

The Editor's Notebook



A.C.T.A. 1967 NATIONAL CHAM-PIONSHIPS and INTERNATIONAL MATCH will be conducted at the grounds of the Gold Coast Gun Club (formerly the South Coast Gun Club), Queensland, commencing at 8.00 a.m. daily over the five days, Saturday, June 10, until p.m. Wednesday, June 14, inclusive. The programme (which includes the Queen's Birthday holiday on the Monday) has been amended to avoid a carry-over of events and will progress as follows, with the provision that, subject to time permitting each day, a \$300 Cash Handicap event will be added. The first day, Saturday, will see the winner of the coveted Champion of Champions Cup (1966 winner was M. Burgess of Cobar, N.S.W.). On the second day. Sunday, the National Intermediate Championship (1966 winner, T. Holmes, N.S.W.) will be shot in conjunction with the National Double-Barrel Championship (1966 winner, V. Ryan, Vic.). The third day, Monday, will commence with the National Single - Barrel Championship (1966 winner, D. Glover, Vic.), followed by the National Double Rise Championship (1966 winner, W. Charlton, N.S.W.). On the fourth day, Tuesday, the 1967 Australia - New Zealand Championship shall be contested. A \$300 Handicap event is then scheduled to take place. For the fifth and final day, the Twenty-first Inter-national Teams' Match will be con-ducted (Australian Team to be the 30 highest aggregate scorers in the Aust. - N.Z. Championship and the Aust. Nat. S.B. and D.B. Championships — of which only the best 25

scores are to count. Final scores are to be withheld pending complete results from overseas). The last scheduled event is to be the Eighteenth Grand Australian \$550 Handicap. The High Gun Trophy will be a B2, Grade (d), Special Trap 2 model Under and Over shotgun, the broad-rib type with 30-inch barrels, donated annually since 1966 by the makers, Fabrique Nationale of Belgium and Gollin & Co. of Sydney (as agents for N.S.W., Q'land and S. Aust.), with the provision that it may be won only once by any shooter. This will be competed for over the programmed events numbered 1 to 7 inclusive.

If a shoot-off is necessary to determine the High Gun winner, then the shoot-off shall be shot under handicap conditions.

During the programme all New Zealand shooters will shoot two yards back from their New Zealand handicaps and ALL SHOOTERS MUST SHOW CURRENT HANDICAP CARDS WHEN NOMINATING FOR EACH EVENT.

The official photographer at the A.C.T.A. National shoots will be F. LANG of P.O. Box 40, TWEED HEADS, N.S.W.

Trophies will be presented daily from a dais after each event.



RANDOM SHOTS OF A ROVING SHOOTER -



It augurs well for the 1967 International that it is being held at the Gold Coast Club, Southport (Qld.). This club's recent annual Carnival revealed five good traps, well placed for shooters and spectators, there being a clear view from the Clubhouse itself, while an intermediate grandstand about half-way down the tracks provides further comfort. A tree - populated "field" atmosphere about the place makes it seem natural to be shooting there. The whole layout is within a couple of miles of the happy, good-time towns of South-port and Surfer's Paradise, and the access road is easy. One feels sure that domestic and overseas visitors will enjoy their stay, whether their shooting form should happen to be in a state of delightful elevation or regrettable depression.

The Carnival itself was highly successful for the club, as well as being enjoyable for the shooters. The Committee and their helpers, often over-burdened but never flustered, were in complete command of the situation at all times; they deserve the fullest credit for the unselfish hours which they devoted to making it so.

President Andy Gordon was often to be found at the day's end, cheerfully engaged in the humble tasks of collecting empty bottles and glasses from the lawn-tables, or replenishing paper-rolls in the appropriate places.

