

Secretary's Notes ----

Since the last issue of CTSN, a number of interesting developments affecting the future of the Australian Clay Target Association have occurred. Many of them are a direct result of the three day Executive Conference which was held in Sydney from 17th till 19th September.

Matters discussed at that meeting, together with a summary of the major decisions made, are noted in a separate report elsewhere in this magazine. However, this opportunity should be taken to announce the appointment of an official travel adviser to the Association. The adviser is Jetset Tours, which has offices in every Australian State and is the largest travel organisation in this country. Full details of the appointment are set out in a separate report.

The National Office staff is continuing to experience difficulty with mail deliveries, and Club Secretaries are requested to pay particular attention to closing dates for advertisements to appear in CTSN. Copy for advertisements must be **received** prior to 1st of month prior to month of issue — i.e. copy for January 1978 issue must be in National Office prior to 1st December, 1977. This means that Secretaries or Publicity Officers of the more remote Clubs should post copy about a week before the end of the month. It is important to note that for the first time, a January issue of CTSN will be published in 1978. This should improve the service for Clubs which intend to conduct major programs in January. Whereas previously, those Clubs had to advertise in a magazine which was distributed at the end of November, they will in future reap the benefit of having the program advertised in a "current" issue.

The National Office has received a number of requests to publish in CTSN a full list of registered members. To do this with our rapidly growing membership would be economic folly. There appears to be no benefit to be derived from the idea because these days **every** currently registered shooter **should** be in possession of an up-to-date handicap card, which he or she must produce on request.

It is interesting to note that presentation of current cards is widely policed in Western Australia — there are no growls from shooters and the grading system seems to be working very well as a result.

Speaking of registration cards, it is almost "that time of the year" again. Yes, it's time to be preparing to pay 1978 registration fees. The ACTA must be the only organisation in Australia where prices haven't gone up in the last twelve months, and at \$15, the annual registration fee has to be a bargain. Early payment will ensure issue of your new card in time for the 1978 'year — it also helps spread the work load as far as the office staff at your Club is concerned, and of course the National Office is assisted in a similar way. Whilst thinking about your own re-newal, give a moment's thought to which of your friends you want to do the favour of an introduction to clay target shooting. Remember, if each existing registered shooter could introduce one new member each year for the next five years, we would have close to 100,000 members at the end of 1982. Before rushing off and saying "our National Secretary has gone off his rocker!" stop and think. Such a figure is NOT impossible if we all adopt a very positive attitude — surely you have one friend you would like to share your sport with — it MAY be your wife or girl friend.


Dear Noel,

Executive Report —

The second series of meetings of the Executive Committee was held in Sydney commencing on Saturday September 17th and continued until late in the afternoon of Monday September 19th. A wide range of topics was discussed, including many of direct interest to shooters. The following is a summary of the topics discussed and the decisions made: 1. Nationals '78. As already advertised, the Association's

1978 National series will be held at the grounds of S.A. Gun Club in Adelaide from March 8th till March 15th. The sequence of events will be similar to that used at the 1976 and 1977 series. Major changes have occurred in the distribution of trophies and cash payments to placegetters, and full details will be an-nounced as soon as possible. However, it is possible to announce the following major additions to the trophy list

(a) IMI have donated a Franchi Model 520 Auto Shotgun (retail value \$730) to be presented to the 1978 National Double Bar-rel Champ. For some time, concern has been expressed that the winner of the "Blue Ribbon" event did not receive sufficient recognition and IMI have now put the matter right.

(b) Air New Zealand, for many years a strong supporter of clay target shooting in New Zealand will be sponsoring National Elimination Events in Australia next year.

The Air New Zealand sponsored Elimination Events will be the National Double Barrel C'ship, the National Single Barrel Championship and the Australian New Zealand Trap (Pointscore) Championship.

The Air New Zealand sponsorship includes trophies for the two competitors with the highest qualifying scores as well as a cash donation to the Association which will assist the Association in mounting the Australian challenge in Vandalia next August.

The competitor with the highest aggregate from each State will take his place in the team — six States equals a six-man team. Team members will be expected to confirm their availabili-- otherwise the place will be offered to the shooter from the ty same State who has the second highest aggregate over the "Air New Zealand Elimination" events.

(c) Placings in the National Skeet Championship have been extended to include first to tenth, and this move provides further incentives for "up and coming" skeet shooters.

Once again Winchester Australia has shown its great support for Clay Target shooting by continuing its policy of donating a Presentation Grade Winchester Trap Gun, a Browning Shotgun and a Beretta shotgun. As soon as details of the specific grade of the Browning and the Beretta are known, an announcement will be made in CTSN.

(d) In addition to the new trophy for the National Double Barrel C'ship, IMI has again donated a Franchi Under and Over to be presented to the winner of the National Skeet Championship and are continuing to promote women's competition by repeating their regular Ladies' Overall High Gun Award. The usual "Silver Australia's" will be presented to the various National Champions.

In 1977, Ern and Verlie Hawkins donated a crystal trophy for the winner of the Ladies Trap High Gun award, and this gesture was very much appreciated by the growing number of women participants. It will be repeated in 1978.

For the first time, both ends of the age scale will be en-couraged to compete at the 1978 Nationals. There will be a Junior (under 18 years) and a Veteran (over 65) Prize offered in each event. Additionally, the newly introduced "Veterans Ag-gregate Trophy", donated by Cec Herbert from Gunnedah, will be presented to the veteran competitor with the highest aggregate score over the National Double Barrel Championship, National Single Barrel Championship and Australia-New Zealand Trap (Pointscore) Championship (i.e. the events used as qualifying rounds for selection in the Mackintosh Team.)

Readers may recall that an announcement was made at the conclusion of the 1977 Nationals that future winners of the Australia-New Zealand Trap Championship would be presented with the new Perpetual Trophy donated by Bob Smith and Barry Kable of New South Wales. This trophy will be won for the first time in Adelaide.

Naturally, the increased trophy list has led to a small increase in nomination — the 1978 fees will be \$2 per event up on 1977.

All competitors who braved the chill winds at Brisbane Gun Club to attend the 1977 Presentation of Trophies will be pleased

to hear that the 1978 Presentation of Trophies will be conducted at an Official Dinner to be held on Wednesday March 15th. The venue is yet to be decided but interested competitors, their families and friends are assured of an excellent night and a lot of funt

2. Constitutional Revision. Of equal importance (many would say of greater importance) was the discussion on revision of the Association's Articles of Association - more conveniently called the Constitution. The purpose of the current revision is to update the present Constitution, making provision for State As-sociations, and also providing for a smaller stronger Executive Committee. Current business trends suggest that meaningful decisions can be more readily arrived at with a small group, and the Association is entering a period of growth where it must employ proven commercial business principles to maintain its position in the recreation scene.

State Associations are (excepting in Queensland) now well established and are geared to look after each State's interests in Clay Target shooting. Queensland is rapidly "bridging the gap" and should have a State Association within a month or two. Once this happens the stage is set for the Constitutional changes to be implemented and it is hoped to put the changes before the 1978 Annual General Meeting. Time is short and everything will need to run smoothly if we are to achieve this objective. An extensive educational program will be necessary to fully acquaint each of the registered shooters with the reasons for the proposed changes, together with the benefits which should accrue.

