# "to cook your ducks"



Remove the wings at the joint nearest the body and the legs at the first joint above the feet.

Pull out the large feathers near wings and tail. Pick duck thoroughly. Paraffin wax and water will do a neat, quick job of removing the feathers. The method is: place 12 oz. of paraffin in 6 pints of water in a pot, bring water to the boil and remove from the heat. Melted paraffin will float on top of the water.

Immerse each duck in the water so that a coating of paraffin adheres to the feathers and then set the bird aside to cool.

When the paraffin has hardened, small feathers and down may be removed easily by scraping with a small knife. Paraffin may be used many times. Like all game birds, Duck should be allowed to hang in temperature just

above freezing for at least 48 hours before they are cooked.

A simple recipe for Roast Duck is:

First stuff with sliced apple or whole peeled onion. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover breast with two very thin slices of either fat, salt-pork or bacon. Arrange birds in roasting pan and bake for 15 to 30 minutes (according to size) in very hot oven at approximately 450 deg. F. Basting every 5 minutes with fat from pan.

Remove the apple or onion and serve with Orange Sauce.

# Australia-New Zealand Annual Teams' Match for the GLEN CUP

#### History

This is an inter-Dominion shoot between Australia and New Zealand which commenced in Southport, Qld. (where it was dead-heated) eight years ago. This event is shot alternatively, year by year, in Australia, thence New Zealand, and progressive results to date are:—

After a number of visits by individuals and groups of shooters each way across the Tasman Sea during the 1950's, prominent N.Z. shooters Peter Matheson and Bill Nix, in March 1960, offered to present a trophy to commence official tours, with the trophy to be known as the Glenn Cup in honour of T.M. ("Tom") Glenn.

#### Shoot Procedure

All team members make their own travel arrangements, teams to consist of six shooters. Both teams shoot at 20 targets per shooter from 16 yards. Two barrels are permitted and either barrel shall be of equal value, kills only to count, ten targets per visit, two visits to the traps. Each competitor to shoot from the five tracks, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off ten targets per shooter until one team survives. Cartridges shall be of the prescribed 1k oz. shot load as for the championship series.

Australian Team Selection (1968)

The six top Australian scorers in the Australia/New Zealand Championship comprise the Australian team.

New Zealand Team Selection (1968)

The six top New Zealand scorers in the Australian National Doublebarrel Championship. A shoot-off will be held for this team if necessary, but if the shoot-off cannot be arranged, the team Captain will make the final selection.

# The Editor's Notebook



#### **REGISTERED SHOOTERS**

Article 49 of the Articles of Association of the Australian Clay Target Association states: (a) The Association shall keep a register of shooters and no person may enter or compete at any Association competition or event conducted by a member Club of which a Delegate is a member of the Association unless such person is registered with the Association and is not in arrears with his subscription.

(b) Each member Club and each member who is the Delegate of an unincorporated Club shall BEFORE THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF JAN-UARY IN EACH YEAR supply the Secretary with a full and accurate list of all members and shooters registered with such club for the year commencing on the first day of January of such year and shall at the same time remit to the Secretary the subscriptions of such Club members and shooters. Each member Club and each member who is the Delegate of an unincorporated Club shall also promptly forward to the Secretary of the Association the names and subscriptions of any persons joining such club or registering as shooters after the thirty-first day of January in any year.

The above information is given for the benefit of secretaries and shooters alike. In the past, the cost to the Association of the preparation and mailing A.C.T.A. shooting "News" to unfinancial shooters has been far too heavy. MARCH 1968 "NEWS" WILL BE MAILED ONLY TO SHOOTERS FINANCIAL (ACTUALLY RE-CEIVED BY THE A.C.T.A.) AS OF FEBRUARY 16, 1968.

#### DELEGATE APPOINTMENT

Affiliated units of the A.C.T.A. are reminded that they are entitled to one delegate (Article 15) to represent their interests at the Annual Meeting. However, delegates can only be accepted providing the Association "Articles of Association" are completion of the necessary forms, namely "Acceptance of Membership (Article 5(a)), "Nomination of Representative" (Article 21) (in the case of a corporate club, or "Nomination of Delegate" (Articles 5(c) and 16) (in the case of an unincorporated club), followed finally by "Notice of Acceptance of Delegates". Official printed forms as applicable are obtainable from the A.C.T.A. office. It should be noted that nomination of a representative or member delegate can only be accepted providing all subscriptions and monies due by either the nominee or the club, to the Association, have been paid as provided for in Article 49.

It is also pointed out that where a representative or delegate has been appointed previously, and this has not been officially rescinded, the appointment as previously made will stand, until the Association is advised or instructed otherwise. In accordance with the Articles of Association, clubs cannot appoint a delegate other than on the prescribed form (letters are unacceptable).

Each 1967 financial affiliated member club has been mailed a Delegate Card (for unincorporated clubs) or a Representative Card (for incorporated clubs). These cards must be presented by the respective financial shooters concerned to obtain permission to attend and be eligible to vote at future annual general meetings.

#### 1968 ANNUAL MEETING

The 1968 annual meeting of affiliated club delegates and representatives of member clubs will be held on Sunday, March 10, at the Blair Athol Hotel (half-way between Adelaide and the Gun Club on the Prospect Road). Delegates and representatives to assemble at 7.30 p.m. and the meeting to begin at 8.00 p.m.

Only such items as submitted within the Association Articles and published on the Agenda shall be discussed.

JANUARY - FEBRUARY, 1968

The election of seats on the Executive Committee of the Association will take place during the holding of the 1968 Annual General Meeting of the A.C.T.A. at the Blair Athol Hotel, Prospect, South Australia, during the evening of Sunday, March 10.

A.C.T.A. 1968 NATIONAL CHAM-PIONSHIPS and INTERNATIONAL MATCH will be conducted over five traps at the grounds of the South Australian Gun Club (S. Aust.) at the thirteen-mile post out of Adelaide on the Port Wakefield Road, commencing at 8.00 a.m. daily over the five days, Saturday, March 9, until p.m. Wednesday, March 13, inclusive. The programme has been amended to avoid a carry-over of events and will progress as follows, with the provision that, subject to time per-mitting each day, a \$300 Cash Han-dicap event will be added. The first day, Saturday, will see the winner of the coveted Champion of Chamof the coveted Champion of Cham-pions Cup (1967 winner was W. Stevens, Ipswich, Q.). On the second day, Sunday, the National Intermedi-ate Championship (1967 winner, P. A. Veale, N.Z.) will be shot in con-junction with the National Double-barrel Championship (1967 winner, D. Smith, Qld.). The third day, Mon-day will commence with the National day, will commence with the National Single - barrel Championship (1967 winner, also D. Smith, Qld.), followed by the National Double Rise Championship (1967 winner, J. N. Thomas, V.). On the fourth day, Tuesday, the 1968 Australia - New Zealand Championship (1967 winner was K. Hey-wood, N.S.W.) shall be contested; this will be followed by the Australia-New Zealand Teams' Match for the Tom Glenn Cup.

[NOTE: Results of these Aust./ N.Z. contests, to date, are shown elsewhere in this publication (with acknowledgements to N.Z.G.C.A. Secretary, W. H. Stewart).]

A \$300 Handicap event is then scheduled to take place. For the fifth and final day, the Twenty-second International Teams' Match for the Mackintosh Trophy will be conducted (Australian Team to be the 30 highest aggregate scorers in the Aust. N.Z. Ch'ship and the Aust. Nat. S.B. and D.B. Ch'ships—of which only the

best 25 scores are to count. Final scores are to be withheld pending complete results from overseas). The last scheduled event is to be the Nineteenth Grand Australian \$550 Handicap. The High Gun Trophy will be donated again by Fabrique Nationale of Belgium and Gollin & Co. of Sydney (as agents for N.S.W., Q'land and S. Aust.), with the provision that it may be won only once by any shooter. This will be competed for over the **programmed** events numbered 1 to 7 inclusive. (1966 High Gun, C. Hartley, N.Z.; 1967 High Gun, M. Burgess, Cobar.)

If a shoot-off is necessary to determine the High Gun winner, then the shoot-off shall be shot under handicap conditions.

During the programme all New Zealand shooters will shoot two yards back from their New Zealand handicaps and ALL SHOOTERS MUST SHOW CURRENT HANDICAP CARDS WHEN NOMINATING FOR EACH EVENT.

The official photographer at the A.C.T.A. National shoots will be F. LANG of P.O. Box 40, TWEED HEADS, N.S.W.

Trophies will be presented daily from a dais after each event.

Ten Referees are required for the 1968 National Championships—applications to be forwarded to A.C.T.A. for submission and consideration.

Cartridges to be used in the 1968 National and International Championships shall be of the same load as in the 1966 series, but contained in a plastic shell with appropriate markings.

Official Travel Agent for the series will be TRANS AUSTRALIA AIR-LINES of 50 Franklin St., Melbourne, Vic.

Official Accommodation Agent is Mrs. Dorothy Dowling Agency of 74 Melbourne Street, North Adelaide, South Aust.

Visiting New Zealand shooters and their wives are invited to a buffet luncheon on the Saturday—admission by ticket from A.C.T.A. Secretary.

New Zealand shooters are reminded that Mr. Malcolm Fuller of Fuller Firearms, Sydney, will donate a highgrade Stirling shotgun to the first New Zealander to win the Australian Double - barrel Championship or the Australia - New Zealand Championship. (With acknowledgments to N.Z.G.C.A. "Gunshot" publication --Sept., 1967.)

The final series of the 1968 International Teams' Match will be conducted on Friday, July 5, near Cardiff, Wales, and a cordial invitation has been extended by the Clay Pigeon Shooting Association to any Australian shooters wishing to attend.

The 1969 Australian National Clay Target Trapshooting Championships will be conducted in the State of Victoria at a place and date yet to be decided.

The 1970 Australian National Championships. The Executive Committee has recommended for the consideration of the 1969 Committee that, subject to bitumen road and rail facilities being A1, the 1970 National Championships be held in Perth (W. Aust.).

The 1967 Interstate Teams' Match was won by Victoria with a combined score of 495/300 (shot at Geelong G.C. 13-5-67). Details Nov. '67 News.

