



The Editor's Notebook




LEARNING TO SHOOT. The best possible way to learn to shoot is to engage the services and interest of a top-class shooter. It stands to reason that the top-ranking shooter is better equipped to start a beginner on the right lines. A good beginning may not be the complete answer to becoming a first-class shot, but it is certainly a very great help. Much the same applies to other sports, such as tennis, cricket, rowing, and the like— a good coach knows from experience the fault which beginners are prone to, and he can correct bad habits before they become common place in the shooter's make-up. The correct and safe handling of a gun is not a complicated business. A good in-structor can, by demonstration and simple explanation, soon get the beginner started on the right lines. Once a beginner has mastered gun handling and the principles of shoot-ing moving targets, it all depends on his natural aptitude how quickly he progresses. Even after the initial stages of learning, an instructor can before they become common place in stages of learning, an instructor can still be of great help, because he will be able to advise his pupil (after his visit to the tracks) where his shots are going, whether low, behind or in front, and it is much easier to correct some known fault than to go blindly on by trial and error. Any experienced shot will be able to teach and demonstrate to a beginner such fun-damentals as safe handling, footwork, stance and swing.

It should always be remembered that one cannot learn to shoot by the printed word alone, but a beginner can be helped with the right approach and the right ideas, and some points of instruction can easily be absorbed by careful reading as by verbal instruction.

Always remember that if you are not a "safe" shot you are a danger to yourself and others. Some essential points to remember are: Never have your gun loaded except when you are on the shooting mark or expecting game, and whether loaded or unloaded, never let it point in the direction of anybody or anything except the intended quarry. Even when game are expected to rise or fly overhead, always unload your gun if you have to climb over a gate or fence, cross a stile or get through a hedge or even jump a ditch or channel.

1965 INTERNATIONAL MATCH. Although the 1965 International Match - Australian section - was held at East Burwood on Monday, March 8, the Great Britain teams will not compete until Friday, July 9, 1965, when the teams representative of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales will shoot their respective sections of the 1965 International. When the remainder of the competing teams, Central Africa, South Africa and any other likely contesting country shoots is unknown in Australia at present. New Zealand, as has been mentioned previously, will shoot during its New Zealand Championships programme early in April. In a brief note recently the English Secretary, A. Peter Page, extended a cordial invitation to any Australian shooters who may be able to visit Britain this year for the International at Edinburgh on Friday, July 9, next.





Dear Sir.

"Tassie Shooter" (March News), lacking a copy of the rules of skeet, seems to have been in a quandary as to the procedure to be adopted in a 12-bird skeet tie shoot.

No doubt by now he has a copy of the rules, as I am sure the Secretary of the A.C.T.A. would forward them if requested.

On page 4, under the heading "2. General", lines 7 and 8, he will see that at station 1 the first bird is to be taken from the high house.

As, in a tie shoot, the birds are to be taken from alternate traps and stations, it follows that the second bird should come from the low house and be shot from station 2, and so on, alternating as far as station 7 in accordance with tie shoot rules. It will be noted that the station 8 bird must come from the high house.


As to time-saving sequence of shooting doubles, yes, there is a way, that is to shoot the pair from No. 6 station immediately after the single from No. 7.

However, it has been my experience that this tends to confuse the shooters and it is better to adhere to the order laid down in the rules for tie shoots.

Anyway, a good squad of skeet shooters get their shots away at the rate of five a minute, and this does not leave much room for time saving.

VISITS MOUNT HAGEN, N.G.

One of the most enjoyable and interesting visits between one Gun Club and another was made recently by myself, Ian Farren, Charlie Squires and Reg Pora when we visited the Mount Hagen Gun Club in the Highlands of New Guinea.

Travelling from Melbourne to Sydney, Brisbane, Port Moresby, we crossed over the Owen Stanley Ranges to the town of Lae, and there changed into a DC3 aircraft for the trip through the Highland Valley chains, at the end of which lies the thriving town of Mount Hagen. The scenery en route leaves one spellbound and we were all surprised at the appearance of the country. We had imagined huge malarial swamps, thick with crocodiles and teeming with disease. This was not the case. The Highland Valleys are virtually like huge parklands, with the valley floors studded with areas of grass and light

One of the most enjoyable and timber. Beautiful mountain streams teresting visits between one Gun flow through them and thriving towns lab another was made recently dot each chain of valleys.

The main crops grown in the Highlands are cattle and coffee, and the Wahgi Valley, in which Mount Hagen is situated, is now plunging very rapidly into a huge tea industry. Pyrethrum also thrives in these altitudes.

