

#### Our Cover

Depicts the newly adopted motif for the A.C.T.A. green reefer jacket. The motif shows our native golden Cootamundra wattle surrounding a map of Australia which contains the coats of arms of each Australian State. The coats of arms from left to right are those of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania.

Shown also for artistic purposes, is an Australian Aboriginal "Didgeridoo." A didgeridoo, an ancient aboriginal musical instrument is a hollow tube of wood some four or five feet long and about three inches in diameter. It is extended from the mouthpiece, held close against the mouth, with the lips inside it to the toes which keep the other end raised just clear of the ground. It is a formidable-looking instrument and only few natives master the art of playing it properly.

### **REGISTERED SHOOTERS**

Article 49 of the Articles of Association of the Australian Clay Target Association states: (a) The Association shall keep a register of shooters and no person may enter or compete at any Association competition or event conducted by a member Club of which a Delegate it a member of the Association unless such person is registered with the Association and is not in arrears with his subscription.

(b) Each member Club and each member who is the Delegate of an unincorporated Club shall BEFORE THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF JANUARY IN EACH YEAR supply the Secretary with a full and accurate list of all members and shooters registered with such club for the year commencing on the first day of January of such year and shall at the same time remit to the Secretary the subscriptions of such Club members and shooters. Each member Club and each member who is the Delegate of an unincorporated Club shall also promptly forward to the Secretary of the Association the names and subscriptions of any such persons joining Club or registering as shooters after the thirty-first day of January in any year.

#### FFFS

Club secretaries are reminded that club 1974 affiliation fee of \$10 is due and payable on January 1, 1974.

All club shooter members are reminded that their 1974 Association fees are due and payable through their club secretaries on January 1, 1974.

These shooter registration fees are \$10 for the 1974 calendar year, whilst juniors are registered for \$1 for the year. Juniors receive a handicap card but do not receive any publications of ACTA Shooting News.

Registered juniors seeking the publication must register for the full \$10. Irrespective of the class of registration fee, juniors are included in the ACTA Public Liability Insurance Policy as recently published — coverage is to \$200,000 — whilst the premium is borne by the A.C.T.A.

However, where registered A.C.T.A. persons have a common address, and are related, then on request only one copy of Shooting News is to be sent and a reduction of \$2 is permitted for the additional registered shooter at the time of registration.

As from 1974, no plastic sleeves will be available for A.C.T.A. handicap cards.

Only subscribers to A.C.T.A. "Shooting News" may send \$8 (see information inside front cover) direct to the Secretary for "Shooting News" publications.

No pro rata rates are accepted and all fees are for the calendar year concerned.

April 1974 "Shooting News" will be mailed by Committee direction only to those financial — that is, those whose fees are actually received by the Secretary as of February 14, 1974.

As from Sept. 1973, all shooters not having paid the full \$10 annual registration fee ceased being mailed further copies of the 1973 publications of A.C.T.A. "Shooting News." (See May, 1973, page 5).

In view of production costs and space content, apropos the recent scheduled increases in Australian postal rates, all further publications of the A.C.T.A. "Shooting News" will not contain lists of shooter registrations or handicap amendments but a full list of registrations will be published in the July publication each year.

Shooters who have not marked their cards with their progressive common mark scores throughout 1973 are to be classed by club secretaries as "A" Class shooters in the 1974 registration lists to be forwarded by club secretaries for A.C.T.A. processing.



### NOMINATIONS FOR 1974 OFFICES IN A.C.T.A.

All interested shooters are hereby notified that nominations for all offices in the Association close at 5 p.m. on Monday, December 31, 1973. Nominations must be lodged on the prescribed form with the Secretary, A.C.T.A., G.P.O. Box 2038S, Melbourne, 3001, Victoria. Any nominations received after this hour or date will not be accepted. Nomination forms are available from the Secretary. A.C.T.A. Nomination forms are only available on application.

Those lodging nominations are reminded that such nominations must be lodged in accordance with Article 27 of the Association Constitution, which reads: "Nominations for all offices in the Association and members of the Executive Committee must be in writing signed by the Secretary of the member Club or by the DELEGATE member of an unincorporated club making the nomination, and must reach the Secretary of the Association on or before December 31, in each year prior to the Annual General Meeting."

It is advised that private nominations will be rejected. Nominations received must have the official backing of the club and be approved by the Committee of the member club concerned.

These nominations will be published in February 1974, A.C.T.A. "Shooting News."

From the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee meeting of September, 1973:—

1. An A.C.T.A. fund has been established to support the 1973 World Shooting Championships and Commonwealth Games shotgun teams and the fund is to be used for uniforms/badges (gold, silver, bronze), master awards, etc., to be won by the Australian and International Shooters.

(Note: Some cheques and some cash have been lodged with A.C.T.A. to commence this fund and the respective donors seek no personal recognition but merely that the fund be an "A.C.T.A. fund" for the above purpose.) Further donations would be appreciated. Figure at this stage is \$221.50 includes \$52.00 Cunnamulla G.C., \$30.00 L. S. R. Stewart of Cunnamulla. Donations to the Secretary, A.C.T.A., G.P.O. Box 2038S, Melbourne, marked "for Australian Teams Fund."

- 2. The 1975 Australian National Clay Target Championships will be conducted at the Tasmanian Gun Club at Launceston, Tasmania, during March, 1975. The actual dates will be decided and made public during the 1974 National Championships at Melbourne, Victoria.
- 3. The 1974 Australian National Clay Target Championships both trap and skeet will be conducted at the Melbourne Gun Club, near Lilvdale. Victoria within the period Wednesday March 6 to Wednesday, March 13, with one national event daily excepting Sunday which will be a free day. The daily sequence of events will be Skeet, Double Rise, Grand Handicap, Double Barrel, Free Day, Single Barrel;

ANZ Points Decision; thence on the last day will be the International Trap Teams' Match and the Champion of Champions event. The grounds will have 7 × DTL trap layouts of which one will be retained as a spare and for practice shooting. Four of these layouts are superimposed with skeet layouts. \$300 value compulsory division handicap events will be conducted if time is available during the programme.

