

### TRAPSHOOTING ... with Elgin Gates



In America, down-the-line trap shooting consists primarily of three events. Single Barrel, Handicap and Double Rise. American single barrel shooting consists of one shot at each target from the mandatory distance of 16 yards for all competitors. The event is called class shooting or, more commonly, singles

Classes have been established which are based on the shooter's average of breaks as follows:

96.5% and over	= Class AA
94% and under 96.5%	= Class A
91% and under 94%	= Class B
88% and under 91%	= Class C
under 88%	= Class D

The usual event consists of 100 targets shot over four traps, 25 targets per trap, five targets from each position on the tracks before moving, five shooters per squad. At some of the smaller clubs having only two traps, all the squads will shoot 50 targets, 25 on each trap until the entire field has finished the first 50, then' they will start over again to shoot the second 50 in the same manner

Some effort is made to squad shooters of the same classification together although this is not mandatory. You might see a squad posted with, say, two AA shooters, two A shooters and a B shooter on it. Usually, however, the shooters themselves get together to make up squads and nominate accordingly.

There will usually be a championship trophy for the highest score posted in the event, regardless of class, and sometimes a runner-up trophy. Then there will be a first place trophy for each class. At the State and Zone shoots, second and third place trophies may be awarded in each class. But always, there is a provision in the program so that any competitor is eligible for only ONE trophy in a particular event. Thus, if a class A shooter happens to shoot the high score - which occasionally happens - he takes the championship trophy, but cannot also take the class A trophy, which will go to the second high score in class A. When sweepstakes are involved, each class shoots for its own money

For all practical purposes, the traphouses, size and shape of targets, distances thrown, shooting tracks, etc., are nearly the same as in Australia with two exceptions: No one shoots closer than 16 yards in any event, and the American targets are thrown at lesser angles, approximately 22 degrees to right and left of

centre as compared to the 30 to 45 degree targets that can be thrown in New Zealand

Handicap shooting, by a small margin, is the most popular event in America. This is also a single barrel event, i.e. one shot at each target. The minimum handicap mark is 18 yards, and only juniors, novices, physically handicapped shooters on crutches and in wheelchairs, and women are allowed to shoot at this mark. The maximum handicap mark is 27 yards. But with the phenomenal scores now being posted in America fron. 27 yards. serious consideration is being given to establish a 30-yard maxium handicap, or possibly to throw the targets a greater distance, say, 60 yards instead of the present 50 yards in order to equalize handicap shooting, or even to throw wider angles.

Handicap trophies and prizes are much more valuable than in class shooting, and sometimes trophies are awarded to winners of yardage groups, say. 18 to 21 yards, 22 to 25 yards and 25 to 27 yards

The third event is the double-rise, simply called "Doubles" in America. These are also shot at 16 yards by classes, and are virtually identically to Australian double-rise targets.

A typical weekend shoot will consist of 100 singles, 100 handicap and 100 doubles (fifty pairs). At some of the larger shoots, the National Championships, for example, the ratio is about two to one singles and handicap against doubles. The Nationals program over a week consists of a total of 400 singles shot as two different 200-target events, 400 Handicap as four separate events and 200 doubles as two separate events.

Shoot-offs in all events are by rounds of 25 targets instead of miss and out. Thus it is possible for a shooter to miss his first or second shoot-off target out of the trap and still be the eventual winner if his competitor misses one more during the round of 25

In addition to the regular trap shooting as listed here, which is administered and sanctioned by ATA (Amateur Trapshooting Association) there also is held at the Nationals, two double-barrel events: The Preliminary International Clay Pigeon tournament and the ATA International Clay Pigeon Championship of America. These targets, which most Australian shooters are familiar with, are thrown from Winchester Continental machines a distance of about 65 yards, 45 degree angles left and right, and either high or low, much in the manner of Olympic targets. Shooters are allowed two shots to break the target, kills only to count, and all shooters fire from the 17 yard mark.

These events are an attempt by ATA to get American shooters interested in true International or Olympic type shooting so that we may develop shooters who can successfully compete at the major world tournaments. That this has been somewhat successful was the performance of the American team at Munich in 1975 in winning the team gold medal and setting a new team record.

It is hoped that this brief explanation of American trap shooting will be of interest to overseas shooters.

#### SECRETARY'S NOTES

Since last writing this column, life has been quite hectic. Maybe some of the "outside" activities of the Association will hold some interest for our readers.

Firstly, in company with Victorian Association officials, a visit was made to the Victorian Chief Secretary, the Honourable Vance Dickie. The purpose of the call was to determine the accuracy (or otherwise) of recent press reports which predict much tougher firearms controls. Mr Dickie impressed with his frankness, and apart from agreeing that the area of penalties needs to be looked at as a matter of urgency, (and this is already being done) responsible fire-arms users should have nothing to be too concerned about. It is the A.C.T.A. Secretary's belief that similar

approaches to top legislators in other States will do our cause no harm.

Next, in company with an Executive of the Australian Shooting Association, we put a submission before the Industries Assistance Commission Inquiry into tariff levels on sporting goods. Naturally, the A.C.T.A's interest centred around clay targets, and we argued that the present 41% tariff level (plus 3% primage) was likely to afford too much "protection" to any inefficient local manufacturer. Any results will be reported in a future issue.

Then came an appearance before the Victorian Town Planning Appeals Tribunal to assist in a situation where an application to build a Gun Club directly beneath one of the major flight paths of Melbourne Airport had been refused on the basis of noise. The fact that the site is also adjacent to a proposed quarry is purely incidental. As this matter is still to be resolved, no further discussion is yet possible.

#### STATE ASSOCIATION REPORTS

VICTORIA — Victoria and the National Executive have suffered a set-back in the sense that experienced David Grummett, who had been appointed to fill the vacancy on the National Executive caused by Harry Williamson's resignation, has found that due to changed circumstances, he cannot afford the time to do the job he believes is necessary, and therefore he too has resigned. The South West Zone are arranging a Special General Meeting to enable a further recommendation to be made to the State Council.

