





SECRETARY'S NOTES

It is always reassuring to see evidence of improvement in standards in any interest one may have - even more so when it happens in Clay Target Shooting. There is much evidence to indicate that our sport is on the way up. For example our membership is significantly ahead of last year's figures, more clay targets are being consumed than ever before, less growls or complaints are being handled through the National Office, and so one could go on. One of the most interesting areas of improvement however relates to the production of current registration cards. More Clubs than ever before are asking competitors to produce their card at the time of nominating and are finding that the simple request does NOT cause the shooter any offence. On the contrary, the shooter respects the Club for asking as it is an indication that the interests of the "paying customers" are being protected. Personal observations made at Clubs to which visits have recently been made would suggest that about 80% of shooters are now carrying their current registration card with them at all times.

Our National President continues to cover a lot of ground and has visited Clubs at Dorrigo (NSW), Northam (W.A.) and Coffs Harbour (NSW) in the past few weeks — the welcome extended

to him at all Clubs has been very rewarding.

Your Secretary took advantage of a "lull" in the work load to spend a few days in New Zealand during late August. The opportunity was taken to discuss problems of mutual interest with senior people from the New Zealand Clay Target Association, leaving no doubt in my mind that great benefits can be achieved by developing closer communications with our Trans-Tasman colleagues. Special mention must be made of the tremendous service given by Air New Zealand during our flight — first class service to excursion class passengers!

Back to the subject of improving standards, an area of communications in which a number of Clubs fall down concerns the lack of information contained in program advertisements in CTSN. It is a widely held beliew that all relevant information should be listed. This may be too tall an order where space becomes a problem, but particularly in cases of major events it would be in the best interests of both the Club and competing shooters to include details of nomination values and number of trophies in advertising. If this detail could be combined with a better planned advertisement lay-out, there is no doubt that advertising costs could be further offset through increased attendances.

Talking of advertising, it is one of the major policies of CTSN to provide a medium through which Clubs can express views and advertise competitions. Quite serious problems are created by those Clubs who persist in sending copy for their advertising after closing date. Australia's mail system is currently not the most reliable in the world and many Clubs use Australia Post as an excuse. It would be wrong to jeopardise the value of the magazine by delaying its distribution simply to accommodate those six or seven Clubs who cannot organize themselves. We earnestly seek the co-operation of Club Secretaries and Publicity Officers in this matter.

The holder of registration number 002 is Sep Stewart, Executive Committee Member from Queensland. Sept has advised that his property "Waratah" at Cunnamulla has been sold and he and Mrs Stewart have moved to Brisbane. Clay target shooting in that western part of Queensland owes Sep a tremendous debt because of the amount of work he has put in over a long period of time.

RELOADING -

More Answers!

In June issue of CTSN a column called "Reloading — Questions and Answers" was introduced as a service to readers. After just one month it lapsed through lack of interest. Hearing the many pops and booms that occur around shooting grounds, it is difficult to believe that none of our shooters need help. So lan Cook, Manager of IMI Aust. Ltd., has renewed his offer to answer questions. We are again indebted to Jim Draper of Wodonga (Vic) for this question:

"Using any shotshell reloading powder, why is it necessary to (a) apply pressure to the powder? and (b) is there a maximum recommended wad pressure for each powder type? and (c) what are the results of over pressure on the wad and the gun?

IAN COOK ANSWERS: Wad pressure was extremely important in the days of felt wadding, particularly as the original woollen felt was replaced with various substitutes. It was, in fact, possible to load cartridges to dangerously high pressures by increasing the wad pressure, above the magic figure of 40lbs.


However, with modern plastic wads and plastic cases with tapered internal walls, it is not nearly so important, probably for two reasons —

(a) The wad in the taper acts a little like a cork in a bottle and tends to pop out if pressed down too hard, i.e. it tends to relieve any excess pressure on the powder.

(b) The "cushion part" of the wad has more cushioning effects than the old felt wad and thus the initial pressure of burning is lowered.

It is a fact that a little air space on top of the powder seems to have little detrimental effect on performance. Providing one sticks to recommended loads with matched components, the wads should be seated to give the best crimp (not too deep, not too shallow) and satisfactory performance should be obtained."

SHOTSHELL RELOADING

An exhaustive and complete study of the Shotshell Reloading Scene in Australia — by PAT BROWNE

Part 1 — INTRODUCTION AND COMPONENTS

When a shotgunner in Australia fires his favorite fowling piece, be he a field man or trap or skeet gunner, he is left with a piece of hardware namely the empty shell, that opens up to him the absorbing hobby of reloading. In a nut shell, the object of the exercise in shotshell reloading, is to put back into the shell what you have fired out of it. The secret (if there is one) is to put it all back together in such a way as to get the same results as you would and do get from a factory load. There is nothing difficult about the process, nor are there any mysteries. A lot of hogwash has been talked about and written about reloads versus factory loads over the years, most of it based on rumour, not much based on fact. However, in this series we will have a very close look at the Australian shotshell reloading scene. We will examine in detail the components commonly available to us, the machinery, in the way of presses and accessories that we can use, and above all the best and most suitable reloading combinations we can put together for Australian conditions.