The prodigious efforts of the Hogarth family was appreciated by all; Ray, probably the busiest clubcaptain in existence, and the dedicated secretary, who also happens to be his wife, Lee; son George, who undoubtedly reduced his chances of glory by applying himself unstintingly to the tasks of the shoot, and decorative daughters Clare and Carol, who, youth being as sensible as it is, must have preferred shooting a reverse experience. Seeking to fill

The family capped these works with a resounding party, enlivened by aquatic and other novelty events, which contributed to the Carnival's success.

The system of staggering the shooting days makes this a truly Carnival time. Although it occupies a period of nine days, shooting takes place on only five of them, plus two nights. This gives the Committee a chance to catch breath. It also prevents holidaying wives becoming shotgun widows for 5 days straight, and affords the weary shooter an opportunity to relax at less strenuous sports such as tennis, surfing, fishing, golf, water-skiing, ten-pin bowling and dodging motor cars.

The programme was highlighted by some sparkling shooting. Keith Cameron (Roma, Qld.) shot 174 straight, edging his old rival Doug. Smith (Gold Coast, Qld.) out of the Pacific Coast Double - barrel Cham-pionship by one bird. They were both hotly pursued by Bruce Mackey (Brisbane, Qld.), who shot flawlessly until a target escaped, undamaged but doubtlessly terrified. The last time these two cartridge-wasters met, Doug, had to string-up 300 straight to secure victory. That heroic tussle was staged on the same grounds — obviously they have no complaints about the traps.

The Teams Match was filled with interest and surprises, causing chaffing and chuckles, which after all is the main purpose of teams matches. Neil McGilp, feeling lonely without his Dalby (Qld.) mates, scrounged a team of unattached shooters of unknown quality and delightedly "did over" the whole field. If he is able to pick fast horses as unerringly as he can shooters, the race-course would provide him with an easy path to riches. Don Scowcroft had the breaker to scoring shooters' breaks. a gap in the Sydney team, he

approached a roving shooter, found him unattached and willing, and went off to round up the rest of the team, as happy as though he had shown good sense — for the rover crashed six points, and the team still finished but one point behind the winners. It was very sad.

As ladies on race-courses love to display their incomprehensible hats, so at this Carnival the men took a whirl at creating fashion headlines. Keith Cameron appeared, only briefly, we regret, in an enormous Mexican creation which, as well as protecting himself, provided shade for a small group of people around him. It strained at its moorings in the slightest breeze, but fortunately Keith is of a hefty physique and was able to remain aground. Fred Lang (Gold Coast) sported a crimson sombrero

which Annie Oakley would have bought on the spot, while a petite, high-crowned model in the Swiss tradition was worn by a shooter whose name escapes me. There were others with lesser claims to distinction but having solid worth as objects d'art — the pigmy type in felts or straws with such a faint attempt at a brim that it would have delighted Chief Rain-in-the-Face; the wide-brimmed, swashbuckling straws in the manner of the Southern Gentleman, and the beat-up Slouches, obviously straying from the rifle-range.

There are shoots which we all look forward to some day attending — Hay, Mt. Gambier, the International, Deniliquin. Add the Gold Coast Carnival to the list — you will not be disappointed.

ANCESTORS OF THE CLAY PIGEON

(With Acknowledgments to "Outdoor Life and Bill Depperman, via C. Ollera of Guyra, N.S.W.)

Clay pigeons are not made of clay and do not resemble pigeons.

It will probably come as a surprise to the average shooter today that the first demonstration of the original "flying saucer" which sparked the modern clay target (and that's still not made of clay), was held at Coney Island, N.Y., in 1880 by its inventor. He was a Cincinnati trap shooter named George Ligowsky.

Ligowsky invented his clay pigeon as a substitute for a substitute. Ligowsky's clay bird was intended to replace the glass ball, which in turn had been invented to replace live pigeons in trap shooting. If you've forgotten, trap shooting gets its name from the once popular sport of shooting live pigeons as they were released from traps. The public outcry against shooting pigeons helped produce the glass balls. But glass balls weren't the only things the outcry produced.