The Victorian Skeet Carnival will be held in October (at Wangaratta) and Zone team selections are under way. The South East Zone eliminations will start at Melbourne Gun Club on Sunday, August 28th, when a 100 target Skeet program will be conducted. Further eliminations will be held at Metropolitan Clay Target Club and Australian Gun Club on dates to be advised. The three day Carnival should be the biggest skeet program ever held in Australia.

TASMANIA — The Apple Isle is in the process of Zoning itself and this must lead to more effective communications, especially at Club levels. Greater co-ordination of shooting programs and promotional activities is usually another benefit to be gained.

Meanwhile, the shooting sports are developing closer ties because of mumbles about impending legislation. Presently, the position is under control.

QUEENSLAND — It may be considered improper to include this paragraph under the heading "State Associations" but it seems certain that such a development will occur in the foreseeable future. One of the biggest obstacles to be overcome will be the wide geographic distribution of Clubs, but good communications can always overcome distance problems.

The amount of interest already shown by Clubs, especially during the Nationals, has been most encouraging. Also, the enthusiasm shown by National Vice-President Ron Porter is indicative of a sure-fire success.

NEW SOUTH WALES — Since the election of Ern Hawkins to National President, it seems certain that a contest for the position of Chief Executive of the N.S.W. Clay Target Association will occur. The Annual Meeting will take place at Guyra, during the State Carnival to be conducted over the holiday weekend in early October.

The N.S.W. Clay Target Association, together with the National Executive have been grappling with a problem involving two shooters who were in breach of safety rules in some horseplay at Narrabri Gun Club late last year. The two shooters had their Registration suspended until they showed cause why they should be reinstated.

The two shooters concerned met with the N.S.W. members of the National Executive at Brisbane in late May, who made the following decision. 'That the suspension of (the two shooter's names) was lifted as from this meeting with a warning that if their names ever appear again on a similar charge, their suspension would be more severe, with a possible life suspension.'

(Let's be safety conscious at all times! Ed. Note.)

Now the sequel to the brief mention last month to the alleged misappropriation of Gun Club (or A.C.T.A.) funds. In a court action taking part of two days, the defendant was found guilty of misappropriating \$80, representing eight adult registration fees. A jail sentence was imposed but suspended on the condition that the person concerned enter a good behaviour bond. He was also ordered to make complete restitution to the Gun Club (who had replaced the missing money to the A.C.T.A.) and pay all witnesses expenses, totalling around \$400. Spare a moment's thought on the comparison between this penalty, which will certainly act as a deterrent to others, and some of the laughable sentences being handed out to people convicted of offences involving the misuse of firearms.

By the way, whilst in Canberra for the I.A.C. hearing, the opportunity was taken to call on the Ministry for Environment, Housing and Community Development which is the Federal body responsible for Sport. The purpose of the visit was to try to get financial support for the Trap and Skeet team which will represent Australia in the 1977 World Moving Target Championships to be held at Antibes, France. We were made very welcome but no money! In the present financial climate, it seems very doubtful that sport can expect any real support from Federal sources in the foreseeable future. Perhaps we should

become a little more militant or vocal on this topic!

Mr Ern Hawkins, our National President has widely distributed a policy statement which is repeated elsewhere in this journal. The reaction to the statement, especially from State Premiers, has been most encouraging. It is great to see our Sport being better recognised in these areas.

In conclusion, let me draw your attention to a report in this issue which gives details of decisions made at the series of Executive Committee Meetings which were held during the Brisbane Nationals. You are especially asked to carefully read those matters relating to rules changes including rules affecting handicap values and inward movement.

### What Happens When You "Let Them Alone"?

#### - A QUESTION OF CONSERVATION

"'Let them alone. Let Nature take its course.' That," claims Dick Dietz of the Remington News Letter, "is the cry concerning wildlife frequently levelled these days by various groups at state

and federal wildlife agencies.

The statement is made sometimes by anti-hunters who think hunting should be banned as an anachronistic practice no longer appropriate in modern society. Current anti-hunting action in this country is somewhat complex, ranging from simple ignorance of wildlife and environmental factors affecting it, to a seemingly deliberate disregard of the facts by specific groups whose sole thrust is against hunting with no additional supportive action that could be construed as 'pro-wildlife.

'Similar statements are made at other times by pure preservationists in objection to wildlife management and conservation programs as interference with the 'natural order of things.' Preservationists would like to 'stop the clock' and keep both wildlife and wild habitat exactly as it is now. Nature, however, doesn't work that way. Game populations do not stay the same when left alone, any more than do forests or other environmental communities. If the basic premise of preservationists were feasible or possible, Tyrannosaurus Rex might still be roaming

Logic alone should favor the opinions of professionally trained biologists with years of first-hand practical experience over those of untrained, inexperienced, self-proclaimed 'ex-

"What are the facts? Do they support the stand of the professionals? What happens when man, indeed, attempts to 'let

them alone'?

'Back in 1906, the Kaibab Plateau area of Arizona was turned into the Grand Canyon Game Preserve by presidential edict. One of the objectives was to protect and preserve the area's magnificent, healthy and stable herd of about 3,000 mule deer. Some 10% of the herd was removed each year by a combination of predators and hunting by Indians. With the creation of the game preserve, all hunting was banned and most of the predators were systematically removed.

'The result was a classic, ecological disaster. The herd multiplied again and again until, in the 1920's, estimates had it as high as 100,000 deer. The overpopulation ate the previously lush plateau bare. Disease, malnutrition, starvation and death occurred among tens of thousands of animals. The only solution was to open the area totally to hunting, to trim down the herd drastically and give the range a chance to recover so that a proper balance between deer and food supply could be restored.

"Similar overpopulation disasters have occurred elsewhere. Typical was Pennsylvania in the early 1920's when a half million

deer died in a single winter.

"An extremely serious ecological problem that still exists today occurred in Australia when the European rabbit was introduced without the presence of indigenous, controlling predators. In New Zealand, deer, without sufficient natural predation and with too low a human population to provide effective hunting harvest, became a national pest requiring the government to offer bounties to reduce their numbers.