Executive Member Roy Holtfreter has kindly offered to prepare some explanatory notes, and the first of these appears elsewhere in this issue of CTSN. Please devote some time to trying to understand the changes - in this way, we will see the results of a responsible vote when the changes are presented to an Annual General Meeting.

Financial Planning. The National Secretary presented a Financial Report which showed that the Association has made quite a dramatic recovery from the liquidity problems which beset it late in 1976. However, inflation continues and this factor, in addition to the extensive development plans that the Association is embarking upon, will necessitate consideration being

given to increasing registration fees in 1979. (NOTE — THERE IS NO FEE INCREASE IN 1978 — THAT IS RIGHT, THE 1978 REGISTRATION FEES REMAIN AT THE SAME LEVEL AS 1977. WHERE ELSE CAN YOU FIND 1978 PRICES THE SAME AS THEY WERE ON 1st JANUARY 1977?)

The recommendation being submitted to the 1978 Annual General Meeting is that Registration Fees be increased to the following levels (for 1979).

Full adult fee		. \$	20
2nd Family member (at common address)	 	 .\$	10
Junior fee			
Subscriber to magazine	 	.\$	10

It will be noticed that a strong incentive is still provided for family units to become registered shooters - for \$33 per annum (from 1st January 1979) a family of two parents and three juniors can have "membership" of Australia's best Sports Association.

On the expenses side, controls imposed by your Executive Committee are producing results, and the Association will finish the current year with levels of expenditure noticeably lower than the levels recorded in 1976. As predicted at the last Annual General Meeting, 1977 has been a year of re-establishment of the Australian Clay Target Association.

It should be noted that no changes are proposed in the levels of Club Affiliation fees in the foreseeable future.

Empty Cartridge Cases ---- Control at Nationals. The matter of policy determining the fate of fired cartridge cases at National Championships was discussed at some length as it was appreciated that past policies have seriously discriminated against users of self-loading shotguns. The matter has been resolved in such a way that, in future competitors at Nationals using this type of firearm will be issued with a special identity card which when suitably completed, will entitle the bearer to recover an appropriate number of fired cases from the ACTA stock. It re-mains a rule of the competition that ALL FIRED CASES ON THE SHOOTING TRACKS ARE THE PROPERTY OF THE ACTA. In-

Personnel structuring of the new business shows lan Cook as General Manager, Jeff Wain as Deputy General Manager and Don Hobill as Marketing Manager.





Association Plans Constitutional Reform Roy Holtfreter explains

Further to the recent Executive Meeting held in Sydney I wish to inform all shooters per medium of Clay Target Shooting News of matters concerning the proposed updating and alterations to our Constitution.

My reason for this is, it was made known to me that since our previous meeting, where the main changes were accepted by our National Executive Committee almost unanimously, and our last A.G.M. where I explained the proposals, some opposition has developed.

I commend the fact that shooters generally are prepared to debate the issues confronting us all in promoting our sport, getting this organisation the standing it deserves in the community, and out of the low ebb it attained in the not too distant past. The proposed alterations to the Constitution are part of the plan to achieve this end. I do not believe at this point of time shooters generally have been given the opportunity to study the propo als or the reasoning behind them and for this purpose it has been decided to publish them, I hope at the same time as this letter. I reiterate that the alterations are still supported by a majority of your National Executive, and give notice that it is intended to place the proposals before the Annual General Meeting in Adelaide.

The principal aim of this total proposal is to get the ordinary shooting member more involved in our organisation. To this end it has been made a pre-requisite of each State or Territory to form an Association in the manner referred to later. Please note that where the term 'State' has been used this would include a designated territory if not contained within another State. Further, these Associations will be broken down into zones for the purpose of local administration, but each Club will have representation on the State body.

Be assured that no attempt is being made to prevent Club members having their say at an Annual General Meeting, as is the position at present, and this will be specifically written into the Constitution. It therefore follows that a Club or individual who feels that they have made known a matter through their Delegate on the State Executive without success and still consider it worthy of attention, can discuss the point at the National level, if they so desire.

To give members a greater understanding of what is pro-posed, the following are the motions submitted and accepted by your Executive Committee, together with the end result of the change:-

"That individual Clubs be required to be members of ap-(1)proved State Associations as a pre-requisite to membership of the A.C.T.A.

This would ensure that:- A State Association would have to be formed in each State, and that all Clubs within that State would have to become members of the appropriate State Association and have full voting rights.

It is suggested that each State should form itself into workable zones, not exceeding 4, and at the A.G.M. of that Association a State Executive would be elected consisting of nine members. (2) "That the right to vote at general meetings of the A.C.T.A.

be restricted to nine delegates as nominated by each Association.

Thus at a general meeting of the A.C.T.A. there would be, at present, a total of 54 Delegates with the right to vote, plus the resident of the A.C.T.A. who would have a casting vote.

This ensures that those responsible for the administration of our sport at State level would have the opportunity to express their views at National level and carry out the instructions of the various Clubs from within each State. On the whole I consider these State Delegates would be better informed and more prepared to make proposals and decisions affecting our sport. Naturally, those States in which the majority of individual Clubs are situated would have their voting rights at the A.G.M. reduced to a common level. However, at the A.G.M's I have attended, the majority of Clubs are not represented, and many of those who are, by proxies, sometimes far removed from the Club and only acting to procure a vote for the purpose of elections, e.g. BRISBANE 1977.

Of approximately 250 Clubs affiliated only 96 were represented at the 1977 A.G.M. of which 17 Clubs had official delegates whose Club of registration was not the Club for which they were acting as delegate.

I submit to you that the proposed alterations remove the need for this if it was ever required and point out that this same situation does not occur at State Association meetings which, in my opinion, is the appropriate place for members to promote their Clubs and seek the support of their State Executive Committee in order to promote any proposals or voice any grievances they may have.

"That the representation on the A.C.T.A. Executive Com-mittee for the States of N.S.W., Victoria and Queensland (3) be reduced from four delegates each to two delegates each.'

Such an amendment would reduce the number of A.C.T.A. Executive members from 18 to 12, a more realistic number if it is considered that the existence of properly constituted State As-sociations and their closer liaison with individual Clubs, must reduce the work load on the National Executive Committee and leave it to handle those matters of National importance, i.e. policy, etc. Too often in the past in my opinion our Executive has been forced to discuss issues which should have been resolved by the Club or State Association. A side effect also of the above is that a noticeable reduction would be effected in the cost of running your Executive Meetings. I believe we are past the time when it was considered necessary by some to have close access to an Executive member so as to promote their own ideas, and would like to see such proposals duly considered by zones and States before being submitted to the National body, and the above alterations would ensure this would happen.

Further amendments are proposed but these are only changes to numbers, dates, places, etc., and a general modernising of the Constitution, as suggested by our advisers. These changes will be pointed out, in detail prior to the meeting, for your consideration.

To summarise, the following would be the proposed administrative structure of the A.C.T.A .:-

A.C.T.A. PRESIDENT

A.C.T.A. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

To consist of 12 members plus the A.C.T.A. President. (Two members from each State elected at the A.G.M. of that State). A.C.T.A. GENERAL MEETINGS

To consist of A.C.T.A. President, A.C.T.A. Executive Committee plus members of State Association Executive Committees. Total of 55.

The nine delegates from each State being:-

State Association President; two National Executive Committee Delegates; plus a State Executive Committee consisting of one member from each zone and the balance from the floor to a total of nine. STATE ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

To consist of President, two A.C.T.A. Executive Committee Delegates, one Delegate from each zone. The balance from the Club Delegates, to a total of nine as above.

