SECRETARY'S NOTES

The 1977 National championships are almost here and a number of us are already being affected by National fever. Traditionally our Annual Meeting is conducted during the Nationals, and this year, it is of vital importance (aren't they all!!). We will face a ballot for National President which is a matter for careful consideration and intelligent casting of votes. The two nominees have produced policy statements, which were included in the April issue of C.T.S.N. (Clay Target Shooting News), and the disappointment is that the unsuccessful candidate will also disappear from the National Executive — whoever it is will certainly be missed. It must be remembered that it is Club Delegates who vote (they must be accredited, represent a Financial Club, and be currently registered shooters) and it is my belief that in the past, too many so called Club Delegates have in fact cast votes according to their own opinion rather than at the direction of the Committee of the Club they are representing. This leads to two factors —

1. Clubs should ensure that they direct their Delegates.
2. (and equally as important) Delegates should arrange a briefing session with the Club Committee. It would be a major step forward if we could have a majority of Clubs represented at the Annual Meeting with all Delegates casting responsible votes. This year, vacancies on the Executive Committee will be filled either by unopposed nominees, or by appointments in cases where casual vacancies have occurred.

One such vacancy has been created by the resignation of Mr D. H. (Harry) Williamson from the South West Zone in Victoria. Unfortunately Harry has been in poor health for some time and has finally decided to sell his property at Apsley (on S.A.-Victorian border) after which he intends to move interstate. With his usual conscientiousness, Harry has tendered his resignation mid-term, rather than risk only half-doing the job by remote control. Harry Williamson will very definitely be missed — his tact, consideration and experience will not be easily replaced. Although I have had a very short time working with him, I have known Harry since 1958 and he has always been a great asset to the Association.

The other major topic to be considered at the 1977 Annual Meeting will be the 1976 Financial Reports. These show a dramatic (and traumatic for those trying to keep the "ship afloat") reversal in the year to 31st December 1976. The reports are reprinted elsewhere in this issue to give each registered shooter and any other interested parties a chance to analyse the position and ask any questions which may arise. It is most unfortunate that our move towards more open communications coincides with such a dismal financial result. It is my hope that following the Executive Committee Meeting in May, a forecast of 1977 operating expenses will be available to the Annual Meeting.

As an acknowledgement of the dominant part our Nationals play in our annual activities, this issue of C.T.S.N. has been "jazzed up" a little to celebrate. Thanks are due to three major supporters of Clay Target Shooting News for helping in defraying the additional cost by taking advantage of the colour panels. The three are Guthrie Trading Co., IMI Australia Ltd, and Winchester Australia Pty. Ltd. In fairness, a number of others would have taken four-colour space if they could have been accommodated, especially Boustead Pty. Ltd., the Remington Agents.

Enough of the Nationals — there is a separate section in the journal for the intending competitors and shooters. Back to general day to day matters.

Following restriction of the April issue of C.T.S.N. to only those shooters who were registered for 1977, the office has been inundated (strong word but true) with calls from shooters who had paid their 1977 fees to their Club — however the fees had not been remitted to the National Association prior to the distribution of the April Issue. Additional copies of the magazine had been ordered, and the mailings were made as renewals were received. The point here is that it benefits everyone concerned if Club Secretaries can send fees to the National Office as soon as practicable after they have been received from members.

At the end of March, a full report on 1976 members who had not renewed their registration was posted to every affiliated Club in Australia. This should enable Clubs to increase their income from membership fees at the same time as helping to develop our sport. Increased membership is the only way we can survive

so let's all co-operate in making major progress in 1977.

In April issue of C.T.S.N., reference was made to the courage shown by some Clubs which were called upon recently to discipline members. A Queensland Club has faced a similar problem, and after calling on a member to resign, a request which was refused, had to call an extraordinary general meeting to resolve the matter. Our sport will gather strength if we all pursue improved standards.

Elsewhere in this issue is a brief summary of the results from the 1977 New Zealand Championships. Congratulations to the promoters and organisers — by all reports, the program was a tremendous success and attendances far exceeded expectations. Our congratulations also go to the winners and placegetters in the various events.

Recent issues of the C.T.S.N. have carried poetry. Who would ever have thought of a shooting journal promoting poems? That is exactly what we intend to do though, because there has been a most rewarding response from shooters who are enjoying GHOSTIE'S contributions. Don't stop now, Ghostie!