'In the United States, the passage of the Wild Free-Roaming Horse and Burro Act of 1971 has caused an overpopulation of wild horses that is rapidly ruining western ranges not only for the feral horses, but for wildlife and grazing livestock as well. It is a growing problem that can be solved only by some means of effectively controlling the wild horse numbers.

"The buffalo, or American bison, once near extinction, has multiplied under protection on some federal lands to the point that there are now too many of them for the land to support

"In New Jersey's famous Great Swamp controversy, starvation, disease and slow death of deer became rampant while antihunting groups fought to delay controlled hunting needed to reduce the size of the overpopulated herd. Anti-hunters proposed letting the deer 'go somewhere else.' The problem today, in situations such as the Great Swamp, is that there is no 'somewhere else.'

"In another typical case, Australia's winsome little koala bears were totally protected by law in 1927 when commercial slaughter for their fur threatened them with extinction. Half a century later, the cute koalas have so multiplied that they are spilling out of the special, protective preserves and invading the suburbs in numbers sufficient to create traffic hazards.

The lesson seems clear, as does the advice of the wildlife professionals. Any given area can support just so much wildlife. As populations expand without control, there is no longer additional 'empty space' into which they can move.

"There are only two alternatives for some species of wildlife. Their numbers must either be controlled sensibly or they will ultimately starve, suffer severe die-offs and, in the process, seriously reduce the capacity of their habitat to support even normal populations for many future years.

"In this light, the sensible, humane answer would seem to be Leave the solutions to the professionals who know what they are doing.' We fail to see that those who say 'Let them alone' are acting humanely when what they are really saying is 'Let them

ter "rag" yet!



### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Soon after his appointment as National President, Mr Ern Hawkins produced the following personal statement, which has received: wide distribution. It is certainly worthy of being repeated in C.T.S.N. It reads as follows:-

"Statements are being made almost daily, over the whole nation, on the current prominent subject of firearms control, varying in the extreme from those who say that nothing needs to be done to those who say that guns should be totally banned.

Opinions are being passed, based on emotionalism due to recent tragic shooting incidents; based on the motive of 'lets do something to satisfy the public outcry' which is really only vote catching; and based on no knowledge of the overall situation at

What all of the opinions appear to overlook is - how effective would their suggestions be if implemented.

The gun itself is blamed for the tragedies and crimes that occur through its misuse, yet is it any different from the motor vehicles part in our staggering road toll?

Neither the gun or the motor car cause any problems without the involvement of human beings and this is the area at which we should direct our efforts.

A licensed firearm is just as deadly as an unlicensed one and nothing will be gained by registering every gun and rifle.

There is proof of this with existing laws concerning pistol ownership. Each pistol is individually licensed and it is extremely difficult to obtain the authority to own one and yet they are readily available on the black-market to anyone with the rifle money

I started shooting in the field over forty years ago because I enjoyed the outdoor life and at that time it provided food for the table. Some twenty years later I became involved in club competition shooting and at the present time this is my predominant activity.

Over recent years I have become involved deeply in shooting administration and have worked to some extent with police and government officials during the preparation of shooting range

and explosives licensing regulations.

I have just been elected as President of the Australian Clay Target Association, which consists of some 300 clubs with close to 8000 registered shooters throughout the Nation and I have stated my background because I believe my experiences over forty years with guns gives me the right to make these personal comments on the occasion of my appointment.

Incidents and crimes in which guns are involved fall mainly in-

to three categories.

Firstly we have the so-called "accidents" around the home and in the field, where children find a loaded firearm in a cupboard; where youngsters playing with "empty" guns shoot one of their playmates; their firing at unknown targets in the field results in a fellow hunter being the victim.

I do not believe these are accidents, they are nothing less than tragic human negligence and would not occur if simple basic

safety practices were complied with.

Secondly we have 'spur of the moment' incidents where so-meone, triggered off by hot headedness, by halucination, or even by dare, can obtain a firearm licence, buy a gun, commit a tragedy whilst in an agitated state of mind.

And thirdly there is the planned use of firearms by criminals and there is no way known anywhere in the world that they can be prevented from obtaining guns.

To provide some effective control on the misuse of firearms

may I offer the following suggestions:

No person should be allowed to apply for a shooters licence until such time as he can produce a certificate stating that he has received acceptable training in the safe handling of firearms and that he fully understands their potential. Gun Clubs throughout Australia demand absolute safety procedures from their members as a condition of membership and their record speaks for itself.

The majority of clubs conduct Firearms Safe Handling demonstrations for schools and for the general public and I am quite confident that club managements would undertake the task of educating individuals and issuing certificates up to the standard demanded of their own members.

I do not believe anyone should be able to walk into a licensing authority, pay a fee and walk out with a licence to buy a

There should be a delaying period of at least seven days from when a licence is personally applied for to when it is issued by mail.

This would provide a cooling off period, it would be some confirmation of the address of the applicant and it would allow time for some background checking before the licence is issued.

(3) For the criminal use of firearms I believe we already have an adequate deterrent but it is not being used.

Too frequently those convicted of crimes using firearms are given absolute minimum sentences or fined a few dollars

Which means nothing to people of this type.
WE HAVE ADEQUATE PENALTIES ALREADY EXISTING AND MAGISTRATES & JUDGES MUST BE ENCOURAGED TO ACCEPT THEIR RESPONSIBILITY TO SOCIETY BY AP-PLYING MAXIMUM PENALTIES FOR CRIMES USING GUNS, IRRESPECTIVE OF THEIR BEING TOYS OR REAL GUNS, AND IT SHOULD BE MADE KNOWN THAT THESE MAXIMUM SENTENCES BE MANDATORY.

If the above points were fully carried out we would do more to reduce shooting "accidents" and we would do more to reduce the criminal use of firearms than any new legislation restricting ownership.

I am one of many hundreds of thousands of honest firearms users who, obtain enjoyment from shooting at legal game or inanimate targets and I ask that my views be considered before an additional bureaucracy is set up that can only end up as revenuecollecting agencies from honest citizens with no practical effect on the misuse of firearms.'

