

SECRETARY'S NOTES

Another first for the Australian Clay Target Association — this is the first time that "Clay Target Shooting News" has been published in January. That the move is warranted can be borne out by the fact that this is another very large issue — it contains 70 advertisements many of which would not have been placed if the January issue had not been available.

As we move into 1978, the Association is entering a new era insofar as development is concerned. 1977 was a year of re-establishment and if reviewed on that basis, was quite a successful period. The financial deficit which occurred in 1976 has been offset, and the Association is now well based to move into top gear. Some of the projects to which consideration should be given in the short term future include extensions to the Coaching Scheme, establishment of a National Shooting Ground, improvement of relationships with other sporting shooting organisations, both within and outside Australia, development of more sponsorship programs, wider distribution of CTSN. The list could be extended a great deal further. However, none of the above suggestions is more important than increasing our membership.

Membership numbers is the basis on which the Association is judged when it makes approaches to "outsiders". The fact that our membership remained virtually unchanged from 1966 to 1976 is a very black mark against the A.C.T.A., although the 1977 increase of 20% has substantially erased the "bruise". The fact that our membership increased to around 9200 in the last year is a great incentive to do even better in 1978. Remember, if each of us introduces one new member before the end of 1978, our membership could increase to 18,000. But why leave the introduction until later — ACT NOW and give a friend the opportunity to get the sort of satisfaction from Clay Target Shooting that you are, and reap the benefits of a full year's fees as well.

It is worth noting here that the decision to make no increase in 1978 Registration fees was based on our ability to increase the number of registered shooters. Quite obviously the Association's operating costs must continue to increase, and the extra money must come from somewhere — none of us wants a return to those traumatic days which occurred late in 1976.

What about a National Shooting Ground? Sure, I realise that only a small proportion of our total National membership attends Nationals, but this situation is changing and as the number of competitors at Nationals increases, it is irresponsible for the Association to continue to expect individual Clubs to expand their facilities, to be used only once every five or six years. Consideration should also be given to the physical restrictions on space confronting most of the Clubs which are traditionally considered as venues for Nationals. Let's have a look at a couple of them — Brisbane, host Club for the 1977 Nationals, just managed with eight trap grounds plus a practice ground. Although it has space to install ONE more trap ground, will nine DTL layouts be sufficient in six year's time? Adelaide (S.A. Gun Club) will manage with its seven trap grounds in 1978, but there is no way it could conveniently accommodate the Nationals entry of approximately 850 shooters in 1984. Which introduces another question — should our National Championship events be increased to 100

targets? After all, they are intended to be the PREMIER events of our Skeet and DTL shooting calendar, and yet the "course" is no more of a challenge than some of the bigger Club matches.

Having decided that the Association needs a National Shooting Headquarters, the next question to be answered would be — WHERE? Interstate jealousies are luxuries that cannot be afforded when making these major policy decisions — financial geographic and convenience factors must all be FULLY considered before any decision is reached, after which ALL people concerned with the development must work in unison.

Speaking of decisions, the most urgent decision confronting the Association relates to the matter of Constitutional revision.

It was originally intended to publish the proposed changes in CTSN to give all readers a chance to form an opinion. On reflection, such a plan may have caused further misunderstandings, which is a problem we can do without. Instead, every Club in Australia now has a copy of the changes which have been RECOMMENDED BY THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE. Please make yourself aware of the changes, discuss any queries you may have either with the Committee of your Club, the Zone in which your Club is located, or your State Association. This is a matter on which the future of the Association depends very heavily, and if a decision is to be made at the 1978 Annual General Meeting (to be held in Adelaide during the Nationals) it must be RESPONSIBLE. Arguments for and against the proposals have been aired through CTSN but the ultimate decision rests with Clubs, whose delegates will vote at the AGM. The basic purpose of the changes is to streamline the administration of the A.C.T.A., to bring it more into line with modern thinking, and therefore, hopefully facilitate more effective and faster decision making from State Association right through to National Executive Committee.

To those of you who are reading this prior to Christmas, the National President Ern Hawkins and his Executive Committee join me in wishing you a very happy Christmas.

To all our readers, best wishes for an enjoyable and successful shooting year in 1978.

SHOTSHELL RELOADING...

PART 4: Mechanics 111 by PAT BROWNE

MULTI-STAGE, TURRET OR PROGRESSIVE PRESSES

To tidy up the mechanics section and before we get involved in ballistics let us have a look at progressive loaders and what to look

for when using one.

As mentioned in earlier chapters these presses are of necessity more complicated and more expensive than the single stage press. In fact, when you set one up on a bench it looks very awe inspiring. Don't let the look of the press throw you if you are not mechanically minded, the thing to remember is that it is no different in principle of operation to the single stage press. All the progressive loader does in actual fact is perform all the eight loading operations at the one time. In other words it completes a shell every time you pull the handle. Don't get me wrong however and think that the turret press is so simple that loading shotshells on one is a breeze, a good knowledge of the press operation IS necessary before you will get the press working to its full potential.

A most important thing to remember is that this type of press is not for the tinkerer, it is a production machine. If you like playing with reloads and working out new load combinations a turret press is not for you. Again don't get me wrong, you can make up any type of load on this style of press, but as a rule you set it up to run a particular type of load and you run a lot of them. Being a high capacity machine the turret press I have found is used for only two or three, perhaps four particular loading combinations. Most owners set the press up to load a 32 gram trap and skeet load, a 32 gram handicap and field load and a 36 gram handicap and field load. The thing to remember is that the shooter that has a use for press of this capacity does a lot of shooting and as a result he wants to load a lot of shells quickly and economically. Another application of this press is for club or syndicate loading which we will discuss later.

Setting up your press

The same principles apply when setting up the progressive loader as are used for the single stage press with a few exceptions. All of this type of press available in Australia have automatic primer feed and so you do away with the primer tray. As a rule you are handling much larger numbers of shells with a progressive loader and therefore you need more space on your bench than for a single stage press. Bench layout can be similar to the single stage set up keeping in mind the working cycle of the press. The very nature of the turret press being circular means that you both put-on and take-off around the same side of the press. This puts most of the activity on one side of the press leaving room on the other side for components. Setting up procedure differs with each make of press but some broad principles apply. The most important thing for you to do after bolting the press to the bench is to READ THE INSTRUCTION BOOK that comes with the press. All presses have a different technique for getting the indexing plate full and the press operating without getting shot and powder all over the place.

At this time we come back to part I when we talked at some length about empty hulls, what to look for and how to sort them. This subject I cannot stress too much as the success of the operation of your progressive loader is dependent on the quality of the empty hulls that you feed the machine. It is most important that you feed consistent hulls to any progressive loader. When I say consistent I mean well sorted hulls of the same type, e.g. once fired AA's or Blue Star's. This is the time that care and patience in sorting and classifying your empty hull's will pay off. It is also the time that a 'case conditioner' comes into its own. Decapped and resized shells that have been through the conditioner give you a great start when using a progressive loader. Three of the four loaders available having indexing plates that need empties that sit flat and move with the plate without wobbling. Careful attention to this detail will ensure you of trouble free running.

I have digressed a little and so back to the setting up procedure. After inserting the correct shot and powder bushings or charge bar you have done as much as is possible until you set up the primer feed. A point to remember is that powder bushes for single stage presses do not necessarily throw the same weight when used in a turret press. You remember last month when we talked about consistency of technique, well this is the reason. With a progressive loader, for each shell you only give the press one bump as distinct from the single stage press where you give the press five or six bumps. This means that the same bush used in a progressive loader will throw from 1.5 to 2 grains lighter than in a single stage press, not a bad thing to remember.

Now, before you go any further load up your primer tube and attach it to the press. At this stage you have no powder and shot in the containers so work the press and feed primers adjusting the mechanism until primers feed faultlessly. We will come back to

primer feed later.

At this stage charge your containers with powder and shot making sure that on the presses that have them, that the powder and shot controls are in the OFF position. Insert an empty hull into station 1 and work the handle of the press to decap the hull. A primer should be in position for insertion at this stage as you index to station 2. Repriming is carried out as you work the handle at this station, on one press the powder charge is also dropped at this station. Indexing to station 3 on some presses you get your powder charge or seat your wad and so on. Close attention to the setting up instructions supplied with the press will soon have your turret full and ready to go on a production run. Adjustments to your press for wad depth and crimp are exactly the same as for a single stage press and the time to adjust them is after you have the turret full and the press working. The same procedure applies when checking powder weights as for the single stage press and it is a good idea to discard the first dozen or so shells that come off the press, it takes about this number for a progressive loader to settle down.

Technique for progressive loaders

With progressive loaders the secret is to keep your wits about you and work slowly and steadily. Cleanliness is of the utmost importance. The critical points of the loading cycle are the primer feed and the indexing movement. All these points come together in the technique. Working slowly and steadily allows the shells in the indexing plate to settle down from the wobble they get when they are moved. This wobble is most pronounced after you drop the shot load and before you start the crimp. The shell is top heavy and if jerked around on the indexing plate can cause hang-ups if the crimp starter misses the mouth of the shell because of a wobble. This wobble can also cause problems with wad insertion if the wad guide misses the mouth of the shell.

Cleanliness is of the utmost importance and is tied up with the primer feed. It is very messy on a progressive loader when a primer fails to feed and a powder charge drops through onto the indexing plate and base. A dropped shot load is also bad news and if either of these malfunctions occur it is most important that everything stop and the mess cleaned up before loading continues. Pieces of shot and loose powder cause havoc with indexing and primer feeding and can turn a pleasant reloading session into a nightmare.

So, when you start a reloading session on a progressive loader work yourself out a sequence and stick to it. I use a Mec 650 and it becomes second nature after a short time to (a) take off the finished shell and put on a new empty, (b) put a wad on the wad guide, (c) check that a primer has dropped as you index to the next station and (d) glance up to see that the charge bar has returned to the right position for the next pull of the handle. If you work out a quick visual check list you will iron out most of the kinks that can bug you when using the progressive loader. The cardinal rule on this type of

press is as follows:

ANY TIME YOU MEET AN OBSTRUCTION - STOP - AND FIND OUT WHY! YOUR LOADER IS DESIGNED TO OPERATE EASILY AND WITHOUT ANY BLOCKAGE. IF YOU MEET RESISTANCE TO THE HANDLE PULL, INVESTIGATE. IT MAY BE THAT THE WAD DID NOT PROPERLY SLIDE INTO THE CASE, YOU MAY HAVE TWO PRIMERS IN THE PRIMER POCKET, A CASE COULD BE OUT OF LINE OR YOU COULD HAVE DOUBLED UP ON THE WAD. Keep this rule in mind and use commonsense and you will soon be churning out reloads at a rate that will amaze you.

To this stage I have been talking about one man operation. It is most frustrating when you work up a nice rythm and are loading at a rate of knots to run out of primers, powder or shot. Two man operation on a progressive loader is the go. Production can be more than doubled with an extra pair of hands. One man works the press and the other acts as a floater. His job as the second pair of hands is very important on the team and would consist of the following duties:

SHOTSHELL RELOADING Cont'd

Firstly keep the components up to the operator, top up the primer tube, add more shot and powder as required, keep the wads and empties coming and pack up the finished shells. Of the four progressive loaders on the market, three of them lend themselves to two man operation, the Ponsness Warren can take up to four working at one time with a resultant increase of production. If you are setting up a loading team, pick blokes that work well together and rotate the tasks, each should take a turn on the press and also on the other duties.

