra.

WALK-UP CONDITIONS

In all Walk-up events the position of the gun shall be optional, providing complete safety conditions are observed.

CARTRIDGES

Standard Shell for Championships. Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are required to be restricted to 1s oz. of shot, struck measure, or its equivalent. Shells marked by the manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved.

CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHIES

Championship trophy value (inclusive of badge or sash) for Commonwealth Championships is fixed by the Association at £40. Similarly with State Championships the amount fixed for trophies (inclusive of sash or badge) is fixed at £30. In District Championships the value of trophies is left optional and at the discretion of the club conducting the event.

TIES

All tie shoots in Commonwealth, State and District Championships (except walk-up and mixed birds) must be shot off squad system, first miss-out.

SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS

Conditions for all open skeet championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are one round of 25 targets, nomination in each event 30/-.

Skeet Tie Shoot Rules. - Skeet tie shoots shall be a half-round of Skeet, taking alternative singles from Stations 1 to 7, shoot high trap from No. 8, and a pair each from Stations 2 and 6.

TWENTY FIVE YEARS AGO

In what was reported at the time to be the "best news for years" advice was received from England that Australia had been accepted as an International contestant. In the initial match in June 1939 teams were 25 men a side, with the best scores to count. Australia did not produce a very brilliant performance in its initial effort, running second last.

The Commonwealth Mixed Birds title of 1939 was won on the old Bentleigh grounds by the veteran retired bank official, Les L. Schilling. The runner-up was the late Jim Wildman, who used the shooting name of "Walsrode". Schilling won after a double tie with the runner-up.

D. B. O'Callaghan, still a prominent trapshot, won the Nobel Club's single-barrel championship at West Footscray (V.) from Geoff, Rutledge.

At King's Meadows, Launceston (Tas.) the Commonwealth doublebarrel title was staged on the Apple Isle for the first time. Victory went to Victorian shooter, Jack Bryant, 23/25, from Pat Reid of Seymour (V.) and the late Lew Bertram. The occasion was the first time that Victorian shooters in a body had invaded the Tasmanian shooting arena, and the result was an allrecalls the trip across Bass Strait in the old s.s. "Taroona". (Flying was in its infancy in those days.) There were high-jinks in plenty the night following the championship and several who were there vividly recall the uneasy feelings experienced the following day.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Cabled advice was received in near Dundee (Scotland). Melbourne in mid-1949 that Australia had won its first International Match. Telephones ran hot when the news was announced over the B.B.C. in the official news of the day. The Australian Team had shot at East Burwood during March 1949 and the best 20 scorers had averaged 91.6 per man, an excellent score for the period. Jack McCratth was second high-gun, 95/100, followed by A. E. Poxon (Launceston, Tas.), 95/100. A. F. Burns (Melbourne), Newton Thomas (then of Townsville, Q.), Fred Brook of Gilgandra, N.S.W., and Keith Cameron of Roma, Qld., all carded 92/100.

TEN YEARS AGO

A £50 Handicap at Collarenebri (N.S.W.) was cut by W. Turner, J. Thompson, G. M. Buchanan, R. J. White and J. Crighton, all of whom returned possible scores of 30 straight. Strangely, a second similar event shot the following day was cut by the same shooters.

A PARTICIPANT'S REPORT.

(Exclusive to "News")

Dear Bill.

The R. M. Ansett Air Race is now history; we have all returned home safely and have to some people thinking at last returned to some form of sanity. Of course, the critics always feel most events, sporting or otherwise, in which they do not participate is only a form of madness. In this category are listed: Clay Target Shooters, Sydney-Hobart Yachtsmen, Melbourne Cup, Air Races, Car Trials, Beer Drinking, Dancing and Movies; in fact, anything which you enjoy - well, it's definitely bad for

I now propose to give you a full resume of my participation in the Air Race, which you may care to publish in the "Shooting News" as a point of interest to the many airmen who are clay target shooters.

I was among the first to nominate for the Race from Newcastle, and I decided to take Ray Morton along as navigator. Ray, as you know, is Secretary of Newcastle Gun Club. As, is commonly known, Secretaries always get the blame, I felt that if we got lost or did not do well, I could then quite correctly blame Ray, as Secretary-Navigator.

My old 1936 Stinson Reliant was given a very thorough check-over by the Royal Newcastle Aero Club's aircraft engineers, who did an excelaircraft engineers, who did an excellent job. I, in turn, commandeered a couple of my apprentices and myself (supervision) and we completely cut and polished the whole aircraft from top to bottom. I once heard it said that it was a big job to wash an elephant; well, Bill, I can assure you, to wash and cut and polish old Charlie Whisky Mike was the equivalent to five elephants. lent to five elephants.

We decided to go to Archerfield a couple of days early, as I had business to conduct in Brisbane. This proved to be a very wise decision. We left on Wednesday, 25th March, 1964, flight planning to go from Newcastle to Tamworth, Inverell, Toowoomba, Archerfield; well, old Jupiter Pluvius took a hand and we were advised at Tamworth to amend our flight plan and go direct to Archerfield from Inverell. We took this advice, only to be frustrated by low cloud and storms over the Ranges 35 miles from Archerfield; we then had to return to Inverell for the night.