### **Executive Committee Report**

The following items should be of interest to all our registered shooters. They relate to matters discussed by your National Executive Committee during the series of meetings held during the Brisbane Nationals.

Because of space limitations, the report will be brief and to the point.

#### **RULE CHANGES**

As a result of a series of resolutions, the way was cleared to enable revision of certain rules - it should be clearly understood that the embargo on rules relating to shooting ground decisions still applies. However, the major changes relate to handicapping.

1. Inward Movement

It is now possible to gain inward movement on handicap marks - it is the shooters responsibility to record his handicap performances on his Registration Card. If he can demonstrate that he has shot at 250 handicap targets without penalty then on application to A.C.T.A. office, through his club, his mark will be reduced by one metre, provided that no such provision applies to shooters on 12 metres.

Rule 153 will be revised accordingly. 2. Trap Handicapping Formula.

All values applying to the Handicapping Formula will be doubles, effective from 1st August '77.

For example, a 22 metre shooter will need to win a trophy (or cash) valued at \$44 or more to incur a metre penalty. A two metre penalty will apply to wins totalling in excess of \$200 in any one event.

Rule 149(a), 155(b) will be revised accordingly.

Nominations for District, State & Commonwealth Cham-

New maximum levels have been fixed — these are as follows:

TRAP — State Teams Elimination Events \$9. Commonwealth Titles — 200 Target I.S.U. \$34.00. Commonwealth Titles other types \$9.00. State Titles - 100 Target I.S.U. \$17.00. State Titles — All other types \$8.00. District Titles — 50 Target I.S.U. \$8.50. District Titles — All other types (20 or 25 targets) \$6.00, (30 targets) \$7.00.

Maximum retail value of trophies for Commonwealth and State Championships are now set at \$60 and \$50 respectively.

SKEET — State Team's Elimination \$10.00. Commonwealth Titles — I.S.U. 200 Targets \$34.00. Commonwealth Titles — All other types \$10.00. State Titles - I.S.U. 100 Targets \$17.00. State Titles — Other Types, 25 Targets \$7.00, 50 Targets \$10.00. District Titles — I.S.U. 50 Target \$8.50. District Titles — Other Types, 25 Targets \$6.00, 50 Targets \$8.00. Trap Rules 126(e), 148(c) and Skeet Rules 148(a), 101(a) and 105(g) will be revised accordingly.

Skeet Rule 105(f) will be revised to read: "The Club conducting the elimination match shall provide compulsory division prize money of \$150 or 40% of the total nomination, whichever is the greater. Where there are no tied scores, the distribution will be 60% for 1st, 30% for 2nd and 10% for third."

Use of Reloaded Cartridges in Interstate Teams' Matches:

The use of reloaded cartridges in Interstate Teams' Matches is now authorised and the necessary changes will be made to Trap rule 147 and Skeet rule 99.

**ADMINISTRATIVE** 

The next Executive Committee Meeting is to be held in Sydney commencing 17th September.

A.C.T.A. delegates to Australian Shooting Association are Messrs A. M. Burgess and N. Southey.



(Comments from IMI's round man, Ian Hale)

Points noted at Nationals . .

- 1. Firstly it is obvious that the ground size as to quantity of trap-lay-outs appears to be the minimum required. Although the Nationals ran like clockwork and most events finished inside the scheduled daylight, it was the degree of difficulty of the targets which contributed to low scores and shoot-offs to minimum times. e.g. S.B. A.N.Z. points D.B. H'Cap etc.
- 2. As my good wife says about me, "Getting bigger better."
- The Trade Displays creating an almost Carnival atmosphere.
   Reminded me of a Country Show, only thing missing was Jimmy Sharmans Boxing Tent.
- 4. Great to see the old master Newton up there chewing the fat with all his old mates.
- 5. Geoff Mark and Bob Schwarz left Brisbane at 5 a.m. Thursday and arrived in Ballarat at 1 a.m. Friday (pulling a trailer as well). Must have had a Police Escort; marvellous what 10 days away from your wife will do.

6. My observance at overseas Gun Clubs:

(a) At Live pigeon Shoots there are three Referees sitting in a room overlooking the shooting arena. After each shot they confer and then make a decision. If the decision is LOST then a bell is rung and there is no right of recall by the shooter. No disputes, protests, etc., are entered into.

(b) My experience at the Nationals is that on two occasions the scores as entered by me were disputed by shooters. The tragic part is that either or both could have been right and frankly if the shooter/s question the score then usually they are subject to unfair criticism and rumors that not only tend to circulate but as all rumors do they are usually enlarged.

(c) Now the simple solution is the system of three independent scorer 1 2 3 shooter from the first round and 4 5 6 shooters from 2nd round, then either all of the 3 scorers match, or 2 out of 3 at least match and those are taken as correct. One of the ones that are agreed to be correct are signed and the other two destroyed immediately. To substantiate my statement it is amazing how often only 2 of the 3 scores do match. Worth a thought?

## HOW THE SNIDER RIFLE CAME ABOUT

The Prussian Needlegun had in the Dano-German war of 1848, proved to most military leaders, that the day of the percussion rifle was near its end as a war weapon.

The Americans had moved in the development of the capping breech loader rifle through the Sharp's rifle which the British troops had used earlier, but owing to gas escape at the breech, proved to be unpopular.

Slow to move from their proven reliable Enfield Tower rifle of which they had 1000's, it was 1864 before the English authorities widely advertised for a gunsmith to submit designs to convert the Enfield rifle into breech loaders.

Nearly fifty rifle designs were submitted, most of which were eliminated, and withdrawn before testing.

Five were to undergo extensive tests.

Four used the percussion cap to ignite the charge, and one only used a self-contained centre fire cartridge, which had a

case made of paper pulp material.

This last one, a true breech loader, being the Snider, had a breech block containing firing pin, extractor, and locking mechanism had merely to be placed in the prepared breech by sutting away 2 inches of the top side of the Enfield barrel, and providing a hinge for the block on the right side. All true Snider Actions can be recognised by the brand, an entwined snake around an arrow, stamped on the top of the action. The adoption of the design was accepted in 1865 by a select committee. It was the brain child of Jacob Snider a Dutch American inventor from Philadelphia.