A word now about club or syndicate presses. I have mixed feelings about the practice of a reloading press being used by a lot of of different people. It leads to mistakes being made and so I offer the following words of advice:

If you are in a reloading club or syndicate appoint a maintenance officer. His job is to keep the press maintained and in good working order. All the members of the syndicate should report any malfunctions of the press to this man whose job is to fix them. It is real bad news to have a lot of blokes tinkering with a press, it only leads to bad feeling amongst syndicate members. The most important point however is in the use of the press by individuals. This may sound silly but I know of the most incredible instances of fellows using a club press and not checking the charge bar configuration. When you go to the press to load a batch of shells with your own components START FROM STRATCH, do not rely on any other persons loading combinations, in fact it is a very good idea to have your own bushes for your own particular loads. Keeping these points in mind and using care and commonsense club reloading can be and is a very good idea. It gives more gunners access to high capacity loading equipment and spreads the economic burden a little.

This month completes our look at the mechanical side of shotshell reloading. Next month we will start our look at the ballistics of shotshells and we will delve very deeply into what makes a shotshell tick.

ARE YOU ASHAMED TO SHOW YOUR REGISTRATION CARDS?

To is disturbing to hear of the trouble being experienced by some Clubs when shooters are asked to produce their current registration card. A classic example recently occurred at the Metropolitan Clay Target Club Grand Prix program, where shooters who couldn't produce their card were asked to sign the "Lost Card Declaration". The number of shooters who took offence at this request was small but the fact is THERE WERE SOME! If these competitors care to check, they will find that the rules require them to produce their card, and in any sport if it is to suceed, the rules must be adhered to.

The other point to come out of the above Club's exercise is that of the eighteen shooters who were asked to sign the "Declaration" three were found to be unregistered. In each case, it was found that the shooter's failure to register was due to an oversight, but if cards had to be produced at every Club, no unregistered shooters would be able to compete.

Club managements should not be timid in this regard. If a shooter takes offence when asked to produce his handicap card he obviously does not wish to comply with the shooting rules and our sport is therefore better off without him.

The more positive approach is for all Clubs to ask for and maintain cards and in a short space of time, our trap grading and handicap system will be far more effective. The answers are in the shooters' hands. Please co-operate!!

Amalgamation of two Major Victorian Clubs Results in **New Facilities**

On 1st September 1977, a new Club appeared on the Victorian scene. It's name FRANKSTON-AUSTRALIAN GUN CLUB. The new Club is an amalgamation of the Australian Gun Club and the Frankston Gun Club. Pressure from a number of sources had been building up against both Clubs and the tenure of their respective shooting grounds became very "dicey". As a result of "forward thinking" by the Committees of the two Clubs, a feasibility study was carried out to establish that amalgamation was the correct de-

The decision was made and as reported last month, the site of the New Club has been a scene of feverish activity ever since.

CTSN felt that it was necessary to record the history of the two Clubs involved in the amalgamation and hopes that the following information provides interesting reading. We are most appreciative of the effort put into the production of the reports by the two respective Clubs.

In 1927 Jack Sutherland, a noted shot more commonly known as "Calrossie", got together a group of shooting enthusiasts at a cafe in Flinders St., Melbourne and journeyed out to the factory of "Ammunition (Nobel) Pty Ltd", West Footscray, to try the then almost unknown sport of shooting claybirds.

Although popular in U.S.A., where it originated, earlier attempts to establish this sport in Australia had all failed. The Nobel factory (later part of I.C.I.) loaded Eley Kynoch and Nobel shotgun cartridges and gave support to ensure that the new venture was a success. The club which was formed was called the Nobel Clay Target Club and it commenced shooting over one trap in a quarry in the grounds of the factory.

Membership cost 6 shillings (60 cents) and to popularise the sport, cartridges were supplied to the shooters at trade prices, for example, Nobel Ballistite 11/80z. loads at 3/7 (36 cents) a packet. However after objections from the trade this price was increased slightly.

Clay targets were imported from England in casks and so well were they packed that breakages were a rarity. The Club was a success and with Jack Sutherland, who was a representative of Nobel touring the State, other clubs were formed.

Horace James, a great shot of the firm of Donald Mackintosh, and in constant touch with shooters, also promoted the sport and when in 1936 the Aust. Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association (later the A.C.-T.A.) was formed on lines initiated by the Nobel club, Horace James was elected president and allotted No. 1 ticket. A youthful Fred Byers of the Nobel office attended to the secretarial duties until the club suspended operations on the outbreak of war in 1939, as did all except five of the 300 clubs which had joined the A.C.P.T.S.A. Both cartridges and clay targets were almost unobtainable.

'The Blackburn Clay Target Club"

Founded in 1935 and situated in the property of Jack Bryant, Holland Road, Blackburn, where it was very active until 1939 when the war slowed the tempo considerably. However, the club was one of the few to keep functioning, a fact which was appreciated by some of the U.S.A. armed forces who were based in Australia at that time and were frequent visitors. The usual source of clay targets having dried up, these were made on the spot by Jack Bryant and some other members. The source of cartridges arouses some interesting speculation and the visitors were possibly a help in this regard.

With the war over in 1945, activities gradually returned to normal until in 1948 the site of the club was sold.

Vic. Fankhauser then made part of his orchard property in Burwood Rd., East Burwood, available and the club transferred there in Feb. 1948.

"The Australian Clay Target Club"

In August 1948 the Nobel and Blackburn clubs amalgamated to form the Australian Clay Target Club which had its first shoot on 11 September, 1948. Dave Watson, president and Aub. Johnston, secretary, were both popular and efficient and the club was an instant success. Equipped with 4 D.T.L. grounds including one doubling as a skeet ground, it was for some years the venue of the National Championships and being centrally situated to the other States was appreciated by those attending those events. In 1948 cars were not the universal means of transport they now are and a bus carried shooters from the Box Hill station to the club. It was usual for a round of skeet to be shot at the conclusion of the D.T.L. programs, this was English skeet of 20 targets (no No. 8).

After the retirement of Dave Watson as president, those to follow him were Jim Bienvenu, Geo. Biggs and Frank Johnson. In 1957 Cal. Hollow of I.C.I. conducted a shooting school at the club and this was almost too successful, 270 applying to join including the premier, Henry Bolte. I.C.I. further offered to pay the initial sub. to the A.C.P.T.S.A. of the pupils. A skeet committee was appointed, two traps purchased and in 1958 American 25 target skeet rules were adopted. This was the forerunner of the Association adopting these

Aub. Johnston after long and successful years as honorary secretary was forced by ill health to retire. A number of secretaries and acting secretaries filled the position, some capably and others less than that and the club went through a difficult period. A special general meeting in 1960 confirmed the appointment of acting president Frank Johnson as president and John Lucas as secretary.

The finances of the club were in a bad state, however, the financial statements of the secretary showed where action was necessary. The newly formed Field and Game Association held a number of shoots at the club in 1960, first as guests and later at a fairly nominal charge; these shoots played a big part in both the social and financial affairs of the F & G in its formative years. 1962 was a year of great progress, Ron Siede was elected president and at once made a drive to restore the finances to a sound position and with the help of an alert committee this was accomplished. Skeet, which started at 10 a.m., as well as D.T.L. shooting was popular and Dudley Edgerton (D.T.L.) and Roy Fallshaw (Skeet) were appointed to manage their sections and application was made to the Nunawading City Council, which now controlled the property, for more land for a second skeet ground. Des O'Callaghan, a student of skeet handicapping, was appointed handicapper (all skeet prior to this was offscratch).

John Lucas proved invaluable in squadding the large attendances. The October 1963 annual meeting showed all back debts had been paid and the club now had a credit balance.

Contributing to this was a very active ladies committee in the forefront of whom were Zilla Siede and Olive Edgerton. 1965 saw Ron Siede retire after three active years and the club in very good shape. Des O'Callaghan was elected president but become ill and Dudley Edgerton acted in his stead until the 1966 annual meeting when he was elected president.

The Nunawading Council's activities adjoining the club were proceeding at an ever increasing rate and it was obvious that another


site would be necessary.





Clay Target Shooting -Vandalia Style

(By Warren Charlton, Hawkesbury Gun Club).

Here is a brief summary of my visit to Vandalia, U.S.A. and the Grand American 1977. I hope there are points of interest, in my summary, to anybody thinking of doing this trip in the future.

Possibly the most memorable part of my 61/2 week trip, was the three days I spent with Betty-Ann and Roy Foxworthy and family at their Lake Home in Columbus Indiana. (Believe me, their home and surroundings is a paradise. The home is three storeys, which is situated on a private lake where we were able to swim and ski).

We drove direct from the Foxworthy's to Vandalia on the day before the shoot, which allowed me to clear up any problems with handicapping and grading before the crowd arrived.

The first procedure was to register with the A.T.A. which was done in an office equipped with computer T.V. screens (the Club had its own computer house on the grounds). At this point of time the computer is used to verify every shooters shooting average, handicap and grade. It is then checked with his handicap card before he nominates for the shoot. As a visitor I was graded "A", my handicap penalty was 25 yards and naturally as a visitor I had no average

The second step was to nominate for the events, this could be done on this day for the complete program of 17 events over nine days. The shooter has the privilege of nominating his position in the squad (I chose No. 4 shooter). I was able to nominate the squad I wanted to shoot in, obviously if that squad was filled I had to take the nearest squad available, if that suited me.

The program was shot at the rate of 100 squads per hour, which is 500 shooters, using 64 traps and 8 practice traps making 72 traps in all. I must confess that choosing my squads at this time confused me (as I am used to shooting where I am squaded). Mrs Priscilla Baldwin helped here by calculating the squads with the best trap backgrounds. When the program started about 9 a.m. I nominated about squad 100 which had me on the tracks approx. 10 a.m. When the program started around 8 a.m. I nominated around squad 200 which also got me on the tracks approx. 10 a.m.

The third step after receiving your squad receipts, was to have them stamped with your plastic A.T.A. membership card (which is similar to a Bankcard and is stamped, using the same sort of machinery).

The final step was to pay the money at the cashiers window.

Points of interest with the shooting, is that there are no referee's. The decision on targets is definite, if you fire the gun, then you have accepted the target, whether it be slow, fast or out of bounds, you abide by the result. Broken targets are no birds whether you shoot or not. No. 1 shooter in the squad is responsible for the squad and I did notice that there was a reluctance to fill this position -- however, there was quite a number who wanted this position. No. 1 shooter asked if the shooters were ready, scorer ready and asked to see a target before he started. He also made the decisions on any problems during the shoot, for example, the final decision on a visible chip, if the scorer didn't see it and another shooter did. This system appeared to keep all shooters honest and eliminated the cost of referee's and delays which could occur while the referee's arrive on the track. The scorers were high school students and they called lost targets only. We shot five targets on each track and on the changeover No. 1 shooter waited until all shooters were on their markes before shooting again.


The biggest problem I had was closing my gun, I tried to maintain our method of safety by closing the gun only when it was my turn to shoot, this didn't work as I slowed the squad down. After a test I found that the American method more than halved the shooters time. I found the best method for me was to close my gun just after No. 1 shooter shot and then rest the gun on my hip, so as not to fatigue my arms.

The method of shooting was to shoot 25 targets on your first trap and then move along 8 traps and shoot the second 25 and so on until you have visited 4 traps and shot at 100 targets. This made it necessary to carry 100 cartridges in a carry bag which could be obtained at the respective cartridge company's sales offices. If a shooter was late and missed the first 25 targets, he was able to join in and shoot the next three traps and 75 targets and then he would return to the practice trap and shoot his first 25 targets to complete his

There is naturally a lot more I could say about this trip but I felt that these were the most important points.

If I was to visit this shoot again, I would like the same length of time (61/2 weeks) and next time I would shoot their main shoots every weekend and during the week where possible. By doing this I would be more familiar with their procedures and targets. I would then shoot the Grand last thing before returning home.