After landing at a number of small airports, we finally arrived at Mount Hagen and were immediately struck by the large number of air movements in and out of the port. Upon enquiry we were told that Mount Hagen is the third busiest airport in Australasia for the 1963-64 year.

We were met on arrival by our most amiable host, namely, Norm Camps, President of the Mount Hagen Gun Club, and by Mrs. Doreen Buscombe, Secretary of the club. Norm's

plantation is only a mile out of town, but before we were allowed to go there and deposit our luggage he felt that a call at the Hagen Country Club was necessary. Thus, with our thirst quenched, we drove out to Norm's Bindon Plantation, where two of us were billeted in his very comfortable home with every modern convenience. A feature of the main room is a gun rack which, in itself, would be the envy of most.

Game is plentiful in New Guinea if you know where to look for it, with wild cattle, buffalo, pig, duck, geese, deer and crocodile filling the mainbill. Quail and jack snipe also abound. We, unfortunately, did not have the time to spend on these pleasures, as there is so much else to do, sight-seeing and meeting people. Reg and Charlie were collected, after lunch, by a plantation owner from further down the Wahgi Valley, and they were billeted with him until after the Gun Club shoot.

Having lived like lords for a week, we visited the club on Norm's four-

mile plantation for the shoot arranged on our behalf. The feature of the club is the lay-out of tracks and trap house with lawns, etc., with the tracks and the trap house being built to exact I.C.I. specifications—one of the few clubs with this feature. Approximately twenty yards behind the tracks is a huge club house, curved to conform to the rear curve of the tracks 85 ft. long and 25 ft. deep. Within the building are tables and stools and a bar and office and barbecue area. The foreground is clear, with a low hedge approximately 300 yards in front, with high mountains seven miles in the background. The valley floor at the Gun Club site is 5,400 ft. above sea level and the mountains at the back reach 14,000 ft.

The club employs two full-time native groundsmen and part of their duties is the manufacture of clay targets. These clays are of excellent quality and break as readily as the Australian manufactured article.

During the shooting I remarked that the shots seemed to get to the


clay more quickly and also that the birds seemed to fly a little faster than at sea level. We were then told that the altitude density at Mount Hagen is equivalent to 7,200 ft. above sea level and it was conjectured that perhaps the thin air caused less resistance to the shot and the clay and thus they did, in fact, travel faster. However, we don't think that these wo factors were the reasons that we all did not shoot as well as we had hoped, and did not share in the main trophy events.

We were surprised at the cheapness of the nominations and every other factor involving shooting at Mount Hagen. The club is well organised to the point where they are able to subsidise their own shooting, due to the revenue obtained from raffles of high-quality guns and other functions. Shooting can be had at Mount Hagen for a whole day from 10 in the morning until almost dark. with quite good trophies being offered for as little as £7 in the day. This would entitle you to twice as much shooting as you would normally get on Australian tracks.

The Mount Hagen Club has been instrumental in the formation of the other Gun Clubs in the Territory, which at this stage are Tarangau at Manus Is., Lae and Port Moresby. Rabaul have also recently come into the fold.

One of the things I have never seen in Victoria was four women shooters on the track at the one time, and all good marksmen, namely Mrs. Doreen Buscombe, Mrs. Pat Toole, Mrs. Judy Blogg and Mrs. Anna Middleton. They are quite consistent winners there, judging by my reading of the "News".

None of the shooters in Mount Hagen have done a great deal of competitive shooting other than within their own club, and, of course, this limits their ability. If they were to have more competition, I feel sure that some worthwhile champions would emerge from there, as the basic material and keenness would be very hard to match in Australian clubs. These sporting people in Mount Hagen shoot for the love of the sport rather than go to the other extreme and become pot hunters and cashhandicap seekers. They run a full programme of District Championships throughout the year, inter-spersed with trophy and handicap events, and the culmination of the shooting year is the Territory Championship, which is shot under State Rules. In the two years that this shoot has now been running, shooters from the mainland have visited both times, and Mount Hagen expects quite a number of Australian shooters to attend this year. As usual, after the programmed events had

finished, we shot off the box, which in this case turned out to be an electrical cable drum positioned at 34 yards. This is where we came into our own, and Charlie Squires won two of the brackets. This particular event capped off one of the most enjoyable day's shooting we have ever experienced, and also one of the most enjoyable and entertaining weeks, socially and otherwise. This is a brief outline of Mount Hagen. To tell all would require a book, but I suggest that anybody who can make the visit to Mount Hagen for the Championships, which will be shot over the last week-end of August 1965 and take in also the spectacular Western Highlands District Show, which is world renowned for its colour, on the week-end prior to the shoot, would most certainly be made as welcome as we were by the members of the Hagen Club.