Firstly, let us look at the Australian shotgunning scene and see if there is any distinct pattern that we can isolate as being typically Australian. If you examine it closely you will find that there is no distinct pattern. What you will see however, is that Australian shotgunners are influenced broadly from three different areas of the shotgunning world, and all three areas will influence the gun-cartridge combination used and the type of shell the individual gunner will want to reload. The three areas that have a definite influence on shotgunning in this country are, England, with the light side by side doubles and the 21/2" 2 5/8" cartridge, the Continent with the under and over and the 70mm or 24" - 32 g and 36 g cartridge, and the USA with the bewildering array of pumps and auto loaders, from the smallest to the biggest loadings imaginable. The Australian scene then is a curious mixture of all these influences and as such, the reloading of shotshells must cover, as near as possible, all of these gun-cartridge combinations. More of this later when we delve more deeply into the subject of the right cartridge for the right job.

So, to the cartridges that are available to the shotgunner in this country and their suitability for reloading. We are well served by the ammunition companies, with a wide selection of cartridges, all of excellent quality, but for this exercise we will limit our discussions to plastic shells, as these are the most important to the reloader. I am fully aware that shotgunners still reload paper shells, but this number is only a small percentage. So we have established our first point "If you are going to reload, reload plastic shotshells". There are several reasons for this. Firstly, the majority of information from all sources is concerned with plastic shells and plastic wads; Secondly, the plastic hull is easy to reload and gives a near perfect finish. Another very important point is that all the guess work with wad pressure and wad columns is eliminated, allowing the reloader to produce a ballistically correct and consistent reload. You will see how important this is later when we discuss the ballistics of shotshells in some detail.

Variety in Empties.

Let us now look at the empty shells that are available to us for reloading. Broadly speaking they come in two varieties. The first consists of a plastic tube with a separate paper composition base wad and either a brass or brass plated steel head. These shells reload very well, but some points need to be watched. Moisture can be a problem as the base wads are very absorbent, so if you get them wet be very careful, in fact I would go so far as to say discard them. Brass plated steel heads are not a problem, but they must be resized. More about this later when we discuss the mechanics of reloading. The second of the two types is the most reloadable of the lot. This hull is a compression formed, one piece plastic shell with the base wad moulded in, and it usually has a brass head. This type is moisture proof, and the thick plastic base wad and the brass head, make it suitable for reloading in most cases without resizing. There are some exceptions to this rule, and again we will leave this to the mechanics section. There are some other (very few) cartridges available that are not manufactured by the big ammunition companies, but in every case they can be treated as one or other of the more common or readily available cartridges, in fact in some cases the

original hull has obviously been manufactured by one of the large companies. We now turn to Table 1, where I have listed the commonly available plastic shotshells and the specifications the reloader is looking for.



Some preliminary comments on the crimp style used on modern plastic shotshells needs to be made at this stage, although we will deal with the complete subject when we discuss ballistics. Only two styles are used, the 8 star and the 6 star, fold crimp. In my experience the 8 star makes for a better and neater job, but the 6 star can be made to work very well with a little care.

A word now about the sorting of empty hulls. In my opinion, this subject is the most neglected but one of the most important. Inspection and classification of your empties is the first and most important step of the reloading process. Let us assume that you have a box of empties collected or purchased at a gun club. Get yourself several boxes or plastic bags and proceed to sort them.

First up, discard the paper shells and then sort the rest into brand names. Now, become more selective and more critical. Take each box of brand shells, be they red or blue, and check

each empty individually. There are several main points to watch, the general condition of the hull and the mouth or crimp end and the brass or head. Worn, split or badly discoloured shells around the open end, should immediately be discarded. Be ruthless, it is false economy to tell yourself that you may get one or two loads from an old shell that has obviously had its day.

These shells when reloaded, not only look shoddy, but also crimp badly and ballistically this is disastrous. Examine the brass or head closely for any bulges or wear and if any are found, discard them. Primers should be looked at for signs of gas leakage. If you notice any discolouration round the primer pocket put these hulls aside for the time being, as they may be able to be used with over-sized primers. This subject will be covered at some length later. As you gain experience, you will be able to pick "once fired cases" and it is a good idea to put them to one side. Also at this time, sort your empties into types, one box for A.A's one for Blue Star, etc., etc.

Now you are all sorted out, you have a stock of good empty shells all graded into types. The time that you have spent doing this will not be wasted as you will discover later. If you are going to reload a large number of shotshells, a "case conditioner" is a good investment. I will discuss this piece of apparatus at some length in the equipment section, but if you do have one, this is the time to use it. As you are inspecting your cases, decap and resize them at this stage. When you start a reloading session it will be a breeze if you have clean, recapped and resized cases coming to the press. An added bonus from this operation is less strain on some of the cheaper presses. So much for the preliminaries, let us now look at the components, that are available to us to put our shotshells back together.

The basis of your shotshell is the primer. Is is the ignition system, the spark plug if you like. Like spark plugs, they come in different sizes and types and there is a specific primer for every application. I can not emphasize this too much, as in my experience, the haphazard use of primers is the downfall of many reloads. When we discuss the ballistics of shotshells later, you will see how important the primer is in the making of a balanced load. A word about primer size would be in order at this stage. In Australia we have two sizes readily available, normal and oversized. Most factory loads have normal size primers, with some exceptions in the heavier magnum loads. This brings me back to my earlier statement about keeping "once fired cases" to one side. This will allow you to use normal size primers early in the life of a new shell and have the oversize primer to fall back on when the primer pocket becomes enlarged. Normal size primers are a nominal .242" diameter and oversize primers are a nominal .245" diameter. All primers available are, of course, noncorrosive. I have listed the most commonly available primers below and their sizes.