Old-timers with good memories may remember some of the Rube Goldberg-like attempts that were made to imitate pigeons in flight. But few modern shooters have any conception of the weird procession of gadgets that began shortly after the Civil War and didn't end even after George Ligowsky invented the clay pigeon.

Depending upon how far back you want to go, the inspiration for trap shooting can be stretched back almost to earliest recorded history. Homer mentions "popinjay shooting" in the "Iliad". In this sport the Greeks shot arrows at a dove. During the Middle Ages this sport was also popular. Usually a popinjay was a stuffed parrot mounted atop a pole. When live birds were used, a cord kept the bird from flying away. The last public popinjay shoot with bow and arrow in England occurred in 1792.

There is some doubt as to whether shooting at live pigeons with a gun originated in this country or England. The earliest date this writer has encountered seems to place the origin of the sport in America. Apparently Cincinnati was one of the first places where trap shooting was organised. In 1831, about twenty years before the great slaughter of passenger pigeons really got under way, Cincinnati shooters not only used passenger pigeons in their traps, but also quail. Around 1900, English sparrows were used in the Middle West.



The "Old Hats"

Trap shooting was first practised in England even prior to about 1856 by "frequenters of low public houses". Then the Earl of Stamford took up the sport and made it respectable. The first fashionable pigeon club near London was given the name "Old Hats". Its name derives from the fact that old top hats were used to cover the holes in which the pigeons were kept prior to release when the hats were pulled off the holes. The use of old hats for trap covers was discarded rather soon, and innumerable devices were invented with sliding covers which could be opened with cords by an attendant behind the shooter.

The English used native pigeons and later imported Belgian pigeons and also used their own larks and sparrows. "Low characters" even hooded the birds to make them fly more slowly.


While there was a public clamour against shooting live pigeons over against shooting live pigeons over traps, substitutes for live birds seem to have been thought of even before criticism of bird shooting became vociferous. But once a successful substitute was perfected, live pigeon shooting was practically doomed.

Glass balls were the first substitutes for live birds. Charles Portlock of Boston, Mass., is credited with their invention in 1866, but it was not until many years later when such famed shots as Captain A. H. Bogar-dus, Dr. W. F. Carver, and others aus, Dr. W. F. Carver, and others made long-run records with balls that glass balls received their biggest use. By that time clay pigeons which the English called "mud saucers" were beginning to fly.

----- Feathers and Fertilizer

Glass balls came in various sizes and colours. Some were corrugated, others sanded. Some burst into what looked like smoke when struck. Others emitted feathers or a flash of light. But all glass balls had one thing in common: they littered the shooting grounds with broken glass.

Balls made of resin were tried. These had to be brittle to break, and frequently they weren't brittle enough. Light pottery balls which it was claimed would dissolve after rains also came along. And a hopeful fellow brought out a ball made of what was advertised as a fertilizer.



It took the combined efforts of an Englishman and an American to figure out a scheme to attach one end of an elastic cord to a post and the other to a ball. You pulled the ball just about to the point where the cord would break. Then you let it go and shot at it. No fooling, this was patented in 1888.

Rubber balloons were also tried. They were fitted into a cardboard disc and looked like toy copies of the planet Saturn. Here the idea was to hit the balloon and deflate it.

The throwing device used for glass balls influenced the design of many of the targets. One novel "ball" was made of wire to which a paper bird was hooked. The paper birds cost a penny apiece and could be re-used if the pellet holes of prior hits were marked.

Then along came a "gyro trap" that shot a propeller-like target into the air. This device was popular for a time in this country, England, France, Belgium, and India. A variation was a "flying top" that had a propeller mounted in a hunk of clay.


Another idea introduced after the clay pigeon was a kind of brass saucer filled with powdered charcoal which was supposed to explode into a cloud of black dust when a pasteboard that held it in place was shot out. Later, similar "birds" were filled with bran.