The 1967 Interstate Skeet Teams' Match was won by Victoria with a combined score of 120/125 (shot at Australian G.C. 2-9-67). Consequent upon a delay in the despatch of the West Australian results of the 1967 Interstate Skeet Teams' Match, amended and complete details of this contest are as listed elsewhere in this publication. The W.A. team shot 113/125.

The 1968 New Zealand Championship series will be conducted by the New Zealand Gun Club's Association at the Timaru Gun Club from Saturday, March 30, through to Saturday, April 6, inclusive.

At the time of going to press, no information has been received from either the Australian Olympic Federation or the Australian Joint Shooting Council concerning the 1968 Olympic Games (Mexico City in March), neither do we know whether any shotgunners are to be included in the Australian Team.

Club Secretaries are advised :----

1. And all shooters are reminded that CURRENT HANDICAP CARDS MUST BE PRESENTED AT ALL SHOOTS.

2. Due to the high costs involved, club secretaries will no longer receive a gratis copy of A.C.T.A. Clay Target Shooting News. The Executive Committee is aware of the present - day increases of all attendant costs and wishes to remind clubs and shooters alike that unless registration fees increase, all break badge insignia and other free material (excepting "International Badges") will have to be curtailed.

3. Handicap cards must be handed to the club Secretary when nominating at any shoot. The card will then be marked whether, or not, of any alteration under the handicapping formula, or with an asterisk (\*) where the full programme has not been contested. A.C.T.A. must then be informed, within seven days, by use of the new handicap return form as issued to all clubs. Shooters shall collect their cards at the completion of the day's programme. (See Dec. '67 "News" for full details.)

4. ANNUAL SHOOTER REGIS-TRATION FEE of \$3.00 is payable via club secretaries.

5. To non-shooter subscribers A.C.T.A. Shooting "News" is \$5.00 per annum. No pro-rata rates are considered.

6. The Handicapping Formula is calculated on the retail value of trophies.

7. Handicapping —

(a) The Formula commences "Cash or Trophy value wins and divisions obtained in one day" — this includes yardage prizes. Thus, a shooter may be handicapped after his results in, say, the first event, but, unless that plus his results in the following events do not total in excess of \$101, then only one yard per day can be applied to the shooter. (b) Championships ---

(i) A shooter winning a championship which is shot from in front of his current A.C.T.A. handicap receives no alteration to his recorded handicap.

(ii) A shooter winning a championship which is shot from behind his current A.C.T.A. handicap receives an immediate handicap alteration to that of the championship.

(iii) A shooter winning a championship which is shot from his own current A.C.T.A. handicap receives an immediate adjustment according to the Handicapping Formula and the prescribed Championship Trophies.

8. A.C.T.A. Rules for Down-theline and skeet shooting applicable as of January 1, 1968, are listed elsewhere in this publication.

9. Referees are reminded to watch all shooters and to observe the types of ammunition being used, as, under the varying conditions of light, the plastic wads as inserted by some manufacturers may be mistaken for a chip of the clay target.

All are reminded that when a target is broken, then the target usually deflects slightly one way or the other — either up or down, left or right.

10. Duties of a Referee

(1) A Referee should wear his badge at all times.

(2) when wearing such badge a Referee may be requested, by the club concerned, to referee the shoot and is obliged to assist accordingly.

(3) He should check all traps for correct heights and angles. (See diagram this publication.)

(4) He must only referee the event, but may release the targets where electric release is provided.

(5) He should never score, as this districts his attention.

11. The method of allocating trophies and prizes is:

(a) First, second and third trophy winners cannot take part in yardage prizes.

(b) Yardage prizes are a separate entity and are virtually a bonus for the respective best scorers within the groups concerned. 12. Enamelled metal badges are only struck by the makers against firm orders by this, your Association office. Club secretaries only may request these badges ON THE PRE-SCRIBED FORM, which will be of the standard A.C.T.A. insignia with the surround, containing the year, the championship title, the winner's initials and name. Such lettering on the surround will be in the following colours:—

Clubs are charged \$2.50 for each badge ordered.

13. Championship Sashes only may be ordered direct from the makers by club secretaries. Recommended and official makers are W. FLATTELY & SON, 11 ORR STREET, CARL-TON, 3053, VICTORIA. Colours for the respective gradings of championships are as for BADGES as shown above.

14. Break badges in cloth form are available free to shooters, but ONLY where the SCORE SHEETS as submitted by the Club Secretary ON THE PRESCRIBED FORM to A.C.T.A. Secretary, clearly show the shooter has earned this right. Break badges are for 50, 75, 100, 150, 200, 250 and 300 breaks (see Rule No. 91). Such a badge is also available free, on application by club Secretaries, for shooters who have attained the handicap of 27 yards.

15. Enamelled car badges are available at \$2.50.

16. Available to clubs on request at nominal prices are

- (a) shoot record books
- (b) shoot report forms (padded) for "News"
- (c) D.T.L. score sheets (padded)
- (d) Skeet score sheets (padded)
- (e) A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules D.T.L.
- (f) A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules Skeet
- 17. Rules Interpretations ----

(1) Rule 43 permits two malfunctions of a gun - referee will then declare "LOST TARGET". All malfunctions or misfires must be noted on score sheets, then on shoot records.

(2) All Ties shoot-offs (except Deauville Doubles, which are shot off in squads of two shooters) are shot squad system, in the same manner as the event was shot. All shooters commence on the same trap (except in the case of a major breakdown of the said trap).

Shooters shall be squadded in the same order in which they qualified. Shooters shall close up after each five targets per shooter and shall be re-squadded at the commencement of each run over the trap or traps.

(a) Single - Barrel and Double -Barrel down-the-line (5 tracks) are shot off the same yardage as the elimination event was shot, in squads of 5 or 6, unless insufficient shooters exist for the last squad. First missout.

(b) Mixed Birds — squads of 5 or 6 (as for S.B. or D.B.): (i) two targets Double Barrel; (ii) two targets Single Barrel; 5 tracks (first shooter commences on Number One track); (iii) two targets Walk-up (squads of 5 or 6) from the centre track. Number one shooter shoots at one target, he then returns to the rear of the squad, each shooter doing the same in turn; (iv) Double Rise — two pairs, each target to count as one point . (Total is 10 Points.)

(c) Walk-up (squads of 5 or 6 as in (a) above) to be shot in lots of 5 targets until finality. All shooters shoot from the centre track, Number one shooter shoots at one target he then returns to the rear of the squad, each shooter doing the same, in turn, as in Rule No. 96.

(d) Deauville Doubles (first missout) — shot from tracks 2 and 4, one team of two shooters at a time, as in Rule No. 94.

AT ALL TIMES, A SQUAD IS A SPECIFIC NUMBER OF SHOOT-ERS, thus:---

- squad of 5 = normal down-the-line squad of 6 = normal down-the-line
- last squad of 2 to 6 = normal down-the-line

Squad may be up to 10 (5 pairs) for Deauville Doubles, excepting the case of a last squad. (3) SLOW PULL:

Some shooters seem to consider they can decide whether a pull is "fast" or "slow", but this is NOT SO.

The DECISION of the REFEREE in all cases coming under his jurisdiction, as in A.C.T.A. Rules, shall be FINAL (Rule 14).

Also, Rule 31 states clearly -

"NO TARGET" shall be declared when a trap is sprung at a material interval of time before or after the call of "PULL". Thus, no referee would permit a delay (as in letters received) of up to three seconds within the meaning of this rule.

(4) Double-Rise Call. The Committee has instructed that the call in double-rise shooting must now be 0 1 or 11. In the past it has been found that a varying style of calling has been in vogue, and the Committee is most anxious that uniformity should be attained in this matter.

(5) "LOST BIRD" correct ruling— Shooter shooting double-barrel event has a misfire with first barrel and then shoots the second barrel and does not break the target. Shooter claimed a "no target". Referee refused and decision was "Lost Bird". The referee was quite correct in his decision — the shooter lost all equity in another target when he fired the second barrel. Shooters should remember that when they experience a misfire the shooter concerned should immediately hold up his gun above the shoulder (always pointing towards the trap house) and call for the referee. The referee is then required to test the gun by pulling the trigger, and if the gun fails to fire, he gives his decision.

18. A.C.T.A. Rules require that all Commonwealth, State and District Titles, plus any event over \$100 value, must be applied for on the prescribed form. The lodging of an advertisement only, without any application, merely holds up the procedure involving return mails.

19. Due to the volume of work handled by the Secretary, it has been decided that Executive Committee members will adjudicate on shoot queries and procedure.

Would all member clubs and registered shooters please note this and contact their nearest Executive Committee member accordingly, when so required.

20. CLAY TARGET SHOOTING ON SUNDAYS — STATE OF VIC-TORIA — permission is subject to approval of the Victorian State Government Chief Secretary through the controlling central body. A.C.T.A. will forward, when requested, the appropriate forms for application. Clubs must then at least, one month in advance, submit through A.C.T.A.:

1. standard A.C.T.A. shoot request form showing programme and date(s) concerned;

2. "Sunday shooting" forms (two copies) — [NOTE: Four copies must be completed, of which one is to be lodged with the club's local municipal authority, another with the officer in charge of the Police Station nearest to the gun-club range, thence two copies to A.C.T.A. for submission to the Chief Secretary's office.]

The A.C.T.A. will advise the club of the outcome as soon as it is available. NO firearms may be discharged without this permission in writing, also Sunday shooting of clay targets is permitted between 12 noon and 6 p.m. only.

22. Open Season for Protected Game Shooting (see Dec. '67 "News") - additional information received since publication:-

(i) Western Australia - Minister for Fisheries and Fauna has accepted the principle that the opening date for the duck shooting season be set on a biological basis rather than a traditional date. Thus the 1968 Duck season OPENS -

(a) at 6.00 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 13, in that part of the State which lies within the boundaries of the shires of Harvey, Dardenup, Collie, Donnybrook, Capel, Busselton, Augusta - Margaret River, Nannup, Balingup, Greenbushes, Bridgetown and Manjimup.