On landing at Inverell we found we were no orphans; we had plenty of company; we (I refer to all grounded airmen) took over an hotel, spending a most enjoyable evening with our new-found brothers. I will never forget Inverell; I learnt how to solve one of the furniture manufacturers' problems, beds that sag in the middle. Many thousands of pounds and many thousands of man hours have gone into research in overcoming this problem. Well, Inverell has the complete and most effective answer. Yes, just nail a piece of 3 x 2 underneath. You may break your back, but I will guarantee the bed will not sag. Sleep or comfort—don't be silly, it doesn't come into it; the cardinal point is, "the bed won't sag".

Next morning we were airborne by 9 a.m., and were across the dreaded Ranges by 10.15 a.m., only to be advised by radio that Archer-field and Brisbane aerodromes were closed because of a rain storm, which was expected to last about thirty minutes. As we had plenty of fuel, we elected to orbit Kalbar, a small town about 30 miles out. At 10.50 a.m. we were advised that Archerfield

We then cleaned up our paper work and, fortunately, had all documents in correct order as required; we were soon cleared and given the Official Race Number, 71; we then were able to sit back and have a bit of fun watching some of the not so fortunates.

We were made very welcome by the Flying School, known as the Air Academy; their club rooms soon became headquarters for most of us. Our many thanks and appreciation go to them for their hospitality and meals, especially the early 4 a.m. breakfast.

It rained and rained and rained; the start was postponed twenty-four hours. Twenty-four hours later we eventually were all assembled at 5 p.m. on Saturday for the briefing. Well, I was in the first Redex Trial and I saw some weird and wonderful gear for navigation, etc. This Air Race was no different; I didn't know so many computers were made. Also, you would have to see it to believe that a map could have so many combinations of rollers, cartons, plastic bags, etc., etc., etc., just to make it easier to read, or should I say misread?

During the briefing we were all handed Flight Plans, which were to be filled in and then checked by the Controllers. Well, it was well worth watching some of the crews, consisting of three or four persons, each one with his own special computer, each one coming up with a different answer, the arguments, etc., as to who was right, which figure should they use in the Flight Plan. I thanked my lucky stars I only had Ray Morton with me.

The Big Day came. All cabs in Brisbane were booked; everybody wanted a cab at 4.30 a.m.; fortunately, we were lucky, we booked ours for 4 a.m. breakfast as soon as we got to the ground, final briefing at 5 a.m., then check the aircraft over, etc., and right on the dot of 6.30 a.m. the first planes were away. They

sent the slowest ones first—about twenty of them—then the fastest, then the field. Each plane left at one-minute intervals, right on the dot. The organisation was terrific no hitches.

We were flagged out at 7.31 a.m.; the weather was far from the best—low cloud, with rain storms every now and again. The first check in point was Toowoomba, where you had to identify a marker on the ground. The marker would be in the form of a number or letter, and was changed from time to time. We all had to record on P.A. card supplied the marker and the time.

On arrival at Toowoomba we had difficulty in finding the aerodrome; all the fields looked the same, and we lost four precious minutes circling before we found the aerodrome and the marker.

We then changed, heading, setting course for Inverell. On the way to Inverell we were passed by another aircraft, who was spot on course, and when he was about twenty miles from Inverell he saw Ashford about twelve miles on his right; he apparently mistook this town for Inverell; thinking he was off course, he turned at right angles and headed for Ashford, and, needless to say, we beat him into Tamworth.

Coming into Tamworth was quite an experience; this was a compulsory landing point; there were aircraft all over the place. Planes coming while others were taking off. D.C.A. did a wonderful job, their Control was superb. We landed on the grass strip on the left, while the others took off on the right. The Aero Clubs handled all the parking and refuelling; this again left nothing to be desired. We had made good time to Tamworth.

We took off from Tamworth at 12.35 p.m. on the next leg to West Maitland, a section which is very well known to me; on this leg again we were passed by yet another hasty aircraft, which was also spot on course. When he was abeam Singleton he turned 90° and went straight for Singleton; we then saw him follow the rail line down through Branxton and Greta, and then, to our

amazement, he turned off again and flew to Cessnock. Whilst the weather was quite fine, there was a lot of haze, which obscured Maitland until we were about ten miles out. We saw this chap circle Cessnock, and when we turned around the Maitland N.D.B. we saw the aircraft headed over the Newcastle Steel Works. Needless to say, we had no difficulty in identifying the marker at Maitland. We landed at Bankstown at 2.14 p.m., this making a total time of 4.25, which, when corrected on handicap, was 2.48. The four prize winners on the first day had corrected times of 2.31-2.42.

Briefing again at 5 p.m. for the next days, Bankstown to Moorabbin, this was a complete repetition of the first day—the same fellows with the same problems. Again our thanks go to the Royal Aero Club of N.S.W. and their wonderful catering staff, some of whom were on duty over twenty-four hours straight, getting us meals and again an early breakfast, 5.30 a.m. this time.