The cartridges which Snider used in the original trials were most unsatisfactory, owing to cases swelling in moist conditions and subsequent even separation.

and subsequent case separation.

In 1866 Colonel Ed. Boxer of the Royal Laboratory invented and improvement and conversion of the Enfield Tower rifle began.

The Snider proved a simple accurate and sturdy weapon, and it filled the stop gap requirements at only 12 shillings each, in-

cluding conversion.

Various models began to find their way into the Colonies, mainly for military and naval purposes soon after the conversions were made, and most military collections have one or more of the first British breech loading rifle.

The finest of the Military Sniders came out in the Mark III. a new made weapon, with its steel barrel, spring operated locking latch on the breech block and 3 banded fore end (each screw locked).

Several gun makers in England produced the Snider action fitted to big bore shot guns, and they provided the punt gunners of the English fens and marshes with a most useful duck gun.

I have heard of, but not yet witnessed, the mighty 4 bore Snider rifle from India, supposedly for elephant shooting. When one handles the giant cartridge with its 412 inch case, estimated load of 10 drams of black powder and 1400 grain bullet, one is prompted to wonder what manner of man would shoulder such a gun, but no doubt, they had some form of mounting to take the fearful shock of the discharge.

Getting back to some of the more acceptable calibres, we find the Snider rifles in Rook & Rabbit cartridge of various calibres, such as .250, .300, .360 etc., moving up to .577 reminds me of one I have seen, made by I. Hollis & Sons, London, As a sporting rifle nicely engraved in English style, each screw receiving special attention. Its stock is checkered neatly at wrist and fore end, its 24 inch barrel is mint new. The action is of the Albini-Braendlin Belgium patent, the bolt of which under microscopic examination looks as if it has never been fired the carbine no doubt made for a sportsman of the 1860 era and never used.

#### **Australian Clay Target Association** ANNUAL REPORT — 1976

1976 was probably the most traumatic year in the Association's history. It seemed that a number of problems combined to affect a disaster - and very nearly succeeded. In fact, had it not been for an understanding A.N.Z. Bank Manager, together with patient creditors, the Association would have had great difficulty in "staying afloat". Acknowledgement is also made of Club's cooperation in collecting 1977 registration fees a little earlier than usual.

To alleviate any further worrying, 1977 prospects look much brighter, in the sense that a small operating surplus is almost certain.

The year included a number of highs and lows, other than the financial side. Firstly some facts and figures:

NO. OF REGISTERED SHOOTERS

Adults 7251; Second Family Members 258; Juniors 737; Life Members 81; CTSN Subscribers 3 — Total 8330.

The Company had Cash Receipts of \$152, 764 and Payments of \$155,187. (Remember that in accounting terms, there is a difference between Receipts and Payments, and Income and Expenditure. Income and Expenditure figures represent transactions applicable only to 1976).

There were 264 Clubs affiliated in 1976. Other items of major interest included:

February/March saw the 1976 National Championships at Perth Clay Target Club — this program produced the best financial result of any National series yet held — the Western Australian Clay Target Association is to be commended for its efforts.

National Skeet - Ken Lowry, Victoria. National Double Rise - Alf James, Victoria. National Double Barrel - Barry Kable, NSW. National Single Barrel - Vin Ryan, Victoria. Aust-New Zealand Trap - Bob Smith, NSW. Champion of Champions - Harry Somers, NSW. International Team High Gun - Daryl Wiese, WA. Winner of Grand Australian Handicap

Bill Wickham, Victoria. (b) The A.C.T.A. Annual General Meeting re-elected "Tup"

Pedersen for a further term as President. New faces to appear on the National Executive Committee were Arthur Kenna (Townsville), Keith Sim (Griffith), and Len Toyne (Launceston).

Following the elimination to select a trap and skeet team for the Montreal Olympics, the following shooters were selected — Peter Wray (Vic.), John Porter (Q'ld), John Summers (Vic), and Mark Little (Vic). Of these the Australian Olympic Federation finally chose only Peter Wray to represent Australia at Montreal.

A group of over 80 Australians made their presence felt in New Zealand, where the Aussies won four major National Championships. The successful competitors were Maurie Quirk, Jack Henwood, Richard Aquilina and Jim Ellis.

Australia was named as the winner of the 1976 Mackintosh Trophy for International Teams — their score was 7358/7500 points. This gave Australia its fourth win in the past six years.

August saw the resignation, due to ill health of the National Secretary, Mervyn Berry. Mr Berry had held the position for

11 years.

November saw Executive Committee Member "Pud" Burgess win the 1976 National Trench Championship, so capably run by A.C.T. International Gun Club in Canberra.

All sorts of team shooting achieved new levels of participation in 1976, and the Interstate Matches were no exception. The results were as follows:

State Associations continued to develop during 1976. The most obvious achievement was that of the West Australian Association, which promoted such a successful National Championships, However, the N.S.W. Clay Target Association has grown in stature and is gaining strength each year. During 1976, the N.S.W. body gained affiliation from over 90% of Clubs in the

In November a State Association was formed in Victoria, and under the Presidency of R. F. Buchan, and with guidance and assistance from NSW's President, E. F. Hawkins, has progressed at a rapid rate.

#### PROMOTION

The National President, in spite of a period of ill-health, was quite active during the year and Clubs which he visited include: Perth, Wangaratta, Melbourne, Foster, Australian, Frankston, Morwell, Korumburra, Geelong, Metropolitan, Finley, Wagga, Mildura, Apsley, Mt. Gambier.

This level of activity has placed considerable pressure on the Presidential Allowance. A recommendation has been made to the Executive Committee that the allowance be increased.

The Executive Committee Members were active in their areas, and are facing increased responsibilities as we develop our sport, particularly in view of the growth of State Associations.

In addition, the National Secretary visited a number of Clubs, including A.C.T. International for the 1976 National Trench Championships.

However, there remains a marked need to promote our sport outside the Association and a responsibility rests on the shoulders of all our members to encourage "outsiders" to take an interest in clay target shooting.