One further note about primers until we come back to them in the ballistics section. Keep them in their original containers and locked up. Moisture, solvents and lubricants can de-activate them, so be careful.


POWDERS

PRIMERS

Modern smokeless powders are the power of our shotshells. Before examining the commonly available propellents in Australia, let us briefly examine smokeless powders and what makes them tick. Smokeless powders are mixtures of chemicals designed to burn at a specified rate under controlled conditions to propel projectiles from a gun. You will find that powders take three forms, small spheres, small cylinders or thin circular flakes or wafers, and are specified as either single or double based. Nitrocellulous forms the main energy medium for single based powders, whilst nitrocellulose and notroglycerine powder the double based powders. All powders contain sufficient built-in

oxygen to allow them to burn completely in a confined space such as the chamber of a gun. They burn very efficiently when used in a balanced load, produce very little smoke and leave very little or no residue. In the very broad range of propellents available the types suitable for shotshell reloading are in the faster burning bracket. If we take this section of powders out of the complete range, we can classify these propellents from fast to slow burning.

Now, before we go any further, let us get one thing straight about the burning rate of powders. When we talk about a fast powder, we are talking about its burning rate, not the velocity obtained from that powder. If equal quantities of fast and slow burning powders are ignited under identical conditions, the fast burning powder will develop a higher peak pressure and this does not necessarily mean higher velocity. As a general rule, fast burning powders are for light shotloads and the slower burners are for the heavier loads. In 12 gauge loads, light would be %oz, 1oz, 1 1/16oz, 11/20z; Heavy would be 1 3/16oz, 11/20z, 1 3/8oz, and 11/20z.

Some powders do have some overlapping characteristics and thus are suitable for a wider range of loads, we will discuss this in more detail in the ballistics section later. Now to the commonly available powders. I have listed them in burning rate order from fast at the top of the list, to slow at the bottom.

So, there are the nine most commonly available powders that we can use. As we are talking about basics in this first chapter, let me list some precautions for you to heed about them.

- 1. Store in a cool dry place.
- 2. Do not use a powder unless you know it's identity.
- 3. Please do not smoke when handling powder.
- 4. NEVER, NEVER mix powders.

WADS

Modern plastic wads, shot cups, wad concentrators, call them what you like, are one of the most significant advances in shot shell design in recent years. This single component together with the star crimp has revolutionised shotshell reloading and taken it from the realm of the dedicated tinkerer to a sophisticated and rewarding pastime. To put it another way, it has taken the guess work out of reloading and has simplified the whole process. The humble wad however, comes in for some terrible abuse. It is a never ending source of amazement to me how little some reloaders know about this component. Although they come in many shapes and sizes, they are all designed to do several very important things. The wad serves as a gas seal and

as a cushion during your gun's recoil, making it easier on the shoulder and also preventing deformation of your shot charge due to compression.

The petals up front help to stop your shot from being flattened by scrubbing against the barrel. It is a spacer also, and when inserted properly into the correct hull ensures a properly crimped shell. Acting as a heat barrier it prevents the hot powder gases from fusing your shot into a solid mass. Above all, it acts as a "cover" over the powder charge and ensures the correct initial burning rate of the powder when properly "weighed down" with the right shot load and crimp.

All of these functions then, fall on the humble wad, all of them critical in the performance of your reloaded shells. Why then, do so many shotgunners take so little notice of the importance of this component. Some of the wads stuffed back into shotshells that I have examined would make your hair stand on end.

Reclaiming wads and using them again is false economy. Considering the tasks that the wad has to perform it is like putting a punch drunk pug into the ring with the world champion—he is not up to the job—neither is a used wad. The practice is dangerous—how dangerous we will discuss in the ballistics section.

Again are listed the components available to us, but this is only a guide, the correct selection of a wad for your reload will come a little later.

SHOT

Little need be said about shot at this stage, apart from the fact that it is the business end of the reload. The name of the game is to get your shot load to the target in the most efficient manner, to do the job it is intended to do. Hardness and roundness of your pellets is most important and a good quality chilled shot should be used. Shot that is available in Australia is of excellent quality.

SUMMARY

So there you have it. All the components needed to make a reloaded shotshell. With these components you can make your reload to suit all types of scatterguining in this country, As I said earlier, it is not difficult, and next month we will discuss this very thing, putting a reload together. We will also have a close look at the machinery available to us to do the job properly.



TRAPSHOOTING...

I will apologise in advance for deviating somewhat from my regular column on trapshooting to address a subject that has become extremely important in America and certainly on the upsurge in virtually every "free" nation in the world.

I am speaking of the tremendous push by the anti-gun forces

I am speaking of the tremendous push by the anti-gun forces who are progressively fighting for laws leading first to registration of all firearms, then to outright confiscation as an end result of their crusade. Their basic pitch, for the record, is that confiscation of all firearms will stop all crime and murder, and therefore, having confiscated all firearms, the human race will live in peace and happiness.

How naive! The simple truth is that guns don't kill people. It is people who kill people. In this context, serious consideration should be given to registering and confiscating such deadly weapons as rocks. And this is the basic theme of the column this month. Let's register and confiscate rocks. And, oh, yes, there are a few more things to be registered and confiscated.

Just the other day a golfer went berserk at a California club, and before the local police could subdue and put him in the paddy wagon, he had caved in the head of his golfing companion. The murder weapon was an unregistered eight-iron which had been purchased at a sporting goods store along with a bag of other similar weapons.