(b) at 5.00 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 14, in the remainder of those parts of the State which lie within the boundaries of the S.W. and Eucla Land Divisions, with the exception of those shires in (a) above, or those areas defined as closed under the headings "General" and "Specific" areas in the 1968 special publication.

The 1968 Duck season CLOSES, unless otherwise proclaimed, throughout the whole of the Eucla and S.W. Land Dviisions at 7.00 p.m. on April 30.

DO NOT KEEP WILD DUCKS IN CAPTIVITY.

22. (ii) New South Wales - This is the third year that Game Licences (\$2) have been required for wild duck shooting.

Conditions are:---

(a) Ducks taken under game licence cannot be sold.

(b) Licence is not transferrable.

(c) Licence does not authorize taking or killing in any sanctuary or on private property without consent of the owner.

(d) Licence must be available for inspection on demand.

(e) The use of a firearm will be the only legal method of taking ducks.

(f) The taking of ducks from a powered boat on the move and the use of live decoys are both banned. It is not anticipated that the season will be very successful due to drought conditions prevailing over most of western central and south-western New South Wales. However, New England and North Coast Districts have had favourable conditions during the latter half of 1967 and prospects in these areas are better than for the open season of 1967.

### CLAY TARGET (D.T.L.) SHOOTING RULES

#### Applicable from 1st January, 1968

0

#### COMPETITION.

Rule No. 1.—Wheresoever the word "competition" may be used in the following rules, it is to be understood to refer to each particular event, and must at all times be so construed by the management, in whose charge the carrying out of such "competition" has been entrusted.

#### THE MANAGEMENT.

Rule No. 2. — The management of any club holding a tournament, or other competition, under these rules has the authority to reject any entry in the said tournament, or other competition, without giving any reason therefore, and to disqualify in whole or in part, any competitor who acts in an ungentlemanly or disorderly manner, or who handles his gun dangerously.

#### COMPETITOR.

Rule No. 3. — A competitor is one who has nominated for the particular event and whose name appears on the official score sheets or score board. A competitor can only compete once in each event. Each competitor shall carry his Handicap and Registration Card at all shoots.

Rule No. 4. — A competitor must be at the firing point within two minutes after having been called by the official referee, scorer or a member of the club management. Failing therein, he may be disqualified or be penalised with loss of targets.

Rule No. 5. — A competitor shall hold his gun in a position of safety, with breech open at all times.

Rule No. 6. — When at the firing point ready for competition, the competitor shall distinctly give the command, "Pull", to the puller, and thereafter the competitor is in the competition. Rule No. 7. — When firing, the competitor's feet must be behind the firing mark assigned to him, and he must stand with both feet within eighteen (18) inches on either side of the centre of this mark. Should the competitor fail to observe the above rule, a "lost target" will be declared.

Rule No. 8. — Shooting on the grounds at any place other than the firing point at legitimate targets only is prohibited except where a pattern plate is installed.

Rule No. 9. — No competitor shall make, negotiate or discuss any bet (either on his own shooting or that of any other competitor) while he is at the firing point or shooting tracks, nor shall he leave the firing point or shooting tracks for the purpose of making, negotiating or discussing any bet. If any competitor infringes this rule, he may be disqualified by the referee.

Rule No. 10. — When it is his turn to shoot, a competitor shall close his gun only when at the firing point and facing the traps. He must remove the cartridge or cartridges from his gun before turning from the firing point on No. 5 track and proceeding to No. 1 track. The cartridge or cartridges must be removed from any magazine gun between each track.

Rule No. 11. — It shall be the responsibility of the competitor to check his score with the score sheet before leaving the shooting track. Any protest on his score must be lodged with the referee immediately, i.e. before leaving the shooting track. Such protest can only be made against incorrect score.

Rule No. 12. — All such protests must be confirmed in writing within 15 minutes, accompanied by \$2 forfeit. Rule No. 13. — A competitor is duly notified to compete when his name is called out by a referee, scorer or other person authorised to do so by the management, or when his name appears on the score board. If a "squad hustler" is furnished, it is a matter of courtesy only, and does not in the least relieve the competitor from responsibility. It is the duty of each and every competitor to be promptly on hand to compete when called upon to do so.

#### THE REFEREE.

Rule No. 14. — The Referee's decision in all cases coming under his jurisdiction as set forth in these rules, shall be final. Referees must wear their official badges at all shoots.

Rule No. 15. — The Referee, besides attending to special duties set forth in these rules, shall adjudicate the competition, he shall distinctly and loudly announce the result of each shot by calling out "Kill" when the target is broken, and "Lost" when the target is unbroken, except in Double Rise shooting and point scoring. He shall decide all other issues which arise in relation to the direct competition.

Rule No. 16. — If the Referee is negligent or inefficient, impairing thereby the equity of the competition, the management may forthwith remove him. This rule applies also to scorers, pullers, trappers and any other of the staff.

Rule No. 17. — The Referee is empowered to challenge the ammunition used by any competitor.

Rule No. 18. — The Referee shall insist that no competitor is permitted to shoot from other than his A.C.T.A. handicap mark, except in Eye-openers preceding a Championship, which shall be shot from the same yardage as the Championship. These eye-openers are restricted to 5 targets per shooter, per trap, or 10 targets when only one trap is used. All clubs are permitted to run one Pre-International shoot per annum, when the clubs at their discretion may shoot any event from 16 yards, providing such shoot is held no more than 30 days prior to the advertised date of the International. Prizes, cash or trophies not to exceed \$100 on any one event.

Rule No. 19. — The Referee has power to alter his decision.

Rule No. 20. — All members of a squad shall automatically change lanes as soon as the next shooter has shot, and not wait until all shooters have shot. All members of a squad shall remain at the firing track until the last shot of the squad is fired.

#### THE SCORER.

Rule No. 21. — The Scorer shall keep an accurate record of each shot. Accordingly, the Referee call "Kill", or "Lost". He shall mark the figure 1 for "Kill" and 0 for "Lost".

Rule No. 22. — The Puller shall pull the trap, or traps, instantly in response to the competitor's call of "Pull".

Rule No. 23.. — The Puller shall have an unobstructed view of the competitors at the firing points.

#### BROKEN TARGET.

Rule No. 24. — A "broken target" (kill) is one which has at least a visible piece or pieces, or the centre section, broken from it, or which is completely reduced to dust, or which has a visible section broken from it, even though such section is broken into dust by the competitor's shot while in the air.

Rule No. 25. — A "dusted target" is one from which more or less dust is detached by the competitor's shot, but which shows no visible diminution in size therefrom. A dusted target is not a broken target, and is a "Lost" target.

Rule No. 26. — The score of a competitor in double target shooting shall be shown as one (1) point for each "kill" as broken by the competitor's shot. Two barrels must not be fired at one target.

#### BAULK.

Rule No. 27. — Any extraneous occurrence which, in the opinion of the Referee, materially interferes with the equity of the competitor after he calls, "Pull", constitutes a baulk. Under no circumstances will a baulk be granted unless claimed by the competitor immediately it occurs. Only the competitor directly interested can claim a baulk, which, if allowed by the referee, restores him another target. Rule No. 28. — In double-barrel shooting, jarring back denotes that from the concussion of the first shot the safety has been slipped back to "safe". Whatever may be the cause of slipping the safety back to "safe", the competitor must abide by the result.

Rule No. 29. — Simultaneous discharge is one wherein, from any cause, both barrels are discharged together or nearly together, and shall be declared "No target".

#### NO TARGET.

Rule No. 30. — After a referee declares a "no target" it is thereafter no part of the competition, and is irrelevant to it.

Rule No. 31. — "No target" shall be declared when a trap is sprung at a material interval of time before or after the call of "Pull".

Rule No. 32. — "No target" shall be declared when the trap is sprung without the call of "Pull".

Rule No. 33. — "No target" shall be declared when, in single-target shooting, two targets are thrown at the same time.

Rule No. 34. — "No target" shall be declared when the target is thrown at a widely different angle (see diagram).

Rule No. 35. — "No target" shall be declared when a competitor shoots out of turn, or from the wrong track.

Rule No. 36. — "No target" shall be declared when two competitors, or when a competitor and a noncompetitor, shoot at the same target.

Rule No. 37.—"No target" shall be declared when there is a misfire, in either barrel, caused by the competitor's gun, or a misfire of the cartridge, due to no neglect on the shooter's part.

Rule No. 38. — In the event of a misfire with the second barrel, the competitor must fire a live cartridge in the general direction of the target, and is permitted to score with the second barrel only.

Rule No. 39. — "No target" shall be declared (whether shot at or not) when a broken target is thrown.

#### LOST TARGET.

Rule No. 40. — "Lost target" shall be declared when the competitor fails to break the target.

Rule No. 41. — "Lost target" shall be declared when the competitor fails to shoot because his gun was unloaded or uncocked, or because the safety was faultily adjusted or jarred back, whether from his own oversight or not, or because of any other cause chargeable to his own oversight or neglect.

Rule No. 42.—A competitor having a misfire or apparent misfire, will, forthwith call the referee for his decision, otherwise the referee shall declare it a "lost" target. The competitor must not turn around, must not open his gun, and must keep his gun pointing in the direction of the traps.

Rule No. 43. — "Lost target" shall be declared if a cartridge after it has once misfired in the competition, or a gun after it has twice misfired in the competition, is used by the competitor.

Rule No. 44. — "Lost target" shall be declared if in single-barrel shooting the competitor loads two cartridges. (A competitor is only allowed to load one cartridge and is not permitted to load an empty shell or dummy cartridge.)

Rule No. 45. — "Lost target" shall be declared if a competitor shoots from his wrong handicap mark.

#### CHALLENGE AND PROTEST.

Rule No. 46. - A competitor may challenge the load of any other competitor, such load shall not be greater than one and one-quarter ounce weight of shot struck measures nor larger in size than No. 6. On receipt of a written challenge, with \$2 forfeit, the management shall obtain a cartridge from the challengee, and if, after public examination of it, the management finds the challengee has violated the above requirements, he may be disqualified or not, accordingly as the offence was wilfully committed or otherwise. In case the challengee is wholly innocent, the forfeit shall be paid to him, otherwise it shall be returned to the challenger. The management of any club, or of any tournament, has the

power to examine any competitor's cartridges at their discretion, without involving themselves in any peralty.