- 4. Meetings during the National Championship period—
- 4.1 The Executive Committee will meet from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. on Tuesday March 5 at the Croydon Hotel, Maroondah Highway, Croydon. Phone: 870-9344.
- 4.2 National Marshals and Referees are required to meet at the Melbourne Gun Club at 4.30 p.m. T u e s d a y M a r c h 5 f o r r u l e s interpretations/instructions with Executive Committeemen Messrs. Biggs, Holtfreter, Hawkins, Rowe, Mules and Smith present. Trap referees will be rostered as line referees for the skeet event. (Shoot Marshals throughout the programme will be as for 1973.)
- 4.3 A "Get-together Buffet Dinner" will be held on Tuesday night, March 5 from 7.30 p.m. to 10.00 p.m. at the Croydon Hotel, Maroondah Highway, Croydon. Admission only by entree ticket available from A.C.T.A. office at the Melbourne Gun Club before 5 p.m. price \$3.50 per head. Beverages to be paid for by those concerned C.O.D.
- 4.4 An open referee discussion meeting may be held at 5 p.m. on Thursday, March 7 at the Melbourne Gun Club after the National Double Rise Championship to be chaired by Executive Committeeman Mr Noel Massey, with Messrs. Hawkins, Burgess, Bobson, Holtfreter present. Entrance charge: NIL.
- 4.5 The 38th Association Annual General Meeting will be held at the Croydon Hotel, Maroondah Highway, Croydon on Friday night, March 8, from 8.00 p.m. or as advised.
- 4.6 A "Tropny Presentation Night" will be held at the Croydon Hotel, Maroondah H'way, Croydon, Wednesday March 13 from 8 p.m. Trophies to be presented will be the High Gun Trophies and Cup plus the Champion of Champions Cup. These presentations will be followed by a "Buffet Supper" at 9 p.m. for which admission will only be by entrance ticket purchased from A.C.T.A. office at the Melbourne Gun Club price \$2.50 per head. Beverages to be paid for by those concerned C.O.D.

Within the 1974 National Championships advertisement some amendments have been included, whilst in addition the following features are to be observed:

5. Trophies will be presented daily at the conclusion of each event thence on the last day that all high gun trophies plus the Champion of Champions Cup be presented at the trophy presentation meeting prior to supper.

- 6. A.C.T.A. shoot office will be open 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the host club grounds on Tuesday, March 4, being the day prior to the nationals programme commencement, to accept signed shooter nominations for the first day's event and also for successive daily events. All nominations will be shuffled before being squadded for each event. Nomination forms will be provided for shooter completion and lodging.
- 7. A.C.T.A. will permit daily trap practice shooting subject to trap availability limited to 20 targets per shooter at the time of the ticket sale. Practice targets being 10 cents each.
- 8. Shooters missing a squad will be placed only in the final squad(s) and subsequently, having missed that squad, the shooter missing the first re-allocation forfeits his nomination.
- 9. Event shoot-offs to be conducted, over traps to be specified, in the order of—
- 9.1 best overall of the event who is also best in his class;
- 9.2 best in each of classes A, B, C to achieve 1st, 2nd, 3rd placings in each class but no shoot-offs for 4th or 5th placings.
- 10. Cartridges of 1½ ounce (32 grams) loading to be branded by manufacturers "A.C.T.A. National Championships/Melbourne/1974" and in any national championship only such especially branded cartridges of that current year and venue are permitted.
- 11. Referee, scorer and each contestant of each squad sign as to the recording of the respective scores as they are completed and before anyone leaves the layout.
- 12. A daily Jury of three Executive Committeemen will be appointed the day previous and listed on the notice board accordingly.
- 13. Empty shotshells on the ground are the property of the A.C.T.A. and may be consequently purchased from the marshals by means of tickets purchased from A.C.T.A. office at \$2.00 per cartridge carton or \$4 per small clay target carton.
- 14. Daytime use caravans are permitted on the grounds only on application to A.C.T.A. Caravan parks exist at Lilydale, Croydon and Healesville.
- 15. A light aircraft field is adjacent to the east of the Melbourne Gun Club distant one mile direct or three miles by road.
- 16. New Zealand shooter entrants be accepted for class shooting as: 11-12 yarders and beginners within 12 months: shoot C Class; 13-15 yarders: shoot B Class; 16 yarders and back: shoot A Class.
- 17. Skeet that every shooter when approaching for the first time, be allowed to look at, or to shoot at, both a high and a low target from station one without endangering any "break" score. He must then

commence his part of the competition and may subsequently similarly sight a high and a low target from number one station of the second layout.

18. 1974 National Championship High Gun Trophies will be as defined within the programme provisions of the special shoot advertisement herein.

The 1973-1974 Winchester Clay Target Tournament arrangements as decided by Winchester Australia Pty. Ltd. are contained within this publication.

The Winchester proposed host clubs will be approached by Winchester.

A.C.T.A. will merely ratify the club shoot applications within trap rule 27 and skeet rule 24 and will receive the club remittances for passing in bulk to Winchester Australia Pty. Ltd.

Attention is drawn to the "Editor's Mailbox" section of this publication concerning:—

- (a) The foreseeable future of mini targets.
- (b) The prospect of firearms legislation becoming more restrictive.

