



# The Editor's Notebook



A.C.T.A. REFEREE EXAMINA-TION, 1964. Closing date for receipt of applications for the A.C.T.A. 1964 Referee Examination was July 31. As this date has now passed, no further applications for inclusion in the 1964 series can be accepted. Names of all candidates who secure a 90% pass in the written section of the examination will have their names published in the November issue of "News", after which successful candidates will be required to arrange with one of the Official Referee Examiners (whose names and addresses appear on the page just prior to the start of the official list of registered shooters in the July 1964 issue of "News") to undergo the final practical or oral test. Candidates are reminded that such practical test must be completed on or before December 31, 1964.

When information is received from the Practical Examiners that individual candidates have passed the Oral Test, such candidates will then be recorded as Official A.C.T.A. Referees. Successful Referees will have their names published in "News" as such and will also be issued with the "Official A.C.T.A. Referee Badge".

HANDICAPPING. A shooter in front of 16 yards recently won over £10 and was accordingly penalised one yard. The shooter then wrote the Association stating that he did not consider he should have been penalised. The Handicapping Formula is quite clear on this point, wherein it

directs that a shooter in front of 16 yards shall be penalised one yard for every cut or division obtained. Once the shooter has reached a 16-yard handicap, then his handicap remains stationary unless he wins £10 or over in cash or trophy value in one day. Upon achieving such a success, he is penalised a further yard providing the amount won is not over £51, after which the penalty is two yards for up to £151; after that figure it becomes a 3-yard penalty. Optional sweepstake winnings are not taken into account for handicapping and should not be included in handicap returns.

Handicap Returns. Some clubs are continuing to fail in not submitting completed Handicap Return forms following each shoot. Clubs are notified that it is obligatory that a complete Handicap Return form should be submitted to the A.C.T.A. following each shoot. Another important point noted is, that many of the clubs who are submitting on the clubs who are submitting handicap returns do not prepare these forms in complete detail. One of the most common facts omitted is that the column "Trophy or cash value won" is not finalised. It is pointed out that handicaping is the handicaping. out that handicapping is now based on "cash or trophy value won" and it is, therefore, imperative that information in this regard should be forwarded to the Association. Handicap Returns are obtainable free from the A.C.T.A. office and all clubs should ensure that the stocks of these are adequate.

MISFIRES. The question regarding the proper procedure when a misfire occurs has again been repeated during the past month. The answer in this matter has frequently been published, but is apparently not quite understood by certain sections of the shooting fraternity. The latest query comes from a northern shooter, who wrote, "Recently at our club I had the misfortune to misfire on the first barrel, and thinking quickly that perhaps I had forgotten to reload, I pulled the second barrel. I missed, probably owing to the slight hesita-tion that occurred. I opened my gun to see if I had put in a cartridge. It was all right with the cap dented in full, but, of course, the referee had to give me a 'lost target', as I had opened my gun. I got several opinions on what would have been the decision if I had not opened my gun, the general one being that it would have been a 'lost target', as I used the second barrel." The shooter then goes on to enquire, "(a) Should it be a 'no target' as Rule 37, (b) Am I penalised for using the second barrel after the misfire, (c) Does first part of Rule 42 mean the second barrel must not be used, (e) If a 'no target' and I get another clay, can I use both barrels or only the first? I know I shouldn't have opened the gun, but I did it automatically to see if I had left an empty shell."

The answer to the first section of the query is, of course, lost target, because the shooter used his second barrel, thereby forfeiting his chance of obtaining another target. It should be realised that quick thinking is necessary at all times, particularly in relation to misfires. The shooter who is at all times alert has very much an advantage over the shooter who only has a casual approach to shooting. Rule 42 (first portion) states. "A competitor having a misfire, or apparent misfire, will forthwith call the referee for his decision, otherwise the referee shall declare it a lost target'." The shooter, once he has fired his second barrel, is not entitled to another target, so the final section of the question does not require further comment.