Paul Gribben's monthly "history lesson" has also been widely commented on and our aim is to provide material that shooters want to read, so keep the suggestions coming.

Whilst on the subject of acknowledgements, we have been discourteous to Val Paral of Queanbeyan/Canberra Gun Club on two recent occasions, and we hope that he will accept our apologies. Val has provided a number of photos illustrating activities in his area — these include the 1976 National Trench Championship, the A.C.T. Paraplegic Association Invitation Day at the Q/C Gun Club and also the Club's "First 100 Targets" program. Val Paral is the Editor of the Club's magazine Trap and Skeet. Thanks for your help and tolerance, Val!

In the past, we have spoken of co-operation amongst shooters — it is pleasing to see this sort of activity also amongst publishers. The editor of Australian Shooters' Journal MR HEINZ RAZ has kindly agreed to allow us to run some of the writings of Australia's top shotgun writer Pat Browne. Pat's first column will appear in June issue.

Just as this column is closing, we have learned that three shooters from Singapore will be attending our National Championships. This is great news and further enhances the international character of the series. Overseas countries to be represented now include New Zealand, New Caledonia, New Guinea and Singapore. "See ya" at the Nationals '77.



TRAPSHOOTING WITH ELGIN GATES



The best description of trapshooting is that it is like a jigsaw puzzle. A lot of small pieces fitted together to make the overall picture. And each one is important.

This column is on light conditions. A small piece of the jigsaw puzzle, but more important than many shooters realize.

You may not have noticed, but on a cloudy day when there is bright sunshine for a few minutes, then shade for a few minutes when a cloud covers the sun, targets will be broken consistently in the periods of bright sunlight. But when a cloud covers the sun, suddenly you will hear the call of "lost" more frequently.

Why? Two reasons: (1) With less light available, the targets

cannot be seen as quickly and easily as they come out of the trap-house, nor during flight, especially against certain types of background. The moment the sun is obscured, target visibility is reduced at least 25%, sometimes more. (2) A shooter may be wearing dark shooting glasses for the bright sun, but in the sudden shade of a cloud, they will be too dark. Furthermore, the iris of the eye will dilate somewhat to bring in more light, and depth of focus will be reduced. (This subject was covered in detail in my last column).

If, for example, black targets are being thrown against a background of trees and the trees suddenly become shaded — as they do many times — their normal green color will be nearly black, even though the shooter himself may be standing in brilliant sunlight. Target visibility will be drastically reduced. The simple point is that what you can't see good, you can't shoot good.

Now, let's discuss sunlight. The best possible position of the sun for maximum visibility is overhead and behind the shooter, putting full light on the targets from the moment they leave the trap. Most trap fields are built so as not to face into the rising or setting sun, therefore the best shooting visibility is usually from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. This will vary somewhat depending on the season of the year and the position of the shooting tracks. When the sun is low, either early or late, and slants in from one side or the other, glare is increased and visibility is reduced.

It is a common practice in America for shooters to use side blinders on their shooting glasses to keep out excessive light and glare from a low sun. I've shot over many fields where the sun comes in from the side in early morning. Targets are side or back lighted. In simple terms, you just can't see them as well. Also, when the sun is low, late in the afternoon, even when directly behind, visibility will be sharply reduced. The trouble is, the shooter may not be aware, even after missing a target or two, just what the trouble is.

I always carry two pairs of shooting glasses, one yellow, the other light green. The green is used for shooting in bright sunlight or when there is a bright background. The yellow is used on dull, cloudy days or when I need to accentuate the contrast between background and targets.

Believe me, in this game of trapshooting — like the jigsaw puzzle — you need all the little pieces in the right place at the right time. It may seem like a lot of fuss over a trivial matter, but really, it's important.



An unusual pair of 19 bores

It became the trend circa 1850 for the wealthier class of shooter to have shotguns made as matched pairs. So perfectly matched in fact that it was customary to number them 1 and 2, usually on the butt-tang and on the top rib of the barrels near the breech. The sportsman could then take the field with his trusty loader-cum-gun-bearer, whose task was to load as fast as necessary, exchanging his master's fired gun for the loaded one, and one can imagine a cross word or two if a fair shot was missed because the loader fumbled with the wads or dropped the caps.