STATE ASSOCIATION GENERAL MEETING To consist of Executive Committee plus further Delegates from each Club so that each Club has two Delegates, provided that in the event that one Club has two Delegates on State Executive Committee, then allowed that number and no more.

In closing I wish to ask all shooters to study these proposals carefully and consider the advantages which will accrue at the National level. Believe me they are nothing new and very similar alterations were proposed by a former Executive member and Past President in Mr Gordon Hall about four years ago, but this is the first time your Executive has been prepared to accept that the proposals are good for the Association generally and vote accordingly.

I sincerely hope that when the time comes shooters will attend the A.G.M. in Adelaide and give their support also.

Part 2 - MECHANICS 1

We looked last month at the raw materials available in Australia that enabled us to put our shotshells back together. Before we actually discuss the making of a reload it is most important that we look at the machinery available to us to do the job.

Obviously the most important piece of equipment is the reloading press. Now, there are a bewildering array of shotshell reloading presses on the market, and they come in all sorts of shapes and sizes, from the simplest with a small capacity per hour to the most elaborate which can turn out over a thousand reloads per hour.

Broadly speaking, presses fall into one of two categories, either a 'single stage' or a 'multi stage' or 'turret' press. The single stage press is one where you take the empty hull and perform each operation on it until you have a completed reload. In their various types, from the simplest to the more complicated you can expect to load from around 50 to 200 loads per hour.

A large increase in production can be, and is possible with a multi stage or turret press. This type of press incorporates all the mechanical operations into one pull of the handle. Once the turret is full every pull of the handle gives you a completed shell. Depending on how many people are working together on this type of press you can turn out from 400 to in excess of 1200 reloads per hour. This type of press is in essence a more complicated and more expensive press than the simpler types.

Before we go any further into the presses themselves, let us look at the steps in the reloading process.

- 1. Re-size
- 2. De-cap
- 3. Re-prime
- 4. Load powder
- 5. Seat Wad
- 6. Load Shot
- 7. Start Crimp
- 8. Finish Crimp


These eight separate mechanical operations are necessary each time you reload a shotshell. The reloading press contains all the tooling required for these operations. This tooling is arranged differently on each make of press, but you may rest assured that on every press on the market today, all the tooling is there. In some cases it is arranged in a circular manner, on others in a straight line. The layout is of not much consequence as long as the press works and works efficiently.

A Simple Mechanical Operation.

As mentioned last month, there is nothing mysterious about loading shotshells, it is a simple mechanical operation. I have had told to me on more than one occasion that this or that press is no good for this or that empty. What a load of bull this is. A reloading press is a mechanical tool and when adjusted correctly will turn out a reloaded shell that will perform as well as any factory load on the market. Before I am deluged with letters on this point may I qualify the statement a little. It is most important that the reloader knows what he is doing when he pulls the handle. If he does know, he can adjust his press to give optimum results. So often I see shoddy reloads that could have been made perfect by a simple adjustment of the press. To help you understand the operations of the reloading process let us examine each step on its own.

1 & 2: Resize and decap on older style presses these two operations were separate. One had a separate resizing die and after the hull was resized the old primer was pushed out. Modern presses however have combined these two operations in most cases with a resultant saving in time.

Mechanically, all you do is force a resizing die down the full length of the empty which squeezes the head of the shell back to the right diameter. At the same time a punch lowers through the centre of the shell and forces the spent primer out of its pocket. Some other important things also happen during this operation. The decapping punch is usually the right size to push out any mishapen kinks in the hull and the resizing die and the recap-



ping punch if correctly adjusted make sure that the base of the hull is perfectly flat. The decapping punch as a rule is floating and when the handle is returned to normal, a cam or stop activates the punch to eject the resized shell. Adjustment at this stage is limited to making sure that when the press is in the fully closed position that the resizing die has gone right to the bottom of the head of the shell, in other words right to the rim.

3. Reprime: This operation is very simple but again press adjustment must be watched. Most of the simple presses have a spring loaded primer seater. The operation consists of dropping a primer into the recess provided, place the empty on the seating station and lower the punch to press the primer into the pocket. If the punch is set too shallow you will not push the primer in far enough, too deep and you will dish the bottom of your shell which will cause misfires. Adjust the seating punch so that the primer is correctly seated when the handle is in the full down position.

4. Load Powder: We now come to the centre station on most presses where the most important operations are carried out. The first is the dropping of the powder charge. On top of the press are your powder and shot containers. These containers are connected to the drop tube by the charge bar. The charge bar contains two holes, one for your powder charge and one for your shot charge. By the simple process of moving this bar from one side to the other you drop a predetermined VOLUME of powder into the shell, through the drop tube. You will notice that I emphasise the word VOLUME, we will come back to this later when we get around to loading our first shells.

Most presses these days use powder bushes which allow you

to select the right size bush to give you the correct amount of powder for the load that you want. Some presses however do have a separate charge bar for each load combination, whilst others have adjustable charge bars, more about this later when we discuss the advantages and disadvantages of all these systems.

5. Seat Wad: If you look at the crimp end of a fired shotshell you will notice that the crimp folds back in slightly. This is known as a crimp memory and the problem that it poses is that it makes the insertion of a new wad rather difficult. This is overcome on the modern press by the use of a wad guide. In most cases the wad guide is attached to the press and on some of the more elaborate types swings out for ease of operation. On the very simple presses the wad guide is separate. All the wad guide does is exactly what its name implies. it guides the wad into the shell when it is pushed down by the drop tube. It is simply a set of metal or plastic fingers which sit inside the top of the shell and stop the skirt on the bottom of the wad from catching on the top of the case. Adjustment of the drop tube for the correct wad seating depth is required. This is a subject that we will go into at some length when we discuss the loading of our first shells, as it is a most important point.

6. Load Shot: The simple movement of the charge bar back to its original position drops a correct measure of shot into the shell, and as a rule no adjustment is necessary at this stage, just commonsense. Make sure that the drop tube is inside the mouth of the case when you drop the shot.

7. Star Crimp: Most presses these days have self aligning crimp starters. In simple terms all this means is that a floating die aligns itself with the crimp memory. Adjust this station to push the crimp in until there is only about one eight opening at the mouth of the shell.

8. Finish Crimp: Here is the culmination of the reloading process. Correct adjustment at this station is critical to both the finish and performance of your shell. Most presses these days have two adjustments on the crimp finishing die. Firstly there is a plunger in the middle that pushes the crimp into the finished position. This plunger must be adjusted so that it finishes the crimp to just the right depth, and you will see how important this is when we look at the crimp later. The second operation is one where a slight taper is applied to the front of the shell. Most modern machines have this facility and it makes the shell look that much better in appearance apart from obvious advantages gained in feeding with auto loaders and pumps.

So there they are, eight distinct steps, all necessary in the loading of a shotshell. I have looked at these steps in the context of using a single stage press and obviously there are some variations on a theme. Multi stage or turret presses sometimes have automatic primer feeding and different charge bar configerations and occasionally a final resizing is carried out after the crimp is applied.

Reloading Presses

There are a lot of very good presses available in Australia. The thing to remember when buying a press is to look at them all. Your choice will depend on what you are looking for both from the price and the capacity angle. A good idea if your pocket can stand it, is to buy a press with more capacity than you need at the time of purchase, because rest assured as you start reloading you will shoot more and you will find that your shell usage will jump quite considerably.