SIX-MEN SQUADS. From reports received at the A.C.T.A. office, it would appear that there is some dissatisfaction regarding the position of the No. 6 man when he is waiting to shoot. Some shooters complain that they do not like the No. 6 man "breathing down their necks" while they are shooting. There could be some merit in the complaint. Many object to being "coached from behind" and to have the experience of another shooter in close proximity could be shooter in close proximity could be disturbing. Therefore it is recommended that the No. 6 man, when squads of six are being put through, should stand between the tracks, say if shooting off No. 1, then he should stand between the No. 1 stand mid-way between the No. 1 and No. 2 tracks. This should obviate any inconvenience to other competi-

A.C.T.A. CAR BADGES. Shooters are again reminded that a fresh quantity of new A.C.T.A. car badges are now in hand and are available to those interested. Orders will be delivered strictly in sequence, and when the present supply runs out, no more will be struck unless firm orders for a reasonable quantity is received. The cost of the badges is 25/- each, including postage.

DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIPS. There has been a growing tendency in recent months to conduct "District" championships without first obtaining the approval of the A.C.T.A., both in regard to the particular event and the date of holding the event. All club officials are informed that it is an A.C.T.A. regulation that all open championships, that is District, State and Commonwealth, must first be approved by the A.C.T.A., the event and the date of holding same. Clubs are reminded that if they continue to ignore the A.C.T.A. in this matter, the whole question will be referred to the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee for direction and action.

1965 OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS. All clubs interested are again reminded that applications for Commonwealth, State and District Championships for the calendar year 1965 are required to be lodged with the A.C.T.A. Secretary, Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, not later than September 14 next. Clubs applying should be definite in their application, which must be in writing. In the past certain clubs have applied for "anything that is available". This type of application is of no assistance to the Executive Committee in the job of allocation. All applications are listed and submitted to each member concerned and slipshod applications such as that referred to receive scant consideration.

A.C.T.A. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING. The next A.C.T.A. Executive Committee meeting will be held in Melbourne over the dates October 8 and 9. Notices of Motion having reference to the A.C.T.A. Constitution must reach the A.C.T.A. Secretary by September 30. Items for inclusion on the Agenda of the meeting (other than Notices of Motion referring to the Constitution) must reach the A.C.T.A. Secretary no later than first mail on September 14.



The competent field shot is frequently discussed when considering the degrees of shooting skill, and it is not easy to arrive at what level a shooter can be described as competent. At the start of the present century the view was generally held that as regards game shooting, to kill one game bird from three cartridges was good shooting, whilst the super shots of that period averaged between 70% and 80% of kills to cartridges used. Having regard to present day conditions, with less game and for a majority, less leisure, and consequently less opportunity for field shooting, it would be appropriate to think of a reduction in the figures mentioned in trying to fix what is a competent field shot. Taking the season right through, if a shooter can gain a kill once in every four cartridges of all kinds of game, including snipe, in all types of conditions, he could be regarded as a competent shot and should not feel out of place in any company.



#### Shoot Better Alone

I know when I started shooting, I almost invariably shot better alone than when in company, and if you happen to be sensitive about that sort of thing — as I was — it requires a considerable effort to overcome it. If you are invited to a big shoot, try not to be over-awed by the occasion, or if your wife, fiancee, or some other charmer is with you, dismiss her from your thoughts when the real business of shooting begins. You can do this with impunity, for you will probably be expected to kill with almost every shot, so whether you kill one in three, one in six, or only one in twelve, will really make very little difference in that particular connection.

# Advice to Young Shots

By ORION in "Shooting Times" (Eng.)