It was George IV, who when Prince of Wales, on the missing of an easy bird, would shout angrily at his loader "Confound it; you put no shot in my gun".

This is about a pair of guns, but with a difference, in that although they are perfectly matched, they are by different makers, in fact made in two different countries, one being made perhaps some years before the other.

Number one gun was made in London in 1838 by John Augustus Manton, the youngest son of the great Joseph Manton who had died three years earlier. Its serial number, 10570, puts it right at the end of the firm's operations. In the same year he sold out to Charles & Henry Egg who afterwards advertised themselves as 'Successors to J. Manton & Son'. Not long afterwards John Augustus Manton sailed for Australia and joined his brother, Frederick Manton, at his estate on the Yass plains of New South Wales. He died in 1852 and was buried in St. James Churchyard Melbourne.

So much for the maker, now about the gun — a double percussion of 19 bore, with Manton's own patent grip safety. Also copied by Purdey in later guns. One other unusual feature is Joe's own design of reinforced barrels which were made with 1/16" stepdown 9 inches from the breech. The inscription on the rib reads: JOSEPH MANTON & SONS PATENT 6 HOLLES ST CAVENTISH SQUARE LONDON; and on the locks: JOSEPH MANTON AND SON PATENTEES. It is of excellent workmanship

and is a delight to handle, being light and perfectly balanced. It bears the original owner's monogram on a neat oblong escutcheon (see photo).

One idea which went out of use within a few years of this gun's manufacture was the use of the pierced platinum vent plugs under the nipples, which were thought necessary by gunmakers of the time to let the burnt powder fouling blow out from the narrow flash hole leading from the base of the nipple to the antechamber. This was later found to be of no advantage. In fact Peter Hawker, the famous English shooter and author commented in his shooting diary, 22nd Sept., 1824: 'I burnt my fingers by once firing in haste with my hand near the gas-hole of my detonator'. W. Greener of Birmingham was one of the first to discard the idea. The device is seldom found in post 1840 guns, although a platinum plug was fitted as a decoration only.

No. 2 gun is as near a copy of the Manton as the maker could possibly manage. A close study of the photo will bear this out. Made in Vienna Austria, by Mathias Nowotny, then one of Europe's top gun makers, it is marked on both locks and rib 'Mathias Nowotny in Wein'. A numeral two is engraved on the tang of the breakoff breech, and also on the rib. The engraving on this gun is a near perfect copy of the engraving on the Manton, the only difference being slightly coarser checkering on the Nowotny stock, and a very pretty pattern of browning on the Nowotny barrels in contrast to the normal pattern of English Stubb twist on the Manton barrels. Whereas the Manton has a typical English monogram, the Nowotny has a plain set of initials on its escutcheon plate (see photo). Both guns are in perfect condition with the Nowotny appearing to have had very little perhaps indicating that the owner found the Manton, or should we say, No. 1 gun the more pleasant of the two to use, and so used it more as a single gun rather than sharing shot for shot with the Nowotny.

The two guns which have the four specifications of top class collectors' pieces, name, age, condition, and rarity, were bought in London by an Australian Collector and eventually found a permanent home at Shepparton.



The editorial staff (?) of the "News" would be interested in hearing members' views on the best means of counter-acting the adverse publicity shooting receives through the media.

JOHN BOLAND

NEWS THIS MORNING OF A TRAGEDY AT WOLLONGONG WHERE TWO SEVEN YEAR OLDS AND A NINE YEAR OLD MET THEIR DEATH BY DROWNING MUST MAKE EACH AND EVERY ONE OF US THINK VERY SERIOUSLY.

THIS TIME OF THE YEAR MOST AUSTRALIANS ARE ON HOLIDAYS AND IT IS FAIR TO SAY THAT RARELY DOES A DAY PASS WITHOUT SOME DEATH BY TRAGEDY OCCURRING WHICH NEVER SHOULD HAVE OCCURRED.

ROAD DEATHS, WE SEEN TO HAVE BECOME IMMUNED TO. THE VAST MAJORITY OF THOSE SHOULD NOT HAPPEN AND WE ALL KNOW THAT, HOWEVER, WHAT ABOUT THE DEATHS BY DROWNING AND ACCIDENTAL SHOOTINGS.