The embroiders for A.C.T.A. have written: -

"We regret to advise owing to the heavy increase in manufacturing costs and the introduction of equal pay that we have had to increase the price of our badges.

The combined embroidery factories have increased prices by 30 per cent for all embroidery.

We regret the price increase, but because of the spiralling costs mentioned, which proved to be beyond our capacity to absorb, there is no alternative."

At Mildura Gun Club (Vic.) on Saturday 3-11-73, Frank Apted of Metropolitan and Harry Moore of Mildura, established a joint Australian and Victorian break record of 280:280 broken standard targets during the Victorian State Tower Championship. However, at 8.15 p.m. because of rain, overcast conditions and rapidly approaching darkness, the two shooters decided, with club management approval, to continue the shoot-off on Saturday, 10-11-73, at the same venue, with no shooting in the meantime.

At the time of going to press for this publication, the ten Australian shotgun shooting selectees for the 1973 World Championships within the International Shooting Union had assembled in Melbourne, Victoria, to practice and prepare for the final selection of the respective teams of four trench and four skeet shooters.

\*

During the later stages of their practice they were issued with light-weight, sand colored shooting vests by A.C.T.A. with "AUSTRALIA" across the shoulders in two inch lettering of our national sporting colors. Because of the color of the vests the national colors were used as gold on green so that the national name was apparent without color clashing. Such national championship shooting dress is in line with overseas arrangements.

As all competing national teams are required to march to prepared positions before a dais at the World Championship opening and closing ceremonies, the Australian trench and skeet shooting teams were clad for these ceremonies in the official Australian team dress by A.C.T.A. of hat, green reefer jacket (complete with the Australian crest on the left breast pocket), gold colored shirt, green tie, grey trousers, tan shoes.

The teams were led and presented during these ceremonies by the team manager Mr Robert (Bob) Buchan who also guided and assisted them during the whole of the preparatory practice shooting and also during the entire World Championship series.

The 1973 World Moving Target Championships of the International Shooting Union embrace two distinct types of moving target shooting:—

- (a) Clay pigeon shooting, both trench and skeet types, where the target size simulates the body structure of a pigeon in flight, and for this sport, 12 gauge shotguns are used universally.
- (b) Running Boar Shooting which is simulated field shooting at a paper target, sized 51 inches × 29 inches, being a colored replica of a full-sized European Wild Boar. This target moves back and forward over an open run. A special .22 rimfire rifle is used.

The trench and skeet shooting championships were to be conducted at the Melbourne Gun Club (Victoria) through the A.C.T.A. which is the controlling body of shotgun shooting in Australia, within the Australian Shooting Association which itself is composed of the respective shotgun, running boar, small bore rifle and pistol shooting associations within Australia, and, as such is the Australian shooting affiliate of the International Shooting Union, the World Olympic Federation and the British Commonwealth Games Federation.

The official opening ceremony for the commencement of the 1974 I.S.U. World Moving Target Championships was held at 10 a.m. Monday, November 12, 1973, at the grounds and clubhouse of the Melbourne Gun Club.

These are the first shotgun teams which Australia has fielded in World Shooting and competing were some 28 or so teams from other member countries.

To greet these visiting representative teams and their managers, on the dais on the opening day were the Victorian State Governor, Sir Rohan Delacombe and Mr G. Matthews, M.P., representing the Prime Minister of Australia, together with members of Federal and State Parliaments plus the Lillydale Shire President. Also on the dais was the I.S.U. World President, Dr. Hasler and A.S.A. President, Mr G. Armstrong.

The respective flags of each competing nation will be flown during the opening ceremony.

As the placegetters for the team and individual events are decided from the shooting scores, I.S.U. gold, silver and bronze medallions were presented whilst the flags of the appropriate nations are especially flown and each national anthem were played from taped music.

"Master" shooting badges were presented to those competitors achieving the required standards.

The closing ceremony was conducted at Springvale, Victoria, at the grounds of the Sporting Shooters' Association where the Running Boar section of the championships was held. This closing ceremony was held on the afternoon of Thursday, November 22, 1973, and all competing teams and their managers were to attend, as for the opening ceremony.

The grounds of the Melbourne Gun Club were in first class condition with marquees for food and resting tents for each individual national team.

First arrivals on Wednesday afternoon, October 31, were the members of the Italian team with their manager. The team commenced loosening up the following day with shooting practice and showed good styles. They brought their own ammunition.

The Italian shooting team manager Mr Ferdinando Rossi, commented most favorably on the "magnificent grounds."

The clubhouse of the Melbourne Gun Club is of brick structure, single-storey with a full concrete base.

The clubhouse has recently been extended to include a main area of 72 ft. × 25 ft., fully carpeted plus a yet to be licensed tiled bar area of 17 ft. × 25 ft., a kitchen 20 ft. × 10 ft. with all modern appliances and is completely white-tiled throughout. There are separate toilets and showers for both sexes and each such block is connected to a septic system. A covered crush area of 25 ft. × 9 ft. 6 in. leads from the general walk area to the large 26 ft. × 18 ft. office, which also is fully carpeted, and access to this is via an enclosed but glass-fronted shoot marshal's office 9 ft. 6 in. × 9 ft. 6 in. The main office has four windows opening to the covered crush area. At the rear of the office is a committee room 19 ft. × 12 ft. for the jury and as a managerial conference room. Between the bar area and the conference room is a fully equipped cool room 9 ft.  $\times$  9 ft. for the bar supplies.