My, it is frightening to contemplate the thousands upon thousands of deadly murder weapons that surround us. Tablelegs, rolling pins, bricks, knives, ropes, wire, candelabrum, machetes and heaven knows what other objects that have been used to kill again and again.

So, if objects kill, then we must first register and then confiscate all of them, right? Of course, this is pretty ridiculous, but is it really? Any fool knows that a rock is not going to leave the ground and kill someone unless there is a human hand wrapped around it. It is just as ridiculous to believe that a gun will kill someone unless it is held by human hands and deliberately used for must be someone.

Let's say it again. People murder people. Inanimate objects do not. Criminals kill and maim people, and they will do it with whatever weapon comes to hand. All the restrictive and confiscatory laws in the world aren't going to stop them. Criminals always will get a gun when he wants it. Only the innocent citizen trying to protect his home and family will be disarmed and help-less.


The place, of course, is San Quentin Prison, and in spite of all the severity and precautions and searches, there have been 63 murders by inmates in the last five years within San Quentin. Inmates have made guns, zip-guns, knives, saps, blackjacks, brass knuckles, and other deadly weapons of all shapes and sizes.


Now if these kinds of weapons could be made inside a prison under the eyes of armed guards, just think what the inmates could do and what they could construct outside of the walls. The simple fact is that those who want to kill will find a way. Those who are the potential victims should have a manner with which to protect themselves and their families. It is, and always will be, the innocent ones who will be the victims of gun registration and confiscation.

If a criminal is going to rob a man who is armed and in his own home, he may very well get shot. Criminals obviously prefer not to work for their sustenance, so they rob those who do, and every criminal in America is positively licking his chops with anticipation of the day when the citizenry is totally disarmed.

It is a shame that the legislative halls are filled with more antigun advocates than there are those who would protect the rights
of citizens to own firearms. And those who love and revere the
firearms should react strongly when their guns are jeopardized.
Gun lovers should put their money and shoeleather to work in
defeating legislators and all others who would infringe on their
rights to own their own guns. In any country in the world this is
the only way gun owners can retain their guns for their own
legitimate, peaceful and sporting purposes. In the long run, the
final outcome will be up to each of us. In the meantime, don't
forget to campaign for registering and confiscation of all those
other deadly weapons like automobiles, baseball bats, bricks et
al. Why even the common icepick has been used over the years
to murder many victims. The price is cheap and it can be obtained at any hardware store. And don't forget rocks.



Commonwealth Government Recognises Sport (AT LAST!)

One of the most important points in the 1977-78 Federal Budget involved a very small amount of money - namely \$1 million. This amount has been made available for sports development and is a great improvement on whatever was given in the two previous years. (No one has been able to establish if any funds have been available in that period!)

The administration of the funds will be placed in the hands of the newly formed "Sports Advisory Council" and the following is

the text of a News Release describing the Council.

Sports Advisory Council

The Minister for Environment, Housing and Community Development, Mr Kevin Newman, recently announced the terms of reference and membership of the Sports Advisory Council promised in the Budget.

"The Council's terms of reference require it to determine quidelines for the Government's new sports development program and advise me on other sports development matters," Newman said.

The Budget provided \$1 million for a sports development program which will provide opportunities for Australian sportsmen and women to further develop their potential to the maximum of their desire and skill.

"Sportsmen and women are the best judges of what their sports most need," Mr Newman said. "Accordingly, the members, appointed to the Council for two years, are all prominent in Australian sport and include representatives of both large and small sports, professional and amateur groups, Olympic and non-Olympic sports and the recently formed Confederation of Australian Sport.'

Mr Newman said he was pleased to announce that the Council members are: - Mr James Barry (Chairman), Dr Alan Coles, Mr Alan Davidson, M.B.E., Mr Herb Elliott, M.B.E., Miss Eunice Gill, M.B.E., Mr Wayne Reid, O.B.E.

The first meeting of the Council will be held as soon as practicable.

Terms of Reference

The six-person Sports Advisory Council will have the following terms of reference:

(a) to advise the Minister on matters relating to national

sports development and assistance;

(b) in providing this advice to make recommendations on: (i) the needs and priorities for national sports development; (ii) the development of criteria for a national sports development program; (iii) the allocation of funds to national sporting associations; and (iv) appropriate means of evaluating the sports assistance program; and

(c) to consider any other matters referred to it by the

Minister.

The ACTA has prepared an extensive submission, in which top priority has been given to our financial needs in both the areas of National Coaching and International Competition. Any progress will be reported in future issues of CTSN.

RUMBEL — THE BIG NOISE IN 1977 NATIONAL TRENCH CHAMPIONSHIP

Terry Rumble from Taree-Wingham Gun Club (N.S.W.) celebrated his inclusion in the 1977 International Trench Team to compete at Antibes, France, by winning the National Championship by a margin of two targets. However, the win was not as comfortable as the scores suggest with Burgess (Cobar) and

Lowry (Melbourne) pushing him all the way.

The attendance of 32 was disappointing, with all sorts of excuses being made — maybe the date WAS too close to the full National series! However, the lack of numbers was more than offset by the talent, particularly that shown by younger shooters. The other big 'plus' was that it was proved that the Brisbane Gun Club Trench installation WILL work, and its performance during the three days of competition was very good. This was mainly due to the co-operation of the Committee of Taree-Wingham Gun Club, who lent their "scramble box" for the weekend. It now appears that if Brisbane Gun Club can procure a new box, their installation will come back into favour, so providing another convenient venue for this challenging form of clay target shooting.