THE WORST TRAGEDIES ARE WHERE CHILDREN LOSE THEIR LIVES BECAUSE OF CARELESSNESS BY PARENTS. PROPERLY AND CAREFULLY SUPERVISED CHILDREN SHOULD NEVER DROWN OR BE ACCIDENTALLY SHOT. THAT IS A FACT OF LIFE AND ALL EXCUSES IN THE WORLD WON'T ALTER THAT FACT.

IT IS DIFFICULT, HOWEVER, TO EXPECT CHILDREN TO BE SAFE WHEN THEIR PARENTS PRACTICE LITTLE CAUTION IN THEIR OWN SWIMMING ACTIVITIES AND HANDLING OF GUNS. THE VAST MAJORITY OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE GUNS FOR GAME SHOOTING SHOULD NEVER BE ALLOWED TO POSSESS THEM OR GO NEAR THEM. THEY INVARIABLY LEAVE THEM AROUND LOADED, PARTICULARLY WHERE CHILDREN ARE PRESENT. THE EXCUSE IS OFTEN THEY MUST BE READY TO SHOOT A RABBIT IF ONE SHOULD APPEAR. THE VAST MAJORITY OF THESE SO CALLED SPORTING SHOOTERS WOULD NOT KNOW A RABBIT FROM A CAT. THEY SHOOT ONCE A YEAR AND VERY BADLY AT THAT AND SHOULD NEVER BE ALLOWED NEAR A GUN, AND IF WHAT I AM SAYING NOW MAKES US ALL THINK ABOUT IT, WE MIGHT JUST CUT DOWN A LITTLE OF THESE UNNECESSARY TRAGEDIES.

Dear Sir,

On behalf of responsible shooters and hunters generally, and particularly for the 8,000 members of the Australian Clay Target Association, I wish to record our disappointment in the content of a commentary put to air by your News Editor, Mr John Boland, at about 7.30 a.m. to-day (Monday).

All clear thinking people will commend Mr Boland on his theme, which was to improve safety in the community. The particular areas he spoke of related to the sports of swimming and shooting, and no one disagrees that there is room for improvement in the safety record of both activities. Equally as true is his statement that adults are generally at fault when accidents involving children occur. If Mr Boland's commentary makes adults stop and consider the consequences of their actions, his effort has been well worthwhile.

However, the part of his commentary which was offensive in our opinion included the generalization that most hunters would not know a rabbit from a kitten and that most shooters have loaded firearms around their being. It is my belief that no responsible firearm owner ever has a loaded firearm at times other than when necessary to enjoy his sport, and whilst it is agreed that game identification is an area of difficulty for less experienced hunters, the comparison drawn by Mr Boland

between kitten and rabbits is unfair and of an inflammatory nature.

Currently, members of various shooting and hunting organizations are co-operating with the State Government through the Ministry for Conservation, in an effort to produce an acceptable plan to expose all young people in the community to education and training in the safe handling of firearms. This indicates that we are as conscious of a need to improve our safety record as Mr Boland is — we see the need as he does, one of community importance. Nevertheless, we will react vigorously if he persists with the policy of damning all shooters and hunters.

The unfortunate part of the situation is that publicly, some damage to our image has already occurred through Mr Boland's commentary. It saddens me to know that the desirable and necessary results of his action in bringing areas of public need to the attention of the community are partially negated by unreasonable and inaccurate statements.


I referred your letter to John Boland who has supplied me with the enclosed transcript of the particular commentary you objected to.






VICTORIAN STATE CARNIVAL

The weekend of the 12th, 13th and 14th March, 1977, saw the biggest congregation of shooters at a match since the 1976 Nationals in Perth. It was the occasion of the 1st Annual Victorian Trap Carnival, held at Melbourne Gun Club's shooting grounds.

The Club Committee and members had worked tremendously hard to prepare the grounds up to Nationals standard. The firearms and Ammunition industry backed the program to the hilt with trophy donations and on-site displays of their range of products. Exhibitors included Michaelis Bayley, Winchester, IMI, Shooter's Discount Store and Geo. Biggs Custom Loads. These displays always create a vast amount of interest and also add a splash of colour and atmosphere to the ground.