The Melbourne Gun Club grounds are a complete credit to their untiring and dedicated Club President, Mr "Bob" Buchan and to his equally dedicated and energetic members within their respective sub-committees. Previous publications have recorded these sub-committees and although all concerned cannot, in the space available be individually named, they have each been led by a steering committee thence sub-committees of administrative by Mr Russell Fox; finance by Messrs Mal Hastie and John Petty; grounds by Mr Rupert Henwood; technical by Mr George Biggs; electricity and trap installation by Mr Lindsay Baxter; and architects John Summers and Bill Delaney.

No A.C.T.A. funds have been used or committed to this project, as all traps, equipment, additions and extensions to the Melbourne Gun Club have been financed entirely by the club — from its own resources and from various donations from the Commonwealth Government, the Victorian State Government, from industrial and private donors and from some sympathetically generous clay target clubs — to enable Australia to have a suitable venue for the 1973 World Championships.

However, various items of uniform, accommodation and fares, as prescribed to equip the A.C.T.A. shotgun teams for the 1973 World Championships and the Xth British Commonwealth Games, are an A.C.T.A. responsibility.

To Warracknabeal (Vic) — Commonwealth Continental DB Mini Target Championship.

From Bairnsdale (Vic.) to Sale (Vic.) Victorian State Night Mini Target DB Points Score Championship, Gippsland District Std. Target Day SB Championship.

Referees who do not fully register for any year, forfeit such status after three months (Association Article 34 (d).

The N.Z.G.C.A. National Championships will be conducted at Christchurch from March 30 to April 6, both days inclusive.

AUSTRALIA'S FOREMOST SHOTGUNNING AND RELOADING AUTHORITY

# OPEN SEASON FOR PROTECTED GAME SHOOTING THROUGHOUT THE COMMONWEALTH — 1974

Today in all civilised countries, the taking of fauna is a controlled privilege, not an inherent right. Native fauna is at all times the property of the Crown and is (a) permanently protected, or (b) protected, or (c) pest fauna.

The sale of wild game is forbidden in most States and eggs must not be taken for any purpose.

Complete information is available from the various State Departments as listed. Licences may be obtained from these respective addresses or from the various police stations.

# **WESTERN AUSTRALIA**

Department of Fisheries and Fauna, 108 Adelaide Terrace, Perth, 6000 (phone 25-5988) from whom a free guide is available.

All visiting interstate or overseas shooters should present current handicap cards, identification papers and firearms at the first police station encountered in Western Australia for licensing.

The only game which may be taken in this State are ducks and quail.

There are two different open seasons for duck shooting:-

- 1. Throughout the inland and northern areas, there is a continuous season.
- 2. In the south-west and Eucla Land Divisions, the season may be varied from year to year depending on biological conditions. The season dates and bag limits are:—

Opens January 5 and provisional closing date yet to be confirmed is March 31.

Licence — \$2.00; bag limit, 10 per day.

The open season for Stubble Quail only is usually January 1 to June 30 each year — all other species are protected.

### **SOUTH AUSTRALIA**

Department of Fisheries and Fauna Conservation, G.P.O. Box 901E, Adelaide, 5001.

Note — at the time of going to press, no information had been received from the Department, however the following information, as applicable for previous years is published as a guide.

No person shall: -

- (a) Shoot at animals or birds on any Sunday;
- (b) Have a gun in his possession on any Sunday for the purpose of shooting at animals or birds on that day;
  - (c) Traps, nets, snares, nooses are prohibited.

Gun licences cost \$2 annually to those over 18 years. A firearms licence for persons under 18 years must be obtained from a Police Station. Gun licences

do not authorise persons to shoot without the consent of the owner or occupier.

Dates awaiting confirmation and gazetting were: — Duck Season — late February until June 30.

Bag limit 12 ducks per person per day of the following species only. Wood Duck (Maned Goose, Black Mountain, Grey Teal, Blue-Winged Shoveller, Pink-Eared, White-Eyed, Chestnut).

Note: Musk, Blue-Billed and Freckled Ducks must not be taken.

Quail Season — beginning April until end July.

Bag limit 25 per person per day.

Snipe Season — The Australian (Japanese) Snipe Season opened October 1972 and closes early March.

Special Note: No ducks of the species listed above may be sold at any time and all ducks, quail and snipe taken alive during the open season must be released when the season closes.

#### NORTHERN TERRITORY

Administration — Arid Zone Research Institute, Animal Industry and Agriculture Branch, P.O. Box 291, Alice Springs, 5750.

All shooting laws within Northern Territory are unchanged from previous years.

All firearms must be declared at the nearest Police Station into Northern Territory, for licensing and/or registering within two days of entry.

Ducks and Geese (except Magpie Geese, Burdekin Ducks and Pigmy Geese) — open season in all of Northern Territory, north of the 18th parallel of south latitude, from July 1, till October 30, annually.

Magpie Geese — open season in all of Northern Territory north of the 18th parallel of South latitude from August 1 to December 30, each year.

Buffalo and marine crocodile or red kangaroo are now protected over the entire Northern Territory and may be shot only under licence.

Other partly protected animal species may be taken after procurement of special licences.

Pests which may be destroyed at any time, other than in sanctuaries, include Feral (wild) rabbits, donkeys, pigs, camels, cats, goats, foxes, dingoes, wedge-tailed eagles and snakes of all species.

### **TASMANIA**

National Parks and Wild Life Service, Magnet Court, Sandy Bay or P.O. Box 210, Sandy Bay, Tasmania, 7005.

As game seasons are reviewed annually and no further decision is likely until the new 1974 year, the following 1973 decisions are listed hereunder, however:—

8, December, 1973

The Japanese Snipe open season has been set from October 7, 1973 till January 31, 1974, with 15 bag limit daily, and licence is \$2.

No open season is expected during the 1974 year for Cape Barren Geese or Black Swan.

Male Deer with branching antlers — February 24-March 25; Licence \$5; bag limit, one per day; seasonal limit, five.