Again the first plane was away at 6.30 a.m., and we took off at 7.35 a.m. The trip to Wagga was most pleasant, flying over the ranges to Goulburn, the patches of fog in the valleys looking very pretty. A marker had to be identified at Goulburn; you saw the great contrasts in the country on this leg: the dairy farms, sheep grazing, cattle country, hills and mountains, Burrinjuck Dam, which incidentally look very small from the air, the rugged Kosciusko Mountains in the distance on our left, as you leave Goulburn to run into the flat wheat lands. All in all, a most interesting section of country to fly over.

Me left Wagga and headed for Mangalore, then through the Kilmore Gap, down the light aircraft corridor to Lilydale and finally Moorabbin; we were one of the lucky ones who made Moorabbin that night. While we had clear skies from Sydney to Wagga, all aircraft were held at Wagga owing to fog in the Kilmore Gap. This fog lifted, only a little later to change into low cloud and rain. We flew a compass course all the way, using our Directional Gyro correction was double min set a compass course to back to Nhill, only we twenty-five miles out, so he ducked off to it, tower up for landing to drome—a most embarrant aircraft getting their you, of course, having receipt the course, having receipt to the compass course and the way, using our Directional Gyro

to help keep us spot on track. Very conscious of the fact that while we could not see them, the Dandenong Ranges were on our left, which we had to keep away from, as we had to fly at 1,500 feet to maintain visual flight regulations, while if we were a little too far right, we would be in the Essendon Control area. Nevertheless, we made it.

Briefing, etc., for the final day was just the same; we all received our instructions. Ray and I were booked in at the Motel De Ville, and we were very glad to get in and have a bath and, after a couple of phone calls, get to bed.

Next morning the weather had cleared up completely, and we took off into clear skies on the leg to Nhill, and, strange as it may seem, this was the hardest navigational leg; for some unexplained reason, a lot of chaps went astray; some ended up at Castlemaine after following the wrong rail line, while others overshot Nhill.

This was the only leg in which we were not spot on course; when abeam of Ballarat I felt we were drifting more than anticipated to the left, bringing us closer to Ballarat than we should be. I then made a correction to heading, which proved to be the thing that put me off course; we came out with Dimboola on our left about two miles instead of it being about eight miles on our right. I was most upset at this, as I derive a great amount of satisfaction from navigation. Still, I had a lot to be thankful for, while off course I was not lost and made Nhill without any trouble, and not like another competitor I know of who made the same error as I did at Ballarat, only his correction was double mine. He then set a compass course to bring him back to Nhill, only when about twenty-five miles out, saw a large town which he felt sure was Nhill, so he ducked off to it, calling the tower up for landing instructions, etc., only to find there was no aerodrome - a most embarrassing situation, as you can hear all the other aircraft getting their instructions, you, of course, having received yours



EXTRACTS FROM THE WRITINGS OF THE LATE W. P. GROSVENOR

(As written to A.C.T.A. Secretary in mid-1940's)

Have I at any time called attention to the fact that the "Professors" at our game of trapshooting do actually alter their "facing the traphouse" position at each of the five stands?

On reflection, the need for this is obvious, as, for instance, when at, say. No. 5, the bird cannot be much more than a straight-away throw when throwing fully to the left, but the right-hand throw is at an extreme angle to the shooter, so to minimise this latter, he shapes facing just a bit more to the right and so swings a bit more easily on to it. The reverse, of course, when on No. 1 position, and even at 2 and 4, it pays to remember it and might enable at least a couple more targets in the 100 to be added to the score. The actual "100 straight" wants doing, indeed, and one should be proud when, one day, the gods vouchsafe to grant it to a shooter. A 25 straight will probably elude all but the older shooters for some time. But, believe me, that once it has been achieved it will be easy to do it again and again. The good shot jumps with a bound into the magic circle of the "elect" and he will be hearing at open meetings such remarks as "Watch that chap, he can shoot", and the like.

Of course, one pretends to be quite indifferent to the admiration of the onlookers, but, human nature being what it is, some of us — including

myself — were not exactly hurt when being noticed.

I might add a "Golden Rule" here to these little bits I am throwing around. In the name of all that is good, be sure that you (the shooter) is not one of those talkative nuisances one runs across now and again "on the line". From the time you first get on the mark, to the time the event has been concluded, the ONLY TIME you open your mouth is when you call "Pull", and this said call should be sharp and decisive, both for the benefit of the puller and yourself. The sharper the call, the quicker the response, and this to the improvement of your shooting. Referring again to the talkative "ass"—he will either mutter audibly to himself about the birds, his luck with them, his — cartridges, the puller, the referee, the light, and even go so far as to ask the poor chap on his left or right, "Where did I miss that one?" and so completely ruin the neighbours' concentration. Yes, it is generally this type who makes a hobby of going on to the line with less cartridges than necessary to finish the event, should he have more second barrels than usual. In fact, he is a damned nuisance all round: he will never be a shot himself and will completely ruin many good scores for other people.