Arrangements had been made for caravan and camp sites to be available on the ground and good use was made of this facility. It is an indication of the enthusiasm of the office staff that two thirds of them camped on the ground. Perhaps it was just as well because they worked about 12 to 14 hours on each of three days.

The Carnival was officially opened by the Honourable W. A. Borthwick M.P., Victorian Minister for Conservation. He showed a wonderful knowledge and understanding of shooting subjects during his opening address and made reference to the benefits to be gained by speaking from strength — a direct reference to the need for all shooting organisations to reach a greater level of co-operation. The State President, Bob Buchan, presented Mr Borthwick with a Sterling Silver Tie Tack (depicting a deer's head) and sent flowers to Mrs Borthwick who was unable to attend. Other guests included Miss Cathy De Vrye of the State Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation, Mr "Tup" Pedersen, the ACTA National President, Mr Ern Hawkins National Vice-President, "Pud" Burgess Executive Committee Member, Mr Mal Fuller of Fuller Firearms, Sydney; Messrs Ross Baillee, Brian Mark and Ken Lowry from Winchester; Messrs Ian Cook and Don Hobill from IMI; and Mr George Rath from Michaelis Bayley Trading. (All the trade exhibitors report being satisfied with the interest shown in their displays by shooters. In fact, other Club Executives were seen trying to "con" the trade reps. to install the displays at other Clubs from time to time!)

Now to the competition. A total of 592 competitors contested eleven events over the three days including two events for "women only". Those men who have tried to keep women from "invading" shooting grounds have lost the battle, so give in graciously, fellas! There were over 20 women competitors at the Carnival and that is a great response. However, we must all make sure that the women's competitions are not treated as second-

grade events — the girls can be fearfully aggressive when they believe they have been wronged! Weather conditions on all three days were very fine and mild although other State Associations must have had a word "upstairs" because quite a strong wind on the third day seriously upset the scores of both the Open and the Women's State Trap Teams. (Western Australian Association Executive Members are strongly suspected!)

SATURDAY — Fine and warm. The first event was the "Carnival Double Barrel Championship" (Graded) and the overall winner, Dick Toner had to shoot 106 targets before he shook off Alan Isaacs in A Grade. B Grade was won by a rapidly rising "star" Keith Flentjar who shot 65/65 and C grade was won by J. King (20/20). The 11/13m trophy went to R. McCLELLAND (34/36) and the Ladies' Trophy to Karen Williams.

Then followed the "Blue Riband" event, the State Double Barrel C'ship (Graded). Two great shooters survived to battle out the Overall and A Grade trophy, which finally went to Australia's International shooter Ken Lowry (99/99) who held out Tony Bradshaw (98/99). B Grade was won by one of the most popular B Graders in Victoria, Spiros Stammel (32/32) and C Grade was won by a very promising young shooter from Foster (crayfish territory) Brett Shellcott 30/30. Front Markers' trophy was won by L. Skinner (28/30).

The Women's State Double Barrel Championship developed into a real marathon and made some of the guys most envious. The eventual winner was Karen Williams from Mitcham, shooting the tremendous score of 66/67, with the very consistent Desiree Wakefield from Mildura second, and Jane Grice of Brighton third (31/33).

The final event on day one was the Carnival opening Handicap. Once again, the women kept the guys honest and there was a general feeling spreading around the ground that it was probably a good thing to give the girls their own events — at least this would give the guys a go! The Handicap was won by Peter "Consistency" who shot 42/42 with Desiree Wakefield second. The Ladies Trophy went to Lyn Burgess of Cobar fame (The whole clan was down for the Carnival).

The trophies for the D.B. Championships (both Men's and Women's) were donated by IMI Australia and the presentations were made by State Manager, Don Hobill. It was quite interesting to see Ken Lowry being presented with the IMI Trophy. Don, by the way, was anxiously awaiting the arrival of his second child — his wife Glenys kindly waited until the presentations were over before producing a very healthy new shooter named Christopher.

The Winner's Trophy for the Handicap was a set of four car tyres, donated by Moonee Ponds Tyre Service, operated by the Mollica family. This family put a tremendous amount of support behind our sport.




Some of the large attendance at the presentation of trophies.





SUNDAY — Weather fine and warm — slight breeze.