Wild Duck - 3-3-74 to 29-4-74. Licence \$2; bag limit, 10 per day.

Mutton Bird — South — 10 a.m. March 31 to April 30. North — March 27 to April 30. Licence fee and bag limit — Commercial Licence (North only) \$20, no bag limit. Commercial Catchers' Licence (North only) \$10.00, no bag limit. Non-Commercial (Season Licence, North only) \$5, no bag limit. Day Licence (whole of State) \$2, 25 birds, South; 50 birds North.

Note: North and South are designated by a line running from Sandy Cape on the West Coast to Eddystone Point on the East Coast. Birding on Petrel Islands, Bass Strait restricted to Day Licence only.

Wallaby - April 1-November 30.

Non-Commercial Hunters' Licence \$2 (both Crown and private land) — entitles holder to sell not more than 50 skins taken by him during an open season.

Commercial Hunters' Licence \$5 which authorises the taking and selling of the products of Wallaby (meat and skins) during an open season.

Notes: 1. Forester Kangaroos wholly protected, Bennetts and Rufus only may be taken.

2. An open season for wallaby operates continuously in the Furneaux Group of Islands.

Water Rat — April 1 to September 30. Licence to take and sell skins, \$2. No bag limit.

Brown Quail — May 5 to May 31. Licence \$2; bag limit, 24 per day.

Male Pheasant — (King Island only) June 2 to June 10. Licence \$3; bag limit, three per day.

Yellow Wattle Bird season — July 15 to July 31. Licence \$2; bag limit, 15 on opening day; 10 per day for remainder of season.

Brush Possum — July 1 to August 30 — Licence \$5, no bag limit.

Japanese Snipe -6-10-73-31-1-74; Licence \$2; Bag limit 15 per day.

# **VICTORIA**

Fisheries and Wildlife Department, 632 Bourke Street, Melbourne, 3000. Phone 67-7753.

1974 game season dates are — Wild Ducks — from 6 a.m. February 16 to midnight, April 27. Quail (Stubble Quail only) — from March 2 to March 30 and from May 4 to June 29. Snipe (Jack Snipe only) — closed during month of June only. Shooter licence \$2 per annum.

Game (Duck) licence \$3.

Quail licence \$2.

To carry or discharge a firearm over any property in Victoria without the landholders consent is an offence.

### **NEW SOUTH WALES**

Dates of Open Season: Duck — second last Saturday in February to last Saturday in April (10 weeks). Quail — first Saturday in May to last Saturday in July (12 weeks).

Bag Limit: Ducks — variable according to seasonal conditions, for example — 1973 Duck Season — aggregate of 20 ducks on opening day and 10 ducks every other day.

Quail — variable according to seasonal conditions — 1973 Quail Season — aggregate of 25 quail per day and maximum of 50 quail in possession.

Licenses: Game Licences for duck and quail shooters (combined licence) are required and cost \$4.00 and are issued free to pensioners who present their pensioner card. Income from the sale of licences is used for wildlife management purposes. These are obtained from Clerks of Petty Sessions at all Court Houses within New South Wales or at the office of the National Parks and Wildlife Service, 189-193 Kent Street, Sydney.

# QUEENSLAND

Department of Primary Industries, William Street, Brisbane, 4000.

Open season fauna permit (personal) \$2; (for sale) \$5.

The only game in Queensland are wild duck and the decision for an open season is made annually and usually from first Saturday in June in South Queensland and from first Saturday in July in Central and North Queensland, both for three months.

Shooters must obtain prior permission from the owner or occupier of the land concerned.

Wild ducks - bag limit, 15 per day per person.

All islands forming part of the State of Queensland and certain other areas have been declared sanctuaries.

An open season may be declared from time to time for Black Duck (or Grey or Brown), Grey Teal (Wood, Slender), Hardhead (White-Eyed, White-Winged, Barwing, Brownhead), Maned Goose (Wood Duck), Plumed Tree Duck, Whistling Tree Duck.

An open season is never declared for Green Pigmy Goose, White-Quilled Pigmy Goose (Teal); White-Headed Shelduck (Burdekin or Mangrove), Pied Goose Magpie, Black/White, Blue-Winged Shoveller (Spoonbill, Stinker), Chestnut Teal (Chestnut Breasted, Green Headed, Black or Mountain Teal), Musk Duck (Mould Goose), Pink-Eared Duck (Zebra, Pink-Eyed, Widgeon), Black Swan.

Various open season dates exist (available on application) for Finches, some Parrots and Brush or Scrub Turkeys.

#### **MINI TARGETS**

The plant on which we formerly made Mini Targets broke down some months ago and because of its age it is unecomonical to even attempt to repair it.

We have been importing targets from overseas but their quality proved to be most unsatisfactory. In addition, this particular supplier would not accept our latest order for delivery prior to April 1974, and even then at a 50 per cent increase in cost.

We are considering building new plant but even if it could be economically justified two points have emerged in our considerations.

- (a) Because of the capital cost involved and the very small output our costs must increase; and
- (b) Under the very best conditions it would not be ready prior to June 1974.

The net result of all these factors is that apart from current stocks which may last a week or two we will have no Mini Targets available before April 1974 and even then at a significant increase in cost.

Under these circumstances it would seem prudent that clubs intending to hold Mini Target events should schedule them for the second half of 1974.

Clubs with events scheduled for late this year may be unable to obtain supplies from us and we regret any inconvenience which may be caused. I can assure you that we have tried hard to avoid this situation, but because of circumstances outside of our control it proved to be impossible.

Finally, could I ask your Executive Committee to give serious consideration to the discontinuance of Mini Target events. The cost of running them will certainly increase and this may reduce their popularity even further.