A word of advice here to anvbody visiting New Guinea; there are several formalities to be gone through and these have to be observed.

- 1. An Entry permit is required, and this can be obtained from the Dept. of Territories, Canberra, or any capital city.
- 2. If you are taking guns to the Territory, you must advise Norm


Camps of your travel details and gun numbers, as these have to be advised by him to the Customs Dept. of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea.

3. Australian airline offices and travel agents know very little about internal air movements in the Territory and therefore I encourage you to allow the Gun Club at Mount Hagen to make your bookings for you. All that you require is to advise them of your departure date from Australia. Arrangements are in hand to advertise the Territory Champion-ships, and all interested should contact Norm Camps or Mrs. Doreen Buscombe and be most ably looked after from that end.

The climate would probably be the most perfect in the world and it never gets as hot or cold as Sydney or Brisbane. Frosts are unknown and every day is almost akin to spring. Malaria does not exist in most of the Highlands area and mosquitoes are almost non-existent. It is indeed a paradise with its scenery, its pioneers and its natives in their natural dress.

So with this outline I once again counsel while you may to visit to this country and its Gun Clubs.

OUT OF THE PAST

Twenty-five Years Ago

Because of the second world war, it was officially announced that no International Match would take place in 1940. As Australia had only entered the International shooting arena in 1939, it was indeed a brief introduction to International competition.

Veteran of the day, Charles Corbett, passed on early in 1940 at his home in Coburg, V. He first began shooting in 1895, and in addition to being an excellent shot, he was a grand sportsman. He had won hundreds of trophies.

W. R. (Bill) Bloomfield and the late Vic. Fankhauser were the only two equal to recording possibles in the Blackburn Club's 1940 double-barrel championship. The tie shoot went five rounds, Bloomfield winning with 20 straight. The late Rus. Thomas divided two events on the

same day.

Jack Hood, a prominent shooter of the day, who later joined the A.I.F., attended a Camberwell shoot on his final leave. He won the 15/17 yarders' prize with 11/15. Hood later paid the supreme sacrifice at Bardia early in January 1941.

The 1940 National Championships were held at the Nobel Club grounds at Bentleigh (V.). Many of those who had competed at the previous year's fixtures were in khaki. H. S. Smith, now a bank manager at Ipswich in Queensland, was one of those who travelled over 3,000 miles to attend the 1939 series, and in 1940 found himself also in khaki.

Early in April 1940 a "Fags for Fighters" Fund shoot was held at the Ringwood home, "Wellington Park", of Jock Wilson. A big result was obtained.

Fifteen Years Ago

Clay target shooting at night under night lighting conditions was introduced on a properly organised basis about this period in 1950 by the Australian Gun Club at East Burwood. The reports of the day indicated that "to the gun lover night shooting opens a new vista". The report of the day goes on, "Many who have journeyed far and faced the difficulties attached to spotlight shooting in open country from a car can now enjoy a session of 'smashing 'em' simply by taking a gun and a few shillings to East Burwood. Night shooting at clays is not new to Mel-

bourne. About 1938 the late Alex. Watkins and the late Jim Wildman featured the sport on a commercial basis at a well-lit dog racing track. The venture was not successful, mainly for the reason that it was introduced in cold weather. Steel targets, suitably whitened, were tried in this venture, but again the sponsors were frustrated, chiefly because of the doubt surrounding 'kill' or 'lost' decisions, as the discs did not fragment. Clay pigeon shooting, now an International pastime, is expanding rapidly in all English - speaking countries."

Nevertheless reports of foxes appearing within 10 miles of Charing Cross were reported from Beckenham, Shortlands and Park Langley. The foxes were stated to have been attacking poultry and "extermination clubs" were formed to dispose of the bushy-tails—however, at the time of the report the latter were winning the fight.

THOUGHTS ON FIRST BARREL

Our modern double guns owe their existence to an act of inadvertent paternity. When Henry Nock, round about 1785, invented his celebrated patent breech, his object was simply to improve the speed and thoroughness of ignition of the flintlock gun, so as to make it shoot quicker and harder. In this he succeeded; but he can hardly have foreseen the full measure of his success, or the radical transformation it was destined to bring about in the sporting gun of his day. The typical pre-Nock gun with plain breeching was a weapon with a full-length stock and a single barrel of forty inches or more; but guns as re-designed to exploit the more rapid and thorough combustion brought about by the patent breech had barrels as short as thirty inches. Not only was weight thus saved, it was brought back, so that it became feasible, for the first time, to build double guns that were light, well balanced, fast - handling weapons, adaptable to wing-shooting and of modern outline. For these and other advantages deriving from the Nock invention we still owe the inventor a debt of gratitude, for they established standards admitting of no retrogression in the developments that followed.