#### LEGISLATION

1976 was a year in which hunting and shooting sports continued to come under heavy pressure from the "anti" groups. One of the real dangers in this situation is that the "antis" are so vocal that Governments begin to take notice, with resulting changes in legislation which do the long-term prospects of our sport no good at all. Your Association is doing all it can, in cooperation with other shooting organisations, to "advise" the legislators on matters relating to firearms control. Nevertheless, for these activities to be really meaningful, our strength needs to increase quite dramatically.

SHOOTING NEWS (OR CTSN, as it is affec-

tionately known).

Although the 1976 Annual Meeting recommended that the possibility of reducing the frequency of CTSN be reduced, it is the belief of the Administrative unit that such a move would be self-destructing. Not only do our National Advertisers - who by the way, are growing in numbers, demand continuity, but we also need the "insurance" in a public relations sense which the magazine affords us. In fact, the Executive Committeee has been asked by the Secretary to extend the number of issues annually to twelve. This will certainly offer benefits to those Clubs who wish to advertise January programs.

#### STAFF

Dramatic changes in the Administrative Unit occurred during the latter half of 1976, resulting in increased enthusiasm and improved relationships with member Clubs. Communications with the National Executive have been developed and it is hoped that full benefits from these changes will be realised in 1977.

#### COMPUTER

One of the most courageous decisions made in recent years by the National Executive was to transfer our membership recording system to become computer based. Although the Association had only eight weeks in which to develop and test a suitable system (no "packages" were considered to be satisfac-

#### **WINCHESTER TOURNAMENT 1977/1978 ELIGIBILITY:**

The event is open only to registered A.C.T.A. shooters. A shooter may enter at more than one location, but having qualified for the Grand Final High Gun at a location, such shooter then is ineligible for the Location Winners prize again, but is eligible for prize 2 to 10 inclusive. but is eligible for prizes 2 to 10 inclusive.

This proviso does not include Lady or Junior shooters being eligible for the trophy for Best Junior or Lady shooter at more than one location, but does include such Junior or Lady Shooter being ineligible for more than one Location Winners prize.

11-15 metre shooters best score at a location not winning either 1, 2, 3 or 4 trophy will receive a MEC 600J valued at \$129. The winner of this Metre group is ineligible for trophy place 5 to 10 inclusive. If the winner of this group wins the 1st trophy and thus qualifies for the Grand Final High Gun, such shooter although he may enter at another location, is ineligible for the Location Winner 1st prize, but is eligible for prizes 2 to 10 inclusive providing such shooter is not either a Junior or Lady when conditions as to Lady or Junior Shooters apply.




Top left - Some of the enthusiastic New Zealand contingent.









was conducted during very wet and windy conditions.

Scores were lower than usual and there is no doubt that there were one or two "traps" in the lay-out. Nevertheless, the equality of competition was preserved throughout, and if the competitor was good enough, the targets were shootable. The Brisbane Gun Club and its helpers are to be congratulated on their efforts, and it is little wonder that the Club's Committee is now agitating to have all Nationals series conducted at Belmont.

#### DAY ONE - Wednesday 25th May. 8th National Skeet C'ship.

Two hundred and sixty-three shooters lined up to contest this event, to be conducted over two days. It was unfortunate that the commencement of the program was delayed by an out-of-adjustment skeet trap It was also at this time that George Breman was asked to step in and assist as Skeet Marshal. 

made a dismal start, missing one of the first pair, two in the second ten and finally completed a 45. Another disaster befell Alf James, the defending champion, who struggled to complete a 40-50.

Thus, after the 62nd squad had finished, the board showed Murray

C grade placings were clearly defined, with a lady shooter filling third place — this is a great boost for our sport. The results were: 1st —I. Lyons (Q/Canberra) 43-50; 2nd B. Prevedello (Mildura) 42-50; 3rd — Karen Williams (Noorat) 41-50.

The Ladies Trophy was won by Karen Williams with Deserie Wakefield (Mildura) second with a score of 39-50.

A large proportion of the "growls" (yes there were a few!) related to inaccurate scoring — this poses a question: Do shooters check their scores, at Club competitions?

#### DAY 4 - Saturday 29th May '77 - 28th Grand Australian H'cap.


It takes more than rain to dampen the enthusiasm of clay-busters! This was proved, when 492 competitors entered the G.A.H. (which carries the G. Hall Perpetual Trophy) which commenced under the most appalling weather conditions - cold and wet with a very gusty wind - not "true

However, in spite of the weather, Bill Jones from Illawarra was first shooter in the first round and shot 24, proving that the targets were shootable. Nevertheless, as the first round progressed, it became increasingly apparent that the organisers would not have a big shoot-off field to contend with. R. Castle, also from Illawarra and shooting in squad 3, put the first 25 on the board, followed by B. Hannah from Gladstone in squad 8 and Mal Green from Korumburra in squad 24 — the clean scores were few and far between.

At the end of the first round, there were only nine possibles on the board. The 1976 winner Bill Wickham (Echuca) carded a 24.

By this time, the scores and the weather combined to make many shooters disappointed, and the most densely populated place on the ground was the bar. In to round two and more shattered egos. #### DAY 5 - Sunday 29th May '77 -25th National Double Barrel Championship.

Would you believe 26 possibles from a field of 534 competitors in a Double Barrel Championship. Furthermore, who would believe that the premier event in D.T.L. shooting in Australia would be resolved by the one hundred and twelfth target? These things happened in the 1977 D.B. event. Even the sweep on each twenty-five was worth winning. Fortunately, the weather had improved, although the wind was still quite "brisk".