A.C.T.A. "Shooting News" published in its October 1973 issue the following information from Great Britain:—

It appears that the proposals are to prohibit the inheritance by will of gun ownership from father to son/daughter/or chosen heir; to forbid lending or borrowing guns; to cease inheritance of antique firearms; to confiscate automatic shotguns; to disfigure some guns.

A.C.T.A. National President Mr Gordon Hall has written to the Australian Government Federal Minister, Mr G. C. Scholes . . . "I am vitally interested in the reported plan being prepared by the Federal Attorney General, Senator L. Murphy, on National registration of firearms and a central computerised ballistics file . . . As we are a body very much involved in the promotion of safety with the use of guns and with the training of all members in the correct use of guns on and off the competition ground, we are anxious to offer comment on the proposed legislation at the appropriate time."

The following self-explanatory acknowledgements from Mr Gordon C. Scholes, Federal Member for Corio dated 31-10-73 and from the Federal Attorney General Mr Lionel Murphy dated 30-10-73 are published accordingly, with permission:—



I am not at this time in a position to provide the information requested as work is still proceeding on the details of the scheme. But when proposals for legislation are more advanced I shall be glad to arrange for an officer of my Department to discuss them with Mr Hall.

The proper control of firearms is, in my view, an important facet of law enforcement. There is a rising trend in Australia and, indeed in the world, in the use of firearms in crime. While I appreciate that no system of legislative control can be wholly successful in preventing criminals from obtaining firearms, I believe that society should make this as difficult for criminals as reasonably possible.

Stricter firearm controls may cause some inconvenience to responsible persons who have a legitimate use for firearms. Nevertheless, the degree of inconvenience should be measured against the risk to the community of failing to exercise adequate control. However, I would like to allay any fears Mr Hall and his Association may have that my proposal is intended to inhibit or discourage the sport of clay pigeon shooting.

# Half a century with gun and

# rod in Victoria

### PART ONE

# **BOYHOOD DAYS**

"Take this boy, Jim, and teach him how to use and how not to use a gun."

These words were spoken by my mother to the stockman on our stud farm at Kyneton just on sixty years ago.

I was "this boy" and my age was eleven years. The gun was a light, double-barrelled, muzzle-loading quail gun of my late father's who had been no mean shot.

To say that I was thrilled would give but a faint idea of the state of exaltation that I was in. To own a gun, a real gun of my very own was almost beyond belief. Jim, the stockman, a magnificent rider, a first-class horse breaker and fine all-round sportsman, was very thorough and very patient with his very young pupil. At first I had to learn how to carry a gun (unloaded) under difficult conditions, alone or in company, in the open paddocks or in thick scrub, on rough ground or on smooth. I had to learn how to manipulate fences with a loaded gun. The technique for the breach-loader of today is, of course, quite different. You cannot open the breach or remove the charge from a muzzle-loader before you get through or over a fence. Above all I was taught not to be ashamed of being careful both for my own sake and for that of others in the handling and use of such a lethal weapon as the gun. To enter a house with a loaded gun or to load a gun in the house were unforgivable sins. I am reminded of an incident that occurred when a city boy friend was spending his holidays with me. He was years older than I and in my absence tried to load the gun in a room in the house and while adjusting the percussion cap onto the nipple allowed the hammer to fall. A deafening report brought me there headlong to find a large hole in the plaster of the wall and an elderly aunt in a dead faint on the floor. The charge had just missed her by about a foot. What I said may be better imagined than described. All the scorn that a very young but well-trained small boy could put into his opinion of the hopeless ignorance and stupidity of his older friend was expressed in language that left no doubt as to its meaning.

In addition to the gun my equipment consisted of a powder horn, a shot container with an adjustable brass nozzle, a box of percussion caps and a wadcutter punch. With the latter I cut my supply of wads from old cardboard boxes with the aid of a lump of sheet lead.

My early attempts were to destroy or drive off the large flocks of parrots which used to play havoc with our orchard in the cherry season. Greenleaks, Rosellas and Blue Mountain Parrots darkened the sky and deafened the ear with their shrill calls. If left alone an orchard would be cleaned up in a few hours.

At first I was content to shoot my game sitting or by letting fly into a flock as they passed over. As I grew older though I learned the joy of stopping a single bird in full flight. Another pest in those days was the native cat which was a deadly foe in the fowlyard especially amongst the chickens and young turkeys. My method was to set a box trap in their haunts at night and when in the morning I found I had a catch take the trap into an open paddock, stand behind the trap with my gun and open the door. My prisoner always got a clear run of about 20 yards before I fired. If I missed with both barrels my dog, Darkie, attended to him. In this way I learned how to shoot running ground game.

One morning I got a surprise. The box seemed unusually heavy and I thought I had trapped two cats at once. When I opened the trap, out bounced a huge tiger cat which is an animal resembling the spotted native cat only large and fiercer. I was so astonished that I let him go too far before I fired and missed him badly. Darkie failed to catch him before he reached a large gum tree which he climbed, ran along a low bough and jumped straight at the dog which closed with and got badly bitten on the nose for his pains. On being beaten off by me with a stick he made for another tree about fifty yards away. I reloaded my gun and shot him as he was preparing to repeat the performance of jumping at us from on high.

He measured three feet from the point of his nose to the last hair in his long tail.

"Would you like to come out possuming with us tonight, laddie," said one of the men to me one day. "We are going out to the bush paddock and will stay there all night and sleep in the little hut." The bush paddock was a block of six hundred acres of thickly timbered country five or six miles out of the town.