Curious By-products

But if the originator of the patent breech can hardly have foreseen the full, practical impact of his work, still less can he have contemplated the curious, psychological by-products of shooting with a double barrel. These include various fancies and inhibitions connected with ribs and sighting - planes, and also mental states induced in the shooter by his knowledge that he has a second barrel in reserve. It is these latter that I wish to consider.

Years ago, when boys were perhaps entered more carefully to shooting than they are today, it was a common thing to start the new entrant with a single barrel—not for cheapness,

but for the express reason that a double was considered to induce carelessness in the placing of the first shot. I believe this to have been a sound principle; but, however thorough his early training with a single barrel may have been, I doubt if there exists a man whose performance with a double is not, in some degree, worsened by his knowledge that a miss with his right is not necessarily final. In saying this, I am thinking solely of shots taken at single birds. With double chances, it is quite different.

My own experience is that I always seem to have done better with rights-and-lefts than my general standard would imply. The reason, I believe, is that the simultaneous appearance of two targets before the gun eliminates immediately that enervating, subconscious feeling that, after all, one can always have another crack at it. One knows that each barrel must be made to tell, and performance tightens up accordingly.

From Bad to Worse

This psychological "malaise" of first-barrel carelessness can take an aggravated form. I have known men - quick, excitable types - to whom, I am sure, the first barrel has become subconsciously little more than an impediment to getting down to serious business with their second barrel something to be fired off, anyhow, anywhere, so long as it is not allowed to delay the real proceedings. Such a man, if a good natural shot, may perform very well; but if not - if he wastes his first barrel and pokes with his left, or if he raises his head to see what happened the first time, and fails to get it down for his second try, his mental attitude may reduce his performance to a far lower level than he is otherwise capable of attaining.

What is to be done about all this? Here, I may be a better diagnostician than physician, but a clue to a

beneficial treatment is provided by the experience of a broken mainspring or the like, whereby one is temporarily reduced to single-barrel status. I have found this to induce a curiously calm or fatalistic frame of mind — uncomplicated, perhaps, by any subconscious preparations for getting off the second barrel if the first should prove of no avail, and undoubtedly good for one's shooting. Anyone can prove this for himself, if he is strong-minded enough to load one barrel only on some occasion when birds are coming freely. A short course of this heroic treatment could well prove sufficiently revealing to induce a change of outlook in the use of the first barrel, whereby some permanent improvement in performance might come about. Candour compels me to admit, however, that I have never tried the treatment myself, except temporarily and under compulsion.

TREATING A STOCK

You can give the stock a much better and more durable finish in the following manner: Remove the existing varnish with methylated spirit or other varnish remover, using a stiff nailbrush to clear the chequering. The stock should then be "CLANSED". First, wet it with a damp cloth and dry it over an open flame such as a gas ring. Be careful not to scorch or char the wood. This will raise the fibres of the grain. which should then be rubbed down with the finest kind of steel wool. Repeat two or three times. Finish with the steel wool until the wood is perfectly smooth.

Then warm the stock again and apply a mixture of three parts of boiled linseed oil and one part of turpentine. Let the wood absorb as much as it can and then wipe off the surplus. Set aside for a week. Subsequently rub in very small quantities of the oil and turpentine mixture thoroughly with the palm of the hand. Repetition of this treatment at intervals of a week will work up a fine and durable polish which can be restored at intervals by small applications of oil and turpentine well rubbed in.

There are more elaborate treatments, but the above perfectly adequate for one to whom a gun is primarily a sporting weapon and not a cabinet specimen.

LEAVE IT BROKEN

Always keep the safety catch of your gun at "Safe" except when you raise it to shoot, and during intervals of shooting when your gun is unloaded it is preferable to leave it broken (open) so that all may see

that it is unloaded. That is a good rule for everyone, but particularly for beginners who have their reputations to make.

When loading and closing the breech the stock of a gun should always be raised to the barrels so that they remain pointing to the ground. If the process is reversed and the barrels raised to the stock. it could result in the gun pointing directly at somebody.

Carry your gun in the crook of your arm with the barrels pointing to the ground or on your shoulder with the trigger-guard uppermost so that the barrels point to the sky.

On entering a car, boat, house or other building, never assume that your gun is unloaded; always check to make sure, and never leave it anywhere if there is the slightest chance of its being knocked over.