Accessories

Apart from the reloading press there are on the market a range of accessories that improve the efficiency of shotshell reloading. An essential accessory is a set of powder scales. To the serious reloader these are a must. There are many brands on the market and all will do the job.

A "Case Conditioner" is a useful tool and it was mentioned in part 1. Whilst it is not essential it does relieve the pressure and wear and tear on some of the lighter constructed presses. For trap and skeet shooters or others that load a lot of shells it is a very useful tool.

Two other handy pieces of equipment that I have found to be most helpful are the "Casegard 100" and the MEC "Ezy Pack." Both help to keep the reloading bench tidy. Untidyness is the enemy of efficient reloading. The Casegard 100 can be used for two things, one to rack up empties on one side of the press with one tray and the other tray used for the finished reloads. The "Ezy Pack" does the same thing for reloaders who pack their shells into original boxes. As the finished shells come from the **CONTINUED ON PAGE 60**

The Biggs Show at Sunshine Coast

Although Saturday's attendance was not as large as expected, those that did attend were helped tremendously. Apart from local members, shooters from Gympie, Murgon, Kallangur, Toogoolawah, and Brisbane were there also.

The subject matter for the Seminar was as follows:-

Open seminar with a talk on the theory of shotgun shooting. This discussion will cover subjects such as:

Selecting the proper type of gun, Suitable barrel lengths and barrel choke, Shot sizes and suitable cartridges,

Shot velocities

The need to establish "lead" when we shoot at fast moving targets, and how we must go about establishing "lead".

The correct mental picture to have in mind when we call for our target.

Proper stance, proper swing and correct hold on the trap house before we call.

The right position for the gun butt on one's shoulder.

Questions invited.

The importance of proper gun fit,

Gun fit troubles,

Drop at the comb,

Position of eye in relation to barrel rib,

How the shooter's build will alter his gun holding position.

Correct position of butt on shoulder,

Cast on and cast off, etc, etc.

Questions are invited on the above.

On completion of discussion, questions covering all details of shooting will be invited.

In order to illustrate all details most clearly, we will use visual aids such as wall charts and sketches also a black board if available. Perhaps the score board could be put to use.

Following the above exercises we spend the rest of our time on the shooting ground under coaching instruction.





Due to a mishap George was unable to do practical instruction on the tracks Sunday morning as planned, however he spent several hours fitting guns and doing temporary adjustments to gun stocks.

George had charts which showed the problems involved in having incorrect gun fit; suitable types of guns for clay target shooting, barrel lengths, chokes, etc.; and stressed the need to have correct length of stock as well as proper eye level above the rib.

It was soon apparent that numerous guns were in need of adjustment because of too much drop at the comb. George explained that this low comb position causes low shooting on the target. This is one of the most common faults of bad fitting.

During practical shooting instruction on the tracks it was

necessary to make temporary modifications on a number of guns in order to get the shooters proper elevation.

Questions frequently asked concerned correct stance. George pointed out that a position should be adopted that is comfortable to the shooter and enables one to move freely and comfortably in a 90° angle with 85% of the body weight on the front leg.

Another frequently asked question was where the gun should be pointed prior to calling for the target? It was advised by George that different positions are held from each lane.

George stressed the importance of complete concentration on each target.

The club is very grateful to have George's services for the Seminar and as a result 3 members have now made enough progress to become Club coaches, who will be able to assist new shooters as they come to our club, and we will be availing ourselves of George's coaching ability again in the not to distant future, so he will be able to keep an eye on our progress.

The Club also thanks George for his kind donation of a Perpetual Trophy which will be used as a District Champion of Champions trophy.

We also take this opportunity to express our gratitude to . George and his wife Betty for making the effort of attending and sharing our hospitality.

TRAPSHOOTING... with Elgin Gates

I HAVE mentioned before that manufacturers build guns for Mr Average Man, hopefully coming up with a rifle or shotgun that anyone can use. To a great extent this holds true. I can pick up virtually any rifle made, put it to my shoulder, adjust my face against the stock to line up the sights and fire a fairly accurate shot. It may require putting the butt higher or lower on my shoulder, canting my head sideways or crawling along the stock to line up the sights, but the point is, I can adjust myself within reasonable limits to the gun.

Military rifles are a prime example of guns that are made to fit everybody. I have a U.S. .30 calibre M-1 carbine among my muskets. Everytime I pick it up I get the feeling that the military experts designed it for a dwarf. The stock is at least four inches short and the comb a good inch low.

Gun fit is almost entirely a matter of stock dimensions, and it is certainly more enjoyable to own and use a rifle or shot gun with a properly fitted stock. Competitive shooters are well aware of the advantages of proper stock fit so as not to put undue strain on shoulder or neck muscles during a long match.

Stock fit on shotguns, contrary to popular belief, is even more critical than rifles. Field models (and skeet models too) usually come with a low comb that slopes down to the butt. The reason for this is to allow the shooter to bring the gun up to his face from a low position and quickly line the sights up for a fast wing shot. But with wide diversity in the shape of human faces and different physical measurements, very few guns out of the box are a perfect fit for anyone.

For down-the-line clay target shooting it is extremely important to have the gun, whatever its make, precisely fitted to the individual. Otherwise the shooter is severely handicapped before firing his first shot.

At any trap shoot you can see shooter after shooter contorted into unnatural positions trying to compensate for a gun that doesn't fit their particular dimensions. This, in turn, creates many other problems, none of which are conducive to good shooting.

Here's a simple test for trap gun fit: (repeat it several times to make sure you are doing it correctly). Stand in a natural shooting position, holding the gun at waist level. Then close both eyes and bring the gun up solidly against your face into shooting position. Now slide the gun back against your shoulder in a comfortable position with no strain or forcing. Now open your eyes. What you see is called the "sight picture".

If you are looking directly along the barrel at the two beads on the rib, and they are lined up and stacked with the front bead on top of the rear bead — like the figure "8" — the gun is virtually a perfect fit. Almost all factory trap guns have higher combs than field or skeet models, and if you can see part of the rib between the beads, you will shoot high, or over the target, one of the most common faults in trapshooting.

To compensate for this kind of improper fit, many a shooter grinds his face down onto the stock or even cants his head trying to get his eye low enough to stack the beads. This opens a Pandora's box of troubles. Recoil begins to bruise the face, which brings on "flinching," an involuntary jerky movement of the gun in anticipation of pain from recoil. The remedy is to have the comb cut down to the correct height.

But if the beads are buried or blotted out by the receiver when you open your eyes, then you will shoot low and the comb must be built up.

If you open your eyes and find that the front bead is considerably to the *left* or the *right* of the rear bead, then the stock needs "cast-off" or "cast-on", meaning it has to be bent to the right or left by a special process or by removing or adding material to the side of the comb.

The bonus of a properly fitted stock is to virtually eliminate recoil as a problem; a big factor when you shoot 200 or more rounds in a day, not to mention shoot-offs. Another bonus of a perfectly fitted stock is that you can "stay in the gun," meaning that the gun will still be in position firmly against your face with the figure "8" sight picture exactly the same after the first shot is fired. This allows a well-aimed second shot to be fired if needed. The importance of this in double-barrel and double-rise shooting should be obvious to anyone.