Another wonderful attendance turned out to contest the State Points Score Championships.

The Men's event was won outright by "Pud" Burgess obviously sharper because of a good night's sleep, who produced the excellent score of 144/144 points. Breathing right down his neck was the good-natured Frankston star, Rollie McMillan who shot 143/144 points. "B" Grade was won by the gentle giant, and one of the nicest guys in shooting, Mal Hastie (95/99 points) and C Grade went to Bill Drew from Mildura (84/90 points.)

The Women's State Pointscore Championship was the first event for the weekend in which no shoot-off was required to determine the result.

First was Desiree Wakefield from Mildura (85/90 points) (who by the way competed in both the open and the women's events) the Sue Lowry second (84/90 points).

At this stage, the Open and Women's State Trap Teams were announced and were made up as follows:

Other events on Sunday included a 20 Target Handicap and the South-Eastern Zone Single Barrel Championship. The Handicap was won by hard working Winchester rep. Wayne Pilkington, with Brenda Dupuy, wife of another Winchester Sales Executive Bob Dupuy, winning the Ladies' Trophy. The S.B. Championship was won by one of the top five single barrel shooters in the State, Dick Toner with a score of 39/39. The second last event on the program was the South Eastern Zone Double Rise Championship. The "little fat fellas" fought out this event with first place going to Harvey Eldridge, second was Jim Blythman and third Neil Berry (it is not known where the description becomes inoperable!!)

The final event was the Carnival grand Handicap, and with a \$7.50 nomination for trophies totalling over \$700, it had to be the BEST VALUE on the program. All the trophies had been donated by Michaelis Bayley Trading and a very strong field of shooters faced the traps. However, the strain of three days of constant shooting was starting to show and as the shooters shuffled from one track to the next, targets became more and more difficult to break. The event reached completion when Harvey Eldridge missed his 49th target to allow relatively new shooter Reg Boyce to take first place. Third was Brian Bockman from Albury (Brian's father Laurie was a dominant force behind the Albury Apex Gun

Club back in the late 50's). Best Lady Trophy went to Brenda Dupuy.

The various High Gun results were as follows:

High Gun in Team Qualifying Events and Team — Trevor Byrne, High Gun in Ladies Team Qualifying Events and Team — Desiree Wakefield, High Gun over program Ken Lowry, Junior High Gun Neil Daymond, Open Team High Gun Trevor Byrne, Ladies Team High Gun Desiree Wakefield.

So ended what must be one of the greatest shooting matches ever conducted in Victoria. At the Presentation of Trophies Lilydale Shire President Mrs Hardy "ably assisted" by her husband who was especially prominent in congratulating the winners of Ladies' Trophies, complimented the State Association on the obvious success of the program.

Some interesting administrative points arose out of the weekend. Firstly ALL shooters were asked for cards, and out of a total entry of nearly 600, only 39 cards were not available.

Of these, 32 were cards still with the shooter's home Club Secretary, 5 shooters had paid their 1977 fee but it had not been remitted to National Office and two shooters were unfinancial but subsequently paid their fees (see reference to this problem in Secretary's Notes page 2). All nominations were handled on a "cash with order" basis and this proved to be a great success. This system will be adopted at the 1977 National Championships to be held in Brisbane in May.

Special reference must be made to the way in which the Firearms Industry (both retail and wholesale) together with Clubs and private shooters supported the program with trophies.

Fear of overlooking one of the numerous donors is the reason the list is not published, but it is surely sufficient to say that, because of the tremendous support from trophy donors, the State Association made a profit of around \$5,000. What a great start for the newly-formed Association!!

In conclusion it must be recorded that the venue contributed in a major way to the success of the shoot. Melbourne Gun Club is one of the few Clubs in Australia which could have coped with the number of targets thrown for the weekend — a total of approximately 50,000.

CONCENTRATION

(By GEO. BIGGS)
Melbourne Gun Club coach.

An ability to break target after target consistently is the hardest thing to attain in shooting competition.

Before one calls for his target, the shooter must have the correct sight picture and the right mental attitude at the time the target appears from the trap house. His feet position must be right for the target he will receive, and for the lane he is shooting from. He must also have a mental picture of exactly how he will point on the target when the trigger is released.

