



The Editor's Notebook



NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS AND INTERNATIONAL MATCH. As explained through the advertising section, the 1965 National Championships series and 19th International Match will be held from March 4 to March 9 at East Burwood shooting grounds (Victoria)—the home venue of the Australian Gun Club. The International Match is always one of the highlights of the series, and one of the chief reasons for this is that if a shooter is shooting well enough he gains a place in the 30-man team to represent Australia— there is no selection committee—the shooter shoots his way into the team. There is always something of the hall mark of shooting ability once a marksman has made the Australian Team. Frequently, in conversation, one hears "or so and so is an International," and for a shooter to hear such a statement concerning himself must surely bring a feeling of pride.

The series will start off with the National Double-barrel Championship and the A.C.T.A. Intermediate Championship (the latter shot in conjunction) on Thursday, March 4. It is of some interest to note the reason for the shooting of the National Double-barrel title as the first event on the programme. Some years ago a shooter in a northern area, who is a frequent visitor to the National series, wrote to the A.C.T.A. requesting that the event be the first held. His reason was sound logic and was that for many shooters who only get limited shooting practice it is better for them to get a sight of the targets under double-barrel conditions before they come on to the more intricate

type of S.B. and points release. The National double - barrel title counts for the aggregate for a place in the Australian Team, together with the National single-barrel and Australia-New Zealand Trophy. The top 30 scorers in these events automatically gain a place in the Australian Team. On the second day, March 5, the National single-barrel title will be decided, along with a series of £100 Handicaps. Third day, March 6, will see the shooting of the Australia-New Zealand Trophy, plus the Australian National Double-rise Championship. The 29th Annual Meeting of representatives of corporate clubs and delegates of unincorporated clubs and delegates of unincorporated clubs will be held in The Victoria, 215 Lt. Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1, on Sunday, March 7, commencing at 10 a.m. The 19th International Match will be held on Monday, March 8, followed by the 16th Grand Australian Handicap of £550. The final day will see the storing of the blueday will see the staging of the blue-riband event of the series, from the individual viewpoint, the Champion of Champions Cup. This latter event is the original basis of the Association's National programme. It was started in 1937, when the winner was the former Association Chairman, H. G. ("Duxbac") James. The following year the event was won by the late Lew Bertram with a score which included a break of 77 straight, and which many thought, at that time, would never be bettered. Bertram's gun cost him £7/10/-!

Shooting will start each day at 9.0 a.m., and no entries will be accepted later than one hour after stated starting time.

Intending visitors who have not yet arranged accommodation may be unfortunate and miss out. T.A.A. are the booking agents, and application should be made to Mr. Roy Weston of T.A.A., 250 Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1 ('phone 3.023), and it is felt that Mr. Weston will assist late applicants for accommodation if at all possible.

SAVING MILEAGE. A shooter, who indicated "he was getting on a bit", recently wrote the Association advising that his 1964 handicap was 17 yards, but he requested it be increased to 19 yards. In the shooter's own words, he states, "I'll be happy if I can shoot off 19 yards. I'm not as energetic on the 'old feet' as of yore and the extra two yards handicap will not affect my shooting, but it will save 20 yards of walking per squad at 5 targets — in other words, save a lot of walking over a programme." The A.C.T.A. has obliged the shooter and placed him on 19 vards, and expresses the best wishes to a shooter in the not-so-young group.

HANDICAP RETURNS. An increasing number of clubs appear to be submitting results sheets without also submitting a Handicap Return to the A.C.T.A. office. Clubs are reminded that the Executive Committee instructs that all clubs must submit a handicap return following each shoot. It is quite useless, from a handicapping viewpoint, not to in-clude a handicap return when forwarding results. To bring about efficient handicapping in keeping with the Official Formula as published in the December issue of "News", a fully completed Handicap Return is essential. Recently a club forwarded handicap returns over two different days of shooting, but failed to include the amounts won by the various competitors. Such a return is of no value whatever, and in the case mentioned, both uncompleted forms were returned to the club concerned, with a request that details be completed and returned to the A.C.T.A. office. Clubs who continue to fail to submit

Handicap Returns, complete in every detail, will find that their shooters will be handicapped on results alone, and this is sure to lead to dissatisfaction and confusion. It is repeated that "all clubs must submit a fully completed handicap return following each shoot". This is an Executive Committee direction. New-style handicap return forms are available from the A.C.T.A. office. The new forms are greatly simplified and require only the minimum amount of office work to complete. Many of these forms have already been issued to affiliated clubs. Clubs in need of new forms are requested to notify the A.C.T.A. Secretary, Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, immediately. New forms will be on the way by the next mail.

The co-operation of every affiliated club is urgently sought in this matter, as only by this means can correct handicapping be brought about.