In the U.S. I have seen many shooters with their face three or four inches off of the stock when firing the second shot at doubles. They have come "out of the gun," and are just shooting in the general direction of the second target without the slightest idea of where the shot is going. There are a number of other important details that go into shooting good scores at clay targets which will be discussed in future columns, but a properly fitted stock is first and foremost, without which, nearly everything else is a lost cause.


All ranges for rifle, pistol and moving target are in one single line of ranges facing north. They are separated by 3 metre high cement block walls. Background is low wooded hills. There were no overhead baffles in use.

Accommodation for team members





"Spin Dry" Fox



If you reckon that's a fox the fellow in the photograph is sw-inging . . . you're DEAD RIGHT!

As a trap-shooter, John Green, 46, of the Korumburra G.C. (Vic.) is different.

He misses VERY few targets.

He's the same with foxes; he gets them when nobody else can. He and his brother, Bill, use den dogs, and can get on to South Gippsland dairy and beef farms where a pack of hounds or spotlight shooters would not be entertained.

Besides, there is no scrub on such farms; the foxes live underground.

Most times the animals with the \$20 skins are not forced out of the holes by the Greens' Jack Russell terriers.

The fox props somewhere along the tunnel or in an off-shoot.

Whereupon Greenie puts his ear to the ground, binpoints the yapping terriers, and digs a neat (later filled in) metre-deep hole down on to the fox.

A rope is slipped around its front or back leg; it is pulled out and given the coup-de-gras on the back of the shovel.

There are also times when up to three bolt out to Greenie, his nephew Malcolm or Greenie's sons, all waiting with autos!

They get 200-250 each season, which brings in more than the Greens' cows do, during the winter.

INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

The ISU Sub-Committee of the ACTA has approved conditions for qualifying rounds for selection of 1978 teams for the Com-monwealth Games (Edmonton, Canada - August) and the World Championships (Korea - September). The following is an extract from the minutes of the meeting:

3. General Business.

3.1 International Team Selection

3.1.1. Terminology. The Sub-committee decided to dis-continue the use of the term "Elimination Matches" and in future will refer to "Qualifying Rounds"

- Commonwealth Games Canada 1978. World Championships Korea 1978. 3.1.2

In view of the short time interval between the above competitions (approx 6 weeks), it was agreed that the same series of Qualifying Rounds will be used for selection.

3.1.3 To comply with ASA requirements, the Qualifying Rounds will be:

- (a) Minimum 400 targets Maximum 600 targets.
 (b) To be conducted in 200 target matches.
- Matches to be conducted over 2 or 3 consecutive days. (c)
- (d) Only 15 trap trench and approved ISU skeet layouts to be used.
- (e) In the event of a shooter competing over more than 600 targets - for example he may compete in 4 x 200 target selection rounds - his worst scoring 200 series round/s may be discarded by the Executive ISU Sub-committee in determining final selections.
- The final Qualifying Round Matches for 1978 International (f) Selections will be conducted as part of the South Pacific Regional Competitions at Melbourne Gun Club over Easter 1978.
- (g) The responsibility for final selection of the Shotgun Team members will rest solely with the ACTA ISU Sub-committee Executive.
- All performance records and final team recommenda-(h) tions must a completed and in the hands of the ASA by 28/4/78.
- Selections will be notified by ASA 6/5/78.
- Commonwealth Games Rules require 2 shooters. World Championships Rules require 4 shooters. Thus of the final 4 selected in Melbourne, the top 2 will compete in the Commonwealth Games and then go to Korea for the World Championships.
- (k) All team members will be required to sign indemnity forms which specify competitor responsibility and team management authority.
- Results of all qualifying rounds must be forwarded to the National Secretary within 7 days of completion of rounds. A standard summary form will be supplied to all Clubs conducting Qualifying Rounds by the National Secretary. Failure of Clubs to comply with the above requirements will adversely affect a competitor's chance of selection.
- (m) In addition to the specified Qualifying Rounds, the ACTA Exec. ISU Sub-committee reserves the right to invite specific individual shooters to compete in Qualifying Matches.
- (n) In the light of the time schedule refer f & h (above) State ISU Sub-committees are required to determine timing schedules for International Qualifying Rounds without delay and to advise the National Office of the proposed schedules - submitting alternative dates where practicable.

From a practical viewpoint there are only 6 months left in which to plan and conduct the series, therefore prompt action is required by the States and by the National Executive Sub-committee in approving schedules.

The National Sub-committee requires the Schedules to ensure avoidance of clashing of qualifying series e.g. to avoid Melbourne and Canberra conducting Series on the same weekend.

3.1.4. Advertising ACTA Exec. ISU Sub-committee will re-quire Clubs conducting approved Qualifying Bounds, to advertise same in CTSN. At least one month prior to the scheduled competition date. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 24**

This tour is being arranged on what is called a "group tour basis" to give you the best possible fare and we recommend that those who would like to participate in this tour, in fact even if you anticipate you may be able to go, please record your name with us right away. All names that we hold will be given priority booking situation; at the same time, in submitting your name as a prospective tour participant you are under no obligation, no deposit is required at the moment.

Similarly, Jetset are also preparing tours from Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne, for New Zealand next April, and again if you would like to record your name as a prospective participant you will be given the privilege of having a priority booking recorded on your behalf. Just to show you how efficient we are, we are also having Jetset prepare an itinerary for Korea and Japan with the possibility of continuing on to Europe, for later next year. Similarly, you can also record your name for this particular tour, which will take in the 1978 World Championships.

Just to complete the travel scene, Jetset are in the process of making arrangements for the South Australian Nationals, March 8-15 1978, but more about this later.

2 YEARS HARD WORK establishes club we're proud of —

says Sunshine Coast Gun Club Secretary, Bev Grice.

As a result of advertisements placed in the local papers and on the radio, the first meeting was held in February 1975, initiating a shoot on a private property near Caloundra. Following the interest shown by the attendance at this shoot, another meeting was held to form a steering committee, which approached the

Local Council regarding suitable land. Several areas were suggested and the site at Pierces Avenue was chosen, as it had easy access, was relatively flat for approx. 500yds, and was outside the town planning area.

The next meeting held saw the election of the first committee and procedure to affiliate the Club and its members got under way. The first Club shoot was programmed for the 4th May 1975, so a hasty working-bee was held and the first temporary trap house was built, a hand trap was loaned by one of the members and so as the photos show the first shoot commenced. A lot of targets got away that day, however the fun and the fellowship which developed assured members of many happy shooting hours to come.

It was decided to hold regular monthly shoots on the 3rd Sunday monthly. As membership increased we found it necessary to erect another temporary trap house, and another hand trap was loaned. So we continued for several months like this, until a couple of members made another hand trap with a solonoid release, which eliminated shooters having to shout "PULL" to be heard in the trap house.

This trap was used for several months also and then was replaced by an electric trap, also hand made, and although it had its share of break downs, etc., and sometimes threw continental targets, we were shooting and the bank balance was growing.

By March 1976 we had 63 members including five women. During 1976 we purchased the first White Flyer, and installed two steel trap houses. Some members constructed wooden moulds while others filled these with concrete, making our shooting blocks. Meanwhile regular working-bees were held, at which the chain saws started into the trees in the background although there are still many left to cut, there is a remarkable difference from when we started.