Much of the emphasis in these notes has, not unnaturally, concerned good shooting, and learning or trying to shoot really well, but some beginners are much quicker than others in acquiring the knack of shooting, if one can so describe it. Some schoolboys pick it up as to the manner born, and the most they seem to need. apart from a few hints, is plenty of practice, which nobody can do without. I think there is little doubt that a kind of inborn confidence that you can achieve something before you have even attempted it, is an asset in learning to shoot, for with such people, any early setbacks only seem to promote an even greater determination to succeed, and confidence is at all times an invaluable asset both for beginners and the more experienced.

#### Supernatural Gift

Not everyone has this inborn confidence, and some beginners, after some early failures, tend to regard good shooting as an almost supernatural gift, quite beyond their attainment, and with such an outlook, progress is likely to be decidedly slow.

Between these extremes are all degrees of adaptability, but the slow starter certainly need not despair, for such a one may in time turn out to be as good, or even better, than the very quick learner. Lack of confidence, and the feeling that one is making a fool of oneself, is sure to retard progress and has to be overcome, but to anyone whose first shooting season this is, and who is feeling greatly disappointed with his progress, I can only say — do not be unduly depressed about it, for all may be well in the end.

It is, of course, possible that a person's reflexes and responses are not naturally quick enough, and even with practice may be incapable of meeting the demands imposed upon them by good, quick shooting, in which case no more than a modest

degree of skill is likely to be attained, but provided anyone is average in this respect, and starts shooting young enough, slow progress is more likely to be the result of a lack of confidence than a lack of anything else.

#### A Slow Beginner

All this may seem rather abstract, but I believe it is true, and in support of this belief that a slow beginner may still become a first-class shot, let me quote just one example, for there is nothing like a statement of fact to support a theory. In the latter part of the last century A. J. Stuart-Wortley was regarded as one of the most brilliant shots of his time, and that in an age which produced quite a wealth of super-shots, but his beginnings certainly gave no hint of future brilliance.

Persevere, keep trying, and suddenly you may find your shots connecting, and the probability is that you will not have the slightest idea what has brought about the change.

I do not know that one can give very sound advice as to how you can achieve this much desired improvement, but if, as I think, over-anxiety to succeed is often the cause of early failure, if you cease to worry and banish the sort of attitude which makes you feel—I really must kill this one, or I shall be thought a complete duffer—then you are beginning to give yourself a chance.

Certainly you must be determined, and throw yourself whole - heartedly into the business, but subdue any feeling that can be described as worry, fear of missing, or wondering what other people are thinking about you. To shoot effectively you must be relaxed in mind, and once you have mastered the rudiments of shooting and know what you have to do with your gun, do it, without a thought or care as to what other people think about your efforts.

At Frankston, on Victoria's Mornington Peninsula, the main event of the day went to Les Baker of Tyabb—quite a prominent shooter of a few

years ago.

The Commonwealth D'ville doubles at clay sparrows was shot at Goondiwindi, on the border of N.S.W. and Queensland, and was won by H. B. Wade (who shot in the recent National Championships in Adelaide), partnered by W. Pendock.

At Mount Barker in South Australia the Shephard Trophy went to Executive Committee member, R. Mules, who is now President of the South Australian Gun Club. Mules registered the creditable score of 40/40.

In September 1954 the Rainbow Gun Club in the Victorian Mallee advertised the first car shoot ever staged in Australia. The advertised date of the holding of the car shoot was New Year's Day, January 1, 1955, and the car was described as a "New Standard Model Holden". Incidentally the winner of the car was Errol McMillan, a local district shooter. A plate was inscribed and attached to the dash board of the car, announcing the fact that the car was won by McMillan in the first Australian car shoot.

#### AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS

# EXTRACTS FROM THE WRITINGS OF THE LATE W. P. GROSVENOR

(As written to A.C.T.A. Secretary in mid-1940's)

Trapshooting is one of those games when one's friends cannot help you. Once you have started off in a squad—if ever you play a lone hand, it is then. You, and you only, count. If you miss one and you have reason to think you held straight, it may be that you were a bit slow, and if ever you miss a second in succession you may be sure that you have lost your speed and should quicken up on the next one.