Day one (Saturday 6th Aug.) saw the field face the traps in bright sunshine, although a light breeze was soon to prove difficult to master. Alan Bould of Melbourne showed out very early with a 24, followed by Burgess and Ellis also with 24's. Arthur Kenna (ACTA Executive member) produced a tremendous 23 in only his sixth round of trench, while Rumbel and Lowry coulo

only manage 23's too.

The second round was almost over before the first 25 appeared on the board — against the name of Terry Rumbel. Burgess and Ellis shot their second successive 24's, while Terry Budd from N.S.W. Gun Club and Maurie Quirk, enjoying himself immensely, both shot 24's. Rolly McMillan, the Victorian hotshot from Frankston, also shot 24 and had to be assisted from the ground suffering from shock. Lowry fired a 24 and looked a little happier, as it was already apparent that 25's were going to be so elusive that a string of 24's would produce a very satisfactory aggregate.

At the end of the first day, the positions were: Lowry (after a 25 in the third round) and Rumbel on 72's. Burgess on 71, Ellis on 69 (his 21 in the third round didn't help at all!), local hero John Porter on 69 (his first shot at trench since the fizz over his Olympic selection) and Geoffrey Mark (Victoria) and Arthur Kenna on

68.

Day two (Sunday 7th Aug.) was again fine but the breeze had freshened. One of the effects was that not one clean round was shot during the day; even 24's were pretty elusive. Burgess showed his class by carding a 24, while Lowry shot 23. Arthur Kenna continued to show skill with a 22. Geoffrey Mark, who shows considerable promise produced a 23, and a 23 also went up against John Porter's name. Brendan Smith from Bungendore (NSW), who had gone to the titles as Jim Ellis' mentor, showed class and shot 23 — at this stage his aggregate was the same as Ellis! Another young shooter to be showing out was Ken Stevens of Ipswich who shot 23. Doug Smith was shooting scores averaging 22 which was also a very creditable performance for a shooter who has been out of trench shooting for so long.

The second round of the day produced some staggering scores — Ellis 19, Kenna 19, Smith 19. However, the pace makers continued to perform very steadily with Burgess, Budd, Lowry and Rumbel all carding 23's. The day finished with Rumbel and Lowry still locked together on 142, Burgess on 141 while Ken Stevens was in fourth place with 137. No other shooters had any real chance of filling places at this point — however the Lucas Team Perpetual Trophy kept pressure on all shooters as the result for this was still wide open!

On the Sunday night, National Vice President, Ron Porter, played his "Trump card". He and his wife Muriel played host to a number of shooters, many of whom were shooting in teams other than that entered by Brisbane Gun Club, Ron's home Club. Without giving a blow by blow description, let it suffice to say that due to Ron's hospitality, some of the competitors found

it very difficult to face the traps on Monday morning. (On behalf of all the visitors, a very big thank you to Muriel and Ron — Ed.)

Day three (Monday 8th Aug.) was again sunny, and at last the wind had dropped. Brendon Edwards turned on the star act by shooting 23 in the first round with his eyes closed — he was frightened that if he opened them, he would bleed to death! (Yes, he had been at Porter's on the previous night!) Burgess proved himself as one of the most consistent shooters in Australia to shoot 23 — however this left him two targets off the pace as Rumbel shot 24, while Lowry slipped to a 22. Coming into the last round both Burgess and Lowry had to shoot 25's to have any chance while Rumbel was in the last squad and would have to produce 23 or less to be toppled. Well it happened — Burgess and Lowry shot 25's but in a great exhibition of concentration so did Rumbel to give him the 1977 title with an aggregate score of 191-200.

During the last two rounds, Doug Smith and Terry Budd also

shot 25's, which were very creditable performances.

With Burgess and Lowry tied on 189, a shoot-off was necessary to decide the minor placings. Burgess was first shooter and dropped his third target. Lowry, not to be outdone, then dropped his fourth, eight and fourteenth to be trailing by two coming into the last ten. Although Burgess dropped another two targets, the final results were 2nd A. Burgess 211-225 and 3rd K. Lowry 210-225.

The tricks employed by Ron Porter surely worked and Brisbane Gun Club won the Lucas Teams' Match by six targets from ACT International Gun Club, with NSW Gun Club a further eighteen targets back in third place. This result speaks volumes for the future of Olympic Trench shooting in the Brisbane area.

Once again, industry support for this event was tremendous with the following trophies all being donated: Franchi Mod 500 Auto shotgun - from IMI Australia; Sterling Silver Tray - from Winchester Aust.; "Cougar" Gas Camping Equipment - from Michaelis Bayley Tdg.; Ponsness Warren Reloader - from Guthrie Trading Co.; Team's trophies - from Tom and Beryl Lucas.



COLLECTORS' COLUMN

with Paul Gribben (Cosgrove Gun Club

FLOBERT'S .22 RIFLE (contd.) — Part Two

Flobert's 3rd model, still a slight improvement on each of his earlier rifles, had the first semblance of the rolling block ever seen, in fact it was often called the Remington system but having no connection with that name, as the Remington a vastly improved rifle came many years later.

The rolling block, if you can call it that, is once again the most simple idea, an extended V projecting out from the rear of the extractor locked into a V cut under the face of the hammer, the extractor this time carrying a real screw locked firing pin which lined up with the bottom of the barrel circle or rim of the cartridge, thus indicating the rim fire use, the extractor and barrel face both countersunk to take the cartridge rim.