A double garage was erected — this serves as canteen, bar and store room. Another smaller shed was erected and this is used as the nomination shed. With the generous loan of an electric trap from Murgon Gun Club, we conducted two 2-day shoots in 1976, and both were very successful.

However 1977 has seen many changes in our Club, starting with \$2000.00 being spent on ground work. The trap houses were lifted out and the graders etc., levelled out the entire area down to the trap houses. The trap houses were then put back, now in their permanent positions, and a third trap house built of concrete blocks was erected, thus giving us now three down the line trap layouts. Concrete shooting lanes were then poured, with walk ways on the 11m-16m-25m mark. Fencing replaced ropes at the rear of the layouts and another area was fenced for a children's play area, complete with swings, sandpits, etc. The Club also hires a woman to supervise the children on Club shoot days, thus leaving parents free to enjoy the days shooting and socialising.

A kitchen sink, cupboards and refrigerator have all been donated by various members and the club purchased a gas stove hence making work a little easier for the ladies working in the canteen.


We still operate with generators for our electricity, kindly loaned each shoot by various members. It's gestures like these that have brought our club to the standard it is today.

We still have many things left to do and the next major task is the installation of a septic toilet and shower block. Then of course we all dream of our Club House which one day will eventuate but for now, we are happy to be shooting, and hope to continue to extend our hospitality and good sportsmanship to all shooters who visit our club.

We have purposely with-held using any names in this story, as to omit even ONE name would be very regretable, so it is to each and every member both past and present, who has had any connection with the building of this club, that all credit is due, in making this THE SUNSHINE COAST GUN CLUB, the club we are PROUD OF.


Sunshine Gold Coast G.C. - After Two Years



Looking east on new Sunshine Coast lay-out.





COLLECTORS' COLUMN with Paul Gribben (Cosgrove Gun Club

MARTINI SYSTEM SINGLE SHOT RIFLE

When a rifle system is used over a period of 100 years and still has a big following, it has to be good, and thus regarded as one of the giants of the gun world.

Firstly, known as the Peabody, invented by one Henry Peabody of Boston, United States of America, who patented the design away back in 1862. He designed it first with a long nosed hammer which reached over the action to strike the firing pin; later he redesigned it to look very much like the familiar Martini with its under lever action, strong swinging block and .450 centre fire cartridges.

In submitting the rifle to the War Authorities, it was rejected out of hand as not suitable for Military purposes. Probably because of a national tendency to favour rifles of greater fire power found in repeating arms which were just emerging.

Later, the Peabody at a trial where some 50 rifles were given a torture test i.e. 10 days out in the rain with liberal hosings, then covered with snow and later dust, then thawed out and fired without cleaning, the Peabody and three others were left.

In the strength test the Peabody as were the other remaining three, were loaded up with 120 grns of black powder (normal loading 85 grs.) on top of which were placed five .450 bullets.

Only the Peabody survived to undergo the accuracy test which finalised the trial; but for some strange reason, this rifle was turned down in favour of the Sharps rifle which had seen service in the Civil War and had just been redesigned by R. S. Lawrence to handle the centrally primed metallic cartridge in many large calibres.

Peabody set up a gun making Company called the Providence Tool Co. of Providence Rhode Island, which started making the rifle firstly for Military orders which came only sparingly, those that were made were of top quality and most of them found their way to England, Switzerland, France, Denmark and Turkey, these users of the Peabody had a very high regard for the rifle, as a shooter could get off six shots per minute and easily shoot a horse at 1000 yards, both feats surpassing anything ever used before.

The Swiss people being a nation of riflemen and craftsmen knew a good thing when they saw one, and soon set to work on the rifle.

At this time, Frederick Von Martini came up with some improvements by changing the inside cocking and firing mechanism.

In 1869 he took the revised rifle to England where it captured the attention of the Military authorities, they combined it with the Henry barrel and England had the Martini Henry rifle.

From then on, the name of Peabody was lost, and few people have ever seen or heard of such a rifle.

England adopted the rifle in 1871 gradually dropping the Snider which had served temporarily; they made many variations of the Martini in .450 .577 calibre, in long rifle, carbines for artillery and cavalry, many were changed to up to date ammunition. When .303 cartridges were developed, they saw service with the British armies in many quarters of the World until the coming of the Lee Enfield bolt action rifle in 1889.

The Swiss kept pegging away at refining the rifle, and in 1883 developed a copper jacketted bullet in the calibre of 7.5 mm Swiss, and built the combination into a remarkable rifle. They fitted double set triggers and massive stocks which are characteristic of this type of Target rifle and began to make scores never heard of before.

The double set triggers are essential for standing position shooting over all ranges, giving the fast release once on target.

1977 National Trench Championship

We went back to Brisbane the other day to shoot some Trench I'm happy to say, though some people had commented the layout was dead we proved that they talked through a hole in their head, the targets were fine, though sly as a fox thanks to Taree-Wingham and their scramble box.

tending competitors should note that filling in any entry form implies acceptance of the rules of the competition.

* * * * * * * * * * 5. Suspension of Registration. At the request of the Committee of the Toowoomba Gun Club, the 1977 registration of shooter P. Hattingh M/N 11272, of Toowoomba has been suspendent the National Of pended until such time as advice is received at the National Office that the present dispute between the Club and the shooter has been resolved. This action was taken in accordance with clause 34(d) of the Association's Articles. This action has the immediate effect of debarring Mr Hattingh from competing in any events conducted by member Clubs of the ACTA.

6. New "Members" Bonus. In this context "members" really mean registered shooters — from October 1st 1977, honorary membership for the balance of 1977 will be extended to all new members (registered shooters) who pay their 1978 fees. In sim-ple terms this is a variation of the "Buy one get one free" policy. The Association will treat all **new registrations** received up till the end of 1977 as being fully paid until the end of 1978. For example, Joe Bloggs \$15 fee is received at ACTA office on 25th Oc-tober — Joe would receive a 1977 Registration Card, marked Honorary Member, and then for no further payment would automatically receive his 1978 card at the end of this year. This incentive does NOT apply to those existing members who have not yet paid their 1977 fees.

OTHER THINGS DISCUSSED ...

1. Mr Ron Porter raised the matter of introduction of a "Zero Handicap' badge for skeet shooters, similar to the "25 metre shooter" badge available to trap shooters. After discussion it was agreed that the two achievements were not directly comparable and that no action be taken.

2. ISU Sub-committee - this Committee was quite active during the Conference and a separate report has been prepared, detailing matters arising from its deliberations.

 Official Team to represent Australia in Glenn Cup match to be held in New Zealand next April — there is a real possibility that some financial assistance will be available to this team full details will be announced in the next issue of CTSN.

It may be of interest to you to know how hard your Executive Committee works at these meetings — you can be assured that they are far from being "rest camps". The Committee flew into Sydney by Ansett Airlines during Saturday morning and assembled at the Koala Oxford Square Hotel. For the first time, all members were accommodated in the one Hotel and the Hotel's well equipped Conference Room was used for the meeting. The first session commenced at 1.30 p.m. on Saturday and ended at 5.30 that evening. Sunday the work session started at 8.30 a.m. and apart for a short break for lunch and dinner, continued without let-up until 10.30 p.m. - a real marathon!

Sub-committees met on Monday from 8.30 a.m. till 10.30 a.m., after which the full meeting resumed, finishing at 3.30 p.m. Not too much play time in that lot, you can be sure!