Mention of administration work. Half the difficulties of running an Association such as a trapshooting one, is that the shooters are drawn from all sections of the community, and with diverse and conflicting opinions as to how things should be run, it is something of a secretarial achievement to direct activities in the right direction and also in doing this from the background so that unseen influence is not noticeable.

The usual big bunch of Pochard duck fly over my place every night at dusk. There are usually about 200 in a bunch. However, they usually fly at about 150 yards, although on occasions they come as low as 80 or 90 yards. We have no limit here and everything is left to one's common sense. Shoot one flight and give the ducks a rest for a week, else they will fly mountains high all the time. Our fastest duck is, I think, a Golden eye, and especially a male. You can hear him coming a long way off. The diving duck, pochard, tufted, golden eye, etc., seem to fly half as fast again as mallard and I have seen very good shots beaten by them time and time again, as they cannot grasp the big lead necessary to hit them when they come with the wind in tails. In fact, it's good policy to double one's lead, as it is difficult to overcome the instinctive lead one has acquired after years of shooting at normal speeded birds.

Finally I mention some of my coaching methods as used when bringing the England teams of the day up to top shooting form. Same may be of some interest to your Australian readers.

The first and most important of all

is accuracy, because if you do not hit, you do not break the target. This fundamental every man has to acquire for himself, but, of course, individual coaching by one who can tell the shooter exactly where his charge is going, is a great help. What I have in mind is the training of a squad of men to develop speed, or "time", as it is generally called. A slow shot, however accurate, is certain to come unstuck sooner or later by a certain proportion of his birds being outside the pattern of his gun—and he is unlikely to become a real target breaker, which is every shooter's ambition. No doubt, the accurate but slow shot will, with a full choked gun, almost always hit his target with one or two pellets, but this does not make a certainty of a break. (This, of course, referring to the targets of Mr. Grosvenor's day.) Even when the bird is broken in this manner, it generally means it has been tailored, or in other words, "just broken" into some four or five pieces. It is usually admitted that three pellets are the minimum to a correct "kill" of the ordinary kind. To achieve the spectacular break it is necessary to at least double the number of pellet hits to register a complete smash and leave only a puff of dust like smoke hanging in the air. The real experts should smash the targets so completely because they literally plaster them with shot, and this can only be achieved by the very close pattern which their fully choked guns at around 30 to 32 yards from where they will stand. The average man probably keeps around 37 yards, with an occasional lapse or

slow shot. The good shot will likewise be "killing" at about 35 yards. You sometimes hear an onlooker say "he is breaking them on top of the trap house", and this is what it looks like from the back of the line. I used to put up poles, two at 32 yards and the second pair at 37 yards, with string stretching across the field from side to side, thus marking out a space 5 yards in width. I then used to stand at one side and call the results. My approbation or disapproval was conveyed to the shooters by the quality or incisiveness of my call. If a break was made near or on the farther line (37 vards) I would announce "kill" in a slow and weary voice, for those breaks in about the middle of the

space I would give my verdict in an ordinary referee's call. But when a break was made at the nearer line, I used to put vim and go into my voice. If a break was registered well in front of the first string (nearer the trap house) my jubilant announcement conveyed my great approbation. This method of coaching proved a kindergarten way of teaching speed, but it was surprising how quickly my men got into the spirit of the thing and quite unconsciously were doing their utmost to avoid any suggestion of ridicule that I managed to convey by my tone of voice when

I always look forward to getting "Shooting News" each month and enjoy reading and noting results at various clubs, and although getting near the 70-year mark, am an enthusiastic shooter at clays. I like to see new shooters coming along, and these should be given more encouragement. Everyone, male and female, should learn to shoot well in a small, populated country and it is a pity the Government does not see fit to subsidise cartridges for clubs for clay shooting to encourage this fine sport. The cost makes it prohibitive for many young prospective shooters. Sunday shooting should be allowed for clubs as in other sports.