For those interested, my performance was a win at Martinez Gun Club (California) 93/100 Doubles. At the Grand I shot three only 99's/100 and a carry over run of 199/200 16 vards, this naturally included one only 100. One of the 99's was shot at ball trap, the attendance was 2,600 and only two 100/100 was shot. So I guess that was as

TRADE TOPICS

A small shipment of Laporte equipment recently arrived in Australia. It included a small "fun trap" and a quality of Model7505 hopper fed Ball Traps. Expected to sell to Clubs at around \$3600, the design and quality of the traps appear to be of a very high standard. The hopper has a capacity of 400 targets and is constructed from lightweight but strong alloy. The "think" box includes a control to allow for adjustment of the degree to which the trap alters height and angles. The model 750S is also available ex France in Skeet form, and early reports suggest that the cost of a pair of these would be less than \$3500 (Australian dollars).

However, before Clubs get excited and inundate the National Office with enquiries, the delivery position out of France is very obscure. When more information is available it will be reported in CTSN.

More good news on the equipment scene is that a few Model 4100 Remington hopper fed DTL traps have arrived in Australia for evaluation by the Australian agents, Boustead Pty Ltd. No landed price has yet been established but this equipment also looks the part. No doubt, a performance report will appear in due course.

Speaking of Boustead, the Company has recently undergone some personnel changes and the following appointments will be of interest to readers.

General Manager is David Tietjen (who is one of the "straightest" people connected with the firearms industry, and is fully in favour of some sort of Hunting and Shooting Industry Development Program!) and his right hand man is Ross Levinsohn.

Queensland sales are in the capable hands of Frank Toro (who previously has worked for the A. N. Robinson group and more recently IMI Aust. Ltd.); New South Wales Supervisor is John Rose. Manager for Victoria is David Ross.

A shipment of Remington shotshells is awaiting loading in USA—it is help up because of a Longshoremen's strike, but it is of interest to note that due to currency changes, Boustead has scrapped its plan to source Remington shotshells from Japan.

The Company has donated a Competition Grade Remington 3200 Under and Over to be presented to the winner of the 1978 Grand Australian Handicap, which will be shot as part of the National Championships program in Adelaide.

After a "drought" of some months, Dupont powder is to reappear on the Australian market. A shipment arrived in the Eastern States just prior to Christmas and no doubt has brought a smile to the devoted users of this dense, light recoil powder. Mr Charles Game, General Manager of F. C. Lovelock, provided this information during a discussion recently and also showed excitement at the progress his Company is making in the shooting market. Lovelock is also the Australian agent for "Texan" reloading equipment, a name which is widely known amongst shotgunners, as well as for CCI primers and rimfire cartridges.

Lovelock's will donate a trophy, consisting of a Texan reloader and shotshell components, to be presented to the winner of the 1978 Australian-New Zealand Trap (Pointscore) Championship.

More good news for reloaders is that a large shipment of Hercules powder has been landed in Melbourne and will be distributed by SPF Pty. Ltd., P.O. Box 8, Manuka ACT 2603.

Types included in the shipment which will be of interest to shotshell reloaders include Red Dot, Green Dot and Unique.

The consignment also contained a wide range of pistol and revolver powders.


*Whilst doing the Sydney rounds, we talked to Malcolm Fuller of Fuller Firearms. Malcolm spends a lot less of his time at work now than previously, and the business is very capably managed by Al Wilson.

The big news in the Fuller office was the arrival of the Miroku 3800 series.

The top of the line model is known as the G13 which has fine gold inlay and the time proven recoil at around \$2450. Also in the new range is a top grade side lock double barrel (MSL 120) with traditional English type arabesque scroll engravings, finest hand checkering, both on stock and fore end. Probably the most interesting gun is the MT99, a high grade single barrel trap gun which re-

tails at \$499. It employs a specialised super high trap rib that raises the point of impact to facilitate a clear view of the target at all ranges.

Also confirmation has been received that Fuller's will again make available in 1978 a Miroku 800W to be presented to the first New Zealander to win the Australia-New Zealand Trap Championship at the National Championships.

"Free" shooting through sponsorship of Blue Dot Targets

Tom Hoult, the very enthusiastic General Manager of Blue Dot Targets, has introduced an idea which undoubtedly will assist in the promotion of Clay Target Shooting. Beginning with New South Wales (in co-operation with NSW Gun Club) Blue Dot will operate what it is calling a "free Shoot". The Company will supply targets at no cost and will also cover all expenses incurred by the Club in operating the promotion. Anybody from anywhere will be welcome to attend and shoot at as many targets as he or she wishes. To foster a little competition and interest in the shooting, it is planned to run sweepstakes on events, with the host Club retaining 10% of the proceeds to cover administration costs associated with the handling of the sweeps, and 90% being returned to the shooters.

The purpose of the promotion is to rekindle interest amongst those shooters who no longer shoot regularly — either because of economic reasons or because they have forgotten what it is all about. Of course it also gives the "rank and file" shooter — the guy who supports the sport so strongly, but rarely wins a prize — a little

something for nothing.

Similar programs are being planned for other major Clubs in

other States, so "stay tuned" for further information.

It is interesting to note that Tom Hoult expects to give away twenty thousand Blue Dot targets during the exercise at New South Wales Gun Club.

Michael Patrick Halpin Gunsmith: Shepparton

Mick Halpin was born in a tent on a Bendigo gold field in 1860. During his school days he attended The Bendigo School of Mines, and studied architectural drawing. After leaving school, he was apprenticed to a German gunsmith Mr Julius Rae, for five years.

One of Mr Rae's best customers was a Mr George Scott who posed as a Clergyman, when in fact he was Captain Moonlight the notorious bushranger; later, when Moonlight was charged with the offence of bushranging, Mick Halpin attended the Court in order to hear the proceedings, and was amazed at the plausible stories which Moonlight told the Court. Moonlight had tried earlier to persuade young Mick to give up working for Mr Rae and come bushranging with him, but Mick continued his work with Mr Rae, even when his boss moved to Echuca then the biggest inland port in Australia.

After serving his apprenticeship, he came to live in Mooroopna, and opened the first gun shot in High Street, Shepparton, three miles away, and in cycling daily to work he believed he fell off his pennyfarthing cycle at every yard of the road. In 1884 the Shepparton-Mooroopna four-lane highway of today was then just a rough bush track.

At this time a friendship developed between young Halpin and Dr J. V. Healy of Rushworth who often treated patients at Mooroopna Hospital.

Mick was invited to drive for the Doctor in the horse and carriage used on trips to the pioneer families, who needed medical help. Mick filled in his time shooting rabbits and crows, whilst the Doctor delivered babies or set broken bones.

Dr Healy was a gun and shooting enthusiast, and had a son who became one of Melbourne's best-known gunsmiths — Mr Vickers Healy

Mr Halpin imported firearms from England and often had them made to special order by Greener, Hollis, Bonehill and Holloway.

I still remember having a double barrel shotgun which had a barrel rib with the wording "Made expressly for M. HALPIN SHEP-PARTON by C. G. HOLLOWAY, BIRMINGHAM," he also stocked and repaired bicycles, purchasing his stock from Massey Harris also Canada Cycle Company who were the first to introduce Dodge motor cars to Australia.

Mick sold the old Pennyfarthing bicycles earlier and there is one bearing his name on the fork "M. HALPIN" it was sold to a local character of that time "Daddy Long" who ran a paper round on the cycle, and which is now in the Shepparton Museum with a picture of

that famous 'paper boy'.

Mick moved his shop to further east in High Street where Gray's Arcade is now situated, and on a vacant block next door he ran a shooting gallery where he entertained a large number of workers employed in constructing the rail extension to Numurkah; this would have been about 1887.

Firstly he ran the Shepparton Championship, then the Victorian followed by Australian, and finally the World Championship for Gallery shooting. This would have been a .22 event, shooting down a long metal tunnel at a white washed steel plate; the bullseye a .22 sized hole with a bell fitted at the back; ½ and ½ bells could be re-

gistered, the range 22 yards and shooting with an elbow rest.

Members of the Shepparton Gun Club presented Mick with an inscribed silver tray on his retirement from the Honorary Secretaryship which office he had held since 1885, during which time he was an enthusiastic shooter and a sound adviser.

The late Mrs Pat Leahy of Congupna, nee Doreen Halpin, who gave the writer the details of this story, remembered how members of the family worked in the evenings making cartridges to sell to the shooters at a weekend shoot.

The late Mr Ern Guyatt of the Goulburn Valley Motors, a successful businessman in the motor trade in Shepparton, worked in his earliest days as a cycle mechanic for Mick. Mr Guyatt became one of the best known field and trap shots in the Goulburn Valley, and both Mick and Ernie enjoyed a fine reputation as businessmen and sportsmen in the Shepparton area.

Mr Halpin helped many shooters of the district with good advice, one of the more prominent being the late Jack Sutherland of Cos-

grove

When young Jack turned up at a live bird shoot at the Shepparton Gun Club for the first time, he shocked the crowd and the referee by using black powder shells; the referee was unable to see the result! Mick furnished young Jack with a box of smokeless cartridges, and the young sportsman left little doubt in the minds of those who saw him shoot, that here was a youth who would eventually became a world beater. He later joined the Kynock Co. in 1907. He became known on the Shooting fields of Australia and overseas as "Calrossie". He created a world record in 1928 in shooting 128 straight in one shoot, at the home of Trap Shooting Monte Carlo.

I bought my first .22 rifle from Mr Halpin in 1922, it was a single shot B.S.A. bolt action with a heavy barrel; and later a .22 trombone repeater also a B.S.A. Regretfully I do not have the rifles now, they both would bring me many memories of the wonderful shooting

available in the 1920's.

The Halpin family still run the gun shop and sports store in Fryers Street, Shepparton, where Mick eventually built his own premises which bears the name in raised letters, high on the shop front, M. HALPIN 1884 — his son Bernie and grandson Gerald are at the helm of the business which Mick started some 93 years ago.

This event came about by Bob boasting that he had three skeet teams from Melbourne Gun Club and that any one of them could lick a team from N.S.W. and judging by the way those Mexicans performed at Wangaratta the week before Bob had every right to be confident but he failed to check on those quietly confident N.S.W. boys who took all the Mexican ribbing and remarked that they would see what would happen when they got to Wagga.

Saturday the 22nd arrived and Ted Patterson, Adrian Hayes and Barney Rooke took on the job of Selectors for the N.S.W. Team. Bob Buchan presented his top team: Alex Crikis, John Summers, Ken Lowry, Ian Hale and Stan Daymond. The N.S.W. Team consisted of Ted Patterson, Adrian Hayes, Barney Rooke, Reg Clark and Eugene Kavanagh.

At the end of the first day 375 targets per team had been recorded and N.S.W. held a lead of three targets over Melbourne and with a further 375 targets per team to shoot on Sunday. The N.S.W. boys were really starting to rub it in and the team spirit was really high.

Sunday 23rd and the weather man was very kind to us all. Well at the end of the days shooting N.S.W. excelled themselves with some very fine shooting from all the team and dropping only eight targets for the day where as the Melbourne boys lost 11 targets. Final scores being N.S.W. 733/750, Melbourne Gun Club 727/750.

This of course had a quietening effect on Bob but not for long as he said to wait till we get you down to the Melbourne Gun Club.

Well Bob we are ready and waiting anytime. I sincerely hope that this sort of Teams event is not forgotten. The interest shown by all was to be seen on the scoreboard which was so expertly done by Clyde Hawkins.

I seem to have spent a lot of time on this event but those that were at the shoot will understand so now on with the shoot:--

Event1. 25 target E.O. 11 shooters shot the possible.