NATIONALS '78




DR. ED KOZICKI — Change of meeting venue

1977 World Moving Target Championships ANTIBES REPORT

The Australian Team which competed at the 1977 World Series has now arrived home and "Pud" Burgess, the team manager has filed the following brief report, to enable readers of CTSN to share some of the team's experiences. It is an indication of "Pud's" enthusiasm that he has prepared these notes in a very short space of time, despite other commitments such as the State Carnival at Guyra Gun Club.

"Pud" writes:

"After receiving a wonderful farewell at Melbourne Airport, our team flew Cathay Pacific to Hong Kong, from where Swissair carried us to Geneva, Switzerland. The Swissair staff at Geneva were most helpful in overcoming any hassles with Customs and Entry procedures. We then collected the bus which was to become our ground transport and eventually arrived at Milan, Italy, after 48 hours constantly on the move. We stripped the timing gears on the bus just prior to entering the Mont Blanc Tunnel (which is 21 km long and stopping inside is impossible) but were fortunate to find that the Rental Company was prepared to send us on by taxi, at their expense! This arrangement was only achieved because of the ability of team member Alex Crikis to speak French.

Because all team members were exhausted our first action on reaching Milan was to "climb into the cot" and we didn't move for almost twelve hours. At this stage some sort of virus started to affect the team and eventually worked its way through the entire crew. Our early training was done at TIRO VOLO, MILANO (Milan Shooting Complex). A competition event of 50 targets was conducted here on Saturday 3rd September and the first prize was shared by Rumbel and Ellis with clean scores. On Sunday, another 50 target competition was run at Saffreace Agnola, about 80 km North East of Milan. Our score here wasn't quite so good — Burgess and Rumbel finished equal third with 47's while Ellis was in bed — it was his turn for the virus infection.

Just prior to moving to Antibes we were shown through the Franchi plant at Brescia — there was so much of interest here that it will be the subject of a separate report at a later date.

The Skeeties had been invited to a competition at Mergambo but on arrival found that the program had been postponed. However all was not lost as the Italian squad was training there and Crikis and Summers joined in, shooting very creditable 196's and 194's respectively. In fact, these scores were significantly better than the scores posted by the Italian squad.

The trip from Milan to Antibes took us along a new Autobahn which was an incredible experience. It passed through at least twenty tunnels (the entrance to each tunnel looked just like the muzzle of a side by side) of varying length from 170 metres to 2 km. This highway had only been opened for three weeks and was one of the highlights of our tour. Another interesting experience occurred when with "Big Foot" Ellis driving, we took an incorrect turn in Monaco and followed the coast road round to Nice — breath taking scenery, which none of us enjoyed because our heart in our mouth was preventing us from breathing anyway! It was a most precipitous road and a very hair raising ride — thanks Jim!

Finally, we saw the famed French Riviera — the only beaches to have sand are those where the sand has been "imported" from elsewhere. We noticed one or two points of interest and it was difficult to keep the boy's mind on the job they had worked so hard to do — shooting for Australia! Jules Steiner had been a tower of strength in making forward arrangements for us and our accommodation in France was excellent — very comfortable and moderately priced!

The facilities at the Antibes ground were very good — 4 Olympic Trenches and 4 ISU Skeet Grounds. The Clubhouse was quite adequate and very comfortable.

The number of entries in matches were:— Skeet - Open 96; Junior 21; Teams 19. Trap - Open 98; Junior 35; Teams 19.

A full scores table is being prepared and should be completed in time for inclusion in the next issue of CTSN.

Before closing, a few thoughts may be of interest:

(i) The virus which went through the team had a marked effect on our competition performance.

(ii) Light conditions at Antibes were "different" — very hazy. In subsequent discussions with the American Tom Gilmore, it was agreed that a different set shooting glasses may have overcome this problem.

RULES CORNER:

Following the recent Executive Committee meeting, the following rules have been amended — please make the necessary amendments to your rule book!

- 157. Club managements or a member of the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee have the right to re-handicap or re-classify any obviously under-handicapped or wrongly classified shooter immediately, providing the Association is notified within TWO DAYS and the reason given on a Handicap Return Form. If these details are not completed, such handicap movement cannot be ratified.
- 148(c). The recent change to Rule 148(c) was in error as to ISU shooting. The change should read: 200 targets \$40, 100 targets \$20, 50 targets \$10, 25 targets \$5.

The National Office has received an interesting question on the subject of Championship trophy values, and the question and answer will be of interest to a number of readers:

Question: The recently amended Rule 148(a) states that State Championship trophy value be a minimum of \$50 retail (including sash or badge). Rules 130, 131, 132 and 134 state that those State Titles are to be shot as graded events. Rule 100(b) states that where graded common mark events are conducted there shall be one equal value TROPHY for each grade. There is some disagreement amongst committee members as to how Rule 148(a) should be interpreted. Some feel that as Rule 100(b) mentions a minimum of one trophy for each grade and that Rules 130, 131, 132 and 134 state that the mentioned State Titles shall be graded, then Rule 148(a) means a trophy value of \$50 (minimum) for each grade. Other members feel that Rule 148(a) means a minimum of \$50 total over the 3 grades, i.e. means a minimum of \$50 total over the 3 grades, i.e. — e.g. a sash of \$10 value plus 3/\$14 trophies would suffice or 3/\$10sashes plus 3/\$7 trophies would suffice. In other words is it a minimum of \$50 for each grade or a total of \$50 minimum overall total on the 3 grades.

Answer: The \$50 minimum trophy value to which you refer applies to the event, NOT to individual trophies.

Trap Setting in Adverse Conditions

(Question asked by A. D. Mylne, Toowoomba Gun Club) **Question:** Does the first paragraph of Rule 9, in so far as it Governs 6(a) where that rule refers to the distance to which legal targets are to be thrown, mean that:

(i) A trap set to throw targets the mean distance in still air **need** not be re-set for wind conditions for the day as far as distance is concerned.

(ii) The said trap **must** not be reset as above mentioned; OR is that paragraph designed to take care of wind gusts.


Answer: The purpose of rule 9 is to provide for those locations where, due to land contours, wind currents along gullies etc., the targets fall out of bounds even though they are perfectly normal targets when fired upon. There are some shooting grounds on cliff tops when the targets are quite legal when fired upon but where every missed target would be a "No Target" if it were not for the provisions of Rule 9. Traps should be set up to throw legal height targets under all

Traps should be set up to throw legal height targets under all conditions. Angles and distances should be set to throw legal targets under the average conditions prevailing at the time but obviously if gusty winds are blowing then some targets will be blown out of bounds after being fired upon and this is the reason for rule 9.

If traps are set under calm conditions and during the program a weather change causes most of the targets to fall out of bounds then the traps should be reset as provided under rule 51. (E. F. Hawkins — Rules Supervisor).

(iii) Canada and America adopt a totally different attitude towards team selection to the policy which we follow. By the time this is being read, both countries will have announced their squad for the 1978 Commonwealth Games and the World Championships. These squads will train regularly and each will compete in four or five International competitions between now and next August.

In conclusion, I wish to express my personal gratitudes for being given the opportunity of managing a team of such fine young men — it is truly a team of which all Australians should be proud. The support they offered each other was great to see, and their dedication and enthusiasm were of top standard. In fact, the Trap teams 9th placing is not a true indication of just how well the boys performed. At all times each team member was a wonderful ambassador for Australia."