Again No. 1 position was lucky and J. Maxwell shot 25 (he also shot 25 in the second round to be the first 50 on the board). Les McGrath of Hay shot 25 together with A. J. Bott of Maryborough, Q'ld. The two Bryants from Roma shot the first 25 and then rattled home with the second 25 to both finish with 50. Spare a moment's thought for a home where the wife produced a better score than hubby — this is what happened to the Grices from Sunshine Coast. Veteran Brisbane Gun Club member John Mott shot 50, after which a 50 went up against the name of George Stevens from Ipswich. Colin Knight, fresh from his Handicap win, saw his 24th target go unbroken and finished with a 49. Bill Stevens from Ipswich couldn't handle his 46th target and also finished one down. The popular Guthrie Trading representative lan Campbell from Adelaide "arrived" and posted a fifty, while Ken Stevens showed his Dadhow to shoot 50. #### DAY 6 - Monday 30th May 1977 -23rd National Single Barrel Championship.

This event carries the valuable W. Rainbird Perpetual Cup, and could one day become the premier D.T.L. event in our shooting calendar (if ever

we see the merit of standardising on single barrel shooting!)
Four hundred and sixty-three shooters had survived the pressures of
the weekend, and decided to continue to "try their luck". The pattern
created over the earlier days continued and "possibles" weren't frequent In the first rounds, Vic Ball from Waitemata, N.Z., showed the way with the first 25 from squad one. The next did not appear until the 19th squad scores went up and showed Gordon Morgan with a 25. After another gap, consistent Greg Newey from Warwick carded a 25, followed by Wangaratta Gun Club President Jeff Reid. Keith Cameron from Roma came in clean together with Warren Charlton, With the first round half over, and only six 25s on the board, another early finish appeared certain. At the completion of the first 25, other possibles included S. Balogh (Queanbeyan/Canberra) Ray McKenzie (Echuca) Merv Lyons (Queanbeyan/Canberra) Les James (Brisbane) F. Mofris (N.Z.) Gary McWonald (Griffith) Roy Holtfreter (Northam) G. Schmidt (Cunnamulla) W. Stevens (Ipswich) Barry Kable (Sydney), Vic Bauert (Condobolin) totalling seventeen in all.

Performances in the second 25 were not much improved and clean scores were still elusive, especially for those who shot 25 in the first round. Phillip Mules, the new Executive Committee Member for South Australia came under notice early with a 24, 25 for 49. Spencer Angel, Murgon Gun Club President shot 25 but his aggregate was "only" 47; (a long way ahead of 70% of the scores) — Gordon Morgan's bubble burst when he carded 20 in the round for an aggregate 45, while retiring Executive Member Harry Williamson shot 25 for an aggregate 48. Greg Newey had the biggest smile on the ground as his 50 went on the board, followed a few moments later by Warren Charlton's perfect score. Trevor Byrne from Shepparton continued his run of consistent shooting with 25 for an aggregate of 49, and in the same squad young Ken Stevens carded a similar score. What a great future our sport has with competitors of the calibre of these young men coming up. Les James' hopes crashed with his 18 in this round for 43, while Singaporean Frank Oh shot a very good 46 (24, 22). Roy Holtfreter dropped his ninth to finish with 49, which looked good in B grade. Peter Wray dropped two of his last five to finish with 47, and Kable grassed his 39th to complete a 49.

And so we had a 2-way tie breaker on our hands — the tension grew as

The first was for the Tom Glenn Cup, competed for annually between New Zealand and Australia, with Australia being the host country in the odd numbered years and New Zealand the host in even numbered years.

The 1977 result was: New Zealand 118-120, Australia 118/120, Although

the scores were tied, Australia, as the 1976 winner will now hold the Cup for 1977.

#### DAY 7 — Tuesday 31st May '77 — 16th Australia-New Zealand Trap Championship

The point had been reached where a number of guessing competitions were under way — like "How many shooters will enter tomorrow?" or "Who is going to make the team"? or "Do you think there will be a shoot-off, or will the only possible win?"

Well, today's event was to answer some of the questions. 434 competitors turned up, all with an equal chance. However, the combination of pointscoring and the "ground gremlins" proved to be an almost insur-

mountable obstacle.

Phillip Mules' name was against one of the early good scores — 72 points, after which came Graham Ash with 74. Mery Whitelaw surprised even Mery Whitelaw to record a 72, similar to Ron Garth's score. Maybe the "Mexicans" were beginning to find form! "B" grader Keith Saggers (yes, another Victorian) burst onto the scene with a 75 which was to be one of the few. Des Barber and Les English (both of Brisbane) carded a 73 and lan Campbell, in the same squad fired a 75. Basil Wagg from Kaniva broke loose with 74 (he used a second on his 24th) and Bob McGillivray (Frankston) also shot 74, having pulled a second on his first target. Wow, were those Victorians burning?

Young Cliff Fyers of N.Z. carded a 75 with apparent ease (there was a distaster lurking around the corner) while his team mates S. Holmes and G. Read shot 74 and 73 respectively. Geoffrey Mark continued to give father Brian a shooting lesson and returned with a 74, while 'Pud' Burgess showed his usual top form with 75. Tony Penney (Wangaratta) recovered from the damage done to his health by his travelling companion Jeff Reid,

and shot 74.

Other possibles in the first round included: Mrs Sandra May (Sunshine what a great effort for a gall), Bill Kennamer (Perth), Ken Lowry (Melb.), Bill Henwood (Melb.), K. Jones (T'ville), Merv Lyons (c/- Canberra), Des Cosgrove (Warren), Robin Bailey (Perth), John Lee (B'dean), Vin Ryan (Cosgrove), Ennio Cavedon (Wangaratta) and R. Hounsell (Jeparit — a great effort for a C Grade shooter!)

At about this time, the crowd around the High Gun Score Board swelled considerably, and all the pocket calculators were in use in an attempt to solve the problem — "What will make the team?" or "Will the '11's' get in?" However none of the prophets could predict the shocks still to come.

Firstly, Graham Ash shot his way out of the team with a second round 68 for an aggregate of 142, followed by Phillip Mules with 67 for a 139. Their place as a possible for the Mackintosh team was taken by steady Fred Bradwell from Illawarra with a 71, 75 for 146. Ken Saggers slipped to a 70 for 145, but was still well in team calculations. Campbell shot 72 for 147 and looked pretty safe while Wagg came home like a train to finish with 147. However, his D.B. and S.B. scores had let him down previously. Bob McGillivray stormed in with 149 but was 12 down for the team — would the 12's make it? Brendan Smith of Bungendore sneaked in with a 142, which put him on 11 down - maybe he was safe!