THE "COCKED TRAP". Recently a shooter at a Victorian country club sustained shocking head injuries through being struck on the head by the release plate of an electric trap. It appears that some minor adjustment was required, and several shooters went to the front of the trap and investigated the cause of the trouble, while shooting was held up. Unfortunately the trap was still "cocked" when they went forward, and one shooter who happened to be right in front took the full force of the blow on the head. Needless to say, the shooter concerned sustained serious head injuries, into which many stitches had to be inserted, quite apart from the head pains with which he is likely to suffer for some time to come. Clubs are advised to ensure that one person only, be he trap mechanic, president or other senior official, should be present in the trap-house whilst adjustments are taking place. In the case under review it was understood quite a number were actually in the traphouse at the one time, and this doubtless produced an air of overconfidence and somehow the trap became released. Clubs should ensure that all traps are released or "un-cocked" before anyone stands or squats in front of the plate.





OUT OF THE PAST

Twenty-five Years Ago

Jack Bryant, who was National D.B. Champion in 1939, retained his title in 1940. Bryant won 39/40 from "Harrison" (the late Reg Ilett). The event was decided on the Bentleigh grounds of the Nobel Club. Harry Burrows, now a regular referee with the Australian Gun Club, was prominent with minor cuts on that day. Harry has now reached the age of three score years and ten, but still enjoys retaining his connection with the sport. He is a former President of the Nobel Club.

A couple of father - son combinations were in winning brackets at the Coburg Club's fixture at this period. The combinations were, A. Walker and son John, also A. Bruhn and son Trevor. The latter had the makings of a very fine shooter, but has apparently found other interests. A. Walker won the club's double-barrel title on the day.

A live hare enlivened proceedings at the Bentleigh grounds in March, 1940. The hare is reported to have "sported itself, but not for very long". The hare was quickly met with a battery of guns, and the prize eventually went to "Crom", the late Percy Cook of Prahran. However, it is recalled, by those who were present, that there was some very red faces after the hunt. Several prominent shooters missed the game with both barrels and none could find an excuse for missing!

Fifteen Years Ago

A. J. (Gus) Russell won the Wilson Cup at East Burwood and defeated Jim Smith of Home Hill (Q.) for the honours.


The 1950 National series drew a record entry (up to then) of 245. The Champion of Champions Cup event drew a record entry of 215. The contest was unable to be completed on the day of starting, 50 targets per man being disposed of. The leader

at the end of the first day was Jim Smith of Home Hill (Q.), with a possible 50/50. On the resumption of shooting on the next shooting day he dropped two targets in his last ten and the winner came up in J. A. McCraith of Essendon, 59/60. Smith was runner-up, 58/60, and a shooter who does not regularly take part in these contests, R. J. O'Day (Tambo) of Swift's Creek, was third.

Ten Years Ago

Sperry Marshall of Hobart (Tasmania) won the 1955 Champion of Champions Cup with a patch of brilliant shooting, after having tied over the original course of the match with nine others, all of whom returned the possibles. In the shoot-off was also Marshall's brother, Paul.

After the tie shoot, which went another 35 rounds, Sperry Marshall gained a very popular win, 75/75, and winning from Eric Hodge of Southport, Q., 74/75, C. Mudford 69/70, J. R. Bushby (Narrandera, N.S.W.) 64/65, and Paul Marshall 63/65.

THE TECHNIQUE OF SNIPE SHOOTING

Snipe-driving is not everyone's cup of tea. There are many sportsmen who have a complex about facing driven snipe. And there are many more expert snipe-shots who have never taken part in, nor seen, a snipe-drive.

Driven snipe, flying in dead-calm weather or going down-wind, present no particular problem to anyone who is used to overhead targets. The birds are then on course, and can be engaged in the normal manner. But usually the birds are coming over the guns against the wind. They are then swaying from side to side, and probably gaining height at the same time. The stronger the wind, the more difficult the target. Often when a bird is hovering hawk-like close above you, you will think that all you have to do is to take careful aim at it and squeeze the trigger. And often when a bird is a tiny speck in the sky, you will find that you must give it some lead. Once thoughts like these cross your mind, you are lucky if you make contact at all.

The only effective way to deal with the normal overhead snipe is to snapshoot straight at it.

Not Infallible

This method, fortunately, is by no means infallible. Even if you are dead on the target, the snipe may jink as you fire, or it may go through the shot-pattern. In the case of high birds passing directly overhead, the only vulnerable part of the snipe exposed is the head. Its wings are protected by its body, and its vital parts by its breastbone. If, as frequently happens, a bird is struck by a single pellet in the breast, it will flatten out and plane away for some distance. If you are able to mark it down and follow it up, it will almost certainly require another shot.

All things being equal, when snipe are coming over forty yards or more up, it is more profitable to engage these on a flank rather than the ones over your head.

Two Essentials

The two essentials for a successful snipe-drive are wind and plenty of birds. Although snipe will always take off into a wind, they usually maintain their initial direction only until properly airborne, and then swing right or left as the spirit moves them. In a gale they will not go forward at all. So ideal conditions exist when there is a breeze strong enough to keep them on course for a short time and to ensure that they arrive over the guns at a reasonable height. Even so, unless the drives are limited to a few hundred yards, most of the birds will escape without being shot at. One gun, preferably accompanied by a few dogs, is all that is required to drive all except the large, open bogs. He—or she—often gets more shooting than anyone else in the party.