#### OFFICIAL SCORE.

Rule No. 47. — The official score must be kept on a score sheet and be available for inspection by the competitor.

Rule No. 48. — Every competitor in a squad shall be permitted to examine his score sheet before the score sheet is sent to the Secretary's Office. The individual scores shall be totalled before being placed on the score boards.

#### WIDELY DIFFERENT ANGLE.

Rule No. 49. — When a target is thrown either way outside the prescribed limit of the angles, height and distance in single target shooting, it shall be deemed to be thrown at a widely different angle and "No target" shall be declared.

#### MAGAZINE GUN.

Rule No. 50. — The term "magazine gun" applies alike to automatic guns, pump guns (so called) and other guns not directly dependent on hand loading and are permissible for clay target shooting.

#### SHOOTING FOR TARGETS ONLY.

Rule No. 51.-Shooting for targets only, is a term which shall be held to define the status of a competitor in any given event, or events, or in an entire tournament programme, and shall signify that a competitor who is "shooting for targets only" has no interest in any trophy, or trophies (unless he is entitled to do so by a specific announcement in the programme), nor any interest in any money, or moneys, the division of which depends on the scores made in said event, or events, or in the entire programme. "Shooting for targets only" shall not be allowed at open shoots or by any shooter who has attained the mark of 14 yards.

#### GUNS AND LOADS.

Rule No. 52. — A competitor shall not use a gun whose bore is LARGER than a twelve gauge.

Rule No. 53. — A competitor shall not use a load of shot greater than one and one-quarter ounce weight, struck measure, nor may a larger size of shot than No. 6 be used.

TARGETS, TRAPS, FLIGHTS, AND ANGLES, PITS AND SCREENS, FIRING POINTS.

Rule No. 54. — No target shall measure more than four and fivesixteenths  $(4_{15})$  inches in diameter, nor more than one and one-eighth  $(1\frac{1}{5})$  inches in height.

Rule No. 55. — An automatic trap must be used at all open shoots.

#### SERGEANT SYSTEM.

Rule No. 56. — Five single traps, four feet apart, constitute the Sergeant System. The targets are thrown from unknown traps, at unknown angles. Maximum throw of traps to be 55 yards, minimum 30 yards. Limit mark to be 16 yards. Shoot from centre track.

#### FLIGHTS AND ANGLES.

Rule No. 57. — Targets, whether singles or doubles, shall be thrown not less than 45 yards nor more than 55 yards, with a flight of 9 feet high at a point 10 yards from the trap, with a margin of tolerance of not more than 18 inches, above or below. Except in double target shooting, the flight of targets shall be at unknown angles, thrown within an area of 45 degrees right and left of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of number three firing point and prolonged through the centre of the central trap, or through the centre of the single trap when only one trap is used.

Rule No. 58. — To arrive at the proper height at which targets should be thrown as set forth in Rule 58, due allowance should be made according as the ground in front of the trap rises or falls away, and the flight of the targets 9 feet high at a point 10 yards from the trap is judged to be from an imaginary horizontal straight line drawn through No. 3 firing point through the single trap, or through the centre trap if the Sergeant System be used, and prolonged indefinitely.

Rule No. 59. — In single target shooting, to aid in distinguishing between target within and without bounds, two stakes (see Diagram II) not less than 3 feet in height shall be placed in the arc of a circle whose

radii are 50 yards and whose centre is the centre of the single trap, or the centre of the central trap when three are used. Respectively, right and left at 45 degrees of the aforementioned imaginary straight line, two stakes shall be placed upright (see Diagram II).

#### PITS AND SCREENS.

Rule No. 60. — Trap houses shall be used to give full protection to the trappers. These houses shall be 3'3" high in front, tapering or sloping to 2'9" at the back, and shall be 6'0" from front to back, 8'0" wide. A tolerance of 3" either way is permissible on these dimensions. All height measurements shall be taken from the level of the centre lane. The trap shall be mounted in a manner which will bring the top centre oscillation of the throwing arm 14" above the level of the centre lane. A tolerance of 1" either side of this dimension is permissible.

#### FIRING POINTS.

Rule No. 61. — Firing points shall be three yards apart in the circumference of a circle whose radii are 16 yards (see Diagram I).




DIAGRAM I. STANDARD FIRING POINT LAYOU'T.

This shows the standard layout for the Automatic Angle Trap. The trap is located at point B and directly behind it at a distance of 16 yards is firing point No. 3. Points 1, 2, 4 and 5 are also 16 yards from the trap, whilst the distance between adjacent points is 3 yards.

#### DISTANCE HANDICAPS.

Rule No. 62. - The distance handicaps, when used, shall be on prolongations of the lines given in Diagram I, commonly known as "fanshaped". The distance between the firing points, 16 yards, shall then be three vards (see Diagram III).

#### SQUADS.


Rule No. 63. - Competitors shall shoot in squads of five or six, except when there are less than five competitors available for the last squad of any programme event, or when there are withdrawals from a squad or squads after the competition has begun.

#### DOUBLE TARGETS.

Rule No. 64. - In double - target shooting, there shall be squads of

five or six shooters at 16 yards. Double-rise shooting may be off handicap marks or such marks as the club may decide, except in the case of championships, and shall be scored and called by the Referee, 1-1 or 0-1 or 1-0 or 0-0, whichever the case may be, each target to count as one point. In the event of a tie, to be shot off squad system first miss-out, best of each pair until finality.

Rule No. 65. - Each double shall be thrown as a right and left quarterer whose flights shall be limited to the angles D.D.B. (Diagram IV) right and left of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of No. 3 track, as shown at C. on Diagram IV. To aid in distinguishing whether targets are within bounds, four stakes 3'0" high shall be placed in a circle

marks are 3 yards apart as in Diagram I, whilst the other marks are at one yard intervals along the tracks.




DIAGRAM II. SINGLE TARGET SHOOTING.

whose radius shall be 50 yards, the centre of the trap shall be the centre from which the radius shall be struck. Two stakes shall be placed upright at 20° either side of the centre line C, and two stakes shall be placed upright at  $45^{\circ}$  either side of the centre line at C (Diagram IV). All stakes shall be placed in the said 50-yard radius arc.

The shooter must shoot at a complete pair of targets on every occasion, each kill shall score one (1) point.

When there is a misfire in either barrel or when there is a mal-function so that either shot is not fired, the Referee shall declare "no targets"; in the event of a misfire or malfunction on the first barrel, the Referee shall declare "no targets" and another pair shall be thrown. In the event of a misfire or mal-function on the second barrel, the Referee shall declare "no targets"; the result of the first shot shall be scored "Kill" or "Lost" as the case may be, and another pair of targets thrown; the shooter must shoot at both targets and the result of his second shot shall be added to the score.

Rule No. 66. — "No target" shall be declared when only one target is thrown.

Rule No. 67. — "No target" shall be declared when both targets are broken by one shot.

Rule No. 68. — "No target" shall be declared when one target is a broken target or both targets are broken targets when thrown from the trap or traps.

Rule No. 69. — "No target" shall be declared when both barrels of the competitor's gun are discharged simultaneously, or near simultaneously.

Rule No. 70. — "No target" shall be declared when one target follows the other after a material interval of time, instead of the two targets taking flight simultaneously.




DIAGRAM IV. DOUBLE TARGETS.

Rule No. 71. — "No targets" shall be declared when one target or both targets are thrown at a wider or narrower angle or angles or higher or lower than is set forth in Rule No. 65.

Rule No. 72. — Competitors shall be in squads of 5 or 6 shooters, No. 1 shooter in each squad shall always start the shooting. The club, at its discretion, may require shooters to change starting lanes on each trap as follows: No. 1 shooter shall commence shooting from Lane No. 1 on Trap No. 1, Lane No. 2 on Trap No. 2, Lane No. 3 on Trap No. 3, and so forth over all the traps. Preserving the continuity of lane changing on each visit to the traps. This Rule shall also apply to double-rise.

#### TIES.

Rule No. 73.—All ties, except walkup, mixed, birds and Deauville Doubles, shall be shot off squad system, first miss-out, all shooters to commence on the same trap (except in the case of a major breakdown of the said trap), shooters shall be squadded in the order in which they qualified, shooters shall close up after each five targets per shooter, and shall be resquadded at the commencement of each run over the trap or traps.

#### UNFINISHED COMPETITION.

Rule No. 74. — Should darkness, bad weather, or other cause, interfere with the competition, the management shall have the right to decide how and when the competition shall be continued, provided that it is not postponed longer than 14 days. Any competitor who defaults in respect of such postponed competition forfeits all his rights and standing therein.

#### OFFICIAL DECISIONS.

Rule No. 75. — Every person entering competitions agrees to accept all official decisions, and to abide by the rules controlling the competition.

#### ALTERATION TO TRAP.

Rule No. 76. — Any member of the Executive Committee of the Association, any official Referee Examiner or official Referee attending any shoot under A.C.T.A. Rules shall have authority to adjust any trap immediately should it not be throw-

ing regulation targets. Immediately any such alteration has been made, a target to be thrown and the competition to continue.

#### STANDARD EQUIPMENT.

Rule No. 77. — Concrete blocks and measuring sticks for measuring height of targets are required to be standard equipment for all clubs. A peg at least 2 feet high is required to be placed, dead centre in front of trap at 50 yards, as an aid to determining distance targets are being thrown.

#### HANDICAPS.

Rule No. 78.—Club handicaps must be not less than Association Handicaps.

#### SWEEPSTAKE DEDUCTIONS.

Rule No. 79. — Permissible deduction fron. sweepstakes by clubs, in club contests, shall be not more than 50 per cent. (inclusive of targets).

Rule No. 80. — No deduction is permitted by clubs in optional sweepstakes.

#### OWNERSHIP OF UNBROKEN CLAY TARGETS.

Rule No. 81.—All clay targets broken or otherwise—at all times remain the property of the club and not the shooter. The shooter only pays for the privilege of shooting.