I would like to see 13 shot ammunition only allowed for all events as in championships. This would give everyone the same chance and makes yardage more of a handicap. In America I believe that is the only weight of shot allowed in all competitions. Only the wealthy can afford 13 shot.

Championships. As the Intermediate Championship is shot now at 16 yards with up to 16-yard shooters, surely other championships (except perhaps double-rise) should start at

18 yards. It seems a farce to me that back markers come right into 16 yards. I'd sooner go back to 18 or 20 yards than have the back markers come right into 16 yards.

Handican Formula. Most of the yardage, at least from 16 yards, got their handicap from long breaks. Now under the present ruling (and which I am quite sure a lot of shooters do not agree with) a shooter can get break after break (from, I notice in "News" editions recently, breaks of 90 to 323) and no penalty of yardage unless a £10 prize or over. Now very few clubs, unless on special occasions, have prizes of £10 or more; these fellows will stay on marks, say, from 16 to 18 yards for long periods and then move forward at Xmas time - or New Year, anyway. Does this encourage young shooters and those who are only fair to good shots against those who are good to excellent, and those from 12-13-14-15 quickly move back to 16 yards these days? Anyway, I must congratulate those shooters who can easily get long breaks. Excellent shooting, but it makes it hard in handicap events. The Championships we have to put up with. In America one is han-dicapped according to ability, but we are too small in numbers for their classification here, but shooters should be handicapped on their ability to make it fair for the coming ones.

Double-Rise. This, I think, should be scored as pairs only, although the scores look better on the board. Perhaps that's the idea. My score looks better lately and I suppose most are pleased with the result.

This is rather a long letter, but while writing, I thought to express some of my thoughts on these matters. I know I am not alone in most of the matters I have noted. The main idea is encouragement to new shooters, and expense can be cut down with more S.B. events and even matters up with handicap events, with restriction to 1½ shot and points scoring.

#### re: WALK-UP CONDITIONS

In the July issue of the "News" it was stated by you that a local group had instructed a club that in Walk-up competitions the shooters should keep the gun off the shoulder while walking and that the instruction was incorrect. I believe that the group concerned would be the West Australian Clay Target Association, which is a representative body of Western Australian shooters and who practically unanimously agree that it is unsafe for some shooters, particularly those of more mature age, to walk down a shooting track with a gun clamped to the shoulder, gazing fixedly at a traphouse, waiting for the bird to emerge. They accordingly instructed clubs in W.A. to interpret the rule in this event on that basis, and I maintain that a referee would be lacking in his duty if he did not call a lot of shooters in this regard, when they adopt the above method, and I am sure that it was to preserve the equity of the competition that this move was made. Surely the younger shooter is not to be allowed to take advantage of his youth at the expense of others who have served the sport for years, may now be a little unsteady on his "pins", but still wants to be in it.

I would suggest also that most shooters would consider this event a "field" shoot, and I can't think of anything more ludicrous than a trapshooter stalking game in this manner.

# The Story of **Jurdeys**1814=1964

Told by EDGAR BARCLAY (in "Shooting Times", Eng.)

Supreme craftsmanship allied to outstanding engineering skill has given certain British products a world - wide reputation that has endured through the years. One obvious example is a Rolls Royce car, another is a Purdey gun.

Such exalted reputations have never been easily won, and to have successfully maintained the same high standard for a century and a half, through two world wars, social and financial changes, keen international competition, and the vagaries of fashion, must at times have demanded faith and determination of a quite heroic kind. The whole trend of the present century has been for cheaper, mass-produced, machine-made articles, but there has always remained a discerning minority which appreciates and demands the work of real masters.