The orthodox way of shooting snipe is to walk them up. When you are operating in calm weather or upwind, nearly all the targets will be moving directly away from you and at speed. The birds gain their initial velocity by a rapid movement of the wings and by using their legs and, probably, their fan-shaped tails, to catapult themselves forward. As soon as they are airborne they start twisting from side to side, and continue to do so until they feel that it is safe to soar skywards and depart in the direction they wish to take.

Some people advocate waiting until the snipe has ceased taking evasive action. The snags about this are that the bird will not always lift while still in range, and that, while you are waiting, any other birds that have risen at the same time will be making their get-away.

The generally accepted way of engaging these targets is to snap-shoot at them on sight.

Quickness is essential in order that you may overtake the snipe before it has jinked out of the shot-pattern.

For once therefore you will be right if you carry your gun "at the point", with your thumb on the safety-catch. You also have to be watching your front and not continually glancing down at your feet for imaginary bogholes

If, for some strange reason, quantity is more important than quality, walking-up down-wind is the answer. The snipe then rise towards you and swing right or left, giving the broadside shot. If the wind is at right-angles to your line of advance, the odds are still more in your favour, as the birds will be flying dead straight across your front.

The disadvantage of taking a bog down-wind is that birds have more warning of your approach. The sound of a shot will probably put up only the snipe near you; but it will disturb duck a mile away. The sounds that are calculated to frighten snipe are the human voice and the noise of somebody or something splashing about in water. Often a fox or a hare scarpering over a bog will stampede every bird in the area.

Move Very Slowly

When walking a wet bog, all that you can do to reduce noise, apart from not speaking, is to move very slowly, avoiding the more boggy places when possible. If you are alone, however, you can often operate more efficiently, and in greater comfort, by keeping to the hard ground round the edges.

A dog makes more noise than a human in shallow water, especially when working or when retrieving a bird. But if it will pick up snipe, you are more likely to have a successful and pleasant shoot by taking it with you than by excluding it from the operations.

To sum up. If you are out for snipe only, you would as far as possible attack a bog down-wind. But generally it is much more fun not to worry about wind or anything else, and to take each bit of country as it comes.

Visibility is another factor in walking-up snipe. In dull weather, a bird going straight away against

a dark background and showing no sign of its white undercarriage is a very difficult shot indeed. And at dusk the only hope is to get a snipe outlined against the sky. As a general rule it is advisable to walk-up snipe in the middle of the day, preferably in sunlight. In the early morning and late afternoon, partly because the birds are difficult to see and partly because they are then feeding and very much on the alert, driving is more likely to yield results.


While snipe shooting is essentially a winter sport, it is no fun at all when the ground is frozen. Most of the birds will, in any case, have gone off to some ice-free area or to the foreshores; and any that remain, trying to keep alive on the edges of streams or around springs, will have lost condition and all their joie-devive.

Snipe are as good on the table as they are in the field.

For the Beginner

Above all, it needs exceptional quickness, that the instant you sight a flash of cream and brown, which denotes a rising bird, throw up your gun and fire the snappiest of snapshots just above the target. Difficult it certainly is, but wonderfully fascinating, and at times even the most highly skilled can be defeated. Even the great Colonel Hawker once shot thirteen snipe in succession and then missed the next eleven!



The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

DISTRICT DEAUVILLE DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

Same conditions and entrance fee in State Tower Championship.

STATE INTERMEDIATE DOUBLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double-barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. Shooting and count as one point. Shooting will take place from 16 yards. Each competitor to shoot from five tracks, squad system. Each competitor to shoot at five to ten clay targets at each visit. Same conditions as State, except where double-barrel is stated, singlebarrel should be understood, with the addition that competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun.

CLAY SPARROW TITLES

Same conditions as applicable to clay targets.

NIGHT SHOOTING CONDITIONS

Same as foregoing, entrance fee 5/- extra.

WALK-UP CONDITIONS

In all Walk-up events the position of the gun shall be optional, providing complete safety conditions are observed. A loaded gun shall be deemed to be in a position of safety when it is the shooter's turn to shoot and he faces and points the gun in the general direction of the trap house, having the gun either mounted on the shoulder or in the gun-down position.

CARTRIDGES

Standard Shell for Championships. Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are required to be restricted to 13 oz. of shot, struck measure, or its equivalent. Shells marked by the manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved.

CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHIES

Championship trophy value (inclusive of badge or sash) for Commonwealth Championships is fixed by the Association at £40. Similarly with State Championships the amount fixed for trophies (inclusive of sash or badge) is fixed at £30. In District Championships the value of trophies is left optional and at the discretion of the club conducting the event.

TIES


All tie shoots in Commonwealth. State and District Championships (except walk-up and mixed birds) must be shot off squad system, first miss-out.

SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS

Conditions for all open skeet championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are one round of 25 targets, nomination in each event 30/-.

Skeet Tie Shoot Rules. - Skeet tie shoots shall be a half-round of Skeet, taking alternative singles from Stations 1 to 7, shoot high trap from No. 8, and a pair each from Stations 2 and 6.