It was a fun night and all who attended are eagerly looking forward to the next.







It is hoped to run a similar event again next year.


Antibes Support Shoot



Guyra Gun Club hosted the very successful 1977 New South Wales Trap Carnival during the 1st to 3rd October 1977. What must be one of the most picturesque grounds in Australia attracted around one hundred and sixty shooters over the three days.

The Guyra Gun Club, together with the Northern Zone left nothing to chance in ensuring the enjoyment and pleasure of every person who attended. The carnival received widespread publicity through a press supplement which was included in the Guyra Guardian dated 28th September. This is the sort of media support that all Clubs should be seeking. The supplement was fully supported by local business people and sports industry generally, and featured a history of the Guyra Gun Club. It also featured articles on leading shooters, and Guyra Club members; it provided a great lead-up to the Carnival! Club President Herb Williamson, his Committee and especial-

Club President Herb Williamson, his Committee and especially Secretary Rex Varley have done a great job to bring the Clubs facilities up to a very high standard, particularly the Club House, the area of which has been doubled in past four months — the result being achieved by regular **well attended** working bees.

The Guyra Gun Club was opened in 1963, although a Club had been formed back in the early 1920's. Since then it has grown to today's size, where it has four DTL layouts and one skeet layout. It has a fully equipped kitchen, clubhouse heating (a must at the high altitude) and is fully sewered.

For the Carnival, the local service Clubs provided support facilities in the form of barbecue supervisors and scoreboard attendants. The Northern Zone, with the co-operation of the area Tourist Development Authority, mounted a very comprehensive tourist information centre to provide visiting shooters and their families with a most informative service.

By arrangement with the Club, the local Bus line provided a coach to take the ladies and children on a sight-seeing tour on Sunday, and assisted by the perfect weather, this proved to be a great idea. About forty of the girls took advantage of the chance to "get away from it all" for a few hours.

The evening of Saturday 1st October was the selected time for the fourth Annual Meeting of the NSW Clay Target Association. It was conducted in the Club house and was well attended. It also marked the retirement from office of Mr Ern Hawkins, who was the Association's foundation President, and after four years in office, now believes that some fresh blood is required. Furthermore, his responsibilities as National President are becoming progressively more time consuming. A vote of thanks to Ern was passed with acclamation.

Monday saw a slight change in the weather pattern with quite a strong breeze blowing. However, the two Trap teams took the field and produced very satisfactory scores.



PERTH CLAY TARGET CLUB TWO DAY CARNIVAL

Talking about our booming sport, the September Carnival at Perth Clay Target Club attracted one hundred and fifty competitors over two days - this is an excellent response from a State where the total number of registered shooters is just over 700.

The feature event on the first day was the first Western Australian round of the 77-78 Winchester Tournament. In excess of 100 chooters entered this event the conclusion to which provided one of the highlights of the 1977 year. Club, and the Winchester Sales Agent in Western Australia. Another promising young shooter Ross Eckersley was second. (Clay target shooting must continue to grow with such young talent on the scene!) 

CLAY TARGET SHOOTING – THE BOOMING SPORT IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA

A visit to Western Australia provides a great chance to mix with one of the most enthusiastic groups of clay busters in Australia. One could understand if a slight anti-climactic atmosphere existed, because of the euphoria which was attached to the most successful 1976 Nationals. However, such is not the case — in fact, the success of the 76 Nationals is the base on which the West Australian Clay Target Association is building steady growth.

At present the State has just over 700 registered shooters, including a number of regular women competitors. The State Association (locally referred to as 'Wacta') has implemented a policy of grading Clubs, and major championships are **only** allocated to Clubs with an appropriate grading. This policy has resulted in all Clubs striving to improve their conditions and facilities. The WACTA also exercises firm control over the allocation of shooting dates, and aims to arrange "two-day" programs at regular intervals. This is of great importance in a State where it is the rule rather than the exception to travel up to 300 kilometres to a match. In fact it is not unusual to have a group of shooters take on a weekend round trip of 1200 kilometres to follow their favorite sport. If this type of action is to be taken as a measure of dedication, clay target shooting participants show more dedication on a wider scale than most other sports.

Further evidence of WACTA's innovative approach is found in the decision to conduct the 1978 Interstate Trap Team and 1978 Interstate Skeet Team Matches on the same weekend next year. This idea is being given a trial in an endeavour to minimize the travelling problem and therefore provide the biggest possible number of shooters with a chance to win that coveted Interstate Team Badge.

The enthusiasm shown by the women competitors has to be seen to be believed. During the 1977 Interstate Skeet Team Match held at Perth Clay Target Club on September 25th, Executive Committee members Robin Bailey (who is also Club President) and Roy Holtfreter were almost lynched because no provision has yet been made for a Women's Skeet Team Match.

Those W.A. girls are just itching to get a victory over the Eastern States — what about it for 1978? The girls are also to the fore in the administration of the sport with a significant number of W.A. Clubs having women secretaries. One of the "fairest" skeet referees in Western Australia is a woman, Barbara Smith from Edgehill. Her refereeing is of the highest standard and she officiated during the 1977 Interstate Skeet Teams Match. Barbara is also a most competent skeet shooter and in 1976, "shot off" for a place in the Interstate Team.

Husband Barry is also a most proficient skeet shooter and intends travelling to Victoria in October to contest the 1977 Commonwealth Skeet Championship.

It is logical that, in a State which is because of its geographic situation, so remote, a strong inter Club competition should ex-

ist, and a competition exists for both Trap and Skeet teams. Although Perth C.T. Club is the strongest numerically, it doesn't always get things its own way and it always is a great thrill to see one of the other Clubs "get up".

One of the many progressive Clubs in the State is the "Club with the funny name" — C.M.T. Cunderdin. The Committee of Cunderdin has just made the decision to install an Olympic Trench and two ISU Skeet grounds. This shows great foresight by the Club and will lift International shooting in Western Australia, where previously no Olympic Trench existed. The Club hopes to have the installation completed by February 1978 and has been allocated the 1978 State Olympic Trench Championship and the 1978 State ISU Skeet Championship. It is presumed that Western Australia will also enter a team in the 1978 Interstate Trench Teams Match.

As mentioned earlier, Perth Clay Target Club is the biggest Club in Western Australia. It is situated on leasehold ground on the edge of Perth Airport — a position which should render impregnable from the "anti noise" people. The present site was officially opened in 1959, after a tremendous amount of work had been put in by well-known W.A. shooting identities, including Keith Barker and Tom Powell. Tom was the inaugural President and it was a fine gesture by present Vice President lan Gargeeg to extend an invitation to both Keith and Tom to be present at the Carnival conducted on September 24th and 25th.

Perth C.T. Club's Patron is the Hon. W. R. McPharlin (M.H.R.) who still shows a very keen interest in "his" Club and is a regular visitor. The Club Secretary Ross Arlow runs the administration of the Club on a very professional basis. On competition days, he is very ably assisted by his wife, Joan, whose happy outlook seems to make the "paying customers" happy too!

press they are stacked in the frame and each 25 can then be easily inserted into a box.

Summary

We have now looked at components in Part 1., and in this issue at the machinery — next month in "Mechanics 2" we will actually start reloading shells (at last!) and we will examine in detail the actual reloading of a shotshell together with some of the techniques that will make your job that much easier.