Event 2. 50 target N.S.W. Team Elimination. Possibles were shot by four N.S.W. boys, Ted Patterson, Reg Clark, Eric Vincent and our National President Ern Hawkins. Vic boys to shoot the 50 were Ken Lowry, A. Summers, J. Summers, Bill Iles. Three places were required from a long list of 47 to make the 15-man N.S.W. Team.

Event 3 got under way, the N.S.W. U.I.T. Championship, whilst the Skeet was in progress. Leading scores after the first 50 targets were Ken Lowry 49/50, Jim Ellis 49/50 Bill Isles 47/50 and Doug Lucas 47/50. This event was continued on Sunday, Ken Lowry dropping to a 19 and Jim Ellis a 23 but Bill: Iles shot a very good 25 so we had Jim Ellis and Bill Isles both with 72/75. Event 4. The N.S.W. Skeet Championship. Only one possible and this was by Bill: Iles. There were seven 49's to shoot off for 2nd and 3rd places. A long battle saw Barney Rooke getting the better of Reg. Clark on the 93rd target for 2nd and Reg 3rd. By the way Reg Clark ran a break of 168 targets and Barney Rooke 159 straight.



A Shooter's View on Firearms Legislation

from Geoff Rabbidge

"The Menace of The Gun" has been a major topic for daily news media, emotionalism in recent months all demanding Government action to restrict ownership by the decent law abiding citizen of their sporting firearms. It is already illegal for the criminal to have firearms in his possession and penalties for criminal mis-use of firearms are severe, providing maxium penalties are invoked.

Why this attack on a recreation that has one of the largest followings in this why this attack on a recreation that has one of the largest followings in this country? Basically it is lack of knowledge of journalists of the subject or in the case of Police Associations, Bank Officers, Security Companies, etc., a cover up for their inability to carry out the job they are paid to do.

Should these people and those responsible for advising Governments take the time to do a little home-work on what the effect of the suggestions they ex-

pound would have on criminal mis-use of firearms, they would find there is no case for the cause of inconvenience to the recreational shooter, firearm collec-

There is right now a most ridiculous situation in this country where we have the Western Australian Government reviewing their State's laws with a view to doing away with the country's strictest controls which have been enforced for over fifty years (W.A. has a rate of criminal mis-use with firearms above most other States). At the same time other States are reviewing their laws with a view to stricker controls.

England is possibly the best country to use as a sample of the effect of firearm controls with uniform laws throughout and being an island, no borders allow easy smuggling of illegal firearms, yet the very strict controls over ownership have achieved nothing in reducing criminal mis-use, in fact the

armed crime rate is growing.

The Sporting Shooters' Association and The Field and Game Association have put before the Governments in all States contemplating change, detailed submissions - these are lengthly, so only the main point are highlighted in this

Both Associations believe the laws as introduced into New South Wales under The Firearms and Dangerous Weapons Act 1973 are more than adequate to deal with the criminal mis-use problem.

Parliament comment at the time of introduction confirms this:

"The Firearms and Dangerous Weapons Act, 1973 is such a measure, and indeed it can be truly said that it is an "all parties" Bill, having been the result

of representations from all bodies concerned, with strong support from Honourable Members of both sides of the House. The Minister at the time (Mr Griffith) particularly emphasises this feature: "... I conclude my remarks by saying that if ever a bill was of a nature that could be described as a non-party measure, this is such a bill. It deals with an important subject of vital concern to the citizens of this State. In that spirit I commend it" (refer Hansard No. 53 of April 3, 1973, page 4293, para. 2).

Mr Degen, in leading for the Opposition on the bill, offers Labor's full support, and to quote from para. 4 of the same page in Hansard: "... I congratulate the Minister upon introducing this sensible legislation, which has the effect of forcing irresponsible elements within the shooting community out of effect of forcing irresponsible elements within the shooting community out of the sport, which must give it a better name. Shooting is a sport that jealously enjoys a good name in the community. The Opposition agrees wholeheartedly with the measure..." On page 4299, para. 7, Mr Degen elaborates further, and points to the undesirability of extending to police too much power under the Bill: "The Opposition welcomes the introduction of legislation to control the sale and use of firearms and to give the police certain powers, although in some cases the Minister has given more power than the police want. We will move nine amendments to the bill."

The Honourable Member for Granville, Mr Flaherty, an experienced shooter of long standing, likewise afforded assistance during passage of the bill, and is recorded on page 4301, para. 3: "I agree with the remarks of the honourable member for Balmain who led for the Opposition on this important legislation to bring in a completely new Act to be known as the Firearms and Dangerous Weapons Act, etc. . . . Over the years I have often been annoyed at the attacks made on the shooting fraternity by the various forms of news media. Often I have felt that their views were way off the beam. While I admit that there is an element within our society that should not be allowed to use firearms, I believe that the rights of the legitimate shooter should be preserved at all times. Under the provisions of the bill these rights will be preserved.

The New South Wales Premier Mr Wran at the time of the last State election sent the following telegram to S.S.A.A. who had asked him to confirm that he would not alter the New South Wales laws.

The assurance you seek is given - stop. We are committed as a matter of

In essence the Act could generally be said to have three basic aims, which admittedly are contained in six divisions spread over 85 sections:

(1) To introduce a form of reasonable and acceptable control over the carriage and use of firearms, with the aim being to reduce their casual and vandal misuse — Section 22. (Refer Mr Hewitt, page 4539, para. 2 midway — see Attachment 8.)



(2) To introduce new criminal and penal provisions where firearms are possesed, carried or used in connection with crime -- Sections 47, 49 and 58

(3) To repeal certain sections of the existing Act that had long since

become outmoded and were serving the community no real benefit.

In relations to (1) above, Section 22 appears to be working fairly well in that since the Act was gazetted, so far approximately 200,000 Shooters' Licences have currently been issued, and shooters generally appear to be complying with their obligations. Where they do not, police are now in a position to prefer charges if warranted, whereas before it was not quite so easy, particularly as shooters were not required to be licensed in the past.

It is significant to note that none of the recent press comment has even remotely touched on the positive achievements in this area, and in this exercise the press are in fact failing to identify the salient features of this complex question. Much emotive emphasis is apparently being placed on the purchase of firearms, which in reality tends to bear little direct correlation to their misuse in acts of crime. At the dealer interface, a precise record of any firearms' movement is recorded in the dealer's register book, and likewise duplicated in the courier's records upon delivery should the firearm be delivered by courier. If the courier be Royal Mail, then the Act stipulates that it must be by re-gistered mail, in which case a record is once again kept of that firearm's mov-

We therefore see no need for any change in this area, particularly in relation to any increase in documentation of firearms as this would in fact be a form of registering firearms, and would by way of natural progression lead to full registration in due course with associated police discretion, to which we remain totally opposed for a number of well founded reasons which are now elaborated

It should be emphasised that the registration of firearms as such was never intended to be part of the new legislation and the Government had this to say at the time: "... Suggestions that have been made in various quarters for the complete licensing or registration of all firearms have been carefully considered, but the Government is convinced that the magnitude of the task pre-cludes its implementation . . . criminals." (Mr Griffith, page 4287, para. 3

There is ample research material on hand to support this viewpoint, and one particular work has been presented in the form of a text book by British Police Superintendent, Colin Greenwood, who recently conducted such research as a Cropwood short term fellow at Cambridge University in the faculty of Criminology. The study is deep and thorough and commences with the laws governing the possession of arms by citizens from the reign of Henry II in 1181, through the reign of Henry VIII in 1541, the Bill of Rights of William and Mary of Orange in 1688, the industrial disturbances of 1811 and 1812, the Seizure of Arms Act 1820, the studies of arms sales and the conclusions derived at the time from a report to Parliament 15th May 1839 and the Gun Licences Act 1870 which basically remained in force until 1967. At this stage it is interesting to note that the Police reports of injuries by shooting for 1902 when Britain's population was 29,000,000 and the total police forces numbered approximately 44,000 do not indicate a condition of serious waves of armed crime, and indeed if the figures contained in these police reports could be claimed for today the results would be thought to be most satisfactory. A measure of firearms ownership for this period is certainly not insignificant, as we note that in the year 1902, 27,000 pistols of British make alone were submitted for proof to the Birmingham Proof House.

A study of the history and development of firearms legislation through the years both in Australia and overseas has exhibited a pattern which is often repeated without variation (as Greenwood confirms), namely that there has been a notable absence of reliable research, and in almost every case such statistics as have been presented have been vague and unreliable and have lacked points of comparison. Legislation has frequently been related to relatively isolated incidents and has often reached beyond the scope of the incident to affect many people by way of unnecessarily restrictive legislation in no way connected with that type of event. In almost every case the sponsors of Bills have strenuously asserted limited aims for the specific legislation, yet as soon as those Bills have become law they have been criticised for failing to

achieve far wider aims which were not even set for them.

We might ask what the past 50 or so years of exceedingly strict controls of pistols in N.S.W. has done to prevent the use of pistols in armed crime, and the answer is of course the creation of pools of unlicensed pistols for criminal purposes, and N.S.W. police statistics would clearly show that the majority of pistols so used are not licensed to the offenders. Chapter 15 of Greenwood "indicates that 50 years of strict controls on pistols have left a vast pool of illegal weapons, and although large numbers are surrendered in successive am-

weapons, and although large numbers are surrendered in successive am-nesties to police each year it is difficult to avoid the conclusion that this is only the tip of an iceberg," and of course one may well wonder how many remain in circulation and to what detriment to the community. Supt. Greenwood in fact concludes that registration of firearms serves little purpose in relation to the administrative costs involved and that: "... Careful examination of all the evidence available, suggests, therefore that (existing) legislation has failed to bring under control substantial numbers of firearms, and it certainly cannot be claimed that strict controls have reduced the use of firearms in crime. Indeed it is possible to build up a sound case for abolishing or substantially reducing controls . . . The evidence indicates that a much simplified system of licensing the individual would produce no less effect than the system now imposed. In the light of these facts, it should surely be for the proponents of the system of registration to establish its value. If they fail to do

so, the system should be abandoned.

Within the framework of the present control, the proposition that further restrictions on the holders of firearm or shotgun certificates will help solve the

problem of armed crime, just cannot be supported. It is evident that firearms, at present, in the hands of legitimate users who hold certificates present virtually no problem to the community..." (See Greenwood: conclusions and suggestions, page 247, paragraph 1 — reference 1 enclosed).

Clearly then on the basis of this work, it would seem difficult for any ad-

ministrative arm of Government to put forward a substantial brief for further restrictions on firearms. Disproportionate attention is often applied, by these people, to the arms themselves, but when this approach is examined closely by the enlightened mind, it is always found to be begging credibility and not real-

It is always to the specialised area of firearms jurisprudence at all.

This matter has recently been taken up with the Australian Minister for Police and Customs with a view to deleting items 2 and 30 of the Second Schedule of the Customs (Prohibited Imports) Regulations relating to military firearms on the basis that these are outmoded and unnecessary prohibitions. After full consideration of the question the Minister's response to this request has been most favourable and he has indicated that a complete review of his controls will be conducted in view of the more up-to-date legislation that has been enacted in recent times by the States. He has dispensed with the system of import registration of firearms and you may note particularly para. 2 of his

Both Western Australia and Victoria have experienced strict forms of firearms legislation, Western Australia since 1931 to the present day and Victoria between 1952 and 1972, involving police discretion over purchase, possession and type. If this form of legislation has offered the citizens of these two States better protection against crin.e with firearms, then it is certainly not apparent in the demographic reports depicting the figures compiled for homicides with firearms. If we select at random any three years within that 1952-1972 range, say 1953, 1955, 1961, we have the following:--

New South Wales has had no controls over the lawful purchase and possession of firearms over the same period. However, it can be observed that both Western Australia and Victoria are as well represented, per capita, as New South Wales in homicides with firearms. Clearly then for these periods the registration of firearms does not appear to have had any significant reduc-ing effect on the homicides for Western Australia and Victoria.