#### SHOOTING AT PIECES.

Rule No. 82. — Unless, in the opinion of the referee, it is contrary to the equity of the competition, a competitor taking part in a competition may shoot at the pieces of HIS OWN TARGET, if he so wishes.

#### SHOOTER'S ENTITLEMENT.

Rule No. 83. — If a shooter withdraws or is disqualified from a competition, he forfeits all rights to resume. When a competitor has withdrawn, during any part of a competition, the tracks to be at once closed up.

#### SHOOTING UP.

Rule No. 84. — "Shooting up" after the first round of a competition is not permitted in any circumstances, except in the instance of shooters taking part in the annual International Match. REGISTRATION OF SHOOTERS.

Rule No. 85. — All shooters must be registered by the A.C.T.A. before taking part in competition. Unregistered shooters are not permitted to compete at any time.

#### SHOOTING IN FRONT OF HANDICAP.

Rule No. 86. — No shooting is permitted in front of Association handicap in any handicap events.

#### HEIGHT OF TARGETS.

Rule No. 87. — Targets in all competitions to be thrown at a height of 9 feet 10 yards from the trap, with a margin tolerance of not more than 18 inches, either way.

#### TIE SHOOTS IN OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Rule No. 88. — All tie shoots in Commonwealth, State and District Championships shall be shot squad system — first miss-out except walkup, mixed birds and Deauville Doubles.

#### SHOOTING NAMES.

Rule No. 89. — Competitors must at all times use their correct names when entering a competition. Shooting non-de-plumes are not permitted.

#### "PISTOL GRIP" STYLE SHOOTING.

Rule No. 90. — Holding the gun "pistol" fashion, using one hand only, is barred. Any shooter acting in this way is to be warned against continuance — if continued, the shooter to be disqualified from competition forthwith and the matter reported to the Executive Committee. (Penalty, fine \$10).

#### BREAK RECOGNITION.

Rule No. 91. — The A.C.T.A. will recognise breaks in sequences of 50, 75, 100, 150, 200 and 250, and so on, providing same are shot over an automatic trap under double or singlebarrel conditions and in regular competition on one day only, excepting the case where a club is conducting a programme extending over two or more successive days. No practice between events is permitted and breaks must be continuous. To shoot in other than double or single-barrel events immediately concludes the break. Actual score sheets, clearly marked, showing where break occurred, must be produced to the A.C.T.A. before recognition can be granted. Break

Rule No. 92.—An assistant referee, for Deauville Doubles and doublerise competition, is permitted. The Chief Referee to give his decision following the call of the assistant referee.

#### CASH DISTRIBUTION.

Rule No. 93.—In all cash distribution, handicaps or sweepstakes, the distribution shall be on the basis of 60% (1st), 30% (2nd) and 10% (3rd). A competitor scoring the only possible in an event wins only 60%, first place.

#### DEAUVILLE DOUBLES.

Rule No. 94. - Deauville Doubles shall be shot with four shooters on the ground at one time, the first pair using tracks 1 and 5 and the second pair using tracks 2 and 4. After shooting first round of 5 pairs, shooters then change tracks, first pair taking tracks 2 and 4 and second pair taking tracks 1 and 5. Tie shoots shall be conducted first miss-out from tracks 2 and 4, one team at a time. The competitors may arrange between themselves which track they will take, and who will call for the release of the clay targets, which will be released on the call of pull. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs will count, and as one point. Either shooter can help his partner after he has broken his own clay target.

Rule No. 95. — Any misfire or mechanical failure in Deauville Doubles does not entitle the shooters to another pair of targets and they must abide by the result.

#### WALK-UP.

Rule No. 96.—Walk-up events shall be shot double barrel from No. 3 track, squad system. The competitor shall load his gun at the 22 - yard mark; when ready in this position he commences to walk at a normal walking pace, holding his gun in any position of safety. The puller will release the target between the 20-yard and 15-yard marks inclusive, the mark being unknown to the competitor, having been previously determined by an indicator or dice. No. 1 shooter shoots at one target, he then returns to the rear of the squad, each shooter doing the same in turn.

Rule No. 97. — Walk-up. A loaded gun shall be deemed to be in a position of safety when it is the shooter's turn to shoot and he faces and points the gun in the general direction of the trap house, having the gun either mounted on the shoulder or in the gun-down position.

#### OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS AND OPEN COMPETITIONS.

Rule No. 98. — Open Championships, that is Commonwealth, State and District Championships, and open competitions (cases where more than \$100 is allotted for distribution in any one event), must have the approval of the A.C.T.A. before being advertised or conducted. (This Rule applies both to the actual event and the proposed date of holding.)

#### STANDARD SHELLS FOR ALL CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Rule No. 99. — Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are restricted to 1½ oz. of shot, struck measure, or equivalent, No. 6 size or lighter. Shells marked by a reputable manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved. Home-loaded or re-loaded cartridges may be used in all events excepting International championships and events, National championships and Interstate matches and events.

Rule No. 100. — Clubs running any event have the right to divide the number of targets by the number of traps available, shooting 6, 7 or 8 targets per visit per trap. Illustration: 15 targets, two traps, one visit. No. 1 shooter shoots 8 targets on Trap No. 1, finishing on Lane No. 3. No. 1, shooter now starts on Lane No. 4 on Trap No. 2, and shoots 7 targets, finishing on Lane No. 5. Illustration No. 2: 30 targets, 5 traps, 6 targets per trap, one visit. Clubs must preserve equality by lane changing between traps.

#### REGISTERED REFEREES.

Rule No. 101. — To become a registered referee, a candidate shall approach his club Secretary and President, who (when they consider the candidate has achieved a satisfactory standard) shall recommend to the nearest REGISTERED REFEREE EXAMINER that the candidate be given a practical and oral examination.

When the candidate has passed this examination to the Examiner's entire satisfaction, the Examiner will then notify the A.C.T.A. Secretary, who will issue the official A.C.T.A. Referee Badge to the candidate and place his name on the official list of referees.

On receipt of a complaint from any AFFILIATED CLUB or REGIS-TERED REFEREE EXAMINER, the A.C.T.A. Secretary shall immediately recall the referee's badge and remove from the list of referees the name of any registered referee who refuses to take his turn at refereeing at any shoot or is considered in any way to be incompetent.

#### TOWER.

Rule No. 102. — Commonwealth, State and District Championships, both day and night, shall be shot over 20 targets double barrel, both barrels equal value, 5 to 10 targets per shooter per visit to the tracks, squad system, shooters in a straight line left to right, with centre (No. 3) shooter standing 5 feet in front of the centre of the tower. Whilst at the firing point the shooter must not turn towards the tower, but must face directly to the front throughout the competition.

The trap shall be 35'0" above the ground, plus or minus 30" either way, mounted on a tower. Targets shall be thrown at standard angles, i.e. 45° either side of the centre line. Targets shall be thrown a minimum 45 yards and maximum 55 yards.

#### HIGH GUN.

Rule No. 103. — The High Gun for a shoot shall be over the advertised programme or such events as the club, at its discretion, has advertised. In the event of a tie for High Gun, where such programme includes both championship and handicap events, it shall be shot off double-barrel irrespective of the type of championship and/or handicap events within the programme and shall be shot off squad system, first miss-out, from handicap marks—International Teams and State Teams High Gun excepted.

#### INTERNATIONAL TEAMS MATCH

Bauman, Esq., of Brisbane) for 12 months (or until the next International Match) and will be swarded a special trophy valued at \$10.50, and the International High-Gun Sash and I.C.I. Sterling Silver Commemoration Badge. Second Silver Commemoration Badge. Second and third High Guns will also receive trophies valued at \$10.50 each.

Every member of the Australian Team will receive the special "International Badge".

Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$5, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without de-duction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### COMMONWEALTH

SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP The Chambionship shall be shot at

one visit to the traps, and shall be scored one point for each target. Each competitor shall shoot from the five tracks, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss-out.

Entrance Fee and Trophies to be determined each year by the full Executive Committee. All optional sweepstakes to be paid out without deduction and shall be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., and third 10 per cent.

#### NATIONAL CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS CUP

The Championship shall be shot at 50 Targets from 20 yards, double barrel, both barrels equal value, kills only to count, 25 targets per visit, two visits to the traps. Each com-petitor to shoot from the five tracks, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss-out.

Entrance Fee and Trophies to be determined each year by the full Executive Committee. All optional sweepstakes to be paid out without deduction, and shall be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., and third 10 per cent.

# **COMMONWEALTH CHAMPIONSHIPS**

40 clay targets from 20 yards. One barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from the five tracks squad system at 5 to 10 targets at each visit. The manage-ment shall provide three trophies, 1st. 2nd and 3rd. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$5, opt. sweep-stakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### COMMONWEALTH MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 20 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring

value and score as one point. Five clay targets from 20 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay targets, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 yards mark. The competitor advances at an ordinary walking pace - to shuffle or walk slowly is a "no bird". The clay target is released between 20 and 15 vards inclusive and the mark to be unknown to the competitor. being predetermined by an indicator, or dice arrangement, and is determined each target the competitor is to shoot at. Five pairs of double-rise clay targets from 16 yards rise, squad system, each target to count as one, making possible total 25 points. In the event of ties to be shot at 2 double barrel, 2 single barrel, 2 walk-up, and 2 pair double rise, total 10 points, until finality. Maximum Entrance fee \$5 for Championship, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without de-duction, are permissible. The club management to provide three trophies —1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### COMMONWEALTH WALK-UP CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 25 clay targets, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. When ready in this position he commences and continues to walk at a normal walking pace. To walk slow or shuffle constitutes a "no bird". The puller will release the target between the 20 and 15 vards mark inclusive, the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator or dice arrangement. The competitor will shoot at five or ten targets at each visit, in the order laid down in Rule 96. Each competitor shoots from centre track. Maximum Entrance fee to Championship \$5, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. International load shells, 1<sup>‡</sup> oz. shot, No. 6 size or lighter, only manual automatic or electric oscillating traps to be used.

#### QUALIFICATIONS

Each team member shall have resided in the State for which they represent, for at least the preceding three months.