The "tin pigeon" didn't live long, either. It was shaped somewhat like a conventional clay target with a metal disc attached to it by a small chain. The disc was supposed to disengage from its position in the target and dangle on the chain when it was struck by a pellet. Trouble was that the disc didn't always disengage when struck or it disengaged as soon as it was thrown into the air.

E. E. Thresher of Aurora, Indiana, finally came on the market with what looked like the answer - to Mr. Thresher that is. He called it his "artificial live bird", and it was made of "high grade" steel in the shape of a wild pigeon. Like so many wonof a wild pigeon. Like so many wonderfully good ideas, it took too much
other equipment to make it work.
Thresher's steel pigeon ran along a
wire that passed around grooved
trolley wheels operated by hand
cranks that looked like two overturned bicycles. One thing that can be said for this target: It was about the only one that looked like a pigeon.


If you think the inventors had a hard life, think of the poor trap shooters who had to hit the targets.

George Ligowsky, inventor of the clay target, must have tried most of clay target, must have tried most of the peculiar gadgets that his con-temporaries had dreamed up and figured that if someone didn't call a stop, trap shooters would all go hay-wire wondering whether their next target was going to erupt into smoke, feathers, or fertilizer.



According to the story, Ligowsky was at the seashore one day idly watching youngsters skipping shells over the water. Presumably his eyes followed the shells as they arched through the air and perhaps he even began to "lead" the shells with an imaginary shotgun. The records are not elaborate, but it can be assumed that he picked up some shells and conjectured that the inverted - saucer shape of a shell was what gave it its stability in flight. A perfectly circular saucer would have even greater stability.

In the year 1880 Ligowsky gave the first exhibition of his clay pigeon, but like many inventors, he didn't

have easy sailing. He made the mistake of making his clay pigeon of clay. Being new at it, he didn't realise that you don't make clay targets of clay. He made an even worse mistake - he fired his clay targets in a kiln until they were almost as hard as bricks. They were so hard that frequently they wouldn't break at all. When you'd hit them, they'd ring like a bell. That could have been the death knell of the clay pigeon if Ligowsky had not abandoned clay. Some folks tried to use only pitch.

That wasn't good, either, except in cold weather, and if you handled the targets carefully. In the heat of the summer, pitch targets became soft and limp. You could bend them and shoot them full of holes, but it was hard to break them. Pitch and lime-stone are the principal ingredients in modern clay targets (which still contain no clay), but earlier targets were also made of mixtures of pitch and ashes, resin and plaster.

---- Modern Trap Targets--

Manufacturing modern trap targets (let's just stop calling them clay targets) isn't a hard job, as it's performed by one of the country's biggest producers, Western Cartridge Company. The molten mixture of pitch and limestone is poured into water-cooled moulds in a continuous process and they stream out of the machines on endless belts. Just before they're painted, they're trimmed off. Then they're stacked 15 high into corrugated fibre boxes and away they go, ready to be broken by shooters.

When targets pour out of the moulding machines, they are black, but they receive a swatch of colour. These colours include white, orange, red, yellow, and pink. Different kinds of background against which targets are thrown require targets with contrasting colours. In the Pacific Northwest, orange and red are favoured. At the Iowa State shoot only orange targets have been used for years, and in Cuba you'll generally find pink

After its long and bizarre background, the modern White Flyer trap target looks like a very simple thing. It is, yet you'd be surprised to know how many different words it takes to

describe it. The flat top is called the poker chip, the circular rim about the chip is called the ledge, and the rounded part that leads down to the side is the dome. The flat side is the flange. One of the most popular targets has sixteen scorings on the underside which help break it into pieces even if lightly hit by only a few shot pellets.

While White Flyers must be brittle enough to break when struck by only one or two pellets, they must also be strong enough to be shipped piled 15 high. Moreover, they must hold together when being thrown from a trap with enough force to send them spinning out at 60 miles an hour, revolving at the rate of about 5,000 revolutions per minute.