As indicated beforehand the results of Greenwood's work highlight the limitations and failings of the Firearms Registration system as a crimereducing instrument. Responsible shooting organisations feel that the public are entitled to the best mode of protection available by way of sound, relevant and efficient legislation. To this end, we support the Shooters' Licence Scheme as opposed to strict controls over firearms themselves. This system encourages responsible behaviour with firearms in the field, minimal consumption of police manpower and works well when backed up by strong penal provisions for criminal misapplication of firearms.

In the State of Victoria in 1952 when the Firearms Act was first introduced, it was modelled along the British system whereby Firearm Certificates were required to purchase and possess centre-fire rifles, and this embodies complete registration of the arm with close police supervision and discretion on issue.

As time went by questions were being asked as to the effectiveness of this Act when compared with police effort involved, and particularly when it appeared that it was not producing the crime reduction effect as its proponents originally claimed that it would (C. F. Greenwood's finding in Britain). The Government directed the Statute Law Revision Committee (see Attachment 12) in Victoria to study this question and present recommendations to Parliament, and this was done in due course through the Minister. The conclusions were interesting and quite significant in that they recommended that shotguns not be registered and that a shooters' licence system be introduced, as the best form of controls were those that were directed more closely towards the in-

Nothing much however transpired, and it was not until 1966 when the same committee was again requested to look into the question (see Attachment 13) and again came up with the same answer with the addition that the current system of registration of centre-fire rifles be dropped. Other groups (such as the S.S.A.A.) were now becoming interested in the matter since the Act was being more rigidly enforced by the Police because results were not forthcomng, and indeed some members of the Association were even experiencing difficulties in obtaining Firearm Certficiates.

The Victorian Government now decided to act and after an extensive redrafting period the rigidly enforced registration system was dispensed with in entirety and the Shooters' Licence System introduced there in 1972.

Any suggestion from our law enforcement agency (or any other source) that further restrictions should be enacted against the arms themselves would fail to attract support from the shooting fraternity generally and country people in particular. The Shooters' Licence is intended to (and in fact does) exercise a

real measure of control over the carriage and use of firearms, and the provisions of Sections 40 (3) and 48 (2) of the Act, catering specifically for the requirements of primary producers — including their dependents and workers, students of firearms, historians and collectors, etc., are considered to be essential and should not be changed.

The manner in which a Shooters' Licence is issued has been evolved as the most practical model available, having been established as a result of detailed discussions and negotiations in committee with the Minister for Services and his Departmental offices, the N.S.W. Police Firearms Committee, the Sporting Shooters' Association of Australia and other kindred firearms user organisations. All other aspects of the Firearms and Dangerous Weapons Act, 1973 have been similarly explored and analysed, with the result that a satisfactory level of agreement and concurrence has been attained as to how the Act should be implemented.

Specifically in the area of the issue of Shooters' Licences, complete agreement was achieved and Superintendent V. Taylor, Chairman of the Police Firearms Committee, gave the Department's clear cut assurance that Shooters' Licences would be issued 'on the spot' subject to the obligations and qualifications of the Applicant under the Act. This is confirmed in Mr Lendrum's letter to the Association of 18th February, 1975, and subsequently transmitted to Police as an instruction in Permanent Circular No. 164 of the 25th July, 1975, page 11, clauses 39, 40 and 41.

Evidence has been offered earlier in this submission that the Shooters' Licence is working as envisaged and logically therefore firearms owners and the shooting movement in general would never support any changes to the

method of application and issue of Shooters' Licences.

The Minister at the time fully agreed that the Shooters' Licence should be issued without delay and in response to Mr Degan he clearly laid any doubts to rest as to how the Shooters' Licence should be issued:

"The honourable member for Balmain stressed one point that seems to worry the Opposition more than anything else — and I know it worried a lot of other people. I repeat, clearly and emphatically, that it is the Government's intention that the obtaining of a shooter's licence will be a simple task. It is not intended that any impediment will be placed in the way of a normal law-abiding person who wishes to obtain a licence. The honourable member for Balmain said something to the effect that it would require an additional 500 police to issue these licences, but that remark is way off the beam. It is intended that a person who wishes to be issued with a licence can go along to a police station, submit an application for a shooter's licence and, provided there is no reason why it should not be issued, get one on the spot. I do not see any difficulty in this respect. In fact, I am assured by the police — particularly the senior police officer in

In considering any control over the ownership and use of Firearms', we must carefully appraise the effect such controls would have on their legitimate

The value of shooting is completely overlooked — a point strongly taken up in The Field and Game Association submission.

In a recent survey conducted by Field and Game members over a larger cross section of the community than most published polls, it was found that approximately 247,000 people left the metropolitan area of Sydney at an average of 3.4 times to go hunting, their trips were over 600 kilometres.

The survey showed an average of three people per vehicle, making 82,333 trips, giving vehicle distance travelled of approximately 167,960,000 trips, giving vehicle distance travelled of approximately 167,960,000 kilômetres, which is over 20 million litres of petrol, excise on this alone is a valuable contribution to the nation's economy. When sales tax, import duties, company and personal taxes, derived from shooters' equipment purchases; sales of food, refreshments, accommodation, so needed by country towns, the export returns from higher yields of rice, wheat, wool and other produce, due to pest irradication by the shooter and the contribution to the national food larder of harvestable wild game, then adding the figures for other New South Wales cities and towns, and the tourist participation from other States, it can be seen chooting is by for the most valuable recentional activity this State. be seen shooting is by far, the most valuable recreational activity this State has.

Regrettably, there does not appear to be any official survey regarding the value of recreational shooting in this State. Victoria has for many years realised the benefits and has several detailed studies on record. We submit a graph from a Joint study by C.S.I.R.O. Division of Wildlife and the Victorian Ministry of Conservation Fisheries and Wildlife Division concerning the 1972 open season on water-fowl in South Eastern Australia, which we believe substantiates the survey of distance travelled conducted by New South Wales Field and Game Association and also reflects the number of visitors to this State. The survey was a sampling of 1,000 shooters, who mainly travelled from Melbourne. In that year over 60,000 Victorian shooters' visited New South Wales for the duck season.

A copy of an arrangement between The Field and Game Association and The Rice Growers' Association for control of wild ducks. This arrangement has lifted rice yields considerably and more importantly eliminated the use of dangerous poisons, which, whilst controlling ducks, were killing many thousands of other species of water-birds. Species that in themselves were of the utmost value in the control of destructive insects, such as the grasshopper, which must be added to the chain of cost saving, as this cuts down the need for insecticide spraying and lowers the ecological damage insecticides

We will not enlarge on the shooters' part in feral pig, goat, wild dog and other animal pests; our submission to your Government at the time of the "1080" poison inquiry covers this in detail.

The recreational benefits of hunting in relation to physical fitness must also be considered. The advantages of this, we believe, does not need expanding. The psychological benefits upon father-son relationships and with young people in learning self reliance necessary in becoming a skilled hunter, is a sub-

ject worthy of much more attention.

The tourist value of shooting we believe, has great advantages to this State, particularly in regards to duck hunters. To improve the ease with which inter-state shooters' can visit New South Wales, we urge you to arrange for the Minister of Services to meet with his counterparts in other States, to initiate a scheme of reciprocal use of Shooters' Licences in all States.

The current system of re-licensing, an already licenced shooter only adds additional costs to the administration and cannot be shown to be of any benefit

the control of criminal mis-use of firearms.

The Field and Game Association considers The New South Wales Firearms nd Dangerous Weapons Act 1973, gives all the teeth necessary for Firearms antrol. The current method of shooter licencing and issue of these licences is dequate, providing the Act is properly policed and that when convictions are cade, penalties are invoked, that will deter others from committing the same crime.

We do not believe that you and your Government would in any way be influenced by the recent prolonged emotionalism of one section of the media.

We would like to place on record our fears of the dangers of such mis-guided journalism. Dangers that we consider cannot be better expressed than by quoting Chief Inspector Colin Greenwood's closing paragraph of his book, "Firearms Control":

To continue with the process of attempting to deal with the criminal use of firearms by placing more restrictions on legitimate users is not likely to achieve anything. But the great danger lies, not in the ineffectiveness of such restrictions, but in the belief that they will solve the problem. Whilst this mistaken belief persists the real problem will not receive the attention and action which is clearly and urgently required."

ABC'S FOR SPORTSMEN
In one of the last pieces he wrote for the Remington Newsletter

before retiring as Remington's public relations manager in July 1959, the late Henry P. Davis compiled a list of what he called ABC's for Sportsmen.

"There is much more to sportsmanship than the mere practice of to-the-letter obedience to the game laws," Davis said. "A man may never violate a game law or break a club rule and still not be a real sportsman, for he may be refraining from doing these things because he has to, not because he wants to. Real sportsmanship cannot be defined or bounded by rules.

"There are certain maxims, however," containued Davis, "that are worthy of constant remembrance, lest we carelessly or thoughtlessly stray from proper field behavior. They are not rules, just reminders. As they run the gamut of the alphabet, I call them ABC's for Sportsmen. They could just as well be called XYZ's, too. I think they're worth looking over.

We think Henry Davis' ABC's for Sportsmen are still worth looking over eighteen years later; so we are repeating them here not only for a new generation of sportsmen, but as timeless reminders for

Always practice safe gun handling.

Be considerate of the landowner. You are his guest.

Conduct yourself as a SPORTSMAN should.

Don't be a game hog.

Educate youth in the principles of sportsmanship.

Favor the fellow who is hunting with you.

Give wildlife a break. Work for its conservation.

Have the location of your hunting partner always in mind.

Influence others to hunt safely.

Join a sportsman's organisation.

Keep that gun muzzle elevated.

Leave some game for seed stock.

Make sure of your target before you shoot.

Never leave a cripple to go to waste.

Obey the game laws to the letter. Put yourself in the other fellow's place. Treat him accordingly.

Quit harping about game shortages and do something about it.

Retrieve every piece of game you knock down.

Share your game bag with the farmer.

Take a boy, other than your own, hunting or fishing. Unite your fellow sportsmen in a common effort to provide

better hunting and fishing.

Value and protect your right to own and bear firearms. Work for all sound game management measures. X may mark the spot if you mix gun powder and alcohol.

Young America's future field sport depends on You. Zeal in game restoration activities will pay big dividends.

Over the years he has had many wins including 27 gold medals, 23 at live birds and 4 at Clays, and at 77 he is still shooting each Saturday and looking forward to the Christmas Shoots.

On many occasions he has said to young and old if he had his life over again he would choose no other sport as he has made wonderful friendships over the years.

He is one of nature's gentlemen and a thorough sportsman. I know, having shot with him since Boxing Day 1923.

Constitutional Reform -

The Victorian Clay Target Association View

(from Bob Buchan, State President)

On behalf of the Victorian State Association we wish to reply to the article on the constitution which appeared on Page 6 Sub-Item 2 and 3 in the November issue of C.T.S.N.

As the Victorian State Association, who represent 76 clubs and 2,856 A.C.T.A. shooters, are aware our sport and activities of the A.C.T.A. deserve much more promotion in our community. We also believe the Constitution must be updated to allow for State Association would would enable the rank and file shooting members to become more involved in their chosen sport.

In opposing Sub-Item 2 and 3, we are aware that suggestions must be made, they are as follows:

Firstly: - Sub-Item 2 "That the right to vote at General Meetings of the A.C.T.A. be restricted to nine delegates as nominated by each State Association.'