Team members shall be chosen by an elimination match, 30 targets from 18 yards, 5 track squad system, double barrel, both barrels equal value. 14 oz. shot, No. 6 size or lighter. 15 highest scorers to automatically become the State Team.

In the event of a tie, to be shot off squad system, first miss-out.

An appropriate High-Gun trophy shall be provided, and a souvenir badge shall be given to each member of the State Team (15) by the club conducting the event. The programme and venue of the Interstate Teams Match shall be advertised by the club conducting the event in the A.C.T.A. "NEWS" at least two months prior to the State Team's elimination shoot, and the State Teams match. The winning team shall hold the Great Britain and Ireland Trophy for a period of 12 months. The competition to be completed in each State not later than the first day of September of each vear.

The club conducting the Elimination match shall provide prize money

of not less than \$100 compulsory division. Maximum Nomination for the Elimination match shall be \$5.00.

Only official A.C.T.A. Referees to officiate, scorer and check scorer to be provided. Score sheets to be signed by Scorers and Referees.

No other major shoot is permitted in the particular State on the day or days when the Elimination and State Teams shoot is held. The team members shall be squadded in the order in which they qualify.

The products donated for this shoot, both cartridges and clay targets, must be used in the Teams shoot.

#### STATE DOUBLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

#### STATE SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 30 clay targets from 18 yards One barrel only. The competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun. Each competitor shall shoot from five tracks squad system at five to ten clay targets at each visit. The management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$4, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### STATE MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 18 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score as one point. Five clay targets from 18 yards single harrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Five walk-up clay targets, double barrel, competitor to have gun loaded and ready to commence his walk from the 22 yards mark. The competitor advances at an ordinary walking pace — to shuffle or walk slowly is a "no bird". The clay target is released between 20 and 15 yards inclusive, and the mark to be unknown to the competitor, being predetermined by an indicator, or dice arrangement, and is determined each target the competitor is to shoot at. Five pairs of double-rise clay targets from 16 yards, each target to count as one point, making possible total 25 points. In the event of ties to be shot at two double barrel, two single barrel, two walk-up and two pair double rise, total ten points, until finality. Maximum Entrance fee \$4 for Championship, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The club manage-ment to provide three trophies — 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### STATE WALK-UP CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. #### STATE DEAUVILLE DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$3, optional sweepstakes, to be divided first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those competitors who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### DISTRICT MIXED BIRDS CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot in the following order at five clay targets from 16 yards, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score as one point. Five clay targets from 16 yards single barrel, one cartridge only allowed in gun, each kill to count as one point. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$3, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible, The club management to provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### DISTRICT WALK-UP CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. The competitor shall load his gun on the 22 yard mark. The Championship shall be shot at 10 pairs of clay targets from 16 yards. Each competitor to shoot five tracks squad system at five pairs at each visit, and score each "kill" as one point. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss-out, best of each pair until finality. The management of club conducting Championship shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$3, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### DISTRICT DEAUVILLE DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

The Championship shall be shot from 20 yards at 20 pairs of doubles. The competitors will stand with four shooters on the ground at one time, the first pair of shooters using tracks one and five for the first round, changing over to tracks two and four for the second round. The

second pair of shooters to alternate with first pair. The competitors can arrange between themselves which track they will take and who shall call for the release of the clay targets, which will be re-leased on the call of Pull. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs shall count, and as one point. Either shooter can help his partner after he has broken his clay targets. In the event of a misfire by either gun another clay target or targets will not be given that competitor and he is required to abide by the result. Each two competitors will shoot at five pairs at each visit. In the event of ties, to be shot off miss-out from Nos. 2 and 4 tracks. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$3 for each competitor, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, 60 per cent. first pair, 30 per cent. second pair, 10 per cent. third pair from money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets each pair that have entered the optional sweep. The management shall provide four trophies — two for 1st and two for 2nd.

#### Tower Championships COMMONWEALTH TOWER CHAMPIONSHIPS

To be shot at 20 clay targets, squad system, as in Rule 102, five feet directly in front of centre of Towerfive to ten clay targets to be shot on each visit to the track. Normal on each visit to the track. Normal setting of trap, clay targets to be thrown at usual angles. Two barrels permitted, and each barrel to be of equal scoring value, and score one point. Ties to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. Competitors must not turn towards the Tower and must face directly to the front throughout the competition. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$5, opt. sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. The management shall provide three trophies-1st, 2nd and 3rd. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

#### STATE TOWER CHAMPIONSHIP

To be shot at 20 clay targets squad system, as in Rule 102, five feet directly in front of centre of tower, five to ten clay targets to be shot on each visit to track. Maximum Entrance fee for Championship \$4, thence same conditions as Commonwealth Championship.

#### DISTRICT TOWER CHAMPIONSHIP

Same conditions as in State Tower Championship. Maximum Entrance fee \$3.

#### INTERMEDIATE DOUBLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP COMMONWEALTH, STATE AND DISTRICT

The Championship shall be shot at 20 clay targets, double-barrel, either barrel to be of equal scoring value, and count as one point. Shooting will take place from 16 yards. Each competitor to shoot from five tracks, souad system. Each competitor to shoot at five to ten clay targets at each visit. The event is restricted to shooters whose Association handicap does not exceed 16 vards on day of competition. The management shall provide three trophies - 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Maximum Entrance fee \$5 Commonwealth, \$4 State, optional sweepstakes, to be divided, first 60 per cent., second 30 per cent., third 10 per cent. of sweep money received, without deduction, are permissible. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official score sheets and score board those who have entered for

the optional sweep. (Intermediate Deauville Doubles will be shot from 18 yards.)

#### INTERMEDIATE

SINGLE-BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP Same conditions as Commonwealth, State or District above, except where double-barrel is stated, single-barrel should be understood, with the addition that competitor shall load one cartridge only in his gun.

#### CLAY SPARROW TITLES

Same conditions as applicable to clay targets.

NIGHT SHOOTING CONDITIONS Same as foregoing, maximum entrance fee \$0.50 extra.

#### WALK-UP CONDITIONS

In all walk-up events the position of the gun shall be optional, providing complete safety conditions are observed. A loaded gun shall be deemed to be in a position of safety when it is the shooter's turn to shoot and he faces and points the gun in the general direction of the trap house, having the gun either mounted on the shoulder or in the gun-down position.

#### CARTRIDGES

Standard Shell for Championships. Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are required to be restricted to 1½ oz. of shot, struck measure, or its equivalent, No. 6 shot size or lighter. Shells marked by reputable manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved. Re-loaded cartridges are permitted.

Home-loaded or re-loaded cartridges may be used in all events excepting International Championships and events, National Championships and Interstate matches and events.

#### CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHIES

Championship trophy value (inclusive of badge or sash) for Commonwealth Championships is fixed by the Association at \$80. Similarly with State Championships the amount fixed for trophies (inclusive of sash or badge) is fixed at \$60. In District and Club Championships the value of trophies is left optional and at the discretion of the club conducting the event.

#### TIES

All tie shoots in Commonwealth, State and District Championships (except walk-up, mixed birds and Deauville Doubles) must be shot off squad system, first miss-out.

#### SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS

Conditions for all open skeet championships: Commonwealth, two rounds of 25 targets (= 50); State and District are one round of 25 targets. Nomination in each event \$5, \$4, and \$3 respectively.

Skeet Tie Shoot Rules. — Skeet tie shoots shall be shot squad system, miss-out.

### A.C.T.A. HANDICAPPING FORMULA

As from January 1, 1968, the following Handicapping Formula, approved by the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee, is effective.

#### CASH OR TROPHY VALUE WINS and DIVISIONS (Obtained in ONE (1) Day)

- 12 yarder. Immediate movement of 1 yard back on receipt of a win of \$2, or division, or equivalent trophy value. (A 12 yarder once having left the mark mentioned cannot be returned to that mark.)
- 13 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$4 or equivalent trophy value.
- 14 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$7 or equivalent trophy value.
- 15 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$10 or equivalent trophy value.
- 16 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$13 or equivalent trophy value.
- 17 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$15 or equivalent trophy value.
- 18 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$17 or equivalent trophy value.
- 19 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$19 or equivalent trophy value.
- 20 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$20 or equivalent trophy value.
- 21 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$22 or equivalent trophy value.
- 22 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$24 or equivalent trophy value.
- 23 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$26 or equivalent trophy value.
- 24 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$28 or equivalent trophy value.
- 25 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$30 or equivalent trophy value.
- 26 yarder. 1 yard back on winning \$32 or equivalent trophy value.

The following will apply to all yardages:

A win or division or equivalent trophy value of \$101 to \$300, 2 yards back.

A win or division or equivalent trophy value of \$301 to \$400, 3 yards back. A win or division or equivalent trophy value of \$401 or more, 4 yards back.

OPTIONAL SWEEPSTAKE winnings and High-gun trophies should NOT be included.

Winners of championships or other events gained behind their A.C.T.A. Handicap automatically go back to the mark from which the win or division was obtained.

No shooter can be handicapped on a win or division gained in front of his A.C.T.A. handicap mark.

A shooter, once having attained the mark of 16 yards, on merit, cannot be handicapped in front of that mark again.

#### INWARD MOVEMENT

Shooters who compete and shoot right through four consecutive FULL DAILY PROGRAMMES, and receive no trophy or division of any description, may receive inward movement from Club Secretaries (except in case where the shooter concerned is the Secretary, then the President or Club Handicapper). Such recommendations must be accompanied by fullest details on the Official Handicap Return Form. No recommendation of more than one (1) yard on each recommendation, unless the shooter is suffering from some physical disability, will be accepted.

#### GENERAL

Club Presidents and Secretaries are instructed that during any shoot, the management must immediately rehandicap each and every shooter who, for any of the reasons prescribed in the A.C.T.A. Handicapping Formula, qualifies for backward movement off his handicap. Such adjustments are to strictly comply with the Formula. No shooter is to be permitted to compete in another event should he refuse to accept his new mark. Handicap details concerning on-the-spot adjustments are to be forwarded on the prescribed form, within two days, to the A.C.T.A. official Handicapper for ratification. Should the shooter ignore his latest handicap, irrespective of mark shown in "News", he will be penalised a further yard if he shoots inside his latest handicap.