The earlier Floberts were not marked with the makers name, merely carried the Belgium proofs and a few meaningless stamps. These small rifles with 22" barrels and plain wood stocks sold from fifteen shillings, each for the first two models and the Remington system for One pound seven shillings and sixpence in Australia.

By 1951 Flobert rifles and ammunition became well-known throughout Great Britain and Europe, and at the Crystal Palace Exhibition held in London that year, his display of Arms made a great impression. This brought his rifles to the eyes of the World and to those two renowned American gun makers Horace Smith and Daniel Baird Wesson who had just formed a partnership and were looking for ideas in cartridges to suit their new development in revolvers. They waited patiently for another patent to expire, and by 1857 had taken out a patent for a self contained metal cartridge in what was to become known as the No. 1 Cartridge .22 rimfire which had a stronger rim, a conical bullet (CB) also a longer case to take a small charge of 11/2 grms of Black gun powder, naturally they developed a vastly improved locking mechanism and extractor.

If you have an early Flobert lacking the breech closure, do not use a modern .22 rim fire in it, as you may lose an eye, for the modern ammo, merely blows back the hammer breech facing.

In the early years of this century, the Warnant system Flobert action came with a device fitted over the action like a cowling, when lifted it performed the extraction of the shell, it had a slot through the top of the cowling for the central hammer travel, this applies to most of the rim fire rifles and small shot guns supplied in great variety of quality with ornate trigger guards, checkered walnut stocks and fore ends, some even silver mounted, double set triggers, double barrel side by side rifles, but the gem of them all that I saw in Innsbruck was a .22 Warnant Flobert in an under and over .22 rifle.

Today they are mostly rusty junk, and not very high in the opi-

nion of most gun collectors.

Flobert guns were last made in 1932, but his little rifles and earliest curiously formed cartridges have carved a niche in the world of gun history, which will never be erased, and his renowned .22 which emerged, goes marching on.

HOW VIEWS DIFFER!

The following paragraph appeared in the April issue of NSW Police News. Take heart, you members of the powerful shooters' lobby!

At the very same time that the Delegates to the Australian Police Federation Conference were congratulating the Western Australian Government on the fact that they had the most effective firearms licensing laws in Australia, the powerful shooters lobby who succeeded in having the firearms legislation in the eastern States watered down to its present ineffective form have now convinced the Premier of Western Australia that he should consider relaxing his laws so that they would be as useless as ours.

TRADE TOPICS

A note has been received from Les Turner of Evans and Balfour, Olympic Gunsmiths, pointing out that the reference to his "retirement" in September CTSN may have given the wrong impression. He still has a vital financial stake in the business and will be in attendance frequently. Anybody wishing to see Les personally however may avoid some inconvenience if they first ensure he is at the shop. General Manager "Phil" Richards reports that retail sales are quite good although the 1977 winter has been quieter than for the last year or two. Responsible retailers are using this period to consolidate their position and wherever possible reduce stocks, he says.

Dick Sharp, the gunsmith, who serviced the A.C.T.A. Nationals at Brisbane is also "flat out" and continues to provide the quality and reliability to which Evans and Balfour clients have

become accustomed.

Dick Ayers, the energetic Winchester Area Manager for South Australia and Northern Territory is just back from a sales mission into the Territory. Not only did he promote his Company products, but he also put a lot of effort into "selling" our 1978 Nationals to the N.T. shooters. He visited a number of Gun Clubs including Darwin RAAF Club (which is considering A.C.T.A. affiliation), Darwin Gun Club, Katherine and Alice Springs. Dick writes: "I must admit that while at these Clubs I did some heavy selling of the 1978 Nationals to be held at the South Australian Gun Club, and expect a number of Northern Territory shooters to be making the trip south. News just to hand shows that the Australian Team in the 1977 World Moving Target Championships was far from disgraced! The Skeet competitors' performance was good - Alex Crikis shot 180-200 to be classified about 20th overall, while John Summers shot 185-200 to finish 11th in the Junior Section. The winner of the Skeet Individual Event was Sietiet from Denmark with 196-200. The Team's Event was won by America - 576-600.

The Olympic Trench Team had mixed fortunes — their scores were: Ellis 73, 69, 46 — 188-200; Burgess 69, 66, 47 — 182-200; Rumbel 69, 68, 49 — 186-200 and Henwood 69, 64, 44 — 177-200. The Team's event was won by Italy which scored 575-600. Australia's score was 547 which placed it ninth. The Individual Event was won by Azkue from Spain who shot 197-200.

After many arm wrestles and helpful coaching from Merv Lyons I discovered that it was not a mule I had grabbed by the tail but more a sport that had grabbed me (along with my wallet) and now it has a hold on me like a trap around a helpless rabbits

Since this introduction I have discovered that 'Have Gun Will Travel' and gradually you find yourself surrounded by friends and people who give you shooting tips, some times to a point of confusion. One also finds himself surrounded by cakes, biscuits and pots of tea - so there is much to be gained from this sport, especially in the waist area.

My main reason for writing to the editor is the confusion peo-ple put on their shooting. ONE MAN'S OPINION —

from Val Paral

(This comment appeared as the Editorial in the July issue of "Trap and Skeet", the magazine of Queanbeyan/Canberra Gun

This is the last issue of volume one; One year older but are we any wiser? Have we fulfilled the expectations? Is "Trap and Skeet" of any value to the Club, to the area and to the shooting sport in general? It is not easy to answer unless we share with you the goals we set out to reach when we started publishing "Trap and Skeet".