I had often been there in the daytime and knew the lonely little slab hut well. It was buried in the heart of the forest in a small clearing and close to a tiny creek. In broad daylight the place appealed to my youthful sense of romance and I often peopled it with all sorts of strange beings and creatures of my imagination.

To go there at night, to moon possums and to sleep there was something which filled me with tremendous excitement and I did not rest until I got permission to go. Our means of transport was a one horse dray, and, perched on a bag of chaff, I set off with my two companions as happy as a King grasping my precious gun, unloaded of course.

We reached the hut before dark and made ourselves comfortable for the night. A big fireplace and plenty of firewood provided the essentials of warmth and comfort. Blankets and the floor were our beds. A billy, a frying pan and a kettle with the rations we brought with us gave us a meal which served with hunger sauce met all requirements.

When we had eaten our meal and were waiting over the fire for the moon to reach the necessary altitude in the sky one of the men produced a fiddle and regaled us with some lively airs. The night wore on, the fiddle ceased, and the time had come for action. We went out into the night and looked and listened.

I wonder how many people other than those who live in the outback forest country ever heard of the art of mooning possums. The essentials, of course, are, first, forest country in which possums abound, and, next, a clear cloudless moonlight night with a full or three-quarter moon high in the heavens. One takes a station that places a tall spreading tree between one and the moon: then by stooping, turning and twisting one's body the bright moon's disc is run along the trunk and limbs of the tree until the shadow of a possum is seen. For the rest a steady hand and sure aim is all that is required.

Even at that early age I was impressed with the beauty of the scene. The clear moon shone through the tops of the trees while the ground beneath, mottled on the outskirts by the leaves and branches showed black as ink around the buts and in the depth of the forest. The intense silence of the night, broken at intervals by the almost human cry of the Koala bear, the squeak of the possum, or the long-drawn wail of a distant curlew, made an impression that remains with me to this day altho' nearly sixty years have passed since that never to be forgotten night.

Whether we bagged few or many possums that night I cannot remember but I returned home in triumph the following day with the memory of an experience which was to remain with me down the years, though often repeated as time went on, but not impressed upon my mind as that first night spent in the vastness of the Australian bush.

Rabbits were not very plentiful in those early days but in my wanderings around the pastures of my old home I frequently came across a hare and I learned quite early in the day to shoot well forward at a crossing hare if I did not wish to hit it in the hind-quarters and hear sometimes the sickening cry of a wounded animal.

Fishing in those days in the Campaspee River was confined to black fish, the small yellow-skinned variety and a home-made bamboo rod with a floater and a worm were the principal requirements to enable an enthusiastic angler to grass up to two or three dozen fish. Yabbies were also plentiful and a home-made net, a piece of string and some dogsmeat would often provide a feast of several dozen for those at home. Later on some enthusiast introduced the English perch better known now as the red fin. These flourished exceedingly and were caught up to three pounds in weight but as they increased the black fish diminished in numbers until they became very scarce indeed

A few years passed and, at the age of 16, I became the proud possessor of a breach-loader with which I wandered through the paddocks and along the banks of the Campaspee and, becoming more ambitious, added an occasional black duck to my bag. About this period I paid a visit to Southern Queensland and spent a memorable holiday with my uncle, Tom Clark, who was then manager of Jimbour Station on the Darling Downs.

In company with one of the boundary riders I shot kangaroo and wallaby, stalked plain turkeys from a buggy and searched for the scrub turkey under the extraordinary bottle tree, in the thick bush. This bird is first cousin to our Mallee hen. The nest is a large mound of leaves and twigs into which the eggs are laid, covered over and left to hatch out by themselves in the warmth caused by the decaying vegetable matter of the mound. The bird is black in color, smaller than the domestic turkey and excellent to eat, as are also the eggs.

On a camping expedition to the Bunya Mountains, a day's ride from Jimbour, I, for the first time, shot Wonga pigeons in the tall pines which grow luxuriantly on the summit of those ranges.

A very unpleasant feature of camping in the Bunya Mountains was the presence there, in large numbers, of a loathsome insect, the scrub tick. Each night, on retiring, it was necessary for us to carry out a careful examination of each other, attired in our birthday suits, to deal with any insects that had attached themselves to our bodies during the day. The tick insinuates its head beneath the skin of the victim and, if allowed to remain, increases in size rapidly until its body sometimes reaches the size of a small cherry. To try to remove the intruder by force results in its body coming away from its head, which is left behind beneath the skin to produce a poisonous and painful sore in a few days time. Fortunately a drop of keronsene applied with a feather causes the insect to remove itself when it can be easily destroyed. Another unpleasant feature of life in the Bunyas is the stinging tree. It is quite a tall tree with large flat leaves covered with pine nettle-like hairs on their under surface. If as you ride along one of these leaves brushes your face or hands the sensation is as if you had been scalded with hot water. A painful rash follows, and, strangely enough, the remedy is homoepathic in character or a "hair of the dog that bit you" for if you rub the painful part with the bark of the same tree the irritation is allayed.

My first real expedition in search of sport came a year or two later when, in company with six friends, I explored the shores of Western Port Bay. The party consisted of four school mates, the Desailly brothers, Dot and Gilbert, Cecil Kennedy and myself with three older friends, the Hayes brothers and W. Warrington Rogers. We hired from a local carrier a small covered van drawn by a single white horse somewhat advanced in years. We carried a small tent, guns, rifles, rods, etc., and a supply of tinned food, with all necessary camp utensils. We left Brighton, where we lived, soon after daylight, a day or two before Xmas in the year 1884 and, travelling at a pace consistent with the powers and endurance of our four-legged tractor.

arrived about nightfall at the Tobin Yallock Creek, a few miles beyond Tooradin. Here we pitched our camp for the night and amused ourselves by fishing for eels in the creek. Next morning our small army invaded the adjoining paddocks and advanced in open order in search of ground game. After we had bagged a few hares we were ordered out by an indignant proprietor who might not have objected to a single armed trespasser, but did so strongly, and not without reason, to an organised force of seven.