Only the club and Association Handicapper have authority to amend shooters' Handicap Cards.

Club managements have the right to re-handicap any obviously underhandicapped shooter immediately, providing the Association is notified within TWO DAYS and the reason given on a Handicap Return Form.

If these details are not completed, such handicap movement cannot be ratified.

Clubs when registering a shooter for the first time must clearly indicate whether the shooter is a complete

novice gun handler, or has had field or other experience, before a 12-yard mark can be approved. Failure to provide this information will result in the shooter being placed on 16 yds.

No handicaps are assessed on Tower, Deauville Doubles, Double-Rise, Walk-up and Mixed Birds. All other novelty contests to be handicapped in accordance with this Formula.

Club managements are informed that a Handicap Return must accompany every result sheet forwarded to the A.C.T.A. and same is required to reach the A.C.T.A. office within SEVEN DAYS of each shoot being held. (Handicap Return Pads are available on application to the A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, 3001.)

### DUTIES OF A REFEREE

It is most necessary that adequate preparations are made to assist the smooth running of a shoot and the duties of the referee in charge on the setting up of the traps. Rule 57 states that the target must be 9 feet from the ground, when 10 yards from the trap, with a margin of tolerance of 18 inches above or below.


There is a tendancy among officials to set the trap at 10 feet 6 inches and say that they are within the permissible tolerance. This is not so. The trap so set has no tolerance above, and has 3 feet tolerance below the 9 feet bar. In all cases the trap should be set to throw targets 9 feet high when 10 yards from the trap and should be altered immediately weather conditions cause clays to be thrown outside these limits. All too few clubs set their traps so that they cannot lower them to cope with an oncoming wind.

Traps should be adjusted so that both extreme right and left clays are thrown at the same angles from the centre. It is quite a simple matter to do this, by standing on No. 1 track and observing at what angle the right target is thrown and then going to No. 5 track and checking on the left target.

On the height of targets — all too few clubs have correct height sticks. These should have a horizontal bar at 9 feet high and another two: one at 7'6" and another at 10'6". To judge the correct heights, referees should stand at right angles to the marker so they can see at what height the targets cross the marker.

If this procedure is carried out prior to the eye-opener event (and/ or when weather or trap breakdowns necessitate adjustments), then very little problems should occur during the conduct of any programme.

To construct a height stick within Rule 57, obtain either old water pipe or timber and fashion as follows:----



# Official Skeet Shooting Rules and Regulations

#### SECTION I

#### FIELD LAYOUT - TARGETS

1. A Skeet field shall consist of eight shooting stations arranged on a segment of a circle of twenty-one (21) yards radius, with a base chord (exactly one hundred twenty (120) feet, nine (9) inches long), drawn six (6) yards from the centre of the circle. The centre of the circle is known as the target-crossing point and is marked by a stake.

Station 1 is located at the left end of the base chord, and Station 7 at the right end when facing the centre while standing on the periphery of the segment. Stations 2 to 6, inclusive, are located on the periphery at points equidistant from each other (the exact distance between Stations 1 and 2, 2 and 3, etc., is twenty-six (26) feet, eight and three-eighths (8%) inches. Station 8 is located at the centre of the base chord.

Shooting Stations 1 to 7, inclusive, are a square area, 3 feet on a side, with two sides parallel to a radius of the circle drawn through the station marker. Shooting Station 8 is a rectangular area 3 feet wide by 6 feet long, with the long sides parallel to the base chord. The location of each shooting station shall be accurately designated by a suitable marker, not easily removable, not more than 30 inches high and so constructed as not to interfere with the free swing of a shooter standing on the shooting stations 1 to 7, inclusive, is on the centre of the side nearest the target crossing point. The marker for Shooting Station 8 is on the centre point of the base chord.

A shield should be installed at the target opening of each traphouse so that the trap operator is not visible to the shooter when he is firing at Station 8. This precaution is desirable as a safety factor for the pro-

tection of the trap boy from possible injury from direct or ricocheting shot.

As a safety precaution there should be a barrier (wire or rope) located 7 to 10 yards behind the shooting stations 1 to 7, and roughly following the course of the semi-circle on which these stations are located. No spectators should be allowed within this barrier and the referee should be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

One target should emerge from a traphouse (called High House) at a point three (3) feet beyond Station Marker 1 (measured along the base chord extended), and ten (10) feet above the ground level. The other should emerge from a traphouse (called Low House) at a point three (3) feet beyond the Station Marker 7 (measured along the base chord extended), and two and one-half  $(2\frac{1}{2})$  feet from the base chord extended on side of target-crossing point), and three and one-half  $(3\frac{1}{2})$  feet above the ground.

Suitable markers shall be placed at points forty-four (44) yards and fifty-five (55) yards from both the High House and the Low House, to indicate the shooting boundary limit (44 yards). These distances shall be measured along a line and the flight of a regular target (55 yards) from the opening (where target emerges) in traphouse through the targetcrossing point.

#### SECTION II


#### SHOOTING PROCEDURE

#### 1. Definition of Terms.

(a) Shooting Position.

Standing with both feet entirely within the boundary of the shooting station.

#### (b) Gun Position.

Any position which is comfortable or satisfactory to the shooter and is consistent with safety.

(c) No Bird.

(i) A No Bird shall be called in the event of a mal-function or misfire at the second target when double loading.

(ii) Any target thrown for which no score is recorded, or failure of a target to be thrown within the prescribed time limit of one second. This permits the throwing of "instant" targets, but gives a short time period in order to prevent a contestant from refusing a target which does not appear immediately after his call. If a shooter fires upon a target which appears after one second has elapsed between his call and the emergence of the target, and also before the referee calls, "No bird," the result of his shot shall be scored. If he withholds his shot after such an alleged "slow pull," the referee may declare the target, "No bird," provided he, in his sole judgment. decides that the delay exceeded the one second time allowance. The pull is not required to be "instantaneous."

#### (d) Interference,

Any circumstance beyond the shooter's control which unduly affects his opportunity to break any particular target. The appearance of a target, or a piece of a target, from an adjoining field shall not be ruled as interference, unless such target, or piece of target, strikes or threatens to strike, the shooter or his gun, and provided that such interference occurs after the shooter has called for his target and before he fires upon it.

#### (e) Regular Target.

A regular target is one that appears after the shooter's call and within a period not to exceed one (1) second, and which passes within three (3) feet, horizontally or vertically, of a point fifteen (15) feet above the target-crossing point. This target, in still air, must carry to a distance equivalent, on level ground, to fifty-five (55) yards from the traphouse, but under no conditions exceed sixty-five (65) yards.

#### (f) Irregular Target.

(1) An unbroken target that has

not conformed to the definition of a regular target.

(2) Two targets thrown simultaneously in singles.

(3) Target thrown broken. Under no circumstances shall the result of firing upon a broken target be scored.

(g) Regular Double.

A regular target thrown from each traphouse simultaneously.

(h) Irregular Double.

Either or both targets of a double thrown as irregular targets. Only one target is thrown.

(i) Proof Double.

A repeat of a double.

(j) Shooting Bounds.

For Stations 1 to 7, inclusive, an area forty-four (44) yards in front of the traphouse from which the target is thrown. For Station 8, the distance from the traphouse to a point directly over a line with Stations 4, 8, and the target-crossing point.

(k) Balk.

Failure to shoot at a regular target or double.

(1) Malfunction of Gun.

Failure of gun to operate or function through no fault of the shooter.

A gun doubling shall be considered a malfunction for the second shot.

The "fan-firing" of the second shell in doubles, caused by a shooter holding back the trigger after the firing of the first shot, shall be considered as the fault of the shooter and is not an allowable malfunction.

(m) Defective Ammunition.

Failure of ammunition to fire or function due to structural deficiency.

(n) Dead Target.

A target from which a visible piece is broken as a result of having been fired upon and seen by the referee.

(o) Lost Target.

A target from which no visible piece is broken as a result of having been fired upon.

(p) Doubles, First and Second Shot.

The first shot shall be the first shot fired. The second shot shall be the second shot fired.

#### (q) Optional Shot.

The shot fired after the first twenty-four targets have been scored dead in any one round.

#### (r) Shooting Procedure.

In shooting single Targets, except from No. 8 Station, a competitor may load two cartridges if he so desires, using one cartridge for each target.

#### 2. General.

A normal skeet squad is composed of five shooters. The squad shall start shooting singles at Station 1 in the order in which the names appear on the score sheet, and shall proceed through the singles at stations as numbered, shooting the high-house target first and the low-house target second. Each shooter shall shoot at both targets before leaving the shooting station, except at Station 8, where each shooter shall shoot at a target from high traphouse before any member of the squad shoots at a target from low traphouse.

Doubles shall be fired upon at Stations 1, 2, 6, and 7 in that order, shooting the first shot at the target emerging from the nearest traphouse and the second shot at the target from the farthest traphouse. However, the shooter shall have the option of reversing the order of the first and second shot, in which case the referee must be notified before shooting. If a double is not completed before any reason beyond the control of the shooter, another double shall be fired upon, and is known as a proof double; except, however, if a shooter fires upon the first target of a regular double and fails to fire upon the second target because of the fault of the shooter, the result of the firing upon the first target shall be scored and the second target shall be scored "lost."

A round of Skeet for one person consists of twenty-five (25) shots, the object being to score the greatest number of dead targets. Twenty-four shots are fired as stated above. The first shot scored lost in any round shall be repeated immediately and the result scored as the twenty-fifth shot. Should the first shot lost occur in a double, the lost target shall be repeated as a single with the result of this shot scored as the twentyfifth shot. If the first shot scored

"lost" should be the first target of an irregular double, then a proof regular double shall first be fired upon to determine the result of the second shot, and then the first target scored "lost" shall be repeated as a single and scored as the twenty-fifth shot.

Should the first twenty-four targets of a round be scored "dead," the shooter shall have the choice ("optional") of trap and station for this twenty-fifth shot.