We operate on a meagre budget. This is not a drawback but a blessing in disguise. The Editor is free of influences which sometimes comes with sponsorship. For that freedom our advertisers deserve a firm handshake and thanks. Our appreciation also goes to the retiring committee, which with Gerry in the Chair, took the Editor on trust. The current committee gave your

Editor the nod for another year so — back to work.

In planning "Trap and Skeet" we hope to cement relationships between members and clubs. At times we have resorted to unorthodox thought provoking methods, which had a few people bamboozled. Nevertheless the method worked and last year witnessed improved communication between people who care about the sport, and without any false modesty we believe that "Trap and Skeet" played its part in a small way.

No amount of wishful thinking or propaganda could warm up the chill of interclub relations in this neck of the woods unless the various members of committees felt deep down in their hearts that co-operation is the key word for the future of our sport. The events of the last few weeks and the ideas discussed is the best news we have heard so far. They speak for the calibre of the men who set out to iron out their differences for the benefit of the rest of us.

During the year we occasionally touched on the love-hate relationship which exists between shooters and industries supplying shooters' needs. "Trap and Skeet" is dispatched by courtesy to all major companies with the hope that the shooter's point of

We hope to introduce a new kind of relationship, one based on respect and appreciation of mutual problems; A two way traffic on the exchanging of ideas and future planning. We are not blind to the benefit enlightened management can provide for the sport. Just look at Phillips and Soccer, Tooth and Yachting; This week 32 oarsmen and women leave for World Championships in Europe; And there is no promise on the part of the teams that they will exclusively drink KB. Compare that with our sport!

At the time of writing there is no news that our representative team will find a sponsor. There are a number of companies who would like to see themselves as the shooter's friend. Thousands of dollars are poured into advertising to convince us of that fact. Yet when the crunch comes the pretence of friendship is replaced by ominous silence. We can only assume that overseas representation is not a good advertising exercise which provides the kind of limelight where company reps. hand over a fist full of wads, mumble platitudes of co-operation, and grin for the photographer.

There is no direct benefit or return on the dollar spent, and yet any company with a bit of courage can make long lasting friends among the shooting fraternity, but to do that they would have to break out of their club - corporate thinking does not like to see one company gaining an appreciable advantage over another. But if one would come out, they all would come out, as staying behind is full of danger.

While the rest of the shooting world is enjoying an increased and imaginative patronage, our sport is being deprived of expansion by the withdrawal of humble privileges, not to mention the cost. The present climate in the community is against guns. The shooter of tomorrow may not even be able to travel with a gun in his car, he may not even be able to keep one at home. (There are many countries with such laws). Sooner or later all businesses will feel declining sales. Clubs like ours may ultimately become the haven of shooters and the only source of revenue for the industry. I can hear you saying "It will never happen here". It is already happening! The proposed restriction of firearm ownership is proposed in N.S.W. and may become a law shortly. It will hit the honest guy whose hobby happens to be guns. Now would it not be desireable for the industry to support

our growth and encourage us to promote our sport, instead of telling us that we are an insignificant portion of their trade, for their benefit as well as ours? Let's look at our standards, our ranges and club houses. We are labelled as an exclusive sport. Yet for every club house in bricks, there are three sheds made out of stringy bark and corrugated iron, is it because we are so lousy that we would not spend a dollar towards better amenities. or are we so simple that we prefer an Esky in our boot to a table and chair on a club verandah?

There is not one layout in this country which could successfully cater for the Nationals with say 800 shooters. That amount of people can be found in N.S.W. or Victoria without any trouble. To manage such a number, at least 15 traps would be required.

We think that the future points to co-operative affairs between several clubs, because there is not one club big enough or rich enough to pull it off on it's own. It is not easy to see where that kind of money comes from. The absence of professionally run ranges is clear evidence that there is not much return on capital for big business, otherwise they would have been at it years ago.

Do not be despondent friends. If every one of us becomes an ambassador of the sport among our friends; if everyone can help, with money or with a helping hand, then a lot can be achieved. We must learn to trust each other and learn how to serve the sport while we are enjoying it. We must convince our suppliers that it is in their interest as well as benefit to help. Naturally they will claim that they do this already. Our role is to present our point of view, which happens to differ with the current version. Primarily we as participants are responsible for the sport. The imaginative planning must come from within we must rely on self help and shake off the lethargy of today. By doing so we may even convince our business friends that we also mean business. We may indulge in criticism and a bit of bitching, but we have not stopped buying, and they know it!

Growth of membership is guaranteed income for the vested interest. We waive the spotters fee (as applied to the car industry) for more enlightened and intelligent consideration of the opportunities and challenge ahead of us - all of us.

DATELINE — **NEW ZEALAND**

As mentioned under the heading "Secretary's Notes", I am recovering from a recent trip to New Zealand. Although a number of our readers have made many Trans-Tasman trips, it appears that we are about to enter a period where the National Association is to become far more deeply involved in promoting Domestic and International travel, and because New Zealand is our closest International neighbour, it is logical that much of the development will occur in that direction.

The most enjoyable personal reward to come from the visit was the tremendous level of hospitality shown throughout the two islands of New Zealand. On the "business" side, it was very encouraging to see that at least individually, many of the top people in the New Zealand Clay Target Association are anxious to see a greater co-operation between the two countries which, in a shooting sense at least, are at the end of the world.

With Australia's desire to compete in International Clay Target matches increasing, and because 95% of our registered comnetitors have so far demonstrated a preference for DTL and American Skeet, it seems logical that official competition between "New Zealand and Australia" should be promoted.