Where is there equity in that proposal when one looks at the number of clubs in each State, such as Victoria 76, New South Wales 80, Queensland 51, South Australia 29, Western Australia 24, and

If we are to have a change in the number of delegates to the Annual General Meeting we propose an amendment that one delegate per four clubs in each state attend. Example - two delegates from states which have 8 clubs, three delegates for states which have 12

The Victorian Association will agree that at the Annual General Meeting, the majority of clubs are not represented, but that would be rectified by more active zones and State Associations.

Secondly:—Sub-Item 3.
"That the representation on the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee for the States of New South Wales, which would include the A.C.T., Victoria and Queensland be reduced from four delegates to two delegates."

It must be pointed out most strongly that no reduction was made to South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania, who would still retain their two delegates.

The Victorian State Association is most strongly opposed to this provision in the proposed article in the Constitution for very obvious reasons which we submit to all concerned.

We propose an Amendment to the proposed article of Sub-Item 3. The Amendment is "That the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee be reduced in voting power by half from each State. It would allow two delegates with full voting power from Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland, one delegate with full voting power from South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania." End of Amendment.

Our reason for this is, as was mentioned earlier, the number of clubs in each State. We now quote the number of shooters that each State has registered - Victoria 2,856, New South Wales, including the A.C.T., 2,320, Queensland 1,814, South Australia 928, Western Australia 745, and Tasmania 476. The combined total of S.A., W.A. and Tasmania is 67 clubs, 2,149 shooters. We then ask you to compare the revenue that each State returns to the A.C.T.A. in registrations - Victoria \$42,840, New South Wales and A.C.T. \$34,800, Queensland \$27,210, South Australia \$13,920, Western Australia \$11,175 and Tasmania \$7,140.

The Amendment if accepted would reduce the A.C.T.A. Executive to nine members plus the A.C.T.A. President, with the result that expenses would be reduced by approximately half, we all must be aware of the expense of running the A.C.T.A. this alone would greatly reduce the cost.

Those States with only one vote should be allowed an observer from those States.

Our Reasons for our Amendment to the Proposed Constitution

In the article it mentioned "Proxies" - we are aware that this does exist, at times, but not in the proportion the article would like us to believe. We must not forget that in many cases where this was reported those delegates were sometimes members of two or three clubs and sometimes held office in more than one Club.

Why were postal votes not considered? At A.G.M. it has always been supported that we accept this system. We do believe this should be explained to clubs.

We ask you all how can we support proposals that call for a reduction of delegates and Executive Members from Victoria, New South

Wales and Queensland, after we look at the figures that have been presented to you earlier in this article. We believe that equity in numbers must not be overlooked. We only have to look at Federal Parliament - do States that have a small population have the same number of representatives as those States with much greater population? Certainly NOT. Let us look at the various Boards and Associations, the Stock Exchange is a good comparison, Victoria and New South Wales, which has more members and turnover and has more votes than other States for the same reason we are asking for. The Wheat Board for instance is a good example - those States such as Victoria and Tasmania have a much smaller voting power than Western Australia and New South Wales - reason production.

We do believe that those States which would only have one vote must be given the opportunity to bring along one delegate or observer from their State Association with no voting voting power...

This would be of great help to those States A.C.T.A. delegate for many reasons, even if it was only to discuss matters that might or might not help that State, it also would be an insurance to those States with one vote that their A.C.T.A. Executive man is looking after their welfare and wishes.

It is true that the Victorian A.C.T.A. Executive who did attend the Executive meeting in Brisbane where these proposed constitutional changes were voted on, did support it at that time, we were given very little time to discuss the subject. Since then we, the State A.C.-T.A. Executive members, having had time to think and talk to fellow administrators of clubs and our State Association, Victoria is certain that an honest and hasty mistake in Brisbane was made by we Vic-

We all hope this matter will be dealt with in Adelaide at the Annual General Meeting, because alterations are long overdue. Please do not rush them through without being discussed.

The Life of a Shooter —In Retrospect

(by A. A. Edwards, Townsville Gun Club).

It seems only yesterday that an old uncle of mine handed me an early model .22 rifle and suggested that I go into the orchard and shoot the parrots that were eating the apples. I can remember saying: "You mean those birds that are making all the noise?" and his terse reply: "No, shoot the quiet ones. They are doing all the eating." I never dreamed that this was to be the beginning of a life-time of shooting that lay ahead of me, for, from then on, life did not seem complete unless I was carrying a gun, or a rifle of some sort.

I was one of a large family living on the Goulburn River near Alexandra Victoria. The week-end meat supply mainly consisted of rabbits, or whatever could be shot. Ducks were rather difficult to hit with a .22. However, my brother and I. by dint of hard work, saved up 2 pounds and bought a H & R

brother and I, by dint of hard work, saved up 2 pounds and bought a H & R single shotgun, and what fun we had on 'Duck Opening Morning', taking it in turn to try and drop a few ducks. This is where we probably learnt to point a

gun with the correct lead, and not sight it.

After the 1914-18 War, a few businessmen got together and formed a Clay
Target Club and started shooting on the Alexandra Showgrounds. This Club is
still active and is now established some two miles out of town.

About this time, my brother and I left school and started picking up a little money around the farms, mainly chasing rabbits or foxes and receiving a few money around the farms, mainly chasing rabbits or loxes and receiving a few bob in return. Of course, skins were good in this cold climate, a buck skin fetching one shilling, and a good fox skin one pound. We pooled our money and bought a new double barrel shotgun for 4 pounds, and joined the Gun Club. Cartridges were, I think, five shillings per box of twenty-five.

From then on, we shot at various Clubs. One, I remember, was Yea. Then there was a trip to Melbourne to watch renowned Champions like "Duxbac", "Calrossi", "Wee-Doc-and-Doris" — each used a nom-de-plume, which is not

allowed today. These shooters had very expensive guns made by Hollis, W. Greener, Holloway, and Purdy. One, I recall, was gold-engraved and cost about 100 pounds, an enormous sum in those days.

Eventually, I joined the Light Horse, for this meant a chance to use the .303, or Big Bore Rifle, and a trip every year to the Light Horse Camp at Broadmeadows, and a day's shooting on the Williamstown Rifle Range. What an experience it was to watch hundreds of targets moving up and down, and to actually take part in a shoot, our bullets whistling out to sea.

Up to, and through, the Depression years, our main source of income was

the rabbit (or underground mutton, as it was often referred to). Some of the sheep and cow 'cockies' kept us in cartridges and paid us a few bob to clear their paddocks of rabbits and foxes. The part we enjoyed most was driving the scrubs in the small bends of the river, with the best shot put at a point where we decided a fox would most likely exit from. We used a special cartridge loaded with No. 2 or 3 shot and made by Donald Mackintosh, Melbourne.

After the Depression, my brother and I saved our fares to go to Queensland, where, we were told, there was plenty of work and better money. This proved to be true, in some respects. However, we moved to Queensland and settled in

Home Hill

After a time, the Ayr and Home Hill Rifle Clubs were formed. We also shot for some years on the Cluden Range, Townsville, competing in the "Kings" and later in the "Queens", and visited other Clubs — Bowen, Mackay, Halifax,

Ravenshoe, Cairns and Charters Towers.

My first love has always been the Shotgun. I was a Foundation Member of My ITST love has always been the Shotgun. I was a roundation Meinter of the Ayr Gun Club, first shooting at Brandon, and later on the Ayr Race Track, in 1940, where I won my first Championship. I travelled to Perth and competed at Western Australian Gun Clubs, shot in the Nationals at Belmont, and competed at Charters Towers, Herbert River and Silkwood Gun Clubs. My most cherished memories include winning a Commonwealth Title at Ingham, 1957, and a Winchester O/U Shotgun at the old Giru grounds. In 1964, to my surprise, I made the Queensland State Team to shoot at Atherton.

My main interest has been with the Townsville Gun Club, first shooting at Pimlico, then at Thornley Park - this name comes from the Chinee Apple which abounds there. This was where Australia's great sportsman, Newton

Thomas shot his first clay targets. The Townsville Gun Club now shoot on their own beautiful and spacious grounds at "Killymoon", a few miles from the city.

After Big Bore .303 and 7.62 shooting, off and on over the years, I decided I should like a change. Consequently I joined the Sporting Shooters' Association of Australia in 1969, and shot with the Townsville Branch at Cluden and later at the Brookhill Range. I have enjoyed my association with the Townsville Branch. Despite my success with S.S.A.A. Awards, I found the elusive 'Diamond' always just out of reach.

The type of shooting provided by S.S.A.A. presents a wonderful opportunity for young people "to get away from it all," to learn how to handle firearms safely, and in particular, to become knowledgeable in the finer techniques of

shooting.

I have been honoured by the Townsville Gun Club by being elected their Patron for the past two years, and by a similar Office in the Townsville Branch, S.S.A.A., which also conferred on me Life Membership.

I have returned many times to my old haunts at Alexandra, in the Kelly country, but have always been glad to return to Queensland.

I look back over a long life of shooting and believe that there is no better Sport to test concentration and perserverance and to develop good sportsmanship -- for, as we all know, competitive shooting provides more disappointments than successes

New Ways to Counter Ducks on Rice

To discourage wild ducks from damaging rice crops, some Griffith growers are feeding rice to ducks on the Barren Bock swamp, which abuts their properties.

The move was so successful last season that more swamp-side growers have joined the voluntary duck-feeding group this year.

This was said by Peter Moore, field officer, National Parks and Wildlife Service of NSW, last month.

The Griffith-based officer was speaking at the Victorian Field and Game Association's Wildlife Management conference at Latrobe University, Melbourne.

A cartridge that is used to scare birds from airports is being used despite is 45c cost. It is far more effective than the conventional cartridge because it travels 70 metres before exploding with the noise and light of a powerful cracker.

A strong light that oscillates back and forth across a crop also de-

ters birds.

Noise makers, coupled to amplifiers, are increasing.

Scare guns alone are ineffective; they need to be backed by shooting, Mr Moore said.

Ducks cause more damage to aerial-sown crops than crops planted by combine in which the seed is pushed into the ground.

The shooting of ducks on the rice is a crop-protection method not a sport shooting open season, Mr Moore said.

Spotlight shooting is illegal. So is taking birds other than by gun.

Poisoning is banned. The NP&WL Service would like to hear from shooters who suspect that poison has been used. In such an instance the service would press for maximum penalty.

Ninety-five per cent of ducks shot are wood duck, black duck and grey teal, in roughly equal proportions.

This season ducks have been no problem, Mr Moore said. (TOM GANNON, Korumburra Gun Club).

CLAY TARGETS IN PARADISE

(Gordon Nelis, Brisbane Gun Club).

NOTE: Although a report on the New Caledonian Matches appeared in December issue of CTSN, this story depicts a different view and is published in the interests of broadening our understanding of overseas contests and conditions.

For the 4th Championnat Open de Ball Trap de Nouvelle Caledonie 1977 our French hosts, the Ligue de Tir de Nouvelle Caledonie, had in their wisdom moved program date from early August as in previous years to early October due to inclement weather conditions experienced at earlier championships.

Their strategy paid off handsomely — the weather was absolutely beautiful for entire championships making our visit to this glorious

tropical paradise even more enjoyable.

The Victorian contingent were first to arrive to avail themselves of full practice period and consisted of our team manager Dr Raymond Young and his charming wife Jennifer, Tony Rowe, Tom and Beryl Lucas, Max and Margaret Vipond and a couple of roving vagabonds in the personages of Vince Molica and Alan Bould. The banana-benders, Graham and Janet Napier from Nambour (Sunshine Coast Gun Club), Barry Nelis and his eldest daughter Vicky, Gordon Nelis and his wife Beverley (Brisbane Gun Club) arrived later to catch last practice day.