In the interest of conserving time, the shoot management may elect to have shooters fire upon their doubles at Station 1 immediately following the shooting of singles at that post and follow the same procedure at Stations 2, 6 and 7. When this policy is adopted, shooters who have not missed a target after having fired upon doubles at Station 7 shall then take their optional shots at that station (7). The squad will finish out the round by shooting singles in the usual manner at Station 8. Taking the "optional" shot by all "straight" shooters while they are at Station 7 is intended to prevent confusion and cross traffic that would result in taking the twenty-fifth shot after finishing at Station 8. Clubs adopting this speed-up policy, in the interests of uniformity, require all squads to follow the same procedure.

At the beginning of each round, when the squad is assembled at Station 1, the squad shall be entitled to observe one (1) regular target from each traphouse and shall have the option of observing one regular target after each irregular target, except where said irregular target was fired upon.

No member of a squad shall advance to the shooting station until it is his turn to shoot, and until the previous shooter has left the shooting station. No shooter shall order any target or shoot at any target except when it is his turn. The penalty for shooting out of turn without permission of the referee shall be to score all targets so fired upon as "lost."

No member of a squad, having shot from one station, shall proceed toward the next station in such a way as to interfere with another shooter. The penalty for wilful interference in this manner shall be disgualification from the event.

No shooter shall unduly delay a squad without good and sufficient reason in the judgment of the referee in charge of his squad. A shooter who persists in deliberately causing inexcusable delays after receiving a first warning from the referee shall be subject to disqualification from the event.

Broken Gun. When a gun breaks in such a manner so as to render it unusable, the shooter has the option of using another gun if such gun can be secured without delay, or dropping out of the squad until the gun is repaired and finishing the event at a later time when a vacancy occurs or after all other contestants have finished the event. Nothing shall prohibit the shooter from missing one round because of a broken gun, having the gun repaired and then rejoining the squad for all later rounds that the squad have not started. In that case the shooter will finish any or all rounds, starting with the shot where the breakdown occurred, that were not shot because of a broken gun, on the proper fields and in the first vacancy that may occur, or after the event has been finished by all other contestants.

Shooting Up. Where a shooter has entered but does not show up to start an event with his squad, he will not be permitted to shoot up after the first man in the squad has fired the first shot at Station 2. He may join the squad for all later rounds, but the round missed because of lateness must be shot on the proper field in the first vacancy, or after all other contestants have finished.

#### 3. Scoring.

(a) The score in any one round shall be the total number of "dead" targets.

(b) Targets declared "no bird" shall not be scored.

(c) One "lost" target shall be scored on:

(1) A balk or failure of gun to fire due to fault of shooter. Should this include both targets of a regular double, it shall be scored as first target lost, and a proof double shall

be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

If a balk should occur, or his gun fail to fire because of the shooter's fault, when a proof double is thrown and the result of the first shot has already been scored, the second target shall be scored as "lost."

(2) Each excessive malfunction or .malfunctions of the gun.

(3) Doubles fired upon in inverse order without notifying referee of intention.

(4) Target broken after it is outside the shooting bounds.

(5) Each target fired at when shooter fires out of turn without permission of referee.

(6) Each target fired upon and allegedly missed because the shooter's gun had a bent barrel, or a bent compensator, or any other bent tube or accessory.

(d) No claim of irregularity shall be allowed, either on singles or doubles, where the target or targets were actually fired upon and the alleged irregularity consists of deviation from the prescribed line of flight, or because of an alleged "quick pull" or "slow pull," unless the referee has distinctly called "no bird" prior to the firing of the shot in the event of the "quick pull,' or prior to the emergence of the target from the traphouse in the event of a "slow pull." Otherwise, if the shooter fires, the result shall be scored.

4. Repeat of Target for Malfunction of Gun or Defective Ammunition.

Only two malfunctions of any one gun in the same round shall be allowable. The third and all subsequent malfunctions of the same gun shall be excessive. Provided, however, that when more than one person is using the same gun in the same round, this rule shall apply to each of said persons separately.

persons separately. A shot shall be repeated for each instance of defective ammunition. If a shell having once misfired is used again, and fails to fire, the result shall be considered a fault on the part of the shooter and scored "lost."

5. Double or Proof Double.

(a) (1) If the first target of a double is thrown irregular as to deviation from the prescribed line of flight and is NOT shot at, a proof double shall determine the score for both shots, whether the second target is fired upon or not. The referee shall be the sole judge of irregularity.

(2) If the first target emerges broken, the double shall, in all cases, be declared "no bird" and a proof double shall be thrown to determine the result of both shots.

(3) If the shooter fires at the irregular target described in (1) above, then the result shall be scored for the first shot and the following rules pertaining to the second shot shall apply:

(b) In shooting doubles, if the shooter is deprived of a normal second shot because (1) the second target is thrown broken, or (2) the second target is thrown irregular as to deviation from the prescribed line of flight and is not shot at, or (3) the second target is not thrown at all, or (4) the second target is not thrown at the second target only shall be declared "no bird" and a proof double shall be fired to determine the result of the second shot. If the shooter fires at the irregular target shall be  $\leq$  cored.

(c) If a double is thrown but the targets collide, before the result of the first bird is determined, it shall be declared "no bird," and the result of a proof double shall determine the score of both shots.

(d) If a double be thrown but the shooter is deprived of a normal second shot for any of the following reasons, the result of the first shot shall be scored, and the second target only shall be declared "no bird," and a proof double shall be fired to determine the result of the second shot only.

(1) Both targets are broken with the first shot.

(2) The wrong target is broken with first shot. (For proof double ruling, see par. F. below.)

(3) The first shot is lost and a collision occurs before the result of the second shot is determined.

(4) The second target collides with fragments of the first target, properly broken, before the result of the second target is determined.

(5) The result of the first shot is determined, and interference occurs before the second shot is fired.

(6) An allowable malfunction occurs on the second shot. If such malfunction is excessive, not allowable, the second target shall be scored "lost."

(e) If a double is thrown and an allowable malfunction occurs on the first shot, it shall be declared "no bird," and the result of a proof double shall determine the score of both shots. If such malfunction is excessive, not allowable, the proof double shall be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

(f) There shall be no penalty for withholding the first shot when either target of a double is irregular. A proof double shall determine the score of both shots thereafter.

(g) In shooting a proof double after the first target (of a double) is "lost," if the shooter fires at, or breaks the wrong target first, said proof double shall be declared "no bird"; but, if this same procedure is repeated at the same station by the same shooter, it shall be scored as both targets "lost." If, in such a proof double and the first target (of a double) is "dead," the shooter fires at, or breaks, the wrong target first, said proof double shall also be declared "no bird"; but if this same procedure is repeated at the same station by the same shooter, it shall be scored as first target "dead," and second target "lost."

SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS. Conditions for all open skeet championships: Commonwealth, two rounds of 25 targets (= 50); State and District are one round of 25 targets. Maximum nomination in each event \$5, \$4, and \$3 respectively.

# SKEET HANDICAPPING FORMULA

Skeet Shooting is single - barrel shooting and all consequent handicapping is defined as a method whereby each competitor has an equal chance of reaching the possible with his allotted handicap.

A skeet shooter with no past performance or handicap rating shoots for targets to acquire a handicap. He shoots at 25 targets which comprise a round of skeet.

On his first performance he shoots with no handicap at 25 targets and, say, breaks 18 targets — this 18 is now his basis for handicapping until further scores are available. To ensure that he improves, THE KEY FIGURE OF 24 TARGETS (not the possible 25) is noted and the handicap allotted is the difference between this figure (24) and his average of 18 (i.e. 24 less 18 = 6). Thus handicap rating is now 6 whilst he is shooting the next event.

After he shoots his second skeet round both his first performance (18 targets) and his second performance (say he breaks 20 of 25 targets) are added together (18 + 20 = 38, resulting in an average of 19 targets). The difference between this average of 19 and the KEY FIGURE OF 24 TARGETS gives his handicap for his next round of skeet as being 5.

After the third round of skeet an average is taken of the three performances of the shooter as described above and a handicap is awarded accordingly. The difference between this average and the KEY FIGURE OF 24 is now his handicap.

After four rounds of skeet have been shot (e.g. 18, 20, 17, 22), even if over a several-year period, during which the club keeps such records, discard the lowest of these four rounds (e.g. 17) and average the remaining 3 rounds to the nearest number of targets

(e.g. 
$$\frac{18+20+22}{3}=20$$
)

This average of 20, subtracted from the key figure of 24, produces the handicap of 4 targets for the next round of skeet.

After the fifth round of skeet, where, say, 19 of 25 targets are scored, the NORMAL SKEET HAN-DICAPPING FORMULA is now applicable, which is:—

Take the last four (4) rounds, each of 25 targets, and discard the lowest score. The remaining three (3) scores are averaged. Thus from the above example, scores were 18, 20, 17, 22, 19, from which the initial figure of 18 is eliminated and the lowest score (17) of the remaining four scores is discarded, leaving 20 + 22 + 19 = 61, of which the average is 20<sup>3</sup>. The nearest whole figure of 20 is the accepted average. Take this average of 20 from the KEY FIGURE of 24 to arrive at the handicap of 4 targets.

THIS IS THE PROCEDURE FOR ARRIVING AT THE HANDICAP OF A SKEET SHOOTER AND SUCH CALCULATED RESULTS MUST APPEAR ON THE CLUB HANDICAP RETURNS AS LODGED WITH THE A.C.T.A.

Once a shooter attains an average of 24 targets, from these calculations, then his handicap becomes NIL.

The maximum skeet handicap attainable by a shooter shall be ten (10).

Once a shooter attains a skeet handicap of 3 or less, he cannot be handicapped forward of 3 unless there are unusual reasons.

In Skeet Championship events, kills only are counted. group.

SHOOT.

In Skeet Handicap events, kills and handicap targets (figures from the above formula) are added together to arrive at the total score. A Skeet possible can only be 25 targets.

This leaves the competition quite fair, but usually shortens the time required to reach finality.

#### Skeet Sweepstakes:

The normal method in a Skeet Handicap is to divide the sweepstakes amongst those shooters attaining twenty-five killed (broken) targets, with handicaps included.

The same method is used on the very few occasions a half-round is shot.

#### Skeet Shoot-offs (Handicaps):