#### In the Beginning

It is not, however, just the technical perfection, elegant lines, and beautiful finish which have made Purdev guns world famous. They have an indefinable quality which includes perfect balance, ease of handling, and a feeling that your gun fits you as precisely as a suit cut by a Savile Row tailor. The late F. E. R. Fryer, one of the most brilliant shots of the last century, declared that he could be taken blindfold into any gun-room and pick out the Purdey guns by the feel of them. I cannot claim such sensitivity as that, but when I first started serious shooting some fifty years ago I made up my mind that a pair of Purdeys was what I needed. Their price new was beyond me, but I secured a pair of hammer guns, second-hand, for a price which would now seem trivial. With very slight alterations these guns fitted me perfectly and served me well on every shooting occasion

that came my way.

Even as I, in my youthful enthusiasm, felt impelled to arm myself with weapons by Purdeys, so others from all over the world have come to Audley House to be advised, fitted, and supplied with guns, or rifles, which will serve not only through their own lifetime, but through that of their heirs as well. One has only to look at the vast collection of photographs, portraits and groups com-memorating notable shooting occa-sions, that hang on the walls of the Long Room or board room, to realise how widespread and varied have been Messrs. Purdeys' patrons. Crowned heads of Europe, princes and potentates from east and west, names well known in many countries and in various connections, and very many of the finest shots in the history of British shooting. The majority of these photographs have been given by customers as gestures of appreciation, and provide evidence of that pleasant and friendly relationship which commonly exists between the shooting man and his gun-maker. Also on the walls of this spacious room hang oil paintings of members of the Purdey family, and as those now responsible for the firm's management look back over its history of 150 years, it must surely be with a sense of satisfaction, and I would think, justifiable pride.

The earliest member of the Purdey family to become a gun-maker was James, born in 1732, who established his business in the Minories. He had seven children, the youngest of which, also named James, was born in 1784, and was subsequently apprenticed to the gun trade and worked for Manton as a stocker from 1803 to 1805. He left Manton in 1806 to become manager of the Forsyth Gun Co., where he was responsible for building the early percussion guns.

#### The Move to Audley House

James, however, was ambitious, and in 1814 he left Forsyth and started business on his own account in Princes Street, Leicester Square. His business prospered, and in 1826 he took over Joseph Manton's premises at 313 Oxford Street, but James was superstitious and went to the trouble of having it re-numbered 314½, though Manton always referred to it as being in Hanover Square. In 1843 his son — yet another James — but known then, and subsequently, as James the younger, was apprenticed to his father. The father died in 1863 and James the younger carried on the business with ever-increasing success.

The Duke of Westminster of that time was one of his patrons, and in 1879 he advised that new premises to accommodate the expanding business should be built to the design of William Lambert, a young architect that he held in high esteem, and following consultations between the Duke, James the younger, and Lambert, it was decided that the premises now known as Audley House, at 57-58 South Audley St., W.1, should be built. The planning was shrewd, for it was so designed that the magnificent Long Room could be shut off from the rest of the premises, and in the event of gun-making falling on bad times it could be used as an art gallery. Happily, this eventuality never arose, and this spacious room has served as the firm's museum, interview room, and board room ever since the building was completed in 1881.

#### Tom Purdey Takes Over

James the younger died in 1909 and his son Athol Stuart Purdey, who had been in the business since 1873, took over, his younger brother Cecil being a partner with him. Athol, who was admitted to the Freedom of the City of London, remained in the business until 1930, but his son Thomas Donald Stuart Purdey, who was born in 1897, took over in 1929.

Thomas, or Tom as he was always called, left Eton in 1914 and went straight into the Army, and in 1915 was serving in France as a Lieuten-

ant in the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, transferring later to the Royal Flying Corps, where he became Adjutant to Lord Sholto Douglas' famed squadron. His elder brother, James Alexander Purdey, born 1891, was a regular soldier and served with the 21st Lancers, the Empress of India Own, and for a time was A.D.C. to the Viceroy of India. When he left the army about 1926-27 he, too, came into the business.