New Zealand Clay Target Association Secretary Sid Hanson is a very "with-it" sports executive and together with his wife, Dianne, is running a pretty tight ship. Unfortunately unforeseen delays prevented a meeting with National President Colin Stott taking place, although I spoke to him by phone. Other people with whom quite fruitful discussions took place included John McMillan (well-known to most Australian shooters), Don Frewin (NZCTA Council Member), Ivan Boyce (Captain of the New Zealand contingent which attended the Australian 1977 Nationals), and Jack Claydon (President of Christchurch Gun Club), which is the venue for the N.Z. 1978 Nationals.

Before closing, I would like to share one or two personal experiences with our readers with the thought that the comments may help you at a later time. The first relates to the very professional but personal cabin service offered to passengers flying Air New Zealand. Although we have all heard it said many times that "they think of everything!", we now have proof — they do! The fact that Air New Zealand's Chief Executive Mr Maurie Davis is a keen clay target shooter also helps us to "identify" with the airline. Secondly a word of praise for the staff of Dominion Car Rentals is necessary. My family and I used Dominion vehicles in both islands and when we arrived at Wellington to fly to Christchurch, Wellington Airport was closed indefinitely due to poor weather. The assistance we received from Dominion's Wellington manager Bruce Harrison, had to be seen to be believed. There was more service to come when the car we had booked in Christchurch, which was also affected by a build-up of tourists due to airport closures, had to be ferried 400 km before it was delivered to us. Mark Fernandez and Kevin Watts were the Dominion guys who did all the work in Christchurch.

Now, to the No-No area - Wellington Airport should be avoided like the plague. Weather is so unpredictable that one can never be sure of getting out and the terminal facilities are so pathetic that there is no pleasure at all in being delayed there. The second No-No relates to the United Service Hotel in Christchurch. This hotel exudes old world charm and is delightfully appointed — one can still imagine long-gowned ladies of the early 1900's sweeping up the wide staircase to the immaculately set dining room. The hotel is situated right on Cathedral Square and its rooms provide a breathtaking view of the world-famous Christchurch Cathedral.

For all of this, it is also the most expansive speedway seat in the world. Because of the Airport problems mentioned earlier, our party arrived in Christchurch at 1.30 a.m. which meant it was 2 a.m. before we got to bed. For the rest of the night we were treated to a non-stop demonstration of "hot-rodding" as the local boys screeched around the square, lap after lap!

It is of interest to note that this was the most expensive accommodation we experienced - and we stayed at some very good places.

Back to shooting - the New Zealand Nationals will be held at Christchurch Gun Club from 1st April till 8th April 1978. A cordial invitation has been extended to us Aussies to attend. The Christchurch Gun Club has four skeet grounds, eight DTL



It was also great to see Peter Papps come down from Canberra. Peter addressed the team on behalf of the Australian Shooting Association, of which he is President, and the Australian Olympic Federation. The Victorian snipe season opens on Saturday, October 1.

And a reasonably obedient dog is an asset.

It will cover MANY times more ground than a shooter. And 90% of a shooter's time is spent in finding birds.

Sure, a dog flushes some that are out of range. But unless they are very touchy, they usually quickly settle again.

Besides, they are usually birds that the shooter would not have put up.

A dog is invaluable, too, in cover.

A snipe will often run at right angles to a shooter.

But a dog knows.

Just as a dog can follow a wounded bird. Or walk straight to a dead one.

I've had a dead bird on bare ground at my feet and been unable to see it.

But a dog smells it!

There's a place where I put up a pair of painted quail among stunted gums and knee-high scrub on successive visits last season.

When we were there a third time, the dog started to move carefully along a cattle track.

I reckoned he was on the yellow-shanked quail again. Especially when he worked 30 yards into a grass paddock where stubble quail were nesting.

I waited for the quail to get up, so I could get the dog back into the scrub when UP GOT A SNIPE.

When I fired, ANOTHER got up.

Yes, a dog sure is an asset.

Besides, shootin's not shootin' without a dog!

Session 7 Dangerous Wildlife Diseases, Foot and Mouth, Blue-

tongue, other wildlife diseases.

Set up and direct the National Coaching Scheme.

Supply coaching material to State Directors for use in their

Supply A.C.T.A. with an annual report on yearly activities.

State Director:

Zone their States and appoint a Zone Coach in each zone. In conjunction with the zone coach, appoint Club coaches (this may be deferred until complete requirement is assessed).

Supply the National Coaching Director with an annual report on progress and activities with a copy to the State Executive, or Association.

Zone Coaches:

Establish coaching rosters for their zones, run coaching classes and appoint Club coaches when suitable material can be

Send an annual report to the State Director with a copy to State Executor or Association.

The National Council should meet once a year, probably the A.C.T.A. Nationals would be the best venue, revue the years activities and forward a run down on the year's activities with any recommendation, to the A.C.T.A.

Some recommendations:

All correspondence to and from the National Director to be routed through the A.C.T.A. office. Club coaches to zone coach, zone coach to State Director.

The National Director will supply the State Councils with coaching material.

It must be realised that to be effective, coaching must be to a set standard - not a different set of ideas in every State or Zone.

It will be recommended that Clubs set aside days for practise, coaching and promotion, as many times a year as it is feasible.

(This plan has been devised by the National Coaching Director, Newton Thomas, and will be discussed by the National Executive at its meeting in September).