The arch of its deep saucer shape gives a target its strength, as do the ledges which also make it possible to stack the targets for shipment and for feeding into automatic trapthrowing machines. Uniformity in weight and shape produces uniformity in flight. A target weighs a fraction over 3½ ounces, is about 4½ inches in diameter, and measures a little over an inch from top to bottom.

A White Flyer in flight combines the qualities of an aeroplane wing and a gyroscope. George Ligowsky probably didn't know anything about either. Being circular, a target has an advantage lacked by the irregular-shaped sea shells observed by Ligowsky. However, it has one quality which the shells also have. It's made partly of limestone.


Revolving at speeds up to 5,000 revolutions per minute when it is perfectly thrown, a circular trap target has a gyroscopic stabilising effect that keeps it going in one direction. This great speed sets up powerful centrifugal forces which you release when you make a direct hit that "smokes" the target.

To you it may appear to be just a puff of black smoke that you see for a satisfying moment as a tribute to your skill. A scientist sees something else happening. When shot pellets break a target into thousands of minute particles, he sees centrifugal forces releasing each particle in the direction it was headed at the moment the spinning target was

broken. This goes on only for a brief instant before the force of gravity brings the particles back to earth.

Of course what makes the modern White Flyer of interest and of practical use is the gadget that sends it spinning through the air. It's the throwing device called the trap. There are various types, one for trap shooting, another for skeet, and one for practice. Some are released mechanically, and some electrically.

But the fun of shooting at trap targets is not confined to folks who have the advantage of a club. The simple little Western hand trap can turn any adequately protected open space into a hunting preserve. With a little easily acquired skill, almost anyone can quickly learn to pitch trap targets as far as 70 yards and make them do tricks that match a twisting quail and a towering grouse.



Although some people can throw their own targets, usually two people are required, one to pitch and one to shoot. The thrower stands behind and at one side of the gunner, and if he wants to put his friend's shooting skill to a real test, he can throw just about any kind of target that's in the book. If you want some fun, pack a hand trap and a case of targets in your car the next time you head for open country.

After you've said everything there is to know about a trap target and the gadgets that hurl them, there is only one thing a shooter really wants to know, and that's how to break the target. The recipe for this reads a great deal more simply than its accomplishment: Apply the stock of a shotgun to the shoulder and blaze away.

ABC's for Sportsmen

There is much more to sportsmanship than the mere practice of to-the-letter obedience to the game laws. A man may never violate a game law or break a club rule, but still not be a real sportsman, for he may refrain from doing these things because he has to, not because he wants to. Real sportsmanship cannot be defined or bounded by rules. It is embedded in an inherent sense of fair play, which one may or may not possess. No rules can plant it in the inner man, but unless the sense of fair play is possessed and its dictates followed, no man can rightfully wear the laurel of true sportsmanship.

There are certain maxims, however, that are worthy of constant remembrance, lest we carelessly or thoughtlessly stray from proper field behaviour. They are not rules, just reminders. As they run the gamut of alphabet, I call them ABC's for Sportsmen. They could just as well be called XYZ's, too. I think they're worth looking over.

Here they are:-

Always practice safe gun-handling.

Be considerate of land-owner. You are his guest.

Conduct yourself as a Sportsman should.

Don't be a game hog.

Educate youth in the principles of sportsmanship.

Favour the fellow who is hunting with you.

Give wild-life a break. Work for its conservation.

Have the location of your hunting partner always in mind.

Influence others to hunt safely.

Join a sportsman's organization.

Keep that gun muzzle elevated.

Leave some game for seed-stock.

Make sure of your target before you shoot.

Never leave a cripple to go to waste.

Obey the game laws to the letter.

Put yourself in the other fellow's place. Treat him accordingly.

Quit harping about game shortages and do something about it.

Retrieve every piece of game you knock down.

Share your game bag with the farmer.

Take a boy, other than your own, hunting or fishing.

Unite your fellow sportsmen in a common effort to provide better hunting and fishing.

Value, and protect your privilege to own and bear firearms.

Work for all sound game-management measures.