It was great to renew old acquaintances with friends we had not seen for sometime. A team had arrived from Tahiti under the captaincy of Ms. Mavro and a very strong Kiwi team, thawing out nicely from their severe winter, was also present lead by Sid Hanson, Secretary of the New Zealand Clay Target Association. Our New Caledonian hosts had already selected teams from their keenly contested eliminations. The only disappointment to us all was the absense of Tony Pavsic and his crew from New Guinea, but a business trip to Europe clashed with match dates so Tony could not be with us ...

Accommodations at Chateau Royal were excellent as usual. Evening dinner entertainment at the Chateau's Beach Hut was superb, the various Polynesian dancing groups excelling themselves, and a must - for those not worried about a fire dance under a huge native grass thatch roof that is!

Ringside tables are not recommended for the faint of heart during the Wallisian dancers routine; at the outset I was not too happy at having a roof support post partially obstructing my view, but after

observing their incredible dexterity and speed twirling machettes and fighting axes - I was pleased to have something to duck behind, just in case.

English speaking movies were screened several nights a week and hotel management hosted regular get-together cocktail parties. These social activities were at no cost to house guests.

There are many first class restaurants in Noumea specialising in everything from local seafoods and French traditional to genuine Chinese. Nightclubs also aplenty; if you visit "La Mafia" your own machine gun.

Then, if you feel lucky, at 9 p.m. the Casino Royale throws open its doors and they can keep you busy at Roulette and Blackjack - until four in the morning if you wish. If you 'go bust' before 4 a.m. you can drown your sorrows in "Nicks Nite Club" next door.

The Chateau has well appointed tennis courts and a magnificent swimming pool sunbathing area. It is also right on Anse Vata beach. And fellah's -- the beach sights you would not believe!

Boat trips leave from the Chateau's private jetty and all manner of water sports from skindiving to water ski-ing are provided by the Chateau's Nauticlub. The local bus service is regular and efficient, leaving the Chateau's front door every twenty minutes or so. Ten to fifteen minutes later you are in the centre of the shopping area with its sidewalk cafes, fashion shops and department stores; not to mention the dozens of local handicraft souvenir shops with much of their merchandise marked 'made in Taiwan' or some such.

And men, when the spouse moves around fashion clothing bearing

'Dior' and 'Cardin' labels -- you can forget the budget!

Match program this year totalled 600 targets; 200 targets Fosse Universelle, 200 targets Skeet Olympique, 200 targets Fosse Americaine. Additionally this year, Parcours de Chasse was available for those who wished to try a practice round or two, but this event was not included in official championship program.

Fosse Universelle, translated, is Universal Trench; shot from 16 metres over five machines connected with phonopull targets thrown are similar to our better known Olympic Trench. Skeet Olympique is of course our Olympic Skeet; gun down, up to three second delay, shot this year in new I.S.U. sequence. Fosse Americaine or Ball Trap is almost identical to our down-the-line and top of trap house is level with ground surface; this is shot from 16 metres, double barrel.

Pacours de Chasse is a simulated field course, similar I would think to Field & Game ranges in Victoria, and was in this instance installed on a steep rain forest covered hillside, just to the rear of main range. Two trap machines were used and competitors move to various shooting stations on hillside between traps with each move altering flight angle of targets. A round consisted of 25 targets using skeet guns and No. 9's. It is not easy!

Range facilities consisted of one universal trench layout, two skeet fields and two ball trap layouts. Clubhouse housed range administration staff, cartridge storage and, that all important appendage -- the bar. A tent was erected for dining room and excellent continental breakfasts and midday meals were provided at modest cost. Snacks were available at all times. We were advised that a new modern clubhouse should be ready for '78 championnats.

Official practice was programed September 29th thru October 1st with competitions commencing October 2nd. On last afternoon of practice our contingent conducted a 50 target elimination to decide our trench team resulting in Barry Nelis (Captain), Gordon Nelis, Alan Bould and Tom Lucas being in the front line. Due to some bad luck, we were, as a team, slaughtered.

Our shooters present having had little to no experience in Olympic Skeet, our erstwhile manager called for volunteers. He was not exactly mobbed in the rush, but following some murmuring about a possible dawn execution, our Kamikaze squad included Barry Nelis (Captain), Vince Molica, Max Vipond and Gordon Nelis. An effort was therefore made, but when the smoke had cleared the squad voted unanimously that scores be not held for posterity, but consigned, with despatch, if not sooner, to nearest trash can.

Fosse Americaine team selection was based on our Australian handicaps resulting in Vince Molica (Captain), Alan Bould, Barry Nelis and Gordon Nelis being the Australian Team. Fortunately, the old adage "you can't lose 'em all" was in our favour and we romped

in, just!

For first four days we shot 50 trench and 50 skeet targets each day. Team and individual grades placings were decided on first threé days (150 targets), with final day to decide individual placings off scratch (200 targets).

Fosse Americaine event was conducted on final two days, 100 targets per day, with team, grade and individual overall placings as

for trench and skeet above.

CLAY TARGETS IN PARADISE

Once again a very good selection of crackers was available with locals and many of the more adventurous tourists favouring FOB Carrega Grand Prix and Gevelot Trap Supervix 7½ nickel trench shells, and FOB Skeet 9's and Gevelot Skeet Supervix 9's. All the above are p-r-e-t-t-y hot stuff. Other European shells available included Black Legia, Manufrance Verna Trap and FOB Type Training. Winchester AA 7's and 9's, Red Ranger 7's and 9's and Black Ranger 7's were also available.

Strange to relate, quite a few competitors, myself included, experienced problems with misfires and blown primers, with both European and locally made shells. I hasten to add that this is not a criticism, merely an observation; for manufacturers to produce the millions of shells that they do, it is a tribute to their quality control that such occurences are extremely few and far between.

During the matches we were once again privileged to enjoy a visit from Ms. Jean-Gabiel Eriau the High Commissioner of New Caledonia, who was accompanied by his Minister for Sport. Ms. Eriau, himself a firearms enthusiast specialising in collecting Colt pistols, displayed a keen interest in the competitions and obviously enjoyed mixing with the shooters.

One of the social activities was a monster smorgasbord/barbecue dinner supplied by our wonderful hosts at completion of shooting one evening. It was a great night at which many friendships were well and truly cemented as the bar ran dry.

On yet another evening our hosts invited delegates from participating countries to attend a FITASC (International Sports Clay Pigeon Shooting Federation) information meeting and Dr Raymond Young and I had the pleasure of attending. Held at the hotel Isle de France, delegates were advised of the possibility of a World Championship for non-Olympic events and/or a World Cup for Parcours de Chasse. Our hosts were keen to receive ideas on this matter and also the extent to which Pacific area countries would participate. Delegates have forwarded reports on this meeting to the A.C.T.A. for consideration.

Highlight of festivities was closing ceremony and presentation of medals and trophies. This was a colourful occasion indeed, right up to presentation of High Gun award, a Beretta S58 trap gun, at which silver medallist Dupuy walked off with forend and bronze medallist Bareth walked off with barrels, leaving winner Barry Nelis standing on victory dais holding buttstock-receiver and an amazed look! A typically French humorous ending enjoyed by all present.

Following closing formalities the Australian team, on behalf of the A.C.T.A., made a presentation to the ladies behind the men who had made the championships the success that they were, as a small token of appreciation from the visiting team and an expression of goodwill between our two countries. The presentation, especially selected to be Australian in character, consisted of solid white opal pendants and were presented to Mde. Bareth, wife of the President of The Ligue de Tir de Nouvelle Caledonie; Mde. Lussiez, wife of the President of The Club de Tir Caledonien; Mde. Furace, wife of the Vice President; Mde. Coniglio, wife of the Secretary; and Mde. Delem, wife of the Treasurer.

Immediately following closing ceremony the Kiwi contingent, clad in winter woolly's and snowshoes (it had snowed in Auckland that morning) bade us a sad farewell and hightailed it for Tontouta airport for their flight home, not too many of them being keen to take their new suntans back to snow country. Unfortunately they missed the closing dinner dance due to a hitch in their itinerary and it was a pity that they were not present at this gala occasion.

Dates have not yet been set for the '78 Championnats due to complexities of late 1978 world calendar. In the Augustto October period we have the North American trap championships at Vandalia, Ohio; the skeet championships at San Antonio, Texas; the Commonwealth Games at Edmonton, Alberta; the Pesta Sukan in Singapore; and the big one, the 42nd World Shooting Championships at Seoul, South Korea.

It will not be easy for the organisers to find a time slot for Noumea, but when the dates do become known I suggest that readers give strong thought to participating. You are assured an enjoyable visit; I hope to make it again next year and if I do it will be. my fourth trip, so I am not leading you astray.

Until Noumea in '78, au revoir.





TRAPSHOOTING

with Elgin Gates

An important factor that many trap-shooters give little thought to is the impact point of their shotgun. I'm not speaking here of the pattern itself, but the impact of the pattern at say 35 or 40 yards—where the target normally is broken—in relation to the sight picture. This varies a great deal from gun to gun, even among identical models. The answer, in many cases, can be found in the barrel.

Most shotgun barrels are made from thin tubing, and by the time they go through the many operations of manufacture including the installation of the rib — usually by silver-brazing — probably not one in fifty is dead true. The impact point varies accordingly.

Let me give an example: for several months I had been shooting an auto-loading model of a well known make. I liked the gun — and still do. The stock was properly fitted; I had the feel of it; and was shooting some excellent scores. Then the barrel developed a crack near the receiver end, so I ordered a new barrel, same length, same choke. I put it on, and suddenly I was missing targets right and left. It had to be me, I thought, as the new barrel was identical to the old one. I went through a frustrating period trying other guns, new-techniques — and went from bad to worse. What I didn't know at the time was that the impact point of the new barrel at 40 yards was two feet lower and a foot to the left of my original barrel.

Finally an old gunsmith showed me how to read a barrel. Here is how to do it: First, be sure the barrel is clean.

Then hold it up so that the receiver or chamber end is about four inches from your eye and point it toward the sky or a white wall. You will see a series of concentric rings in the barrel. The first or largest ring is the receiver end of the barrel; the second is at the end of the chamber. The next ring will seem to be about half-way down the barrel. Each of these will be progressively smaller in size. In some barrels, especially those with forcing cones, you may see two or three additional rings. The last, or smallest ring is the muzzle. For the moment, IGNORE the smallest or muzzle ring and concentrate on centering the other rings inside of each other.

I can read a barrel quickly by holding it in my hands, but for the first few times you should try this with the barrel clamped in a vice. When your eye has the first three or four larger rings centred exactly inside of each other, then hold this picture and let your eye pick up

the smallest or muzzle ring. If it, too, is EXACTLY in the centre of the other rings, you are looking through a barrel that is quite true or straight. (You may have to practise this a few times to get the hangof it.)

Now, if the smallest or muzzle ring is to the left or the right, or high or low in relation to the other rings, the barrel is not true and the impact point will vary accordingly.

The muzzle ring of my first barrel — the one that was shooting good for me — is about a sixteenth-of-an-inch high. The muzzle ring in the replacement barrel was slightly low and a sixteenth to the left. The difference in the impact point of the pattern resulted first in a few lost targets. Then, as I attempted to correct this by experimenting with my shooting technique — not yet knowing about the different impact point — things really went to hell.

The turning point came when the old gunsmith showed me how to read barrels. I had him straighten and align the new barrel to match the old one exactly, including the sixteenth-high muzzle ring.

Having been so badly fouled up in the meantime, it took a while to get back in the groove, but it WAS the answer. Naturally, I checked all my other barrels and guns, finding only one barrel that was really straight.