Tom Purdey, however, was released from the forces in 1920, and subsequently became Chairman and Managing Director of James Purdey & Sons Ltd., and in 1954 he became President of the company, which position he occupied until his death in 1957.

#### Lawrence's Early Days

It is remarkable that such a continuity of purpose and talent for gunmaking should have endured through so many generations of one family, and the aim has always been the same, for at no period was there any divergence from the policy of producing nothing but the best, and how right that has proved to be, for at the present time, and after 150 years, Purdeys are working to the limit of their capacity.

Though Tom Purdey did not die till 1957, he had been a sick man for some time, so in 1954 Lord Sherwood became Chairman and Mr. C. H. Lawrence Managing Director. Lawrence, or Harry Lawrence as he is known to almost everyone, became an apprentice at Purdeys' in February 1914, but his family were already well established in the firm, for his father, E. C. Lawrence, had been with them since the late '90's, having previously served with James Woodward, which, incidentally, is the only firm that Purdeys have ever absorbed. E. C. Lawrence became factory manager in 1912 and retired in 1948, and his brother, T. R. Lawrence, also worked for Purdeys until he went to India in the '80's.

During Harry Lawrence's apprenticeship, which ended in 1921, he worked as an actioner and in various shops which gave him an all-round insight of the business. He devoted

his evenings to the study of engineering, a subject which had always fascinated him, and this self-imposed work was to stand him in good stead later on. In the early '30's he began understudying his father, and during the war years 1939 to 1946 he developed the precision tool and gauge business which quickly became a major undertaking entirely devoted to Government contracts. In recognition of his valuable services in this connection he was honoured by the award of the M.B.E.

#### A Master Craftsman

After the war, Harry left the toolmaking side of the business to devote his energies to gun-making, which again developed so fast that in 1959 it was decided to concentrate the firm's resources on gun-making, and the tool business was given up.

Harry Lawrence was Master of the Worshipful Company of Gunmakers in 1954-55 and again in 1962-63, and he has been Chairman of the Proof House Committee since 1954. It is worthy of record that members of the Purdey family have been Masters of the Worshipful Company of Gunmakers on seventeen occasions, and Major Victor Seely, another director, once, so that with Harry Lawrence's two occasions, members of the firm have been Masters twenty times in all, the first being James the Elder in 1841.

Lawrence is Managing Director not only in name, but in deeds. He is at the factory at eight o'clock every morning to deal with any technical problems or points awaiting his decision. He still retains his own bench there and takes both a personal, and if need be, an active part in the day-to-day work of the factory. When every gun made is to specifications agreed with the customer, every weapon has of necessity to be individually planned, and it is in that sphere that the accumulated knowledge of this highly skilled engineer and master craftsman is of such obvious value.

Evidence of his personal skill can be seen in the tiny working model of a gun exhibited in the Long Room, which is only 7\frac{3}{2} in. long, but is exact in every detail. It is identical with a pair, complete in leather case, presented to H.M. King George V on the occasion of his Silver Jubilee in 1935. They are exact copies of the guns he habitually used, and capable of firing the minute cartridges that were made for them.

#### Looking to the Future

Lawrence's daily visit to the factory is, however, only the beginning of his day. At about 11.0 a.m. he arrives at Audley House, and his day's work there is rarely finished before 7.0 p.m. After fifty years' work one cannot but feel admiration for such sustained devotion to the gun-maker's craft, the name of Purdey, and all that it stands for, but with an eye to the future, Lawrence has gathered a young staff around him, including his nephew, who are all coming along in the Purdey tradition, and the present directors, Lord Sherwood, Major Victor Seely, Mr. C. H. Lawrence, Major Arthur Collins, and the Hon. Richard Beaumont, represent a wide cross-section of knowledge and experience. Mr. Beaumont has had 10 years in the factory and on executive work, and the future of the company is assuredly in safe hands.


The reputation of Purdeys is such that their history is of more than national interest, for today the firm is as highly and widely esteemed as at any time during the last 150 years.