The answer is POSITIVE and ABSOLUTE concentration. We must learn to concentrate on each shot entirely and independently and to shut out ALL other thoughts.

It should be quite unimportant to us what the fellow on the next lane has done or is doing. In fact the less you know of what

your competitors are doing the better. Concentrate on yourself completely. Don't even think of what your score is, or how many more targets there are to shoot! Shot by shot to the end, this is your only thought. Remember, the only thing that can beat you is the little black target that pops out of the trap house. You don't even have to beat the other man. Whatever his success or failure it is his own concern.

Remember, develop your style of concentration and the best shot on earth can not beat you if you keep breaking your target. The only target you have to break is the next one.

THE BRIEF HISTORY OF A SUCCESSFUL CLUB


The Taree-Wingham Gun Club was formed in September, 1969 with nine members. It inherited from the old Taree Gun Club (which had been in recess for some time) the grand sum of \$34, the use of grounds that had a one trap lay-out with a snipe trap. Facilities on the grounds consisted of an old dairy cream shed which was used as an office and beautiful camphal laurel trees for shade. The first Open Shoot the new club held was in January 1970 with 36 shooters in attendance. The following year the club held a two-day shoot on the same week-end and in the meantime the members had built a club house. This club house, which is now used as an office and kitchen was built by the members themselves. They had the loan of a saw bench in the forest and cut the timber themselves, and a local timber mill donated a sling of flooring. (Just after the completion of this building a bush fire went through the property and club members held their breath as they went out to investigate the damage and found that their club house, built of green timber had survived without even a scorch mark — the fire had swept under the building and out the other side and continued on its way!

Immediately after the first two day shoot in January, 1971, the Club found it necessary to move to new grounds and after looking at several sites finally settled on the grounds where it is situated today on a portion of the grounds included in the recreation reserve dedicated to the Wingham Race Course. A lease was taken out with the trustees of the race course and the big move began. (Since taking out the original lease, the race course has since relinquished its trust to the Wingham Council and the land is now a recreation reserve — subject to Minister's Consent and the Club has almost completed negotiations for a new lease with the local Council with Minister's Consent).

The Club planned a two trap lay-out which was possible without having to go into great expense with earth works. The bricks for the two trap houses were purchased from the Lands Department and came out of a disused school, they are sand stock bricks and club members had to pull the chimney down and clean the bricks before they could be used. The Club House from the old grounds was moved in two parts and re-erected on the new grounds and the first shoot was held on the new site on Anzac Day, 1971 over an electric trap that had been built by Ron Sky and club members.

The official opening of the new grounds was held in September that year over a two trap lay-out. The main Club House took 12 months of hard voluntary work to complete — such work included demolishing an old house belonging to an estate, removing all usable timber and iron to the Club grounds, cleaning up after the demolition; demolishing and shifting an old school room given to them by a local Church and more sawmilling in the forest. This 12 months hard labour was made up of three voluntary working bees a week by club members.

While all this work was going on the Club steadily gathered a few assets and a few more members. Lights were erected and the first night shoot was held in April 1973. The Tower was constructed at no cost to the Club and erected by club member Mr Alan Carlyle and the first Tower Championships were shot in June, 1974. The Skeet Houses and lay-out, as with all the other buildings were donated material and voluntary labour by the

members and the first Skeet Shoot was held on 10th August, 1974. By this time the Club had put in septic toilets and a hot water system and water storage was no longer a problem when in 1975 the town water supply was extended to include the Gun Club.


During the later part of 1975 the Club had started earth works to instal two more down-the-line lay-outs and then decided to continue the earthworks and instal a 15 trap Olympic trench lay-out. Once again a great deal of work was in store for the members.

With the trench, there was a great deal more planning and surveying involved prior to earth works. A bulldozer was hired to dig the hole for the trench; being on a rise the trench was able to be drained, but at great expense and the problems involved were far more intricate than the actual digging of the trench. A reinforced concrete floor was poured and owing to the nature of the soil, being mostly rock, the club had no structural problems regarding reinforcement of the front and rear walls, the members were able to lay concrete blocks free standing and to cut down the cost and hydro-static pressure, they filled behind these walls with cinders — the entire walls were left with weep holes to drain off all excess water.