As another example, a good friend had a very expensive trap gun with which he gradually worked up to AA class, winning several championships. I looked through the barrel of his gun one day, noting that the muzzle ring was low, about the equivalent of a foot at impact distance. Since he was shooting so well, I didn't mention it.

Shortly thereafter, returning by airline from a distant shoot, the rib of his gun was damaged during baggage handling. He had it repaired. When I saw him several weeks later he was on the verge of despair, having shot some terrible scores. Suspecting the truth—after he told me about the repair—I broke the gun and checked it.

The muzzle ring was almost a quarter-inch HIGH. His original impact point had been changed three or four feet! The heat of silver-brazing the rib blocks back on had warped the barrel up. He, had it straightened to the original slightly low alignment, and shortly was shooting AA scores again.

The point here is that a man may be shooting up a storm with a gun that had—in his case—a barrel that was impacting a foot low, or whatever. But let him pick up an identical model with the same dimensions, or let him change barrels, or have the rib repaired and he may have a barrel with a different—AND UNKNOWN TO HIM—impact point. The results can make a man want to swear off shooting.

I ended up with four barrels for my autoloader, all of which had different impact points, and had them realigned to match the first barrel with the sixteenth-high muzzle ring. Three of them shoot virtually the same. The fourth crawls back out of line during the heat of shooting so I put it aside.

For double barrel shooting, a gun with a single barrel will at least put both shots in the same place. Over and Under models are SUP-POSED to be aligned so that the impact point of both barrels comes together at approximately 40 yards. I've checked many of them that didn't.

Less than a month ago I checked an O/U gun of a well-known make that had just come back from the factory repair shop. The owner had missed so many targets he was about to go crazy. The under barrel was warped down and shooting at least a foot low. The over barrel a foot-and-a-half high. They were shooting just the opposite of where they should have been. He was an unhappy man when I showed him what was happening, and it was quite anexpensive piece of work to get them properly aligned so he could shoot decent scores again.

The whole point of this barrel reading business is this: If you are "on" and shooting well, it really doesn't matter where the muzzle ring is. But if you have changed barrels, had some rib repair work done, bought a new gun of an identifical model, and suddenly are having trouble hitting targets that you used to break, then before you sell the gun or wrap it around a fence post in frustration, or change all your shooting habits trying to cure the trouble, read the barrels and check or compare the impact point. You may find the answer to your problem.

EDITOR'S MAILBOX

I am a keen and active D.T.L. shooter and travel to as many Clubs

and open shoots as possible, usually shooting twice a week.

In recent months I have travelled extensively having attended the "Nationals" at Brisbane, the N.S.W. State Carnival at Guyra and many more large open programs. At most of these fixtures I have encountered very poor refereeing standards, not only in blatantly inconsistent release of targets but also erratic rule interpretation.

Admittedly, I call very quickly and as such, most assuredly contribute to a high proportion of slow releases. Every shooter knows that all referees are capable of fast or slow pulls at some stage, but I feel that the test of a good referee is whether or not he recognises

and acknowledges this fault when it occurs.

Open shoots involve high travelling, accommodation and nomination expenses, which should entitle the shooter to total equity when he elects to support and compete in any program. This lack of equity has discouraged me (and a lot of others as well) to the point where I am reluctant to return to some Clubs, despite almost overwhelming desire to shoot at every opportunity. I think you will agree that our sport needs a lot of stimulation and promotion and really cannot afford to be affected detrimentally by such fundamental contingencies.

Possibly the introduction of the National Coaching system for shooters could be expanded to include compulsory coaching for referees as well. It appears to me that refereeing standards are not adequately policed, and once having gained his/her badge a referee can adopt a dictatorial attitude against which a shooter has little or no redress.

Until a refereeing system which reduces or eliminates a lot of the human error involved is implemented, I feel that a higher standard should not only be encouraged but insisted upon, in fairness to the paying consumer (the shooter).

I was most interested to note the reference in November Shooting News to Veteran Shooters (page 4) because it prompts me to air a matter which has been in my mind for several years, and which I raised a couple of times at meetings of the now defunct Victorian Western District Clay Target Association.

I feel that the ACTA could recognise the support given to our sport by people who fall within one of the above groups by granting them Honorary Life Registrations. In the formative years of the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association, (later re-named Australian Clay Target Association), opportunity was given shooters to buy life membership for about twenty pounds, as I recall it, but I think that for various reasons, mainly financial, only relatively few would have accepted the offer. The cost to the ACTA of adopting my suggestion would be low, for, when all is said and done our allotted life span is three score years and ten, and, "it is later than you think".

On the title page of each issue of Shooting News there appears a list of men who have been so honoured by the ACTA, principally because of their service to our sport at ACTA Executive level, and they richly deserve such honour. However, the ACTA would not exist without Clubs, and it is at Clublevel that I think of the people (men and women) who, year after year accept and perform the duties of president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, delegate, committeeman, marshal, P.R.O., trap mechanic, coach, referee, referee examiner, team captain, groundsman, grass-cutter, toilet-cleaner and general factotum. Any veteran with 25-30 years service would hardly have escaped some of these jobs, and no doubt he would have derived a fair amount of pleasure in the process.

The publication of this letter in Shooting News, Noel, may spark discussion at State or Federal levels, and as the ball has been set rolling someone may be prepared to give it a push -- or just stick a pin in it.

Re Handicapping.

I would like to add my support to the comments by J. Draper whose letter appeared in Oct. CTSN. I feel that doubling trophy values is a retrograde step in (a) raising costs (b) assisting the good shots beat the handicapper. I also feel that handicapping should be related to targets broken and the shooter who achieves 100% over a hundred targets should be handicapped on 25 metres. By bringing each shooter forward every 2% we have front markers on 72%, this would put 80% shooter on 16 metres. There are shooters who can break 80% on marks forward of this.

In closing I would ask any shooters who have similar or contrary views to write to the Secretary of the ACTA and let him have their

views.

South Australian Clay Target Assn.

A meeting of the South Australian Clay Target Association was held in the Clubrooms of the S.A. Gun Club on 3rd December 1977, which attracted an attendance of six Clubs. This is a disappointing show of support for an Association which has the mammoth task of organizing the 1978 National Championships.

The future of the National Association is very heavily dependent on strong State Associations - this will be even more so after the proposed changes to the National Constitution are implemented.

So what is wrong with Clubs in South Australia? Is it true that the shooters who make up these Clubs don't care? This is NOT the case! I have met and spoken with a number of South Australian shooters in the past twelve months to know that there is more interest in the development of our sport now than ever before. So why the poor attendance? Possibly the problem is connected with distances to be travelled by Club Delegates - or another possibility is that the State Association is progressing so effectively that member clubs feel there is no need for them to be involved. Maybe a reason is lack of motivation or break-down in communications. As an "outsider" I cannot provide the answers. However, I am strongly suggesting that Clubs in South Australia take a good hard look at the situation - as was stated earlier, the future of the A.C.T.A. is heavily dependent on strong, virile, enthusiastic State Associations.

In spite of the above comments, it is to the credit of the very willing workers involved in the planning of the 1978 Nationals that the series look like being the biggest and the best ever.



National President visits International Gun Club S.A.




Peter Marcionni in full flight! (photo by Pat Browne)

Records Set at 1977 Cherry Tree

A record number of entries, perfect weather and excellent shooting all contributed to making the 1977 Cherry Tree Pool Field Championship shooting event an outstanding success. The annual shoot which is staged by the Katanning Clay Target Club is the largest of its type in Australia.

For the first time in the history of the shoot nominations passed the two hundred mark with 215 shooters competing. They came from all parts of W.A. and included two from inter-state. The previous record was last year, when 198 shooters took part.



To establish a record is no mean feat, but to do it under such poor conditions was a freak performance.







The last shoot at Burwood was held on 15 March 1969 and it was expected that within a year or so the Lysterfield ground would be available. In fact, owing to delays in getting control of the land, finance and the difficulty of reaching agreement between the F & G and the Club, this stretched out to over three years. During this long recess the committee met regularly as did the members at annual meetings and on Saturday 3rd June, 1972, the first shoot was held at Lysterfield with an attendance of 138 using two skeet grounds and three D.T.L.

The Australian Gun Club continued to run successful shoots every second Sunday until they dissolved their association with the Field and Game on the 31st August, 1977.

The Presidents that followed Dudley Edgerton were: Bill Stone, Barry Arnott, Col Lukey and Gordon Morgan.

The ever increasing pressures being brought to bear on both the Frankston and Australian Gun Clubs from conservationist and Antinoise committees, made it quite evident that if we wished to shoot on Sundays both clubs would have to move to new grounds.

The ideal situation was for both clubs to amalgamate, pool their manpower and finances and build a new shooting ground. This was eventually achieved and both clubs have now amalgamated and the new club name is the Frankston-Australian Gun Club.

The new club is shooting on the old Frankston Gun Club grounds every Sunday until the new grounds are completed.

Through great effort from an extremely hard working committee and members, the new ground is progressing in leaps and bounds. We hope to hold our Grand Opening shoot early February 1978.

The Frankston-Australian Gun Club will have facilities for complete family recreation. While dad enjoys his chosen sport, Mum and the children will have pleasant surroundings and facilities to enjoy a total family outing.

FRANKSTON & PENINSULA GUN CLUB TRACES ITS HISTORY

The Frankston and Peninsula Gun Club commenced about 1949 in a paddock behind the home of Ian Evans at Overport Rd, Frankston. Ian, who spent many years with the Club as a Committeeman, organiser, sometimes President, Life Member but now deceased, was also one of the founders, with Bill Baxter (Grandfather of the Bill Baxter presently shooting), Noel Miller and Bill Twyrold.

The foundation President was Bill Twyrold, a great exponent of our sport, who spent many years with the Club, several as President. Bill later moved to Wilcannia, N.S.W. Rumour has it that it was the only way out of the Presidency. The Club first shot over an old "Plus" trap, temporarily operated by Geoff Wickes who was later to become involved with the Club as Committeeman, Armourer, President and Life Member, and after a few months moved from Overport Road, to Charlie Grant's paddocks on the Frankston/Flinders Road where they shot until about the 9th year, when a C.R.B. road cut through the property forcing a change to a nearby paddock owned by Charlie's brother Theo.

Five years later the Committee were forced to look elsewhere and this led them to the "Army Reserve" where the joint Club now shoots. A "Damo" electric trap was first installed in 1966, powered by a portable generator for some time before electricity became available. Another electric trap built by Geoff Dickes was also used for some time until the Club progressed to a three trap layout and were replaced by "White Flyers", currently in use. Some of the long standing Committeemen still on the shooting scene include Bluey Male, Hughie Cooper, John Ivey, Max Thomas and Geoff Farrar.

Past Presidents included such names as Glen McComb an active worker in the Club's earlier days and now a Life Member, Bruce McComb Life Member and still occasionally shooting, Bruce Hall Life Member, Noel Miller Life Member (Noel would probably be the longest standing Club member and still shooting), Keith Pretty, now President/Secretary of Dandenong Club, Cyril Oke Life Member, Max Pescott, Jack Rodgers, Des Donnellan Life Member and finally Graham Ash.

The Club ran many charity shoots over the years to raise funds for the Royal Children's Hospital and one for the "Angel of Mercy" amhulance

Our first State Title shoot was held in 1970 and many have been successfully held since.

Some of the better known shooters to come from the ranks of Frankston and who have been included in Victorian or Australian Teams would be Bill Twyrold, Mick Hamilton, Len Baker, Roy Adams, Ron Garth, Bill Stone, Geoff Farrar, Graham Ash, etc., etc.

This summary has been based entirely on memories and any omissions are regretted.