Another day's journey, often through sandy patches of heavy going brought us to Grantville, a little hamlet just opposite French Is.

Here we pitched our camp, on Xmas Eve beside a small creek and settled down for a few days shooting and fishing. That night we decided to give the inhabitants a treat so just before midnight a few of us played the parts of the Waites, visiting the few cottages which constituted the settlement and singing Xmas carols &c to the startled occupants. Our rendering of Good King Wenceslas and Noel however did not appeal to the sleeping people and we were either ordered off with threats of canine intereference or failed completely to obtain any response at all. Grantville had not then been educated up to a visit from the Waites. I often wonder if they ever heard them again.

Next morning we made the acquaintance of the local butcher whose name I forget and earned his friendship by lending him our horse to get him out of a transport difficulty. From him we obtained local information as to the whereabouts of game and a few days passed shooting scrub wallabies and hares.

A day or two later whilst round the camp fire our friend the butcher discovered that our W. W. Rogers was the noted sprinter of that name who had just won the then celebrated foot race known as the Melfort Handicap. He informed us that there was to be a Sports Race Meeting in the district on New Year's Day and suggested that as post entries would be accepted we should go and compete.

As we also had Dot Desailly and Cecil Kennedy who were first-class school boy athletes we decided to patronise the Sports Meeting.

We were also told that the event of the day was the running-off of a certain district championship in which a cup which had to be won twice would be competed for by two former winners.

We arrived unnoticed in our old wagon and the butcher took charge of all arrangements. Bookmakers were not there but sweepstakes and private bets were the order of the day and our friend backed the unknown Rogers wherever he could and in return gave us the dinkum oil about the local horseflesh. The results were somewhat startling. Rogers won the cup and a money stake as well.

Desailly won the hurdle race and Kennedy won the second prize for pole vaulting while the rest of us backed several of the winning horses. We returned to our camp in triumph.

### A TRIP TO CURDIE'S RIVER IN 1886

Whilst yarning one day with my friend and fellow student Garnet Soilleux in his little room in the tower at Trinity College, Melbourne University, he suddenly said, "What about a week's shooting and fishing at Curdie's River," "Curdie's River," said I, "where on earth is that?" He explained that it was an almost ungetatable sort of place on the coast this side of Warrnambool where fish were so ravenous and so numerous that one could catch a boat load in no time almost without any bait on one's hook and that local farmers were hard put to it to keep any grass for their sheep because of the kangaroos and wallabies. "It sounds attractive," said I, "let's go." In the next short vacation we went and motorists of today who are familiar with the Princes Highway and with Peterborough may be interested to learn how we, armed with rods &c and a gun and Winchester rifle each we set off by train to Camperdown where we hired a buggy and a pair of horses with a driver who said he was familiar with the track through the forest which lay between us and the coast. The road, if it could be called a road, was atrociously bad and it was long after nightfall when we reached our journey's end. A bush track in daylight is often exciting enough but a bush track at night with the aid of candle side lights provided thrills every few minutes for hours.

At one spot on the crest of a sharp rise and before we were well into the down-grade our driver pulled up with a jerk and an imprecation, "These young devils will kill somebody one of these times," he said as he pointed out a sapling cut off about two feet from the ground and lying at that height right across the track. He explained that some of the young boys of the forest amused themselves occasionally by doing this sort of thing in order to watch the discomforture of the travelled obliged to stop and remove the obstruction. That any one might be travelling at night and break their horses legs or their own necks did not concern them. At last we reached the Inlet or estuary of Curdie's River which gleamed weirdly in the starlight of a moonless clear sky. To our astonishment our Jehu drove straight into the water and appeared to be putting out to sea in a four-wheeled vehicle as the opposite shore was merely a black shadow some distance away in the half darkness. I am not sure if we could have done this if the tide had been full but we arrived safely on the other side, which was some hundred yards away or more, without mishap.

At Peterborough, consisting then of only one or two houses, we found warmth and a hospitable welcome at Jim Iryine's Hostel.

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS

The Governor of Victoria, Sir Rohan Delacombe, himself an interested shooter, discusses trench and trapshooting with Susan Natrrass from the Province of Alberta. Susan, 23, shot her way into the Canadia team in open Canadian competition of male and female shooters, to be able to come to these World Championships. She has been shooting under international shooting rules since she was 18 and that year was her shooting debut at San Sebastian. Her father interested her in shooting as he has represented Canada at four World Championships and at the Olympics. At end October 1973, Susan set an unofficial world women's record in Mexico with 145:150 broken trench targets — a performance reminiscent of Annie Oakley. Susan played the part of this great female marksman in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in the summer of 1972.

Members of the 1973 Italian Shotgun Shooting Team include two Olympic gold medallists, a twice world champion, and Olympic silver and bronze medallist and countless European National Champions. Shown left to right are Angelo Scalzone, Silvagni Basagni, Ennio Mattarelli, Carlo Danna and Mario Manfredi. In 1972 at Munich Olympics, Scalzone age 42, shot a record 199:200 to win the gold medal. Ennion Mattarelli has twice been the world's champion and won the Tokyo gold medal. Age 45, he won the world championship in Oslo in 1961 and San Sebastion in 1969.

Munich bronze medallist in the trench team is Silvagni Basagni the current Italian Champion and runner-up in this year's European Championships was Mario Manfredi, a former European Champion. Carlo Danna is nicknamed the "Apache" by his team mates because of the blue band he wears round his hair while competing.