The roof is held up on steel supports with a timber ceiling and bituman coating and water proofing. The traps are supported on brick piers with poured concrete slab on top in banks of five attached to the front wall (this has proved very successful from a stability point of view for the machines and standard targets can be thrown very successfully). After fair discussions regarding various trap types it was decided by the members that they would contact Rossini of Italy and subsequently purchased the machines direct. With the exception of the earth works, the entire trench project was constructed and installed by voluntary labour of the Club members. The Club has run two three day open trench shoots, the numbers attending has increased and the scores improved and speaks well of the future of Olympic Trench.

At the present time the Club facilities consist of a four trap down-the-line lay-out; one skeet field with a second skeet field in progress, tower shooting facilities; Olympic Trench lay-out, adequate club rooms, septic toilets, hot showers and full camping facilities. Apart from the Olympic Trench, the major cost of the Club, which is the purchasing of electric traps, has been avoided, as all down-the-line, skeet and tower traps were made by Ron Sky with the help of club members.







NATIONALS — 1977

A warm welcome is extended to all visitors and competitors at our National Championships 1977. The host Club, Brisbane, is in "go" condition for what will be the biggest shooting competition ever conducted in Australia.

In addition, the area is renowned for its tourist facilities and the combination of these two factors presents a wonderful opportunity to make it a "fun fortnight" for the whole family.

To show the A.C.T.A.'s attitude towards the importance of the Nationals, we have introduced a "Souvenir" issue of CTSN (Clay Target Shooting News) to celebrate. The format of the magazine has been designed to allow you to tear out this program and supplement section if you wish without upsetting the continuity of the rest of the book. This supplement includes some suggestions on how the rest of the family can fill in their days while Dad is shooting, together with a few ideas on where to "dine-out". The Queensland Government Tourist Bureau has been most co-operative and if further assistance is required whilst you are in Brisbane, the Bureau can be found on the corner of Adelaide and Edward Streets in Brisbane. Alternatively, the A.C.T.A. will be maintaining an Information Centre on the shooting ground (to be situated in the Club House) and an enquiry there should get some response.

Talking of the A.C.T.A. Information Centre, it is to be hoped that full use is made of this facility. If any visitors or competitors have a question, a suggestion or a **constructive criticism** please come and talk about it. Hopefully, this will lead to improved understanding at many levels.

The Annual Meeting is to be held at the Club on Friday 27th May, commencing at 7.00 p.m. This meeting will be preceded by an Extraordinary General Meeting which will be convened to consider acceptance of the 1975 Financial Report.

At the completion of the shooting program, the Brisbane Gun Club has organised a Maori "Hangi" which is a form of traditional feast — it is recommended that you fast for at least twenty-four hours beforehand. 3. To maintain equality of competition, specially branded cartridges have been manufactured by both Winchester and IMI and these are the **only** cartridges which may be used in the National events, with the exception of the Grand Australian Handicap. All packets will be sealed and once sold by the organisers no returns or exchanges will be considered.

STATE TEAM SHOTS

For many years it has been the practice of this company to supply cartridges to members of State Teams shooting in the official team representing this particular state.

We have given this particular subject a lot of thought, and have decided for various reasons to discontinue this practice.

It is well known that the majority of shooters qualify for State Teams using their own reloads. When the actual shoot takes place they are then forced to change to factory loads of a brand of their choice.

We have noted that this causes some embarrassment to some shooters in that they have to publicly declare their allegiance to a particular manufacturer.

Our main purpose in discontinuing the donation of free cartridges is to avoid this embarrassment, and at the same time give the shooter the chance to use cartridges of his own choice, without making a public affirmation of where his choice lies.

Over the last three or four months my company has become increasingly concerned about our inability to supply the market for clay targets.

It may not be appreciated by clay target shooters that the market has increased tremendously in the past year. The situation has been worsened by the fact that a supplier in New South Wales suddenly went out of business late in 1976 and, frankly, we are currently unable to cope.

Machinery to make clay targets is not manufactured in Australia, and it takes time to organise purchase of machinery from overseas, so the situation will not be corrected overnight.

In addition, we are currently stock piling targets for use at the ACTA National Championships at the end of May, which once again reduces the number available for club use in the immediate future.

We can only assure club executives that we are doing our best to allocate supplies as fairly as possible.