Young Mark continued to shoot well under pressure and carded a very creditable 146 (he missed his 37th target completely) and was in the Mackintosh team, being only 8 down. Geoff gives credit to Bob Harty for a lot of his success—Bob shot next to him through much of the program and showed Geoff the things not to do! 'Pud' Burgess missed his 48th target to slip to a 71 for an event aggregate of 146—still only 9 down for the team. Tony Penney continued with his "new me" with a 73 for 147 his 42 in the S.B. didn't help his team chances though - but a very nervous Sandra May found the pressure a little much and slipped to a second round 60, for an aggregate of 135. Eric Neil of Kempsey did not drop a target but could amass only 144 points in "B" Grade, but as he had not entered the D.B. no team place for him.

It wasn't until the 37th squad shot that the first possible appeared on the board — Ken Lowry showing his usual consistency was the shooter, and was only 4 points down for the team. Doug Smith recovered after dropping a target and pulling two seconds in the first round to record 75 for a 145 - 9 down for team. John Lee pulled a second on his 33rd target to score 149 — 10 down but it was looking like 10's were certainties for the team. Daryl Wiese from Narrogin also finished with a 149. Then in squad 64, 150 points appeared a second time, this time against the name of Ennio Cavedon from Wangaratta — his 10 down almost certainly assured him a team plade. Bob Smith of Goulburn, the defending champion, was not quite close enough on 147 (72, 75) although his 5 down gave him a certain place in the team.

And so there was another two-way tie — Lowry and Cavedon. Both shooters took two packets of cartridges with them for the shoot-off, and as the gallery increased, the Shoot Marshal checked the traps and the tiebreaker was under way. Those who blinked missed it, because it was another of those "one target each" situations — Ken was the first shooter and broke the target nicely with his first barrel, then Ennio called, pulled both barrels only to see the target continue to fly unbroken. Congratula-



Donald (Brisbane) 47/50, 2nd - G. Ethell (Tyagarah) 46/50, 3rd - A. Heathcote (Melbourne) 45/52.

The Ladies' section was won by Mrs Grice from Sunshine Coast, who shot 40/50.

And so the shooting part of the program finished. However, there was plenty of action to come with the High Gun Awards still to be determined. Clyde Hawkins had been working overtime to keep the High Gun score board up to date (spare a moments thought for the amount of work required to maintain this function) but willingly accepted all the help availa-

ble to get the final results decided.

It was planned to hold the Official Presentation Ceremony almost straight after the completion of the Champion of Champions event, but a delay of about an hour occurred due to the need to confirm the accuracy of the High Gun Award results. Unfortunately, the most series problem of an otherwise successful Nationals developed during this ceremony. A group of experienced shooters, some of whom have held senior administrative positions behaved in a most discourteous way in that, for the full time, they conducted their own private meeting, complete with grog, only a few feet from the official table - our President and shooters deserved a better deal. This set-back combined with very low temperatures, a strong wind, and presentation which were too lengthy anway, destroyed the success of the night. What should have been a highlight of the series and the pinnacle of success for the award winners was a disappointing anti-climax, and for the part they played, the organisers apologise.

Back to happier thoughts, The A.C.T.A. Committee and registered

shooters showed their appreciation of the tremendous service given by immediate Past President 'Tup' Pedersen by presenting a Crystal Liquor

Set, housed on a Sterling Silver Tray to 'Tup' and his wife Enid. Soon after, Dave Evans, Senior Vice President of Brisbane Gun Club, on behalf of the Club Committee and members presented Club President Ron Porter with a beautiful reclining chair. Then the International Teams exchanged goodwill gifts, followed by The High Gun Awards, together with major trophies.

Tom Pascoe, Queensland Manager for IMI Australia Ltd, presented a Franchi 2002 Under and Over to the winner of the National Skeet Championship, Gordon Morgan, who also received the Evans and Balfour Trophy. Then Past President Gordon Hall presented his Perpetual Trophy to Colin Knight, the Grand Australian Handicap winner, who also received a 'Texan' reloader and shotshell components from F. C. Lovelock Pty. Ltd. (the presentation was made by Mr Don Darrant) and the A.C.T.A. cheque for \$100.

The next presentation was to the winner of the Australian-New Zealand Trap Championship, Ken Lowry who was presented with a Remington 1100 S.B. Bicentennial Model Automatic Shotgun by Mr Harry Alexander,

Managing Director of Boustead Pty. Ltd., Remington's Australian Agents.
Then followed the High Gun Awards. 
Hopefully, they will not recur at Adelaide.

What a wonderful job the caterers did, too! Again, in a pressure area, the catering staff "kept their cool" and always had a bright comment and a smile. It was certainly the most complete


catering service I can remember, in that breakfast was available from 7 a.m. on each day and dinner was available up 'till 8 p.m. — that's a long day, eh?





represent Australia at the 1977 World Moving Target Championships to be conducted at Antibes, France.

The team includes . . . Manager - A. M. Burgess (Cobar, N.S.W.), Trap Team - J. Ellis (Canberra, A.C.T.), T. Rumbel (Taree, N.S.W.), A. M. Burgess (Cobar, N.S.W.), J. Henwood (Melbourne, Vic.); Reserve - B. Noli (Tullibigeal, N.S.W.); Skeet Team - A. J. Summers (Melbourne, Vic.), A. Crikis (Melbourne, Vic.); Team Coach - J. Newton Thomas (Melbourne, Vic).
All these shooters together with those who weren't able to gain selec-

tion, have put a tremendous amount of effort dedication and expense into

their sport, and deserve our congratulations.

This team has been selected on the basis of "pay your own way" is even more the case after the unsuccessful attempt to get some Federal Government aid. However, shooters and Clubs have been quite generous and there is an amount of almost \$3000 in the "I.S.U. Sept. 18th — Team to fly to Hong Kong for two-day stopover.

Sept. 21st — Return to Melbourne.






